Budget Hearing Set For Oct. 18

WOODVILLE--The Tyler County Commissioners Court has scheduled the public hearing for the 1977 county budget for 10 a.m. Monday, Oct. 18. The date was agreed upon by the court during its special business session Monday morning.

County Auditor's Assistant Ann Fondren told the court that a copy of the proposed budget, estimated at \$1,051,617, would be on file for the public to study before the hearing.

Business was fairly light at Monday's meeting as the commissioners voted 3-0, with Commissioner Joe Best absent, to purchase a new typewriter for \$395 for Justice

of the Peace E.A. Sturrock, and also approved releasing a list of county taxpayers owning more than 10 acres to Professional Realtors of Lufkin. The list is on computer tape with Western Data Corp. and the court agreed to release the information in return for the payment of \$750 by Professional Realtors.

The court also approved a motion to investigate and begin negotiations for the possible purchase of a rock quarry near Rockland for the use of precincts 2 and 3.

A pre-application contract for a grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development was also approved by the court, pending the approval of the con-

tract by County Attorney Jim Allison.

The proposed sale of solid waste pick up equipment was postponed until further decisions have been made about the future of solid waste service in the county.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Bo Jordan submitted the idea of a county election to form a "solid waste district," much like a hospital district. The plan received some favorable comments, but it was pointed out that it could not go on the November 2 ballot.

In other action the court approved the payment of \$25 for food for a needy family.

The commissioners will meet in regular session next Monday, Oct. 11, at 10 a.m.

Conservation Directors To Attend Convention

Val Blanchette and Elmer Ray Oates, directors from the Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation District will be in McAllen October 12-14 to attend the Thirty-sixth Annual State Meeting of Texas Soil and Water Conservation District Directors.

Also attending from the Long Leaf district is T. B. Mackey, district conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

The theme of this year's

meeting is "Resource Management-Present and Future." Approximately 800 are expected to attend.

The purpose of the meeting is to review developments affecting conservation programs and to plan future conservation district programs and activities.

Dignitaries to address the group include: U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Jr.; Representative Bill Clayton, Speaker of the Texas House of Rep-

resentatives; General James M. Rose, executive director, Texas Water Development Board; David A. Wilts, attorney and general counsel, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association; Mel Davis, administrator of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D.C. and Dee Brune, president, Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Brune, who is the current president of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts, is a Sealy rancher, businessman and realtor. He was elected to his present post in 1973.

The Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts will elect two state directors and alternates during area discussion sessions on Wednesday, October 13. The Association's president and vice-president will be elected at the business session on Thursday.

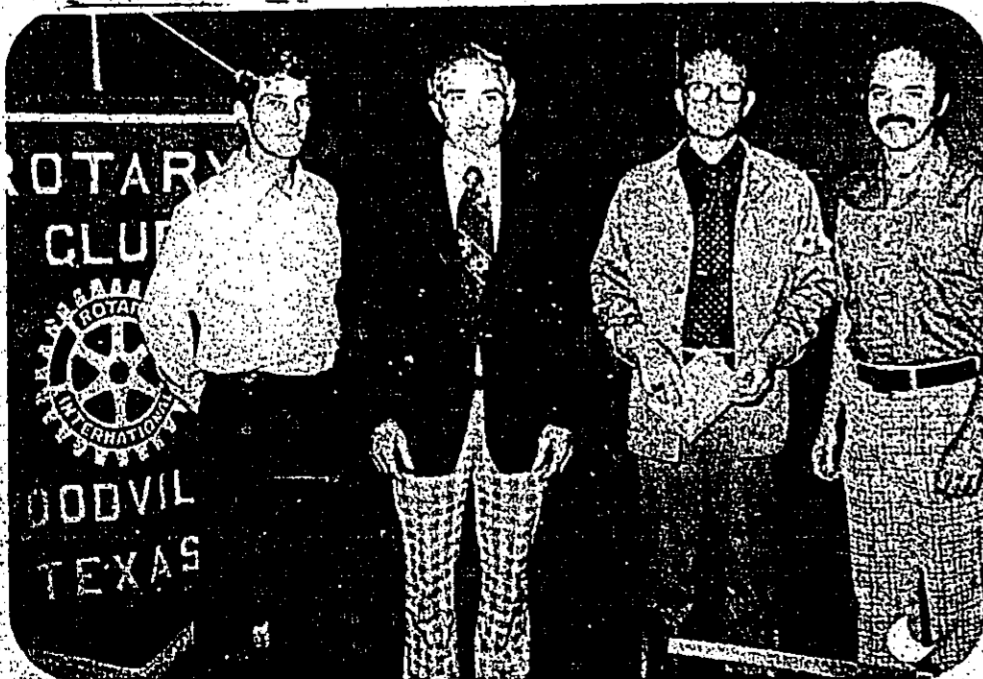
Local Girl Gives Ford A Kiss

Bullock Lauds Auditors

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock, said Tuesday his field auditors turned in a total of \$66.8 million in additional taxes owed during fiscal 1976, which ended August 31.

Bullock said the one-year field audit production was

more than three and one-half times the \$18.6 million produced by field audits during 1974, the last full year before he took office.

"I said there was gold in those hills for out-of-state auditors," said the Comptroller, "and they brought it back--at the rate of \$434,119 for each and every one of them during the fiscal year."

The total audit and collection program of the Field Operations Division yielded \$170.1 million, better than 50 percent more than the goal of

\$113 million promised to the Legislature, he said.

"There can no longer be any question about it," Bullock said. Auditors and enforcement officers in the Comptroller's Office don't cost; they pay. Just look at the figures:

--Out-of-state auditors turned up \$434,119 each in additional taxes owed, at the rate of \$80 per audit hour and returning \$17.25 for every dollar invested in them;

--In-state auditors turned up \$192,510 each in additional taxes owed, at the rate

of \$17 per audit hour and returning \$10.11 for every dollar invested;

--Enforcement officers turned up \$67,081 each by audits and collected another \$175,234 each, returning \$12.64 for every dollar invested."

Just to be fair, Bullock added, none of the figures included late charges, interest or another \$17 million in franchise tax audits that resulted from an Attorney General's ruling sought by the Comptroller's Office on gas sales to interstate pipelines.

Governor Approves Grants

AUSTIN--Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved two criminal justice grants for the Deep East Texas region.

A grant of \$25,007 goes to the Deep East Texas Council of Governments for a regional offender manpower project. Increasing employability and a job placement for offenders will be two major objectives of the project.

Also, DETCOG receives \$40,658 for purchase of police technical equipment for 19 law enforcement agencies in Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity and Tyler counties.

The local grants were

among 78 approved by Governor Briscoe statewide with Law Enforcement Assistance

Administration (LEAA) funding under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

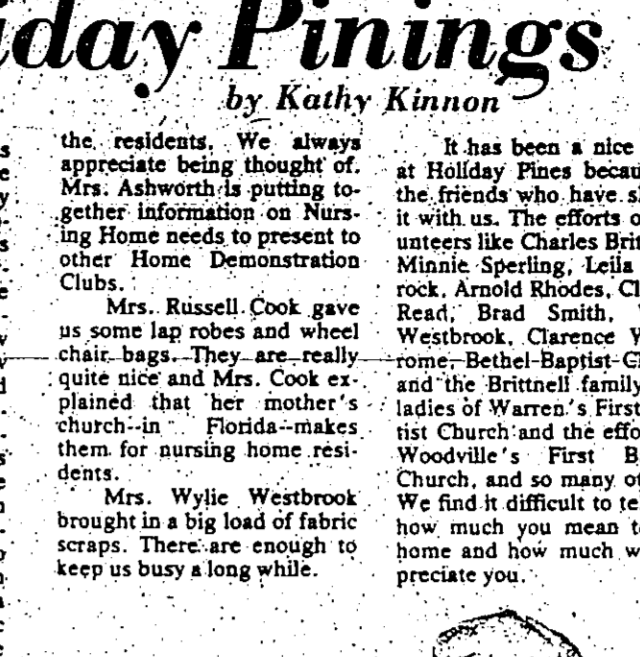

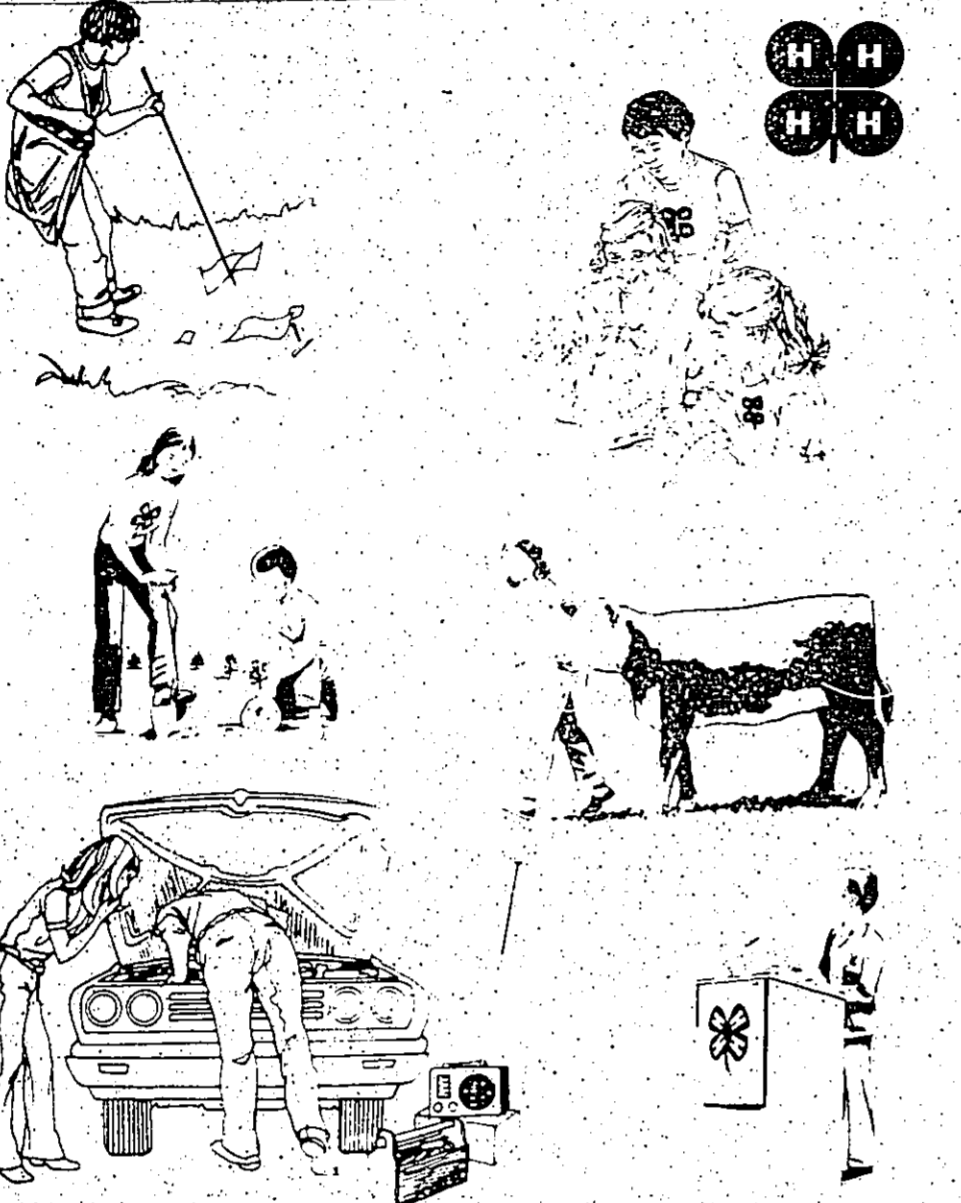
Their job can be made easier if we will take the time to inspect our homes and businesses for potential fire hazards and eliminating them, and by developing an escape plan in case of fire.

Accent On Health

Some 20 million vital records of the lives and deaths of Texans moved to their new home recently. The Bureau of Vital Statistics of the Texas Department of Health resources left its residence of 33 years, moving into a brand new 32,000-sq-ft facility alongside the Department's headquarters in north central Austin.

The new facility is part of the Department's \$6.7 million construction program, authorized by the last Legislature and now nearing completion. An eight-story office tower will add 112,000 sq-ft of workspace. Buildings also have been added to this complex.

For the Bureau of Vital Statistics, the move was the culmination of years of planning. Since at least the mid-1950s, records of Texas births, marriages, divorces, and deaths have been housed on the second floor of the old State Capitol building. The old building was designed for the Texas State Capitol and not for the storage of vital records.

At eight-story office tower will add 112,000 sq-ft of workspace. Buildings also have been added to this complex.

Obtaining a copy of the state's own birth certificate is relatively simple. Anyone who wants a copy of his own birth certificate, or that of his child, can write to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas Department of Health, Resources, 1100 West 6th Street, Austin 78756.

Bicentennial Coinage Popular

WASHINGTON, DC. Americans have history to spend, but apparently they are saving it instead. The U. S. Mint reports citizens are acquiring circulating versions of the nation's new Bicentennial coins at record rates.

The popularity of the coins is a tribute to the nation, said Mrs. May Brooks, an laborer who is Director of the Mint. "It confirms that Americans have great pride in their country and its heritage."

She championed the concept of new coinage as the most effective way to place history in the hands of all Americans.

Congress agreed. It directed minting of both circulating and non-circulating versions to provide citizens with official, meaningful commemoratives of the country's 200th birthday.

The new quarter, half dollar and dollar coins are writing history while honoring it. They were designed by the people in nationwide competition, and the first circulating coins changed to celebrate an anniversary of American Independence.

The newly designed coins "represent one of the most important coinage changes to occur since the founding of our government," Mrs. Brooks said.

The Mint reports that orders for circulating versions of the coins far exceed demand for their predecessors during comparable periods ending last year. It also announced that proof and uncirculated sets of the three coins, which contain 40 percent silver, are being ordered around the world from Austria to Japan.

Mint officials believe Americans and citizens of other nations are purchasing the special sets as "treasures for today, heirlooms for tomorrow."

To increase availability of the special coins, they are being marketed through banks and other financial institutions across the country. But they may also be purchased directly from the U.S. Mint in San Francisco.

Mint officials attribute the demand for the coins to their commemorative value and their relatively limited numbers.

Accident Information Released

Seigneur Cecil L. Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that during the month of August, in Tyler County, there was one fatal accident in which one person was killed. In addition, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 rural motor vehicle accidents in which five persons were injured.

Through August of this year, there have been 124 rural accidents in Tyler County, killing four persons and injuring 79 people.

During the same eight month period in 1975, there were 119 Rural Motor Vehicle Accidents killing seven and injuring 65 persons.

During the month of August in the 16 Counties, comprising District 29, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 481 Rural Accidents, killing nine persons and injuring 244 people.

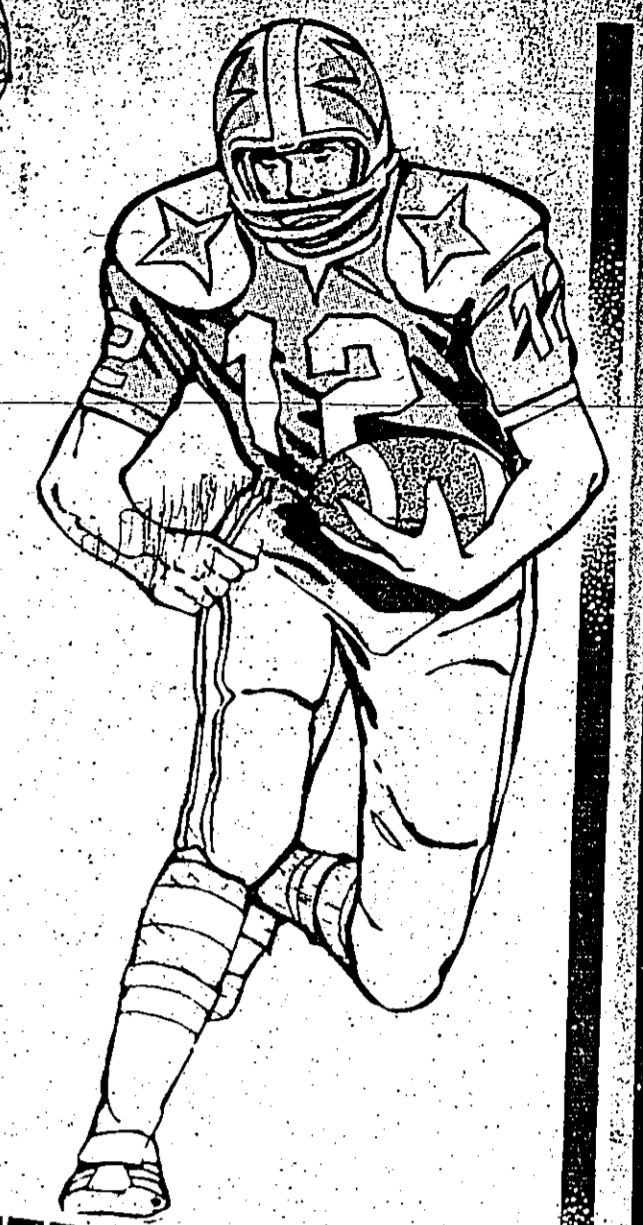

The Future Job Market - Who Will Fit In?

What will the help wanted ads be like in 1985? Which jobs will fade away out of existence and which will be good bets for steady employment?

In order to answer questions such as these for those in the process of career choosing, the Department of Labor has just published its new 1976-77 OCCUPATIONAL OUTLOOK HANDBOOK, an economic crystal ball of sorts which predicts the futures of over 850 careers from accelerator operators to zoologists. For example, the HANDBOOK forecasts rough sailing ahead for busmen and buswains, while those in health care, repair, advertising, and the business occupations will be in the fastest growing industries around.

Most job seekers will benefit from the economic stability predicted by Labor which will result in a 4% unemployment rate (full employment according to government economists). Excluding farm workers, about 81.8 million workers were on the payrolls in 1974, with an estimated 58 million job openings expected through 1985. This includes a 20% growth in the number of openings available.

CHANGING EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

Ahead though are stiffer educational requirements for most good jobs and, according to the Labor Department, those with only a high school diploma may all but be out of the competition.

In fact, the fields where greatest growth is expected are those requiring a high degree of skill. Moreover, the Bureau of Labor Statistics predicts that 80% of jobs through 1985 will require specialized vocational training, but only 20% will require college. The wider use of technology is chiefly responsible for this trend, which will accelerate in the years ahead.

MECHANICS AND REPAIRERS IN DEMAND

And, since technology needs to be installed, maintained, and repaired, the HANDBOOK has this prediction: Mechanics and repairers—the workers who keep our automobiles, airplanes, household appliances, and other machinery operating properly—make up one of the fastest growing groups of skilled workers in the Nation's labor force.

Apparently, an affluent society treasuring electric and electronic gizmos is responsible for expanding employment in this field which already keeps 1.7 million Americans busy. Some, what recession proof, mechanics and repairers tend to be in greater demand when economic downturns make it more economical to have non-working toasters, TVs, and other appliances fixed rather than replaced.

This emphasis on goods makes the knowhow to install and fix just about anything a good bet for future employment. Air conditioning and refrigeration mechanics, appliance repairers, industrial

machinery mechanics, electricians, and TV and radio servicers will all share a good growth rate.

In the office where the use of expensive equipment from copying machines to calculators is becoming routine, business machine repairers will find more work than ever, especially since this is still a relatively new field which has not reached a saturation point.

In addition, an increasing reliance on the computer in every organization from grocery stores to hospitals has already provided employment for 50,000 men and women who are specialized in keeping this sophisticated machinery running, and prospects in this growth field continue to abound.

Jobs for automobile mechanics are also expected to be plentiful over the next decade as a result of the accelerating trend to have multiple cars per family, especially as cars become stocked with more and more equipment such as anti-pollution devices and air conditioning.

BUSINESS OCCUPATIONS WILL FLOURISH

Americans are also turning increasingly into a nation of office workers, as the "post-industrial" stage of the economy takes hold. A trend toward the service-producing

industries and away from goods production). As a result, the number of jobs in the white collar trades will increase.

As mentioned previously, the increasing use of computers will create numerous opportunities for programmers, those skilled in "talking" to computers via intricate languages all their own.

While an above average growth is expected, in this field, opportunities are expected to be especially numerous in medical, educational and data processing services.

One of the most secure professions, computer programmers experienced a mere 1.7% unemployment rate in 1975 while the overall average was a whopping 8.5%.

Other office positions offering rosy futures include managers, secretaries, clerks and bookkeepers.

HEALTHY OUTLOOK FOR MEDICAL WORKERS

More calls to the family doctor and dentist—result of a heightened health consciousness, widespread employer-paid insurance programs, and a better standard of living—have already made the "health industry" the third largest in the U.S. Today the field employs about 4 million workers, but rapid growth is

expected through the mid-80's of all types of medical personnel needed to man sophisticated medical equipment, to process patients' forms and records, and to perform some of the more routine medical tasks previously carried out by doctors and nurses.

It has been estimated

that from 6 to 10 medical workers are needed for every doctor or health researcher with that proportion widening in the future. According to Labor, the opportunities for medical assistants, medical laboratory workers, medical record technicians, respiratory and physical therapists,

operating room technicians, licensed vocational nurses, and X-ray technologists are "good" to "excellent." Dental assistants, hygienists, and dental lab technicians are also expected to share this job growth trend.

Hodges Gardens In Autumn Bloom
 MANY, La.—When the first cool breezes of autumn send warm-hued leaves swirling across the Louisiana countryside, Hodges Gardens in the rolling pinelands of west central Louisiana bursts forth with a dazzling display of fall flowers and foliage.
