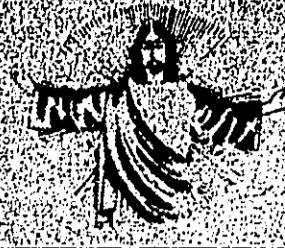

Woodville Due Cablevision By July

Woodville City Fathers ratified for approval a cablevision franchise ordinance Monday by agreeing to final terms of a contract with the American Cablevision Corporation. And, the President of the Bryan based company, Don Adam, indicated to the council that full cablevision service could be a reality in Woodville in as soon as 120 days.

The contract, still unsigned, is being rewritten for council signature.

According to Adam, "We're going to fill your dial."

The Company President

listed station affiliations for the council and assured the group that his firm, which also operates Cablevision services in Jasper, Madisonville and Buffalo, "wanted to work with the city in every way possible to provide good service."

Adam told the group that

most of the licensing necessary for the his companies application was complete but it still had to be approved by the Federal Communication Service.

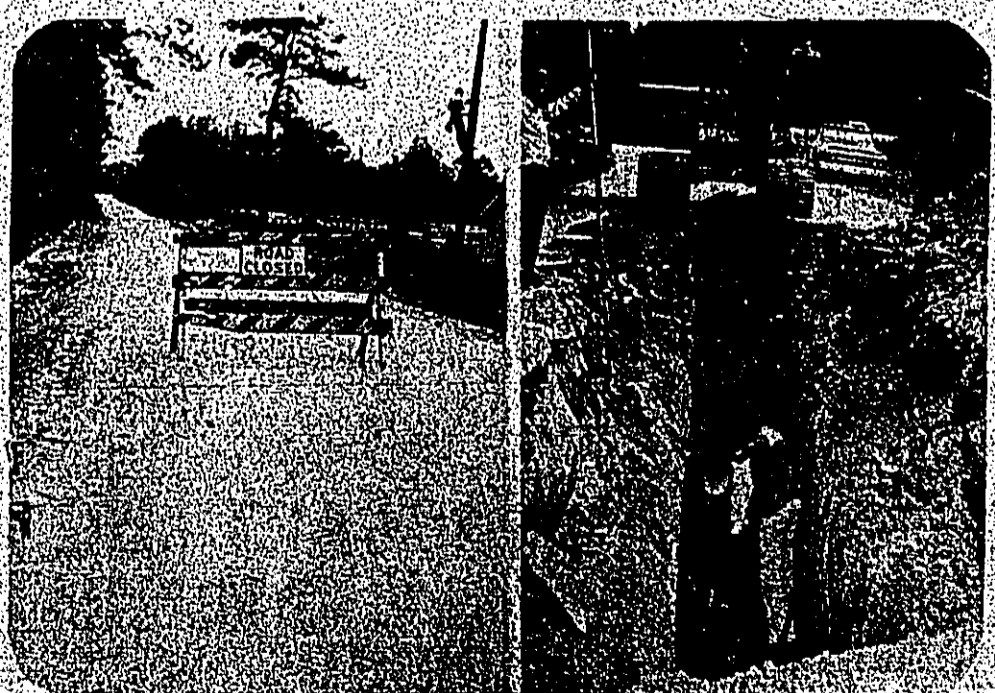
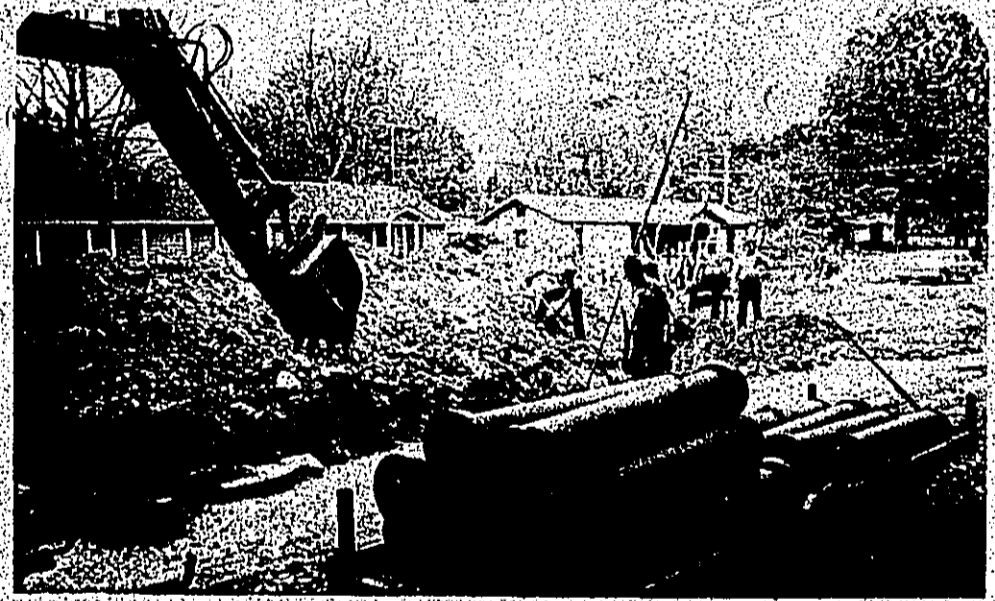
He reported that a 300 foot microwave tower is already being anchored about four miles east of the Town Bluff Road near the Missionary Baptist Church which, he said, would add to the quality of reception here in Woodville. Adam said that the signals from Houston stations would be beamed over from the Votaw, Texas

and that churches in other communities, and in some cases school districts, have utilized the service.

Adam said the system will also bring to Woodville some 20 FM stereo radio stations.

Adam told the group that a full time local technician will be set up here at a local office. He reported also that a permanent phone number will be set up.

The franchise which is set up for 15 years with the city allows for a three percent

Holiday Pinings

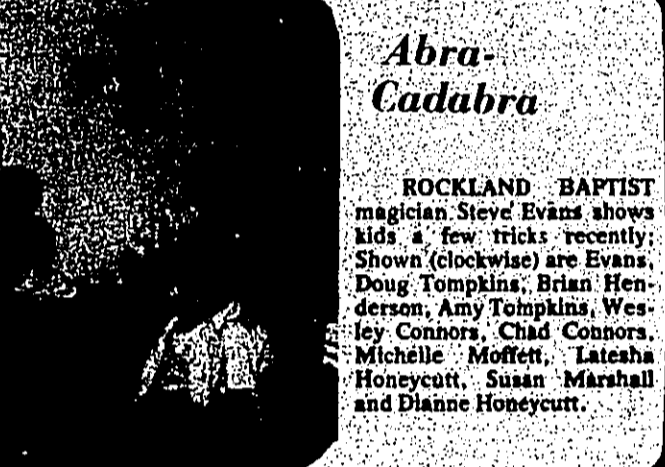

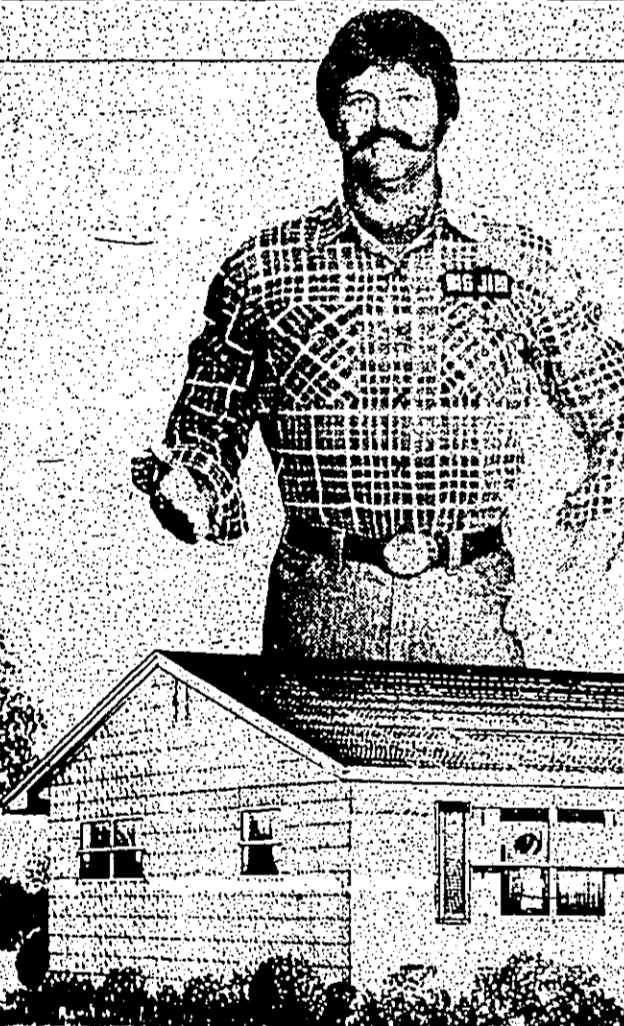

By consulting your calendar you will recognize that April 7 falls on Thursday rather than Sunday or the first day of the week. WHO GAVE THESE MEN AUTHORITY TO MOVE OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S SUPPER FROM THE FIRST DAY OF THE WEEK TO THURSDAY? Another question: how can those who believe that the elements of the Lord's Supper remain unchanged except in a "eucharistic communion" with those who believe that they are changed into the actual body and blood of Christ? Obviously someone believes and practices error. The Bible teaches us not to bid him (or them) God's speed for in so doing we will be partakers of his evil deeds (1 John 9:11).

Vaccine Programs Have Problems

Health officials are concerned that the swine flu program may have hampered other immunization efforts. The Texas Medical Association says recent outbreaks of measles are just one indication of decreasing levels of protection. To make this worse, swine flu legal problems may have hurt a polio vaccination program already beset with legal troubles.

In January and February there were approximately 10 times the number of measles cases usually reported, a Texas Department of Health Resources official says.

As early as late last summer, large outbreaks were reported in the U.S. Midwest, and the number of measles cases is increasing nationwide.

Several factors have been blamed for the problem. One is that the number of people immunized has decreased. About 35 percent of U.S. children ages 1-4 never have gotten measles vaccine. The heavy emphasis on swine flu vaccine may have caused more people to neglect getting measles shots and other vaccinations.

Another factor is that some people were immunized with ineffective vaccine several years ago or were immunized too early in life. At the time, the vaccines and inoculation schedules were believed to be adequate. Their poor performance is just now showing up.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that measles immunization be put off until 15 months of age for infants who live in communities where there is not a lot of the disease. The group still recommends that measles vaccine should be given any time after 6 months of age during the course of measles outbreaks. Under those circumstances, a second shot of vaccine should be given after 15 months of age. The recommendation to postpone immunization to 15 months of age also includes the use of measles, mumps and German measles (rubella) vaccine combined in one shot.

Children's immunization records should be reviewed to see if they need another shot. Those children who received measles or German measles vaccines before their 15-month birthdays should be considered for revaccination. Those never vaccinated at all also should get the shots. State law requires German measles and measles vaccinations before a child can go to school.

State law also requires polio and other vaccinations but legal problems may hinder these efforts.

Public health clinics and some doctors in private practice are requiring that lengthy informed consent forms be signed before children get polio vaccine. The forms are health care providers from lawsuits by patients who claimed they were not told treatment risks. The form points out that the vaccine greatly reduces risks of catching polio and there is only one chance in three million of catching the disease from the vaccine.

The swine flu program was delayed because of increased measles problems and measles already have been law suits involving the program, doctors and health department officials fear the problem may spread to other immunization programs and possibly result in the polio program. Several months ago there was a polio vaccine scare as the manufacturers stated the vaccine could have contained a live virus.

ROCKETS Used to Trap Waterfowl

AUSTIN-Rockets special powder used as propellant and large nets may not sound like tools of the trade, but they are being used again this winter by Texas and Wildlife Department biologists.

Biologists have been operating rocket-propelled nets in efforts to trap and band Canada geese, mallards and blue geese, mallards, pintails and green-winged teal in different parts of the state. The first two trapping sites this year took place at the P&W's J.D. Murphy Area and Port Arthur.

"Using these items we first have a number of traps set to land or come ashore before detaching the device."

The rocket projectiles are tied into a 30 x 120-foot nylon net, folded accordion-style. The netting has a 1/4-inch square mesh.

Department personnel say many as 1,500 birds have been captured at one time using this method, and the rocket is not detonated until there are at least 300 birds in the trap area.

"The more birds we lay for a longer time, the greater becomes to trap large numbers of birds," Stutzenbaker said.

The desired species are then banded with standard, lightweight aluminum leg bands that are individually numbered. Once banded, the birds are immediately released.

After a banded bird is taken by a hunter, it is important the band number, time and place of recovery is reported.

"With that information we can estimate what percentage of the total population dies from one year to the next, where they went after being banded and when they were killed," said Stutzenbaker. "This information, if then combined with aerial surveys and harvest data, to give us a complete picture from which to calculate sound management recommendations for setting future seasons and bag limits."

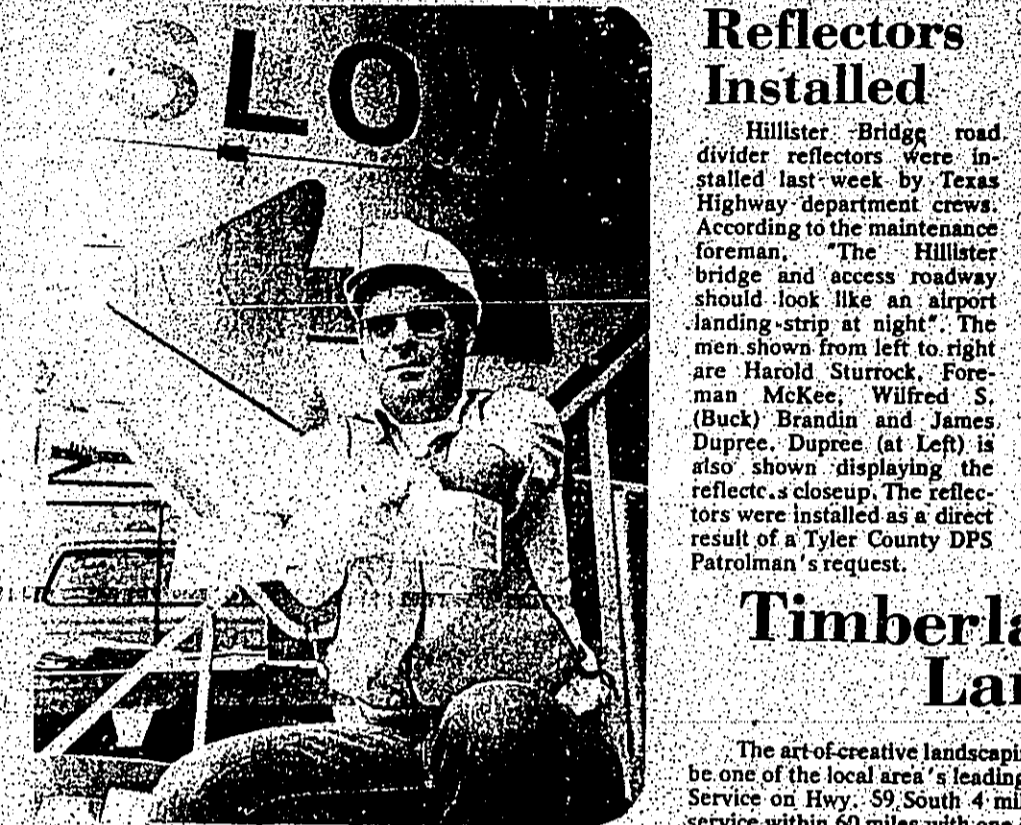

The services are designed to help individuals remain in their home community and to help their family maintain contact. This concept allows the individual to remain at home and work rather than having to be institutionalized.

All services are available to persons living in the 13 county area no matter where the services are located or where the person lives.

Services available within the area include: inpatient hospitalization, halfway house for alcoholics, halfway house for the mentally retarded, day treatment program for the mentally ill, and others. A complete listing of services available in the area is included below.

The services are offered on a sliding fee schedule which is based on the individual's income.

MHMR is operated locally by a regional Board of Trustees appointed by the 13 county commissioners, counties, and local funds from counties match funds received from the State.

The complete listing of the services available in the area follows:

OUTPATIENT PROGRAMS are provided for individuals and groups counseling is provided for persons experiencing adjustment problems. Medical services are also provided when needed.

These clinics are staffed by a variety of professionals including psychiatrists, psychologists, therapists and nurses. They are located as follows:

1. Nacogoches County Outpatient Clinic, 1211 Mound, Nacogoches, 713/569-8288; Newton County Outpatient Clinic, Courthouse Annex, Newton, 713/379-8464; Trinity County Outpatient Clinic, Groveton Hospital & Nursing Home, Groveton, 713/642-1633; and Tyler County Outpatient Clinic, 1011 Broadway Street, Woodville, 713/283-3064. These clinics also provide competent care to individuals and families with drug and alcohol abuse problems.

INPATIENT SERVICES currently provide care to persons in need of temporary inpatient hospitalization. Staff psychiatrists supervise the provision of these services. They are located as follows: Memorial Hospital, Frank and Franklin, Lufkin, 713/634-8111; Nacogoches Memorial Hospital, 1324 Mound, Nacogoches, 713/564-4011; Shelby General Hospital, 114 Hargett, Center, 713/590-5611; and Woodland Heights General Hospital, 920 Frank Avenue, Lufkin, 713/642-8111.

ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE PROGRAMS provide counseling to persons in the 13 county area. Counselors in this program work with the court system, schools and other agencies and individuals in efforts to deal with the mounting problem of alcohol and drug abuse. The programs are located in Post County Community Counseling Center, Jasper-Newton Sheltered Workshop, Beech Grove School, Opportunity Center, Inc. (contractual services) in Third, Lufkin, 713/632-5577; Nacogoches County Sheltered Workshop, 3220 Main, Nacogoches, 713/564-6605; Polk County Sheltered Workshop, 1215 South Washington, Houston, 713/327-8922; and Shelby County Sheltered Workshop, 628 North Fourth Street, Crockett, 713/544-8627; Jasper-Newton Sheltered Workshop, Beech Grove School, Opportunity Center, Inc. (contractual services) in Third, Lufkin, 713/632-5577; Nacogoches County Sheltered Workshop, 3220 Main, Nacogoches, 713/564-6605; Polk County Sheltered Workshop, 1215 South Washington, Houston, 713/327-8922; and Shelby County Sheltered Workshop, 628 North Fourth Street, Crockett, 713/544-8627.

PRESCREENING AND AFTERCARE PROGRAM is involved with providing aftercare and follow-up services to persons who have difficulty functioning independently in the community.

DAY TREATMENT activities are a part of this program. These activities include group counseling, arts and crafts therapy and field trips.

A system of casework services is also used to monitor and review clients' progress in a program to insure that clients are receiving maximum benefits from a service or are referred to appropriate resources.

The Angellina County Day Treatment Program is located on Highway 94, West, Lufkin, 713/639-2552.

The Mobile Evaluation Unit serves all counties and operates out of Lufkin and can be contacted at 713/634-8241.

A HALFWAY HOUSE is designed to provide supervised living for high level mentally retarded persons to assist them in their community adjustment, learning and to achieve the goal of independence and responsibility. It is located at Sammie Manor, 1016 North First Street, Lufkin, 713/639-1479.

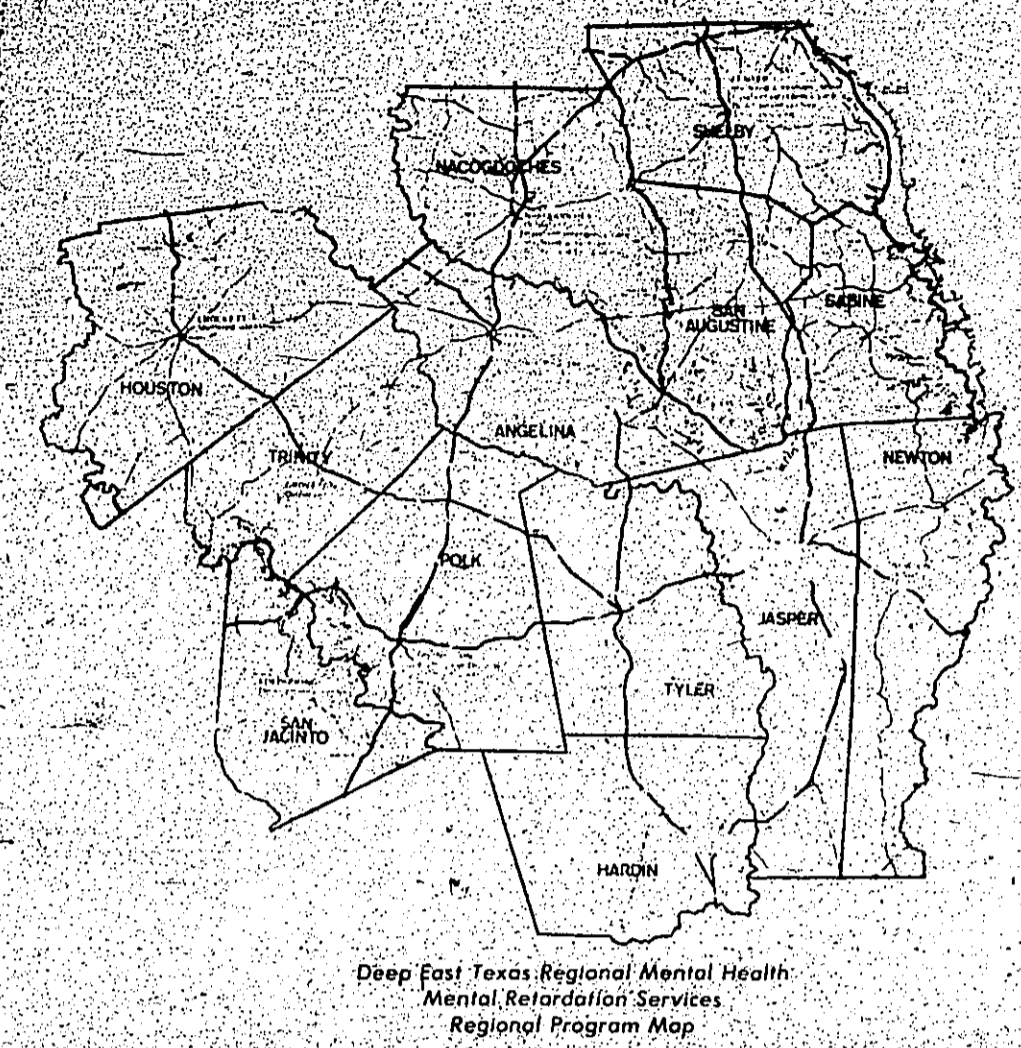
