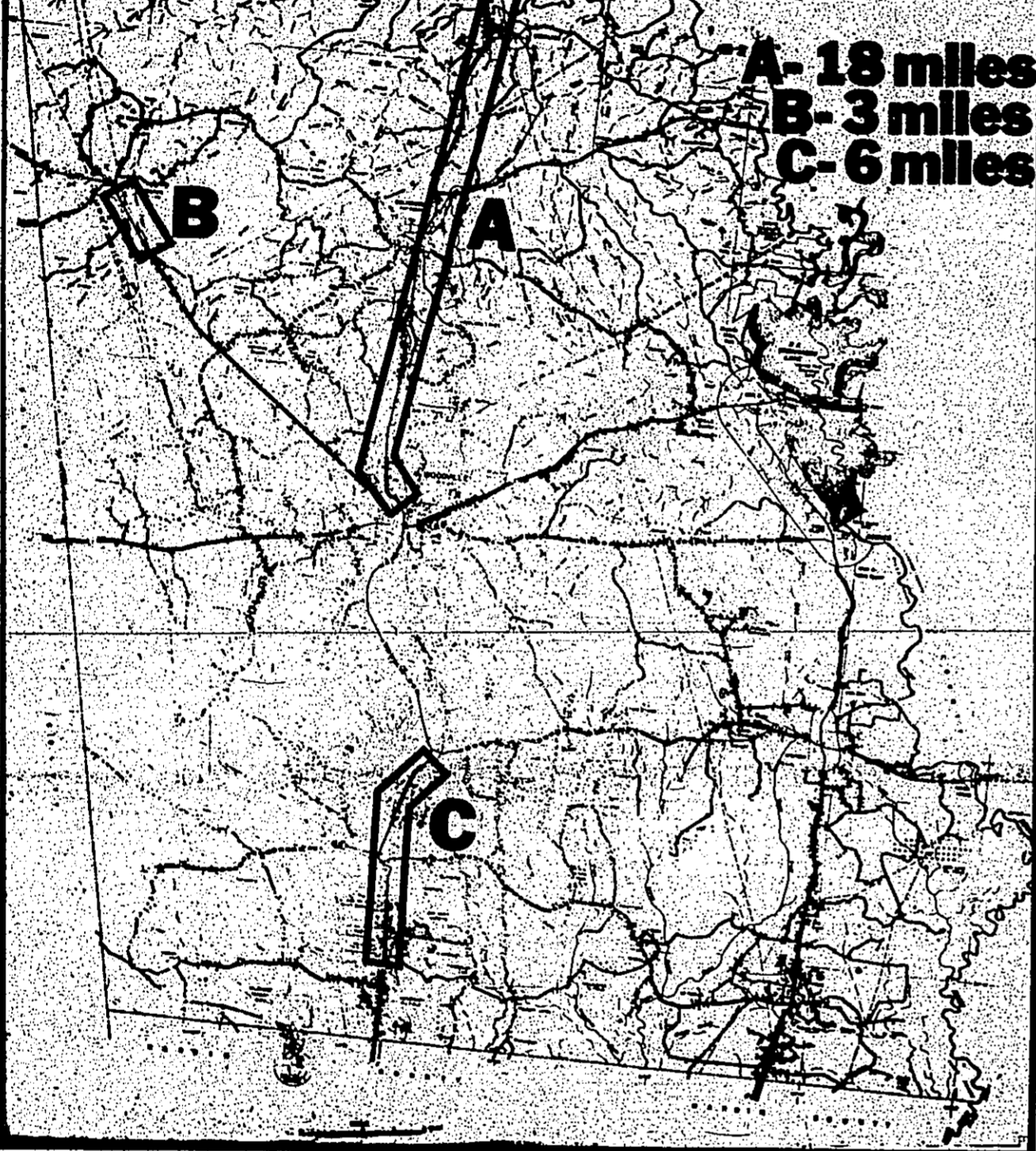

TYLER COUNTY BACKBONE ROADS DUE PRIORITY FUNDING

To Discuss County's Road Situation Road Man Here Monday

County Judge Allen Sturrock reported following a visit on Monday with the State Highway District 20 Engineer Frank C. Young in Beaumont that Tyler County holds a very high priority for state roadway improvement funding for what he termed as "backbone roads" in the county that are in need of repair.

Judge Sturrock along with Commissioner Precinct 1 Maxie Riley visited Young following a fatal two-car head-on collision on the Hillister bridge Wednesday, March 2, which resulted in one fatality with four others injured.

Young told the Tyler County representatives that Tyler County, since it had the majority of Level I "backbone roads" that needed improvement, should get funding first as soon as highway funds are cut loose from the states 3 billion surplus.

Frank C. Young District 20 State Highway Department Engineer of Beaumont is expected to appear before the Tyler County Commissioners and the general public at a meeting scheduled for Monday, March 14 at 1:00 p.m. in the Tyler County Courthouse. County Judge Sturrock has requested that Young appear to allow the Tyler County Commissioners to discuss with Young and allow some discussion about Tyler County roadway problems. Sturrock said that Young has agreed to come on that date and we invited anyone else who has questions about State Highway operations in Tyler County to be at that meeting.

Sturrock and Riley said that improvements would occur on Hwy 69 in an area north from Hickory Creek to Hillister then from the Woodville City limits to the Angelina County line through Rockland, which would include the Rockland bridge. Commissioner Riley and Judge Sturrock felt that these improvements alone would correct three major

safety considerations: A-the Hillister Bridge; B-the Warren Underpass, and the Rockland Bridge.

The plan also calls for improvements to about two miles of roadway south of Chester.

Judge Sturrock said that Young told them that "First money released goes to the backbone roads."

Sturrock said Young reported that "Tyler County

has more backbone than anyone else in the district." Riley said "The reason we went was to point up the importance of correcting the danger situation in Hillister specifically and to find out what we could do personally to help Young initiate the changes."

Sturrock and Riley said that they came back from the meeting convinced that Tyler County was in a "high

priority status with the district department, but that they wanted Young to speak before the Tyler County Commissioners and anyone else who has a question about state highways in Tyler County."

Sturrock said that some 4,800 cars, on the average travel Hwy. 69 "With increases on the weekend." That's a lot of traffic," he said.

Chamber Directors Vote Confidence

The Tyler County Chamber of Commerce met in a special called session Monday night, and in a "show of confidence" vote authorized Carl Nichols to continue speaking for Tyler County through the Chamber of Commerce regarding recent controversy created by Big Thicket Association head Maxine Johnson.

According to Nichols "All I'd like tonight is a show or a vote of confidence from the Chamber, and you as directors authorizing us to proceed on as we have been in the past few days."

The group commended Nichols for his efforts in defending Woodville and Tyler County's position regarding placement of visitor centers which would direct visitors to each of the Big Thicket units.

Nichols has initiated a write-in campaign directed toward the Superintendent of the Big Thicket National Parks Service Director Tom Lubbert, indicating favoritism of the NPS recommendation of Woodville as an appropriate location for the northernmost visitor location.

Nichols said "We don't want to be overconfident in assuming that there won't be

more said from Saratoga. Nichols said that March 31 was the final deadline for more input into the impact of the NPS plan but that we need to keep sending letters."

In other business Nichols reported to the group a proposal to buy books for resale through the Chamber. "To educate the traveling and touring public about the Big Thicket area and to make money for the Chamber through the sale of the books. Nichols said the books were oriented to the ecology of the thicket and were very complete and authoritative about this region of East Texas. Nichols said the initial investment from the Chamber amounted to \$175. He was authorized to proceed with the project on a motion by Jiggs Keneson and a second by Lawrence Upchurch.

Discussion about the raising and lowering of Dam-B lake levels was discussed and what effect it was having on the economy of the eastern part of Tyler County. Nichols referred to a recent letter sent to Corps of Engineers by Mrs. C.A. Williams which confronted that office with the question and the problem. One director commenting regarding tourist activity

"That it was a ghost now of what it used to be." The directors agreed to research the problem further.

In other Chamber business Nichols called for reports in the future from each Chamber Committee director ascertaining goals set this year by each committee. Nichols asked that reports be given at each meeting and that updates be given on progress made in each area of concentration.

Contracts Let

AUSTIN-Highway construction contracts let in February by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission include work in Orange, Jasper, Newton, Chambers, Liberty, Jefferson, Hardin and Tyler Counties.

Clinton B. Bond of Orange will be the department's engineer in charge of the work.

The contract was awarded to Chester R. Martin, Inc. of Henderson for \$428,957.45.

The project is for seal coat on Tyler County on FM 256 for approximately 3 miles and on FM 1746 for approximately 4 miles.

Dogwood Festival Offers 'Kicks' For Kickers

Considered one of the best "kicker" attractions in East Texas, the Western Weekend portion of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival promises "plenty of good action" says Tyler County's own "top kicker" Jim Clark. The 10 day long event which begins March 25, promises "to be bigger and better this year," he added.

Some 15 trailriding clubs will trek to Woodville for a Western Weekend Parade, Western dance and a wild

west rodeo. The riders will camp for parties and dances along the way on Friday night, March 25, at various midpoints along Tyler County's beautiful inroads to Woodville and the beginning of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival.

The 15 trailriding clubs will offer up to 100 to 250 individuals each with over 1,500 riders in all as participants in the Annual Dogwood Celebrations which starts off in a Western atmosphere. Clark promises the best

stock available including good bulls, good jumpin' horses, fast calves, and tough steers to wrestle during the rodeo which begins at 4 p.m. March 26, following the two hour parade.

The riders are expected to ride 5-hour straight Saturday morning covering some 17-20 miles and arriving in time for the start of the parade which spills into the rodeo arena at 4 p.m. Parade Chairman Lawrence Rainey indicated that only horse-drawn vehicles will be

allowed in the parade.

Rodeo entrants will be accepted on Friday, March 25, only from 8-12 noon, said Henry Joe Jordan, Rodeo Chairman. Stock is provided by the Dan Harris Cattle Company of Orange. Rodeo Entrants are reminded to call 713-883-8244 to sign up for each event.

A Dogwood Western Weekend Sweetheart will be chosen from the trailrider clubs entering the parade. Two runners-up will also be chosen. Connie Clark, co-

ordinator of the Sweetheart Contest will see that the girls are judged 25% on appearance, 25% on personality and 50% on riding ability. The girls will be judged immediately before the rodeo with the production company providing the judges. The Dogwood Western Weekend Sweetheart will be sponsored by the Dogwood Festival Western Committee to the Jasper Lions Club Rodeo.

Continuing in this year's Western Week activities is

included a Teenage Country and Western Dance set for Saturday night, March 26, from 8 till midnight. A 6-piece band from Beaumont, "Deepwater" will provide the music. The dance is scheduled to be held in the Kirby High Gym. The Adult Western Dance will be held in the Dogwood Inn Ballroom with music by Roger Mayo.

Trailriders expected to make the trek to Woodville this year will be The Lumbermen Trailriders, Allen's

Riding Arena, Jasper; Texas Saddle Club; Polk County Trailriders; Baytown Roughriders; Huntington; Tyler County Youth Riders; Tri-County Trailblazers, Beaumont; Dogers Riding Arena, Jasper; Dogwood Trailriders, Livingston; West Hardin Trailriders; and the Moscow-Corligan Trailriders.

Parents and lads are reminded that a big event for the youngsters will be the Goat Scramble. Co Chairmen Webb Ashworth and David

Farrell said, that goats will run in three age groups 0-5, 7-9, and 10, 11 and 12. Six trophies will be awarded in each category.

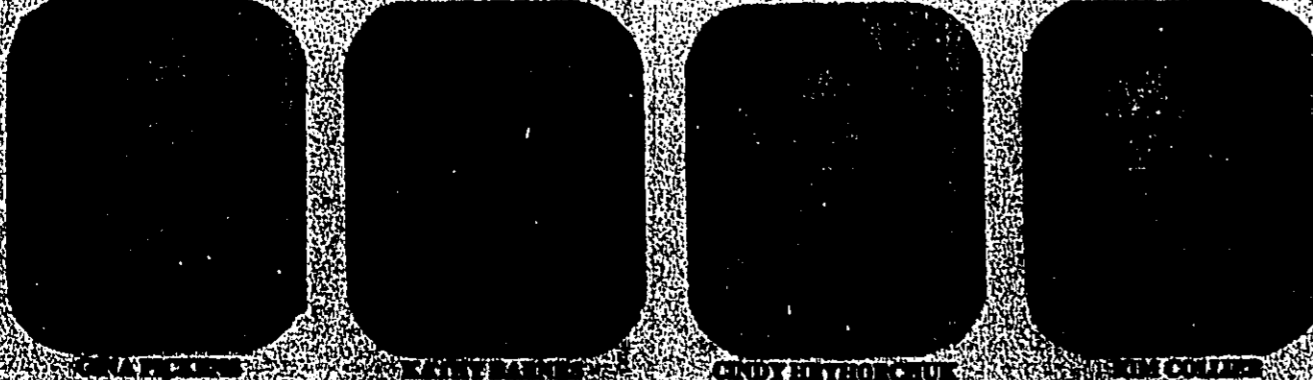
Chester's entry is brunette Kathy Barnes, an 18-year-old

Tips On Squirrel Care

What does livestock management and squirrel management have in common? How successful would one be managing a herd of cattle without knowing something about nutritional and water requirements, reproduction and disease? Without applying this knowledge, it would be doubtful if many cows would be left after a while.

Good squirrel management requires about the same kind and amount of knowledge. Let us look at about squirrels.

In East Texas we have both the fox and gray squirrel. The gray squirrel is restricted mainly to the wetter bottoms with a heavy timber stand.

A mixture of mature elm, beech, pecan, maple and oaks is the preferred habitat of squirrels. Acorns are the mainstay food and are most important in the fall and winter. Left over acorns, insects, buds, fruits and seeds are used in spring and summer.

Squirrels usually produce two broods a year, one in mid-summer and one in late winter. On an average, broods will contain 2 to 3 young. The young are helpless at birth, almost naked, blind and are slow to develop making them subject to predation and other types of mortality for longer periods of time.

Maintaining or increasing good squirrel populations of a squirrel to one or two acorns can be obtained by using several management tools.

Since acorns are the mainstay food of squirrels, it is important to maintain oaks at least 10 inches in diameter. Oaks of this size are mature enough to produce acorns. Most oaks do not produce an acorn crop each year. Therefore, a variety of oaks will increase the likelihood that some acorns will be produced each year.

Livestock compete some with squirrels in the spring and summer for such food items as new buds, fruits and seeds. Proper stocking of woods with livestock will reduce this competition to a minimum.

Reproduction is 2 1/2 times more successful in tree cavities than in leaf nests. When hardwoods are being thinned, retain as many hollow trees as possible. Nest boxes are readily used by squirrels. These are suitable substitutes for hollow stands of hardwoods too young to have cavities. Detailed plans for nest boxes can be obtained from the Soil Conservation Service.

Bass Tournery Results In

AUSTIN—Although registration declines, three popular East Texas bass lakes drew again the attention of fishermen's attention in 1976, according to a survey conducted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Data surveys were based on 902 reported tournaments held by 153 bass clubs in 68 reservoirs around the state. The three most popular lakes, as has been the case for the last several years, were Livingston, Toledo Bend and Sam Rayburn. The three East Texas impoundments accounted for 1,028 tournaments, again were the most popular tournament lakes. Lake Belton was the most popular tournament fishing lake outside the East Texas area.

The number of trophy-sized catches was down in 1976, said Paul Seldensticker, P&W fisheries biologist. Trophy-sized bass are those weighing six pounds or more. Biggest bass landed during 1976 tournament competition were 9.8-pound lunkers taken from Lakes Conroe and Falcon, with landings of seven-pound fish or better reported from 26 lakes around the state.

The study objective is to determine harvest, fisherman success and harvest of trophy bass for tournaments in public waters of the state. The survey also will aid fisheries biologists in determining further declines or increases in the bass population of a given lake. Seldensticker pointed out.

Although Toledo Bend, Rayburn and Livingston again had the total harvest and number of tournaments, both figures for 1976 were down from 1975. Only three lakes, McQueeney, Houston County and Palestine, had an estimated tournament harvest of more than one trophy pound per acre. Other lakes with good harvest figures included Lakes Belton, Whitney, Fairfield, Casa Blanca, Leon and Tyler.

Lake O' the Pines, Amistad, Waxahatchee, Whitney and Falcon rounded out the top 10 most popular tournament lakes in 1976. Lake McQueeney, outside San Antonio, registered the largest increase in harvest from 15 pounds per acre in 1975 to 1.44 pounds per acre in 1976. The high harvest lakes for 1975, Houston County and Casa Blanca, showed sizeable decreases in '76, however both maintained excellent harvest figures.

According to the survey, average weight of black bass taken during tournament ranged from .89 pounds at Lake Martin Creek to 3.79 pounds at Narworthy in West Texas. Martin Creek had only one reported tournament, while Narworthy had three.

Livingston, Toledo Bend and Palestine produced the most bass over six pounds, but there remained a general decrease in the number of trophy-sized bass taken in the three heaviest lakes. In order to harvest a six-pound or better fish at Toledo Bend in 1976, it took 435 angler-hours, compared to 1,581 angler-hours in 1976.

Narworthy exhibited the best catch of trophy bass per angler hour, with one trophy landed for every 110 angler-hours of fishing.

According to Seldensticker, other exceptional trophy bass reservoirs were Murvaul, Tyler, Oak Creek, Conroe and Falcon. Lake Somerville, site of 21 reported tournaments, had the greatest fisherman effort with a rate of 5,589 angler-hours per trophy bass.

Tournament fishing surveys will be conducted biennially starting in 1978 to supplement existing data. Old biologists in detecting fish population trends, in any given tournament lake.

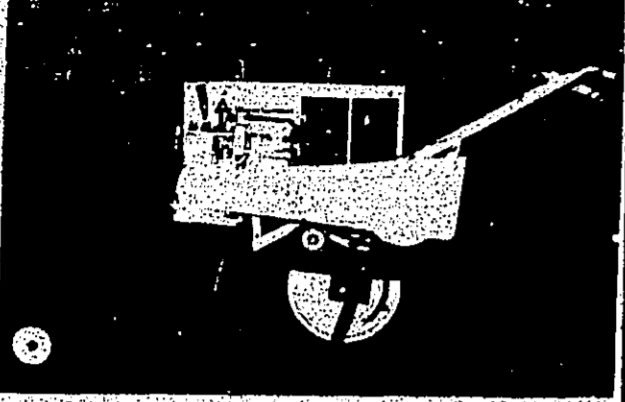

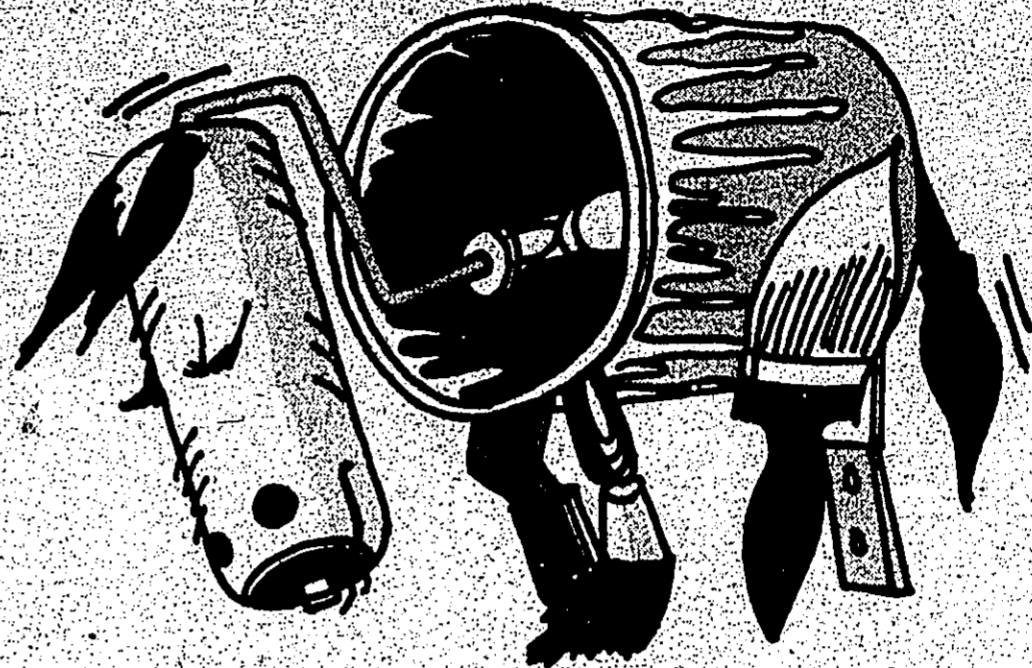
