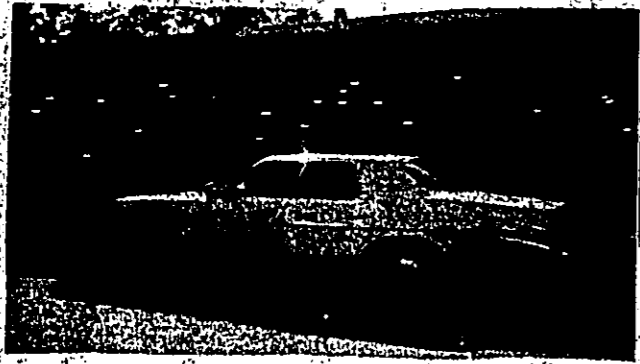

## Presents County With Minibus

On Thursday, March 17, 1977, Mr. Bob Girard of Farmers Union Community Development Association, Inc. of Waco, Texas, presented Tyler County with a brand new mini bus. This bus is provided under the Rural Transportation Program for the purpose of providing transportation for the elderly of rural Texas, who cannot transport themselves for medical, nutritional or educational necessities. The program is administered by Farmers Union Community Development Association, Inc.

Under the Rural Transportation Program, the bus is provided at absolutely no additional charge to the County. It is furnished, maintained, and fueled, completely free of charge, until October 1, 1977. At that time, it becomes the property of Tyler County.

The old bus, which was a 1974 model with slightly more than 50,000 miles on it, was turned over to Farmers Union in exchange for the new bus.

Mr. Girard drove the new bus, which is an air conditioned, 12-passenger (11 passengers and the driver), green Dodge Sportman, from Waco and presented it to The Rev. Jesse Adams, who accepted the bus on behalf of the Mini-Bus Program of Tyler County.

Among those present for the presentation, in addition to Rev. Adams, were county treasurer Austin Fuller, county auditor Ann Fondren, and Mr. Barnes, driver of the mini bus.

## PROTECTING YOUR HEART

**A Guide To Sensible Eating**

Since diet is one of the risk factors associated with coronary heart disease, many people are restricting their intake of saturated fat and cholesterol. Modified fat lunches and dinners are being planned, offering a unique challenge to home-makers.

Could you suggest some interesting luncheon entrees which are low in saturated fat and cholesterol? Consider a colorful vegetable plate. Most vegetables contain very little fat and no cholesterol. They are excellent sources of vitamins and minerals. Cut an acorn squash in half, fill each cavity with a small amount of orange juice and brown sugar. Bake until tender. Put the squash in the center of a plate and surround it with radiating carrot strips, asparagus spears and cold filled green beans. Experiment with melted corn oil margarine and herb combinations to perk up familiar vegetables.

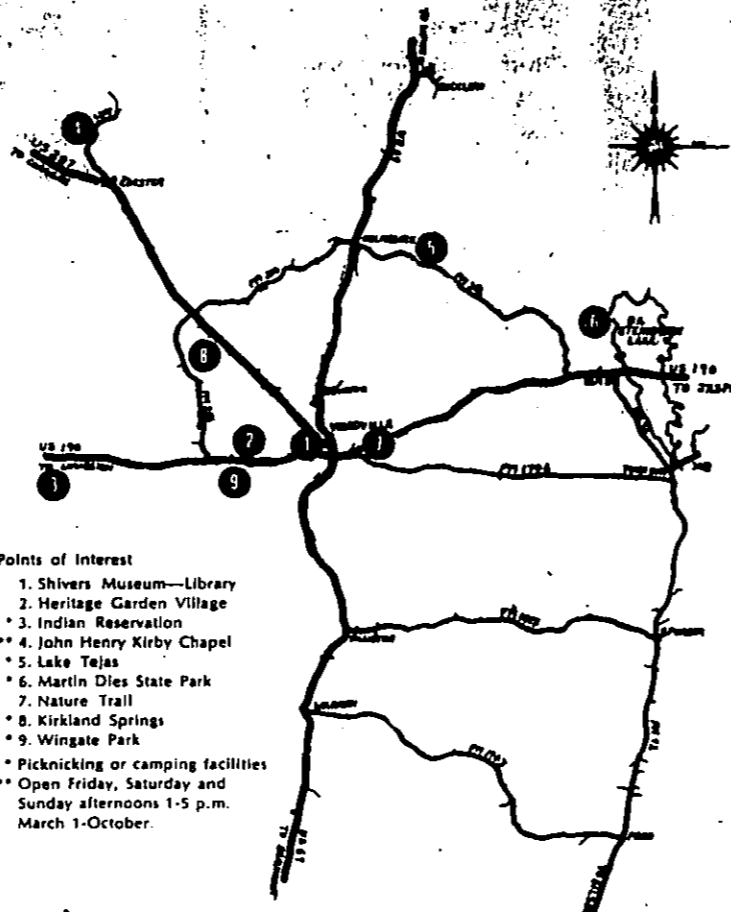

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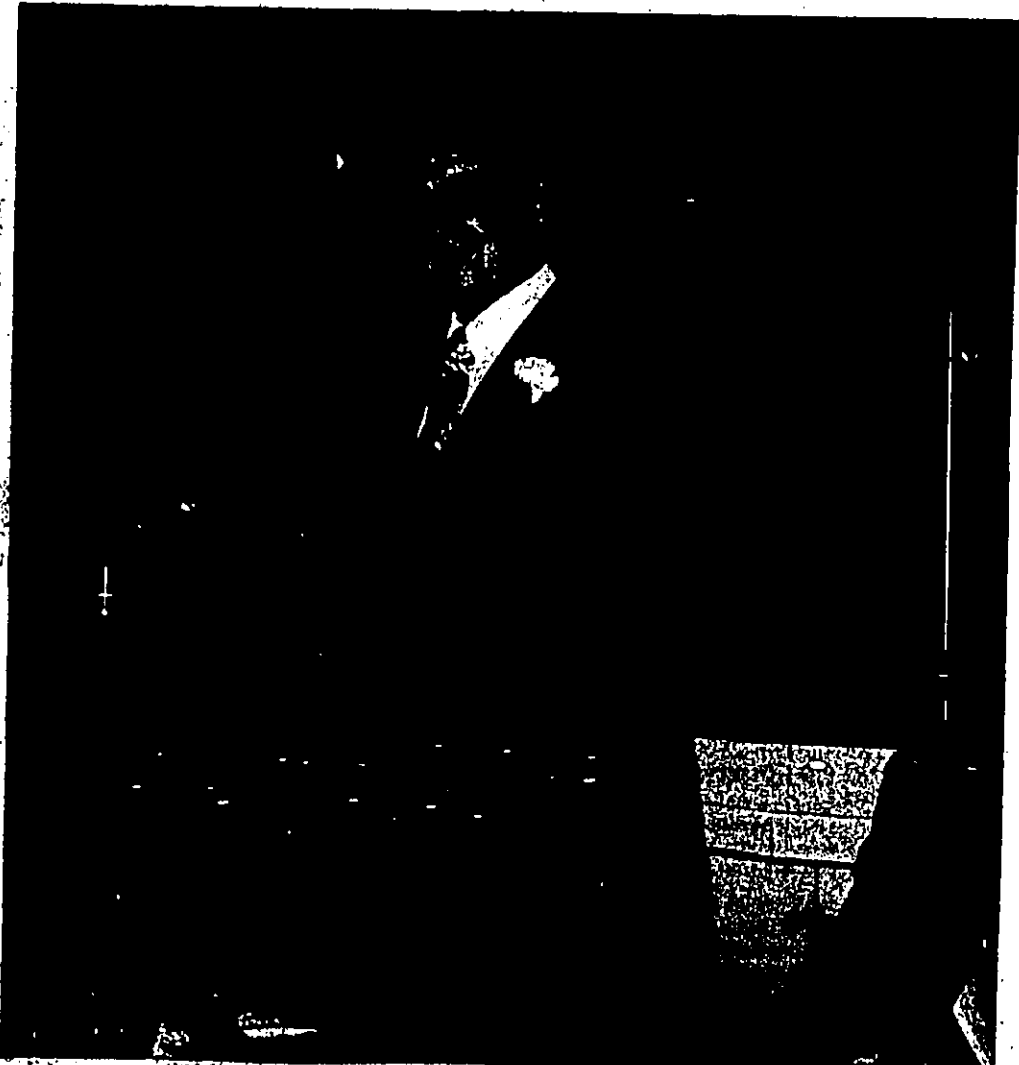

### 'Reprehensible' Excuse Looms As Insufficient

KOUNTZE — Even before the school board returned its 6-1 decision not to renew head coach Ted Tate's contract Monday night, a Texas Classroom Teachers Association attorney representing Tate said he would appeal the case to the state education commissioner.

"These people don't even follow their own procedure," TCTA lawyer Ed Mason said while the board was out deliberating Tate's contract.

During a public hearing for Tate, attended by about 500 citizens, Mason had Supt. Rodney LeBoeuf turn to the school board policy book and read the reasons given for firing a teacher or not renewing a teacher's contract.

LeBoeuf said he was basing his recommendation not to renew the contract on Rule 4, which states a teacher may lose his contract if he is mentally or physically incapable of service, or "engages in immoral or reprehensible conduct." Tate's "failure to correct a deliberate false statement," LeBoeuf said, was reprehensible.

"The most low blow," Mason said during the break, "and the most chicken thing of all is to deem this man reprehensible."

In other types of dismissals, according to the policy book, a teacher must formally be given warning before his contract is not renewed. A list of deficiencies must be presented with a chance given to correct them, then, if the problems continue, another written statement must be issued and the teacher given a hearing before the board.

After LeBoeuf recommended to the school board last week Tate's contract be dropped, he gave a letter to the coach saying statements Tate had made in the Kountze News and the Beaumont newspapers had instigated the problem.

Monday, he pinpointed the item to which he most objected. It was the first sentence in a prepared statement from Tate, printed in full in the Feb. 3 issue of the Kountze News.

"On Friday, Jan. 28, 1977, it was revealed to me by Supt. Rodney LeBoeuf that he did not expect me to return as a coach in the Kountze school system after his school year."

whereby Coach Tate should be let go. Why does this seemingly obvious answer seem to elude us all? Surely, there must be another reason which has not come to light. We will continue to wonder.

That is what LeBoeuf had referred to in his letter when he accused, Tate of "deliberate gross misrepresentation of the truth," LeBoeuf said Monday.

The superintendent said he had not intended Tate to consider himself out of the Kountze school system at the time.

"It was revealed to me," Tate explained his statement. "That was my impression."

At the same meeting, LeBoeuf had told Tate he planned to hire an athletic director, who would be in charge of assigning his own coaching staff.

Tate said the way he understood it, "some guy from Timbuktu was coming in" and would decide Tate's future as a coach after 15 years with the district.

In two subsequent meetings, LeBoeuf wrote in the letter, "I have told you I felt the situation could be resolved if you corrected your misrepresentation of the facts. However, you have not seen fit to do this."

"If I had to retract any of those statements," Tate said Monday, "I'd have to lie."

Both men were speaking under oath as they were questioned by Mason and Beaumont attorney Bob Keith, representing the school board.

"He never said 'correct the false impression,'" Tate said of LeBoeuf. "He said I could correct it through the news media. I asked him how, and he said, 'Use your own judgment.'"

Another of LeBoeuf's objections, he said, was to statements Tate made saying LeBoeuf had "reprimanded" him for criticism of planned athletic facilities quoted in an earlier edition of the Kountze News.

"I recall when I reprimand someone," LeBoeuf said Monday. He said he had told Tate he didn't like the statements, and said Tate agreed he'd been hasty with some of them.

But Tate quoted LeBoeuf telling him, "I felt like you came on strong. They (the statements) were unprofessional, inflammatory and I did not like it at all."

Tate said he considered that a reprimand.

### Bill Will 300 Fans Rally At Board Meet For Coach Limit Info

AUSTIN, Tex. — All bureaucrats could trade the public's right to know for federal funds under a bill introduced in the Texas Legislature.

Paradoxically, the provision is part of a bill that also contains features designed to give Texans greater access to government records.

Atty. Gen. John Hill's staff wrote the bill, and it was introduced by Rep. Ben Z. Grant, D-Marshall.

It would add a provision to the open records act saying that information could be withheld if its disclosure would "cause the denial of funds, services or essential information from the United States government which otherwise would definitely be available to a governmental body."

The same bill would allow judges to make government bodies pay the lawyer fees of citizens who successfully sue them for access to records. And it would eliminate criminal penalties — up to six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine — for bureaucrats who release documents that are held confidential by the act.

More than 300 Kountze school patrons attended the meeting of the Kountze school trustees March 15 in the high school auditorium where a large crowd could be accommodated, as interest in the "Dump Tate" campaign by the school board and administration, is very high.

The Board held an open general business session, seated on the stage for a period of time. Then, they went into closed session for about twenty minutes to discuss disciplinary measures for a student. They returned briefly, then went backstage, again, to discuss personnel. After about three-fourths of an hour, they were onstage again.

Supt. Rodney LeBoeuf announced that Coach Tate's contract would not be renewed, either as a teacher or as a coach. A list of all teachers to be rehired, from high school to primary, was read. One or more of the teachers are retiring.

Following this, several persons were allowed to speak. C.R. "Buddy" Moore spoke on Tate's record during the seven minute period he was allowed. He pled for the reasons for Tate's dismissal. None were given. Allen Hodge spoke briefly in favor of

Tate. Jim Alford spoke against Tate's athletic program, citing alleged neglect of lower grades. During the meeting, pro and anti Tate factions were identifiable by applause and comments at various phases of the proceedings.

LeBoeuf announced that a public hearing would be held March 21 at 7 p.m. in the school auditorium. At that time, Tate would have an opportunity to answer any charges which may have been leveled at him.

LeBoeuf told an area sportscaster that he had given Tate the reasons for not renewing the contract and that it would be up to Tate whether he revealed them or not.

Whether trouble was expected or not is not known. However, the sheriff and two deputies were present.

One person attending summed up the feelings of outraged frustration many feel about the situation. "If they would just tell us what it is all about. If we knew, we might feel different; but we don't know anything!"

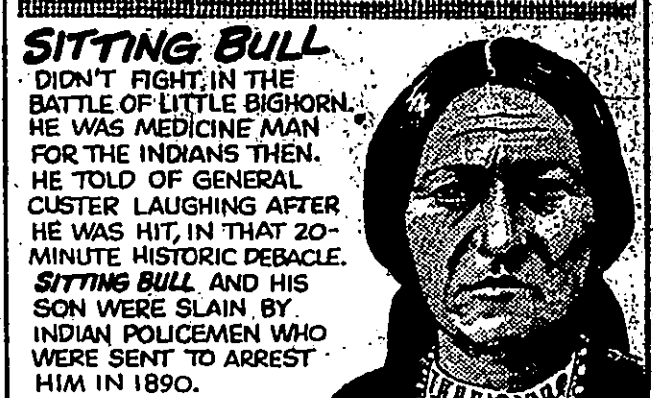

### TATE TO APPEAL BOARD DECISION

KOUNTZE — Ted Tate saw his career at Kountze High School come to an apparent end Monday night but immediately after the Kountze School Board voted 6-1 not to renew his contract, Tate said, "We're gonna appeal it to the State Board of Education."  
Momsies later that, Tate made his way across to Supt. Rodney LeBoeuf who had recommended that Tate no longer be employed in Kountze, and said, "The thing about it is that you're leaving and you're taking my job with you." LeBoeuf shook his head and walked away.  
"It's not over," said Tate. "We're gonna appeal this thing."  
The more than three hour meeting produced for the first time the specific reason why Tate was not recommended for retention.  
LeBoeuf said that Tate had been guilty of "reprehensible conduct, specifically the failure to correct false statements in the public press."  
That, according to LeBoeuf, was the "sole reason" for Tate's dismissal.  
The statement cited by LeBoeuf was published in the Feb. 1 edition of the Enterprise when Tate said he believed he was "out" as the head coach of Kountze. LeBoeuf said he was more upset that the statement had not been corrected than he was about the statement.  
"That's the first time he's ever pinpointed one statement," said Tate. "I asked him before what I could do. He said 'use your own judgment.'"  
During the hearing, LeBoeuf said Tate's reputation as a head coach was "good," although LeBoeuf said he had never observed him "tate coaching."  
Tate's attorney Edgar A. Mason, who is a representative of the Classroom Teachers Association, asked LeBoeuf: "You've never seen him coaching?"  
LeBoeuf replied, "You don't coach at a game."  
Several witnesses were called in Tate's behalf, including Silsbee basketball head coach Fred Williams, who said he thought Tate was "an excellent coach. I have all the admiration in the world for him," said Williams.  
Another witness was Bill Conway, Tate's assistant for six years. "I would say his coaching abilities are excellent," said Conway of Tate. "He has not shown immoral or unethical conduct to my apparent knowledge. He has spoken the truth as far as I know."  
Still, the board chose to back LeBoeuf, who has been in contact with the AAM Consolidated school system in College Station about taking a job as principal, although he says he has not been offered a job yet.  
"We are going to evaluate procedural alternatives right now," said Mason. "We'll decide what we're going to do the latter part of this week or next week, then do it. It is indicated the appeal would be filed within 30 days."

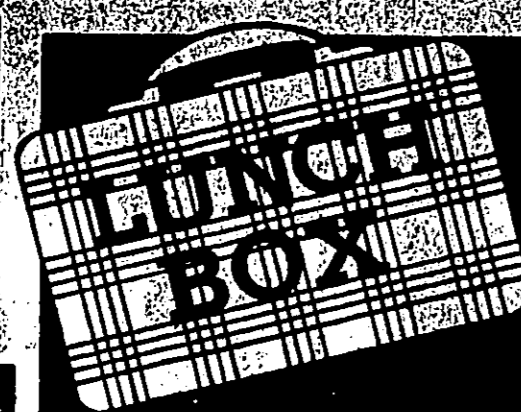

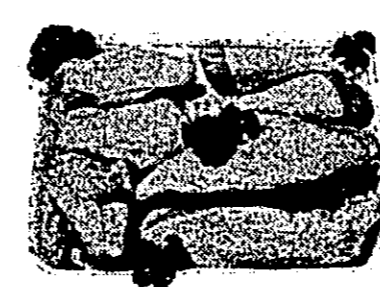

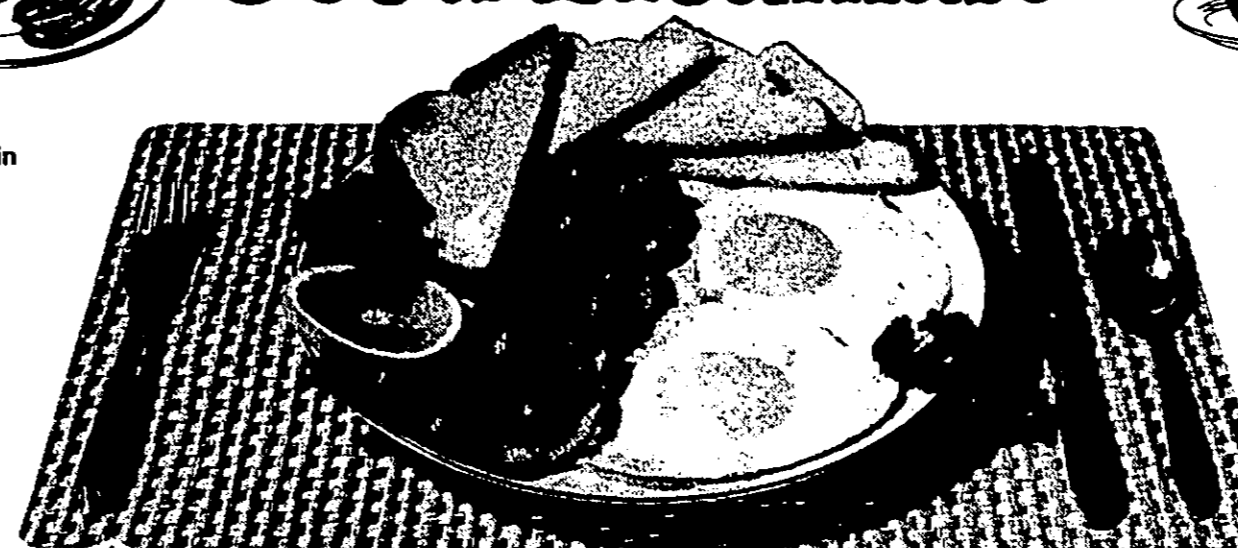

MAGIC TRICKS From The Shell-Lewis-Magic Club

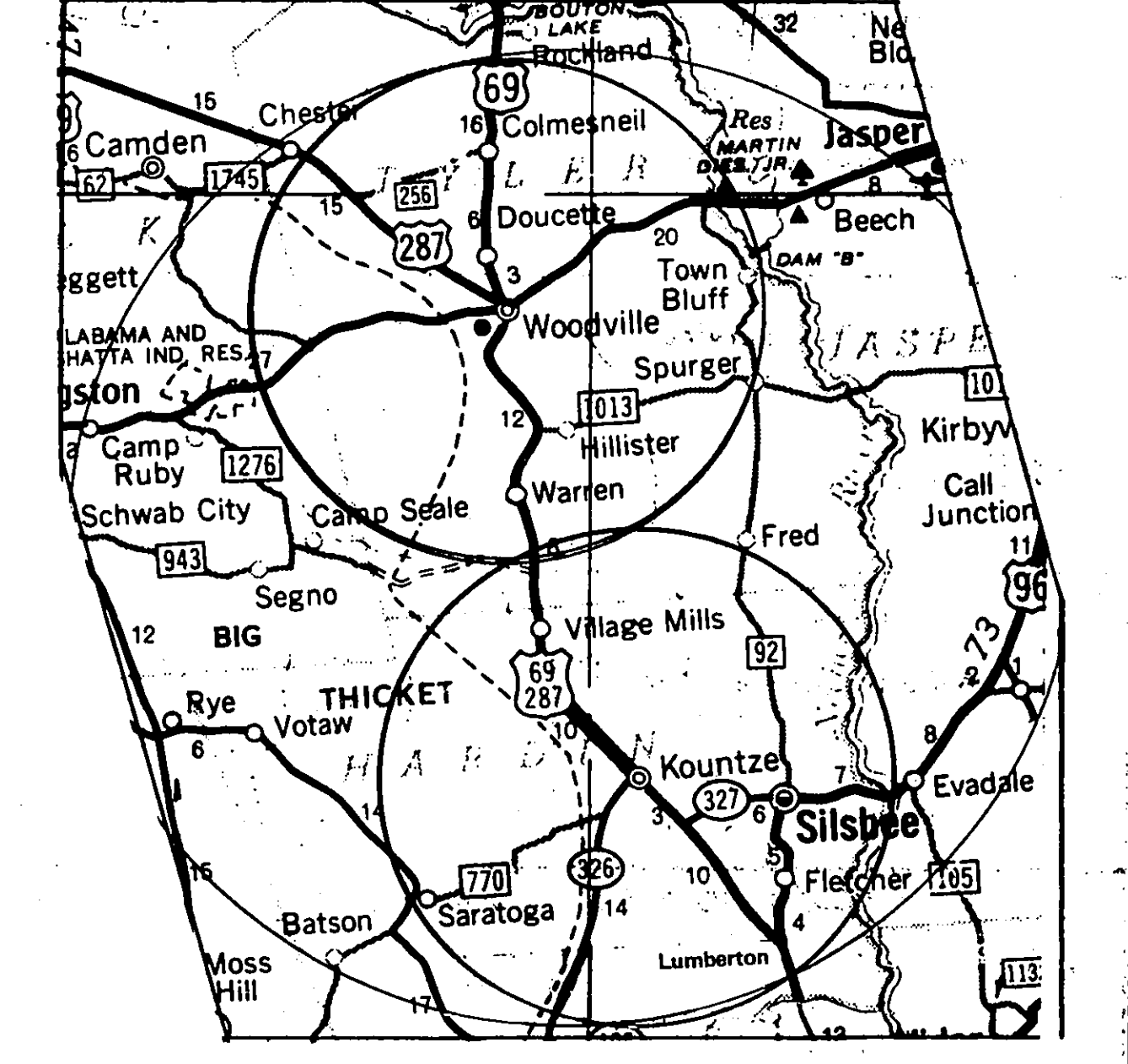

LaBoeuf Still In Running For Job at College Station Beaumont Journal, Tuesday, March 22, 1977

KOUNTZE - Supt. Rodney LaBoeuf is being considered for a job as high school principal of A&M Consolidated School District in College Station, the superintendent there said today, but no action was taken on LaBoeuf's application at a school board meeting there Monday night. Supt. Fred Hopson in College Station said LaBoeuf is in the running with several others. Because discussions of hiring personnel were conducted in closed session, Hopson said he could not tell the status of those job-seekers. The board will meet again April 4, and Hopson said that is the earliest a decision will be made. LaBoeuf was questioned about his plans during a hearing on the renewal of head coach Ted Tate's contract Monday night, despite the objections of school attorney Bob Keith. #### Lengthy Dispute
