Escape Trio Caught Near Rockland

Two of the escaped prisoners have already been convicted of murder and robbery charges and the third was still awaiting trial for similar activities at the time of the jailbreak which occurred at 3 a.m. Friday according to Nacogdoches Sheriff John Lightfoot.

Both Stotts and Page have been transferred to Huntsville where they have begun serving a life term. Tyler County Dispatcher Joe Tucker received word of that escape and then alerted Sheriff Craven. Craven said that he and Deputies "Slim" Cowart and Charles Bendy headed north on a tip that the three escapees would soon be in the vicinity of Rockland.

Craven said "When we arrived in the area about a mile south of the Neches River, we thought we saw a car turn east, apparently upon sighting our car." Craven said further, that a previous CB call asking for a position report on "County Mounties or Smokes" had been made by the trio, which the Sheriff's unit heard, asking the callers to refrain from using the frequency in that they were in pursuit of the three escapees.

MH-MR Services Growing

After having served a total of 1407 clients during its first year of operation, the Tyler County Mental Health - Mental Retardation Center expects to serve almost 1,000 more in its next and second year of operation. At a staff meeting last Wednesday, reports were made listing some of the accomplishments that the program has generated thus far in the County since its inception in January 1975, when it first began receiving clients.

The meeting was held in May, National Mental Health Month. Aside from the regular counseling program that the service offers, Program Director JoAnn Fries reports of success in development of a crafts program which was initiated for the elderly of Tyler County which mainly operated in the nursing homes in the county.

Fries said that the service was "trying to find ways to serve more people with less staff."

She spoke of group therapy activities provided by the service and other programs which "are aimed at the prevention of mental illness."

The group emphasized the idea of trying to keep treatment at home where possible.

They indicated that they rely on donations from area clubs to sustain operation in general, to keep things above water.

"Faithful volunteer help from the Ivanhoe Civic Club has been a tremendous asset," the staffers agreed. They bring lunches to all of our student clients who attend the Child Development Center each Tuesday at the Woodville Garden Club and the Heritage Civic Club also helped a lot with donations they reported. But we still need more help in the form of donations and we always need volunteer help.

Tyler County currently contributes \$7,057 annually to these local programs. These local funds are used as local match for receiving State Community Mental Health - Mental Retardation funds.

During fiscal year 1976 DETHMHRMS has budgeted funds in excess of \$60,000 for the operation of the Tyler County Outpatient Clinic and the Tyler County Developmental Center and for drug and alcohol services.

Emergency Medical Training Offered in Jasper

Accidents and accident-related injuries are one of the leading causes of death in the United States. And Tyler County is not immune to the problems that cause such statistics. It is for this reason that an E.M.T. (Emergency Medical Technician) course is being offered at the Jasper Memorial Hospital for the purpose of training E.M.T.s.

Carroll L. Dore is a certified E.M.T. who has taught at Lamar University as a certified instructor. Dore, with the aid of area doctors and hospitals, has put together a course which offers interested persons an opportunity to train to fill a void in Tyler County as well as surrounding counties. E.M.T.s in radio equipped vehicles will be able to offer rapid emergency treatment in case of accident or injury.

Why do we need E.M.T.s?

Area facilities we have available are adequate to handle the area's needs.

Dore thinks not. He says he feels that the problem with present facilities is a lack of equipment and personnel specifically trained to handle trauma cases. The nearest facilities with adequate equipment and trained people to handle such injuries are in Beaumont. Because of this, many accident victims must be transported a great distance to receive adequate emergency care. With the present system, each of these victims must first be carried by ambulance to an area hospital usually under the immediate care of an untrained and unqualified driver. The decision is then made to transfer the person to another hospital. Dore feels that "valuable and often life saving time" is lost by such an "inefficient system." He envisions a network of well trained and equipped

Such a comprehensive system is still in the future. But, if Carroll Dore has his way it will only be a matter of time. And local hospitals and doctors share his enthusiasm for the program.

According to Dore, almost all of the area medical people say it will only be a matter of time before they will participate in the program.

The E.M.T. course begins Tuesday, June 1, in the classroom at Jasper Memorial Hospital. It will be held two nights each week from 6:30 to 10:30 p.m. except for July 31, when it will run from 4 to 8 p.m.

Classes will be taught by Dore with the voluntary assistance of six area doctors. The course will last for 10 weeks, a total of 80 hours of instruction. Total cost for the course, including the cost of books and incidentals is \$17.50 per person.

A badly needed and enthusiastically supported program, the course has attracted 10 people from Tyler County. Dore hopes there will be many more. "But," he emphasized, "the only way that the program will ever be a success is if the people of the area get behind it and support it."
