## Commissioners In Busy Session

The Tyler County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday and agreed to advertise for bids for a new car for the County Sheriff's office and other businesses approved for payment some \$31,265.34 in bills to the county.

The County also received a quarterly Federal Revenue Sharing check totaling \$41,614. The check applies to third quarter expenditures which the Commissioners spent considerable time budgeting at the Monday meeting.

Sheriff Lewis Craven alerted the Commissioners on the need of a new patrol car which would replace a 3-year-old unit now in operation by the Sheriff's office.

Craven also asked permission of the Commissioners to allow him to purchase "less than" \$200 worth of "seatbelts" lights for each car in the department. The request was

approved by Commissioner Kenneth Ball and by Bj-Jordan.

Some \$600 was requested by the Sheriff for the installation of additional crystal units to be installed in Department of Public Safety cars in the county which would tune them on county radio transmissions. Craven reported to the Commissioners that the request "would help in better coverage of traffic accidents and other emergencies". Craven said the new system would require a "tower" to be installed in the radio tower which would enable the DPS vehicles to hear the high band calls made by the Sheriff's office. The request was granted using revenue sharing funds.

Tax Assessor Collector Barbara Tolbert addressed the Court asking permission to attend the May 16 State Conference of Tax Assessors

and Collectors in M-Allen. The Commissioners agreed to fund the trip for the County tax officer and her deputy.

Approval was also granted the Tax office to hire a full-time person at regular deputy salary due to the retirement of one of Luther Owens. Tax Assessor Tolbert pointed to an increase work load in the tax office, "Especially now during election time," she said. Commissioners H. M. Parks and Joe Best approved the request.

In other action both the County Extension Agents report for March and the County Treasurers report received approval from the Commissioners.

Other business included an authorization to repair electrical problems in the county jail facility caused by prisoners who have torn the present system apart.

A report from a local electrical contractor A.L. Folk prompted Judge Tom Dick Mann to pass a motion advising each prisoner to be jailed of the costs to be incurred if damage is done to the electrical system. Sheriff Craven said he would advise each prisoner before being placed in the jail.

A trip to Austin which was requested by Anne Paridon and Janie Morrell of the County Auditor's Office to attend the Auditor's Institute was approved by Commissioners.

A motion to institute a 30 miles an hour speed limit on the Bloomington Road in Fred was approved by Commissioners Jordan and Ball. The County Sheriff's office was asked to post the speed limit in the area to alert drivers.

Sheriff Department Jailor Robert Jones was rehired as an extra dispatcher in the sheriff's department. "Provided it does not interfere with present wage and hour laws."

The Commissioners agreed to advertise for a sale on a Cadillac heavy machine presently located in Precinct 3, Colm. snell.

The appraisal firm of Richard E. Pritchard, Inc. presented a brief picture to the commissioners of what looks like a "brighter" gas and oil tax revenue picture. Consistently referring to the fuel production situation in the county as "looking good".

Frank E. Pritchard pointed to the fact that his company had lot of work to do in the next sixty days in charting the will log activity and the completion dates around the county.

Following the report, the appraisal firm asked for and received a two year contract which was approved by the Commissioners Court.

Other business by the court involved the canvassing of the County School Board election, seating J.R. Smith in Precinct 1, E.C. Hurdin in Precinct 3 and Jeff Ratcliff at large.

All members of the Commissioner court were present including Judge Mann and Commissioners Ball, Parks, Best and Jordan. County Auditor Earl King was present along with Assistant Ave Fondren, County Clerk Allen Swanson recorded the minutes of the meeting.

The courtroom gallery included Commissioner Precinct 1 candidate Dorothy Nyles and County Sheriff Candidate Herman Nolan.

## Watts Takes Oath

Oath-of-office ceremonies were the highlight of the Woodville City Council's regular meeting Monday as Terry Watts assumed the top city position in Woodville, as he was sworn in by 10:30-time City Attorney Don Wheat.

Wheat, also administered the oath-of-office to Doug Tolbert, who replaces Watts in his alderman position and Dr. J.M. Radford who was re-elected on the council Monday.

Dr. Jim Jette was voted as Mayor Pro-tem on a motion by Aldermen Gordon Anderson which was seconded by Radford.

Other business at the meeting included an explanation to new council member Doug Tolbert about a parking permit and/or special designated parking area request from commissioners' court which was brought to the council several weeks ago by the County Commissioners.

Tolbert was advised that the Council had previously decli-

ed to allow parking permits. Once the last one's had expired.

The council voted to let the current position stand "By not allowing special permits or any designated area for parking for county employees or anyone else."

In other action, the council granted a request for streetlights to be placed in the Springwood Addition.

The City of Woodville has "been put on notice" by the Tennessee Gas and Pipeline Company of a pending rate increase, amounting to some 4.8 cents per 100 cubic feet.

The Council, who have just experienced a "bad" December in terms of cold weather were made aware of the company's request, which seeks an effective start date for the new increase of May 1.

The council was also alerted about a visit from Gulf States Utilities for their next regular meeting on May 10 when a Gulf States representative will appear seeking an appar-

ent rate increase.

One reason cited by GSU in a petition presented to the city was that "From the time of filing of the last general rate increase in 1971, GSU's cost of doing business has increased dramatically due in part to rapid increases in labor, material, and capital precipitation by a period of unprecedented inflation and general economic uncertainty."

In other business the council heard a brief proposal from Don Stephenson, representing the Trinity Valley Broadcasting Company regarding an interest in helping the city obtain a cable TV company. Stephenson indicated that his company would submit a firm proposal at a later date if they wished. The council indicated that they would entertain any proposal on the subject.

The meeting ended following an executive session involving police department secretarial personnel.

## Demo Absentee Ballot Stalled By Print Delay

County Clerk Allen Sturrock reminds all Democratic Party voters in the county that absentee balloting for the May 1 primary will not begin until the county is in receipt of the proper ballot form which is still being printed earlier this week.

The delay in delivery of the ballot form is due to candidates who have changed their positions on the state ticket, or dropped out of the race altogether, county officials say.

Sturrock reminds Republican absentee voters however that those ballots for that party have been received and persons interested may note now.

Persons interested in voting absentee are asked to call

283-2281 before they come to the Courthouse to vote, Sturrock says.

**WHO MAY VOTE ABSENTEE?**

1. Any qualified voter who expects to be absent from the County on Election day.
2. Any qualified voter 65 years of age or older on Election day.
3. Any qualified voter who because of sickness or physical disability cannot go to the polls on Election day.

Anyone having questions concerning the voting should call the County Clerk's office at 283-2281 any week day between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

## Craven Seeks Second Term As Sheriff

Lewis E. Craven, sheriff of Tyler County, Texas, has released his official announcement in his campaign for reelection, subject to the Democratic Primary, Saturday, May 1, 1976.

The Sheriff who resides at 306 Kelley Street, Woodville, Texas, with his wife, Helen are the parents of three children and the grandparents of two. They are members of the Baptist Church.

In making his announcement, the Sheriff said, "a strict, fair and impartial enforcement of the law has been my job and my objective for the past three years and I have been totally dedicated to it. My record is proof of this. The Sheriff's Office has been and is operated to serve the interests of the citizens of Tyler County, always dependable and always available so that everyone may feel safe and secure in their family, home and property."

"I instituted the policy of dispersing my four deputies to work and serve the sector of the county where they reside, in order to make them more readily available to the citizens in their needs," the Sheriff continued.

"I have waged an unceasing war against narcotics and other drugs particularly among the young. By constant attention to the problem, numerous arrests and convictions for both possession and sale of these drugs have been made. The constant pressure on the drug traffic has had the desired effect of curtailing the supply and keeping hard drugs out of Tyler County. This is continuing problem and I lodge my constant efforts in

this direction. While breaking up several burglary and theft rings, the Sheriff's Office also served hundreds of civil papers, subpoenas and jury summons, attended all of the court sessions, solved robberies and murders, performed rescue work, found lost children, recovered stolen property, radio dispatched all law enforcement units in the county and arbitrated family disputes. The office received many other requests for help, which we give when we can, it being a public service office."

"I think of the Sheriff's Office as belonging to the citizens of Tyler County. That I have been elected to run this office fair and honest. Not to be pressured by anyone or any group."

# Texas Taxes

It's time to do something about the soaring costs of utilities for residential users. Only by making a fundamental change in rate structures can the consumer be granted any real relief from skyrocketing gas and electric bills.

Although it has recently been suggested that the answer is to reduce taxes on natural gas and hope that the savings to the producer will be passed along to utility companies and ultimately to consumers, that proposal does not make sense.

In the unlikely event that any savings would be passed on to the consumer, the average residential user might be saved a dollar a month on gas and electric bills.

And we would be doing Peter to Paul and the rest of the Legislature would probably have to raise some other tax to make up for the loss of revenue that would result.

What we should do is pass legislation for equitable equalization of utility rates. Right now the biggest source of gas and electricity get a big break from both private and public utility companies, gas and electric rate structures discriminate against the low-income user, the average homeowner and apartment dweller.

Presently the rate on electricity is a commodity at the lower rate paid per unit. Big business, big industry, and big houses use tremendous amounts of gas and electricity and the average residential consumer is forced by discriminatory rate structures to help pay their utility bills.

Equalizing utility rates would have two desirable effects: equitably lowering utility bills for the average homeowner and apartment dweller and encouraging conservation of energy by making every user in a given area pay at the same rate for gas and electricity, no matter how much is used.

As I told the Wisconsin Means Committee of the Texas House of Representatives, which is considering the proposed reduction in the natural gas severance tax rate, it is also unfair that users of other states can pay lower rates for our gas than Texas users.

We need to increase taxes on gas that goes out of state so that the people of Texas can benefit more naturally from our own natural resources. Laws passed on to residents of other states are taxes. Texans don't have to pay.

But let's not kid ourselves or deceive Texas' taxpaying utility consumers. It won't mean much if anything in terms of their bills. It would bring the State of Texas more tax income from out-of-state users who are presently getting a cheap ride on our gas.

Present discriminatory utility rate structures should be changed by legislative action. It is unfair and wasteful of our energy resources to charge commercial, industrial, and other high volume users the lowest rates and families struggling to keep the lights on, the water hot, the house cooled or heated, and the food cooked the highest rates for energy.

The time has come to do something about the outrageously high gas and electric bills. Let's do it right.

### Fire Tower Vandalism Presents Danger

Vaughn, Forester with the Texas Forest Service, vandalism of fire towers in East Texas and the local area is presenting a danger to Forest Service personnel and a tremendous expense to taxpayers. The TFS reminds all citizens that this destruction of property is a felony and if a TFS employee were shot while on duty in the towers, much more serious charges would be filed.

"As TFS employees start spending more time in these towers, more emphasis will be placed on exciting these vandals," says Pat Eberhart, head of TFS Fire Control in Ludkin. "Fire fighting is hazardous enough without being shot at."

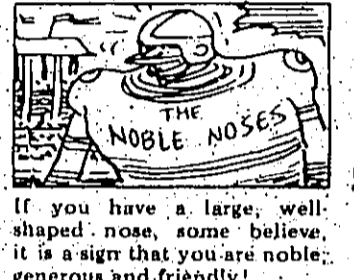

WASHINGTON D.C.—Sunset is a real rocky road. When applied to government agencies, it suddenly becomes an even pricier concept. Already several state governments have adopted "sunset laws" that would force agencies of state agencies and programs and would mark the twilight of many of these programs which were found to have outlived their usefulness.

The sunset laws are therefore an enlightening precedent for the Federal government to follow. Several bills which I have sponsored would have the same effect as these sunset laws and would call for regular reviews and reforms of existing programs and agencies. A great number of bills have also been introduced to strengthen Congress' oversight responsibilities and powers over the government bureaucracy, including the Administrative Reorganization Act which would provide Congress with regular reviews and reforms of existing programs and agencies. 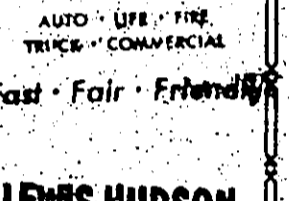

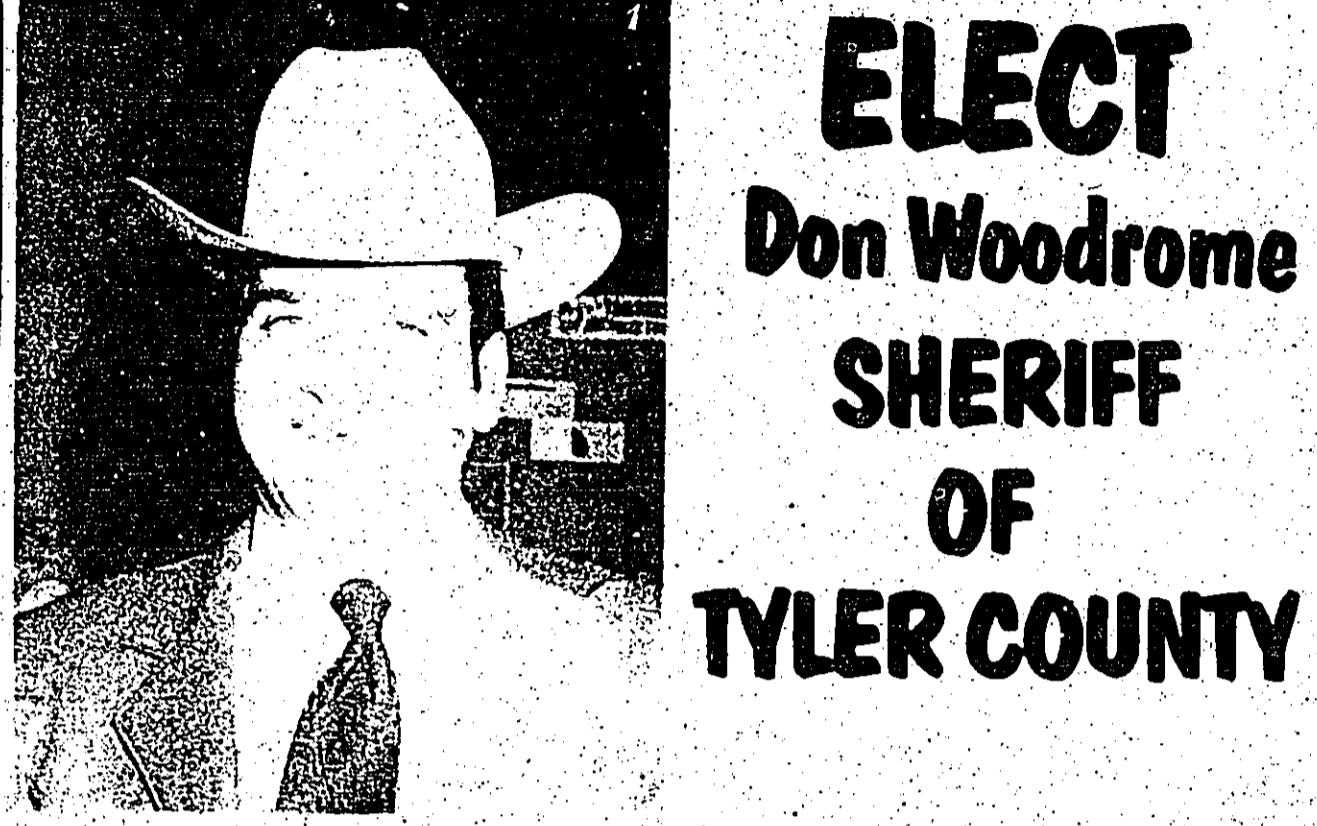

Sheriff Lester Gumm called me last evening on my return from four weeks of holding trials in the 21st Dist. Court of Galveston County. He and I are sincerely concerned in the report that you are being criticized for the manner in which you conducted the murder trials sent to my court for trial in Bell County. In one of the trials the sentence resulted in a life sentence (the greatest penalty possible at that time) and the other in a murder WITH MALICE AFORETHOUGHT finding of guilt, with penalty of a probated sentence.

I confess that I have never known in my twenty years as District Attorney and twenty-three as a jurist, this result for a Bell County jurist to return such a verdict. However, this was arrived at by what I call a "bleeding heart jurist" when the victims are seemingly forgotten and only one can see the pitiful, crying youth and his family in the courtroom, perhaps will well remember, I shortly after, spoke loudly and justice, bitterly, of what I considered a gross miscarriage of justice, solely at the hands of a jury, who failed to see, or refused to see, the true facts presented by the prosecution.

In all my years I have never seen a better prepared, better presented case than that was presented by you as District Attorney. No prosecutor returned. No prosecutor could have done more if any claim difficult, or manner it could have been done, knowing in what particular, or manner it could have been done, in my book you did a masterful job - I cannot say the same for my Bell County jury.

With my highest commendation to you on your abilities and upon your performance (as I wrote you soon after the trial, thanking you and telling you of my bitter disappointment), and again with my kindest regards and best wishes, I remain

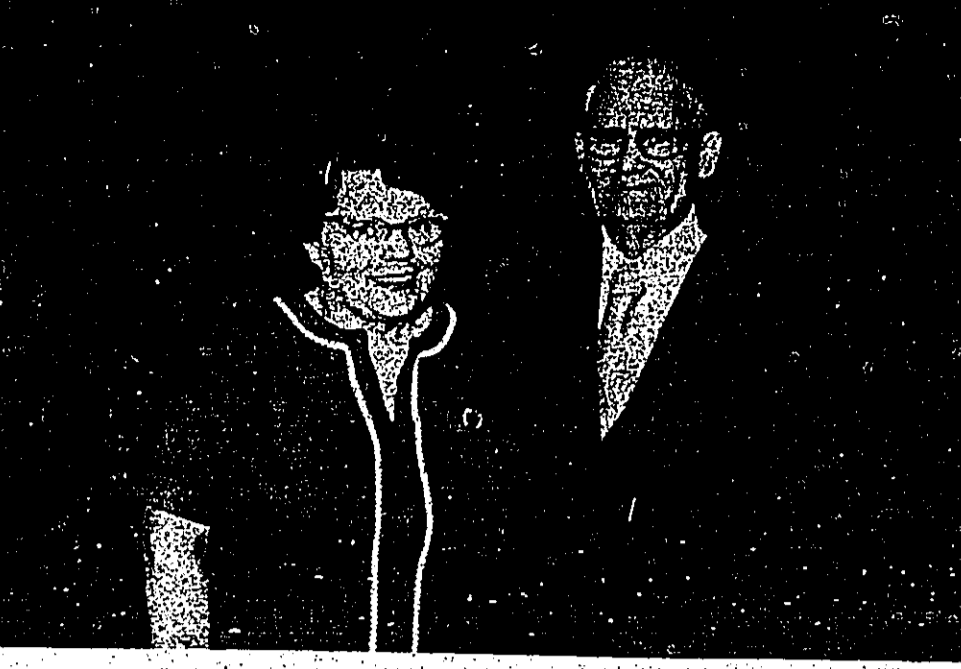

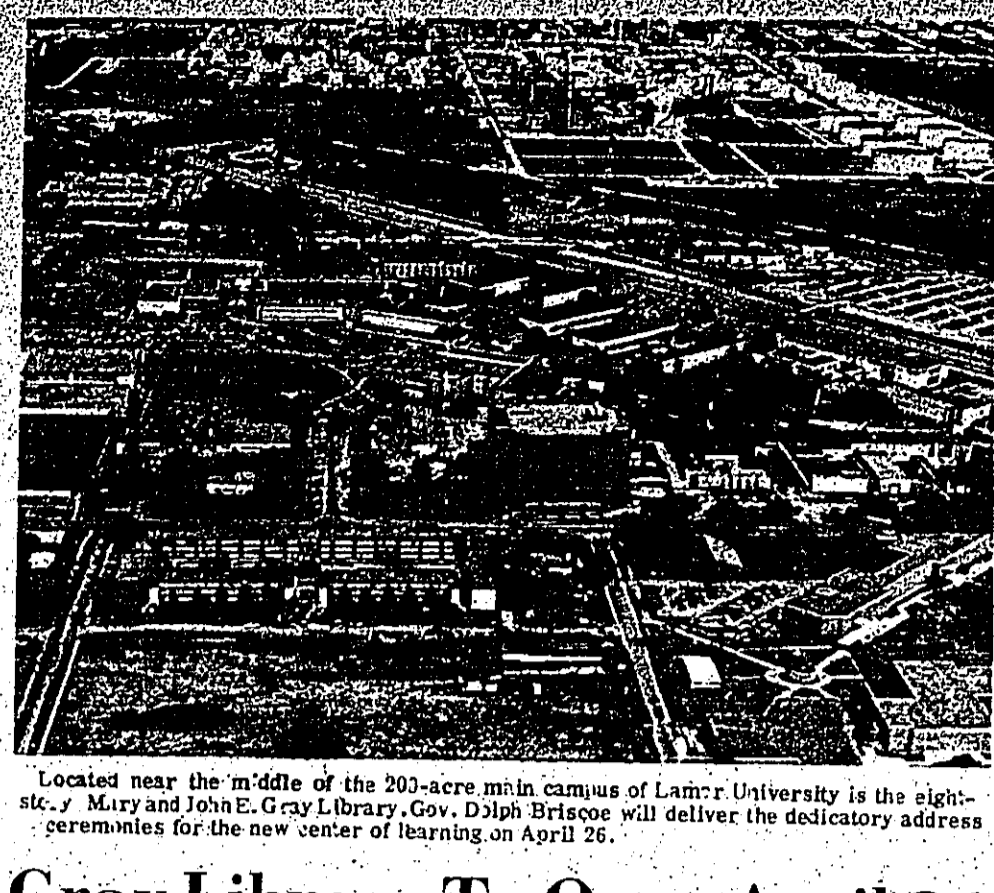
