Courtroom Visitors Hear Resignation Announcement Friday

Of All County Offices 10-Year Audit Sought

Tyler County Judge Tom Dick Mann says he'll call for a county-wide 10-year audit by an independent certified accounting firm at the next session of Commissioners court on Monday June 14.

Mann says he's going to call for the action "beginning with my own office first," he said.

Mann said that the people of Tyler County were due an explanation on the status of their county finances saying further, he felt the audit would be the best way to do

ed by the malicious rumors and vicious politics of the day."

Mann said that he was entertaining the idea of hiring into the Brookeland Independent School District in Jasper County, but was awaiting a unanimous vote of that schools Board of Trustees

Judge Mann went a step further saying, "If the county can't afford such a move then I'd ask that they take half of my salary for the rest of my term and use it to audit my office first."

County Auditor Earl King agrees with the idea saying that there are some good aspects of the procedure which would help his office. "Such as in streamlining the audit procedure or pointing up the fact that proper 'on time' auditing is a necessity in county government."

King said the cost of the project, as Mann has set it out would be extremely expensive.

King indicated that the county might be able to afford two or three years but that a detailed 10-year audit would be very expensive.

Judge Mann, who indicated that he felt the idea would be received by Commissioners favorably, said, "We need to restore confidence in County finances."

"The action is necessary," he said, "because through idle gossip the whole thing has been misleading to the people and I think they ought to know the facts."

"I'm not trying to put anything off on anybody but I just want to show that it's not what you spend but rather what you get for what you spent."

According to County Auditor King, "The general procedure is to secure an outside audit firm of certified public accountants who will make a survey and then a proposal to the court as to the costs of such a project."

King said he would recommend to the court, "Someone familiar in municipal audits."

Following the audit, King stated, that the firm would offer a certified opinion as to the financial condition of the county.

The County Government structure includes: The Sheriff's office, county auditor, judges office, County Treasurer, County clerk's office, District Clerks office, Tax Assessor/Collector, each of the offices of Justice of the Peace and all four Constables offices.

Judge Mann who says he is, definitely "Not going to run for office again" said he wants to emphasize the fact that he "feels that the people need to know the facts."

Precinct 3 Without Commissioner

Kenneth C. Belt, 54, of Colmesneil, submitted his resignation Friday to the Tyler County Commissioners Court with the court acting immediately to appoint Leon Fowler, Commissioner elect Precinct 3.

Belt, who would hold the office until the term officially ends December 31, 1976. Fowler, who is 43, will then assume the office officially having been elected by a 614 to 175 vote margin over Belt in the May 1 primary election.

Fowler has previously held the Commissioner post for two terms from 1966 to 1972.

Belt, who would have completed four years as Commissioner Precinct 3 at the end of his term this year, according to several sources close to the courthouse, is allegedly said to be involved with the misuse of county payroll checks.

Belt has appeared before a special two day session of the grand jury along with other witnesses apparently subpoenaed to appear in connection with those allegations of official misconduct.

Belt refused to comment on the subject saying only

that "I've decided since the election to go into another business."

Belt said he thought he would go into contract hauling.

Prior to the Commissioners Court accepting Belt's resignation and in his absence from the court meeting which took place at 3:30 p.m. on Friday, the Commissioners met with District Attorney Stanley Coe in a closed door session. The court had requested Coe's appearance, apparently to advise them on the nature of the charges leveled against Belt, and to make them aware of the possible penalties if the allegations prove true.

Fowler has opted not to accept the seat on the Court until he is handed a complete financial statement and completed inventory list. County Auditor Earl King and Assistant Ann Fondren, according to County Judge Tom Dick Mann, apparently will have the two items ready within the next few days.

"I appreciate," Fowler said, "the confidence of the County Judge and the Commissioners Court in appointing me to finish out the term as

commissioner of Precinct 3 and will take oath of office and file my bond upon completion of the inventory and audit of the books which should be completed shortly."

According to Judge Mann "The court expects to be able to meet Mr. Fowler's request and swear him in as soon as possible."

The new president replaces Dr. Jim Jinnette.

Jinnette said he was amazed at the accomplishments of the group. The performance and accomplishments are truly worthy of note," he said.

As a result of the project, \$470 has been raised and made available for new equipment on the primary playground. Colmesneil Phone Company Gets Improvement Loan

The offices of Senator Floyd Bentsen and Congressman Charles Wilson have jointly notified THE TYLER COUNTY BOOSTER that through the Department of Agriculture, the Rural Electrification Administration, has awarded a \$965,000 low interest loan to the Colmesneil Telephone Company in Colmesneil.

The loan is being made at a special 2 percent interest rate "Because of low revenue per mile of telephone line."

According to Bentsen's office, the loan apparently will be used to finance

facilities to connect some 228 new subscribers, and to construct .16 miles of new line.

General improvements to the system will also be added, his office said.

The President and Manager of Colmesneil Telephone Company, Charles S. Fortenberry, stated that "These funds will continue to provide one party lines throughout the system and will enable us to improve our long distance service. The money will also be used to build a combination warehouse and garage for trucks, equipment and storage space for cable and other supplies."

"The combination warehouse and garage will be built on the site where the old Pomp Meadows store now stands," Fortenberry said.

"The land has been purchased from the Meadows Estate recently and constructed of the warehouse-garage will start in the near future, after the old Meadows store is torn down."

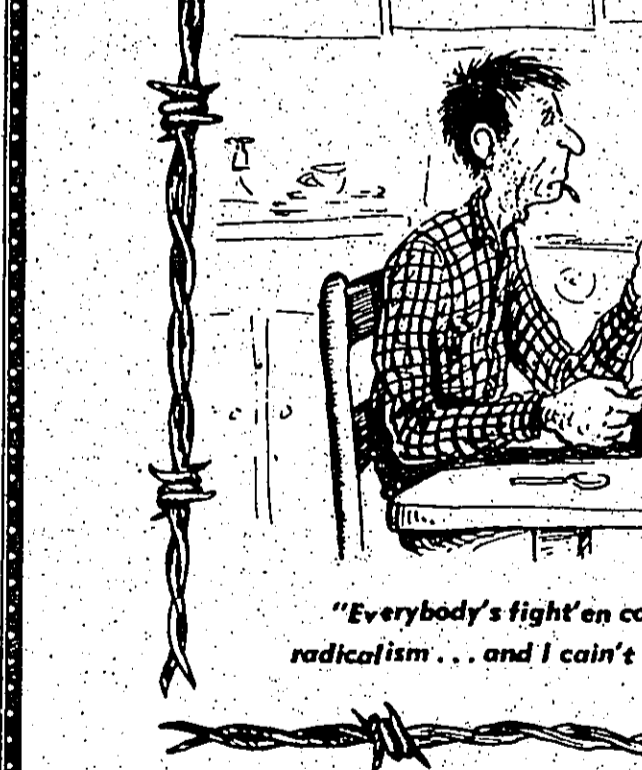

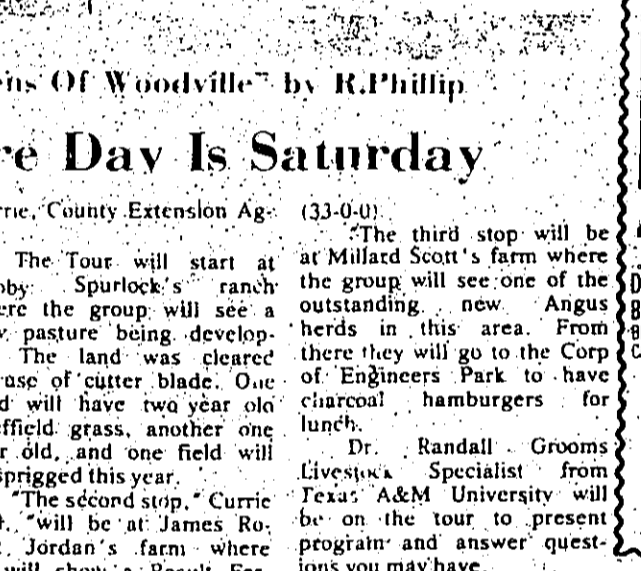

Garner Retains Membership In AAFP

KANSAS CITY, MO. — Curtis Garner, M.D., has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.
