## Title Still In Offing

# Eagles Blast Newton, 34-15

WOODVILLE—The time bomb inside the Kirby High offense finally went off last Friday as the Eagles shot down the Newton Eagles 34-15 to celebrate Kirby's homecoming. The win also upped the Eagles' district record to 3-1 and kept alive their title hopes.

Newton drew first blood in the contest before a capacity crowd at Eagle Stadium. With 5:05 left in the first period, Kirby's John Nunley recovered a Newton fumble at the Kirby 27. The Eagles could not advance, however, and Keith Broom went back to punt. The snap from center was wild and Broom was tackled at the Kirby eight yard line where Newton took over.

An offside penalty moved the ball to the four, and two plays later Newton

quarterback Ricky Sells kept from three yards out for the touchdown with 2:17 left in the period. The PAT kick was good and Newton led 7-0.

That is when the Kirby offense finally came to life. Fullback Billy Goodman picked up 24 yards to the Newton 48. Then quarterback Tobin Rainey passed to sophomore and Kevin Battise for 25 yards to the Newton 26. The first quarter ended following a seven-yard run by Goodman to the 19.

From there on it was all Ricky Hadnot as the 185-pound senior made up the rest of the yardage on four carries, the last one for seven yards and the TD. The Eagles lined up for a kick, but Rainey took the ball and passed to John Nunley for two instead, and Kirby took a slim 8-7

lead with 10:24 left in the half.

Newton bobbled the following kickoff, but recovered at its own 30. Neither team could get in gear through the rest of the half and traded punts. Broom booted two beautiful punts, one for 40 yards and a second for 50 which forced Newton to start from its own 15 late in the period.

Neither team could advance with their first possessions of the second half. Joe Blackmon put the Eagles in good shape on their second possession by returning a punt to the Newton 42. Several plays later, Rainey connected with end Battise for 33 yards to the four. Ricky Hadnot got the call once again and carried the ball the final three yards for

the TD. Ricky Dumesnell added the PAT and Kirby had a 15-7 lead with 4:47 left in the third period.

Dumesnell boomed the following kickoff and a host of Kirby defenders downed Newton's Terry Latham at his own eight. Ricky Hadnot, not content to play just half of the game, then fell on a Newton fumble at the two. Three plays later, Goodman dove in from the one for the touchdown at 3:30 in the third period. Dumesnell's kick was wide, but Kirby was ahead 21-7, and the homecoming crowd loved it.

Newton started their next possession at their own 30. A 22-yard run, several plays later set Newton up with first and goal at the Kirby eight. On third down, Nunley stopped the Newton

runner on the five, and on fourth, Blackmon tipped a Newton pass into the hands of Broom in the endzone for a touchback to kill the threat.

The Eagles could not move the ball and were forced to punt from their own 26. Newton started its next possession at midfield and moved down the field in three minutes and fifteen seconds for a second touchdown with 6:23 left in the game. The try for two was successful by a matter of inches and Kirby's lead had been cut to 21-15.

That's when the second explosion occurred.

Plagued all season by second half lapses, the Eagles recovered Newton's onside kickoff at the Kirby

## Fire Department Busy

WOODVILLE—The Woodville Volunteer Fire Department was busy this past week answering at least six different calls, including a fire Friday night, which caused extensive damage to the green chain operation at the Woodville Lumber Company.

Nineteen men used approximately 5,000 gallons of water to control the lumber yard blaze which destroyed an electric motor, some lumber and assorted other equipment, according to Fire Marshall Alva Cook.

Last Tuesday evening, the WVFED responded to a call in the Fairview community south of Dam B where a brick residence was totally destroyed by flames.

## Postmaster Makes Appeal To Customers

An appeal to customers in the Woodville area for cooperation in keeping roads passable and the approaches to their mailboxes clear and passable to all times especially during the winter months is made by Woodville Postmaster H.M. Durham.

"Although rural and star route carriers must make every reasonable effort to serve the greatest number of customers possible, these carriers are not required to provide service on foot," the postmaster said.

Customers should also be aware that failure to keep approaches to boxes clear at all times may prevent carriers from making deliveries.

Customers may be asked to temporarily relocate their boxes, or make other arrangements to get their mail, if detours continue for an extended time.

Using the correct address at all times is becoming more and more important. Mail is delivered by address and not by the name of the individual; therefore if the correct address is not used there is good possibility that the mail will be returned to sender or returned for better address. The postal personnel of the Woodville office want to serve you but we don't know every one and where every one lives. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

## Election Is Tuesday

Tyler County voters will join the rest of the nation in going to the polls next Tuesday, Nov. 2, to elect a President and Vice President for the next 4 years. Also on the local ballot will be races for the U.S. Senate, the U.S. Congress, state railroad commission and two state constitutional amendments.

Locally, the only contest of significance is between the Democratic nominee for Sheriff, Lewis Craven, and Her-man Nolen who has campaigned as a write-in candidate.

On the state level, two write-in candidates, 211th District Judge Sam Houston and Houston attorney Tom

Lowrance, are waging a campaign against Don Yarbrough the Democratic nominee for Associate Justice, Texas Supreme Court, Place 2. Yarbrough is currently a defendant in 16 law suits and faces possible disbarment.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. There are approximately 8800 registered voters in Tyler County, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Tolbert. As of noon Tuesday, 241 voters had completed absentee voting.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**

**NO. 1** The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of 400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-d, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution and repealing sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution.

**NO. 2** A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes.

## Letters TO THE EDITOR

### Against Retrospective P.O. Complaint

Dear Sir,

I strongly oppose Proposition 1 on the November ballot authorizing an increase of 400 million in water development bonds, and would like to make some of my reasons known to the voters of Tyler County.

At the present time the Texas Water Development Board is authorized to issue 400 million in bonds. To date it has used only 200.1 million of this authorization, which was passed in 1966. At the rate of usage up to this time the remaining 199.9 million should last several years longer, so it seems there is no need for an increase.

Although these bonds are supposed to be self-liquidating by water sales from reservoirs built with the funds, more than 79 million has been withdrawn from the states general fund in the past 10 years to cover shortages. This will be repaid eventually, but in the meantime it is our tax money that is being used, and if it is not needed elsewhere it could be drawing interest or our taxes could be cut.

In my opinion, the TWDB also backs projects which are not sound but are quite likely very profitable for developers and some business people at our expense. For instance the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority is in arrears in payments because they have sold less than 10% of the water in Canyon Reservoir more than 10 years after completion of the reservoir.

Another questionable project is the Planetto Bend dam in south Texas. It is still involved in controversy and at present is said to be opposed by more Jackson county voters than the number voting for it in 1967. I hope for financial success is based on the promise that it will attract industry to the area. Maybe it will, maybe it won't, but the TWDB is financially involved.

To me these are sufficient reasons to vote against Proposition 1.

### Green Tomato Recipes

**COLLEGE STATION**—Green tomatoes, picked before the first frost, can be used many ways that add more flavor to them and will prevent having them to winter frost. Mrs. Mary Sweeten, foods and nutrition specialist, points out:

"Green tomatoes aren't as top quality as the vine-ripened red flavorful ones, but they can be a delicious accompaniment to any meal. Try this method—especially good with Mexican food—slice, dip in buttermilk and flour, salt them and deep fry. The flour, salt and pepper and the fat add flavor to the green tomatoes," she said.

Mrs. Sweeten is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"They are also delicious as ingredients in relishes or chowchow, mincemeat, marmalade, spiced green tomatoes and green tomato pickles."

"But remember to harvest them before the first frost, because after they've been touched by frost, they aren't suitable for eating," she said.

#### GREEN TOMATO-CABBAGE RELISH

- 4 quarts (about 24 to 28 medium sized) chopped green tomatoes
- 4 quarts sliced cabbage
- 3 cups chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped sweet red pepper
- 1/2 cup salt
- 1 teaspoon ground allspice
- 2 teaspoons celery seed
- 2 teaspoons mustard seed
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 1 quart vinegar

Sprinkle layers of tomatoes, cabbage, onion, and sweet pepper with salt. Let stand overnight; drain. Add allspice, celery seed, mustard seed, sugar and vinegar. Boil 25 minutes or until there is just enough liquid left to moisten ingredients well. Pack into clean, hot, sterile jars. Fill jars to top; seal. Process in boiling water bath for 10 minutes.

#### SWEET PICKLE RELISH

- 4 quarts green tomatoes
- 4 quarts onions
- 24 sweet red and green peppers
- 2 bunches celery
- 2 bunches mild pickling spices
- 5 pounds sugar
- 2 quarts vinegar

Cut and seed the tomatoes. Halve the onions and peppers. Let the tomatoes, peppers and onions stand overnight in salt water. The next day, grind these vegetables with the celery. Squeeze out as much juice as possible. Tie the pickling spices loosely in a cloth bag. Bring the sugar, vinegar and spices to a boil; then add the other ground, drained vegetables. Cook until the onions are tender and mixture is clear. Remove the spice bag. Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal. Process in boiling water bath for ten minutes.

#### INDIA RELISH

- 6 pounds (22 medium) green tomatoes
- 1/2 pound (3 medium) onions, peeled
- 1 large stalk celery
- 1/2 pound (2 medium) sweet red peppers, quartered
- 1 2/3 cups granulated sugar
- 1 3/4 cups distilled white vinegar
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/4 teaspoon turmeric
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 1/2 teaspoons celery seed
- 3 tablespoons salt

Wash, trim vegetables. Quarter, remove stem end from tomatoes; put all vegetables through medium grind of food grinder. Drain excess liquid. Heat sugar, remaining ingredients to boiling. Add vegetables; simmer ten minutes, stirring occasionally. Continue simmering while quickly packing one hot, sterilized jar at a time. Fill to one-half inch from top; seal. Process in boiling water bath for ten minutes. Makes five to six pints.

**GREEN TOMATO MARINADE**  
 Wash green tomatoes; trim, and cut into small pieces or slices. To four pounds of the prepared tomatoes, allow two pounds of sugar, one-half teaspoon of salt and five lemons. Remove the peel of the lemons, cut it into the slices, and boil for five minutes in one cup of water. Discard the water and repeat the par-boiling if the bitter flavor in the rind is not desired. Slice the lemon pulp and remove the seeds.  
 Combine the tomatoes, sugar, salt, sliced lemon and drained peel. Heat slowly and stir until the sugar is dissolved. Continue stirring and boil for one hour, until the mixture is somewhat thick and the fruit clear. Pour at once into hot sterilized jars and seal. Process in boiling water bath for ten minutes.

**GREEN TOMATO CHOW CHOW**  
 4 1/3 cups green tomatoes, after running through chopper  
 1/2 cup cabbage  
 2 medium-sized onions  
 2 medium-sized sweet green peppers  
 3 cups vinegar  
 1 1/3 cups brown sugar  
 1 cup raisins  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon, ground  
 1/2 cup brown sugar  
 1 teaspoon mixed spices  
 1 tablespoons salt

Put all ingredients together and cook for 30 minutes. Pack in sterilized jars and process for 15 minutes at simmering temperature.  
**GREEN TOMATO MINCE-MEAT**  
 1 peck green tomatoes  
 5 cups brown sugar  
 4 cups raisins  
 2 cups beef suet  
 1/2 cup vinegar  
 2 tablespoons salt  
 2 tablespoons ground cinnamon  
 1 tablespoon nutmeg  
 2 cups chopped apples  
 1 tablespoon ground cloves

Slice the tomatoes thin, or put them through a food chopper, allow to drain. Cover with cold water, place over fire and boil for five minutes. Drain well, add suet, vinegar, fruit and seasonings, return to fire, and allow to simmer for thirty to forty-five minutes. Pack while hot, and process in hot water for 20 minutes.  
**SPICED GREEN TOMATOES**  
 6 pounds of small whole green tomatoes  
 4 pounds of sugar  
 1 pint of vinegar  
 1 tablespoon of cinnamon  
 1/2 teaspoonful of cloves  
 1/2 teaspoonful of allspice  
 1/2 teaspoonful of mace

Small green fig or plum tomatoes are suitable for this pickle. Soak and peel. Make syrup of the sugar, vinegar, and spices. Drop in the whole fruit and boil until the tomatoes become clear; pour all into trays, cool quickly, pack cold into jars, strain syrup over them, seal and process.

**GREEN TOMATO PICKLE**  
 1 gallon of green tomatoes  
 1/2 dozen large onions  
 3 cups of brown sugar  
 1/2 lemon  
 3 pods of red pepper  
 1 pint of vinegar  
 1 pint of water  
 1 tablespoonful of whole cloves  
 1 tablespoonful of allspice  
 1/2 tablespoonful of mustard seed  
 1 tablespoonful of ground mustard  
 1 tablespoonful of whole black pepper

Slice the tomatoes and onions thin. Sprinkle over them one-half cupful of salt and let stand overnight in a dish or enameled vessel. The pepper, cloves, allspice, and celery seeds are to be added. Slice the lemon and chop two pepper pods very fine. Drain the tomatoes and onion slices, add all seasoning except one pepper pod to the vinegar, then add the sugar and other spices. Cook for one-half hour, stirring gently at intervals to prevent burning. Remove the heat and allow the mixture to cool. Pack in sterilized jars and process in boiling water bath for ten minutes. Makes five to six pints.

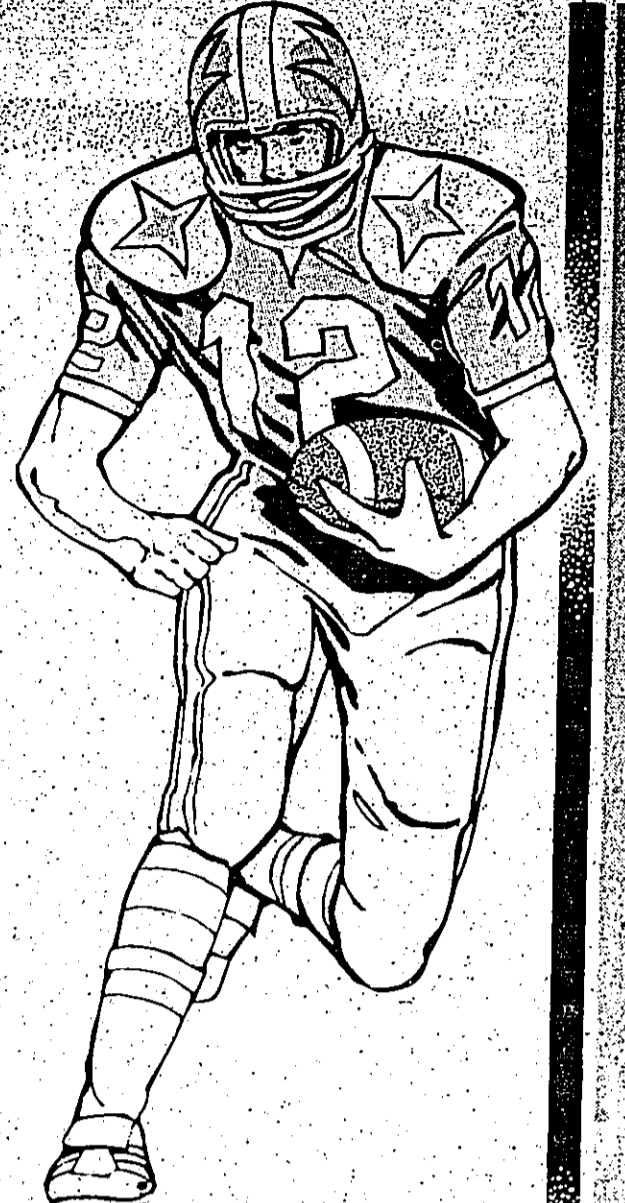

## Dancing

"Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these: Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness," (Galatians 5:19). Mr. Taylor in his Greek-English Lexicon defines lasciviousness as "WANTON MANNERS." Then he comments as follows: "as filthy words; indecent bodily movements; unchaste handling of males and females, etc." This would include much more than the common dance, but it surely includes that. Dancing is a work of the flesh. "Which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God." (Gal. 5:21).

What are some of the fruits of the dance? Lust, immorality, evil thoughts, immorality, broken homes, homeless children and drunkardness. Does dancing cause you to be more spiritually minded? Jesus said, "Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them." (Mt. 7:20). If the dance is going to be known by its fruits then an unbiased mind will have to conclude that it is evil.

Sometimes an effort is made to justify certain dances because they have a chaperon, but I remind you, friend, that you cannot chaperon the mind and thinking of the dancer. Even if you think a dancer could control his own thinking, what about the thinking of his (her) partner? Could one effort to cause another to sin?

In Matthew 14 the daughter of Herodias danced and pleased Herod. He promised to give her anything she wanted. She asked for the head of an innocent man. John the Baptist was beheaded as a result of those proceedings. Good fruits, hardly.

You might respond by saying, "I know people claiming to be members of the church of Christ who dance or let their children dance." With shame I would have to admit that you are right. But ask you few questions: 1) Are there people around you who think that just because a person calling himself a member of the church of Christ does something that makes it right? 2) How does God view the dance? This last question is the important one. "Let us speak as the oracles of God." (1 Peter 4:11).

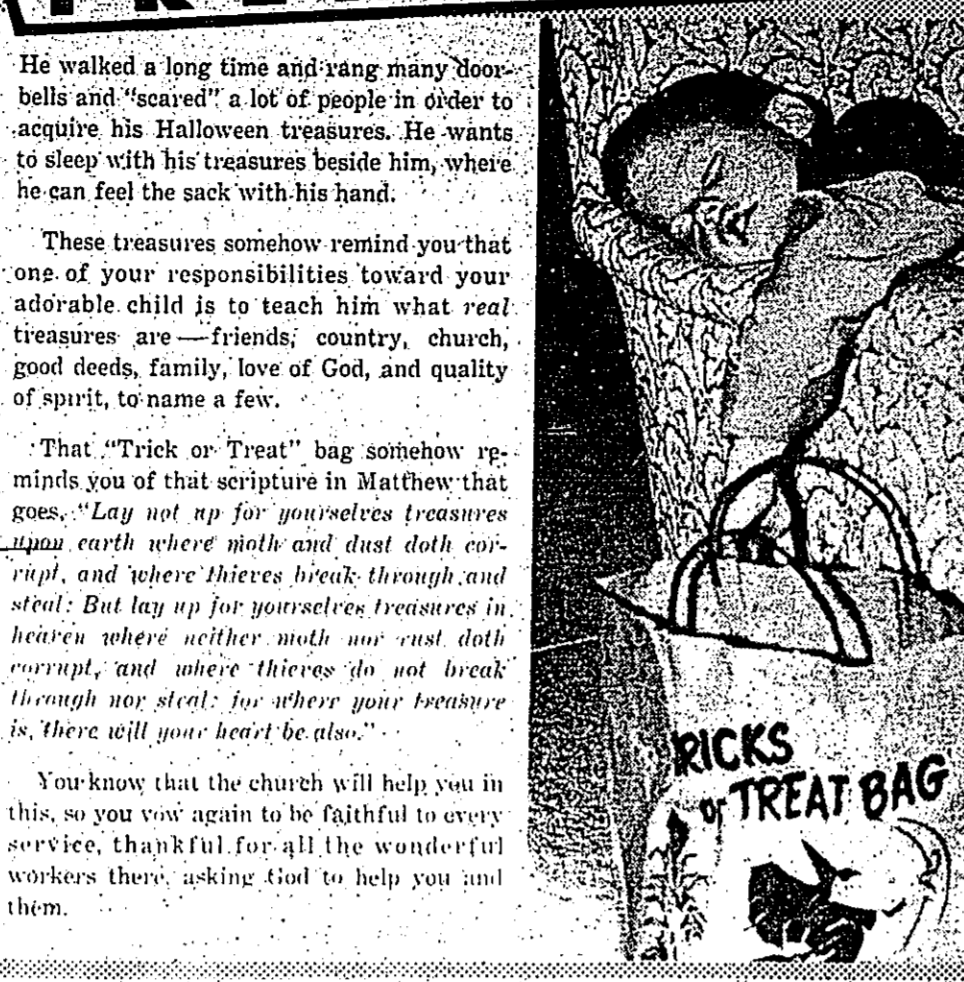
# TREASURES
