

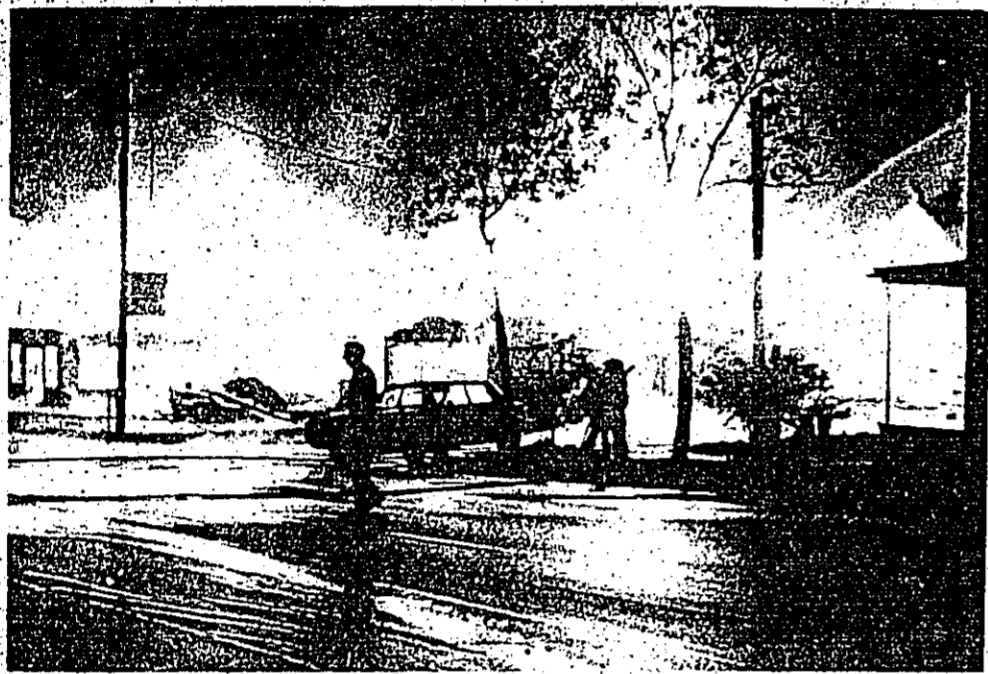

Fire Guts Two Colmesneil Businesses

Fire Loss Heavy In Colmesneil

Tyler County firemen were busy this week with two major fires and several grass fires skirmishes around the county.

A blaze Monday which was quelled about midnight, saw the destruction of two Colmesneil businesses as firemen responded from Woodville and Chester to fight the blaze.

Another fire on Friday, gutted the central living area of the Jimmy Dean residence in Woodville.

The B and B Automotive Service Company was completely burned to the ground along with its neighbor store the Pittman Drug Store.

There were eight cars which burned up in the fire and three more which sustained heat damage after being towed from the front of the Automotive business into Highway 89. Windows were cracked from the intense heat.

Fireman Faircloth termed the blaze "A real hot fire" and said that some 24 volunteers assisted in the fire fighting.

Colmesneil Fire Chief Jimmy Davis sustained a cut on his right hand requiring several stitches. Colmesneil Fireman Don Barker climbed to the roof of the Harrington residence and with a flashlight searched for flames atop the roof.

Woodville fire trucks poured approximately 20,000 gallons of water on the blaze while Colmesneil firemen used 30,000 gallons.

Estimated combined damage figures will approximate nearly \$75,000 fire authorities reported.

The fire which occurred last week in Woodville at the Dean residence, caused some \$10,000 damage, firemen reported.

White, Jr., Secretary of State, spoke to the County Clerks on the New Election Laws. The County Democratic and Republican Chairmen along with the Precinct Chairmen also attended the session.

Ray Hardy, District clerk of Harris County and Mr. R.E. Scherer, Jr., District clerk of Chambers County were co-chairmen for a question-answer session for District Clerks on the subject of "Legislative Direction". Greg Hooser from the State Bar Association was also available for discussion.

The "Resolutions of Respect" were read and adopted for the two recently deceased Clerks, Fred Hill, County clerk of Jefferson County and Nation Lee Clark, District clerk of Newton County.

The group experienced lunch at the Pickett House and resumed their meeting that afternoon.

Door prizes were donated by local merchants. R.E. Scherer, Jr. and Patricia Brown, Area VII co-leaders encouraged all to attend the State Meeting in June to be held in Brownsville, Texas.

City Ballots Are Counted

The Woodville City Council canvassed votes for the city election Saturday which saw some 365 ballots cast in that contest.

Terry Watts, who replaced Grady James as mayor of the city, earned a total of 268 votes. Watts said Tuesday that he wanted to thank all those who voted for him, "in spite of the fact that I ran unopposed."

J.M. Radford was reelected on the council along with political newcomer Doug Tolbert. Radford was reelected with a vote total of 229 while Tolbert 255.

A third candidate in the selection was David Mann who earned 123 votes.

Swearing in ceremonies for Watts will be held on Monday with City Attorney Josiah Wheat administering the oath of office for the top city post in this city's general law 31-dermanic form of government.

School Votes In

In contested races on the Woodville Independent School Board Margaret Land was elected to Place Four and incumbent Eric Sullivan was reelected in his Place 5 position.

Incumbent W.S. Nichols received a total of 623 votes. Lane who collected 370 votes won out over Tom Knight who earned 310. D.M. White earned only 74 votes in that race for Place 4.

Sullivan earned a vote total of 393 votes while Jack Esler earned 343 in the Place 5 contest.

A possible 3500 persons were eligible to vote in the Woodville District election with only 767 turning out at the polls.

Lane won a seat vacated by E.L. Boyd who stepped aside to run in the County Commissioners race.

In the Warren School Board race Bill Cormier, with 548 votes, beat Feta Bolding with 272 votes for Position 3 seat.

Kenneth Gregory got 732 in an uncontested race for position 5.

Marvin Fannin, with 466 votes, won the Position 7 race. Opponents B.itten Yawn and Louise Knight got 15 and 394 votes respectively.

The Warren School District has 1,300 registered voters. In the Chester Independent School Board race Ray Barnes was re-elected and newcomer Joe Barnett were elected by a large majority.

Franklin Handley, who ran uncontested, was elected to a two year term.

The Colmesneil School Board race incumbent Doyle O. Cowart was re-elected with 100 votes. John A. Pittman was elected with a total of 114 votes.

Fund Applications Due

These seventeen projects constitute the largest number of final applications for Community Development Block Grant funds received by any COG area in Texas.

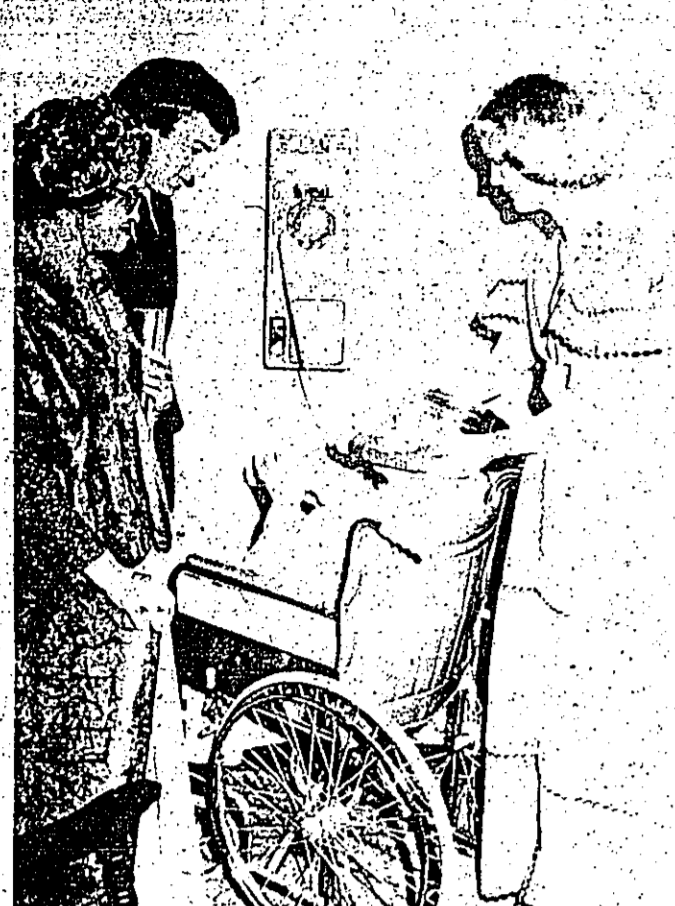
- 1. City of Nacogdoches (Nacogdoches County) - \$250,000 for city improvements.

- 5. City of Trinity (Trinity County) - \$100,000 for a sewer lift station, water lines and fire hydrants for the north part of the city.
- 6. City of Thompson (Shelby County) - \$100,000 for water facility repairs, sewer extensions and street improvements.
- 7. City of Colmesneil (Tyler County) - \$100,000 for water system improvements and extension.
- 8. City of Goodrich (Polk County) - \$100,000 for water system improvements.
- 9. City of Hamphill (Galveston County) - \$100,000 for water main and fire hydrants.
- 10. City of Grovton (Trinity County) - \$100,000 for water system extension and fire hydrants.
- 11. City of Pinaland (Galveston County) - \$100,000 for street improvements.

Congress Told Timber Issue Affects Consumer

WASHINGTON D.C.—Congress was told that the American consumer will suffer shortages and higher prices for wood and paper products unless legislation is passed that encourages modern forestry on federal forest lands. That warning, and the likelihood of tens of thousands of workers loss of jobs, was given by spokesmen recent-ly for the forest industry in testimony before the Senate Agriculture and Interior Committee, which are considering legislation to amend the 1897 law that restricts severely timber harvests and sales on National Forests.

Industry spokesmen said all consumers would suffer under one legislative proposal, that would reduce the wood output of federal forests by 60 percent. They endorsed another bill before the Committee as a "reasonable and responsible" approach that protects all forest values as well as consumers.

The spokesmen stated that the growth and harvest of timber on those lands under sound management could be increased by 50 percent over time, and in an environmentally and economically sound manner. The National Forests supply 15 percent of the total U.S. timber harvest, industry spokesmen said, the same percentage of oil that was lost during the embargo by Arab countries.

"This is a consumer issue," a spokesman said, pointing out that even those consumers who do not use National Forest wood fiber directly will feel the effects of wood and paper shortages if timber from the National Forests is embargoed.

The spokesman who compared a five-member panel representing the National Forest Products Association with John H. Crowell, general counsel of Louisiana-Pacific Corp., Portland, Ore., Paul E. Edinger, senior vice president of Edward James Lumber Co., Wash., D.C., Robert A. Boyd, president of WHP Lumber Co., Sedro-Woolley, Wash., A.C. Edwards, woodland manager of the W. Steaco Corp., North Charleston, S.C., and Joseph H. McInnis, vice president and general counsel of National Forest Products Association, Washington, D.C.

They endorsed the principles of S. 3091, introduced by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.), which would amend the 79-year-old Act, which they pointed out, was adopted when forestry was a non-existent science in the United States and in which forestry could not be foreseen.

Recent court interpretations of that 1897 law threaten to cut the supply of wood fiber from the National Forests by 75 percent in the short term, 50 percent through the end of the century.

Industry spokesmen said the Humphrey bill would protect both the environment and the economy and give the Forest Service, which manages the National Forest System, the flexibility that both the agency and professional foresters insist is essential to manage diverse lands for all values — timber, water, wildlife and recreation.

The forest industry opposed S. 2126, introduced by Sen. Jennings Randolph (D-W. Va.), which they said would perpetuate the obsolete restrictions resulting from recent judicial interpretations of the 1897 Act.

Industry spokesmen said the Randolph bill would "mandate a 40 percent forestry right out of existence." They said independent analyses of the bill by the Forest Service and the National Forest Products Association showed it would reduce the total timber harvest from the National Forests by 60 to 60 percent.

Industry witnesses compared the prescriptive restrictions contained in the Randolph bill with legislation that would tell physicians what scalpel to use or journalists what upriver to use and how many words to put in a sentence.

They said foresters cannot practice forestry in a strait-jacket, nor can forestry practices be proscribed for the management of 100 different species of trees growing on 500 million acres of land that have widely varying soils and climates and where management objectives must consider the economic and social needs of communities from Puerto Rico to Alaska.

Industry testimony showed it would be impossible to stilt timber harvesting from the National Forests to private lands, as some preservationist groups have suggested. They said private lands are already contributing 77.7 percent of the total U.S. harvest — 26.2 percent from industry owned lands and 51.5 percent from industry private lands.

Public lands supply 22.3 percent of the total harvest, they said, with 15.6 percent coming from the National Forests and 6.7 percent from other federal, state and municipal lands.

Industry testimony cited a number of authoritative studies prepared for the 1974 President's Advisory Panel on Timber and the Environment, that show private lands

WASHINGTON—The social philosopher, Irving Kristol has described the small-businessman as the "New Forgotten Man" of America.

The small businessman is, of course, remembered only too well by the IRS, OSHA, EPA, CPSC, FCC, and dozens of other bureaus, boards, agencies, and commissions in federal and state governments.

But those who examine the problems of small businessmen must agree that Kristol that small businessmen are overtaxed, overregulated, and underappreciated.

The time has come for Congress to remember the New Forgotten Man. For the last several years, I have proposed legislation to raise the six-tax exemption for small business to the first \$100,000 of taxable income.

I have also sponsored legislation to raise the exemption on federal estate taxes from the current \$60,000 to a more realistic \$200,000.

But a comprehensive, rather than a piecemeal approach is required, and that is why I hope Congress will complete action soon on my bill to create a commission on small business to study all the problems of small businessmen and recommend solutions. Perhaps then the "New Forgotten Man" will be forgotten no longer.

The residents really enjoy their special seasons each month. Mr. Bryan Sturrock says they have loved all the love. This is what they have taken in our morning.

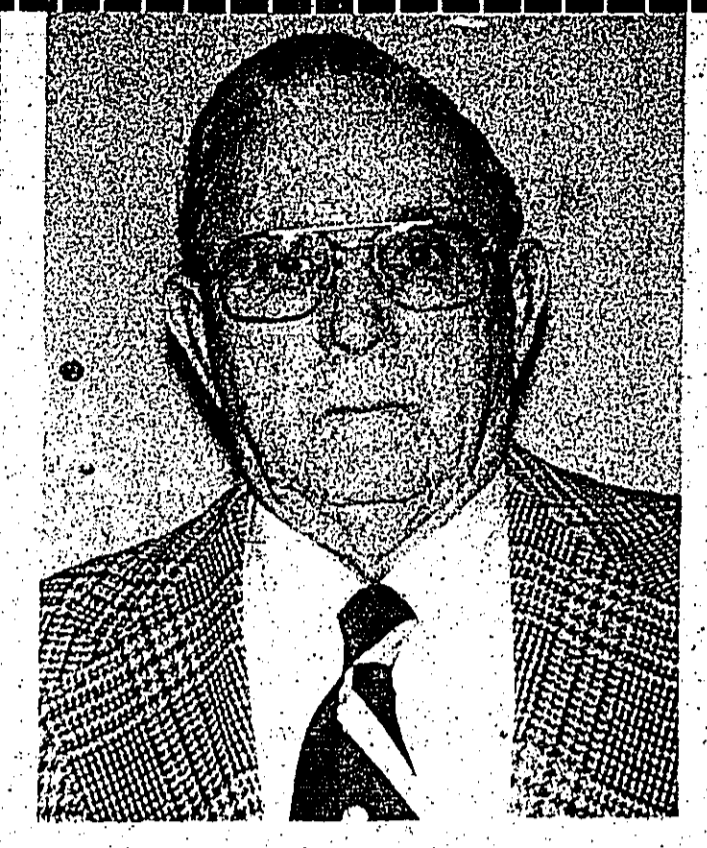
