Middle income Texans who own single family homes are paying taxes on property assessments closer to fair market value than industrial land owners and expensive home owners, according to State Rep. Wayne Peveto.

The Orange congressman told a meeting of the Pineywoods Chapter of the Texas Association of Assessing Officers here that a proposed tax reform bill being formulated may help remedy that situation.

At the last session of the state legislature a tax reform bill died in Senate committee after the House approved it with a two

thirds vote. The Senate committee voted it down by one vote.

He expressed confidence about the bill's chances of passing at the legislative session which begins Jan. 11.

"If it went to that Senate committee today it would pass by one vote. Once in effect it will probably take three to five years to work as well as we expect it to," he said.

The basis of the proposed legislation is that each taxing unit within a county sets its own appraisals, Peveto said. "It's ridiculous to have two or three or four different appraisals on property for

tax purposes. The taxpayers won't stand for that kind of waste anymore," he said. Peveto and a committee are now putting the final touches on the proposed bill.

If approved, the bill would set up a central appraising office in each county. This office would be governed by a three-member board (in counties under 25,000 population) or five-member board (counties over 25,000). The board members would be elected by the trustees, councilmen and commissioners of the local taxing units.

The board will develop a budget for the central appraising office and ratify the selection of a chief appraiser. The chief appraiser would be nominated by the county tax assessor-collector.

The office would be financed by the local taxing entities according to their use and benefits derived from it, Peveto told the full house audience at the Angelina College cafeteria.

"We're trying to re-codify the entire property tax code so any legal problem would be covered. It's an impossible task but we're doing our best," the representative said.

The major change between the proposed bill and the one which was defeated at the last legislative session is in the state administration.

Under the proposed bill the state administration would be run by a six member board, nominated by the governor and confirmed by the Senate. In the defeated bill the state administration was run through the comptroller's office.

"The comptroller won't be a tax czar in this bill," Peveto said.

Texans for Carter boast 55-45 lead

AUSTIN — Jimmy Carter's campaign bosses in Texas claim the Democratic presidential nominee holds a comfortable 55 to 45 per cent state lead over President Ford.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, co-chairman of the Carter Texas campaign, "guessed" the Georgian is favored by 55 to 58 per cent of Texans.

"If all the things we have done in the campaign reach down to the grass roots level and we are successful in turning out a big vote Nov. 2, the state will be comfortably in the Democratic column," Armstrong said.

Texas Campaign Coordinator Chuck Parrish of Atlanta refused to disclose results of the latest Carter poll but agreed with Armstrong that a state Democratic victory is in the cards if the present level of campaign activity continues.

At a news conference in the state capital Tuesday, the campaign leaders said: — Endorsement of Ford by The Rev. W.A. Crisswell, pastor of Dallas big First Baptist Church Sunday, will not damage Carter's standing with Texas Baptists. ("I don't feel like it hurt us. A lot of Baptist people were turned by the fact that forum was used," said Parrish.)

— The Carter campaign already is reimbursing state officials for expenses of their Carter travels and activities.

State Republican Chairman Ray Hutchison said he is going to seek a Federal Elections Commission opinion to determine if Carter must reimburse Gov. Dolph Briscoe and other Democratic officials for use of aircraft and other expenses incurred in support of the nominee.

Armstrong said he never uses a state plane-in campaign travels and is reimbursed by the Carter organization for aircraft rental, use of his own plane or other expenses.

"I can almost sympathize with Ray Hutchison," said Parrish. "I'm sure that with all these Democratic officials out for Carter, it must look like an Air Force to him. But to my knowledge, there is absolutely no one in the state doing our business by using state equipment."

Parrish later acknowledged that Mrs. Carter rode on Gov. Dolph Briscoe's plane during her visit to Texas. He said the state will be paid for her share of the transportation expenses.

Top project of the Carter campaign during the next three weeks is a get-out-the-vote effort, said Parrish.

Parrish said the Carter campaign has recovered from its slump just before the first debates and immediately after revelations about the controversial Playboy magazine interview.

"President Ford's comments on Eastern Europe and the Arab boycott left us with a great deal more confidence," said the state campaign coordinator. "It's a building thing that will come to a climax Nov. 2. "Every time we have had a viable Democratic candidate and the Democrats have stayed together, they have won in Texas."

Parrish reported more than 210 of the state's 254 counties with 96 per cent of the population have Carter leadership, and 174 counties have Democratic headquarters opened or scheduled for opening.

Carter, who has visited Texas twice, will be back again before the election, the state campaign leaders said.

Revenue Sharing Spending Reported

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that an analysis by his office shows

that Texas cities and counties spent a combined total of \$212.2 million in federal revenue sharing funds during federal fiscal year 1975, which ended June 30, 1975.

Bullock said cities spent 72 percent of their \$132.3 million in revenue sharing allotments for capital improvements and the remaining 28 percent for operating expenses.

Counties, he said, spent 62 percent of their \$79.9 million in allotments on capital improvements and 38 percent on operating expenses.

The analysis of local government use of federal revenue sharing funds was contained in the Comptroller's September monthly financial statement.

The analysis also showed that the biggest single use of revenue sharing money by local governments was transportation, which accounted for \$56.1 million or 26 percent of all revenue sharing funds spent by cities and counties during the year.

Bullock said August state expenditures of \$408.4 million ended the state's 1976 fiscal year for total expenditures of \$6.2 billion.

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
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HALLOWEEN SHOWS US SOME MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT FAITH



People everywhere seem to be complaining about high food prices. One wonders if food prices are much higher in proportion to wages than they were twenty, or even ten years ago. More likely there is less disposable income being spent on food now than in times past.

An electric bill of fifty or sixty dollars is a rather common thing. Air conditioning, dishwashers, garbage disposals, trash compactors, electric carving knives and can openers, even that friend of the family, television, create a never ending drain on income. Car payments, house payments, boat payments, and lake cottage payments are consuming a major portion of net income. Direct dialing, credit cards, and other instant credit arrangements mean instant poverty to many.

The fact is so much money is spent for luxuries the general public simply can't afford there is very little left over for food. The interest the average person pays on credit purchases each year would go a long way toward defraying his yearly food costs. Would you believe the national consumer debt now stands at upwards of \$100,000,000,000 (don't bother to count the zeros, that is 100 billion dollars).

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Hot, Dry Weather Damages Crops

AUSTIN—According to the September crop production report, the hot, dry weather during the first three weeks of August damaged the Texas cotton and sorghum crops, causing a decline in production estimates from a month ago. The peanut crop also suffered, but improved after showers fell late in August. On the other hand, the corn crop, which is grown primarily under irrigation, responded favorably to the hot weather, and production is estimated at a record 161 million bushels, 42 percent above the previous high set last year and 7 million bushels above the August forecast, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

The dry period during August caused heavy shedding of immature cotton bolls and as a result, the September crop estimate showed an eight percent decline from the previous month. White reported that late

stands have been especially affected by dry weather and heavy insect infestation. The Commissioner said that a few cotton fields in the Blacklands have been plowed up because of poor crop prospects. White noted that despite unfavorable weather

conditions, production is still 31 percent above last year's crop of 2.13 billion bales. Although sorghum production is estimated at 318 million bushels, down 56 million from last year, quality of the crop is reported good. Yield per acre has dropped two bushels

below the August estimate but 40 bushels more than during 1975. Peanut yield estimates of 1,600 pounds per acre are unchanged from last month, but are five percent more than in 1975. Production is projected at 491 million pounds, a 28 million pound increase from last year.

Q: My husband and I have been separated for two years. Our teenage children are living with me. We cannot afford divorce proceedings. Is there any way I can have any property I buy put solely in my name so I can specify my children as the only beneficiaries if I die?
A: State law presumes that property held in the name of either a husband or a wife belongs to both parties until proven otherwise. This is true whether the husband and wife live together or apart.

Q: I've been living in our family home, which became my homestead when my husband died seven years ago. When our last child reaches the age of 18, can I sell the house and keep the proceeds?
A: The husband's one-half interest in a home acquired during marriage passes to his children if he dies without a will. In order for the widow to sell a home in this situation, the children would have to join the widow in the sale, or a court order would have to be obtained to force the sale if one of the owners refused to sell. Each of the owners would be entitled to their proportionate share of the proceeds from sale of the property.

Q: Can a doctor refuse to release the patient's personal medical file and all x-rays and test results to a patient or his agent when his services are terminated?
A: In absence of an express agreement to the contrary,

the patient's medical file and x-rays are the property of the physician rather than the patient, even though the cost of the x-rays are paid by the patient. Therefore, the patient would have no absolute right outside of the judicial process to the release of his records; however, a physician has an ethical duty to make a patient's records available on request to another physician presently treating the patient.

Q: My husband has a 10-year-old daughter from a previous marriage. She receives social security benefits from her mother's death. If my husband dies without a will, who would be entitled to property he owned before our marriage, who would become guardian of his daughter, and what Social Security benefits could we receive?
A: A husband's separate property, if he dies without a will, passes one-third to the widow and two-thirds to any children, except that the widow has only a life estate in her share of any real property. Grandparents and other blood kin are given first priority in a judge's selection of a guardian for a child whose parents die without appointing a guardian in a will. Social Security benefits to a widow would replace any survivor's benefits for the stepdaughter.

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...of the U.S. Public Health Service about Swine Flu and Victoria Flu Vaccines.

While there is no reason to expect more serious reactions to this flu vaccination, persons who believe that they have been injured by this vaccination may have a claim. The Congress recently passed a law providing that such claims, with certain exceptions, may be filed only against the United States Government. Information regarding the filing of claims may be obtained by writing to the U.S. Public Health Service Claims Office, Parklawn Building, 5600 Fishers Lane, Rockville, Maryland 20852.

Below is more information about flu and flu vaccine. Please take the time to read it carefully. You will be asked to sign this form indicating that you understand this information and that you consent to vaccination.

The Disease. Influenza (flu) is caused by viruses. When people get flu they may have fever, chills, headache, dry cough or muscle aches. Illness may last several days or a week or more, and complete recovery is usual. However, complications may lead to pneumonia or death in some people. For the elderly and people with diabetes or heart, lung, or kidney diseases, flu may be especially serious.

It is unlikely that you have adequate protection against swine flu, since it has not caused widespread human outbreaks in the past 45 years. You may or may not have adequate protection against Victoria flu, although many Americans had this flu last winter. It was responsible for over 12,000 deaths.

The Vaccine. The vaccine will not give you flu because it is made from killed viruses. Today's flu vaccines cause fewer side effects than those used in the past. In contrast with some other vaccines, flu vaccine can be taken safely during pregnancy.

One shot will protect most people from swine and Victoria flu during the next flu season; however, either a second shot or a different dosage may be required for persons under age 25. If you are under 25 and a notice regarding such information is not attached, this information will be provided to you whenever you receive the vaccine.

Possible Vaccine Side Effects. Most people will have no side effects from the vaccine. However, tenderness at the site of the shot may occur and last for several days. Some people will also have fever, chills, headache, or muscle aches within the first 48 hours.

Special Precautions. As with any vaccine or drug, the possibility of severe or potentially fatal reactions exists. However, flu vaccine has rarely been associated with severe or fatal reactions. In some instances people receiving vaccine have had allergic reactions. You should note very carefully the following precautions:

- Children under a certain age should not routinely receive flu vaccine. Please ask about age limitations if this information is not attached.
- People with known allergy to eggs should receive the vaccine only under special medical supervision.
- People with fever should delay getting vaccinated until the fever is gone.
- People who have received another type of vaccine in the past 14 days should consult a physician before taking the flu vaccine.

If you have any questions about flu or flu vaccine, please ask.

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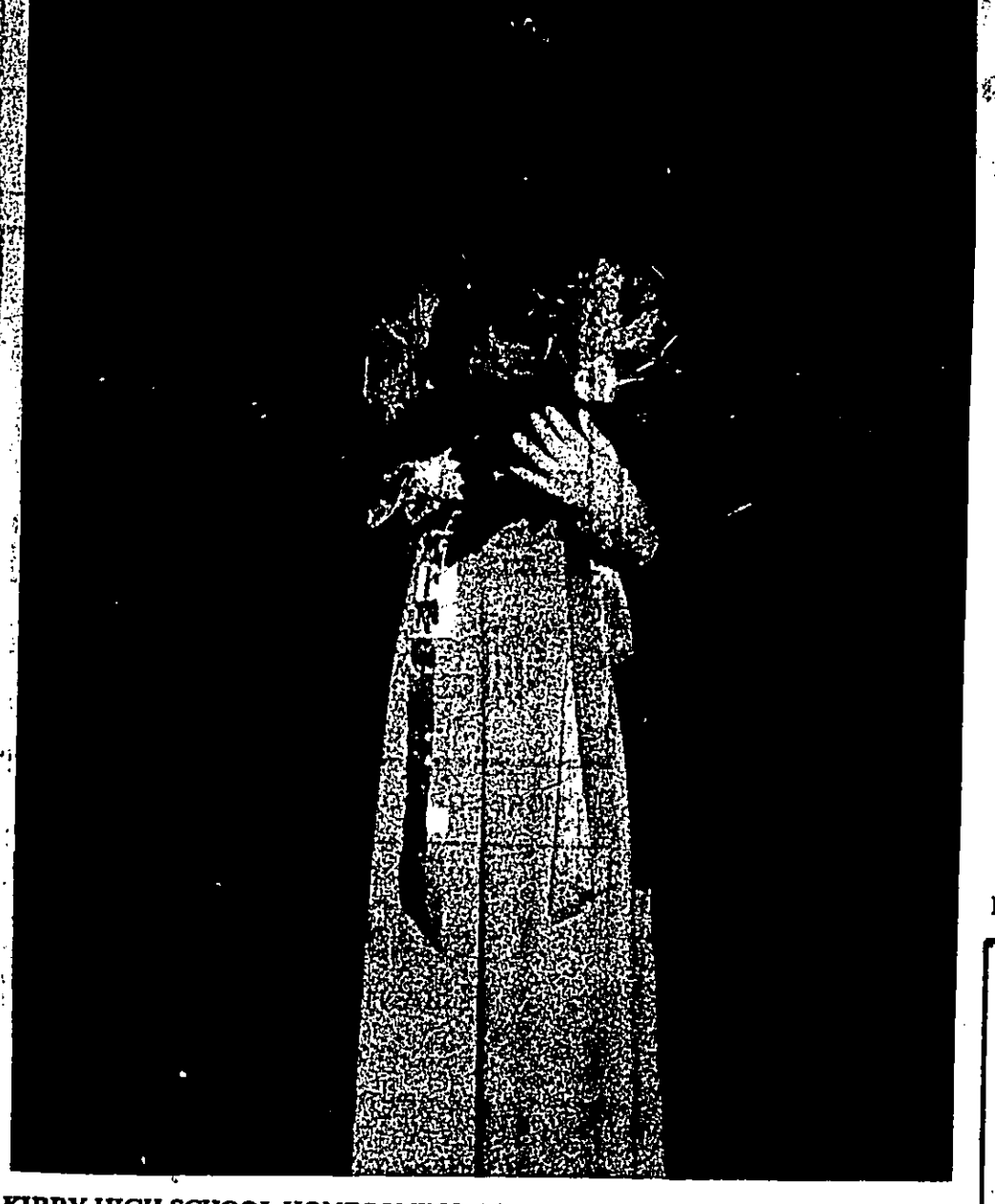

Campaign aide says Ford has closed the gap in Texas

 Austin — Pete O'Donnell Jr., of Dallas, deputy chairman of President Ford's Texas campaign, estimated today there is only a one or two-point difference "either way" between Ford and Democrat Jimmy Carter in Texas.

His assessment came on the heels of an estimate made Tuesday by Carter's Texas co-chairman, that Lead Commissioner Bob Armstrong, that Carter is ahead by five to eight percentage points.

O'Donnell, a former state chairman and national committeeman for the GOP, said the Ford-Dole ticket "They are on opposite sides of some very fundamental issues — national defense, taxes, right-to-work, breaking up the oil companies, gun control, Proposition 13," O'Donnell said.

He said the record of Carter's statements shows that he favors cutting \$15 billion from the defense budget, raising income taxes for families having income of \$15,000 per year, repealing the Texas right-to-work law, breaking up the oil companies, is for federal gun control and is for Proposition 13.

O'Donnell said Proposition 13, a California state constitutional amendment, would legalize trespassing on private property by union organizers.

Carter has backed off from the \$15 billion figure on cutting defense, now suggesting a \$6.47 billion cut is possible. He said he did not have \$15,000 in mind when he said he would favor taxing medium income families.

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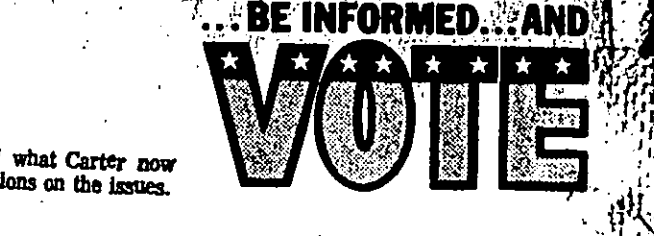

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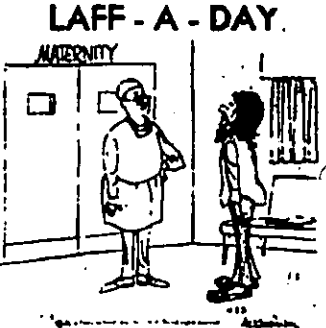

A STATEMENT FROM JIM DOYLE—
 On September 25, 1975, our congressman voted to stop buying chrome ore from Rhodesia in accordance with a United Nations decree. Rhodesia has tried to be friendly with the U. S. and even offered to send troops to help us in Viet Nam. Fortunately, there were enough congressmen with the foresight to defeat this senseless bill because the only other place to get chrome ore is from the Soviet Union. On March 25, 1976, Mr. Wilson voted against an amendment that would have taken away the funds for textbooks and school curriculum development from the National Science Foundation. This is the organization that produced the (Man: A Course of Study) program. This particular series consists of books and tapes that cannot be taken home and are called "learning aids". Hunters provided camping

Camping on the Sam Houston National Forest during the deer hunting season will be provided for in designated areas, but all dispersed camping will be prohibited, according to forest Supervisor John H. Courtenay at the Laklin headquarters of the National Forests in Texas.
 The deer hunting season set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Montgomery and Walker counties and runs from November 13 through January 2. In San Jacinto county the deer season is on November 16 through December 31. The Sam Houston National Forest stretches throughout the three counties with 150,000 acres available as public hunting grounds.
 The designated camping was on the western portion of the Sam Houston National Forest have been established by the U.S. Forest Service District Ranger on a Raven Ranger District, New Waverly, Texas. The inter camp areas in this district, which can accommodate approximately 500 people at any one time, include Stubbfield Recreation Area, Kelley's Pond, and Walker Lake.
 The eastern portion of the Sam Houston National Forest is administered by the U.S. Forest Service District Ranger on the San Jacinto Ranger District at Cleveland, Texas. The hunter camp areas on this district, which can accommodate approximately 400 people at any one time, include Big Woods Camp, Nebletts Creek Camp, Double Lake, and Tarkington Camp.
 Each year, thousands of hunters from throughout the state of Texas converge on the National Forests in Texas as in search of game. In the past, there have been no restrictions on where deer hunters camp overnight, nor were there any restrictions to limit recreation camping anywhere on the National Forests.
 As a result, Courtenay said, concern for the safety of the hunters as well as other forest visitors has created the need to control overnight camping.
 Other benefits of limiting camping on the Sam Houston National Forest during this high-use season, Courtenay said, will be the reduction of litter and abandoned camp structures left behind by the hunters, as well as aiding the state in game law enforcement.

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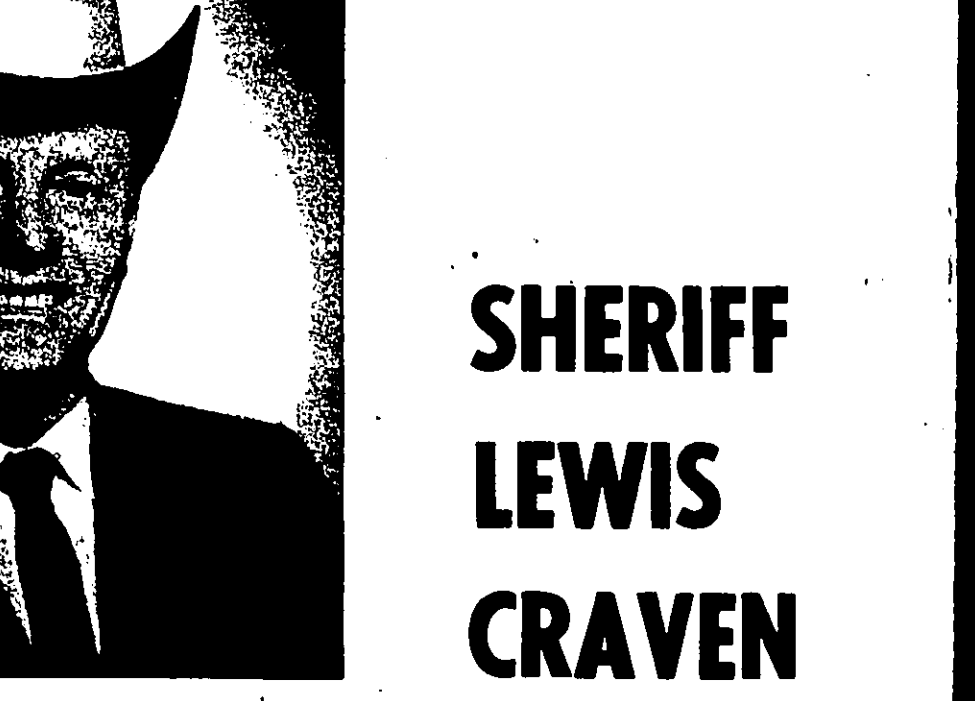

COLLEGE STATION — Many older people live alone, and their safety is of primary concern—beginning at the front door.

Mrs. Vivian Blair, family life education-aging specialist, reminds, "Of course, most people who call on the telephone or

come to the front door are honest, legitimate callers. But the risk taken if they are not is too great to ever take the chance of opening the door without checking first. The best defense is a constant, suspicious attitude of prevention—and a peephole in the front door."

Mrs. Blair is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "When someone knocks on the door, never automatically open the door, even if a visitor is expected. Don't even rely on a chainlock and opening the door a few inches.

Some suggestions to help insure safety at the front door follow. —Install a one-way peephole. They are not expensive and are easily installed.

Wholesale prices up last month

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wholesale prices soared nine-tenths of 1 per cent in September, the sharpest increase in 11 months, due primarily to higher costs for farm products and a broad range of industrial goods, the government reported today.

The Labor Department report indicated strong inflationary pressure in the economy, and was certain to provide Democrat Jimmy Carter and other administration critics with fresh ammunition in the presidential campaign.

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
