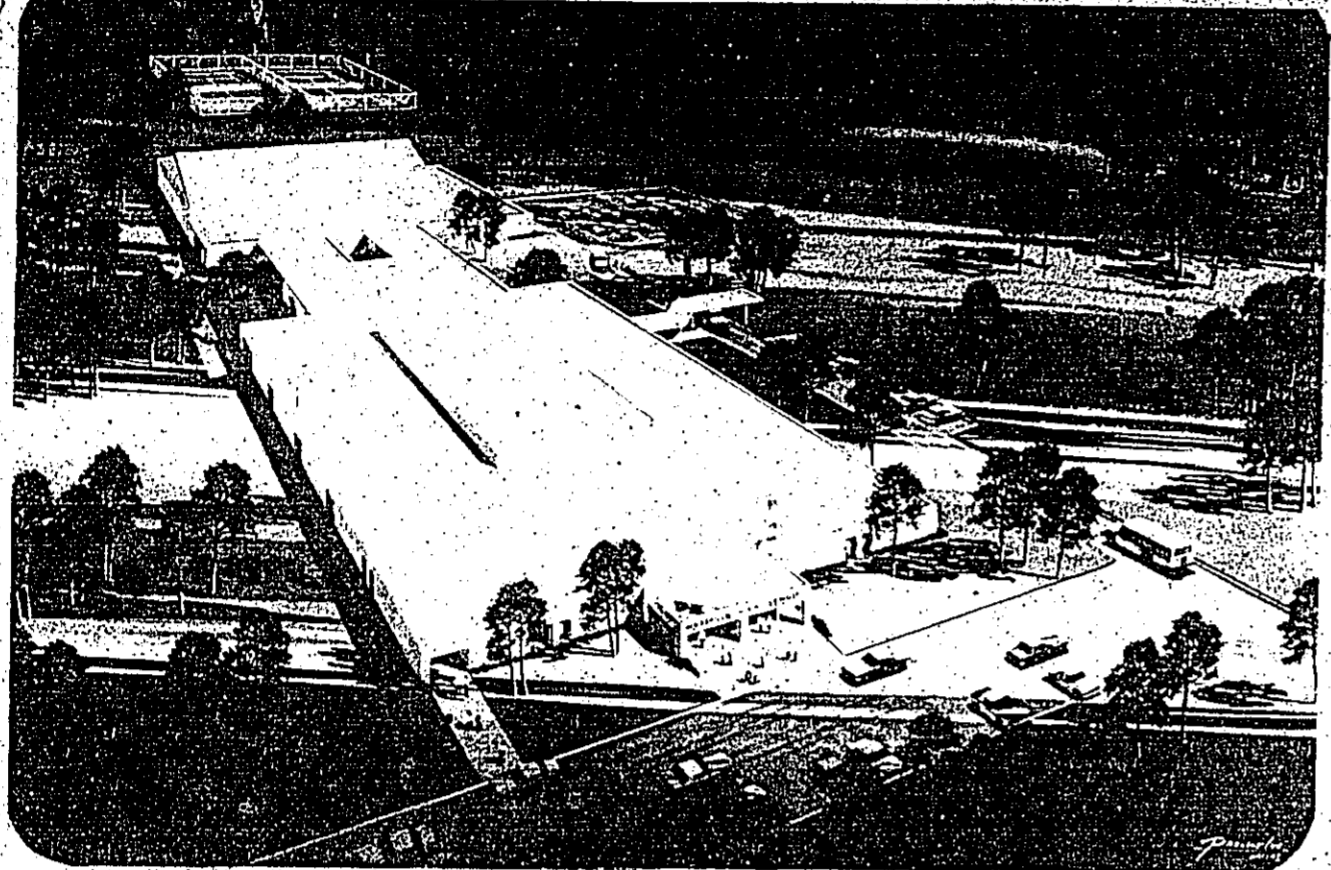

Proposed New High School Visual Effect
**New High School Said
'Necessity-Not Luxury'**

ARTICLE IV
Choosing to build a new high school on a new site to provide for the educational needs of 600 students is the result of several years of planning by the school board and administration. The board and administration, with the aid of a citizens committee of 35 and financial advisors, have sought to determine the best route to take to get the most for the dollar and cut costs to the bare minimum without sacrificing what is needed to provide quality education. Much time and thought have been given to deciding upon the best plan for improving Woodville's schools.

Choosing a plan to follow has been complicated since both the Kirby High main building and the primary kindergarten through second grade buildings are no longer considered usable as classroom space.

Further complications arise from the fact that all of the schools are short on classroom space. According to the school administration Woodville schools cannot add new courses and facilities because there is no room in which to put them. The district does not have as many

teachers as it qualifies for because there are no vacant classrooms. There is almost no storage area for janitors and the maintenance program in any of the Woodville schools.

Of special significance among the difficulties Kirby High faces is the fact that the school does not meet state accreditation standards in three areas.

The first area in which the high school is not up to state standards is in its science department. The science laboratories are too small and do not have adequate special equipment and fixtures because of the poor plumbing and lack of space.

The home economics department has only two rooms, one for sewing and one for cooking. There is no space for much needed equipment. The two existing rooms cannot accommodate the double number of students they were meant to handle. These conditions make this the second area which does not meet state accreditation standards in Kirby High School.

The third area in which the high school is substandard, according to the state of Texas, is in physical education facilities. The gym is an old structure built for 200 students when Woodville was a Class B school. It now serves 500 students. The girls spend nearly half their class time being transferred across town to use the old gym at the primary school because there is no space for them in the gym on the Kirby High campus. Transporting these students is time consuming and expensive. Considering the fact that the gym was built to accommodate 200 students rather than 500, it is not surprising that the showers, dressing rooms, and storage lockers are far from adequate. Woodville is never host to any inter-scholastic league sports tournaments which take place in a gym because the playing court is not the minimum size that the NCAA or High School Inter-scholastic League recommends. There is no room to make it larger.

School officials are especially concerned about these substandard conditions since Woodville schools have been informed that they will be visited by a state accreditation inspection team in the 1978-79 school year.

The school board investigated the possibilities of repairing the main Kirby High building which is about 49 years old. Two building consultants, one from Lufkin and one from Houston, advised against trying to remodel because of the poor foundation and construction in the building. The plaster which overlays wood lathes is in bad condition. There are cracks in the wall which cannot be

Must Have 'Blue' Card**

Voters must be registered 30 days prior to an election to be eligible to vote. School officials and board members are reminding citizens in the school district that August 28 is the deadline for registering to vote in the school bond election September 28.

Residents of the school district may register by going by the County Tax Assessor and Collectors Office, the small building on the courthouse grounds. If you are eighteen or older, the only requirement is that you live in the school district. Property owners and non-property owners may vote in this election.

repaired. The building needs a new roof. The foundation is not a slab and it is difficult to keep termites out. Many of the window frames are rotten. The restrooms, which are too small for the number of students who use them, are old and their plumbing is corroded. The board was advised that it would cost more to repair the building than it is worth.

Having investigated all the building possibilities and having considered the building needs in the primary school and the high school, the lack of space in all of the Woodville schools, and the almost unbearable discomfort of children and teachers alike in the longer summer term, the board feels that the program the bonds will support is at the best that could be devised to improve the schools and at the same time fit the financial structure of the school district.

If the bonds pass, the new high school will be constructed on a 40 acre site presently owned by Mr. Robert Sutton. The school board has an option to buy the land located on the western side of Woodville for \$500 an acre, with a second option to buy an additional 10 acres. It also has signed agreements from other land holders, for access to the new school providing the bonds pass before January 1977. The Sutton land has been examined by school architects and declared to be a very desirable building site.

The passage of the bonds will provide for constructing and equipping a senior high school to accommodate 600 students (expandable for growth). It will have full environmental air conditioning. Included will be adequate academic classrooms, special areas for music, homemaking, science, and vocational subjects, a gymnasium (divided for boys and girls), a cafeteria dining area, and a multi-media library resource center. The high school will use the present football stadium.

In the view of school administrators and board members the new high school structure will provide adequately for the educational requirements of our high school students and will be something Woodville can be proud of, but there will be no money wasted on non-essentials.

Fiery Crash Fatal

HILLISTER—A fiery one-vehicle accident late Saturday night cost the life of a Woodville man, while a passenger in the vehicle escaped with only leg injuries after apparent rescue attempts, authorities said.

Pronounced dead at the scene, one mile east of Hillister on FM 1013, was James Daniel Barr, 46.

The wreck brought the total number of accidents investigated to three in three days in the county. Tyler County Department of Public Safety personnel responded to a two-car head on collision on Hwy. 92 at 4:50 a.m. Friday, which resulted in two injuries and a D.W.I. arrest. Officers responded on Thursday to a two-car collision at about 5 a.m. also on Hwy. 92.

The pick-up truck produced the only fatality investigated by the DPS officers.

DPS accounts of the fatal accident indicate that the truck was travelling east at about 9:30 p.m. and after topping a hill, swerved left, hit a culvert, knocked down a reflector post and came back across the road crashing approximately 40 feet into a thickly wooded area. The truck then burst into flames. Units from the Woodville Fire Department responded to extinguish the blaze.

Peace Justice Roy C. Black of Spurger made the death pronouncement while volunteer workers worked for some time to free the victim's body from the truck.

Jail Ideas Heard

WOODVILLE—City and county officials met last Wednesday afternoon with representatives from the architectural firms contracted to do the Phase I planning for a new city-county jail facility.

During the session, the local officials answered questions and offered suggestions for the new jail. The information gathered at this meeting and others to come will be used to complete the study, according to Michael H. Frawley, a representative of Pringle and Patrick Architects, Planners from Columbus, Ohio.

Also representing the planners at the meeting were Sam S. Bates, director of the Dallas office of Pringle and Patrick, and Don Cole, architect from A-E Management Service, Inc., of Woodville.

Representing the city of Woodville were Mayor Terry Watts, City Manager Walt Davis and Police Chief Gary

Matingly. Sheriff Louis Craven, Deputy Sheriff Billy Cowart and County Judge Allen Sturrock represented Tyler County.

The Phase I study, approved by the county last March, consists primarily of data collection, according to Frawley. Statistics on past history, combined with population projections from the Deep East Texas Council of Governments, are put into a computer "model" by the planners, he added.

"We use data which comes out of the computer to talk intelligently with the sheriff, chief of police and other persons involved," said Frawley.

Judge Sturrock said that the projections on population would include up to the year 2000.

Bates remained in town after the meeting to confer further with local officials. Later, the planners will return with a corrections specialist to discuss use of the jail and possible bail bonding programs to keep the jail from being overcrowded, explained Frawley.

And every day the four faces of the big clock were either five hours slow or nineteen hours fast, depending on how one looked at it.

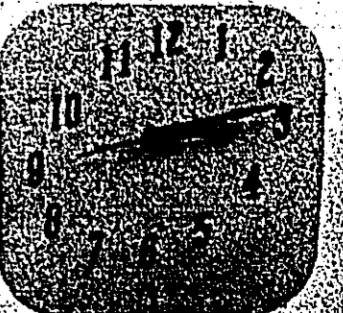

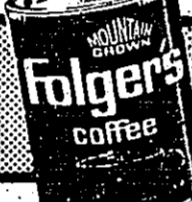
