### Local Jail Planner Re-states LEAA Role

"For the record all we are authorized to do is plan for an LEAA (Federal Standards) Jail under LEAA grant funding and guidelines," said Don Cole, local architect who is acting as liaison between the Dallas Planning firm of Prindle Patrick and Partners and a combined the Tyler County Commissioners and the Woodville City Council group. The two governmental subdivisions are apparently faced with a need to improve jail standards here, but are not sure whether to follow state or federal standards in accomplishing the improvements.

The federal (LEAA) plan is considerably more expensive than the Texas State Standards plan. Cole made the "for the record statement" following a meeting of the city/county on April 6 in which the group as a whole and Woodville Mayor Terry Watts specifically said they felt that several prior planning meetings had produced all that they had asked for.

"I would like to clear the air on the question of jail planning," Cole said. "I don't want people after having read the article in THE BOOSTER to go away with an incomplete and somewhat distorted

view of the planning situation. We are trying to satisfy each of the needs of the councilmen and the commissioners."

There are two levels of satisfaction, Cole said: "the City Councilmen" and the Commissioners' court, and he added, "Sheriff Lewis Craven, and Chief Gary Mattingly."

Cole indicated that the groups both signed a resolution to join together on the project and then followed that by signing a contract agreement with the Prindle, Patrick and Partners firm to produce the Phase I study using grant money totaling \$8,575.

Cole spent last Friday interviewing local county, city and state law enforcement officials in an attempt to get floorplan sketches and layouts which would include the needs of those other related law enforcement agencies in Tyler County into the new plan. Both the city and county leaders had insisted that those agencies be included in the plan, several meetings ago.

Cole indicated that the group has been "verbalizing a compromise" from the LEAA plan. And that according to

original resolutions, the guidelines called only for design of an LEAA designed and approved "conceptual" floorplan.

Sam Bates, representing the Prindle Patrick firm, together with Cole, and at earlier meeting had told the group that they would return to the April 6 meeting with designs and specifications which would include the other law enforcement agencies functions. Cole's contention now is that that was not part of the contract. "But that

it can be done at a later date and for more money," he agreed.

Cole said he sketched each of the law enforcement agencies requirements "to their satisfaction" and presented the sketches to Watts and County Judge Allen Sturrock on Tuesday.

According to Judge Sturrock, "The purpose of the next jail meeting (to be held in early May) will be to finalize the Phase I plan with the new addition we've requested."

### Road Bids Sought

AUSTIN—Bids for the reconstruction of US 287 in Tyler County are expected to be received at the April 26-27 letting of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The project, which extends from Chester southward for 2.8 miles, includes replacement of the existing 18-foot surface with a 26-foot asphalt surface. A climbing lane will also be installed immediately southeast of

Chester to accommodate slow moving traffic.

When completed, the project will provide a modern facility between Chester and Woodville, including safety features and provisions for increased traffic capacity.

H.P.R. Smith of Jasper will be the department's engineer in charge of the work, while Beaumont District Engineer Franklin C. Young will provide overall project supervision.

## Accident Fatal At Spurger Intersection

One man was killed and three others were critically injured late Saturday afternoon as the result of a head-on collision at FM 92 and FM 1013 in Spurger.

Sam McGallion, 64, of Woodville, was pronounced dead at 9:15 p.m. at Tyler County Hospital in Woodville. Due to injuries received when he hit the car dashboard and windshield. Three others, Lucy McGallion, 58, of Woodville, Earl Dotson Jr., 36, and

Stephen Hines, 32, both of Beaumont, were taken to Tyler County Hospital with the extent of injuries unknown at the time.

According to Officer J.R. Allen of the Department of Public Safety, which was notified at 6:30 of the accident, the McGallion car was traveling north on FM 92 when the car apparently crossed over onto the southbound lane. Dotson's van, traveling south, in an effort to avoid

the collision, tried to go around the McGallion car when the car then cut back through the center line hitting the Dotson van head-on. The Dotson van was pulling a boat and trailer.

The injured were then transferred to St. Elizabeths Hospital in Beaumont by Elanders Ambulance Service which had answered the ambulance assistance call originally with one unit, after which another had to be summoned to the scene.

Hines remains in the intensive care unit listed in "critical" condition. Lucy McGallion is listed in "fair" condition and Earl Dotson has been treated and released.

Another accident at approximately the same location took the life of Oscar Enis on April 12. Apparently his car went out of control causing him to hit a tree on the other side of the road. No other vehicles were involved.

## Cattle Referendum Is Topic

A countywide meeting about the proposed Beef Research and Information Act has been called for 7:00 p.m. on Monday, April 25, in the Tyler County District Courtroom in Woodville by Chester Willis, chairman of the Tyler County Beef Development Task Force.

Details about the upcoming beef referendum will be explained, the chairman has announced.

The educational program which is designed for all beef and dairy cattle owners of the county, will include two

slide presentations about the Beef Research and Information Act—one prepared by The Texas Agricultural Extension Service—and the second by The Beef Development Task Force. There will be a period for questions and comments from producers.

Additionally, the BDT chairman, county extension agent, Clinton R. Currie and the extension area economist, Wayne Taylor, will provide more detailed information about the forthcoming beef referendum.

The Beef Research and Information Act serves as enabling legislation and authorized the secretary of agriculture to conduct a referendum among beef producers to determine whether they want a beef development plan, developed by an industry-wide committee.

The Beef Development Plan is a proposed national checkoff program that would be financed by assessment as spelled out in the beef marketing order. If approved, the plan would provide some \$30 to \$40 million per year for beef research, consumer and

producer information, promotion and market development," explains Mr. Taylor.

Expenditures, he added, would be directed by a 68-member board of cattlemen and representatives of livestock organizations.

To be eligible to participate in the Beef referendum, beef and dairy cattle owners need to make two trips to their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices: The first trip to register, and the second to vote.

## Theater Group To Form

Mrs. Chesser formerly of Orange, Texas, worked as director and writer with the Orange The-

ater Group for 15 years.

Other women participating on the committee are: Mrs. E.N. Schouville, who is chairman of the committee, Mrs. George Jarrott, Mrs. Ronald Watts, Mrs. Walter Montagne, Mrs. Clyde Bennett and Mrs. David Mann.

The theater location has not been designated at this time. The group has yet to decide which location and what type of building would be best for their productions.

Wardrobe and stage props will depend a lot on participation of the people of Woodville and surrounding areas as will the long range success of the project.

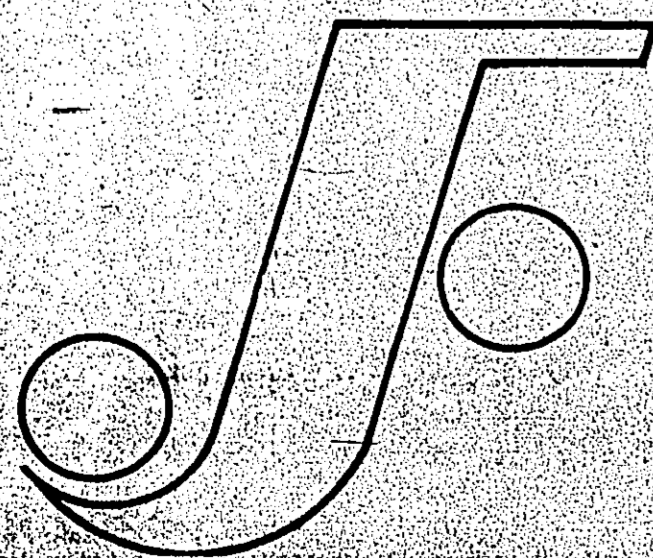

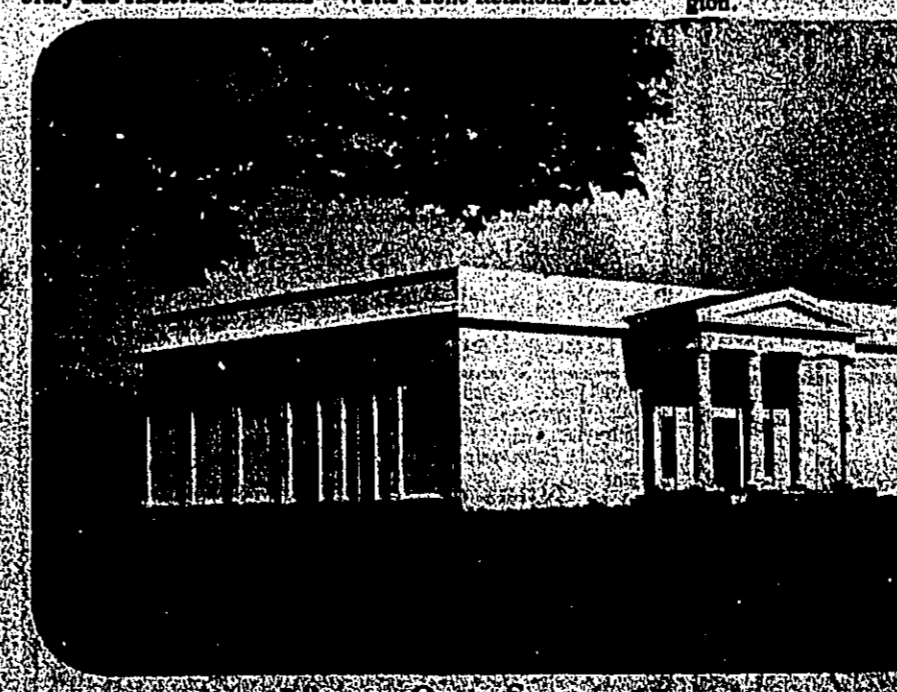

## Bobby Wilson Named Texas' 1976 Rural Hero

HOUSTON—Quick action in rescuing a three-man helicopter crew from its downed craft on a remote ranch near Johnson City, resulted in a rancher being honored as Texas' 1976 Rural Hero today.

Bobby Wilson received the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council's annual award at the 38th annual meeting of the Texas Safety Association at the Shamrock-Hilton Hotel. Presentation was made by Millard Shivers of Dallas, director of rural development for Blue Cross-Blue Shield and chairman of the Texas Safety Council's Awards Committee.

The accident occurred June 26, 1976, when the helicopter from Fort Hood fell about 160 feet, crashing below a bluff on the banks of the Pedernales River, after flying into telephone lines. The site was about five of six miles from the nearest highway.

Alerted by the noise of the crash, Wilson's mother, Mrs. Clifton Wilson, enlisted the aid of her son and his family in investigating. A whirling sound, caused by the engine running full-speed with the rotor blades broken off, led them to the scene.

Wilson climbed down the bluff, and in spite of a warning from the crew members that the helicopter might explode, he extricated the three and moved them to a safe distance while his wife and mother dove some five or six miles for help. One of the men was badly injured with his back broken in eight places.

The Johnson City volunteer fire department and doctor and ambulance from Johnson City, responded, but the injured men could not be lifted up the bluff to the ambulance. A MAST helicopter from San Antonio had to be summoned to lift them out.

Wilson was credited with rendering essential aid to the injured men even though some risk to himself was involved.

Honorable mention in the annual awards contest was given to S. S. Stewart of Dublin and Wilbert Boerger of Washington County. Sherard is credited with saving the life of a rancher, Caldwell who collapsed with a heart attack while helping

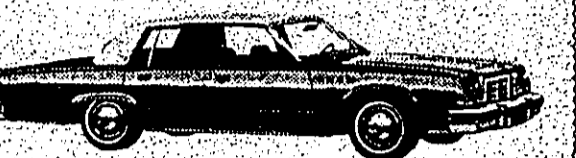

### Accent On Health

The power mower has become a part of the Texas family scene, but it can be dangerous as a colled rattlesnake.

There is no refuting the labor-saving qualities of mowers, but they should be handled as carefully as you would a rattler, says Dudley J. Johnson, chief of the Consumer Health Bureau of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

Cuts, bruises and puncture wounds are typical of the injuries which the mowers can inflict. The gasoline used to power these mowers causes fires which have killed people and burned down the homes of others, says Johnson.

More than 50,000 adults and children are treated each year in hospital emergency rooms for injuries associated with power lawn mowers, says the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. These are the more serious injuries requiring medical treatment. There is no clear picture on the number of painful minor injuries treated at hospitals.

Accidents can happen in many ways.

Nancy was mowing long wet grass when she became clogged in the discharge opening. When she tried to wedge it in, the whirling blades struck her fingers. One finger was amputated.

Jim's father was mowing grass in a hickory tree grove. A nut, struck by the blade ricocheted off the house and hit Jim, blinding the right eye.

A man using a rider mower on a steep backyard terrace started a sideways turn. The machine rolled over. His left leg was so severely cut it had to be amputated.

Mr. Smith was mowing a lot with a garden tractor when he backed up, striking his son who had been playing behind the tractor. The boy's left foot was amputated.

Do any of these accidents sound familiar?

They are accident patterns which are repeated time after time. These patterns are:

1. Contact with the rotating blade. This often occurs when the victim is clearing the discharge chute, when the victim adjusts the machine without turning it off and waiting for the blade to stop, or when the machine hits an obstacle such as a rock and a victim's foot slips under the housing.

2. Propelled objects. Wire, rocks and twigs can be shot either through the discharge chute or from under the housing. Many victims in these cases are bystanders.

3. Overturning. Riding mowers used on steep slopes are involved in this type of accident most often.

4. Mower running over the victim. This often occurs when a riding mower or garden tractor is being driven in reverse. Push-type mowers are dangerous when the operator pulls the mower backward over the foot or slips going uphill, allowing the mower to roll backward.

Experts at the Texas Department of Health Resources say that reel lawn mowers are safer than rotary mowers. Rotary mowers are dangerous because their blades move more slowly than those of rotary mowers. A common accident pattern with reel lawn mowers, however, is attempting to release the reel when it is jammed by a twig or other object without first shutting off the engine.

How about the gasoline used to power your mower? It can be a time bomb just waiting to explode or catch fire.

One of the biggest "don'ts" in handling gasoline is: Don't store it in a glass container. And, keep it out of any garage or storage room in which a water heater is located. Gasoline fumes in case of a spill can be as explosive as a stick of dynamite.

Gasoline should be kept in a well-ventilated area (away from your living quarters) and in tightly-capped safety cans. Don't refuel a mower while it is running or while the engine is hot. And, never refuel a mower indoors because the unburned vapors may be ignited by a spark. Also, gasoline and gasoline don't mix.

One other caution—never use a mower on a wet lawn. The motor running in an enclosed area where carbon monoxide can build up is dangerous. The Department of Health Resources wants you to know that every lawn that is mowed is a safer lawn.

AUSTIN: School finance is one of the major issues the legislature must address in the coming weeks. It is a difficult task to allocate funds for public education that will provide quality programs for all people and at the same time distribute the cost in an equitable manner to all taxpayers.

There have been six bills introduced in the House that relate to school finance. All of these bills have been referred to the House Committee on Public Education. This committee decided that House Bill 750 by Rep. Karter will be the "vehicle" bill for the school finance issue. (Only one bill on a specific subject can be considered by the House during the session.)

HB 750 has been referred to the Governor's office. But it has become a combination of all the proposed bills. The House Committee studied each of the six bills and incorporated into HB 750 what it considers to be the best parts of each of these bills.

The intent of the compromise bill is to combine the portions of each of the bills and at the same time provide property tax relief by increasing the State share of school financing. Currently there are two sources of funds for education—State money and local money. Very complex formulas are used to determine the amount from each source that a school gets. HB 750 proposes to increase the State share of funds and by 1981 to eliminate the local share altogether.

This compromise bill includes numerous provisions. Among them are provisions that would: 1. allow school districts to choose agricultural productivity of full market values in calculating their local share of the foundation program; 2. increase equalization funds; 3. place a cap on the amount of local money a district can raise; 4. mandate a reduction in property taxes in proportion to the reduction in the local fund; 5. assign the Teacher pay raises will be considered in a separate bill. Although this bill by no means offers a perfect solution to the problem of school finance, it is a step towards helping poor school districts and in providing property tax relief by shifting more of the responsibility of school finance to the State.

The Texas Highway Patrol has been investigating these accidents since the month period in 1976, there were 16 Rural Fatal Accidents in which 22 persons were killed and 111 persons were injured.

During the month of March 1977, there were 2 Rural Fatal Accidents in which two persons were killed. In addition, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 19 Rural Motor Vehicle Accidents in which 77 persons were injured.
