Region 5 Rodeo

Then the top four to qualify will represent Region V at the State High School Rodeo Finals held at Hallettsville, Texas, the third week in June. From there, the top four will represent Texas at the Nationals to be held in Helena, Montana, August 16-21, 1977.

Mrs. Willa D. Coe of Kountze is the Regional Director for 34 counties in the Eastern part of Texas. The next Region V Qualifying Rodeo will be April 1-2, April 15-16, 1977, at the Amelia H. Local Visiting Nurses Provide Special Care

A visit with the visiting nurses to see a patient, Elizabeth Colton, who lives in the Smith Feagan section of Kountze was an inspirational experience as well as educational. R.N., Billie Sirmans, and L.V.N., Pat Bertrand, are two of the visiting nurses associated with the Texas Home Health, Inc. in Silsbee.

Texas Home Health, Inc. visiting nurse service, is a private, non-profit organization which provides special care for elderly and handicapped persons homebound who can benefit from nurses on a visiting basis. They work strictly under doctor's orders and instructions. Among those in this area is the one in Silsbee with Sidney L. Dauphin as executive director. Located at 580 North Sixth Street, it employs seven nurses—three registered and four licensed vocational nurses. Other offices are located in Cleveland, Jasper, Kirbyville, Lufkin, Livingston, and Woodville, and are directed by Mr. Dauphin and wife, Charlene.

Patients do not have to be bedridden to acquire these services according to Billie Sirmans, registered nurse and employee of the Silsbee unit. A normal inability to leave home must exist for a person to be considered a home-bound patient, but he does not have to be bedridden. The patient

may be classed as home-bound if his absences from the home are necessary and for short durations only. "We usually care for the elderly, but we work with anyone that is handicapped," Mrs. Sirmans explained.

A visiting schedule is set up for each patient under doctor's care. The doctor provides a treatment plan for the nurse to follow. "Regular hours are from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, but we will go when needed, any time of the day or night," Mrs. Sirmans explained further. Serious symptoms are recognized in time to send the patient to the hospital and save his or her life according to Pat Bertrand, L.V.N.

"Besides providing regular medical care, visiting nurses teach family members how to care for the patients. Members of the family learn how to prepare dietetic meals; bathe the patients, provide physical therapy, give insulin or other injections. As soon as the patient is able and the family has learned to care for him, the patient is discharged from our services," Mrs. Sirmans stated.

The Home Health Service permits a person to live at home and operate within his own personal limitations, rather than being forced to live at a nursing home. It also prevents the patient from making weekly or daily trips to the hospital in order to be properly cared for.

The supper was a great success. The response was so great, the Dam B Volunteer Fire Department is now \$750 nearer their goal.

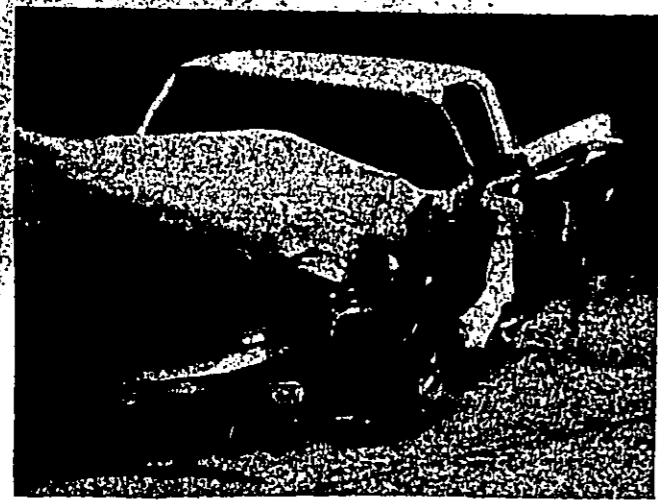
Gospel singing at Warren

Man dies in Spurger crash



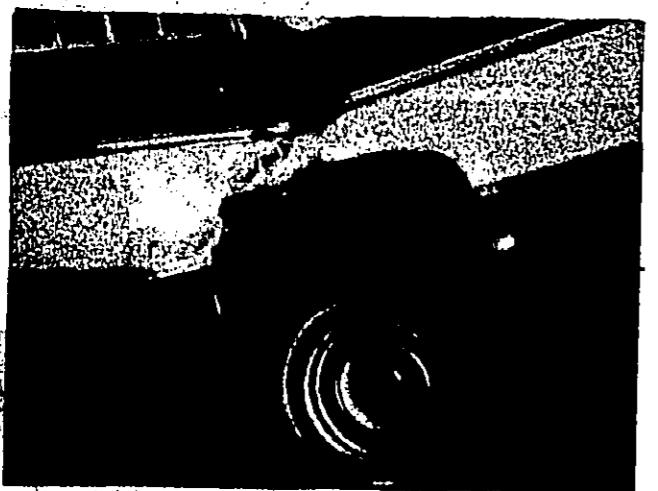
ENIS VEHICLE

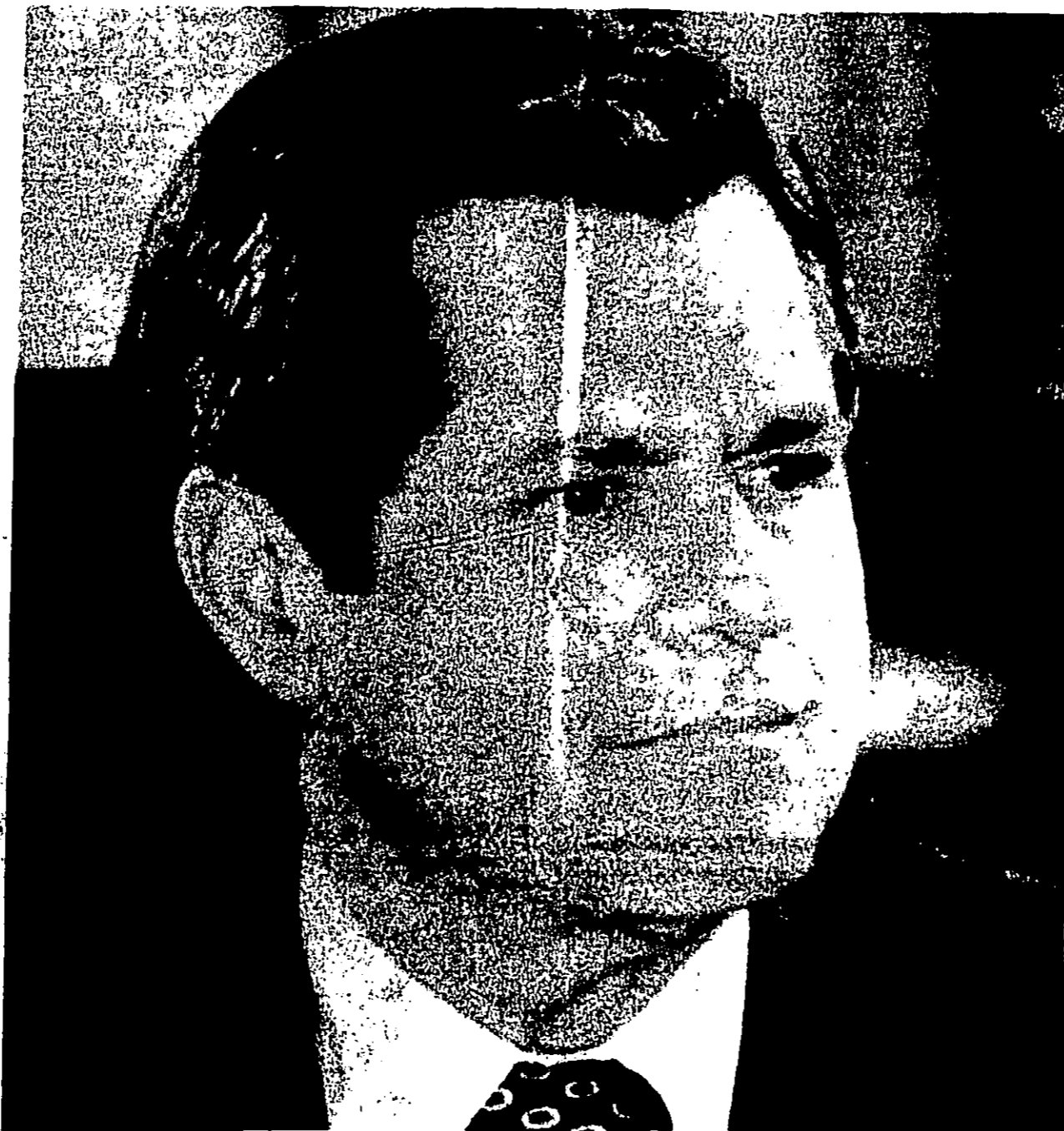

The head of the largest and greatest monopoly, Ivan Krugger, died a suicide.

The president of the Bank for International Settlements, Leon Fraser, died a suicide.

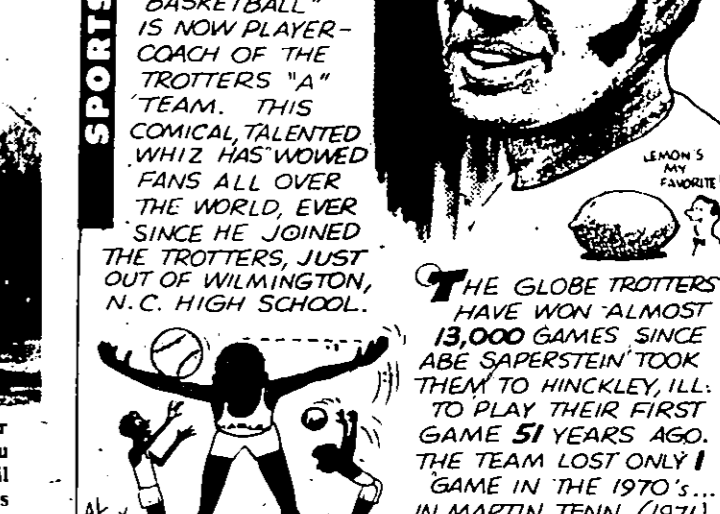

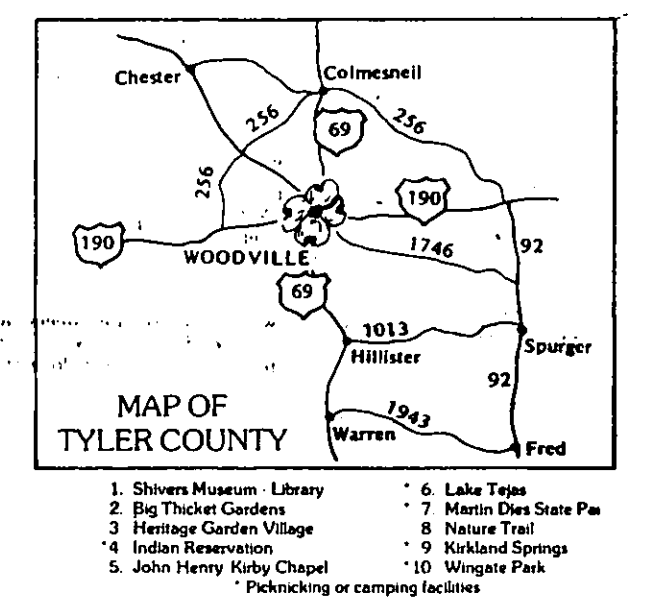
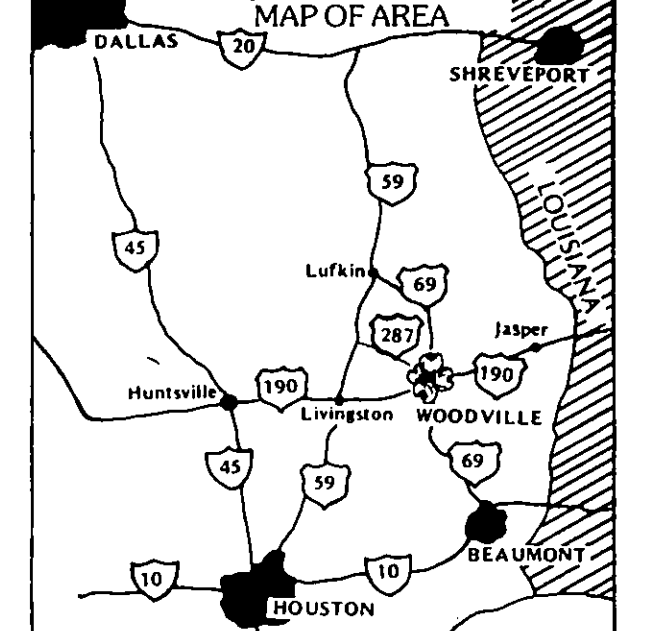
PARADE - Featuring 1800 or more riders, with their wagons, buggies and oxen, the parade is full of excitement. Each trail ride is distinctive in its own style.

Knievel is Not the Only Evil With Motorcycles

With automobiles becoming more and more expensive to buy and gasoline threatening to be harder and harder to get, the motorcycle has taken over. Not just among teenagers either. There's a new chopper being piloted by men and women past fifty.

If it is a clue to popularity, it is only appropriate that Evel Knievel and all the other motorcycle dare-devils should make their mark on American culture. What is tragic, however, is that the motorcycle is also making its mark on traffic statistics related to the killed and injured. With the popularity of the motorcycle has come an epidemic of accidents, which spell tragedy, disability and pain in un-proportioned proportions.

Talk to a motorcycle buff and he will tell you that "This is the safest mode of transportation in the world," that only "negligent riders" have to worry and that "you haven't lived until you feel the wind in your face and the road at your fingertips." But the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports indicate that in the past decade motorcycle deaths have increased by about 500%. The National Safety Council says that on a mile-for-mile basis, the motorcycle is far more hazardous than riding in a car. The motorcycle death rate is approximately 17 per 100 million miles of travel, while the overall rate for motor vehicles is about 4.5 per 100 million miles.

The death rate due to motorcycle accidents doesn't begin to give the real significance of the problem. Nor do the long lists of fractures and life-threatening spinal or head injuries, tragic as they may be. Doctors of chiropractic and other physicians who specialize in orthopedic problems are also concerned about the effects motorcycle mishaps have on the cyclist who has an encounter and is able to walk away. There are many thousands of unreported acci-

ents in which the rider remains a stationary or moving object or merely falls off his bike. These are traumatic twisting and bumping incidents that at their very least may injure the spine and force a structural and/or functional imbalance.

But cyclists have a tendency to be bold and brave, almost to the point of foolhardiness. This has been nourished by the image of Evel Knievel. They figure if they can walk away in one piece, they are okay.

What they don't know is that they may have suffered a neurological or orthopedic injury that could eventually affect the function of vital organs.

There is no doubt that the risk quotient of riding a motorcycle on streets and highways that are predominantly traveled by heavy vehicles is far greater than any other modern mode of travel. But to a dyed-in-the-wool motorcyclist, talk of risk is pure banality. Therefore, there is only one other way to cope with the problem—increased awareness.

The motorcyclist must be aware of the importance of correct-fitting protective gear, particularly helmets. The driver must be aware of the importance of defensive driving techniques, never using his skill for daredevil feats or to match his speed and maneuverability against the automobile. Last, and just as important—is an accident occurs, no matter how minor, the rider should seek immediate attention, including a comprehensive chiropractic examination of the spine, pelvis, neck and limbs.
