

Know Your In-Laws

COLLEGE STATION—Good in-law relations begin before marriage—on both sides, Dobby Johnson, a family life education specialist, points out.

"Studies show that couples who have had frequent positive interactions with their prospective in-laws have a greater tendency to develop satisfactory relationships during marriage," she added.

Miss Johnson is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Couples generally find that if their parents approve of their future spouse, good in-law relationships will result."

"Also, research indicates that when parents do not approve of their child's future spouse, relations with the son or daughter-in-law are more likely to be strained and tense," she said.

Parents may disapprove of their child's future spouse because of his family background—different religion, education attainment, social class differences and personality traits, she said.

Accent On Health

Summertime and recreation just naturally go together, especially in the warm Texas sun. But the Texas Department of Health Resources wants that this year, as in past years, to many Texans will have their fun spoiled by unnecessary accidents.

Whatever type of recreation you choose, there are a few simple precautions you can take to ensure that you enjoy all of your vacation and leisure time.

According to safety experts, water sports offer the most frequent summertime hazards. Last year, more than 530 people drowned in water-related accidents in Texas. Typically, swimming accidents take the largest toll each year, followed closely by fishing accidents. Boating, sailing, water skiing, and canoeing also take their toll. But not all drownings involve swimmers and boaters. In too many cases, people fall from a place of presumed safety, such as a dock, bridge or the edge of a swimming pool. When this happens, in many cases the person isn't prepared to swim and can't get himself to safety.

Children are most susceptible to this type of accident, especially very small children playing near a swimming pool or a pond. Two simple safety rules can prevent almost all such tragedies: first, never leave children without adult supervision; second, make sure everyone in the family knows how to swim. Free or very inexpensive swimming lessons are available in almost every city and county through American Red Cross programs and local recreation agencies.

Not only children but adults as well should wear an approved life jacket while on a boat or near deep water -- just in case of an unplanned dip. Even an expert swimmer won't be able to avoid drowning if he's knocked unconscious by a fall from a boat or by striking a rock underwater. Always wear your life jacket; you know are safe, either because they're marked for swimming or because you're accompanied by someone who knows the area, thoroughly. And that's another good safety rule: don't swim alone. If you get into trouble, your companion can help you a life jacket or a rope to help you reach safety. Never swim when you're chilled, overly tired, overheated, or you've just finished eating.

Anyone familiar with Texas weather knows that it can change rapidly if you see thunderclouds building up or lightning in the water. Rowers can be in danger if a bolt of lightning strikes choppy, wind-blown water, can turn a pleasant swim into a potentially deadly nightmare.

Make sure your boat is in excellent condition and meets all safety regulations which include having a Coast Guard-approved flotation device on board for each person. When pulling a sled, boat drivers must be on the watch for swimmers and other watercraft.

It's a good idea to have two people in a row boat, one to drive and the other to watch the sled. It's also a good idea to learn the hand signals developed especially for sleds; it's too hard to hear above the noise of a motor, but a hand signal can get the message across.

Health authorities believe that there are dangers in other kinds of recreational activities, too. Whether it's hang-gliding or golf, jogging or tennis, mountain-climbing or sunbathing, a few simple precautions can save you and your family a lot of grief.

First, don't get into anything over your head. Know what you're doing; plan and think ahead to avoid possible danger. Over-extended, you're in a hot day under the bright sun is a sure way to get yourself in trouble. Dehydration, sunburn, heat exhaustion, heat stroke, and heat prostration are the penalties for people who don't know when to take it easy and they can take today's play-day as a warning for tomorrow's misery.

Third, don't get into anything with a friend. Whatever your favorite leisure activity might be, it's always more enjoyable in another person's company. If you're alone, you're more likely to get into trouble. Help is things in water. The difference that's the difference between a long, enjoyable vacation and a tragically short-ended life.

Pressure Treated Wood Is Best For Fences

If you're thinking about a wooden fence to add privacy and beauty to your property, pressure-preservative treated wood says Chick Statyon, area wood products specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Builders and architects have traditionally specified wood and cedar for fencing because of natural beauty and resistance to termites and decay (rot). However, only the heartwood (center portion of a tree) of any wood species has this resistance.

WOODVILLE—"Forest landowners: don't have to spend a fortune to make their woods to reproduce and grow," he added.

The Forestry Incentives Program can assist qualified landowners with up to 75% of their TSI cost. This reduces the cost for the landowner from \$200 to \$60 per acre, said Vaughn. When you consider the low cost

Mix Drink Tax Remittance Sent

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced last Wednesday that he had mailed checks to Tyler County and Woodville for their 15 percent remittance on mixed drink taxes collected from April to May of this year.

Both checks are for \$44.63.

Bullock said he has mailed checks totaling \$1.6 million to 188 counties and other checks totaling \$1.5 million to 310 cities as their share of \$10.8 million collected.

The remainder, \$7.7 million, stays in the state general revenue fund, the Comptroller said.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and represents 10 percent of all gross receipts from the sale of mixed drinks.

Bullock explained that the Comptroller's Office remits to counties and cities 15 percent of the total mixed drink tax collected within their boundaries on a quarterly basis.

He noted that the \$10.8 million collected is 21 percent more than the \$8.9 million collected in the second quarter of 1975, 44 percent more than the \$7.5 million collected during the same period in 1974.

Accident Report Released

BEAUMONT—Sergeant C.L. Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that during the month of June, there were no rural fatal accidents in Tyler County. In addition, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 rural motor vehicle accidents in which six persons were injured. Through June of this year, there have been 23 rural accidents in Tyler County, killing two persons and injuring 16 people.



School superintendent Tom Lham said that all teachers will begin their work year on Monday, Aug. 16.

Wednesday, Aug. 18, will be the first day of classroom instruction. All pupils who have not pre-registered or who have not previously attended Woodville schools are urged to register as early as indicated dates.

The lunchroom of the district will begin operation

Wednesday, Aug. 18. Lunch tickets will be available for pupils in kindergarten, 1-4 for \$2.25 per week or 45¢ per day. Lunch tickets for pupils in grades 5-12 will be \$2.50 per week or 50¢ per day.

Pupils who register in kindergarten or 1st grade will be required to have birth certificates in order to establish eligibility for registration.

Pupils new to the Woodville schools should have grade, book and credit records, as well as vaccination and health information from previously attended schools ready at registration time.

State law requires that all pupils entering and attending the public schools of Texas must have been immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella, pertussis, and smallpox, subject to provisional admittance if the required immunizations

have been started, as certified by a physician.

Attendance in the public schools of this state is compulsory for all pupils ages seven through seventeen, for a minimum of 165 days of the regular school term. Attendance in kindergarten is optional.

Pupils who are five years old on or before Sept. 1 are eligible to attend kindergarten. The kindergarten program of the district will operate on a single semester basis, with the oldest five year old students attending the first semester.

The faculty of the school district will begin a series of 10 inservice and work days on Monday, Aug. 16.

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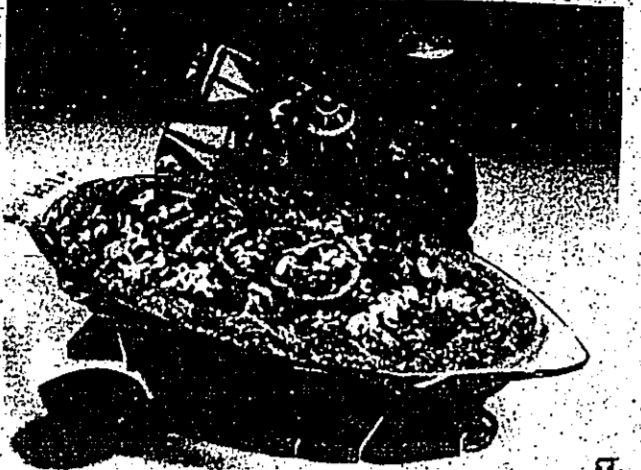
Celebration Planned

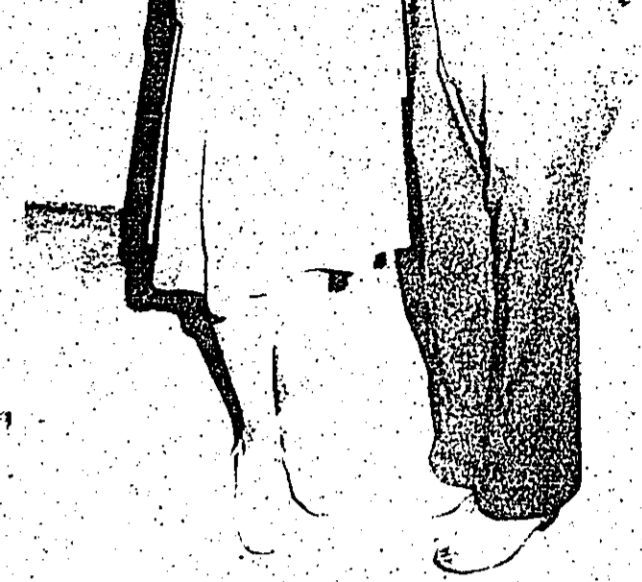
