# Voter Turnout Hits 90 Percent Saturday

With some 90 percent of the voters who participated in the May 1 Primary returning again last Saturday to vote in four important county level runoff contests, incumbent Sheriff Lewis E. Craven was returned to office by a 66 vote margin over Herman Nolen, a former deputy, and in a Precinct 3 Constable race incumbent Harley Crews won over Buck Faircloth by a margin of 214 votes.

Runoff contenders for a Commissioner Precinct 1 Post saw Maxie Riley defeat Dorothy Nettles 806 to 366. Nettles, a Woodville merchant, went on record as the only woman in Tyler County history to run for a commissioners post.

W.B. Bally defeated A.G. Thomas for the Constable Precinct 1 Post by a vote count of 635 to 599. In the Sheriff's race Craven made a comeback with 66 votes over Nolen, a former deputy. Warren had earned a 1,759 total over Craven's 1,759 total in the May 1 Primary. One other contender in the May 1 Primary election

was Don Woodrome of Chester who openly gave his support to Craven several weeks before last Saturday's balloting.

Craven said following the election that "A very long hard campaign is now over," and that he intends,

## Re-count Called

Ballot recounts have been requested by Sheriff's candidate Herman Nolen and State Representative S.M. "Doc" Elliott (resulting from last Saturday's runoff election). Nolen lost by a slim 66 votes and said "So many people have asked us to ask for a recount due to the closeness of the election."

S.M. "Doc" Elliott also has informed the County Democratic Chairman of a request for a recount. Jim Browder of Coldspring, defeated Elliott with 43 votes. Elliott attributed the vote shift in Saturday's balloting

to a failure of Liberty County voters to go to the polls. Elliott said, "I'm down now and it seems like I'm not in it but we're calling for a recount just to be sure."

According to the Tyler County Democratic Chairman's office, recounting will begin at 8 a.m. this Friday with a count team of three. All 12 boxes and the absentee box will be counted. The candidate seeking the recount must pay a \$10 deposit for each box in the recount. The candidate is reimbursed if the retabulation results are different from the initial vote.

In the State Representative race Jim Browder upset S.M. "Doc" Elliott of Dayton by almost doubling his vote tally in Tyler County since the May 1 Primary. Browder won over Elliott by a margin of only 43 votes in his district. Browder said that part of the reason for his win could be attributed to failure of Liberty County voters going to the polls. Browder won convincingly in his home San Jacinto County.

In the State level Court of Criminal Appeals race, Carl Dally won over W. Phillips in Tyler County earning some 1860 votes to Phillips 1,492.

The Railroad Commissioner runoff contest between Jon Newton and Jerry Sadler saw Newton win on the State level. In Tyler County, Newton polled 2,048 votes to Sadler's total of 1682.

# Big Thicket Group Prexy Named

Former Senator Ralph W. Yarborough was elected president today of the Big Thicket Association at their general membership meeting in Saratoga.

In presenting the nomination, Mrs. Laura Mitchell, chairman of the nominating committee, paid tribute to Yarborough's "unflinching interest and effort in behalf of Big Thicket ever since he introduced the first bill in the Senate in

1966. His leadership is still needed," she added.

Yarborough, whose family has lived in the Neches River watershed since the 1840's, served in the U.S. Senate from 1957-1971. In addition to sponsorship of Big Thicket legislation, he was author of bills to establish the Padre Island National Seashore and the Guadalupe Mountains National Park. Yarborough has also passed an impressive

list of education and health bills while serving on these Senate committees.

His earlier public career included service as Asst. Attorney General of Texas, 1931-34; Texas District Judge, 1936-40. He served 3 1/2 years in World War II in combat under General Eisenhower in Europe, and in the occupation of Japan under General MacArthur.

Yarborough earned a JD degree in Law at the Uni-

versity of Texas, and is now a practicing attorney in Austin. He is married to Opal Warren Yarborough, and their son, Richard Warren Yarborough, is Commissioner of the Indian Claims Commission.

The organization now headed by Yarborough was chartered in 1964 to preserve the Big Thicket and to establish a museum of local and natural history. The Preserve was established by law in 1974. The Association is now embarked on an active Museum development project for its Big Thicket Museum, volunteer operation since its opening in 1970.

Membership exceeds 900 persons, who are represented by a board of directors including eight officers that constitute the Executive Board. Elected with Yarborough were Mrs. Cleve Bachman, 1st Vice-President; Bill Brett, 2nd Vice-President; Ann Roberts, Membership Secretary; Alice Cashen, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Russell Long, Treasurer and Legal Adviser; Houston Thompson, Howard Peacock, immediate past-president is the eighth member of the Executive Board.

In tribute to outgoing president, Howard Peacock of Woodville, the board presented to him a trophy: the jaws of a razorback mounted on a plaque inscribed to "Howard 'Tush-hog' Peacock, President, Big Thicket Association, 1975-1976." Affectionate tributes were acknowledged to his leadership.

**Wardens Take Over 1,000 Miles Of Troline**

AUSTIN—Game wardens have taken more than 1,000 miles of illegal troline from Central Texas, said Burkett.

Game wardens are required to destroy illegal, unclaimed fishing gear. Trolines not tagged with the owner's name, address and the date the line was set are illegal, and fishermen have improperly tagged lines stand a good chance of losing their line or paying a fine, Burkett said.

According to Burkett, a troline may be tagged with a metal tag, plastic lettered strips or with the information printed in a small medicine bottle tied to the line. All these methods are satisfactory.

Since many counties have any untagged lines, those that have been in the water more than 90 days, or one that is illegally constructed, such as having too many hooks, Burkett said.

**Fish Population Healthy**

The Rayburn fish population appears healthy according to results of gill net samples taken recently by P&WD fisheries biologists in Jasper.

Game fish accounted for 48 percent of the catch and 52 percent of the catch after gill net samples taken in the upper, middle and lower regions of the lake.

The ratio of game fish to rough fish is judged good and indicates Rayburn is holding its own as a healthy lake with a thriving fish population.

The biologists were somewhat surprised at the numbers of white bass and spotted bass (Kentucky) setted in the survey. White bass and spotted bass each accounted for 6 percent of the total catch. Compared to previous Rayburn gill net samples, indications are that both white bass and spotted bass populations are increasing in the lake.

The clinic #2 is primarily for ages 10 through 12. This clinic will begin June 28th and end July 9th. The boys will meet each Monday through Friday from 9:00-12:00 a.m. behind the Angelina College gym.

The purpose of the clinic is to teach youngsters the basic skills of baseball in order that they may be able to compete to the best of their ability whether in sandlot ballgames or in one of the various youth leagues. **First Strippers In Rayburn**

Striped bass, which are becoming increasingly popular heavyweights in Toledo Bend, are now getting started in San Rayburn Reservoir.

Some 31,585 striped bass fingerlings were stocked in Rayburn on Wednesday, June 2 by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The stocking marks the first time strippers have been placed in Rayburn water. The recent batch of stripers scheduled for Rayburn, according to Bruce Hymish, the P&WD project leader for striped bass at the P&WD Marine Fisheries Research Station, where the stripers were reared.

Both the gill netting and seining are parts of a comprehensive sampling of Rayburn fish populations being undertaken by area P&WD fisheries biologists. The sampling will include coverage of the reservoir, identification of aquatic plants and water analysis.

From the results of the variety of sampling, biologists will be able to formulate management recommendations to maintain and improve fishing on the lake.

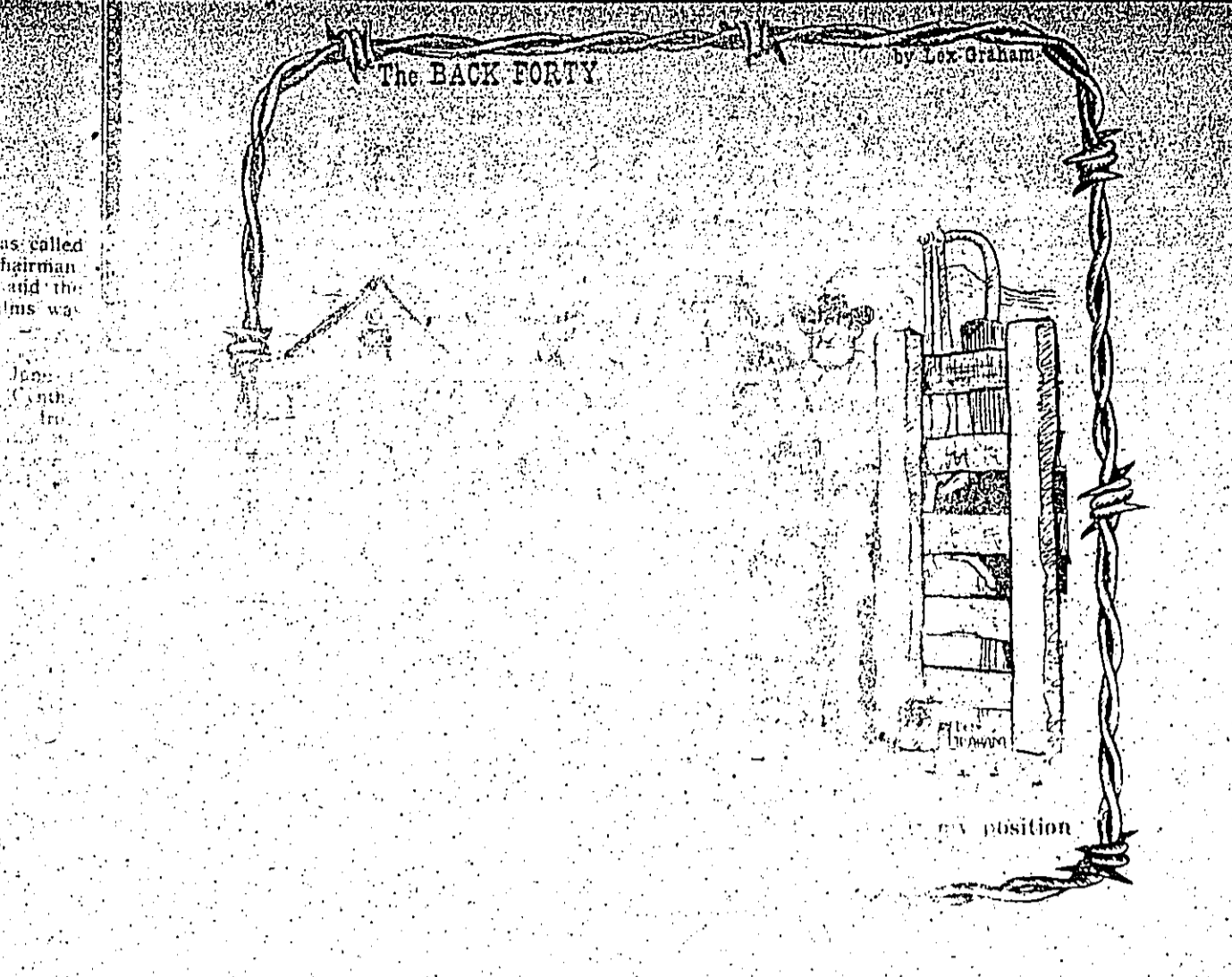

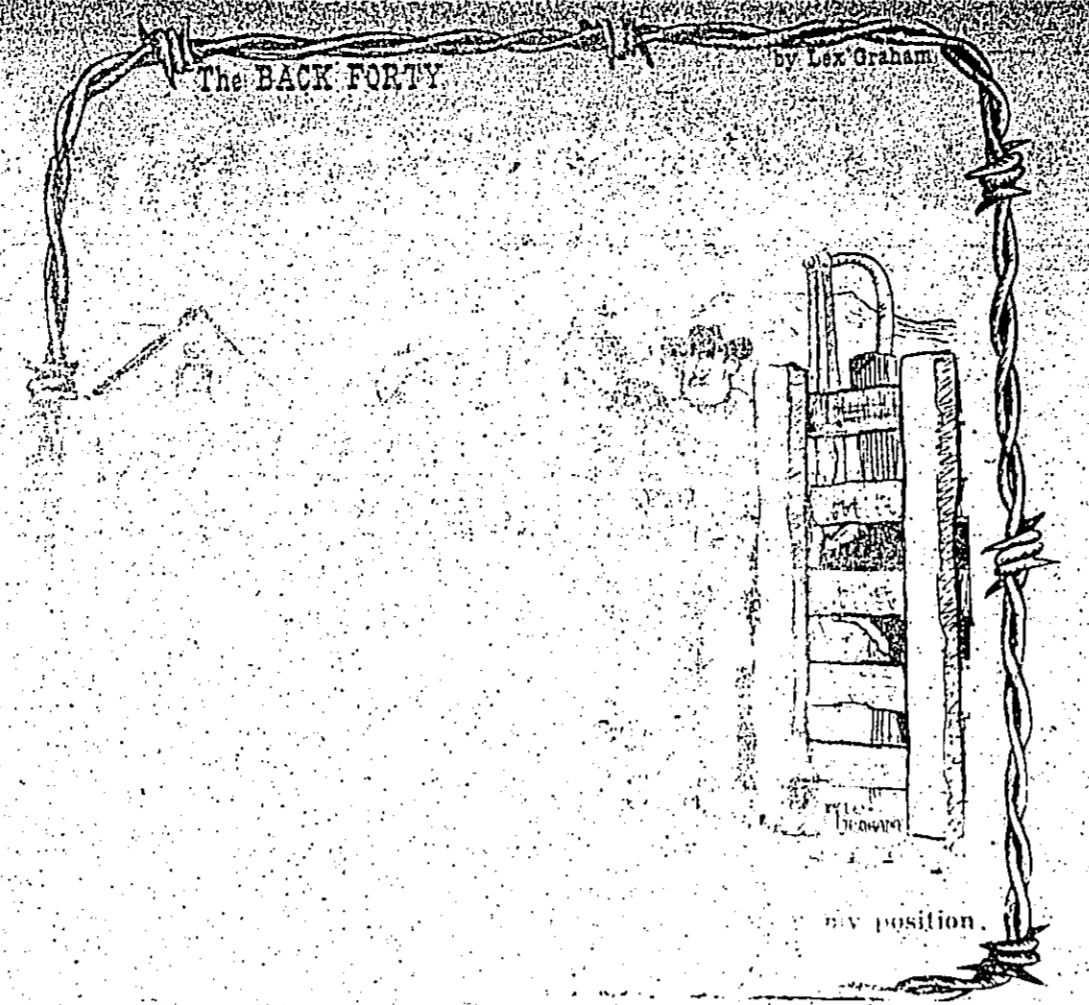
