## Sniffen Around

### The End of the Itch?

COLMESNEIL—Joe Carter may not have a cure for poison ivy, but it is not because he didn't try.

Carter and his wife Molly, who own and operate the Colmesneil Department Store on US 69, were cleaning up some land recently when they encountered poison ivy.

"It was hard to tell who was scratchin' the worst," said Carter. "I spent one week scratching and clawing like a mangy dog."

It was only natural that Carter's customers would notice his predicament, and they began to offer advice. "You'd mention it and everyone had their own remedy," said Mrs. Carter.

And so, the Carters soon had list of almost every known cure for the itch. There were the well-known ones, like calamine lotion, as well as several patent medicines. Below is a partial list of the remedies suggested by the customers.

Milk of Magnesia (to be applied to the wound)

- Coppers and cream
- Epsom salts and alum
- Rubbing alcohol and baking soda
- Sweet cream
- Sweet milk and alum
- Aloevera juice
- Purex or cloxex water
- Brushing thoroughly and rubbing with rubbing alcohol
- Jim Wade foot medicine
- Vinegar
- Rub with ripe tomato
- Baking soda in bath

One of the most unusual cures suggested was to eat nine poison ivy berries. Carter admits he didn't try this, but says he did use a couple of the other suggestions without great success. Finally, he reported to his doctor who prescribed tablets and the wounds eventually healed.

Mrs. Carter, on the other hand reported that the Milk of Magnesia helped ease her itching.

All of this seems to point out that the best way to prevent poison ivy is to stay out of it.

## County Court Busy

WOODVILLE—In two separate special meetings last Friday and Monday, the Tyler County Commissioners conducted several items of business.

During the Friday meeting, the commissioners voted to:

- table four bids for a new front end loader for Precinct 3.

During the Monday meeting, the commissioners

accepted a proposal by Kirby Lumber Co. to remove 1500 square feet of gravel from the D.M. McComb Survey, A-44.

They also voted to buy a rock pit at Rockland for \$11,000 out of the county's revenue sharing funds.

During the Monday meeting, the commissioners

appointed Mrs. Betty Cauthen, the Rev. Henry Shetles Mrs. Morris Jackson, Mrs. Connie Clark, Mrs. Mary Nell Rainey and Mrs. Berntha Williams to the Child Welfare Board pending their acceptance of the appointments.

They also approved the payment of \$22,307 in bills as approved by the County Auditor's office.

They also approved payment of \$4,318 bill from Gulf States Utilities for relocation of the company's equipment during work on US 69 south of Warren. The state has said that it will reimburse the county for 50 percent of the bill.

They also moved to ask Moore Brothers, Inc. and Jim Peterson of the Texas Aeronautics Commission to meet with the commissioners at their Oct. 27 meeting.

Due to next Monday being Veterans' Day, there will be no commissioners meeting. The next scheduled meeting is Wednesday, Oct. 27.

## New County Budget OK'd

WOODVILLE—The Tyler County Commissioners adopted a \$1,073,795 budget for 1977 Monday afternoon after a public hearing was held to discuss the financial plan for the coming year.

The amount allocated for solid waste for 1977 is \$14,547 down from \$71,407 for 1976. County Judge Allen Sturrock told these present that the court did not intend to get the county involved in the collection of solid waste again.

Judge Sturrock explained that the court hoped to locate "type 3 dumps" throughout the county and to let the people carry their own garbage.

The main discussion of the morning part of the budget meeting centered on salaries and working expenses for justices of the peace, and an examination of several budget items by Kirby Lumber representative Alan Forsythe.

Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace Frank Grimes asked the court to raise his salary from \$770 to \$1800, the same as that of the Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace. The court took no action on Grimes' request.

County Auditor's Assistant Ann Fondren told the court that Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace E.A. Sturrock had requested a car allowance which had apparently been left off the budget by accident.

Forsythe questioned the court about several items on the budget. At one point, Department of Public Safety patrolmen Jim Deal and Jim Allen were summoned into the room to tell about the need of a secretary for their office. The patrolmen explained that the secretary's work kept them from being tied down to paper work.

District Clerk Patricia Brown and County Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Tolbert asked several questions about the raises given to elected county officials during the afternoon part of the budget hearing, but no changes were made in these.

A separate vote for the setting of salaries will be held in late December of early January, according to Judge Sturrock. At that time the salaries can be set as outlined in the budget or lowered, but it would take an amendment to the budget to increase them, said Judge Sturrock.

## Gunfire Probe On

FRED—An apparent exchange of gunfire on the Camp Branch Game Preserve last Friday night has brought the Texas Rangers into an investigation of two separate shooting incidents occurring some 45 minutes apart near the home of O.B. Grissom, president of the Southeastern Tyler County Hunt Club.

According to Texas Ranger Everett Smith of Jasper, "We'll take our investigation to the limit and with the help of the Tyler County Sheriff we ought to be able to identify the person who shot into the Grissom home late Friday."

Grissom said that 10 squirrel shot pellets were extracted from his wife as a result of the shooting from a vehicle that was in the roadway in front of the house. Grissom said the front of his home was riddled with four or five shotgun blasts.

Observers and residents close to the scene say the problem originated with hunting lease and land rights usage and call the problem a "feud" between the hunting lease land holders and the local residents "who have hunted the property for many years."

"Only recently has the problem gotten rough" one resident said.

Following the initial shooting into the Grissom home, another shot was fired a short distance away from the home involving Don Alfaro who was admitted into St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont with shotgun wounds.

No complaints have been accepted by either the County Sheriff's office, Justice of the Peace or any law enforcement agency involved in the investigation.

One resident close to the scene has called both incidents as related and termed them "the result of outlaws trying to break the hunting clubs up."

## Flu Vaccine Slow In Coming

WOODVILLE—An apparent bottleneck in the distribution of swine flu vaccine in Texas is delaying the arrival of the serum in Tyler County, according to county health officials.

County Health Officer Dr. John Gilchrist, who expects only a small portion of the flu vaccine to arrive in the next few weeks, says that regional headquarters in Tyler are somewhat vague about the amounts of the vaccine that will be available and exactly when it can be expected to arrive.

Gilchrist said however that enough of the vaccine should be here soon to vaccinate the elderly and those persons with chronic respiratory problems.

The County Health officer said it was possible that a local high school gymnasium might be utilized to

dispense the vaccine under the supervision of himself and other assisting local doctors and volunteers. Gilchrist said also that Public Health nurses from Tyler would also assist the administration of the vaccine.

Gilchrist said the flu vaccine was arriving in Tyler "Only in dribblets" and officials there were unsure of when the vaccine could be delivered.

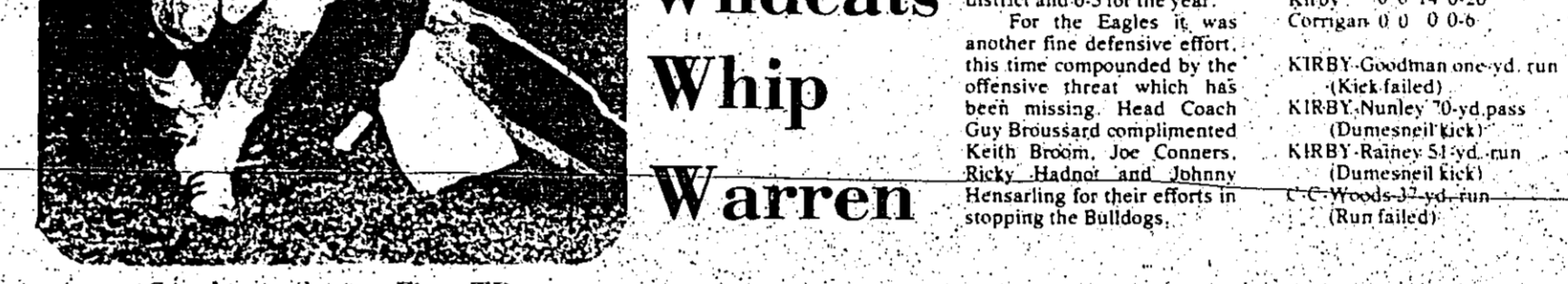

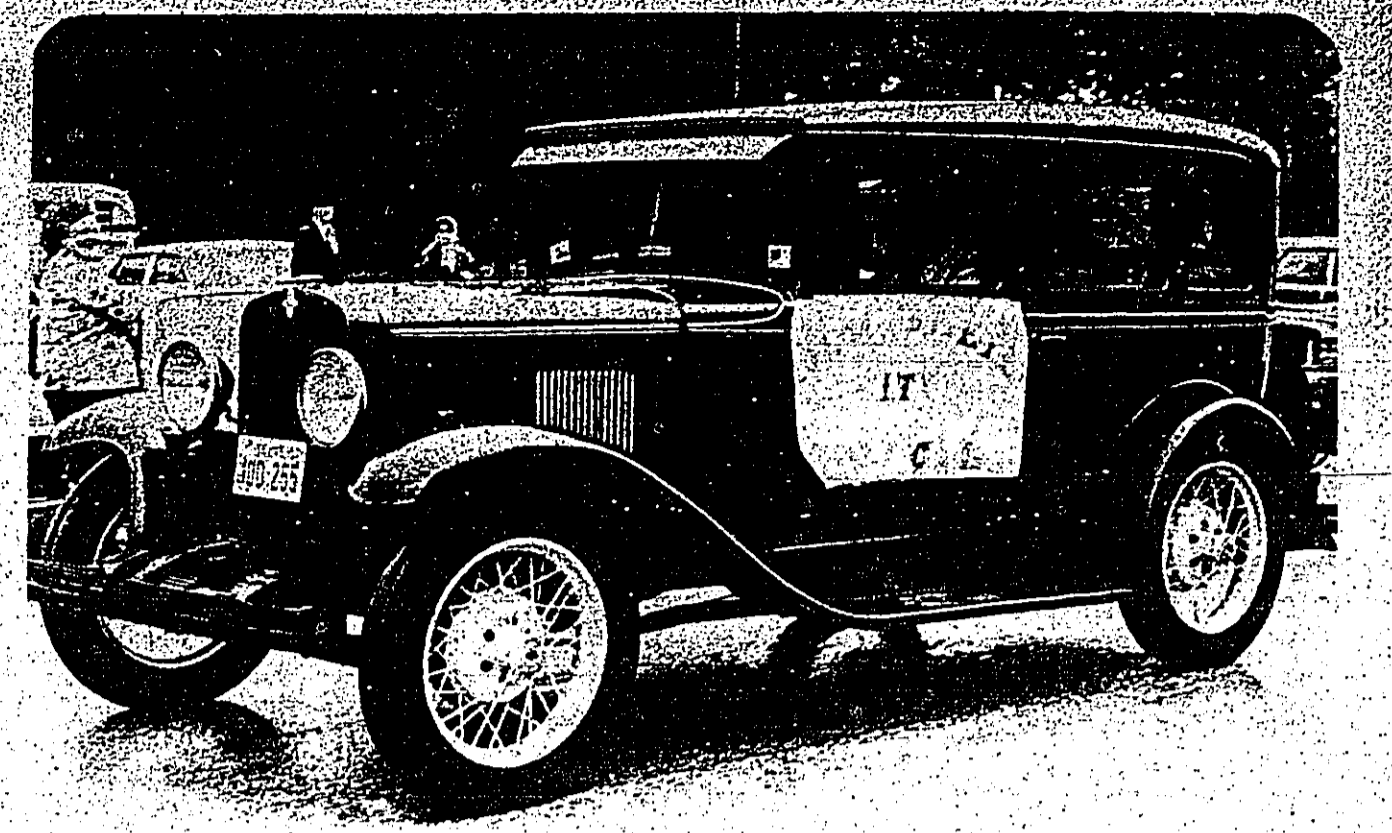

## Yellowjackets Sting Bulldogs 28-6



Tommy Collins Moves For Yardage Before Being Injured

COLMESNEIL—The Yellowjackets spoiled their homecoming for the Colmesneil Bulldogs last Friday by beating their hosts 28-6 in District 12-B action. The win pushed the Jackets into a tie with the Bulldogs for the first place in the district with identical 4-1 records. Earlier in the season Colmesneil had beaten Chester 24-6.

Tailback Anthony Freeman was the big gun for the Jackets as he galloped for 170 yards on 30 carries and two touchdowns.

Colmesneil looked like it would take control of the game in the first quarter as the Bulldogs put together a six-play, 75-yard drive for a touchdown with 8:52 left in the initial period. Tommy Collins got the score on a seven-yard burst up the middle. Collins set up the score with a 38-yard run to the Jacket 12-yard line.

The try for two points failed and the Dogs led 6-0.

Lightning then struck the Bulldogs as Collins was injured on the kickoff to Chester and was sidelined for the remainder of the game.

Chester's defense stiffened after that, however, and with 1:24 left in the first quarter Freeman scored on a 12-yard run, capping a six-play, 34-yard drive. The TD followed a face mask-eating penalty on the Dogs which gave Chester a first and 10 at the Colmesneil 12.

The Jacket's try for two failed also, and the score was tied 6-6 at the end of the first period.

Late in the first period a Jacket defender fell on a Bulldog fumble on the Colmesneil 20 yard line. Four plays later, Freeman punched in from the one for six more Jacket points. Freeman also got the two point conversion to make the score 14-6 early in the second period.

The Bulldogs came back in a hurry as L.C. McKinney picked up 20 yards on three carries and Jeff Moffett added five more. Then quarter-back Moffett dropped back and threw a pass which was intercepted by the Jacket's Ricky Payne who returned the ball 25-yards to the Bulldogs 23. The Bulldogs defense held the Jackets, but the offense could not start a drive before the first half ended.

In the second half, neither team was able to do anything with their first possession. A Jacket punt was killed at the Bulldog one and the Dogs had to take their second possession with their backs against the wall. On third down and five, Moffett lofted a pass to Ralph White for 65-yards to the Jacket 30. The drive died there, however, and Chester took over.

The Bulldogs, now 5-1 on the year, face Sabine Pass next week in Colmesneil with game time at 7:30 p.m.

Hubert got the score with a five-yard run with 1:06 left in the game. Kent Bodley ran for the PAT and the final score was 28-6.

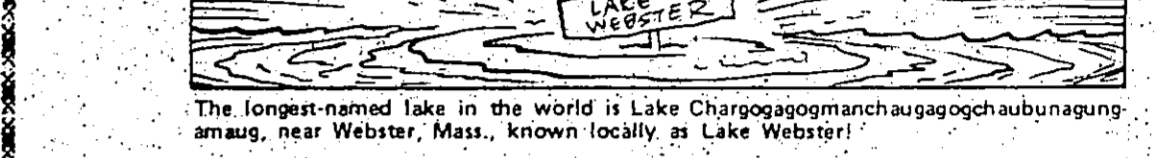

### TMA Urges Medical Training Programs

AUSTIN—To increase the number of practicing physicians in the state, Texas must expand and fully fund primary care training positions, said William F. Ross, M.D., Chairman of the Texas Medical Association's Council on Medical Education and Hospitals, Thursday.

TMA recognizes that we do have shortage of primary care physicians—those in family practice, internal medicine, pediatrics and obstetrics/gynecology, Dr. Ross said.

Between 1972 and 1980, Texas medical schools will have graduated 6,284 new physicians, but to have more doctors for the Texas health care delivery system, we've got to go one step further," said the San Benito physician.

After receiving the MD degree, a medical school graduate generally must take at least three years of graduate training before he or she actually enters the private practice of medicine, he said.

"We do not have an adequate number of primary care residency positions in the state. The new doctor is forced to seek training positions in other states," Dr. Ross said.

Conducting a two-year study, the TMA Council on Medical Education and Hospitals has designed a plan for development and expansion of primary care residencies in Texas, Dr. Ross said.

The doctor said the plan is based on the principle that the number of first year residency positions should approximate the number of graduates of Texas medical schools, and that state funding should be provided for the expansion of primary care residency programs. Appearing before the Program Development Committee of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, Dr. Ross urged the Texas legislature to support state funding for residencies beginning with the 1977-78 biennium. With full funding of proposed residencies, the present 388 primary care residencies could be increased to 618 by 1979, he said.

"If such a plan is not implemented, increasing numbers of Texas graduates will be forced each year to leave the state to do their graduate training. In July 1976, 112 Texas graduates sought positions in family practice, yet Texas had only 85 positions to offer. Thus 27 potential Texas family doctors left the state, and studies have shown the probabilities of their practicing in Texas are lower since they are training elsewhere," he warned.

"Perhaps the Texas Commissioner of Higher Education, Kenneth Ashworth, put it best when he said, 'You might say that Texas is subsidizing health care delivery in other states.'

By providing full state funding for residency programs the state will have available physicians who have received their training in quality programs, the probability of producing significant numbers of physicians in the least amount of time will be increased, and the types of physicians that are most needed will be made available," Dr. Ross said.

"Because we want more doctors to serve Texas in the quickest possible time, we support full funding and expansion of primary care residencies in Texas," Dr. Ross said.

"By utilizing the state's limited resources in this manner, the Texas Medical Association firmly believes that the state of Texas will be able to provide the largest number of physicians in the least amount of time with the most efficient use of our citizens' dollars," he said.

### Range Bull Sale Set

HOUSTON—Commercial cattlemen from throughout the Southwest are invited to participate in the all-breed registered range bull and commercial female sale to be held as part of the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. The show will run from February 23 through March 6 with rodeo performances beginning on February 25.

The sale, which in the past has attracted some of the finest cattle in the state and buyers from throughout the Southwest, is scheduled for Sunday, Feb. 27 at 1 p.m. in the show's air-conditioned livestock building, Don Jones assistant general manager, stated.

"For the first time, the sale will be held on the first Sunday of the show. This change was made in order to better accommodate both buyers and exhibitors."

The deadline for consignments is February 1, 1977, and all consignments are subject to approval by a screening committee. Each animal must meet strict specifications or it will not be allowed in the sale. The following rules will be observed:

1. All animals must be accredited veterinarian-indicated fertility, must accompany each bull to the sale. Bulls must be between 18 months and four years old to be eligible for the sale and not more than 15 bulls per consignment can be entered.

2. Female cattle must be palpated not more than 30 days before the sale. In addition, a certificate from an accredited veterinarian on each animal must be submitted to the management before the sale attesting that the female is either bred and safe in calf or open and that open heifers are potential breeders. A minimum of five heifers and/or cows must be entered.

The bulls must be registered. The heifers can either be registered high grade, purebred or an F1 cross.

Cattle entered in individual classes are not eligible for the sale.

Jobs stressed the two-fold importance of the sale.

"Besides allowing buyers to purchase additional and/or better bred sires and replacement heifers, the sale also gives those entering the cattle business for the first time the opportunity to obtain high quality commercial cattle to start a herd, or boost the quality of existing cattle," Jobs stated.

Additional information on the all-breed registered range bull and commercial female sale is available from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, P.O. Box 20070, Houston, Texas 77025.

### Revenue Sharing Up

AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that an analysis by his office shows that Texas cities and counties spent a combined total of \$2.2 billion in federal revenue sharing funds during fiscal year 1975, which ended June 30, 1976.

Bullock said cities spent 72 percent of their \$132.3 million in revenue sharing allocations for capital improvements and the remaining 28 percent for operating expenses.

Counties, he said, spent 62 percent of their \$99.9 million in allocations on capital improvements and 38 percent on operating expenses.

The analysis for local government use of federal revenue sharing funds was contained in the Comptroller's September monthly financial statement.

The analysis also showed that the biggest source of revenue sharing money by local governments was transportation, which accounted for \$6.1 million or 26 percent of all revenue sharing funds spent by cities and counties during the year.

Bullock said August state expenditures of \$40.4 million ended the state's 1976 fiscal year for total expenditures of \$2.2 billion, an increase of \$26.4 million over the previous year.

Revenue for August was \$33.5 million, he said, closing the fiscal year with total revenues of \$2.6 billion. That's 16 percent, or \$917.1 million, less than the previous fiscal year.

EUREKA SPRINGS, Ark.—Rising out of the Ozark mountains to an elevation of 1500 feet overlooking Eureka Springs, Ark., is Magnetic Mountain. Symbolic of its name received years ago, the mountain today draws, like a giant magnet, thousands of people to its crest to view a seven-story high statue of the image of Christ.

Mrs. Maurice Delcambre of Warren recently visited the mountain with her husband and she feels that local travelers would like to know of the attraction.

"The snow-white likeness of Christ," explained Mrs. Delcambre, "can be seen miles away with the magnificence of countryside accentuating the beauty of the statue."

The mammoth figure, according to brochure related to the area, has an arm extended from fingertip to fingertip, of 65 feet and weighs over one million pounds. Built to withstand 500 miles per hour winds, an automobile could be suspended from either wrist of the statue without affecting the structure in any manner.

The plan for such a religious attraction was suggested by Gerald L. Smith of Eureka Springs, husband of Elina M. Smith, and built by the Elina M. Smith Foundation and seventy friends and relatives.

Currently being constructed at the base of the statue, known as the "Christ of the Ozarks," is a shrine and drinking fountain for hikers.

There is no admission charge to the statue and grounds and visitors quickly learn the structure is com-

pletely isolated from commercial encroachment on 167 acres of land. The location of the area is off Highway 62, three miles east of Eureka Springs. The statue can also be approached "off" Main street in the town at Magnetic Road.

The Smith family has established what is known as "Christ Only Art Gallery" housed in a building located in the city. Here, the art lover can view portrayals of Christ and his Apostles in every known art form including carvings, needlework, oils

and mosaics. Admission receipts to the art gallery is used to maintain the building and grounds.

On Mount Okefenokee Mountain, a passion play is staged by the Elina M. Smith Foundation each night except Mondays and Thursdays beginning May 30 and continuing through mid-October. General admission is two dollars and box seats are four dollars.

The passion play is performed in a setting authentic of the city of Jerusalem with

250 performers costumed characteristic of the Bible times. The play portrays the life of Christ from Palm Sunday through the Ascension with live camels and donkeys adding to the realism of the production.

Mrs. Delcambre stated "The activities and views in this area of the Ozarks are such that no traveler would want to miss." She related that Eureka Springs natives remark that visitors to Magnetic Mountain and surroundings perceive the experience of "really being on Holy Land."

**Repentance**

"And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men every where to repent." Acts 17:30. Many people consider God's command to repent one of the most difficult of all commands.

**WHAT REPENTANCE IS NOT:** 1) Change. Some may think that if a person makes a change for the better that he has repented. This, however, is not necessarily so. There is no evidence that Cain ever killed another man. Yet, was he penitent regarding the killing of Abel? Also, one could do good things with the wrong motive (Mt. 6:1-6). 2) sorrow. Some feel that if a person is full of sorrow he must have repented his wrongs. Judas was sorrowful, but then, hanged himself (Mt. 27:3-5). 3) Restoration. Even restoring something falsely taken does not, within itself, insure that one has repented.

**TWO THINGS THAT BRING ABOUT REPENTANCE:** 1) "Not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth to repentance?" Rom. 2:4. God's goodness in providing man a way to escape the consequence of sin will stimulate the sincere heart to repentance. 2) "For godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation." II Cor. 7:10. Sorrow toward God as the one offended by sin will cause one to reflect on that which he has done, prompting him to repentance.

**WHAT IS REPENTANCE?** "But what think ye? A certain man had two sons; and he came to the first, and said; Son, go work today in my vineyard; He answered and said; I will not; but afterward he repented, and went." (Mt. 21:28,29). He repented when he changed his mind. What followed the change of mind was the fruit of repentance, that is, going to the vineyard to work.

**FRUITS OF REPENTANCE:** "Bring forth fruits worthy of repentance." Luke 3:8. The fruit of repentance is that which is to be put in place of what one had formerly practiced. "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance; against such there is no law." Gal. 5:22,23.

Repentance is a change of heart brought about by the goodness of God and godly-sorrow, which results in a change of life.

"Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Act 2:38.
