National TV news commentator Hughes Rudd told his park morning audience Monday that his organization "Couldn't understand why the little town of Woodville would want to be an out-house anyway."

If you asked Clyde Gray "why?" on Saturday odds are that you wouldn't have gotten an answer as busy as he was, but, it was written all over his face, nevertheless.

Gray was responsible for gathering nearly 1,000 persons Saturday at the entrance to his Heritage Garden Village to witness a helicopter lift-off from Woodville with the destination of the privy in Nederland as part of its Bicentennial Festivities.

Just as many folks were on hand to greet the incoming helicopter and privy in Nederland and among them was Congressman Charles Wilson, who donated "A year's supply of the Congressional Record" which he said "Was a necessary ingredient for any privy."

Gray put the spectacular idea together with Port Arthur's famous A.J. Justice who said he needed an outhouse to compliment the Nederland Festival activities.

The fest earned both Woodville and Nederland miles of television film and a ream or two of newspaper coverage in state and national publications.

Gray says further "It's not over yet."

Dorothy Nettes, candidate for Commissioner Precinct 1 in Tyler County and Owner of the local Sears store here presented the group with an official copy of the Sears catalog to go with the privy flight.

An official "outhouse queen" was designated who was complete with bouquet of corn-cob while robed in a flowing newspaper gown, Kimmy Lashio, a Burmese Country singer charmed the group with popular American songs.

Tyler County's own Jethro Holmes and his two oxen Tom and Jerry helped pull the outhouse to its launching pad where the small chopper picked up the privy amongst gusty winds and the applause of the crowd.

A group then formed an automobile parade to the Nederland Festival where the landing provided some excitement for the flatland folks who joined in the festival activities.



Bicentennial Is Big Part Of Dogwood Festival

The streets of Woodville will take on a festive air of bicentennialism Saturday, April 3 at 2 p.m. with flags flying, bands marching and soldiers marching. One of the most important flags to wave that day will be the official bicentennial flag which will be presented to the courtly following the Dogwood parade.

Leading the parade will be the Fort Polk Color Guard and Drill Team clad in their colorful 1776 uniforms. The 17-member group will include a drummer, a fifer and a flag bearer.

Over 14,000 persons are expected to attend the annual Dogwood Weekend parade according to parade chairman George Jarrett, U.S. senator John Tower will serve as the parade marshal and later speak at the flag presentation. There will be over 125 entries in the parade this year.

Courtly pleasers will include the Jasper Lions Club rodeo "Good Guys" and "Bad Guys" who will be staging their traditional "shoot-outs" along the parade course. The Shrimpers will bring their marching group, clowns and funny automobiles.

There will be eight marching bands in the parade. Choral music will be provided by the "Southwesterns" of Robert E. Lee High School, Houston. This group is directed by Miss Esther Grant and will perform at the Dogwood Festival night.

I want to express my personal appreciation to "The Tyler County Booster" for their cooperation and assistance in keeping our communication lines available.

In the news papers and on TV almost daily

that the United States Postal Service has problems.

The Woodville post office shares their proportionate part.

Even with these problems we still have the greatest delivery record in the country.

Delivers fifty percent of the world's mail volume each

and every day of the year. The Woodville post office also and with the other more than 30,000 post offices does its job.

During the past 20 years the Woodville office has had many changes and much growth. City delivery has been installed serving a day a possible 200 businesses and homes. The new building recently completed has been built during more adequate lighting system for better working conditions and more parking space for customers making us better able to serve the community.

We have two more employees than 20 years ago but

the volume of mail is much greater. Changing facilities, different scheduling of employees and changing schedule of incoming and outgoing mail has made it easier.

The Woodville Post Office has one Rural Route and one

Star Route, both are Number 1. These two rural delivery units serve a total area of 100 miles for 20 years ago.

Now we have 100 miles of delivery route and 150 boxes. Now it is 120 miles and serves 176 areas.

The Star route was about 40 miles with 75 boxes and

now has grown to 100 miles serving a total of 100 boxes

and days. Each week Dogwood Rural Office has invited

several hundred people from here with 130 post office boxes.

We are scheduled to receive a mail at 6:30 a.m.

and expect Saturday and Sunday mail to be delivered by 4:30 p.m. in time to go out that day.

We are committed to deliver any first class mail that meets this criteria the next day with in 150 miles of this office. Our carriers are scheduled to arrive or leave the office at 6:30 a.m. and to leave the first class mail boxes in the post office by 8:30 a.m. daily.

When mail comes in later or is poorly addressed or not encoded this makes our task more difficult. We serve

as a post office and a service center.

We know that without you the citizens of the Woodville delivery area would have it worse. We want you to know that we are here to serve you to the very best of our ability. Your help in giving our ability.
