



Mann, Bostick and Judge Sturrock

Sturrock Is New County Judge

WOODVILLE—Former County Clerk Allen Sturrock became Tyler County Judge Wednesday morning after he was selected to succeed the resigning Judge Tom Dick Mann. The selection of Sturrock came during the county commissioners' regular meeting Monday. Tuesday morning the commissioners met in emergency session to receive Sturrock's resignation as county clerk and appoint Grace Bostick as the chief deputy clerk to take Sturrock's place. Both Sturrock and Mrs. Bostick were expected to take the oath of office at 8 a.m. Wednesday, and will serve until the November general election. Judge Mann resigned effective at the end of business on Tuesday and said he was going to work for the Brookeland school district on Wednesday. Originally he said he would resign Sept. 1, but changed the date due to the start of school activities in Brookeland. Sturrock, 57, a native of Tyler County, has been county clerk since 1971. Mrs. Bostick, who has been chief deputy clerk for approximately four years and has worked in the court-

house since 1961, grew up in Spurger and now resides in Woodville. Mann's resignation came at the close of business Monday. He read to a full courtroom his letter of resignation, saying that "it has been a pleasure and privilege working with the commissioners and Tyler County." After the resignation was unanimously accepted by the court, Mann told those present that "a lot of real fine people have applied for this job...but, there could be only one. After serious consideration, I believe that the court has decided to make an appointment."

Commissioner H.M. Parks then rose and addressed the court, saying, "It is with regrets that we accept Judge Mann's resignation. We hate to see him go. I've enjoyed working with him. I don't know whether he enjoyed me or not, but at this time I'm going to make a motion that we appoint Allen Sturrock as county judge." Commissioner Joe Best seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. "I feel honored that the court has selected me," said Sturrock after the vote. "I really ran from this thing for a long time...for various reasons. There were some real good men who talked about this job, and I am sorry that you didn't pick one of them. Now you've selected me, so I'll say this. I think some of you, the way you've talked to me are expecting a miracle." "Now miracles still do happen, but they happen through men. And the only way this court and this county can get back on their feet, is to get down on their knees and pray. I really mean that."

Say Trustees

Bond Would Improve Elementary School Plant

Building a new high school will provide better classroom facilities for the primary and elementary school children. The \$3.1 million will include funds for renovating and air conditioning classrooms in the present third and fourth grade building and in the Wheat Jr. High and elementary buildings for use of children in kindergarten through the sixth grade. The present kindergarten through second grade buildings are no longer considered suitable for classrooms by the school administration, school board, and many parents of the youngest children. Brick veneer which was added to improve the outside appearance of these buildings hides the unstable floors, flaking plaster on the walls, and crumbling tiles in the ceiling. Children must go outside the main building to reach many classrooms in the annexes. They are exposed to bad weather walking the long distance to catch the buses. In the winter the blow heaters in the individual rooms are a maintenance problem and allow the floors to remain cold. The rooms are too hot to be comfortable several months during the school term since the school year begins the middle of August and runs through the last of May. According to school officials, the plumbing and wiring in the buildings are a constant maintenance problem. The pipes under the main building are too small to take care of the volume of sewage the school has with students coming in from the annexes to use the bathrooms. The electrical wiring has been added to until it has a tendency to overload and blow fuses. If voters approve the bonds, primary school children in kindergarten through the second grade will be relocated in the present third and fourth grade building. This building is basically sound. All classrooms will be renovated and air conditioned and the present auditorium will be converted to a cafeteria so that the children will not be outside the building in bad weather. The youngest children will use the existing library in the same building. Grades three through six will be relocated in the present Wheat Jr. High building and in the fifth through sixth grade elementary building, which was built in 1967. The classrooms in these buildings will also be renovated and air conditioned. The children will use the library in the same building, and a protected, covered walk-way will be constructed from the Wheat building to the cafeteria. The cafeteria, which is presently overcrowded serving grades five through twelve, will adequately accommodate grades three through eight. The children will use the main auditorium which grades five through twelve use now, and sixth grade band students will use the band hall already on the campus. The auditorium, which is used for many community affairs as well as school assemblies, will be air conditioned. Repairs to the ceiling and other areas in the auditorium were completed in June. With the high school students off the campus, there will be adequate playground space for grades three through six. If voters give their affirmative nod to the proposed school bonds September 28, that move will open the door to better facilities for the primary and elementary students, not only in the near future but for years to come.

Youth Names Fowler

Assault Claimed

WOODVILLE—A 17-year-old Woodville resident and two witnesses have made sworn statements that County Commissioner Leon Fowler hit him in the face early on the morning of July 29 outside the Tyler County Courthouse. Michael A. Jones said in sworn statements before City Magistrate T.E. Phillips that he was assaulted by Fowler after Fowler was summoned to the courthouse shortly after midnight on July 29. The statements were made on Aug. 5, a week after the alleged assault. Phillips said that he had passed the testimony on to County Attorney Jim Allison for any further action. He said that this move was necessary because of claims of bodily harm as a result of the alleged assault. Phillips said that Jones claimed to have head and neck pains after the incident and was said to have missed work and consequently then been fired from his job. Allison said Monday that he and district attorney's investigator B.J. Vardeman were trying to get written statements from Jones, Fowler and witnesses to the incident. According to Fowler, he was called to the courthouse at approximately midnight by the sheriff's department to look at two chainsaws which had been found in Jones' car when it was stopped for a traffic violation. Fowler said that he had reported the loss of two saws from the Precinct 3 Barn on July 26 to Deputy Sheriff George McKee. He added that he had reported on July 28 the license of a car seen near the precinct barn in Colmesneil. Again the re-

port was to McKee, said Fowler. Fowler further explained that the sheriff's department called him later that same evening, the 28th, to come in and look at the saws found in Jones' car. Sheriff Lewis Craven told the BOOSTER Tuesday that Deputy McKee may have known about the theft, but no official written report was made. He added that McKee was probably the person who called Fowler to come to the courthouse. Fowler said that the saws were taken out of Jones' car and he saw that they were not the stolen ones. Fowler said that he then sent McKee to get a flashlight so that he could look at some tools in the car. While McKee was getting the flashlight, Fowler said that Jones bumped into him (Fowler) and that he swung back with his right arm, sending Jones to the ground. Fowler added that Jones did not stay on the ground long. Fowler denied that he told Jones not to report the incident. Judge Phillips said that Jones was accompanied into his office on Aug. 5 by Jerry Mahan, a Tyler County businessman with cattle interests. Phillips said that Mahan also accompanied two witnesses into the office after Phillips told Jones that he would need witnesses. Fowler told the BOOSTER Monday that he was concerned with getting back to the job to which I was elected to, and not fooling around with a bunch of nonsense.

Judge Claims Office 'Used Politically'



No Injuries

WOODVILLE—This accident occurred Friday morning after a tractor-trailer rig driven by James M. Williams, 21, of Lufkin went through a red light at Bluff and Magnolia and hit the rear of another tractor-trailer rig driven by Eugene Escalante, 42, of Austin. Damage to Williams' rig estimated at \$11,000 while damage to Escalante's was minor. No one was injured, but Williams did get a ticket. Police Chief Gary Mattingly investigated the accident which tied up traffic at the busy intersection for an hour.

Woodville City Judge T.E. Phillips told THE BOOSTER Monday that he felt local cattleman Jerry Mahan "tried to use this office for political purposes" regarding a complaint filing procedure surrounding a July 29 incident involving Commissioner Precinct 3 Leon Fowler - Fowler is said to have allegedly knocked down an individual in custody of The Tyler County Sheriff's office when Fowler was reportedly examining some chainsaws thought to have been taken from the Precinct 3 barn in Colmesneil. The saws later proved not to be those stolen from the barn. Judge Phillips said that even though Mahan might have tried to use the office for political purposes, that "the evidence was all I could consider. Our job is not to reason." Phillips referred to the fact that Mahan brought the subject of the alleged chain saw theft, Michael Jones, 17, of Woodville, on August 5 to make a complaint about the incident and in so doing, Jones cited bodily injury. Phillips told both Mahan and Jones that he couldn't take Jones' word alone, that there had to be more witnesses. Phillips stated in questioning Mahan's role in the procedure of the case that Mahan quickly turned up two persons, James Bean

Civic Center Pledges Rolling In

Pledges of \$100 apiece are still rolling in toward the idea of building a Civic Community Center with the total standing now at the \$5,000 mark.

A planning committee has been formed recently to "draw an overall general plan for the proposed community center" and review questions that arise as the project develops.

Committee members include Rose Carruth, Harold Davis, Don Cole, Dorothy Nettles, Doug Tolbert and as an advisor, Clinton Currie.

The group, according to Chamber President Carl Nichols will decide eventually on what the proper location should be, what size the building would be and in general serve as a sounding board for the questions which come up during the planning and building stages of the center.

Nichols, who proposed the idea to the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors at a recent regular monthly meeting, said the group should "only try to build the slab first for the center, using it for dances and outdoor activities."

Nichols idea is to just fund the concrete slab portion of the project, "on a totally reimbursable basis."

Nichols indicated that if anyone is interested in making a pledge toward the project, they are asked to call the Chamber with that information.

A tentative location for the center has been suggested near the Tyler County Airport, Nichols said the area around the airport

Accent On Health

Every year at about this time the Texas Department of Health Resources issues a reminder that many children would prefer to forget school will be starting in just a few weeks.

Even though most people are in the midst of enjoying their summer vacations, the personnel of the Bureau of Vital Statistics are preparing for the annual rush. They know that in another month or so, thousands of Texas families will suddenly realize that they're not quite ready for school. One thing they'll need, if they have children that are entering school for the first time, is a birth certificate.

This fall there will be some 230,000 new first graders in the schools throughout Texas, and proof of age is necessary for the first-graders - either in first grade or in public kindergarten. Total public school enrollment is likely to exceed three million children.

At the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the Texas Department of Health Resources, the requests for birth certificates are already beginning to arrive. It takes a sizeable staff just to open the thousands of letters received daily, let alone search out the requested certificate, make a certified copy, and mail it. Over the years, the process has been refined to the point that most requests are filled within three or four days. After all, the Bureau of Vital Statistics has been handling birth records since 1903.

Last year, the Bureau received, reviewed, queried, and filed 559,000 records of births, deaths, fetal deaths, marriages, divorces, and annulments of marriage. Another 31,200 birth and death records were corrected.

More than 273,000 requests for certified copies of vital records were received, resulting in 386,000 request searches of the files. In response to these requests, 254,000 certified copies were issued. In all, nearly three-quarters of a million pieces of mail were received and processed. Services of one kind or another were provided to more than 1.1 million people.

The problem, of course, is the individual who waits until the last possible minute before requesting a record that he needs. So many people make this mistake that the inevitable result, every year, is a log-jam of requests with all of the delays, confusion, and possibility for error that naturally occur under those circumstances.

Parents can avoid these problems simply by taking a few minutes right now to request any birth records or other certified records they need. You can write directly to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas Department of Health Resources, 1100 West Street, Austin, Texas 78756. Or you can obtain a certified copy of a birth certificate from the city register in the city where the child was born, or the county in the county of birth; duplicate records are maintained in each location. In many cases, a brief visit to the county courthouses will ensure that you have the proper record in the shortest possible time.

If you do write to the state office in Austin, don't forget to include your check or money order for two dollars, the fee for a certified copy of a record. If you do include the two dollars with your request, that just means more correspondence, more delay and more frustration for you. And when you write, include the child's name, the place of birth, the date of birth, and the names of the parents - including the mother's maiden name. All of this information is necessary in order to make sure you receive the correct record you need.

Next year by this time, the experienced personnel of the Bureau of Vital Statistics will be even better equipped and prepared to handle the annual rush of birth certificate requests. This coming October, the Bureau is moving into a new record facility designed specifically for the protection and handling of more than 20 million birth, death, marriage, divorce, and annulment records that are already on file - and the million more that will be received in the future.

Deer Survey to Begin

AUSTIN—A census of white-tailed deer set to begin in early August will determine the number of antlerless deer permits to be issued this hunting season.

Last year some 250,000 permits were issued. Of that, almost 63,000 does, representing 18 percent of the 1975 white-tail harvest, were bagged according to Charles Winkler, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department big game program director.

This census will give us an accurate count of bucks, does and fawns in the field, and then we can determine the number of does that can be harvested without hurting the overall population," Winkler said.

The statewide census will begin Aug. 2 and run through the first week of October. The beginning date was set at the time fawn tags were issued to be 30 to 45 days old.

P&W's doe permits are issued on the basis of the total deer population, fawn production and range conditions.

Because of the heavy spring and summer rains, the range is expected to be far better than last year and able to support more deer.

Winkler stressed, however, that range conditions can change between August and mid-October when the survey is completed.

Once the survey is completed, P&W biologists will recommend the number of doe permits to be issued to individual landowners in areas where deer populations exceed the habitat carrying capacity.

In past years, the majority of these permits have been issued in the Edwards Plateau, South Texas Plains, Cross Timbers, Gulf Coast Prairies and the Post Oak Savannah areas of Texas.

Game Warden Receives Award

AUSTIN—Game warden Billy Platt of Jasper has been selected the Outstanding Game Warden of the Year by the Southeastern Association of Game and Fish Commissioners. The association is comprised of wildlife professionals from 16 southeastern states.

During Platt's 14 years in the field, more than 90 percent of the 1,100 game fish and water cases he has filed have resulted in convictions. Drawings in his district have been reduced from an average of 15 per year to less than five.

Platt also has been active with youth organizations and civic clubs. His drive and diplomacy have had much to do with a turnaround of attitudes towards game conservation by the people of East Texas. This has resulted in the increase of Jasper County's deer population from one of the state's lowest to one which now attracts hunters from all over Texas.

Radio Communication Equipment Thefts High - Reward Offered

LUFKIN—A reward is being offered by the U.S. Forest Service for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons involved in the theft of radio relay equipment from the National Forests in Texas.

Supervisor of the National Forests in Texas at Lufkin, said that electronic components of the forest communication network have been disappearing at an alarming rate and they are seeking the cooperation of local citizens to stop the thievery.

The radio communications network, spans all four National Forests throughout East Texas, ranging over an approximate radius of 175 square miles.

The main control station operates from a Forest Service location in Lufkin with relay stations scattered throughout the Angelina, Sabine, Davy Crockett and Sam Houston National Forests.

The communications network, according to Courtney, is vital to Forest Service operations in the day-to-day management activities of the National Forests and receives heavy use during fire seasons.

The radio communications are also used to assist in search and rescue operations on the National Forests and other civil emergencies when needed.

During the preceding four months, Forest Service officials said that radio equipment valued at approximately four thousand dollars has been removed by persons unknown from the lower locations on the National Forests.

"In one instance," Courtney said, "a repeater was removed from a station on the Davy Crockett National Forest that knocked out all communications on that Forest. Had a fire or other emergency condition arisen during that period, heavy losses of property or human life could have occurred."

Courtney said that Forest Service special agents and local law enforcement authorities have had no success in apprehending those who are removing the equipment.

Anyone having information that may be of assistance to the apprehension of those involved is encouraged to call Forest Service Special Agent Billy Platt at the headquarters of the National Forests in Lufkin at 632-4446, or the nearest local law enforcement officer.

A reward will be paid to any person who provides information resulting in the arrest and conviction of those involved. Forest Service officials have stated that any source will be guaranteed anonymity and any information will be treated as confidential.

Livestock Exhibition Rules Given For Tyler County Fair - Sept. 11-12

WOODVILLE—The rules and regulations for the livestock exhibition at the Tyler County Fair, Sept. 11-12, have been announced by the Fair Committee.

1. Only members of 4-H, FFA, and FFA Clubs within Tyler County are eligible to exhibit in this show.

2. Any exhibitor may be disqualified to receive ribbons by not conforming with rules and regulations of the show.

3. The Livestock Committee reserves the right to remove from the show grounds any exhibit or animal that may be falsely entered or may be deemed unsuitable for exhibition, including health reasons.

4. The Livestock Committee reserves the right, in the event of certain circumstances, only in the best interest of exhibitors, to change show classes or grades.

5. All livestock and poultry must be on the grounds by 9:00 a.m. September 11, 1976.

6. Entry deadline will be September 1, 1976.

7. All Livestock entries at the very minimum must be halber breakers.

8. The Livestock Committee will not be responsible for injury, or liability to exhibitors, contestants, spectators, livestock, or any other articles exhibited in the show, including commercial exhibits.

9. Prizes will consist of 1st, 2nd and 3rd place ribbons.

Texas To Receive Funds For Wildlife Restoration

AUSTIN—Texas will be in line for an appropriation of nearly \$2.25 million in federal funds during the next fiscal year for sport fish and wildlife restoration and hunter safety programs.

That figure represents first payment to Texas based on the excise tax collected from the sale of sporting goods to hunters and fishermen around the state.

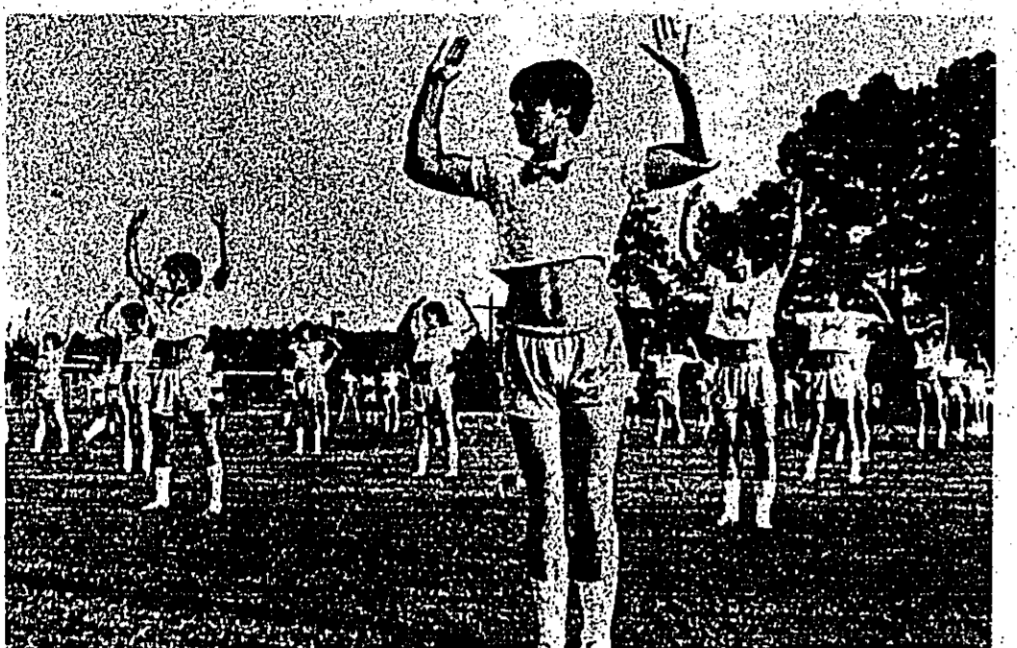
A total of \$2,235,800, half of the total federal fund allocation expected for Texas during fiscal year 1977, will be distributed to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department of the Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service.

These funds come to the states on a reimbursable basis that is, they are paid back to states after the funds have been allocated and spent. The 1976 fiscal year tax receipts are tallied. Federal aid funds for wildlife restoration are distributed according to a formula based on hunting license holders and the area of each state. State population figures are used in apportioning hunting safety monies.

Fish restoration funds come to Texas based on the number of sport fishing license holders and size of the state.

The second installment will come to Texas in December after the 1976 fiscal year tax receipts are tallied. Information collected by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department estimates fishermen spent up to \$650 million on fishing trips in the state in 1975. That total included expenditures for gas, bait, lodging and food, boats and fishing tackle.

P&W's inland fisheries officials arrived at the figure by estimating that each angler spends some \$10 per day on freshwater fishing. In 1975, approximately 3.2 million anglers fished in Texas. Up to \$350 million was spent in fishing the state's many reservoirs. The remaining \$300 million was spent by stream and farm pond fishermen.

Sept. 25 Texas Hunting & Fishing Day

AUSTIN—September 25 has been set aside by Governor Dolph Briscoe as Texas Hunting and Fishing Day in recognition of the contributions state outdoorsmen make to conservation.

In his proclamation, Governor Briscoe cited Texas hunters and fishermen for their support of game, storage and law enforcement through the purchase of hunting and fishing licenses.

"Game animals such as deer, quail and turkeys now exist in greater numbers than ever during this century and millions of acres of freshwater lakes now contain great populations of both native and introduced varieties of fishes," stated the Governor's proclamation.

Briscoe urged all citizens to "join with hunters, anglers and conservationists in expressing their appreciation for and dedication to proper use of natural resources now and for future generations."

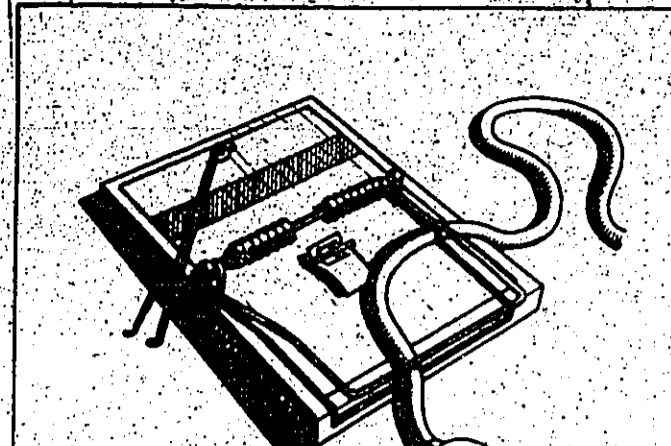

Texas Livestock Dealer Suspended
WASHINGTON, D.C. — George R. Watts, Athens, Texas, has been suspended as a registered livestock dealer for violating payment, accounting and record-keeping requirements of the Packers and Stockyards Act, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) said Tuesday. Watts purchases livestock throughout Texas, said the USDA. Liebert suspended Watts' registration for a 34-day period, starting Wednesday, Aug. 10, 1976. He may not operate

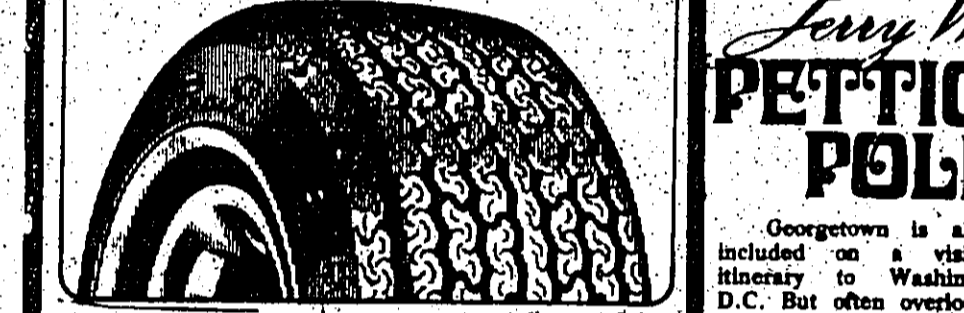
Bullock Releases Report

AUSTIN—Comptroller Austin Bullock said today that federal aid to Texas state and local governments has more than tripled since 1966, but Texas still has the lowest per capita income in the nation. He said they pay in income taxes that are "appreciated" to federal aid programs. Bullock said the analysis lists 41 other states that get better returns on their income tax dollars. "The reasons we have a lower return," said the Comptroller, "are that we have a relatively low state and local tax effort, we have less unemployment than the national average and because Texas has a tradition of independence from federal programs." However, he pointed out, Texas state government alone has already received \$1.5 billion in federal funds during the first ten months of the current fiscal year, representing about 30 percent of all state revenues. The analysis of federal aid is the work of Comptroller's June financial statement.

The monthly financial statement shows that June's expenditures of \$403.5 million brought state expenditures for the first ten months of fiscal 1976 to more than \$3.3 billion, 17 percent above the same period in fiscal 1975. State revenues, meanwhile, also total \$3.3 billion through June, \$660 million more than the same period in fiscal 1975, an increase of 11 percent.

Washington Report

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Perhaps more than any other group in our society, the veterans are deserving of all the benefits our nation can afford to give. While nothing can ever compensate for the psychological and physical hardships of the wartime experience, the transition to civilian life is made easier through the benefits provided the ex-G.I. and his dependents by the Federal government. The U.S. now has one of the most comprehensive veterans' benefit programs in the world, but the program still needs periodic adjustments and extensions to ensure that the most complete benefits are provided. Last month, the House of Representatives unanimously passed a bill which would provide cost-of-living increases in compensation benefits for service-connected disabled veterans and their dependents. In that same session, the House also passed a bill which would extend the months of eligibility and death pensions for veterans and of dependency and indemnity compensation for parents. In addition, several other bills were recently signed into law that can make an important difference to many veterans under the Housing Amendments Act of 1976, the veterans' home loan program has been enlarged and extended; medical benefits have also been extended to include survivors of any death who at the time of death was suffering from a total and permanent service-connected disability; and the Federal share of caring for a veteran in a state home has been increased. I have also cosponsored a series of bills which would increase the number of service-connected disabled veterans and their dependents who would be eligible for the time period a vet has in which

Georgetown is always included on a visitor's list in Washington, D.C. But often overlooked, and a much more pleasant way to spend a day, is Old Towne. Less crowds. Great shops. And restaurants. And recently added to the list of musts in Old Towne is the reopened Gadby's Tavern. Famous as one of George Washington's favorite pubs, it now is open to the public. Serving meals at surprisingly moderate prices, the tavern has a menu similar to Washington's era. It includes such things as Brunswick stew, English rabbit, colonial beef, barbecue and baked country ham. For more than a century it was a famous saloon. And served meals to John Adams, James Madison, Francis Scott Key, the Marquis de Lafayette and William Clay, as well as Washington. It's still one of the most attractive colonial buildings in the U.S. The tavern was built in 1770 as a coach stop and hostelry. Six Presidents and five First Ladies have dined there. In fact, our First Lady Betty Ford is honorary president of a volunteer club group which helped with the refurbishing. Inside, visitors may visit

a taproom, a gaming room, a parlor, wine cellar and the famous ballroom where musicians played from the balcony. Once the tavern was a gathering place for the colonial patriots plotting their future moves. The first recorded birthday ball was in February 1787. This came the first Washington's birthday ball. For many years thereafter Washington's birthday was observed with cannon fringes and fireworks. But the Civil War brought Gadby's Tavern bad times. It was occupied by Union troops. And finally closed by the Metropolitan Museum of Art bought the building. And installed them there. To save the tavern, the local American Legion post bought it in 1929. Later they sold it to the City of Alexandria, Virginia. Gadsby's Tavern is back in business. It's still not too late to come to Washington for a Bicentennial visit. The estimated masses of crowds expected for the summer never came. There is a list for lunch at Gadby's Tavern in Old Towne Alexandria. But it's worth it.

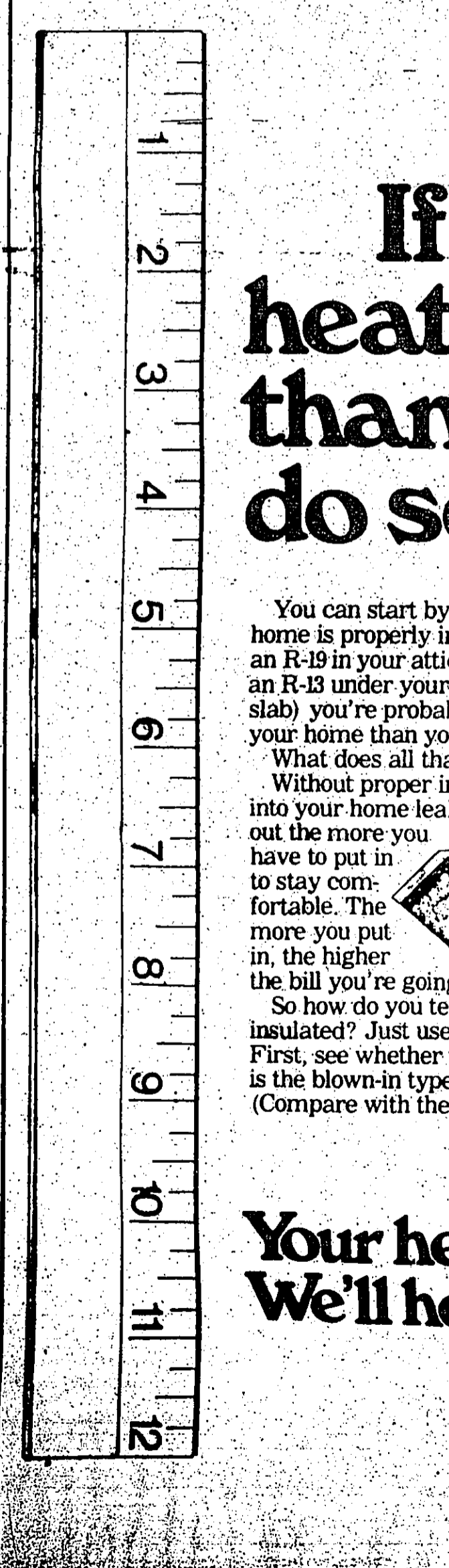

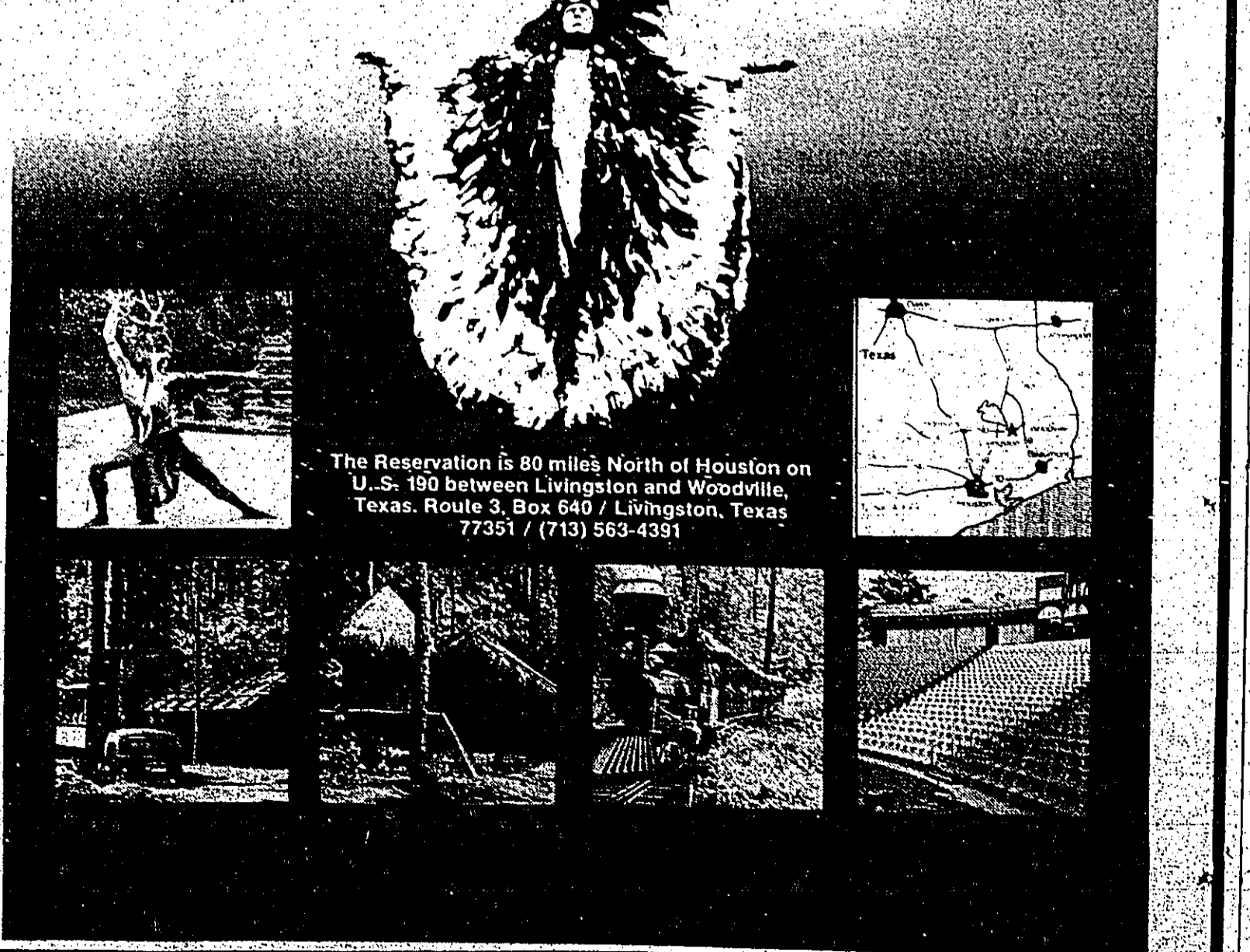

The Will Of Man

God created Adam fully capable of making up his mind about eating of the "tree of knowledge of good and evil." He chose (willed) to eat of the tree and was driven from Eden.

If you think that men are wholly inclined to evil, please remember that Adam was mature, perfect and innocent. This was the first evil to come into his life.

Common sense teaches us that men are not WHOLLY inclined to evil. What about the many good deeds done by sinners? Are these not inclinations to good?

Is it not a fact that if men were wholly inclined to evil that evil is all that they would be capable of doing? Please remember that when a person becomes a saved person he does not have to give up any good thing which he is already doing.

In spite of these considerations there are those who believe that man is so completely given to evil that he cannot of his own mind WILL to accept the salvation offered by God without the direct action of the Holy Spirit working upon his heart. This false doctrine was made necessary by another false doctrine - that is, that man is born totally depraved, having inherited Adam's guilt. However, some who deny the depravity of man at birth still cling (inconsistently though it be) to the need of a direct action of the Holy Spirit upon the sinner.

The question boils down to this: Can man exercise his will in an effort to obey the will of God without the direct intervention of the Holy Spirit? If man cannot choose to do the will of God without the direct aid of the Holy Spirit, would God not be a respecter of persons if the Holy Spirit were sent to some and not to others? (Romans 2:11; Acts 10:34).

Paul says, "How that by revelation he made known unto me the mystery; (as I wrote afore in few words, when ye read, ye may understand my knowledge in the mystery of Christ)..." (Eph. 3:3,4). Do these verses not teach that we can understand what Paul wrote? If so, then, why the need of direct aid from the Holy Spirit to understand and will to obey? Or, will some say we can understand without the direct aid of the Holy Spirit, but cannot will to do the will of God without His aid?

"Wherefore be ye not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord is." (Eph. 5:17). "If any man will do his will, he shall know of the doctrine, whether it be of God, or whether I speak of myself." (John 7:17).
