Accident Report Given

Sergeant Cecil L. Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that during the month of April 1977, in Tyler County, there were two Rural Fatal Accidents in which two persons were killed. In addition, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 Rural Motor Vehicle Accidents in which two persons were injured.

Through April of this year, there have been 58 Rural Accidents in Tyler County, killing six persons and injuring 37 people.

During the same four month period in 1976, there were 59 Rural Traffic Accidents killing one and injuring 48 persons.

During the month of April in the 16 Counties comprising District 2B, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 543 Rural Accidents, killing 19 persons, and injuring 238 people.

Esler Questions Board On Voting Box Locations

The Woodville Independent School Board of Trustees got a tongue lashing from unsuccessful school board candidate Jack Esler, Tuesday (May 17) at the board's regular monthly meeting.

Esler questioned the board in a rapid-fire staccato manner asking why the board had taken no action as yet to install voting boxes at Dam-B and Hillister following a referendum which, Esler said, requested that in 1970.

Esler, who later told THE BOOSTER that the tone and delivery of the questions, "Were just part of the act," saying further that the questions were asked in that manner, "to arouse the board."

One of those voting box questions which was aimed at Trustee Harold Allison, while he was seated at the board's conference table with his back turned to Esler in the District's small meeting room, was answered "I feel that if they're interested in school then they

wouldn't mind coming here and voting." And, Allison said, "I've lived in Tyler County all my life and I'm opposed to anybody coming in here and trying to tell us how to run our business."

One person in the gallery said, "Well, what about our money, Mr. Allison, I'm a taxpayer."

Trustee Fred Sullivan said, "I personally have knowledge of persons who live in Dam-B who vote in regular elections, and, he said, "who it's considerably inconvenient to if they work in Woodville, to have to return to Dam-B to cast their vote."

Sullivan referred to lines which would have to be drawn in order to designate voting box boundaries, and how that, "It's not going to be a totally 100 percent thing anyway you put it."

"That's true," said Esler. "But putting a voting box at Dam-B and Hillister would save a lot of people a lot of driving money."

Board President Dr. R.E. Swearingen, said, "It's very difficult for me to believe (knowing how many people come into Woodville for so many different things) that anybody sincerely wanting to vote could come in and do that."

Esler responded stating that many people in Dam-B do their shopping in Jasper and those in Hillister go to Beaumont. "There are not as many as you think coming to Woodville to do their voting."

"They could if they wanted to, badly enough," Dr. Swearingen said adding, "People do what they want to."

Esler, after requesting and getting placement on the board's next regular meetings agenda regarding the additional voting box, master continued to question the board concerning the proposed construction program. Esler requested specifics about size and cost and Board

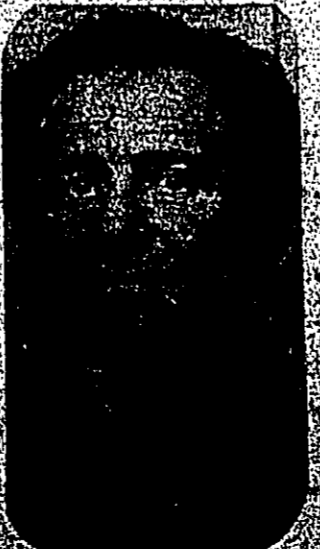

Library Schedule Set

The summer schedule for children will begin at Allan Shivers Library as soon as school is out, according to library personnel who have announced main events will include a weekly story hour and reading club.

The very day Tyler Co. School students finish this semester of school they may register in the Texas Summer Reading Club for 1977, a project co-sponsored by the Texas State Library and Allan Shivers Library.

A certificate from the Texas State Library will be awarded each student who

reads at least ten books. One book must deal with the theme "Jungle Journey" and the other 9 books may be any the student chooses on his reading level. Stars will be placed on the certificate for theme books and extra groups of ten.

Registration in the club will continue throughout the summer. Children visiting grandmothers or other relatives here are invited to participate if the hostesses will be responsible for the checking out of books.

The first weekly story hour will be Tuesday, June 7th from 10:30-11:15 a.m. and will be held at this same hour each week until school

starts again. Besides stories these sessions will feature film strips, puppet shows, movies, and games.

There is no age limit for the story hour, but children must be old enough to listen to a story—usually 3 years or older. Mrs. Quaid Sullivan, library director, stated.

Parents, please remember that the library is open from 9-5 on Mondays and Tuesdays, 12-5 on Wednesdays and Fridays, 12-5 on Thursdays, and from 9-1 on Saturdays. Xerox service and museum tours are available daily from 9-5 Mondays through Fridays and from 10-12 on Saturdays.

Swearingen said, "It would be foolish for the board to try to answer those questions. Swearingen assured that the board will be kept advised of the progress of the project. He said that the board will be given information and one else who wanted to question the board and the architect about the plans for the school at the special meeting held in the school library on Tuesday (May 24).

Registration Open For Voting In Referendum

Tyler County cattle producers can register to vote in the national Beef Referendum, June 6 through June 17, at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office in Woodville.

The stake is the Beef Research and Information Plan—a producer self-help plan to strengthen beef markets here and abroad, increase research to solve beef industry problems and improve communications throughout the cattle business.

The Plan would be funded by a deduction of 30¢ per 100 on all cattle sales. But any producer who does not want to participate can make a donation to the fund.

Producers will return to their ASCS office the first two weeks of July to actually cast their ballots.

All legitimate cattle producers who have owned cattle in the last 12 months are eligible to register and vote, including FFA and 4-H youth who own their own cattle.

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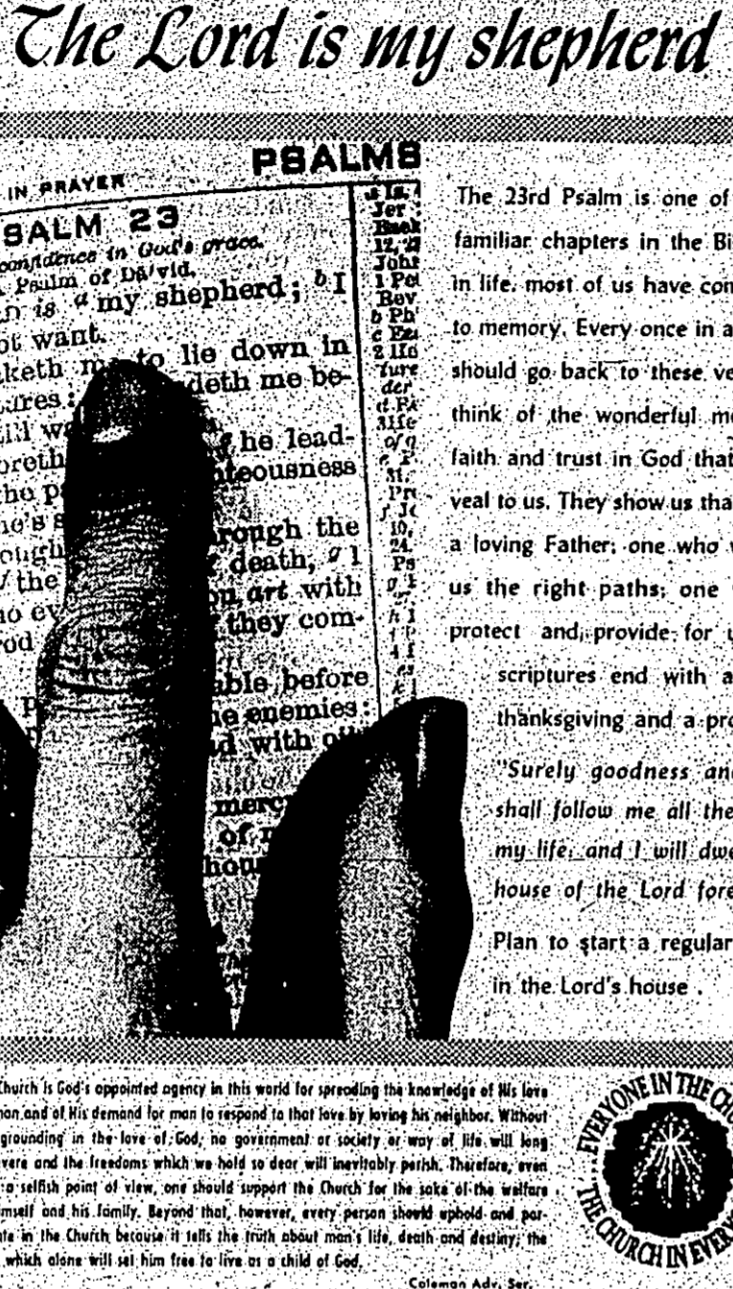

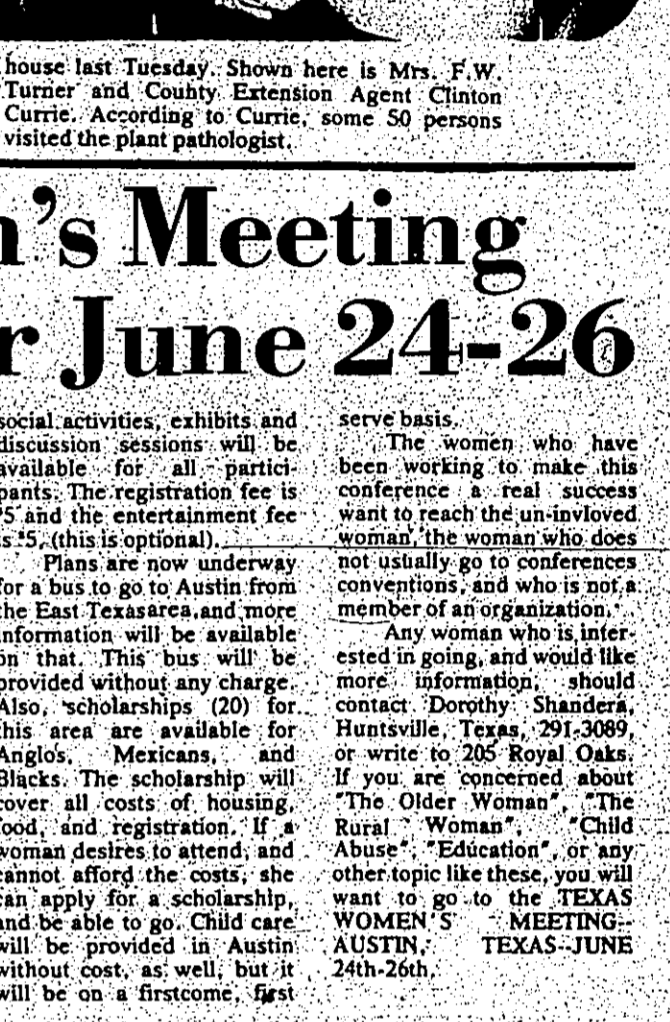

Labels Confuse Consumers
Accent On Health

Consumers with children's sleepwear should not be confused by a label saying "flame retardant" or "flame resistant" in determining whether the sleepwear contains the "flame-retardant chemical Tris."

That's the word from Harold R. Ray, Director of the Product Safety Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

"Just because the products bear one or the other label doesn't mean they have the Tris treatment," said Ray.

The US Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) recently banned the sale of any children's clothing containing the flame-retardant chemical Tris. The ban also extends to any Tris-treated fabric that is used but is intended for sale to consumers for use in children's wearing apparel.

Laboratory tests in which Tris was orally administered to rats showed that some rats developed cancerous tumors.

Ray said the affected products in interstate commerce, or introduced into interstate commerce, are banned and must be repurchased from retailers and distributors by any manufacturer or others who sold them. Consumers who have purchased but not washed any Tris-treated children's garments or night fabric are also entitled to a full refund of the purchase price, said the CPSC.

Washing the garments three or more times removes much of the chemical, and the washed garments then present little, if any, risk to the wearer, says the CPSC.

Ray said you can't look at a garment and tell if it has been treated with Tris.

Not all children's sleepwear is Tris-treated, and children's garments other than sleepwear are rarely treated, said Ray.

To determine if a particular children's garment has been treated with Tris, it is suggested that consumers should contact the manufacturer or the store where the item was purchased.

Some fabrics are inherently flame-resistant. Others require the addition of chemicals, but the chemical isn't necessarily Tris, said Ray.

You can get a line on excluding Tris-treated sleepwear by looking at the fiber content printed on the label, said Ray.

Fibers used in children's sleepwear sizes 0-14, which are frequently treated with Tris to achieve flame resistance include: Acetate and Acetate Blends; Triacetate and Triacetate Blends; and 100 percent Polyester.

"Fabrics used in the manufacture of children's sleepwear which characteristically require the addition of a chemical to achieve flame resistance include: Acetate and Acetate Blends; Triacetate and Triacetate Blends; Vinylon (brand name Leavyl); and Vinylon Blend."

"Fabrics used in the manufacture of children's sleepwear which are inherently flame-resistant and would, therefore, NOT require the addition of a chemical to achieve flame resistance include: Modacrylic (brand name Vero, SEF, Kanecaron) Modacrylic Blends; Modacrylic Blends; Cordelan (brand name Cordelan); Modacrylic Blends; Vinylon (brand name Leavyl); and Vinylon Blend."

If in doubt as to whether a particular children's sleepwear garment, size 0-14, contains Tris, consumers should contact the manufacturer directly.

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What Can You Expect From Counseling

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the last of a three part series on mental health prepared by The Deep East Texas Regional Mental Health Rehabilitation Services as part of the observance of National Mental Health Month in May. The first article dealt with the question of when counseling is needed and the second article dealt with how counseling is conducted. After a family or a member of a family has determined that counseling is needed, then has contacted one of the five outpatient clinics operated by Mental Health Rehabilitation Services, the success or failure of counseling depends upon the attitude of the persons involved," said Dr. Jack Martin, director of mental health programs of MHMR. "If a person comes into counseling with the attitude that he is all right but the other person needs help or if he is expecting some type of magic potion to be prescribed he is certain to be disappointed. Counseling is a reality, a self-help type of situation," Martin said. "with the counselor serving as a guide. Changes must come from the individual as the counselor's role is one of helping the person discover what the problem or problems are. According to Martin, a person who realizes that he has a problem and then is able to identify it has a much greater chance of being successful in changing the situation. The openness with which a person discusses the situation with the counselor also has a great influence on the success or failure of counseling. "Some people may not really want to change, they may talk about it and how much they want to change the situation, but until there is a great desire to change, the counselor can be of little help." In the case of marriage counseling, the instance of one partner in the marriage wanting the other person changed and not being willing to change themselves is great. After counseling sessions the problems can be isolated. Then it is up to the individual or individuals involved to take the necessary action to achieve the desired results. The results of a counseling program are highly varied but are very successful when the people involved are really seeking change. "Counseling effort made between children and parents and between man and wife and other individuals can make a great difference in the mental health of those involved." "The efforts of community based mental health programs are the most advanced concepts in the treatment of emotional disturbances," Martin said. The development of the organization necessary to provide these services in the communities of East Texas is the reason Mental Health Rehabilitation came into existence. It is governed by local representatives selected by the county commissioners of the 13 counties served. The goal of MHMR is to make all necessary facilities for persons needing help in the mental health field available near their homes. This is to follow the concept that if the facilities are near and counseling is readily available then the instances of severe emotional disturbances can be reduced. Lufkin To Have New MHRM Facility

Construction is scheduled to begin in two weeks on the new mental health day treatment facility for the Deep East Texas Regional Mental Health Mental Retardation Services.

The facility will be located on Medford Drive, is expected to be completed by the first of the year, according to Dr. Wayne Lawrence, executive director of MHRM.

Cost of the facility will be \$300,000 with \$225,000 coming from federal funds and the additional \$75,000 coming from a \$45,000 grant from the T.L.L. Temple Foundation and \$30,000 from local funds. The architects' fee will also come from local funds.

The facility will serve emotionally-disturbed persons who do not require hospitalization, but cannot be served on an outpatient basis by clinics, Lawrence said.

Included in the facility will be staff offices, counseling rooms and a laboratory kitchen and a laundry for training purposes, wood-working and other skill development work areas.

Lawrence said that persons using the facility will be supervised for about six hours per day and then return to their homes in the area.

The facility will contain approximately 8,500 square feet and will be of a contemporary design. The building will also house certain administrative offices in one wing of the building.

The River Ministry is supported by the Mary Hill Davlin, Offering for State Missions.

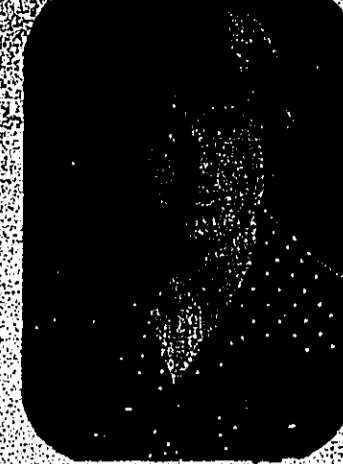

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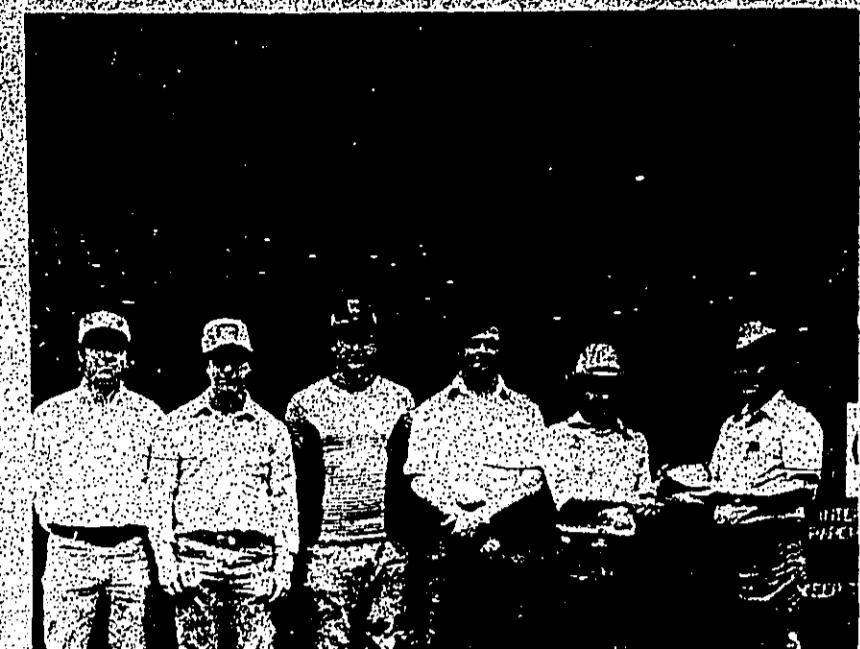

Wardens Step Up Checks For Fishing Violations

CORPUS CHRISTI—During the months of March and April, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens along the lower Texas Coast made spot checks of boaters and fishermen to see if they were complying with fish and water safety laws.

Of the 3,171 fishermen checked in March, wardens found an average of 10 percent of them lacked a valid fishing license. And of the 1,022 boaters checked, three percent were found to be in violation of the Texas Water Safety Act in some fashion.

An even greater number of fishermen in the same area were stopped by wardens in April—5,234—but the number who did not have a license had dropped to six percent of the total.

But water safety violations started climbing in April and six percent of the 1,461 boaters visited by the wardens were cited.

Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement division director Henry Burkett said he has ordered reports of such checks on a statewide basis starting in May.

From September, 1976 through April 1977, 518,844 of the 4.25 fishing licenses had been sold, down 51,932 for the period September 1975 through April 1976.
