Guest Editorial
Thicket entities due federal help

The House now has passed legislation aimed at helping counties and school districts compensate at least partially for tax income lost because Washington assumed control of lands and thereby removed them from the tax rolls. The measure not only would help counties within the boundaries of the Big Thicket preserve, it also would be a boon to deep East Texas counties which contain national forest acreage and the Army Corps of Engineers Sam Rayburn Reservoir.

The counties which lie in the national forests receive federal payments now, but the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee's environmental subcommittee said such payments do not compensate local governments adequately for the financial burden of federal lands.

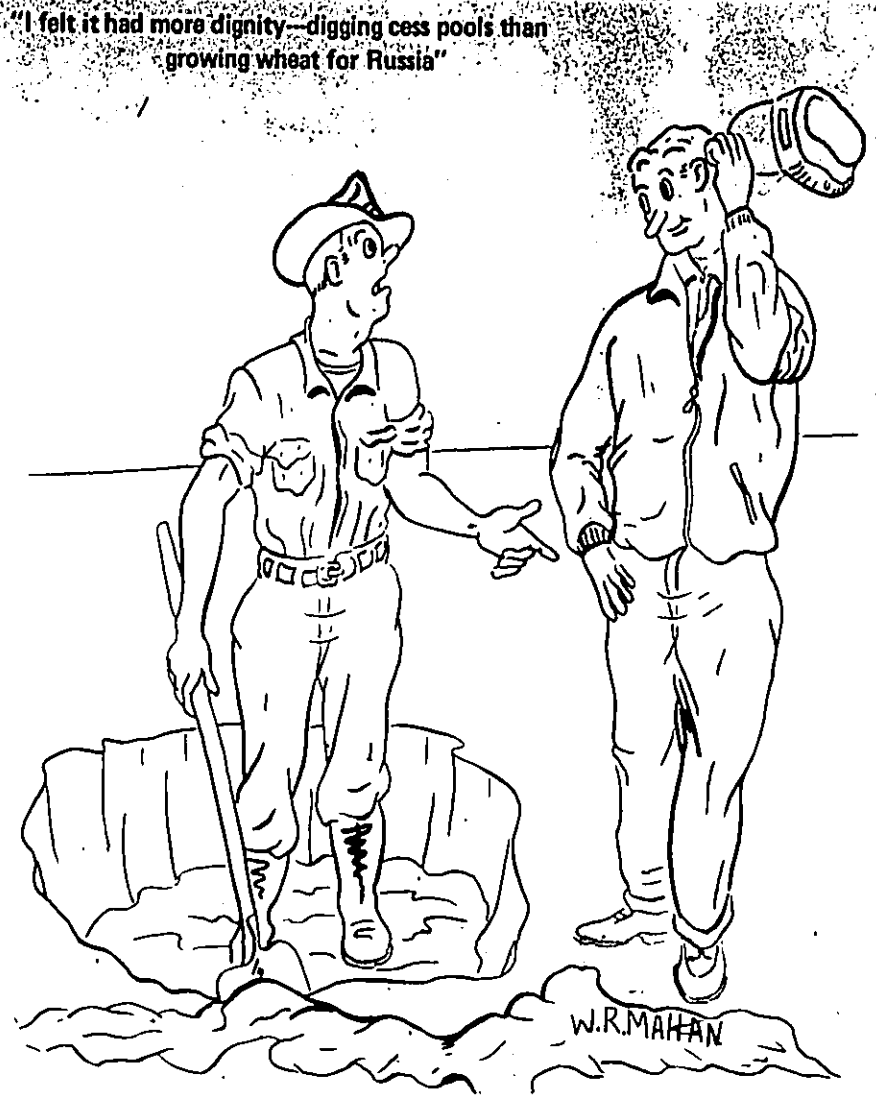
The annual payments would be computed according to a formula based on population, federal land acreage and the amount already received by the county from other federal payments such as timber receipts. No county could get more than \$1 million a year.

A second major provision would benefit the Big Thicket counties in particular. Aimed at cushioning the short-term economic impact of a federal land acquisition, it provides that counties with lands acquired by the national park system since 1970 would be eligible for five annual payments, each equal to 1 per cent of the land's fair market value.

The interior committee estimated the payments would cost the federal government \$25 million a year, but would have virtually no inflationary impact because they would be distributed so widely throughout the economy.

Although the legislation cleared the House by a whopping 276-125 vote (with Rep. Charles Wilson of Lufkin enthusiastically voting yes and Rep. Jack Brooks of Beaumont voting no), the measure's future remains clouded.

The Senate leadership has banned further hearings on new legislation this year, but Senate sponsors of the measure — encouraged by the House action — are hoping for an exception.

The handbook is available for reference use at all local TEC offices as one of our many services to the public," said TEC Chairman Harold K. Dudley.

MARLON BRANDO, Jack Nicholson Violent In 'The Missouri Breaks'

Motion picture history has been studded with famous pairings in the past — Tracy and Hepburn, Gable and Harlow, Bogart and Bacall, Burton and Taylor, Newman and Redford. But it is doubtful if any can surpass the brilliant, Academy Award-winning league of Marlon Brando and Jack Nicholson, the former with two Oscars and seven nominations to his credit, the latter with one Academy Award and five nominations in the past seven years.

They are teamed, for the first time, in "The Missouri Breaks," an Elliott Kastner presentation of an Arthur Penn Film, produced by Kastner and Robert M. Sherman and written by Thomas McGuane. The Robert M. Sherman Productions is released by United Artists, a Transamerica Company.

The story of "The Missouri Breaks" could have and probably did take place many times in the late 1800's. It's the story of tough, violent men in a hard land without any law. Brando portrays Lee Clayton, a legislator, a deadly professional gunman.

The inevitable has to come to pass — the showdown between Clayton and Logan.

FOREST SERVICE HAS CRITICS, DEFENDERS IN CUTTING BAN

WHAT IS THE REAL RESULT OF CLEARCUTTING?

The sign along the highway says "Thanks for protecting our forests," as shown in lower right photo. But does the U.S. Forest Service protect forests through clearcutting, as is shown in the left photo? John M. Walker of Ratcliff says "No," but John Courtney.

Walker accuses the forest service of hiding the clearcuts so people won't be so aware there are so many of them, of closing roads to clearcuts so people can't get down to see that they are there, of not leaving proper preparations of game trees for wildlife, of spreading clearcuts over the county so they can't be so noticeable, and of often not replanting trees in clear cut areas.

"There was a time when the national forests had several purposes," he said, "such as providing places for wildlife, for hunting and fishing and so forth. But now they've just turned it into nothing but timber farming."

But Courtney says more is being done now for the preservation and wildlife than ever before.

As a matter of fact, he says, that is why the clearcuts have been spread out over wide sections of the national forests, and not because they are trying to hide them from the public.

Hunting Fever

About a million Texans begin this same time each year being peculiarly stressed in a similar way about the same thing. Though not actually an illness, it is recognized by some as hunt fever, resulting from stress and over prospects for the pending fall hunting season.

What has happened to my lease since I was there last winter, what are this year's open seasons and bag limits, and where can I get my new hunting license? Being treated to encouraging answers to these common questions can bring happy relief to some of the worst cases of pre-hunt fever.

It's actually too early to tell just what the game population will be on your lease at the time the season opens. But you can get enough info to be tentatively satisfied if you go to the right places.

In general, over most of the state, the late winter through mid-spring temperatures and related benefits of survival of brood stocks and killed the breeding seasons off in some degree of high excellence.

In July, though, began what used to be normal, an abrupt reduction in rainfall which has continued severely into August. This tends to put much stress on the habitat. Late season rainfalls by such as cool, pleasant, and does come to a halt. The insect supply, a required pre-hunt food item for young game birds, dries up.

Grazing and browsing animals like deer and antelope begin to get in trouble with two or three weeks of continuous drought. Without rainfall to keep the soil mineral supply circulating in the plants, leaves and stems become those loaded down with suckling young, begin to lose ground. If the drought continues for 10 days, some adults and a large portion of the young will die from poor nutrition, accelerated by internal and external parasites.

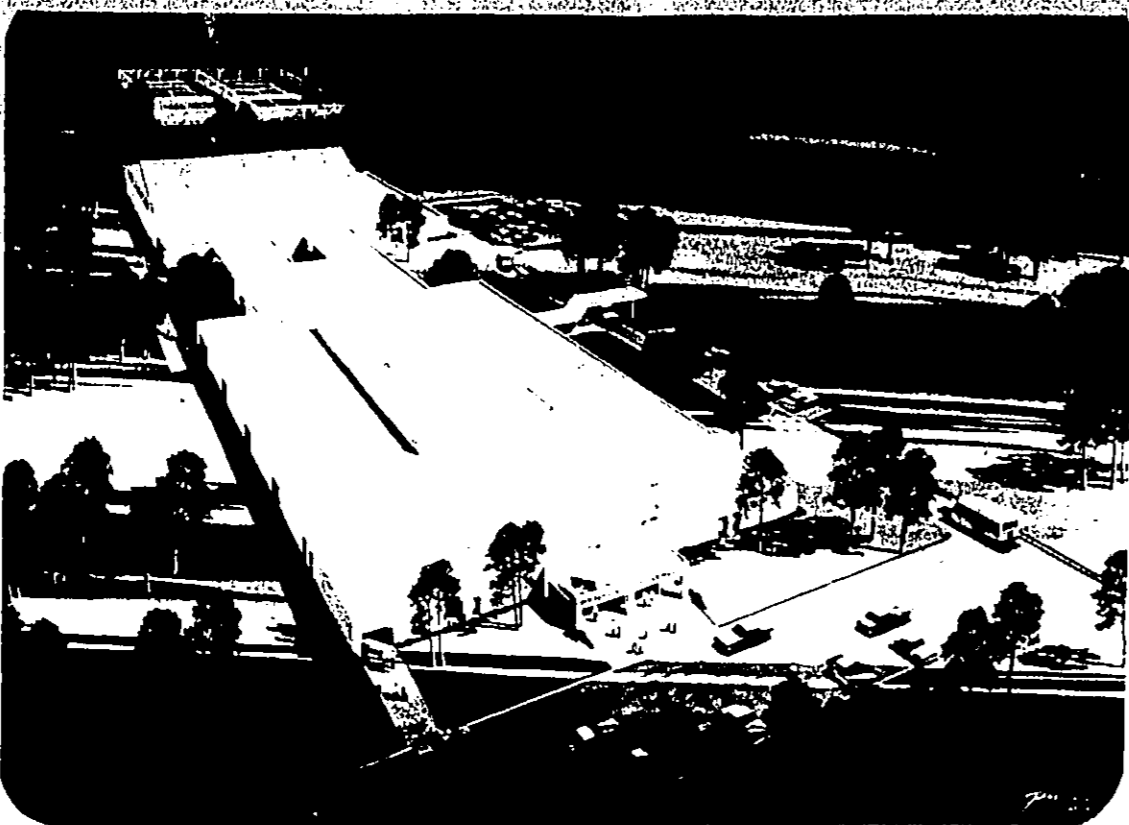
The best way to get a complete picture of habitat and population condition in your county would be to contact any Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife biologist who lives there. However, his assignment is widespread and he is hard to catch. It's worth a try.

Next, call your game warden. He has many other jobs but he also happens to be generally in his assigned county. To get his name and number contact any P&W office. If you don't have an office close around, he can be located after the information operator. The county sheriff's office can be of help.

The Guide to Texas Hunting and Fishing Regulations has been available for several weeks at all P&W offices and at local business firms that sell hunting and fishing licenses. Pick one up and you will find a summary of wildlife game regulations listed by county, with information prescribing general hunt activity in the forecast.

Grand Jury Ends Probe With Perjury Indictment

WOODVILLE—A Jasper man was indicted Thursday for aggravated perjury as the five-member Tyler County grand jury brought its probe of county governmental spending and use of funds to a close.

Jurors met for about 10 minutes before returning an indictment against Graham Bennett, equipment salesman, allegedly perjured himself during testimony before the grand jury during its eight-month investigation.

The arrest warrant will probably be issued today by the district clerk.

According to the Tyler (Woodville) aggravated perjury is committed when a person makes a false statement in connection with an official proceeding.

The offense is a third degree felony, punishable by a term in the penitentiary for less than two years nor more than 10 years. A person convicted of this crime may also face a fine of up to \$5,000.

Not dismissing the jury, 8th Dist. Judge Clyde Earl Smith accepted the indictment and commended the jurors for their work.

The court's action Thursday ended an eight-month probe by 11 men and one woman who heard testimony from nearly 50 witnesses within the county. Many of those called were county officials questioned in connection with alleged kick-backs and payoffs within the county structure.

The attorney general's office entered the probe in late spring by sending assistants Herbert Hancock and Ler (Lurch) to aid County Atty. Jim Allison in the questioning of witnesses.

With the dismissal of this jury, the county now has one active grand jury which will meet Aug. 27.

New Hunting Innovations Approved

ASTIN—Hunting of wild deer and use of muzzle-loading weapons at state wildlife management areas are two innovations for this coming hunting season.

Harvest of wild and deer at the Kerr Area in Kerr County and use of muzzle-loading weapons in deer and quail hunting at the Chaparral Area in Dimmit and LaSalle Counties were approved by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

These management areas, which encompass thousands of acres, serve the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and deer laboratories in wildlife management research on a variety of game species.

There are 10 such facilities scattered around Texas from the Panhandle to the Rio Grande Valley and from the Trans-Pecos to the pine woods of deep East Texas.

The Kerr Area even deer hunt will mark the first time such species will be hunted on a state-owned area. Exotics will be hunted along with a number of white-tailed deer that have been determined as being surplus to the population.

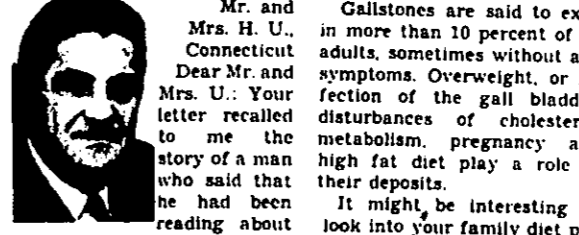
Wildlife biologists currently are studying the relationship between white-tailed and in stock certain pastures. P&W bug game program director Charles Winkler said exotics at Kerr have increased to the point where they are interfering with the white-tailed cattle study in these pastures.

The public firearms hunt at Kerr runs Nov. 13 through Jan. 2, but may be stopped sooner if the prescribed quota has been harvested. Hunters with muzzle-loading rifles will have their chance to bag a deer or quail at the Chaparral this year.

MY HUSBAND and I are second cousins. Our two children are healthy. Within the past two years I developed stones in my kidney and my husband developed stones in his gall bladder.

It might be interesting to look into your family diet pattern as a responsible reason for the formation of stones. Rather than speculate on a hereditary or cousin relationship, you both should have complete medical surveys to find the exact reason for the family quandary.

I reacted similarly to the way you obviously avoided medical examinations and eventually decided that it was your cousinship that caused the stones.

Many people living under the same conditions eating similar foods react differently in health and disease. There are many factors that account for the formation of stones in the gall bladder and in the kidneys. So many of these factors are present that you can be certain that your distant blood ties play no role in the formation of stones.

Kidney stones are attributed to infection, diet, drugs, pool, the acidity of the urine and to many other reasons. Excess vitamins and disturbances of the parathyroid glands are additional reasons. Besides those included in the vast category of "unknown."

Gallstones are said to exist in more than 10 percent of all adults, sometimes without any symptoms. Overweight, or infection of the gall bladder, disturbances of cholesterol, metabolism, pregnancy and high fat diet play a role in their deposits.

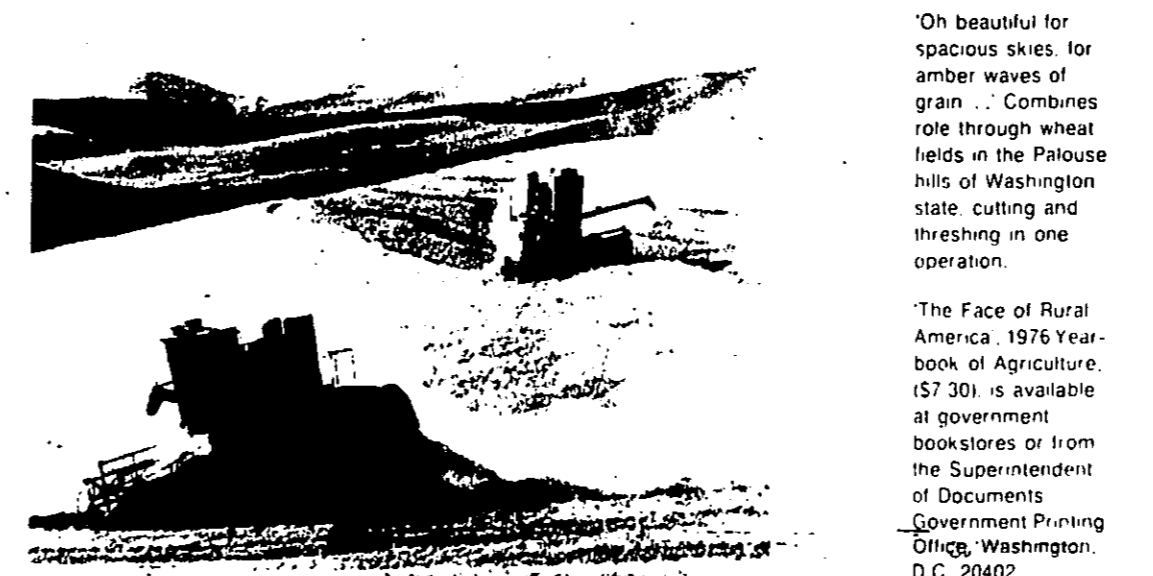

"Puckered" fabrics are replacing gauzes and crinkles for that all-important surface interest," she added.

Mrs. Culp is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System. She said that puckered fabrics include seersucker and plisse. While the pucker in seersucker is permanently woven or knitted into the fabric, puckers in plisse are created by applying heat and chemicals. Some plisses may "de-pucker" if ironed, she noted.

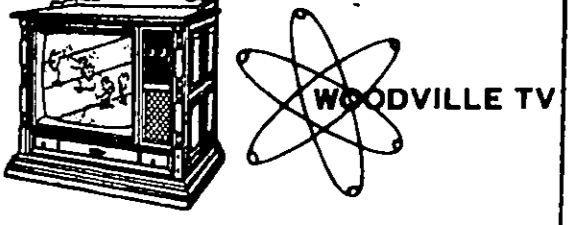
