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Bullock At Chamber Banquet

Introduced as "Brother Bullock" by Woodville Attorney Josiah Wheat, the

State Comptroller of Texas Bob Bullock entertained a crowd at the annual Chamber

of Commerce Banquet held at the Woodville Inn last Friday. Bullock informed the group of the importance of the State Comptroller's office and how he "wanted it to be the best state agency in Texas government when he took office some two years ago."

Carl Nichols, who was introduced as both the "outgoing and incoming Tyler County Chamber President" formally accepted the job at the banquet in a speech which cited some of the successes and failures of the past year and some of his expectations for the coming year. Nichols centered hopes on the securing of the Big Thicket Northern headquarters in Woodville and said he hopes to secure at least 77 new members in the coming year bringing the total enrollment of the chamber membership to an all time high of 200.

Herbert Sutton of Colmesneer had been named before the banquet as the Outstanding Citizen and was supposed to have been formally recognized at the Chamber Banquet but was unable to attend the event. A plaque will be presented to him for the high honor as bestowed by the officers of the Chamber.

The featured speaker Bullock delighted the crowd with humorous recounts of

various sales tax collection attempts around the state; one a liquor store owner in San Antonio and one involving "the meanest lady in the world" a Chinese restaurant owner in Dallas.

Bullock talked also of the seriousness of the job as state comptroller which he said is the office where bills are collected and paid.

Bullock said that when he first took office that he fired some 200 employees in an unprecedented move which got the attention of everyone. He said he began to staff the offices around him with employees who believed in an honest days pay for an honest days work.

Bullock said that he was proud of the work that his auditors were doing in collecting the sales tax receipts from Texas 250,000 businesses. He said that "a very large majority of the merchants in the state are very respectable honest businessmen...but that there were some that weren't." He said that some will try to fudge a little bit on sending that money in.

Bullock said that he hoped that his auditors were giving the businesses around the state a quality audit done in a professional way. "I'm not too sure I have all that but we're trying to reach that point."

Bullock's office insti-

tuted some 400 business seizures around the state but reported at the same time that "Most of those that were seized have been reopened since that time because they arranged for payment of their sales taxes."

Bullock told the group that he wanted to have the best state agency in Texas State government and indicated following the meeting that "He intended to run for Governor and head up the big state agency." He has already gone on record saying that he will not run against Governor Dolph Briscoe, however.

County Gets \$16,000 Study Funds

The Texas Office of Traffic Safety has announced the allocation of \$16,000 to Tyler County for a Traffic Engineering Study. The purpose of the study is to record all engineering aspects of traffic safety in order to reduce accidents and improve the traffic flow.

The funds will be used to help collect and analyze basic data on traffic volumes, street capacities and signal utilization. Additionally, the study will collect information on pavement markings and parking. An accident analysis will be made and presented to county officials.

A professional traffic engineering firm will be employed to collect and analyze the data necessary to develop comprehensive recommendations to Tyler County for implementation of programs designed to reduce the number of traffic crashes. The study will also attempt to minimize any adverse impact of future increases in traffic volumes.

In announcing the contract, Ken Nevil, administrator of the Texas Traffic Safety Program, emphasized the need to solve traffic safety problems at the local level. Said Nevil: "The diversity of Texas prohibits State of Federal officials from dictating solutions to traffic safety. Each community must solve its own traffic safety problems with technical and financial assistance from outside sources. We know that before an impact on the traffic safety problem can be met, we must first identify the problems and situations as this study will provide."

Airport Grant Is \$4,500

Texas Aeronautics Commissioners approved a resolution accepting a planning grant award from the Federal Aviation Administration, and authorized the issuance of grants to four Texas communities for airport improvement and construction projects during a meeting Friday.

The FAA Planning Grant Agreement provides the TAC with \$45,000 in matching federal funds at a ratio of 75 per cent federal/25 per cent state. The money will be used to maintain and update the present Tyler Airport System Plan published by the TAC in January 1976.

Car Approved, Airport Project Authorized

The Tyler County Commissioners met in a called meeting Monday and approved a \$5,114 bid from Jack Land Ford for a new Sheriff's car and agreed to enter a 80-20 percent cost share Soil Conservation Service project for improvements to the Tyler County Airport.

The Sheriff's car OK resulted from three bids submitted by each of Tyler County auto dealers. The measure allows that the funding for the 1977 Ford LTD Ford Sedan with a 400 cubic inch v-8 engine to come out of revenue sharing was made by Commissioner Prechert.

Leon Fowler, who indicated that he "was glad to go along with the vote since the money had become available on Jan. 8." The measure was seconded by Commissioner Maxie Riley and Bo Jordan simultaneously. Other bidders competing for the county purchase were A&M Motor

Co. with a bid of \$5,573.38; Ogden Chevrolet of Colmesneer, with two bids, one of \$5,280 and one totaling \$5,150.

Jack Lane, who was present for the bid opening said that the new car would be delivered "within 30 days or before."

Commissioners Bo Jordan and Leon Fowler initiated motions to apply for a grant for improvements to the Tyler County Airport. Soil Conservation Service representative Tommy Mackey said that the county's portion of the 80-20 split would amount to "10,700 of in-kind services or equipment usage. Commissioner Maxie Riley, who accepted the role as Airport Manager said in the meeting that he was in favor of shelving the application for several months so further study could be made. Riley said, however, that he would do anything the court wanted to on the project. Riley's main objection to the plan was that constant complaints about poor roads in the county made him feel that improvements in Precinct 1 Roadways was more important than the airport.

The commissioners discussed a request for a radio as submitted by Ellen Ambulance service but decided that the request "was a matter of non-county vehicles." According to Allen Sturrock: "We'll have to write out something for the service other than us owning the radio. County Attorney Jim Allison said the question has led to discussion of wreckers and other services who have made the same request. County Judge Sturrock asked the court to see if neighboring county's might have some radio units available which could be sold to the Ambulance service.

The commissioners agreed to increase the coverage of the courthouse by 10 percent and keep the same insurance carriers. Judge Sturrock asked that the increase be made with the same assignment pending a recheck of the value of the equipment and contents of the courthouse.

In other business county consideration on vacations and policies will receive further study following recommendations submitted Monday by a newly installed policy board.

County Treasurer Austin Fuller was given permission to attend a seminar in Austin on Civil Defense.

The court voted to call an election to coincide with the district school elections around the county to fill two vacant seats on the County School Board. According to Judge Sturrock the vacancies are in precincts 2 and 4 and the election will be held April 2.

Plat files from Lake Ivanhoe were approved for recording purposes in other routine business.

Maxie Riley accepted an appointment as Library Executive member serving along with County Judge Sturrock.

And, Barbara Tolbert, Tax Assessor/Collector was given permission by the Commissioners to advertise for bids for a new secretary's desk and chair.

Use 'Fine' Muscles

There's a program developing in the Fred Elementary School that's aimed at preventing slowness in a child's learning pattern and it's based on the theory that if a child's muscles are tuned up properly that his mind can function better in the classroom as a result of better overall muscular control.

The program which is being conducted by first grade teacher Mrs. Juana Baber is called 'Gross Motor Development' and its purpose is to develop the young child's body's motor skills.

So far the program has cost a total of \$15 and the kids love it. And, its coordinators and volunteers aren't asking for a lot of funding to keep it going. They just work hard putting in a lot of time because they believe its valuable to the kids.

With some shared ideas from the Houston Independent School District, Volunteers like Mrs. Baber and about a dozen other mothers the program is designed "to be preventative instead of remedial".

With the fact that a child has to crawl before walking and walk before running, the program is designed to make sure that all kids don't linger or skip a stage that would hurt him later on.

Reading and writing skills, for instance, are based on motor skills.

The program was started because recent testing revealed that various children had sufficient intelligence to perform in the classroom but were failing to achieve due to slowness in other areas.

The program at Fred Elementary is aimed at all kindergarten, first and second graders and some resource students. The goal of the program is to reach all preschoolers.

Volunteer mothers who are assisting with the program include Patricia Moore, Shirley Moore, Shirley Drake, Joyce Moore, Chaille Drake, Carolyn Moore, Sissie Singletary, Eugenia Moore, Jessie Yawn, Pat Holland, Oma Moore and Karen Wales.

Accent On Health

When you invite a visitor into your home, it's usually someone whom you know and like to be around.

But there's one visitor you seldom see and don't want even though you provide him with the run of your home and all the comforts which you enjoy. That visitor, says the Texas Department of Health Resources is the rat.

Just as surely as if by invitation, you welcome the rat into your home by providing harborage and food. The rat is a pest because of infestation of any premises. This may come as a surprise to most persons since Texas and the United States have long prided themselves on being "highly sanitary."

But, let's take a look at the problem to determine whether you may be guilty of encouraging rats.

A rat must have food to exist. If you have a cat, dog or other pet and overlook its leaving scraps around the rat can survive quite well. Gain in another standard diet of rats and mice. What about that bird feeder as it constructed so that grain spills onto the ground or placed that a rat can climb onto it? And how about your garbage cans? Is the lid tight or does it fit loosely? Do you always keep the lid on the cans?

The answers to these questions may give you a clue as to why there are rats around.

Now, for the harborage requirement.

Rats take up residence in sewers, in piles of lumber, in heaps of boxes and leaves, in storage sheds, in the attic or under your house. Have you heard strange noises in your walls or attic? It could be rats scampering around.

With winter upon us, rats are more prone to seek shelter in the warmth of someone's home. You'd be surprised just how little space they need to squirm through a hole around a water or gas pipe or ventilator duct and get into your home. If the hole is 1/4 inch, they'll enlarge it with their sharp teeth. Then they'll head for your kitchen pantry.

In addition to health hazards from rats, which transmit many diseases, rats love to chew on things, including electric wires which produce short circuits and fires.

Texas participates in rat reduction programs, and many cities have rodent control activities through Model Cities Programs. Local health departments, direct programs in other cities. The Public Health Education Division and General Sanitation Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources cooperate in offering help in insect and rodent control.

A rodent control school was just completed in Amarillo and may be the forerunner of others in the state. And the City of Brownsville, through its Health Department, has conducted an extensive rodent control program. These are but examples of the activities being conducted throughout Texas.

And you as an individual can take a big step in rat control by taking away harborage and food.

Rats now share the dwelling places of 12 million Americans and bite 14,000 of them every year.

Rats have made millions of every major city their home, and now they've headed toward the suburbs.

One of the invaders is the Norway rat, also called the brown rat, house rat, barn rat, sewer rat and wharf rat. This species is highly destructive and prolific and accepts human beings as part of his environment. He also is aggressive. The Norway rat likes nothing better than to use the works of man for food, shelter and warmth.

At least 300 U.S. cities have critical rat problems today and almost as many communities need help. In many large cities, rat-infested buildings have increased sharply.

A Department of Health Resources rodent expert sums it all up: "We know we can go in and kill rats," he said. "But for an effective effort, homeowners must take away the food and harborage."

Employer Tax Returns Due Now

Employers must report Social Security and withheld income taxes for the last quarter by Monday, January 31, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks of the full amount of tax due. They are allowed until February 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

The IRS emphasized that employers who received the preaddressed Form 941 in the mail should file it by the report. Those persons who did not receive the preaddressed forms can obtain forms from their local IRS office.

Any balance of Federal unemployment tax not over \$100 for 1976 should be paid by January 31, using Form 940. Balances of tax due over \$100 require the employer to make a deposit with Form 941. Taxpayers who deposit the full amount of tax on time have until February 10 to file the return.

Relief For Colds

People get an average of three colds per year and spend more than \$735 million trying to find relief, a federal report shows. Yet only the \$5,000-\$50,000 cold and cough preparations on the market actually can cure the common cold.

The Texas Medical Association (TMA) says a doctor cannot cure colds and should be called mainly if there is a fever over 103 degrees for more than 24 hours, bloody discharge from nose or mouth, persistent chest pains, earache, severe or long-lasting sore throat or persistent cough. A doctor also should be contacted if a normally healthy person has a cold for more than a week or two. Of course people with other illnesses may need medical attention if they even get the sniffles since colds can complicate other illnesses.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is working on a program to allow more cold and cough drugs to be sold without prescriptions and strengthen some ingredients already in over-the-counter drugs. Doing so may increase some of these drugs' abilities to relieve cold symptoms. However, people must be increasingly careful not to misuse these products.

The Texas Pharmaceutical Association says many cold medications can cause dizziness, drowsiness, hazy thinking and other side effects, especially if combined with alcoholic beverages. Allergies to certain drugs also cause reactions. People allergic to aspirin should be especially careful to read labels since many products contain the drug. In fact, reading labels and following directions is vitally important for all drugs.

Non-prescription drugs also can cause bad reactions if they interfere with prescription drugs. Some problems should be sought about using both types of drugs together. People with heart disease, high blood pressure, thyroid disease, diabetes, glaucoma and several other conditions also need advice when they are prescribed drugs.

Almost all drugs can be harmful if overused but most sprays and drops present particular problems. The drugs can cause nasal congestion, nose irritation when they are designed to relieve. TMA says nasal irritations can be caused by sprays and drops. These problems are common when people use them continuously. People get relief from sprays and drops for a few days, but the irritation continues as long as they are used.

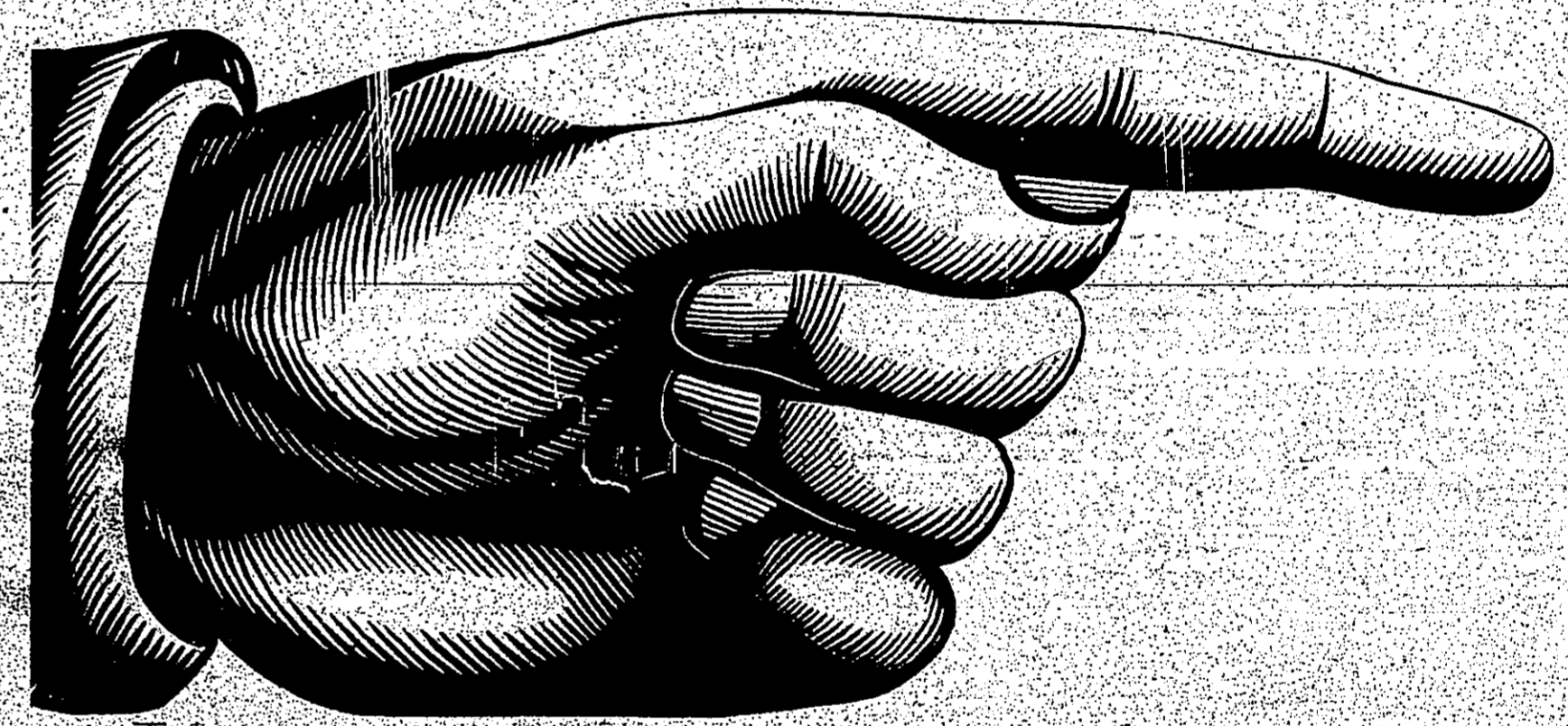

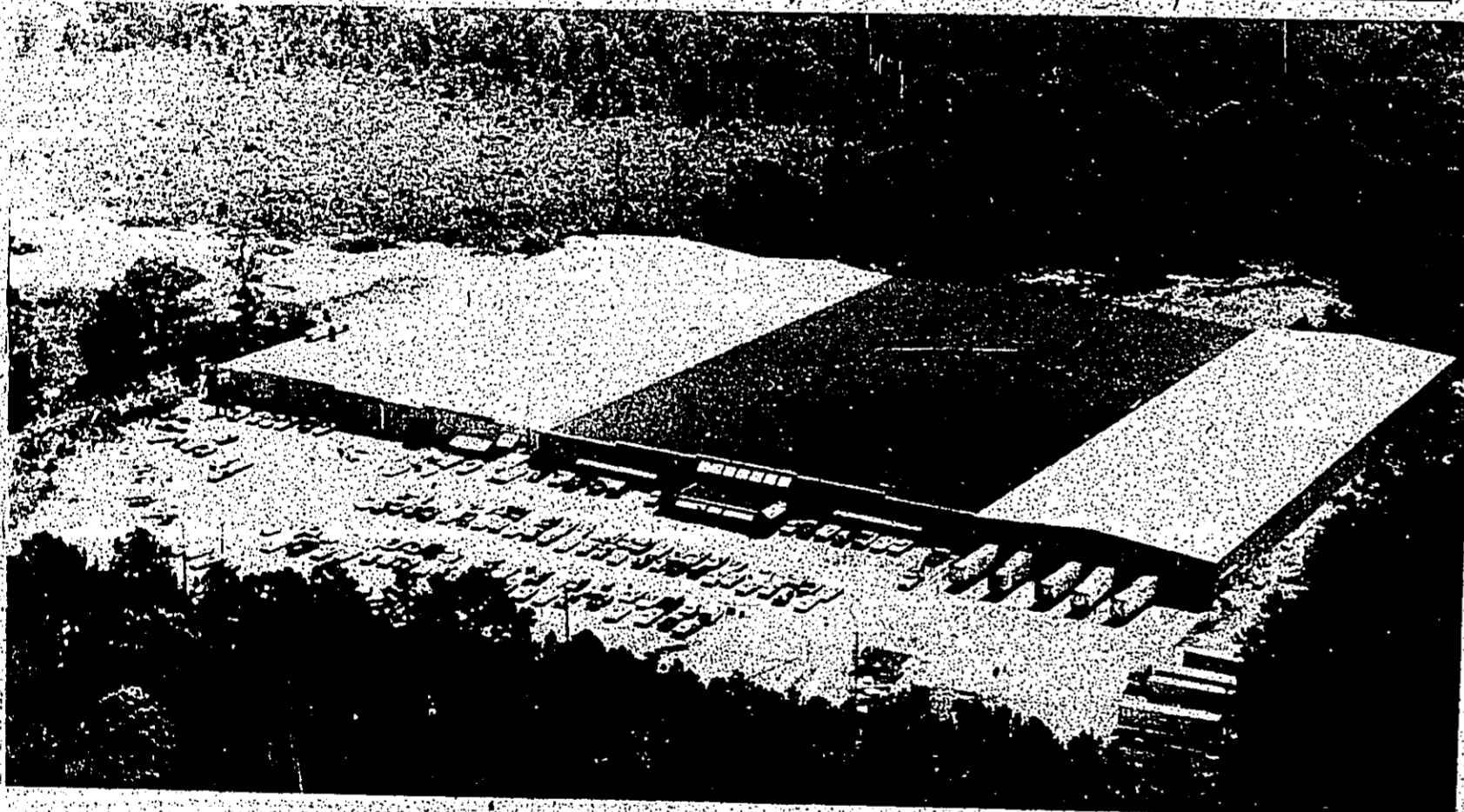

the president's message

Dear Tyler County Citizen

Although we did not achieve all of our objectives during 1976, we did make what we feel was some progress and we plan to continue working in the same direction during 1977.

Tyler County Chamber of Commerce membership did show an increase over previous years, totalling 126 members which to my knowledge is the highest in recent history. This increase in membership enabled us to end the year at the break-even point financially, without having to go out begging for additional donations as we have had to do in the past.

Our objectives for the coming year is to further increase our membership to 203. That means 77 new members in '77. We can only do it with your help. Every present member get a new member and we can surpass the objective of 203. We can't possibly approach every individual in Tyler County on a person to person basis so I ask all interested persons who are not already a member to telephone Faye Ward, our Executive Secretary, for details on joining the Chamber. Remember, you can join on an individual membership and need not be in business to be eligible. Individual membership costs you as little as three cents per day and that's a very small amount to contribute to the promotion of Tyler County.

Another accomplishment during 1976 was increasing our service to 24 hours per day, seven days per week through the installation of an automatic telephone message receiving device. It has been highly effective in that many calls have been received which we may not have received otherwise due to our mornings only office manning. We have received many compliments on this increased service, indicating public acceptance.

During 1976, we initiated a Community Center project which will continue into 1977. We are currently exploring sources of grant money, state or federal and probably matching funds. We currently have pledges from individuals throughout Tyler County, amounting to approximately \$8500.00. You will be kept advised of the progress on this project through the news media.

One of our disappointments in 1976 was the inability to attract additional light industry to Tyler County. We had several excellent prospects but they did not finalize favorably. I am not optimistic about our near future success in this respect. Most light industry uses considerable amounts of energy in the form of natural gas which is only available to us in limited quantities but be assured that responsible persons are making every effort to increase our local fuel allocations. We will continue work toward this objective during 1977.

Another long standing project which was actively pursued during 1976 was to obtain for Tyler County at least a part of the offices of the National Park Service and a Big Thicket Information Center. The results of these efforts should be available and made known in the near future with the public release of the National Park Service final plan for the Big Thicket National Preserve. We are highly optimistic about the outcome of this project.

In general, it has been a very satisfying year in spite of several disappointments.

In closing, I want to express my appreciation of the cooperation of Chamber Board of Directors and of all Chamber members during 1976 and hope you will continue in these efforts during 1977. As last year, I ask each Committee Chairman to provide to me, at the February Board of Directors meeting, a brief written statement of his committee's 1977 objectives and how he proposes to achieve them.

Let me assure you that I will do everything in my power to justify the confidence in me that you have expressed by electing me to a second term as President of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce.

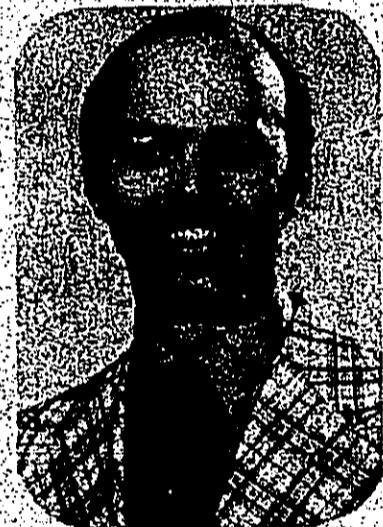

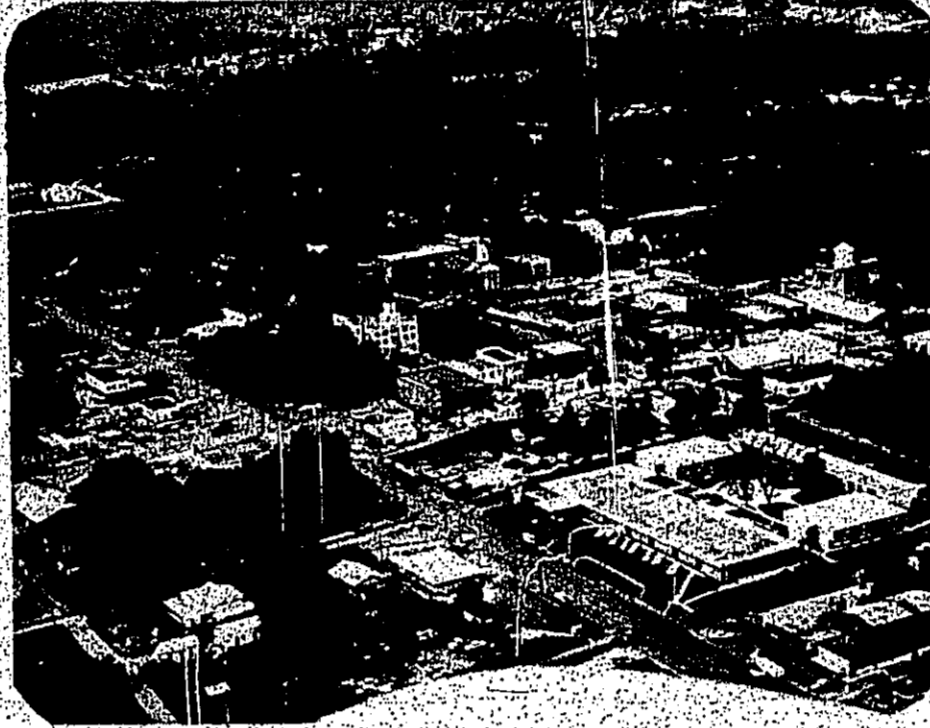

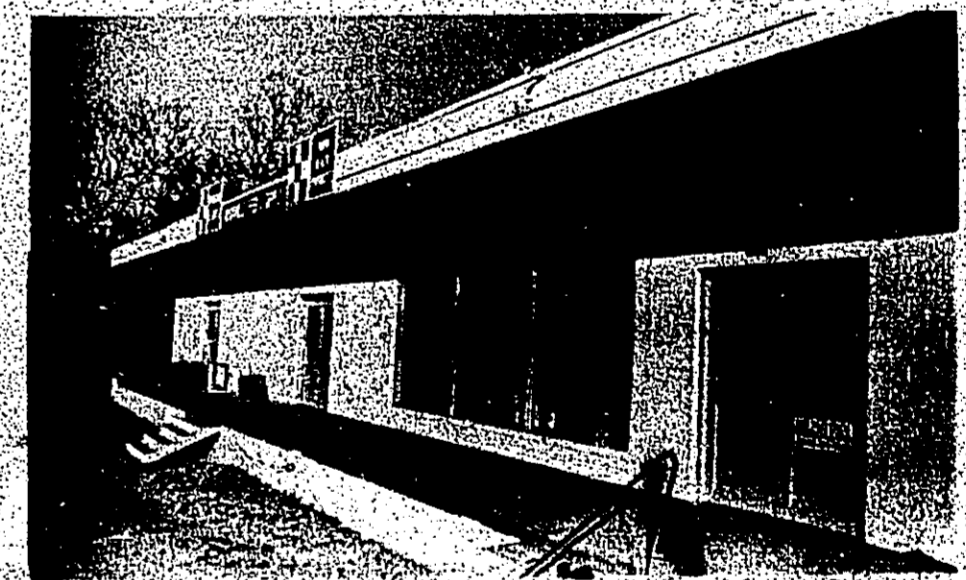

Civic Center Pledges Pass \$6,000 Mark

(REPRINTED FROM THE TYLER COUNTY BOOSTER, JULY 22, 1976)

WOODVILLE—Redoubling efforts to secure additional pledges toward the construction of a civic center for use by the entire county, Chamber of Commerce President Carl Nichols, acting on behalf of the Chamber, collected another 31 pledges at \$100 each, bringing the total thus far in two weeks of work on the project to \$6,200.

That amount equals about one half of the dollars needed to build the foundation slab for the center.

Nichols' idea, he says, "is to start from the ground up, and plan usage of the center so that pledgers and eventual contributors can get their money back on a totally reimbursable basis."

Nichols says that the project "is particularly seeking pledges from individuals. Most of the local businesses and industries are the ones who are hit the hardest anyway. Individuals would better indicate a total, community, county-wide effort," he said.

We have been offered pledges in amounts larger than \$100, but for the time being, at least, we are accepting only in that amount.

Location of the proposed civic center is still an open question, but the majority seem to favor the Tyler County Airport vicinity because of its central location with respect to all of Tyler County. Nichols said further that the area also has a built-in recreational-entertainment atmosphere in its location next to the Hennigan Ball Park and the FFA Arena.

The size of the project will be determined by the dollar amount of pledges we receive and the size we feel can be adequately equipped and supported by the community. However, we aim for something larger than any other meeting or activity place presently in Tyler County.

Nichols said the group would be organizing a committee of five citizens to evaluate suggestions and recommend answers to the many detailed questions existing at this stage of the project.

Special events for the enjoyment of ourselves and to invite tourists to our county to enjoy have grown to include most of the year—3rd weekend of January, Ter-La Neches Valley Singing Convention; 1st Saturday of February, Miss Tyler County Pageant; last Saturday in March begins Dogwood Festival with Western weekends; and 1st Saturday in April, Queen's Weekend; Father's Day weekend in June Goppel Quartet Festival; 3rd weekend in July, Tyler County Lions Club Rodeo, and an annual Tyler County Fair in September. If your group has an annual event, on a specific date that is not included, please let the Chamber know and it can help with listings in the following ways that were used in 1975:

Ads taken in East Texas Chamber of Commerce Vacation Guide with printing of 125,000; Discover Texas Association Vacation Map with 250,000 printed; Texas Calendar of Events which is published quarterly by the Highway Department and distributed by all tourist bureaus and copies given to newspapers, radio, TV, chambers of commerce, and information centers; Texas Tourist Development Agency with listings mailed to over 300 Texas newspapers monthly; Mobil Travel Guide; several company magazines or newsletters; the Highway Department Texas-Land of Contrast; Texas Arts & Crafts Foundation listing of area artists and craftsmen; articles appeared in these national magazines April: Woman's Day, and Southern Living.

Over 2,000 county brochures were mailed to other tourist bureaus at their request. A new county map brochure was printed and with the funds from the motel room tax, made available this year, a new city brochure is near publication. The Dogwood Festival Committee had 3,000 brochures printed with 5,000 planned for 1977. The Indian Reservation made improvements to their attractions and began a successful drama "Beyond the Sundown" which has been presented each summer. Efforts were begun with government agencies in 1961 to try and have them locate a Big Thicket headquarters in Tyler County. With the Bill to establish the park passed in 1975 this idea was brought forth again to elected officials and department heads. The prospects look good that Woodville will house part of the Big Thicket tourist activity.

Local citizens serve on many district or area committees. They are able to present needs to Tyler County and know what services are available. DEIDA, DETC, G. G. District, Texas Astronautics Commission, Texas Good Roads Association, Texas Industrial Commission, East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Schools Vote Expansion In '76

The five school districts of Tyler county offer the citizens of the area a quality education for their children, and interest in education is evidenced by the recent passing of bond issues in several of the districts.

Last September, voters in the Woodville Independent School District passed a \$2.7 million dollar bond issue for the building of a new high school and renovation of other buildings. This will include the air conditioning of the schools for the first time in their history.

The WISD has an enrollment of approximately 1,650 students in grades kindergarten through twelve and includes an area of approximately 275 square miles. The 1976-77 total budget is \$1,818,861 and the district employs 95 teachers.

The Woodville schools offer a full range of athletic, vocational and athletic activities.

Superintendent for the district is Tom Lham. Members of the WISD board of trustees are President Dr. R.E. Swearingen, Vice President Jim Galsky, Secretary Bobby Kinnon, and members Margaret Lane, Fred Sullivan, Dr. W.S. Nichols, and Harold Allison.

The students in the Warren Independent School District have enjoyed a new high school for four years.

The Warren district has a total enrollment of 898 students in its high school, junior high and elementary campuses in Warren and an elementary school in Fred. Fifty-seven teachers are employed by the district which covers 252 square miles and includes portions of both Tyler and Hardin counties.

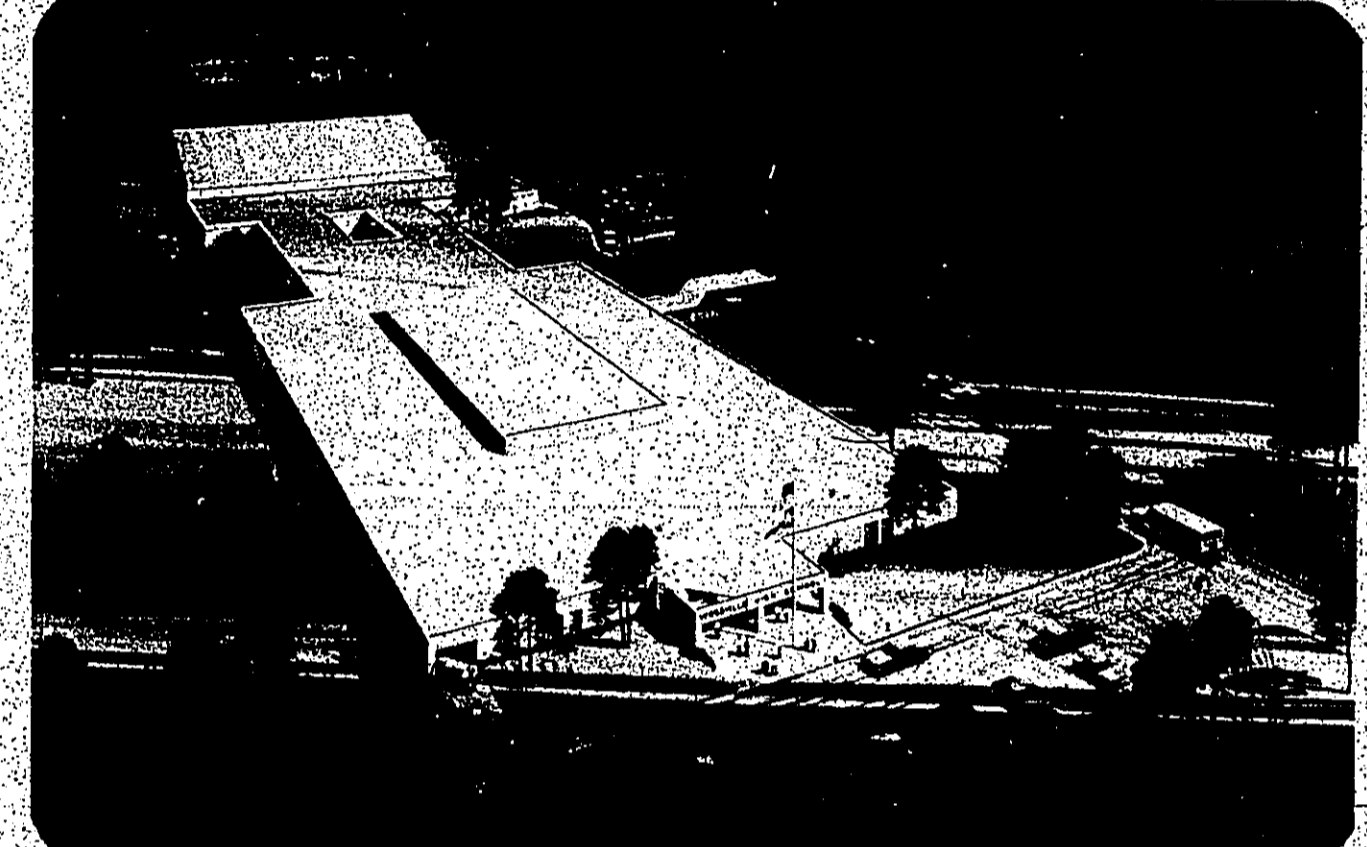
Approximately 90 percent of the district's students are brought to school on buses. The 1976-77 budget for the WISD is \$1,269,821.

Superintendent Adolph Hryhorchuk is in his first year. Ben Worthington is president of the school board which includes Vice President Kenneth Gregory, Secretary Harold Davis and members Herman Elliot, Carol Connors, Marvin Fanning and Bill Cornier.

The Colmesneil School District, third largest in enrollment in the county, has an enrollment of 367 students in grades kindergarten through 12. Nineteen teachers are employed by the district.

Recent additions to the Colmesneil system are a new vocational-agricultural building, a new field house and a remodeling effort in 1966 which air-conditioned the building.

Director Quentin Sullivan and his friendly staff serve the people of Tyler County from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Monday and Tuesday, noon to 5 p.m. on Wednesday and Friday, noon to 8 p.m. on Thursday and noon to 1 p.m. on Saturdays. A staff member

Allan Shivers Library: Another Reason to Come to Tyler County

WOODVILLE—One of the prides of Tyler County is the Allan Shivers Library situated on North Charlton in Woodville.

With approximately 20,000 books on hand for the public's information, the Shivers Library is a valuable asset to the county. In 1976 the library loaned an average of 4062 books per month, and in March barely missed loaning out a total of 6,000 books.

Approximately 6,425 borrowers cards have been issued since the library moved into the new building donated by Gov. and Mrs. Shivers.

Students from all five Tyler County High schools use the resources for pleasure and study.

The library also offers services which include a xerox machine (financed by the Women's Study Club), a movie projector, slide projector, strip film projector, screens, puppet theatre, microfiche machine, tape recorders and posters.

Story hours for children are held once or twice a week during the year.

The elderly, too, make great use of the Shivers Library. For those who are unable to come to the library, the staff takes books

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will be on duty 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday to give tours of the adjacent museum and to xerox material for the public. The museum play also is toured until 3 p.m. on Saturdays.

Growth is also evident in the Spurger School District where 290 students are enrolled in grades kindergarten through 12. The school was air-conditioned and the parking lot blacktopped in 1975, and a cafeteria was built following a 1962 bond election. The district employs 20 teachers.

Vocational education is stressed at Spurger, 1968 and payment was just recently completed for a new vocational building. A unique part of the Spurger program is a pre-employment lab where students attend two-hour classes in welding and building trades.

The 1976-77 budget for the Spurger district is \$320,000. The district includes 107 square miles.

Although Spurger High School does not participate in football, its students are active in all other major sports, as well as scholastic pursuits.

A.B. Crank is the superintendent for the district. The board of trustees is made up of President Mooney Hines, Vice President James Chastness, Secretary Henry Joe Jordan, and members Jack Sheffield, T.E. McCullum, Pete Hines, and Jim T. Coleman.

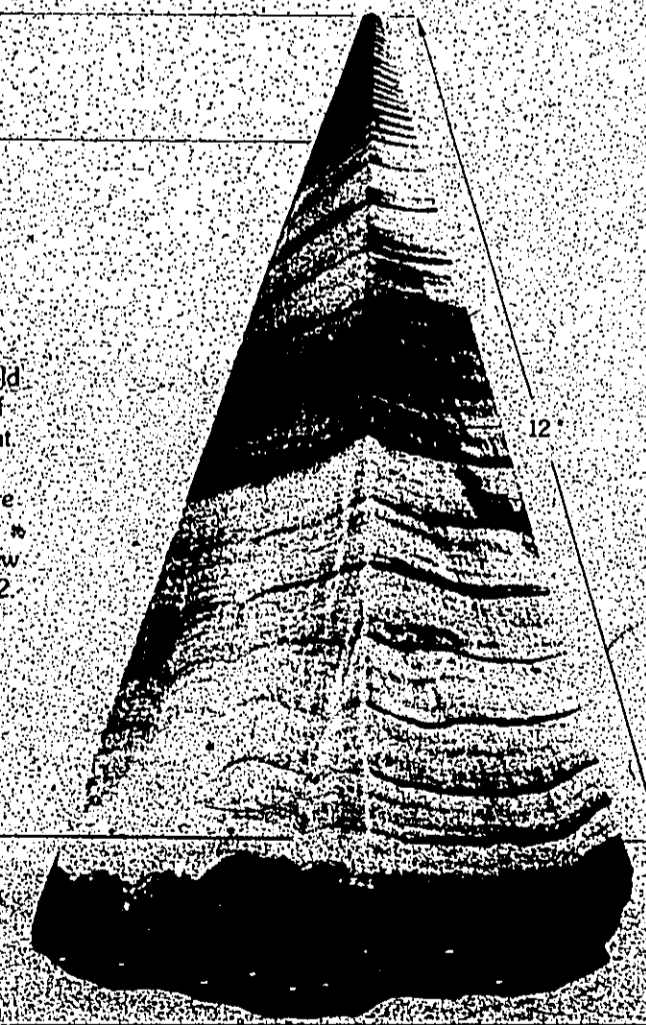

TEXAS TAXES



by BOB BULLOCK, State Comptroller

AUSTIN—As you probably know, this office recently released its formal estimate of the amount of money that will be available to the 1977 Texas Legislature for writing a new two-year budget.

Overall, the projections are rosy. We anticipate that the new Legislature will have additional \$2.9 billion to work with, 34 percent more than was available to its predecessor in 1975.

There have been some misconceptions about what this office really means when it makes revenue estimates, as required by law. We are simply estimating how much money the State will be bringing in—its income—over a given period and how much it will spend.

You do about the same thing, but on a much smaller scale, when you figure the family budget.

Now, we are not—and I want to repeat "not"—saying that the 65th Legislature will have \$2.9 billion more to spend. We are simply saying that much more money will be available.

What is done with the money is a legislative matter. It can be used for new programs, or to expand existing ones. Or, as some leaders are advocating, we might set aside a little for a rainy day—a suggestion I personally like. Some of it could even be returned to Texans through tax cuts.

We have a number of ideas about what we think ought to be done with the money—but that is not our job. Our job is to collect money, not spend it.

The fact that our revenue estimates was released just before Thanksgiving day was purely coincidental. But I think it was appropriate because it reminds us again that we have a lot to be thankful for in Texas. Most of our sister States have not been as fortunate.

The statistics tell the story. Sales tax collections are up a whopping 17 percent over last year, far above the national average. Motor vehicle sales tax collections are up 33 percent and the franchise tax is up 28 percent.

What it all adds up to is a sound State economy. Businesses are expanding. Texans are making more money and they're spending more, demonstrating a renewed confidence in the future.

I hate to sound a sour note at this point, but I think it's in order. Planning is as essential for times of prosperity as it is in times of crisis. Common sense tells us that the current revenue boom can't last forever.

It is essential that the Legislature keep this in mind when it convenes in January as its decisions will have a profound effect on the State's future.

I've said it before, and I'll say it again: Unless precautions are taken this State will be facing in the future—perhaps 1979, perhaps later—the biggest tax bill in its history.

It's as sure as the feathers on a hen's back.

STATE VIOLENT CRIME CLAIMS 1 OUT OF 24

A branch of the Texas Department of Public Safety has prepared an estimate from statistics on violent crime in the state. According to these figures one out of every 24 adults was a victim of serious crime during 1975. The Associated Press recap of the TDPS release further indicated that the criminals were younger than in past studies.

The Statistical Analysis Center made its estimates on the basis of a random sampling of 1,000 persons, whose names were obtained from the computerized file of drivers' licenses maintained by the DPS.

It found one out of six Texans age 16 and over was the victim of some kind of crime during 1975.

"Males, youth and ethnic minorities all had above average risks of being victims of crime," the report said.

"The victims of violent crime tended to be from low income groups while the property crime victims tended to be from higher income groups."

A third of the victims expected to be victims again in 1976. The crime they most anticipated was burglary of their homes.

The criminals were young, the victims recalled—32 per cent under 18 and 48 per cent between the ages of 18 and 25.

Projections made from the data indicated property crime cost Texans \$850 million in 1975, or \$98 per adult Texan.

"The public favors the idea of compensation of the victim, especially by the offenders. The public favors increasing the allocation of financial and personnel resources to juvenile offenders," the study showed.

It found that 45 per cent of all crime victims had sustained thefts, while 29 per cent had been burglarized.

Of the victims of violent crime, four-tenths of 1 per cent said they had been raped, 2.2 per cent had been assaulted with a weapon and 5.6 had been assaulted with fists or some other part of the body. Eleven per cent were robbed, which involves the threat of force.

Many crimes go unreported, the survey found.

ranging from 61 per cent of the thefts to 25 per cent of the auto thefts.

"Generally, assault with body is considered to be a potentially serious crime, but it was reported very infrequently. One must conclude that the victims do not consider this crime very serious. The volume of assaults and attempted assaults uncovered in this study was unexpectedly high. . . . The volume of assault victims and attempted assault victims was higher than anticipated. The volume of rape victims is also higher than anticipated," the report said.

Repeal of 'blue law' targeted

AUSTIN — Three representatives Thursday introduced legislation to repeal the state's "blue law."

The present law prohibits Texas stores selling on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays such items as kitchenware, clothing, household goods, and motor vehicles.

Rep. Craig A. Washington and Henry Alon of Houston and John Hostenbach of Odessa filed the repealer as HB 587. The three said repeal will benefit people who work on weekdays and must do their shopping on weekends.

Among other bills filed Wednesday was HB 589 by Rep. Arnold Gonzales of Corpus Christi to guarantee a duty-free lunch period for all Texas teachers.

TOWER OPPOSES LABOR APPOINTEE

WASHINGTON — Sen. John Tower Monday announced he will oppose confirmation of his state's only nominee to a cabinet post, F. Ray Marshall, the nominated secretary of labor.

Tower, in a briefing with Texas reporters, released a statement citing Marshall's views on collective bargaining for the military, repeal of right-to-work laws, and unionization of public and agricultural employees — Marshall has indicated varying degrees of support for all — as reasons for his opposition.

"Dr. Marshall is a candid and articulate speaker, but his views are directly contrary to those of the majority of American workers," Tower said in the statement.

Marshall, meanwhile was unavailable for comment. The Senate Monday scheduled five hours of debate on his nomination Wednesday morning. He is still expected to be easily confirmed by the large majority of Senate Democrats.

Tower said he would neither try to organize opposition to Marshall nor push for a filibuster against the Austin economics professor's confirmation.

Pickeral plentiful in East Texas

TYLER — Spring traditionally is the time when game fish spawn in Texas lakes, but the dead of winter — December, January and February — is when fishing is best for the chain pickerel, a toothy pike which spawns during the coldest weather of the year in East Texas.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fisheries biologist Joe Toole at Marshall says the pickerel are abundant in Caddo Lake on the Louisiana border and Lake O' the Pines just to the west.

According to Toole, just about anywhere on Caddo is a good pickerel fishing spot. At Lake O' the Pines, cold Hurricane, Johnson and Alley Creeks are likely spots.

Toole said pickerel generally are easier to catch than largemouth bass and most of the pike will average one to two pounds. Currently there is no bag or possession limit on the fish.

Check 1977 Crop Seed Labels

Farmers buying certified seed to plant their 1977 crop should pay particular attention to the labels on the seed bags—there's been a change.

"Certified seed sold after Jan. 1 next year must bear two labels—one certifying the variety and the other indicating a number of seed quality factors," points out Dr. Robert S. Metzger, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Whereas in the past, seed was certified for both variety and quality factors, the certification—now parallel only to the genetic factors—points out the farmer, since the seed law still requires that seed quality information be fruitfully stated, an analysis label must also accompany all certified seed, explains Metzger.

"The farmer label will tell the farmer such things as purity, inert matter, other crop seed, weed seed, noxious weed seed and germination," notes the Texas A&M University Systems specialist. "The fact that the seed is certified has nothing to do with these particular factors."

Metzger explains the new certification labeling this way. "Take cottonseed, for example. TAMCOT 5F27 sold as certified seed must bear a label (blue in color) that indicates that the seed is indeed the 5F27 variety. The certification label will show net weight, kind and variety and who produced the seed, but nothing on quality factors. A second label on the seed bag will list the various quality factors mentioned above and will tell the farmer the percentage that the seed contains, such as the per cent of weed seed.

"The main thing for farmers to remember when buying certified seed is to look at both labels on the seed bag," emphasizes Metzger. "Both labels must be checked to get the complete story on the seed."

The change in seed certification standards in Texas came about recently in an effort to assure a more dependable supply of certified seed and to give seedmen more flexibility in producing seed for different markets, explains the specialist. The change also establishes uniformity with the Federal Seed Act and encourages international seed trade.

Seed that is certified for genetic identity has been produced and processed under standards and procedures established by the Texas Seed and Plant Board and enforced by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

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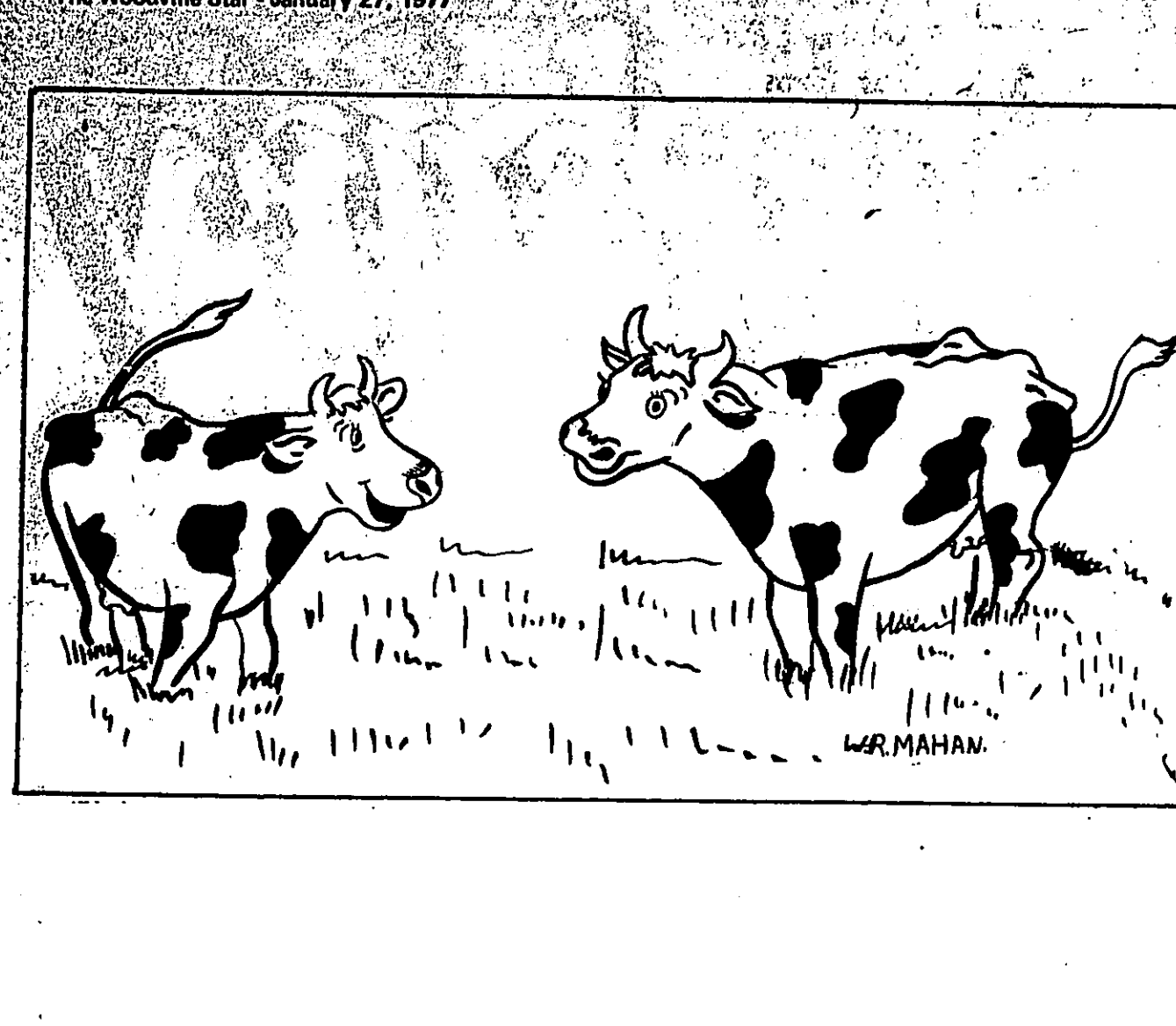

VEHICLE REGISTRATION TIME NEARING

Texas will begin registering their motor vehicles for fiscal 1977 Feb. 1.

Registration renewal notices will be in the mail soon, local tax office spokesman said.

Some vehicle registration renewal notices will arrive a little later this year. Usually they are mailed immediately after Christmas to facilitate postal distribution.

However, this year, inmates at the State Department of Corrections prison facilities at Huntsville are sorting by zip code all of the approximately 10 million renewal notices.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will save approximately \$90,000 in postage discounts for performing this service, which is contracted by the prison system.

The 1977 stickers will have a solid red background with white year figures and state name. The sticker serial number will be printed in blue in the upper right-hand corner.

Fiscal 1978 stickers had a blue background, white figures and red serial numbers in furtherance of the Bicentennial theme which will be continued in 1977.

Robert W. (Bob) Townsley, director of DBT's Motor Vehicle Division, said he anticipates less motorist confusion in affixing 1977 stickers to the metal license plates.

DBT first issued multi-year metal license plates in fiscal 1975. Last year was the first for attaching annual stickers to the plates.

"Although most motorists followed instructions and experienced no problems, others failed to read the instructions for affixing the stickers with some-inevitable results," Townsley commented.

The 1977 stickers will be applied to the depressed area in the upper right-hand corner of the REAR metal license plate, Townsley explained. The 1976 stickers should remain in its present location—the upper left-hand corner of the rear license plate.

Inmates of the Wynne Huntville make license plates, print stickers and prepare record-keeping materials for DHT and county tax assessors-collectors.

As previously, mail registrations will be accepted from vehicle owners for an additional fee between Feb. 1 and March 1. Motorists who wish to register their vehicles in person, can save time, clerks will continue to continue seasonally large and average about 22-24 per cent above the unusually low level of a year ago.

Deadline for having the stickers affixed is midnight April 1.

Above all, avoid lengthy registration lines by not waiting until the last minute to obtain 1977 stickers.

Said Townsley: "Motorists can ease the pain by heeding the Christmas warnings—shop early!"

Beginning in 1978, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will initiate a year-round licensing system with some registrations expiring each month thereafter.

This will mark demise of the half-century-old, 60-day registration periods and one-date deadlines for acquiring and affixing new stickers without penalty.

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TREE SCENES

TEXAS FOREST SERVICE

Being a forester, I am capably asked how to take care of this or that tree problem. These discussions usually begin in someone's front yard discussing a tree that is about dead. The conversation ends with my faithful statement, "If you had done that immediately after it happened, the tree would have been fine."

Like any living organism, a tree must be properly cared for or it will become diseased. It may lay its woody frame across your roof some stormy night.

Many tree problems start from wounds in the branches, trunk or roots. Unattended wounds may not heal properly, and an application of wound dressing is of little use without needed preparation. To treat the wound, remove dead wood from the damaged area, fertilize, and water the tree.

When limbs are snapped during high winds or ice storms, remove the damaged limbs flush with the trunk immediately. Failure to promptly remove the limb can result in internal decay that can kill or seriously degrade the tree. Paint over the stump of the limb with a tree dressing. Hitting a tree with a lawnmower is the most common wound to a trunk. When a trunk wound occurs, trim the loose bark around the wound. Dead or dying bark will decay and can lead to serious damage.

Root wounds usually occur from heavy construction near a tree. Roots are often accidentally cut or scarred allowing decay to form. Dying limbs are a symptom of root damage. Since the roots provide the water to the limbs, dying roots will produce an equivalent amount of dying branches.

The best treatment for roots is to prune the dying limbs, fertilize and water the tree in an effort to establish replacements for the dead parts of the root system. If dying limbs continue to appear, contact a professional tree expert or nurseryman for assistance.

Most yard tree problems can be prevented by thoroughly inspecting the trees every three months. Take care of any wounds or defects as soon as you find them.

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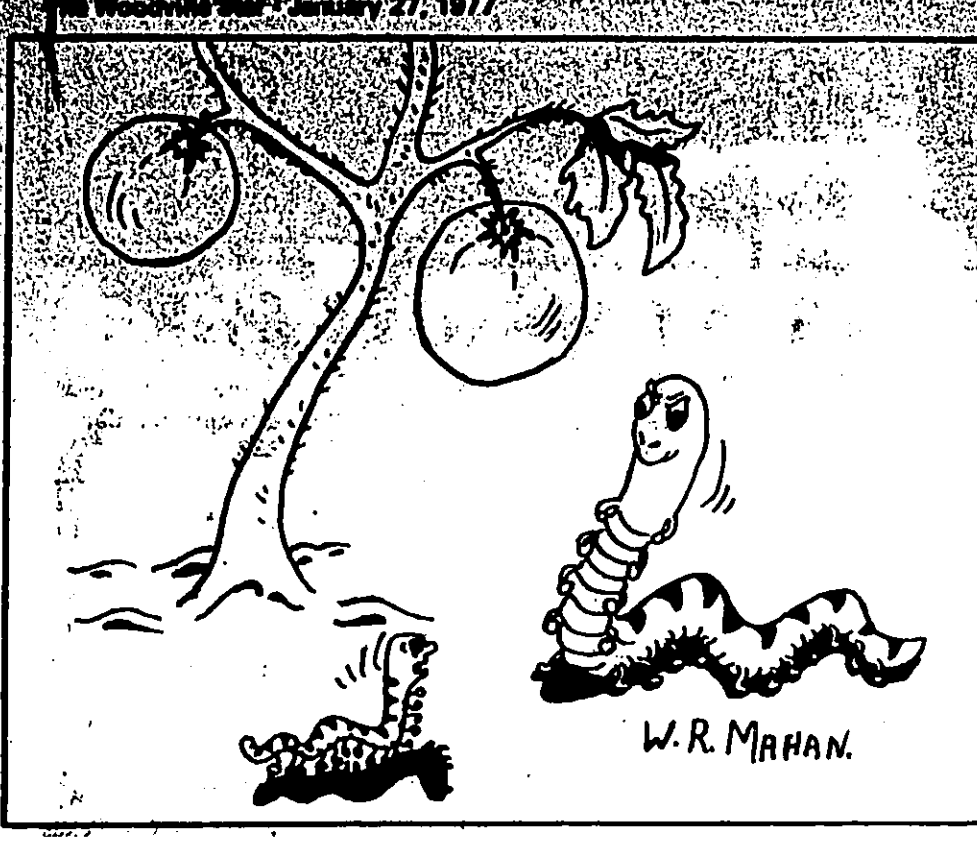
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Six Flags To Enlarge

ARLINGTON — A whirling, stomach-churning new thrill ride and a unique puppet show will highlight a \$6-million expansion program at Six Flags Over Texas. And, changes are being made to add thrills to the Texas Canteen Out-Parachute ride.

The new ride and show are being built on Skull Island to give that section, in the heart of the park, a total "new look." Skull Island was one of the original features in the park when it opened 17 seasons ago.

The new ride, the Spinnaker, consists of a giant wheel resting on its side with 21 gondolas dangling from the rim.

Each gondola can hold two persons securely locked inside. As the wheel begins to spin and pick up speed, the gondolas are flung outward and passengers suddenly find themselves in a wild-whirling parallel to the ground.

Stiffer laws for prostitution are proposed

AUSTIN — State Rep. Stan Schuster of Killam said he has filed legislation that would strengthen Texas prostitution laws.

Schuster's proposals include raising the offense for prostitution from a Class C misdemeanor to a Class B misdemeanor and clarifying the definition of a person who solicits for prostitutes.

"The problem is that the current law for prostitution is only \$200, and streetwalkers are making substantially more than that daily. A prostitute could be arrested, fined and be back on the street the same day. The only way to solve the problem is to make prostitution unprofitable by six months in jail and/or a fine of \$1,000 as a Class B misdemeanor," Schuster said.

Don Adams bills cleared by panels

AUSTIN — Senate committees already have cleared three bills by Sen. Don Adams of Jasper for floor action when senators return to work next week.

SB 97 makes changes in Senate procedures during impeachment proceedings.

It calls for cutting off pay of members when the Senate is in adjournment for more than four days during a trial and permits adjournment for non-adjourned periods of legal areas.

Adams' SB 30 eliminates the requirement that a child born out of wedlock must be listed as illegitimate on the birth certificate.

SB 29 provides for designation of Mission de los Ais in San Augustine County as an archeological site. — BY CAPITOL STAFF.

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'Happy Days' Top TV Show

The Nelson ratings on the top TV shows is in and the Associated Press has compiled their findings. Happy Days and Laverne and Shirley have walked away with the top two honors to put ABC in the network lead. The survey used for this rating ended January 9th.

The average national ratings for the week showed ABC with a 21.4 rating, representing 13.2 million homes, followed by NBC with a 20.2 rating, or 14.4 million homes, and CBS, 21.1 or 14.3 million.

Although ABC had five shows in the top 10, it also had the lowest-rated show, its "Justice on Trial" program on "ABC Close-up" Friday night.

"Who's Who" — a 50 Minutes' spinoff offered by CBS as an alternative to entertainment programming Tuesday night — turned up in 38th place, fourth from the bottom. Opposite "Happy Days" and "Laverne and Shirley" it was, however, only the first installment.

And "60 Minutes" on Sunday night continues to appear near the top opposite Walt Disney on NBC, and "The Young and the Restless" on ABC.

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People Disabled Since Childhood May Be Eligible for SSI Checks

People disabled since childhood may be eligible for supplemental security income payments (SSI) when they reach 18 regardless of their families' income, according to social security officials here.

"The SSI program makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 or over or blind or disabled.

"The payments can be especially important to young people who are severely retarded or have other handicaps that keep them from becoming self-supporting," a spokesman said.

"Eligible disabled people can get payments at any age," he said. "The eligibility of children under 18 can be affected by their parents' income and resources, but severely disabled people who remain unmarried are considered independent of their families starting at 18, or at 21 if they're in school.

"Starting then, they may be eligible for SSI payments if they have little or no income of their own," he said.

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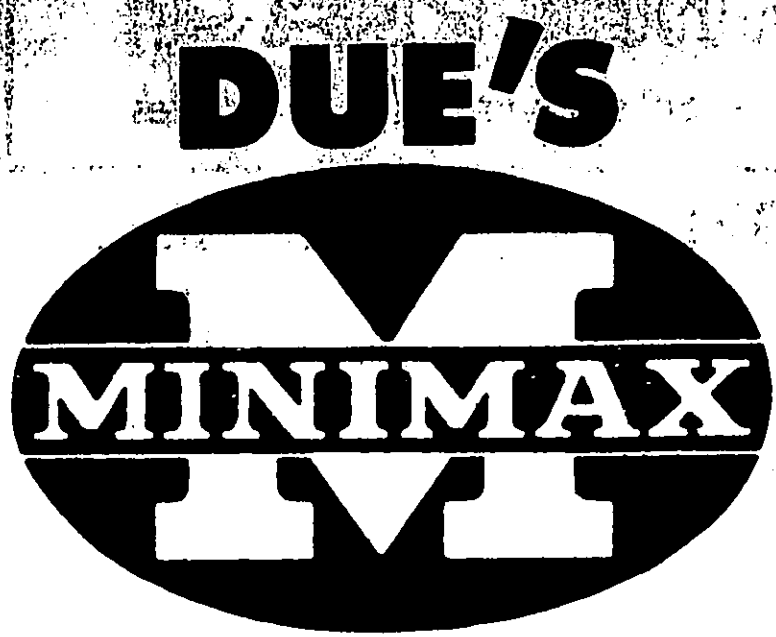
