Colmesneil Board To Select Group

The Colmesneil Independent School District Board of Trustees will meet in regular session Monday, May 10, at 7 p.m. to appoint a board of Equalization and consider other matters within the district.

"The meeting will be held in the school library," said Colmesneil School Superintendent

J.E. Handley. According to Handley the board will also consider a resolution giving the board president authority to receive additional teaching units for Plan A to help with the auditorially handicapped.

"An executive session following the meeting will be held to employ personnel," Handley added.

Elections See High Turnout On Saturday

Spontaneous applause could be heard in the vote-count room of the Tyler County Courthouse Saturday night as election officials were sure that a state record had been set after complete but unofficial ballots had been counted only 90 minutes after the polls closed at 7 p.m.

A record 56 percent of Tyler County's 7,997 voters were anxious to cast their opinions Saturday in interesting races around the county, and with the well-oiled democratic ballot system which was supervised by Morris Clemmons, County Democratic chairman, the results were in what many considered to be record time in the state.

"You're all to be congratulated and thanked for doing an excellent job, I'm sure we have a state record," Clemmons said adding "This is the first time it's happened in the 22 years that I've worked for the Democratic party."

Republicans, who in anticipation of a "heavier-than-usual" vote, had to double-order their printed ballots to meet a total record vote of 85, according to Allan Coats, County Republican chairman. Woodville Attorney James Dillon, was chosen with a total of 21 write-in votes to succeed Republican Chairman Coats for the top county Republican post.

Republicans cast 48 votes for Ronald Reagan while Gerald Ford earned only 35 votes. "All five Republican resolutions included on the ballot were passed," said Mrs. Allan Coats, an election judge.

In brisk Democratic balloting the Town Bluff Box was first to report at approximately 10 minutes after the polls officially closed at 7 p.m. County Chairman Clemmons

congratulated A.C. Pedigo, election judge at Town Bluff for quick reporting activity.

Spurger was second turning in come 385 votes. Political observers attribute the overall quick returns to the utilization of younger people in the mechanical process of counting the ballots.

Local races of high interest included the 88th Judicial District Attorney race involving Incumbent Stanley Coe who was defeated solidly in Tyler County by George Kirkpatrick by a margin of 1,665 votes. Incumbent and unopposed Tyler County Attorney Jim Allison received a total of 3,017 votes in his uncontested race.

Probably the hottest race in the election were the bids by two former deputies to unseat Incumbent Lewis Craven as the top law enforcement officer in the county. Herman Nolen forced a runoff with Craven which will be decided on Saturday, June 5, when the runoff election will be held.

Chester's Don Woodrome in his bid for sheriff polled a total of 725 votes while the Nolen came saw 219 more votes than Craven's total of 1,759.

Incumbent Tax Assessor/Collector Barbara Tolbert swamped efforts by Audrey Hall in an attempt at that office with Tolbert collecting 3,468 to Hall's total of 799.

In the Commissioner of Precinct One race, a political newcomer, Dorothy Nettles, won a runoff position against Moe Riley. Nettles polled a total of 213 votes while Riley more than doubled that amount with 455. Local radio and television stations have picked up the historical fact that Nettles may be the first woman in Tyler County politics to run

for a Commissioner's Court seat and have a chance in a runoff attempt.

Mrs. Nettles says in stating why she's running, says that besides the historic value that "I can do anything that any commissioner would be asked to do."

Commissioner Precinct 3 voting action saw former Commissioner Leon Fowler unseat Kenneth Belt for that post with a total of 614 votes. Jerry McJann was the next highest votegetter in that race, though not enough to earn a runoff.

Lynn A. Clamon of Chester, unseated Incumbent Lewis Hudson for the Constable of Precinct 2 post.

Absentee Balloting To Start Again

The runoff election for County-wide offices will take place on Saturday, June 5, from 7 a.m. till 7 p.m., according to County Clerk Allen Starrock.

Starrock said the absentee balloting will begin on Wednesday May 26 and run each day until Tuesday, June 1, with the polls opening at 8:30 a.m. and closing at 4:30 p.m.

Starrock said that absentee balloting activity will also take place on Saturday, April 29, from 2 to 6 p.m.

Lamanite Group To Visit Reservation

INDIAN VILLAGE--One of the most talented groups of American Indian performers ever produced on stage will make a trek through East Texas with a stop at the Alabama Coushatta Indian Reservation May 27-29. The Lamanite Generation, an all-student talent from Brigham

Young University in Provo, Utah, will bring an original Indian Variety Show with a complete program of modern dances, contemporary songs, traditional American Indian dances, Indian songs, plus rarely-seen Indian comedy sketches.

The program will be presented at the Indian Reservation's Sundown outdoor amphitheatre at 8 p.m. each evening, plus a 2 p.m. Matinee on May 29. The Reservation is located between Livingston and Woodville on U.S. Highway 190.

The proceeds from the four performances will go toward establishing the first educational trust fund ever for the benefit of the Alabama Coushatta Indian Reservation students. Recent trends indicate students from the Reservation complete high school, but only a small percentage attend colleges and universities.

The Lamanite Generation will include special performances by Mexican-American student talents plus Polynesian numbers. The entire production is under the direction of Jamie Thompson, the founder of the talented group. Technical staff producing the original Indian Variety Show are all students. None of the performers nor the technicians are paid.

The group will tour throughout the United States during the Bicentennial year including a concert in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, following the Indian Reservation appearances. During its short 5-year history of the Lamanite Generation, they have toured the major cities in the US plus Canada, Mexico, South and Central America.

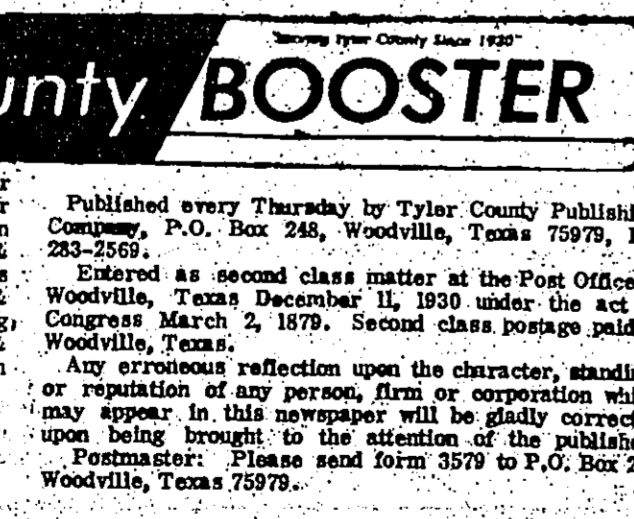
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Bake Sale Set

TFS Gets Thicker

Local Texas Forest Service offices have been receiving a series of unusual telephone calls. These calls aren't from forest landowners. In fact, they're coming from "bewildered" tourists asking what and where is the Big Thicket. So far, all the Big Thicket visitors, here it is. The Big Thicket is not a park; it is a biological preserve, meaning it is set aside for its national heritage. Its biological characteristics, and scenic values that make it unique. The Thicket is one of the two biological preserves designated in the United States. Scientists consider it to be a meeting place between the Eastern and Western land ecosystems.

If you have been looking for the Thicket, you probably know it is hard to find since most of the land in the Big Thicket is only outlined on paper and has not yet been purchased. It will be at least two years before permanent facilities are established for camping and recreation.

 Although the Big Thicket has been "closed" for acquisition since 1974, the federal funds were pledged to purchase the land. During that period, thousands of acres of timberland in the preserve area were stripped. "We in Texas are running out of time," White stressed.

Is Wildlife In Your Plans?

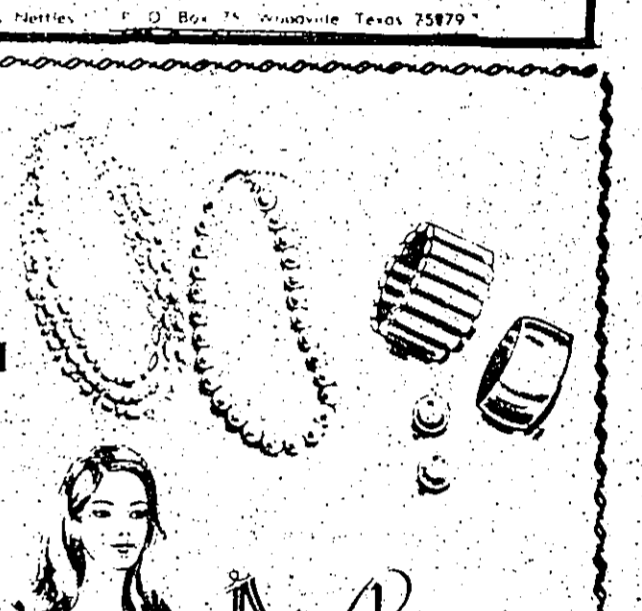
"Do you have pastureland, cropland, woodland or other land idle on your place? Why not modify the management of these areas to include wildlife? In most cases, it costs little or nothing to enhance wildlife habitat. The end result is more birds and numbers of wildlife," said Tommy Mackey, District Conservationist.
 "Pastures can be improved by adding vetch or some other legume to furnish forage for livestock and fix nitrogen in the soil. Vetch will also furnish seeds for quail and other birds as well as forage for deer," he said.
 "Woodlands need to be protected from wildfires by use of fire lanes. Disturb these fire lanes produces numerous seed producing plants and forests in addition to keeping the fire lane open. Birds utilize the seeds and tear the forbs," Mackey said.
 "Various management techniques to enhance wildlife can be planned on cropland and other land used as well as additional ones to the land uses already described."
 "Wildlife management ideas on these areas can be obtained through our local Soil Conservation District. They can be obtained by calling 283-2723 in Woodville or writing to the office located at 411 Pine Street, Mickey said.

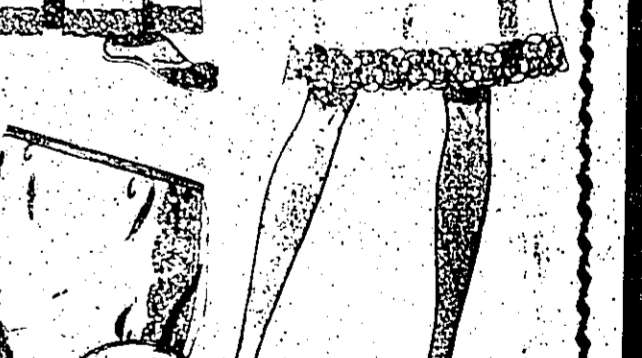

Roses In Bloom At Hodges Gardens

Roses have made a lovely comeback after two tornadoes devastated them during the peak blooming season last spring. A great many of the roses were lost last year, but all plants were replaced and late summer found all roses in bloom back in first class blooming condition. Improvements in the garden are being made, and this year's offering in Louisiana's famous "Garden in the Forest" promises to give rose lovers a fabulous showing.

Located 12 miles south of Many, Louisiana on S. Highway 171, the roses at Hodges Gardens annually attract as many visitors as the early spring outpouring of azaleas, tulips and dogwoods. In the Modern Rose Garden which faces the 25-acre lake and sweeps down a hill toward the many established favorite hybrid teas, floribunda and grandifloras are on display as well as some brand new varieties being introduced for the first time this year.

Colorful, prolific climbing roses cover pergolas in the Old Rose Garden. These popular and fragrant "ramblers" as they are called in the South, make a beautiful framework for roses of any year, many dating back to antiquity. Here too, can be found the most beautiful developed exclusively at Hodges Gardens labeled with the breeder's name.

On Rose Point, old and new varieties can be enjoyed with the lake and Rose Point Pavilion accentuating the beauty of the scene.

Favorite among the roses found at Hodges Gardens are Mr. Lincoln, Yankee Doodle, Tropical, Angel Face, Chrysler Imperial, New Yorker, John F. Kennedy, Scarsdale, Liberty, Optimist, European Promise, Granada, Cherry Vanilla, America and many others.

Feeding in late April and early May this year, roses will bloom all summer at Hodges Gardens and peak again in October. Some will stay in bloom until the first frost.

Other blooms to be enjoyed during May at Hodges Gardens are marigolds, petunias, gladioluses and gerbera daisies. These are accompanied by the colorful foliage of coleuses, copper plants, calluliums, crotons, red bananas and several varieties of wandering Jew.

Hodges Gardens is a 4,700-acre parkland and wildlife refuge that is the result of a vast ecological and reforestation project started in the 1940s by the late A.J. Hodges. The main gardens are in the confines of an old stone quarry and laced with waterfalls and streams. There are two picnic areas as well as natural scenic wooded areas, greenhouses and a monument to the Louisiana Purchase. Hodges Gardens is open from 8 a.m. until sunset daily and all proceeds go toward reforestation of the gardens.

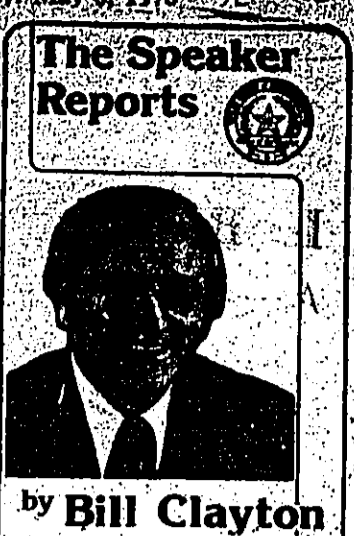

The Speaker Reports

by Bill Clayton

AUSTIN—A recent study of the 48 continental states has confirmed what we in Texas have been preaching to manufacturers and business people throughout the nation. We have here in Texas the most attractive business climate in the United States.

One portion of the very thorough nationwide study indicated how many manufacturing jobs were won or lost from 1967-1974. Texas, at the top of the list, has a growth of 150,000 new jobs won for a 22.6 per cent increase.

What that means is that states such as Texas with favorable business climates tended to gain thousands of manufacturing jobs, while those with poor business climates generally lost jobs.

The factors that went into ranking the states are things that we know well in Texas. Included are taxes, labor laws, size and cost of government, welfare costs, state indebtedness and similar state and local government related conditions.

I think it is also appropriate to note the other states listed in the top ten for attractive business climate. In order after Texas are: Alabama, Virginia, South Dakota, South Carolina, North Carolina, Florida, Arkansas, Indiana and Utah. It is interesting that all the states "work" laws and that most are southern states.

The report said the ten worst states in terms of business climate are: New York, New Jersey, Illinois, California, Massachusetts, Michigan, Delaware, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Minnesota, Oregon and Washington.

Texas is one of only four states that does not rely upon corporate income taxes to finance its activities. The other states are Nevada, Washington and Wyoming.

It has been found that the greater the proportion of the state's income which comes from corporations, the greater the likelihood that the legislature has adopted the philosophy of letting business and industry carry the load for the improvement and enlargement of state services. Once a tax source is tapped, a state is not likely to relinquish it easily. More frequently, the source is tapped again and again. In Massachusetts, for example, 12.6 per cent of state taxes come from taxes on corporations. A great majority of the states derive more than five per cent of their taxes from business.

While talking about taxes, it is also important to the business climate to note that Texas is one of only six states that does not have a per capita personal income tax on its citizens. The other states are Florida, Nevada, South Dakota, Washington and Wyoming.

It is not difficult to deduce that the higher the personal tax in a state, the greater the difficulty in attracting executives, engineers and skilled technicians to move into an area.

Companies often pay these taxes for its employees in the form of higher salaries, meaning that while salaries in states without a personal income tax may not be as high, the income tax imposed tends to equalize the wages and have no net effect.

Next week I'll give other reasons Texas has become an industrial state of the first order.

Record Number of Bass Fry From Texas Lake

AUSTIN—Record numbers of striped bass fry, obtained from previously stocked lakes by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, are on their way to state fish hatcheries.

The first of an expected 11 million fry are arriving at hatcheries, eight million of which are being spawned from Texas fish with another three million from South Carolina.

Since early March, P&WD fisheries technicians at Toledo Bend Reservoir in Sabine County and Spence Reservoir in Cole County have been sampling female strippers to determine the correct time for spawning. The development of eggs in the females were ripe and taken to hatchery stations at intervals. Hatchery technicians are working around the clock stripping eggs and fertilizing them with milk from male bass. The fertilized eggs are hatched in jars and the fry sent to ponds when four days old for rearing to fingerling size.

From the time the adult fish are brought to spawning stations, it is seven to nine days before fry are sent to rearing ponds.

Some 25 percent of the eggs are fertilized with milk from male white bass to produce a hybrid fish. Better rearing success has been reported with the hybrid strippers.

The hybrid will be stocked in lakes where there is no hope of natural reproduction by pure strippers. Striped bass require some 50 miles of flowing water to reproduce successfully.

Alligators On Threatened List

AUSTIN—A threefold increase in the U.S. alligator population since the early 1960s has prompted federal officials to propose removal of the species from the endangered list in certain areas and classify it as threatened.

According to the federal proposal, alligators in the coastal portions of Texas would be classified as threatened. These include the coastal marshes of Texas and the Florida Panhandle. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department non-game program leader, estimates 10,000 alligators live in Texas, mostly in upper coastal marshes.

"Texas alligator numbers increased some 12 to 15 percent from 1974 to 1975," said Brownie.

"Placing the animal on the threatened list relaxes some federal permit requirements and should facilitate state management of the species," said Brownie.

Lieutenant Governor's Report

by Bill Hobby

AUSTIN—This week's column's bureau of business reports the construction, search report on building construction two weeks ago, of the structure in Texas for 1975 University of Texas at Austin which was prepared by Robert Ryan, Research Associate.

Overall, the \$3.4 billion total of Texas building authorizations for 1975 should equal 1974's \$3.4 billion. Additions, alterations, and repairs have become an increasingly important part of construction activity; the volume has doubled since 1967. In 1975 the renovation of existing structures will be stimulated by a variety of factors: the inflated cost of new construction, the increasing incentives for homeowners to renovate existing structures by living in the city core, and the bicentennial surge of interest in old buildings—over those that can scarcely claim historical recognition.

In February, the National Association of Home Builders met in Dallas, partly to lament the recession of 1975, the industry's poorest year in terms of housing starts since 1946. The average cost for the national convention may have been prompted partly by the continuing strength of homebuilding in Texas, which in 1975 was one of the four best years on record and showed a loss of only 5 percent from 1974. Incoming MAHB president John Hart contended that a Dallas press conference that only 20 percent of all U.S. families can afford a new home with interest rates in the 9 percent range. He pointed out that high interest rates compound the effect of rising labor costs. For example, the average house calls for a labor input of 1,065 man-hours. At that rate, a one-dollar increase in construction wages increases the initial cost of the house about 6 percent and, in effect, adds about \$2,000 to the ultimate cost.

In spite of the difficulty in selling single-family homes in a market where the average construction cost tops \$18,000, rental property presents the

industry with even worse problems. Reported real estate investment trusts (REITs) have backed more than \$9 billion in vacant and foreclosed projects and buildings are comparably burdened with problem real estate. Texas has been named one of the four states where REIT difficulties are severest. The displaced owners and land developers of all sorts of property but especially condominiums, apartments, and hotel development projects. The most frequently mentioned remedy for investors is to hold tight until inflation lifts them out by appreciating the value of the property. In Texas at least, investors are hoping for rapid enough increase in population and income to revitalize them by stimulating market demand. But, in many cases, losses will have to be taken for current dollars and not in the presumably cheaper dollars of some future date.

Apparently, some of the state's investments in housing are unrealistic extrapolations of past trends. Even though the population is increasing, especially in some Texas cities with strong industrial growth, the increased investments include a number of elderly persons who will continue to rise. Relatively little has been done to answer the needs of those who no longer care to maintain the family home but are in the nursing-home environment. Last of all has been done for such persons who fall in the middle and upper-middle income brackets—those who are ineligible for government subsidies, but who can ill-afford to enter luxury level establishments.

Sharp attention has been given on the latest national economic survey from the University of Michigan Survey Research Center. The Michigan survey's look towards 1976 increases of 7.3 percent in nonresidential building and 20.5 percent in residential buildings. Applying these forecasts to the Texas construction industry, however, is distinctly unrealistic, because as Texas building has not had in any way with national building for the same time. Between 1974 and 1975, U.S. home-building fell by 13 per-

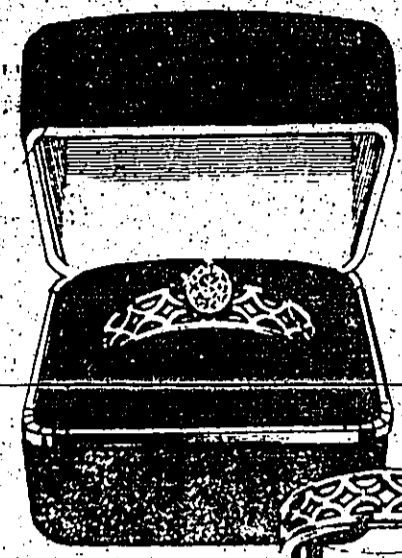

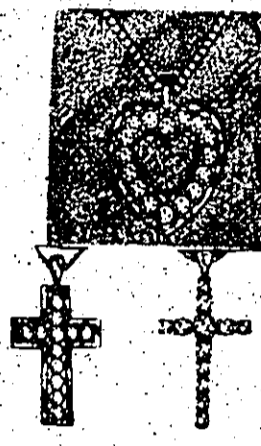

The following is an article contributed by Helen Mann Esquivel of Cotaw, Alabama, daughter of the late Dr. Jim Mann of Colmesneil, and it concerns recent honors bestowed upon Bill Mann, brother of County Judge, Tom Mann.

The Alabama Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy will bestow upon Commander William Aden Mann, United States Navy, Retired and now an attorney of Chevy Chase, Maryland, and Washington, D.C. a cross of military honor. This cross is given only to lineal descendants of Confederate soldiers who have served our country overseas in times of war. The award will be bestowed at the beautiful Joe League Park on the Tennessee River where Bill and his wife will join Helen and her husband for this and other impressive ceremonies. The cross will be bestowed by Mrs. John Hardy Curry, President of the Alabama Division of the U.D.C. and Helen Mann Esquivel, Recorder of Crosses. The cross is worn only by the one upon which it is bestowed and is passed on to his oldest child.

This medal is a Crusader's Cross, which bears the dates, 1861-1865, and is bound by the Confederate flag and flanked by the entwined memento of the ribbon which hold it. It is attached to a laurel leaf as a special mark of valor for those who distinguished themselves in feats of courage and bears the motto, "Fortes Creantur Fortiores" or "The Braves Become the Braver."

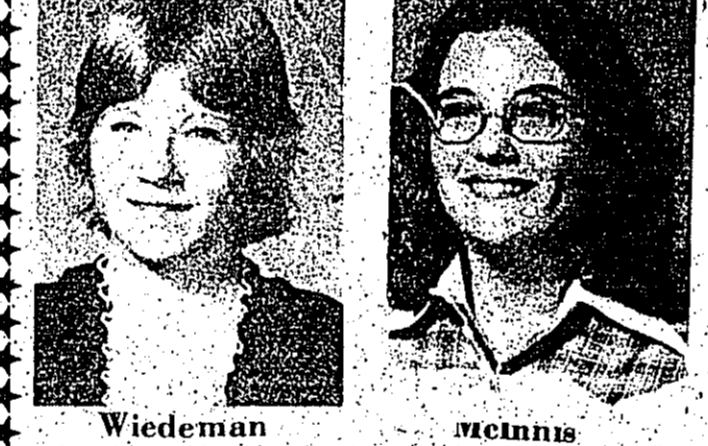

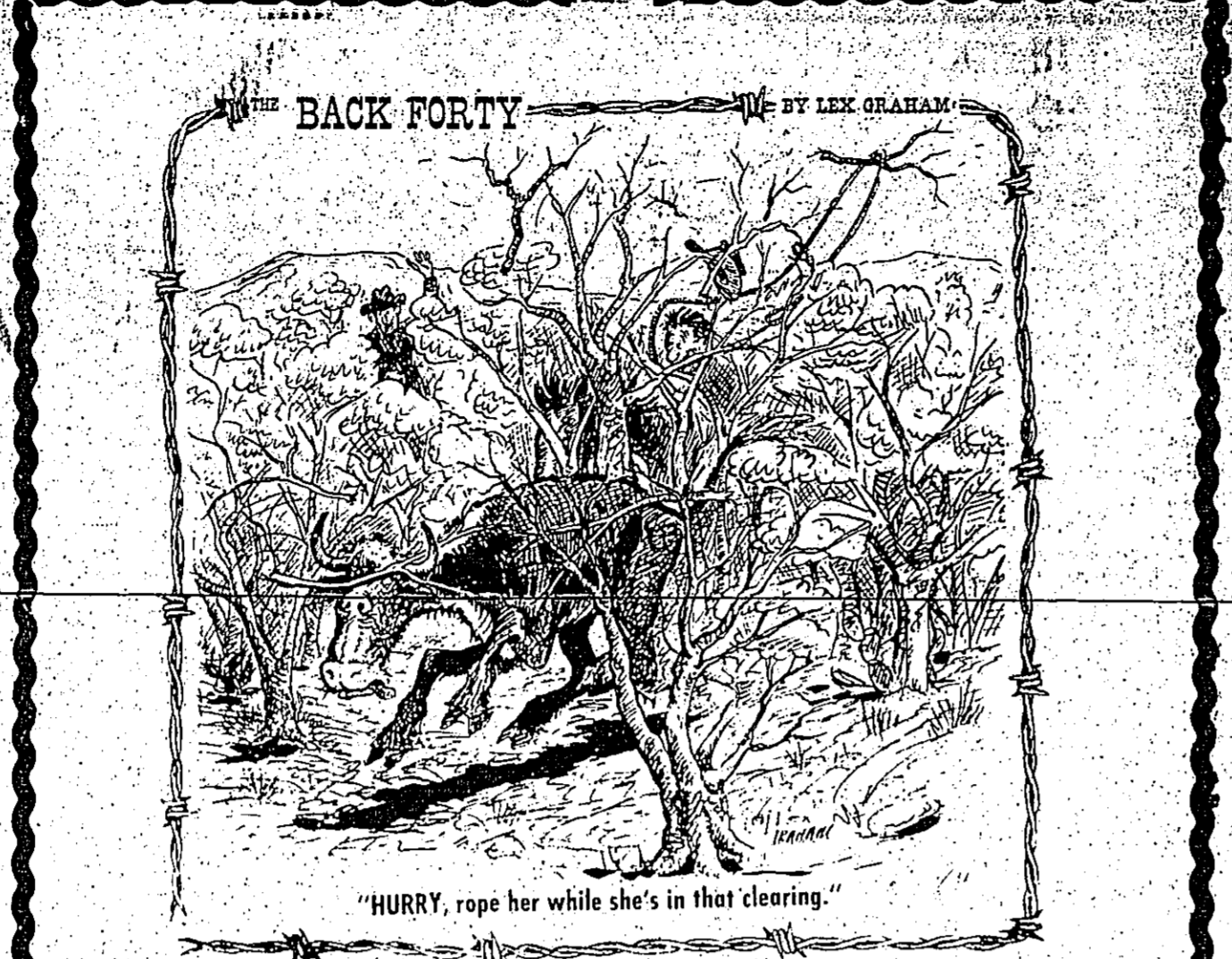
