

## Woodville PD In High Speed Chase



Police Unit Wrecked But None Hurt

WOODVILLE—Three Missouri teenagers were arrested early Monday following a hundred-mile-an-hour 30-mile chase that began in Woodville and ended just about five miles into Jasper County.

The chase which ran in an easterly direction bottlenecked dangerously at the Dam-B Bridge to Jasper because of heavy traffic and ended when the 1976 Firebird Transam crashed in a culvert at the edge of Hwy 190 temporarily out of sight of the pursuing officers.

The chase began at about 10:30 p.m. in Woodville in front of the Highway Department Barn where the "suspicious looking" car was parked.

When Patrolman Charles Walker turned back to investigate, the trio sped off "squeling" their tires," said Woodville Police Chief Gary Mattingly, who said the car then "cut down Reid

Street and turned east on Highway 190."

According to Mattingly, off-duty officer Jim Reid who had been riding with Walker had left the car a few minutes earlier and entered his own private car. He was parked in downtown Woodville and was alerted by Walker about the chase by walkie-talkie. According to Mattingly the suspects' vehicle ran two red lights in downtown Woodville and while driving on the wrong side of the road narrowly missed officer Reid who tried to stop the vehicle with his own car.

The suspects car, which Mattingly described as "much faster than our patrol unit" sped toward Jasper sometimes reaching speeds as high as 120 miles per hour. Mattingly indicated that the chase vehicle was lucky to keep the car in sight because the trio didn't know the roads. Mattingly

said they were running people off the roads and passing them on the left and right. "But, they weren't going as fast as they could," Mattingly said.

According to the police the officers were able to keep the vehicle in sight until it reached the bridge, then they were able to pull to within 25 yards."

Chief Mattingly complimented officer Walker on his quick action in calling in the assistance of the Jasper County Sheriff's office and the Tyler County Sheriff's Department for back up assistance.

"It's also a good thing officer Walker found time to fasten his seat belt," Mattingly said referring to the fact that the Woodville officers' car spun out of control in the grass and wrecked at the roadblock which had been set up just across the Jasper County line by two Department of

Public Safety vehicles.

Police reports indicate that the lead car approached slowly, then as a DPS officer came toward the car it raced through the road block. Officers were successful in shooting out one of the cars tires. Officers reported that the car then traveled several miles further on the wheel rims finally crashing into a culvert at the edge of the woods and temporarily out of sight. Then the trio vanished into the woods on the south side of the road.

Chief Mattingly called in a special bloodhound search unit from the Huntsville Department of Corrections which sent two dogs and two men to search for horseback.

The search team arrived about 3 a.m. on Monday morning.

The dogs were set on the trail of suspect Harold Ando Garcia, 17, of Moun-

tainview Missouri, who was apprehended at 4:30 a.m. in an open field after he had looped back across Hwy. 190 and was found perched atop a round hay bale. Garcia surrendered with a gunny holster at his side. He later apparently told police he had thrown the .22 cal snub nose revolver away before he was caught.

The two remaining suspects: William Randall Carney, 18, of Verona Missouri, and a girl, 15, who is said to have been his girlfriend and also of Verona, were found squatting in the woods. Parks and Wildlife officers Huey Hancock of Tyler County and Billy Platt of Jasper County discovered the pair's barefoot trail and then called in the bloodhounds. They were found 30 minutes later, Mattingly said.

## Hot Air Balloons, Crafts To Accent Fair

Don't be surprised on the second weekend in September if a run-a-way hot air balloon from the Tyler County Fair lands in your backyard or your pasture following its takeoff from

the Tyler County Airport which will be the scene of this first annual event as sponsored by the Tyler County Fair Committee.

Hot air balloons are only one of the many attractions

which will be offered at the first community, county-wide old-fashioned fair for the family which actually starts on the Friday night before with a carnival offering a variety of rides and attractions for the kids.

Youth livestock judging and home-sastry competition among Tyler County's best "home" economists will spice up the three-day activity, as will other events designed to provide continuing mouth-watering and eye-appealing entertainment for the entire family. Arts and crafts competition, a mud pit tug-of-war between the Tyler County Commissioners and the Woodville City Council along with a sparkling 4-H dress revue are a few more of the events scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 10-11.

According to Carl Nichols, president of the Fair Committee, committee persons are actively putting together "the best and biggest show the county has ever seen." And, he said, "it's the first County fair held in Tyler County for several decades, at least since World War II."

Probably the most exciting of the events to take place will be the free flight ballooning exercise performed by Houstonian Tom W. "Crash" Heywood and his wife Jennifer, who is also a bonafide balloon pilot.

Heywood, who is a banker for the Republic of Texas Savings and Loan Association intends to bring his whole family to Tyler County, along with several other companion balloonists who will also put on free flight demonstrations. Persons will be able to ascend in the balloon," Heywood says, "tethered, and as the weather allows, Early morning and late evening free flights will also draw curious people from miles around to the fairgrounds which will be located between the airport runway and the Tyler County 4-H and FFA Rodeo Arena."

According to Heywood the "envelope" of the balloon is made of nylon and holds up a basket in which up to four persons can ride. Propane fuels the

burner which keeps the hot air conveyance aloft. "Add more heat and the higher it goes," he said.

Heywood said a popular sport among balloonists is the game of "Hare and Hound." In that sport, he said, a first balloon rises a short distance then descends and takes off again. Object of the game is for the second "chase" balloon to land exactly on the spot where the first balloon touched down.

Heywood said he would provide two balloons and two commercial balloon pilots and chase vehicles to catch the balloons "if they blow away." The balloon pilot guides the direction of the aircraft by utilizing the upper and lower air currents, "but sometimes you can get blown off course."

Heywood, who himself is an accomplished pilot will take persons aloft in his 2-seat sailplane which becomes airborne when pulled by a tow plane.

### Bentsen Here

The Honorable United States Senator Lloyd Bentsen is scheduled to be in Woodville at 5 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 18 to participate in a "coffee and social question and answer" period in the Community Room of the Citizens State Bank.

According to County Judge Allen Sturrock, in charge of arrangements for the visit, "Senator Bentsen just wants to hear from the people of Tyler County."

Cookies and coffee will be provided for guests and the public is invited to attend Judge Sturrock said.


Both the sailplane and the balloons promise exciting aerial show which will delight the curiosity of those who haven't seen either.

### S & L To Open Hardin Office

Officers and directors of the Southeast Texas Savings and Loan office in Woodville have announced plans to locate a branch office in Kountze in Hardin County.

The announcement was made by Savings and Loan Vice President Dick Davis who said that the applications for the branch office made to the state agency

was approved on Aug. 10. Davis said that the new facility will open in mid 1977 and is to be located on a six-acre tract facing Highway 69 just south of the Peoples State Bank in Kountze on the east side.

Davis indicated that the Savings and Loan organization had applied for an application on April 6 and then a public hearing was held at a Texas State Savings

and Loan Commission in Austin on June 28.

Davis also pointed out that improvements to the Woodville office will also be forthcoming with remodeling plans and the implementation soon, he said, of an on-line computer operation which will benefit the customer services for both the Hardin County and Woodville offices.

### Here Come De' Judge

Newly appointed County Judge Allen Sturrock summed up his first day in office as being "real interesting."

Within 30 minutes of being sworn in last Wednesday morning, he was in the midst of a board of equalization meeting, a duty which he says is "not always pleasant."

But he reports that there was little trouble and by Monday morning, appeared to be comfortable with his new office.

He says his family is adjusting to the change, too, although there was disappointment in the ranks at not being able to go to the county clerk's convention in Galveston. The Judge, reacting to a crisis as a judge should, said that he would probably go for one day anyway to visit his friends.

Judge Sturrock performed his first marriage ceremony for a Nacogdoches couple last Wednesday, only hours after taking office.

"I was really nervous, but then they were even more nervous than I," he reports. "Everything went fine, but the bride had to add the 'and now you may kiss'."

The main job ahead appears to be healing the wounds that have divided county officials in the past. Judge Sturrock has emphasized in his first week the need for all the people of the county to work together, and asked that if they disagree, to do it in an agreeable manner.

"I'm a team player," says Sturrock. "I played basketball when I was at Colmesneil High School, but had decided to quit. But Superintendent Lee A. Taylor and Coach J.M. O'Bannon talked me out of it."

"I came back, but I was never high point man. We played as a team, not as individuals, and we were state contenders," too, said the Judge. "C.J. Ferguson, Alton Estenberry, Ralph Davis, Clayton Fowler, Travis Sturrock, Bill Sturrock and Jack and Julius McMullin were all on that team," he added.

The Judge gives credit to O'Bannon and Taylor for helping give him the team spirit which he now hopes to give to the county.

"As he says, 'I can't do it, but we can.'"

**Deer Quality Down**

By BUDDY GOUGH Southeast Texas has long had the reputation as an area which produces quality deer. Each year, our river bottoms produce some fine old trophy bucks which compare favorably with the biggest deer taken anywhere in the state.

But there are indications the trophy bucks may be getting scarcer in our area. In fact, there is evidence the quality of our deer is declining in certain areas of Southeast Texas, according to a report prepared by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife biologist Gary Spencer in Sissbee. For example, over the past four deer seasons the average weight of bucks harvested in Southeast Texas has declined from an average of 118 pounds to 83.61 pounds. The rather sharp decline in the average weight of bucks taken by hunters is due partly to the poor quality of deer taken in Walker and Hardin Counties where bucks killed last season averaged 75.41 and 70.69 pounds respectively. By way of comparison, the average buck taken in Liberty County weighed 96.20 pounds. The poor quality of deer in Walker and Hardin Counties was emphasized by the numbers of spike bucks in the deer population. Last year, in Walker County all 18-month-old bucks examined were spikes and in Hardin County some 87 percent of the young bucks were spikes. Overall, the statistics show fewer one-and-a-half year old bucks and more three-and-a-half year old bucks are being killed each year. This is probably due to the poor quality of the young deer and the fact that many counties do not harvest spike bucks, Spencer notes. For example, back in 1972 younger bucks made up 38.84 percent of the harvest while last year they accounted for only 25 percent of the harvest. In the reverse, three-and-a-half year old bucks made up 18.18 percent of the harvest in 1972 and 33.21 percent of the kill last season.

## Deer Quality Down

According to the data, while the quality of deer has declined the overall population of deer has increased gradually in Southeast Texas from 25.25 deer per 1000 acres in 1971 to 31.58 deer per 1000 acres in 1975.

The deer density is not that high when our area is taken as a whole, but it does not reflect scattered areas where the deer population is very high, as high as 67.57 deer per 1000 acres.

"It is in these areas of high concentration where the harvest is also generally high that a decline in quality would be most evident."



## Deer Quality Down

By BUDDY GOUGH Southeast Texas has long had a reputation as an area which produces quality deer. Each year our river bottoms produce some fine old trophy bucks which compare favorably with the biggest deer taken anywhere in the state. But there are indications the trophy bucks may be getting scarcer in our area. In fact, there is evidence the quality of our deer is declining in certain areas of Southeast Texas, according to a report prepared by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife biologist Gary Spencer in Silsbee. For example, over the past four deer seasons the average weight of bucks harvested in Southeast Texas has declined from an average of 118 pounds to 83.6 pounds. The rather sharp decline in the average weight of bucks taken by hunters is due partly to the poor quality of deer taken in Walker and Hardin Counties where bucks killed last season averaged 75.41 and 70.69 pounds respectively. By way of comparison, the average buck taken in Liberty County weighed 96.20 pounds. The poor quality of deer in Walker and Hardin Counties was emphasized by the numbers of spike bucks in the deer population. Last year, in Walker County all 18-month-old bucks examined were spikes and in Hardin County some 87 percent of the young bucks were spikes. Overall, the statistics show fewer one-and-a-half year old bucks and more three-and-a-half year old bucks are being killed each year. This is probably due to the poor quality of the young deer and the fact that many counties do not harvest spike bucks, Spencer notes. For example, back in 1974 84 percent of the harvest were for only 25 percent of the harvest. In the reverse, three-and-a-half year old bucks made up 16.18 percent of the harvest in 1972 and 32.21 percent of the kill last season.



## Spurger Budget Set

SPURGER—The Spurger Independent School District board of trustees voted unanimously Friday to accept a budget of \$321,401 for the coming year.

The board also agreed at the regular meeting to leave the tax rate at \$1.85, according to Superintendent A.B. Crank. He added that tax revenues to the district would be higher anyway because of increased values within the district.

Also, its assessed rate of taxation was raised from 60 to 65 percent. This increase came due to a \$16,000 increase in the district's local fund assignment, according to Crank. An increase in local fund assignments means a decrease in state funds to the district, he explained.

The board also approved the payment of approximately \$10,000 for a new bus, Crank said that this was the first time the district had been able to pay for a bus without assistance from other funds.

Resignations of one board member and two teachers were accepted during the meeting. Those resignations accepted were by board member Clyde David Hicks, English teacher, and Vicki Bonds and elementary teacher Brenda Woods, Hicks resigned because he was moving out of the school district, said Crank.

At the same time, the board approved two teachers to replace those resigning: Harry German was hired to teach English, and Paula Arrington to teach in the elementary school.

The next meeting of the board will be Friday, Sept. 10.

## Tax Rebates Mailed

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed out checks totaling \$18.5 million to 659 cities and towns Friday as their August rebate of the one-cent city sales tax they collect.

Woodville was sent a check for \$4,473.86 and Colmesnell a check for \$717.46, according to the comptroller's office.

Bullock also said Friday that field audits and desk examinations by his Field Operations Division during an all-time one-month high of \$18.3 million in additional revenue over the state.

## Estate Tax Changed

WASHINGTON—Senator Lloyd Bentsen said changes in the estate tax approved by the Senate, which have the effect of increasing the tax exemption to \$200,000, are a boon to the widows and children of farmers, ranchers and small businessmen in Texas.

Bentsen, a member of the Senate Finance Committee, had introduced a bill to increase the inheritance tax exemption from \$60,000 to \$200,000. The inheritance tax changes written by the Finance Committee and approved by the full Senate late Thursday night include portions of the Bentsen bill and portions of measures proposed by other Senators.

It would replace the existing estate tax exemption of some farm land at its estate tax which would gradually increase to a \$50,000 credit by 1981. This would be the equivalent of a \$200,000 exemption.

"Sixty thousand dollars is no longer a typical value for a small farm or ranch or business, as it was when

this exemption was set in 1942. We live in a far different world and I am pleased that the Senate has acted to correct this situation," Bentsen said.

According to best estimates, for example, a farmer earning only \$30,000 a year will leave an estate valued at about \$200,000. An inheritance exemption of only \$60,000 for him means his widow and his sons and daughters would have to sell the family farm just to pay the taxes, the Senator said.

The Senate-approved bill also includes a provision by Bentsen against artificially high land valuations that drive up the estate tax. It prohibits an existing Internal Revenue Service practice of assessing some farm land at its commercial rather than its agricultural value, for estate tax purposes.

"From all evidence the federal inheritance tax is helping break up the family farm, ranch and business and I am hopeful that Congress will give final approval

## Spiritually Discerned

"For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness, but unto us which are saved it is the power of God." (1 Cor. 1:18). There is in evidence here two different attitudes toward the "preaching of the cross" -- to one it was "foolishness" to others it was the "power of God." What made the difference? For the answer please finish reading 1 Corinthians 1; noting that verses 23, 24 contain the same distinction. Could the difference be in the hearers? Please read 1 Corinthians 2:1-6 where Paul says, "...we speak wisdom among them that are perfect..." The word perfect suggesting those that are mature spiritually. Here Paul continues the contrast between those who listen to the word of God and those who do not. Paul's preaching was not appreciated among the "princes of this world." (1 Cor. 2:8) Consider 1 Cor. 2:9-13. The mystery had been made known to the messengers of God. Verse 9 speaks of those things not known by men; but verse 10 tells us they were revealed to "us" by "His Spirit". Who is the "us"? Careful now!

Verse twelve says: "Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the spirit which is of God; that we might know the things that are freely given to us of God." Who are the "we" and "us"?

A clue in verse 13: "Which things also we speak, not in the words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Ghost teacheth; comparing spiritual things with spiritual." The "we" and "us" were the inspired apostles and prophets of the first century. Inspired speakers if you please.

Now we come to the hearers. Verse 14 says, "...the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit..." Why? They are foolishness to him (1 Cor. 1:18). Why did he not appreciate them? "...They are spiritually discerned." Paul says, that some will think the gospel foolishness, others will be spiritually minded and receive it.

What Paul does not say is this: YOU HAVE TO HAVE THE HOLY SPIRIT IN YOU TO UNDERSTAND THE WORD OF GOD! For if you did how could a person professing to have the Holy Spirit expect one without the Holy Spirit to understand even this verse?
