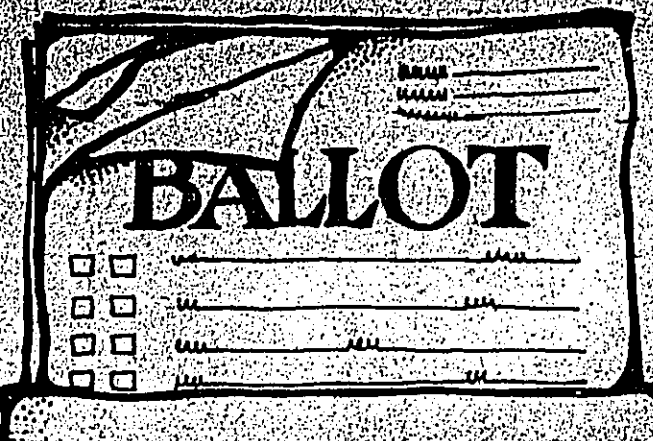

Record Vote Expected In Saturday Primary

Balloting Procedures Explained By County Demo. Chairman

County Democratic Chairman Morris Clemmons, Jr., announced today that several points that the Party wanted to bring to the attention of the voters who will be voting in the First Democratic Primary on Saturday, May 1st.

All polls in each of the twelve voting precincts will open at 7 a.m. as required by law.

All voting boxes will close at 3 p.m. A list of the voting boxes and their location can be found elsewhere in the paper.

For the first time voters will vote for delegates to the National Convention which will be held in New York City for the Democrats. These delegates names are shown at the top of your ballot with the delegates names and who they are supporting for President. Each voter has only three votes for one of the delegates or more, but no more than three total votes. If a voter casts more than three votes total for these delegates his vote will not be counted for any of the delegates. If a question still exists, persons are asked to contact the election judge at the place of voting," Clemmons said.

"In conducting the election I wish to state that every voter is voting a secret ballot and that there is no way that the name of the voter and how he voted is available to anyone. The only way in which this might come about would be if the District Judge would order the boxes to be opened, certification of the voter and a recount of the ballots.

"This statement is made," Morris Clemmons said "due to certain rumors regarding ballot procedure confidentiality."

"This year when you present your voter certificate at the place of voting it will be stamped DEMOCRAT on the space provided for party affiliation. If the voter refuses he will be refused the right to vote in the Democratic First Primary, this is done only on the first primary, as per Texas Election Law Art. 13.01a. "The idea is," he said further, "to get as many persons to vote as possible."

Total funds April 1, 1976 -- \$44,000.00.

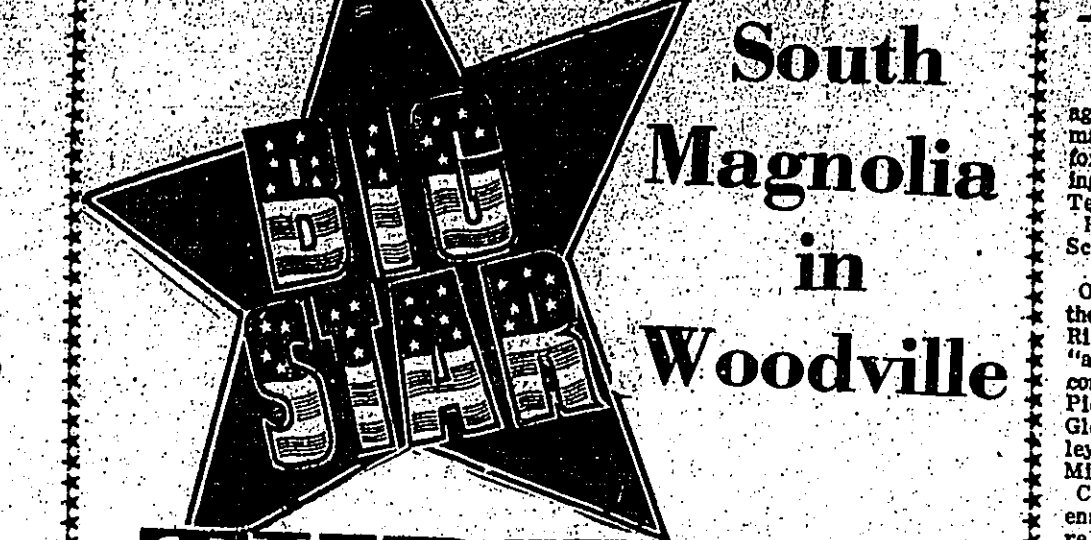

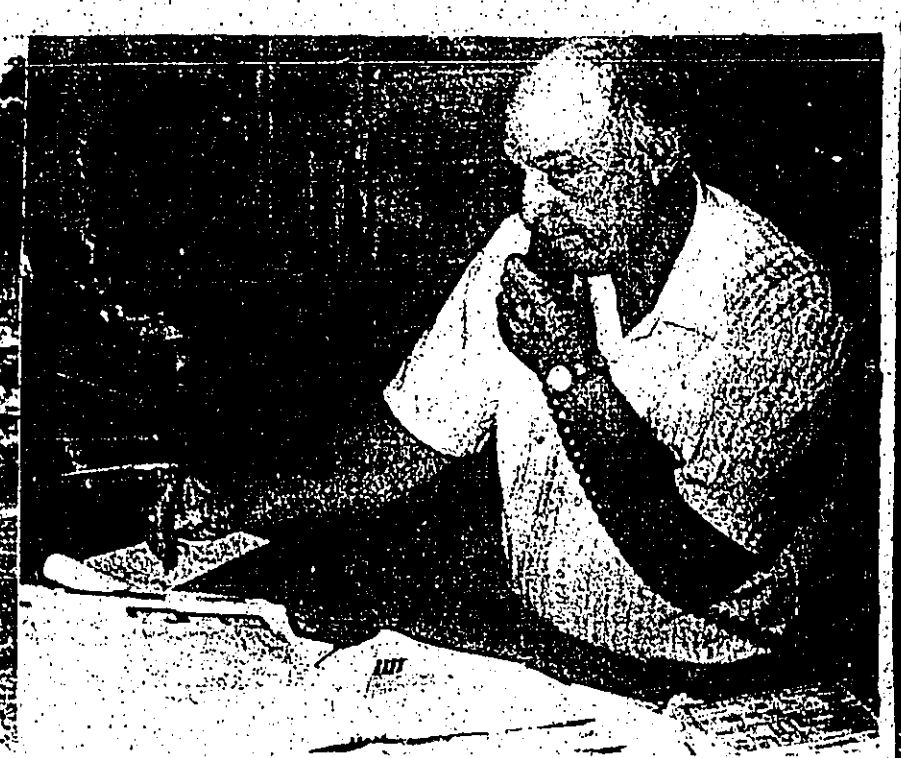



VIEWPOINTS

LAW ENFORCEMENT.

The state must be willing to take a more active role in providing protection for citizens in rural areas, whether it be through additional financing or additional personnel in rural areas. There is an undue burden placed on our law enforcement officers through limited funds, and good legislation must be brought forth to protect the innocent citizen and remove the criminal element.

More and more, current legislation is hammering away at individual citizens by trying to remove their right of protecting home and family by gun control measures. There has never been a "gun control" law that works. For the single reason that lawbreakers always find ways to slip around legislation aimed at curbing crime. Criminals are making a mockery of the 1968 gun control act by going out and stealing guns. Indeed, the list of stolen firearms in the U.S. is increasing at the alarming rate of over 100,000 annually. The criminals can get the guns anyway. The true control of crime is not to be found in anti-gun legislation which infringes upon the constitutional rights of law-abiding citizens to own firearms for sport and the defense of home and business. Instead, there must be more emphasis on hard-hitting laws which concentrate on apprehension and punishment of criminals, not their weapons.

MEDICAL MALPRACTICE.

In the medical services industry, the number of malpractice suits has risen alarmingly in recent years. In some states, malpractice insurance rates have risen to \$40,000 per annum for certain specialties.

While a portion of these costs may ultimately be borne by the medical practitioner, the remainder must ultimately be passed on to the consumer. Higher fees and tax increases for funding public medical programs will be the visible symptoms of this problem in the market place. At the extreme, consumers of medical services will face reduced levels of service if medical practice becomes unattractive or unaffordable to physicians. We must not allow medical services to deteriorate in the State.

Schools should be financed on a public basis and with the cost of education today, more and more burdens are placed on property owners. 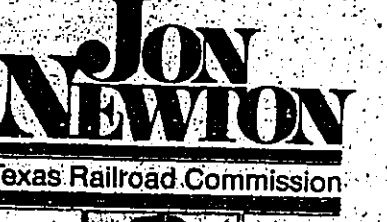
I feel educators compensation should be comparable to the private sector of the economy in terms of training, tenure, and responsibility.

AUSTIN—Economically, Texas may become the envy of all other states because there are a lot of things happening today that are turning money for the state.
While many states are looking everywhere for funds to patch up shortfalls in their budgets, Texas is apparently headed for a surplus in the piggy bank.
If nothing happens to deflate state revenue estimates made by the comptroller's office, then there should be \$800 million in unobligated funds in the state coffers when the 65th Legislature meets in January.
Further, if projections hold, that surplus should bulge to \$2.6 billion in new revenue available for the 1978-79 biennium.
That is a far cry from earlier projections of no surplus funds in the treasury and rumors that we would have to pass a \$1 billion tax bill next year.
The difference has been the Texas economy, which has recovered from the recession at a much more rapid rate than anyone thought possible; and our natural resources.
When our consumers started buying again, our sales tax and motor vehicle taxes tax revenues again became strong.
Oil production and natural gas production taxes far exceeded estimates as did motor fuels taxes and other consumption based taxes.
If these trends hold, and admittedly it is difficult to look many months into the future, then funds available for the 1978-79 biennium could be as much as 21 per cent over current spending level.
Earlier revenue forecasts made us realize that there was a real need to hold the line on spending if we wanted to avoid new taxes.
But even though it now appears a tax increase won't be necessary, we don't want to put away the weapons we had assembled to fight the increasing cost of government.
I have no doubt that the Legislature could find a place for every dime of the \$2.6 billion. However, it would be extremely foolish not to take this opportunity to establish a "rainy day" fund to protect

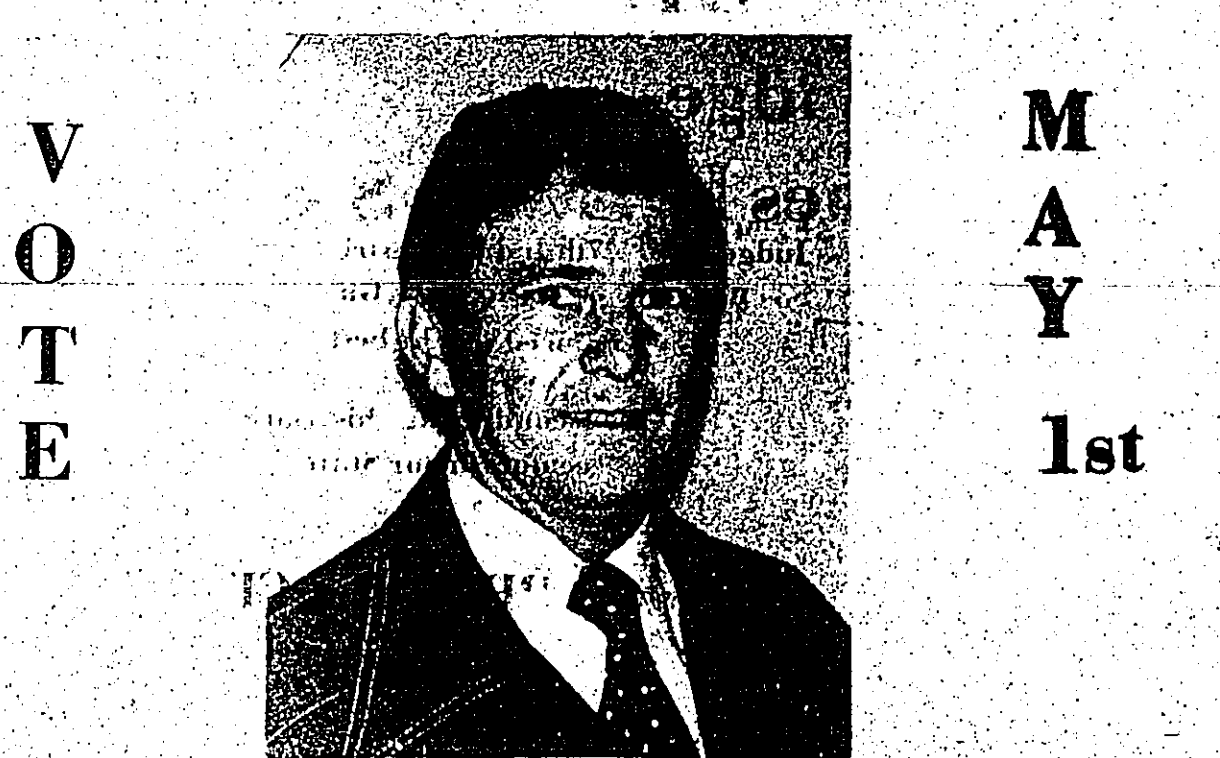

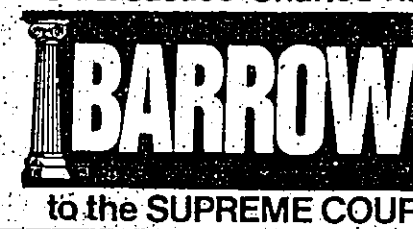

Texas Taxes

By BOB BULLOCK, State Comptroller

Improved enforcement, collection, and administration of taxes by the Comptroller's Department, increased spending by Texas' treatment program was new consumer, and higher oil and gas prices have created a windfall of hundreds of millions of dollars for the State Treasury which may help us avoid the need for new taxes for years to come.

The next Legislature should find that the Treasury has a cash surplus of at least \$1.7 billion and probably as much as \$2.7 billion dollars. Because of the surplus, I expect that the 65th Legislature will have total major fund revenues of \$11 billion when it writes the next State Budget for 1978-79. That's a \$2.5 billion, or 21 percent, increase over the funds available to and spent by the current two-year budget period.

Under the Constitution and State Law, the Comptroller is required to provide the Governor and the Legislature with revenue estimates. Since I became Comptroller, we have made more frequent and longer-range projections of State revenues. But no matter how much expertise or how many statistics go into our estimates, they remain just that—educated guesses.

Things could change. The increase in revenues could be significantly less or greater depending upon a wide range of economic circumstances. The temptation when you find more money in your

piggy bank than you expect is to spend it. But precisely what should not happen with Texas' budget surplus. State agencies shouldn't start seeking surpluses and expand their budget requests to take up the slack. State agencies shouldn't look for new ways to spend the extra money.

State agencies need to trim away the fat and to increase productivity rather than budgets. And the Legislature needs to avoid the temptation of spending all the money available to it.

Economy in government should be more than a catch phrase. Agencies and programs which have outlived their usefulness or have never been needed, should be eliminated.

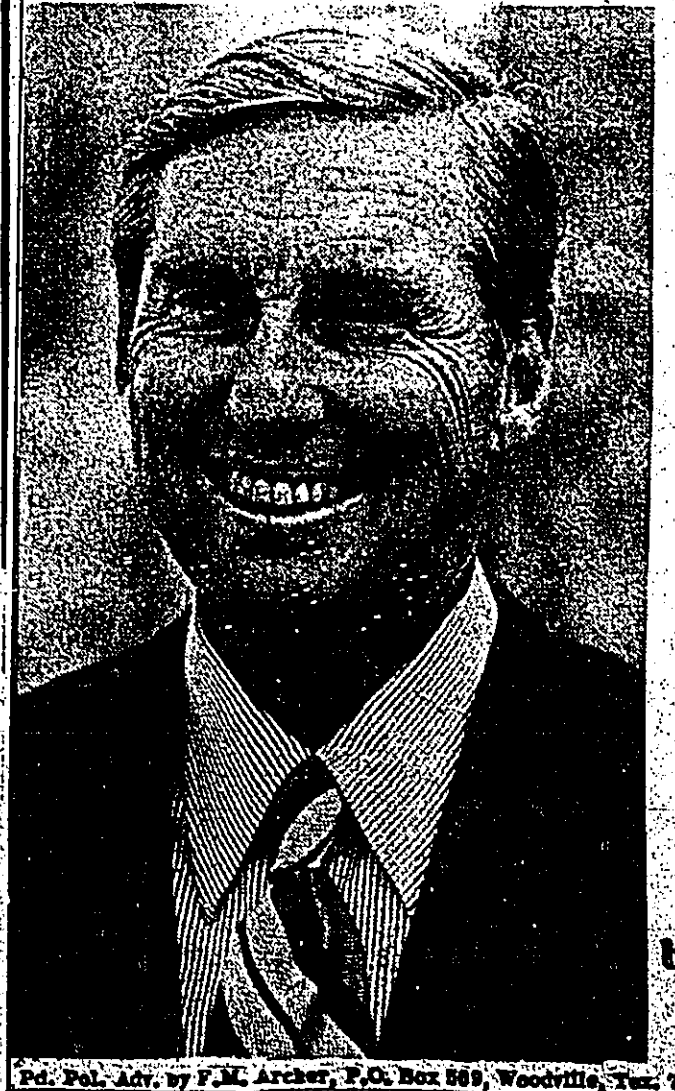

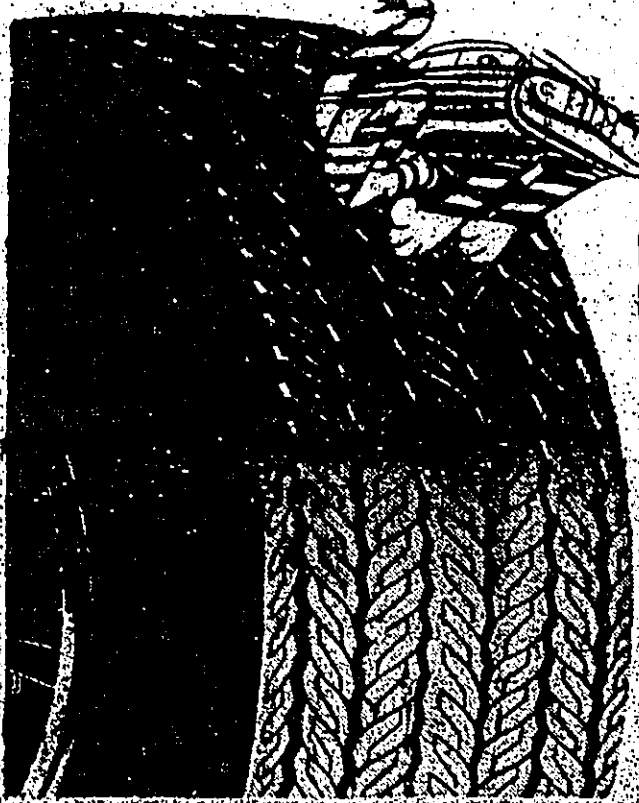

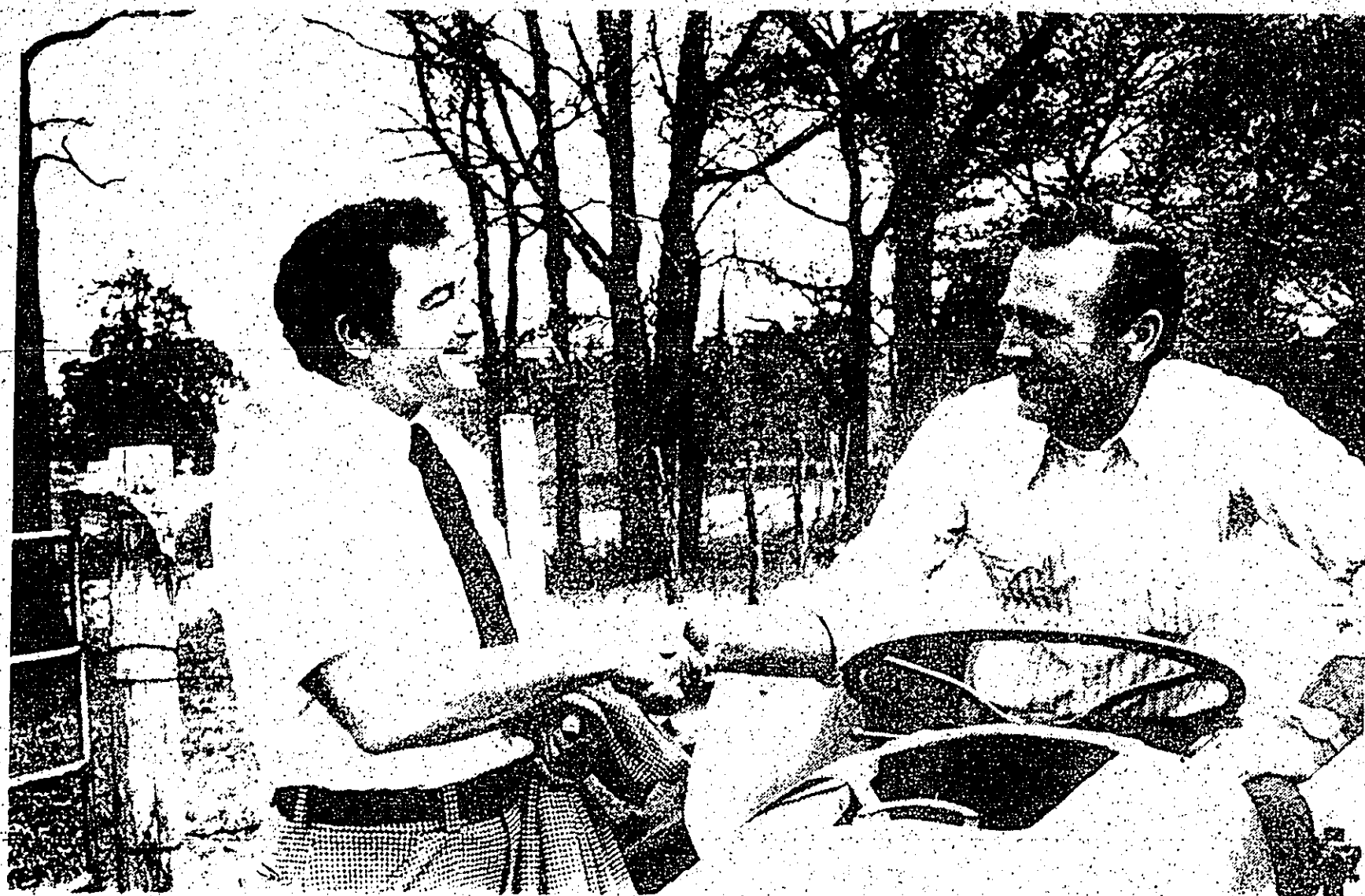

LUFKIN—Suits limiting the harvests of timber from National Forests have now been spread to the U.S. Fifth Circuit which includes Texas.

Seiback for Reform

WASHINGTON—The Senate has dealt the cause of food stamp reform a severe setback.

The federal food stamp program, which began ten years ago as a modest effort to help the genuinely needy, has degenerated into a gigantic boondoggle.

In 1965, one out of every 459 Americans received food stamps, at a cost to the taxpayers of only \$40 million.

Today, one of every 13 Americans receives food stamps, at a cost to taxpayers of more than \$5 billion.

There is every indication that the food stamp problem will grow worse in the future. Under present regulations, one of every four Americans is eligible for food stamps, and the number could grow easily to one of every three Americans.

Public outcry against abuses of the food stamp program also has been growing apace, and this month the Senate approved and sent to the House a bill entitled the National Food Stamp Reform Act.

But the bill is not the answer. It not only will not correct most of the blatant abuses of food stamps, it will add more than \$1.1 billion to the overall cost of the food stamp program.

Virtually the only "reform" the National Food Stamp Reform Act makes pertains to a ceiling on the incomes of those eligible for food stamps.

Under present regulations, families making as much as \$16,000 a year can qualify for food stamps. The bill ostensibly would limit eligibility to persons with net incomes at or below the poverty level, currently \$5,500 for a family of four.

But even this reform is cosmetic. So many loopholes have been added so the family making as much as \$7,818 could conceivably be eligible for food stamps.

Except for that one reform, the National Food Stamp Reform liberalizes, rather than tightens, food stamp rules. The bill reduces the purchase price of food stamps from 27.5 percent to 25 percent, with a provision that could lead to elimination of the purchase requirement altogether.

The measure also permits minor children to collect food stamps if they no longer live with persons legally responsible for their support, and makes it much more difficult to remove cheaters from the food stamp rolls.

It would do nothing about loopholes in current law which permit strikers and college students to receive food stamps. This is unconscionable. Any person who could be working but who, for whatever reason, refuses to work should not be eligible for food stamps.

It would do nothing about the underserving hurts both those who truly need them and the taxpayers who must foot the bill. Hopefully the House will see through this bill and rewrite it entirely. If not, I shall urge President Ford to veto it. The voters deserve meaningful food stamp reform, not an election year hoax.

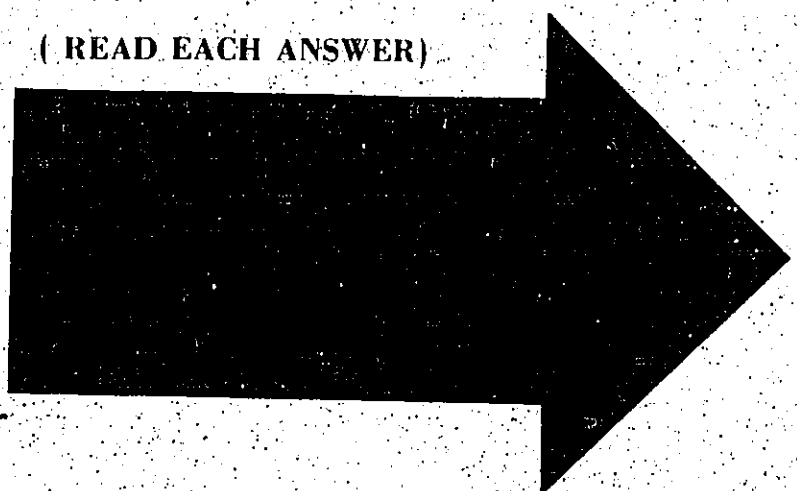

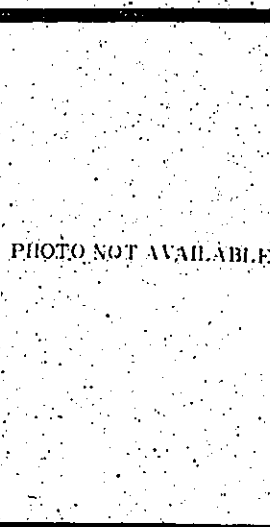

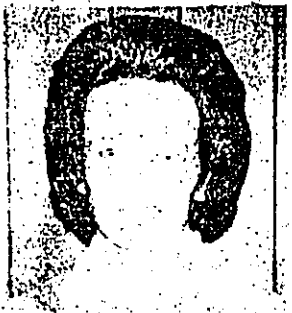
