## At Dam-B Boating Accident Claims 2 Lives



P & WD Officials Search For Second Victim

A fishing trip at the Old Town Bluff ferry landing ended in tragedy for three Beaumont residents early Tuesday morning as one victim was pulled to safety from a capsized boat, died later on shore as a result of exposure while in the water. Another man in the party is still missing and presumed drowned by authorities who were involved in dragging operations as of late Tuesday.

According to Frank Grimes, Justice of the Peace Precinct 3 at Town Bluff, John Henry Gillispie, 51, Dorothy Gillispie, 52, and

Letcher R. Samuel, 73, all of Beaumont, were fishing about 200 yards downstream from the Dam-B spillway, when their lightweight, flat-bottom, aluminum boat apparently capsized, throwing the three persons into the swiftly moving 48-degree water.

Edward Bassett and Irene O'Brien of Beaumont, were fishing about 15 yards upstream when they said they "heard cries for help." They then started their boat and went downstream to where they found Samuel hanging onto a snag in the river.

O'Brien said that Samuel refused help for himself by shouting "Save the woman, I'm alright." Mrs. Gillispie was hanging onto the side of the capsized boat which was moving downstream at a fast rate. She was wearing a life preserver.

After Bassett and O'Brien assisted the woman into their boat they then went back to search for Samuel but couldn't locate him.

Another fisherman, Cicero Kirkendall of Silsbee found Samuel further downstream and aided him into his boat. Samuel was then

brought to the bank of the river and was in apparent respiratory distress where after only a few short seconds according to authorities he died from exposure and water inhalation.

Samuel's body was moved to Tyler County Funeral Home by Eilers Ambulance service and later to Beaumont by Knightington Ambulance Service.

At press time, the other victim, John Gillispie was still missing and assumed drowned.

Assisting in the recovery of Gillispie are representa-

tives from Parks and Wildlife Department, Tyler County Rescue Boat and The Corp of Engineers at Town Bluff.

The Corps of Engineers are cooperating in the recovery efforts by closing down the spillway to still the 5-6 mile an hour current. This can be accomplished for a period of 24 hours, Corps officials said.

Recovery of John Gillispie could take as long as three days Grimes predicts.

Apparently only the woman was wearing a life preserver at the time of the accident.

According to Rev.

Adams, a select committee of individuals will judge from letters and recommendations submitted from clubs, groups and individuals throughout the Tyler County community will have until Saturday, May 7 to submit their nominations for the distinctive award.

Judging of the nominations will take place on the afternoon of May 11 and on Tuesday May 17 at a special ceremony at Holiday Pines Lodge to recognize the winners.

## W.I.S.D. Awards Air Conditioning Bids-Tables Electrical

The Woodville Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Tuesday (April 19) and voted to award an air conditioning bid to the Lindy Dennis Company of Beaumont at a bid of \$305,500 to outfit the new high school complex recently approved as result of a \$3.1 million dollar bond issue.

There were only three bidders for the air conditioning portion of the bid activity. The other two included air conditioning Inc. with a bid of \$357,000 and Wattco Air Conditioning and Heating of Woodville, with a combined bid of \$303,951.

Trustees had to reject the low Wattco bid because a bonding requirement which was a portion of the bid specification, and was not included with the bid proposal. Both other companies had submitted a bond with each of their bids. The motion to accept the bid following an executive session, provided by law, because of the "real property" nature of the goods being purchased, was made by Trustee Margaret Lane with the next few weeks to vote

award that portion of the bidding.

In other board discussion Architect Stansbury gave the trustees an update of the development of the plans for the new educational complex. Stansbury said the main academic building will be located at a high point at the site location.

Stansbury said the new facility will be easily visible from the Chester Highway when completed.

District School Superintendent Tom Linam asked that the plans be finalized as soon as this fall, so that bids could be let for construction as soon as this fall. Stansbury indicated that timing of that nature was feasible and that his firm would work toward that goal.

In other board business the trustees reorganized the officers of the board by adding Margaret Lane to fill the vacancy left by Jim Gainey, she will act as Vice President of the School Board.

The board appointed Morris Clemmons, Fred Miller and W.D. Mahan to the Board of Equalization for the School District.

Trustees seemed pleased with the bids as submitted saying that they had allowed for a \$415,000 overall total in budgeting the air conditioning and electrical portion of the construction work.

Trustees W.S. Nichols and Fred Sullivan voted to table the electrical portion of the bidding until a special meeting can be held within the next few weeks to vote

# Recreation Road, Bridge Completion Due In One Year

Texas Highway Department Officials say that the roadway and bridge construction connecting Hwy. 69 just north of Colmerson with Hwy. 63 in Jasper will be complete in one year.

Recreation Road 255 is located in the northeastern quadrant of Tyler County below Rockland and the newest stretch of construction which crosses the Neches River will add another important link to the Highway Department's concept of an East Texas "Recreational Road".

A.J. Cortez, engineer for the state Highway Department, states that "When the East-West road is completed a more direct route to Dam B, Sam Rayburn Lake and Jasper will be available." He also added that Recreation Rd. 255 will eventually tie in with Toledo Bend Lake on the Eastern end.

"Depending on how you look at it, the road either begins or ends in Tyler County."

Traffic flow is anticipated to be steady due to the mileage which can be eliminated by using the road, Cortez said.

"More tourism can be expected because Recreation Road 255 will lead to the many recreational spots in this area of Texas. Woodville can expect a large portion of the tourist trade" Cortez predicted.

Out-of-town visitors will not be the only ones benefitting from the road. Persons living in the northeastern part of Tyler County will also have a more direct route and shorter distance to travel to reach Jasper, and north Jasper County and Rayburn County residents will be able to enter Tyler County faster and easier also.

Total cost of the roadway and bridge is estimated at \$2,118,142. The bridge alone is \$449,569. Total roadway length in Tyler County will be 6.2 miles.

In Process also and occurring simultaneously with the development of the Recreation Road 255 are plans for the construction of another "North-South" road which will tie Hwy. 190 at Dam B with recreation Rd. 255 at the Neches River Bridge. FM 92 north will be extended up along the Wolf Creek Road area. As plans stand now the first 2.5 miles are expected to be completed by late next year, Cortez said.

With the "hoped for" three year completion of the "North-South" road combined with the one year completed "Recreation Road" both will allow easier access to Tyler County's many recreational spots which will all be within easy traveling distance of each other.

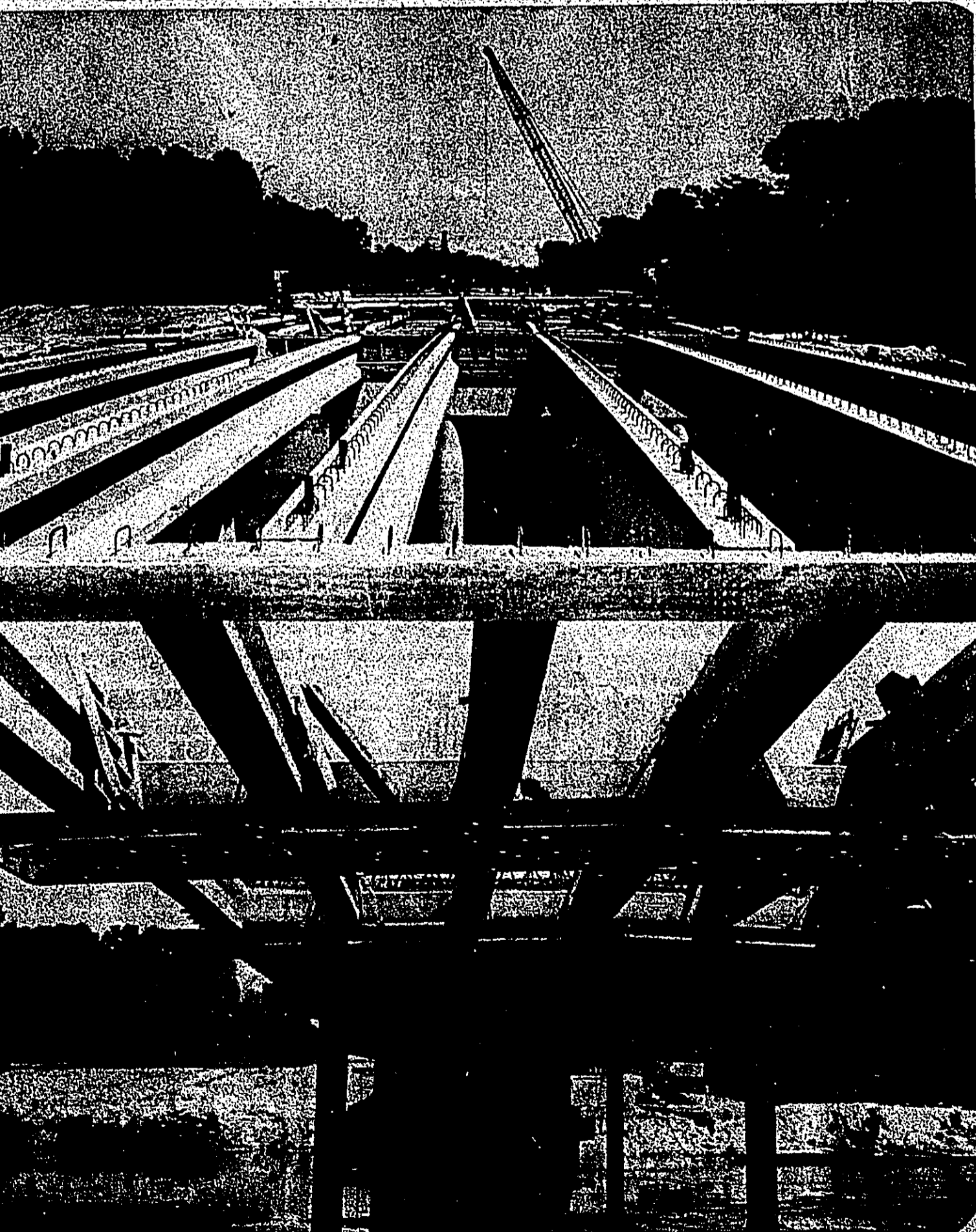

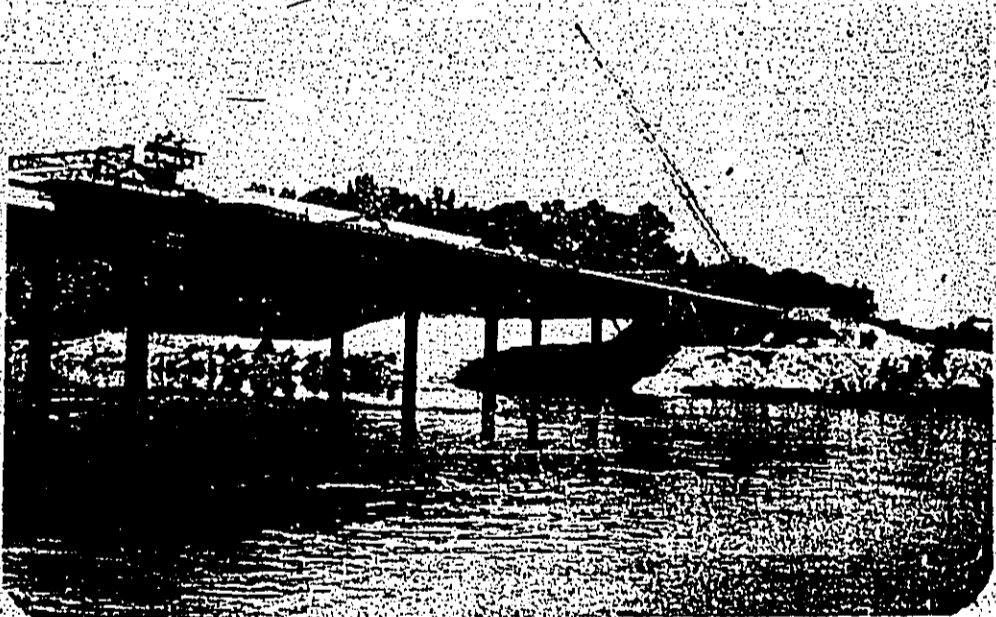

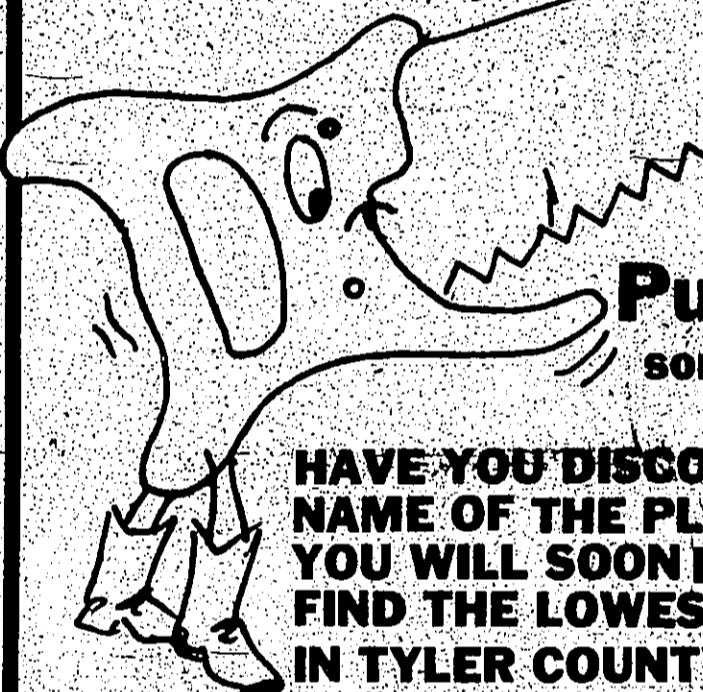
**Library and Research Center Serves 10 Counties**

One of the largest private Indian Artifacts collections and the Jean Laffite Journal will be presented to the Sam Houston Regional Library and Research Center at its dedication May 14, at 2 p.m. in Liberty. The public is invited.  
 These are only two of the many historical collections relating to the 10 counties which will be served by the new library and research center. These counties are: Chambers, Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Newton, Orange, Polk, San Jacinto and Tyler. All were carved from the original Atascosito-Liberty district of the Republic of Texas.



The Center will house a wealth of valuable papers, art objects, artifacts, records, and information gathered from these 10 Southeast Texas counties.  
 One large first floor display room will include historical papers and artifacts dating Southeast Texas history from early Indian settlers to the Spindletop boom period.  
 Andy Kyle's collection of more than 10,000 arrowheads and other Indian artifacts collected from the 10 county region, including even pre-historic information on the area. Some are classified as early as 1800 B.C. In donating this huge collection to the Center, Kyle is giving a great part of his life's work for 30 years he has been an avid collector of Indian artifacts exclusively in Southeast Texas and mostly at sights about to be destroyed by highways and lakes.  
 Kyle, a resident of Liberty and native of New Hampshire, attended college and drifted to Texas by way of the Armed Services. He began searching for Indian artifacts in 1946. Besides searching for arrowheads, Kyle and his wife operate one of the last green houses in Texas for wholesale cut mums. They grow about 40 varieties at their Liberty location and deliver them weekly to florists throughout East Texas.  
 Other items on display include relics from the Spanish Mission and Presidio in Chamber County, Indian artifacts from the Atascosito-Couahatta Indian Reservation, Napoleonic Generals on Trinity River, books and papers from the French period and the Champ de Aisle period, the Atascosito District as it was in 1826, pictures of General Sam Houston, Colonel William B. Travis and Captain Hugh B. Johnston, the Battle of San Jacinto, Texas after San Jacinto, the Steamboat era, the Confederacy and the Spindletop Boom.  
 In addition, there are old photographs displayed from each of the 10 counties in the Atascosito-Liberty district.  
 On the second floor is the Sam Houston Room containing "belongings," pictures, furniture, etc., original to General Sam Houston and his descendants and the famous Tideland's Papers and pen used to sign the submerged lands bill which restored 4 million acres of land in the Gulf of Mexico to the Texas Public School Fund.  
 The program for the dedication ceremony will be announced next week.

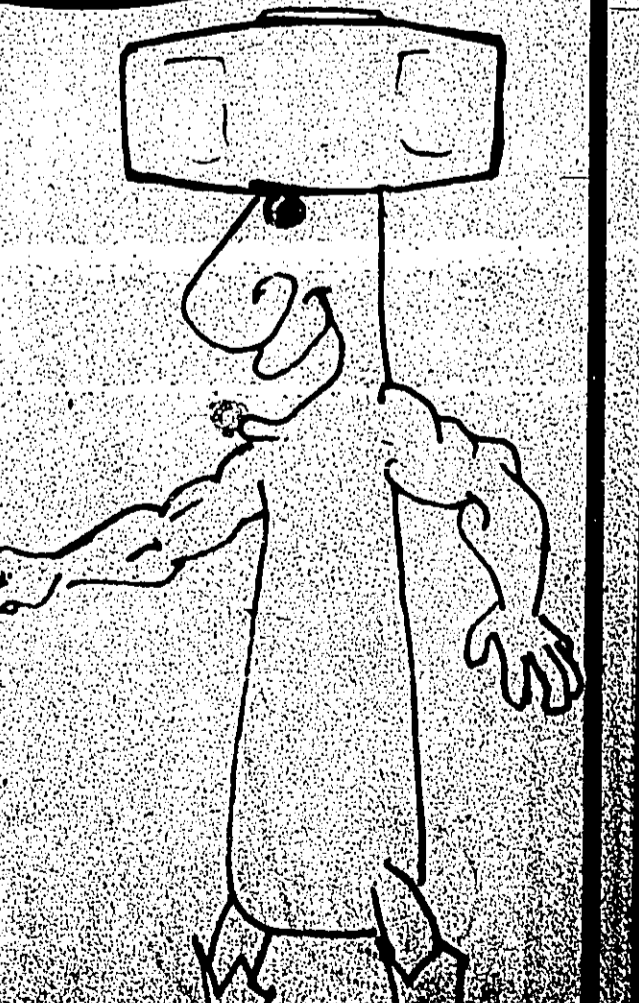
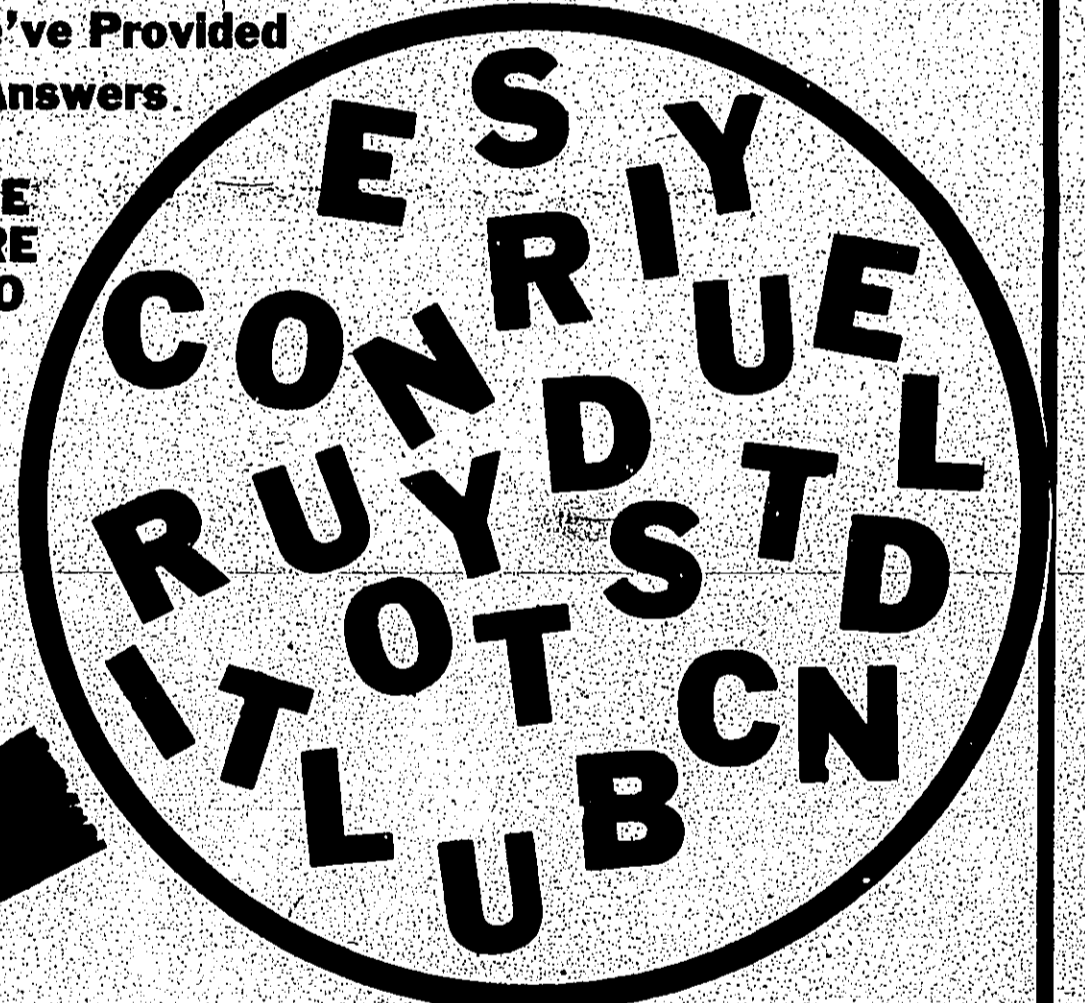

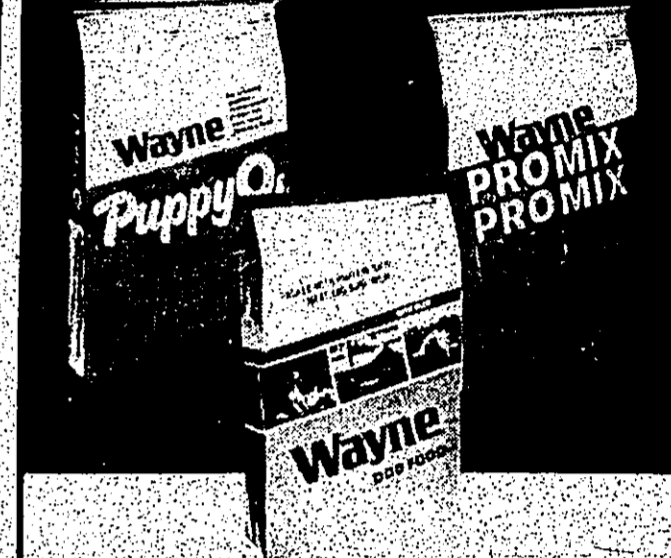

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# Briscoe To Speak To Texas Foresters

LUFKIN—Texas Forestry Association members, (after meeting two of the top three leaders in state government at their last annual get-together, soon will have a chance to hear from the one they missed.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who was unable to join Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker Bill Clayton of the Texas House at the 1976 TFA annual meeting has accepted an invitation to appear at TFA's spring meeting, scheduled May 18-19 at the Sheraton-Crest Inn in Austin.

The list of distinguished speakers for the event also includes Dr. Stephen Spurr, former president of the University of Texas at Austin; Charles R. Burden, executive director of the Texas Air Control Board; and Dick Whittington, deputy director of the Texas Water Quality Board.

Theme for the meeting will be "Air, Water and Wood."

Among the activities already scheduled is a ride on the Riverboat Commodore, to just about an hour and cover the distance between the Austin Dam and the Greenhouses area, then the return trip following a stop-over at Greenhouses.

But the chief attraction is expected to be Gov. Briscoe, who last served as governor of Texas since 1973, has been a member of the National Governor's Conference Executive Committee.

He served in 1976 as a member of the National Petroleum Council.

In 1958, Briscoe was one of five persons chosen by the Jaycees as outstanding young men.

He also was an outstanding conservation rancher in Texas.

He was president of the Texas Forestry Association in 1961 and president of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce in 1967-68. He was president of the Texas State Chamber in 1967-68.

Briscoe was a member of the Texas Legislature from 1949-1957.

A number of the featured speakers, Dr. Spurr, plans to talk on "Future Forest Management Policy and its effect on America's Timberland."

Dr. Spurr, professor of botany and public affairs at the University of Texas at Austin, is a member of TFA and is a forest ecologist with wide experience in teaching, research and administration.

He served as president of UT Austin from July 1, 1971, to Sept. 24, 1972.

A third speaker, Charles Burden, is a native of Orange who gained extensive experience in positions relating to public health en route to his position as director of the Texas Air Control Board.

The other speaker, Dick Whittington, became deputy director of the Texas Water Quality Board after serving in a number of capacities with TWQB and with other organizations.

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# Study Shows Timber Tax High In Texas

Owners of industrial timberland in East Texas are paying an average tax per acre that is the second highest in the South, a study by a Georgia economist has shown.

The Texas Forestry Association said the recently released study, which was conducted by Dr. L.A. Hargreaves Jr. of the University of Georgia, revealed that the average tax per acre on industrial timber-growing land in East Texas has reached \$4.43, second to Georgia's average of \$4.60.

The study, which covered 12 southern states, showed a 7.5 per cent jump in the average tax per acre in Texas-up from the previous average of \$4.10.

Hargreaves' study was recently published in the Economic Research Manual, in Texas, his work covered 3.6 million acres owned by various forest product companies who are managing the lands for paper, lumber, plywood and other wood products.

The average tax per acre in the South's other timber-producing states ran like this: Louisiana, 41 cents; Tennessee, 53 cents; Kentucky, 50 cents; North Carolina, 59 cents; Alabama, 62 cents; South Carolina, 62 cents; Mississippi, 79 cents; Florida, 93 cents; Virginia, \$1.15; and Georgia, \$1.60.

E.E. Wagener, executive vice president of the Texas Forestry Association, said the average tax per acre in Texas is probably substantially higher because of changes in the Texas school financing law, which resulted in higher taxes in many school districts.

The Hargreaves study disclosed that, considering the maximum tax per acre for each southern state, Texas is first with a maximum of \$5.81 per acre. Virginia is second with \$5.54 and Georgia third with a maximum of \$4.23.

Although the study dealt only with industrial timberlands, Wagener said the trends discussed by Hargreaves are particularly disturbing to individual landowners, whose taxes are also climbing rapidly.

"We may be reaching the point where timberland taxation is too high to permit individuals to manage their lands for a crop of trees, which can be harvested for revenue only once or twice during their lifetime," said Wagener.

Individuals currently own about 50 per cent of commercial timber-growing lands in East Texas. Forest groups are particularly high, 50 per cent. The rest is controlled by federal and state governments.
