Big Thicket Group Records Community 'Input' For Project

Some 50 persons met at Kirby High Monday night for a "workshop session" pertaining to the development of the Big Thicket Preserve.

Management people from the National Parks Service were in Woodville to receive comment and "input" toward the development of the Preserve.

The visit to Woodville is the first of four such "hearings" which are allowed by the National Parks Service and, apparently, the U.S. Congress which designed to insure that the public has a proportionate amount of say in the development of the project.

Characterized as a "cluster park" by Parks Service Biologist Karl M. Flemming, he said that the "Big Thicket"

concept was quite an offshoot from parks developed thus far by the National Parks Service.

Flemming said however "Don't get hung up by the difference in the scope of the scientific project here in Southeast Texas. The Parks Service has over 20 separately designated undertakings each under its own different heading."

Project Superintendent Tom Lubbert, says that the Project which involves the Preservation of "a crossroads of biological phenomenon" which he emphasized was "subtle even to the naked eye," and what made this project almost totally scientific in scope.

One interested attendee at the Workshop session Monday was interested in the accessibility of the newly created park for trail riding or horseback riding. The woman referred "a policy" of the National Parks not allowing such access in the parks, "It would be definitely opposed to a park being set up which wouldn't allow horseback riding," she said.

A sprinkling of timber company personnel were present for the meeting with questions about future land evaluation techniques and indicated concerns about the Parks recent inception of controlled burning. Personnel say that "Controlled burning definitely has a place in the NPS."



Brown Visits Tyler County

Brown is attempting, through a letter to the U.S. Attorney General and the Justice Department, to investigate Wilson and the introduction and final passage of the so-called "Big Thicket National Biological Preserve".

Brown said in his statement "It is questionable why the person and/or company of Mr. Temple of Diboll, Texas...will be the recipient of the largest portion of the near \$70 million dollar purchase price."

Brown indicated during his visit that the "legislative taking" aspect of the Big Thicket Bill "is a prelude to land use control."

Brown said that "Since the government started dickered with the thing that the land values have increased substantially."

"The project is designed for a few scientists and very few people."

"Where are we going to be ahead by spending \$70,000 on a project which only a few people will have an interest in."

"The project will be taking the tax base away from counties which are already poor," Brown said.

"Feedback" is the key word Nichols commented, "Now the public has a chance to tell us exactly what they want."



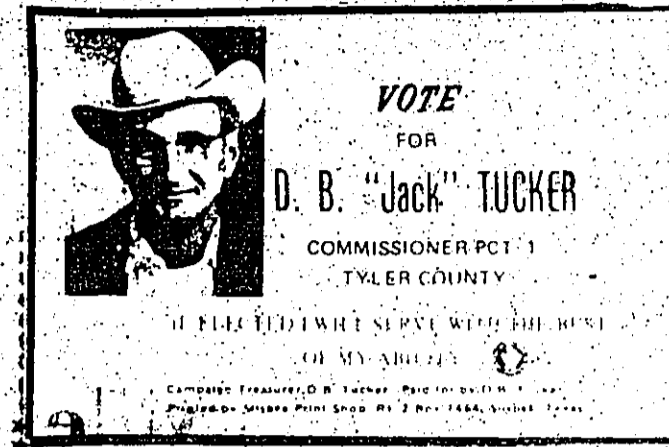

NEW YORK—Time Inc., the diversified publishing and foreign products company, achieved a gain of 33 percent in earnings in the first quarter of 1976.

The company's earnings were \$10,627,000, or \$1.06 per share, compared with \$8,000,000 or \$0.80 a share last year.

Pre-tax income increased 28 percent to \$17,727,000 from \$13,933,000 in the first quarter. The company's effective tax rate is 40.4 percent this year, reflecting an investment tax credit derived from the expansion of the Eastco pulp and paperboard mill at Eastco, Texas.

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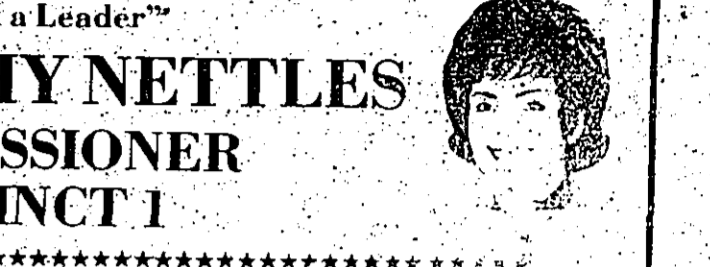
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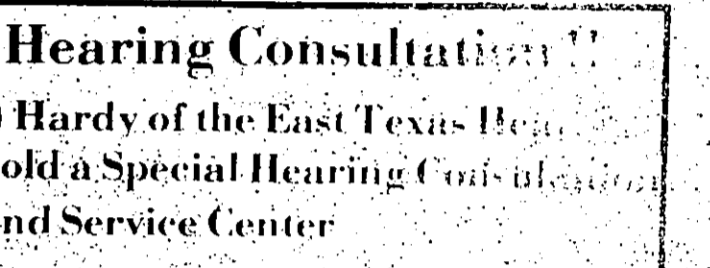
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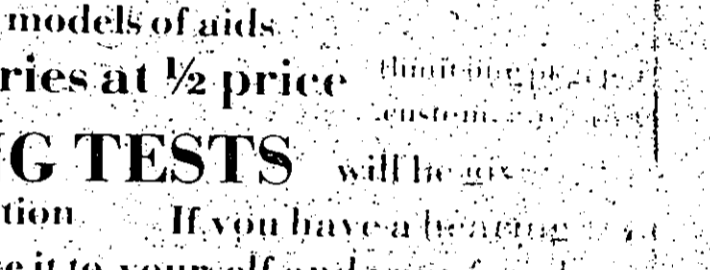
