### Power Plant Plans Advance

JASPER (Sp) - Gulf States Utilities Co. Friday cleared the first hurdle in winning federal approval for locating a nuclear-powered electric generating plant in Newton County.

A subcommittee of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's advisory committee on reactor safeguards gave preliminary approval to development of the two-unit Blue Hills station, to be located on a 2,000-acre site near the intersection of Texas 87 and Farm Road 255.

The proposed station, which would have two nuclear reactors, would be located about 12 miles south of Six Mile Creek on Highway 87 and about 25 northeast of Jasper. The company hopes to be operating the first reactor by 1989 and the second by 1991, said J.H. Derr, GSU manager of power plant engineering and design.

The reactor safeguards committee held a 3 1/2-hour hearing in Jasper on the safety of the proposed Blue Hills station before recommending the plant safeguards be examined by the entire committee. That hearing will take place in Washington, D.C. possibly as early as March, subcommittee members said.

Gulf States officials and consultants testified the location for the proposed plant is free of geologic faults or earthquake activity that might jeopardize the station's two reactors.

Officials also testified that construction of the plant will be strong enough to withstand the effects of hurricane and tornado-strength winds.

A report to the subcommittee by GSU indicates fewer than 10 people live within a five-mile radius of the proposed plant site. About 1,500 people live within a 10-mile radius, a figure the report said could climb to more than 3,200 by the year 2020.

The subcommittee also was told farming, timber industry and transportation activity in the area will not be affected by operation of the nuclear power plant.

If completed, the Blue Hills station would be hooked into the Gulf States electrical transmission grid, which serves customers in East Texas and Louisiana, Derr said.

"We originally had planned to have the Blue Hills station operational by 1983," Derr said. The economic recession of 1974-75 slowed the demand for new electrical power, forcing Gulf States to move back the projected operating date of the plant, he said.

The utility company also is awaiting federal approval to begin construction of two reactors at the River Bend site near Baton Rouge. The latest cost estimate of the River Bend plant, which is expected to be completed by 1983, is \$1.6 billion, Gulf States consumer communications officer Pat McNeal said.

"There is no way of estimating the final cost of the Blue Hills plant," he said.

### Building Program Estimates Given

The Woodville Independent School Board of Trustees heard a presentation on Tuesday (May 24) by district Architect Jack Stansbury of Moore, Stansbury and Vaught, Inc. in which he forecast a September, 1979, completion date for construction of a new high school, gymnasium and vocational building.

Stansbury indicated that bids for the project would have to be put out this September (1976) in order to meet that projected completion date.

Total estimated project cost given by Stansbury stands at \$2,483,370.

The estimated building cost per square foot is now figured at \$28.50.

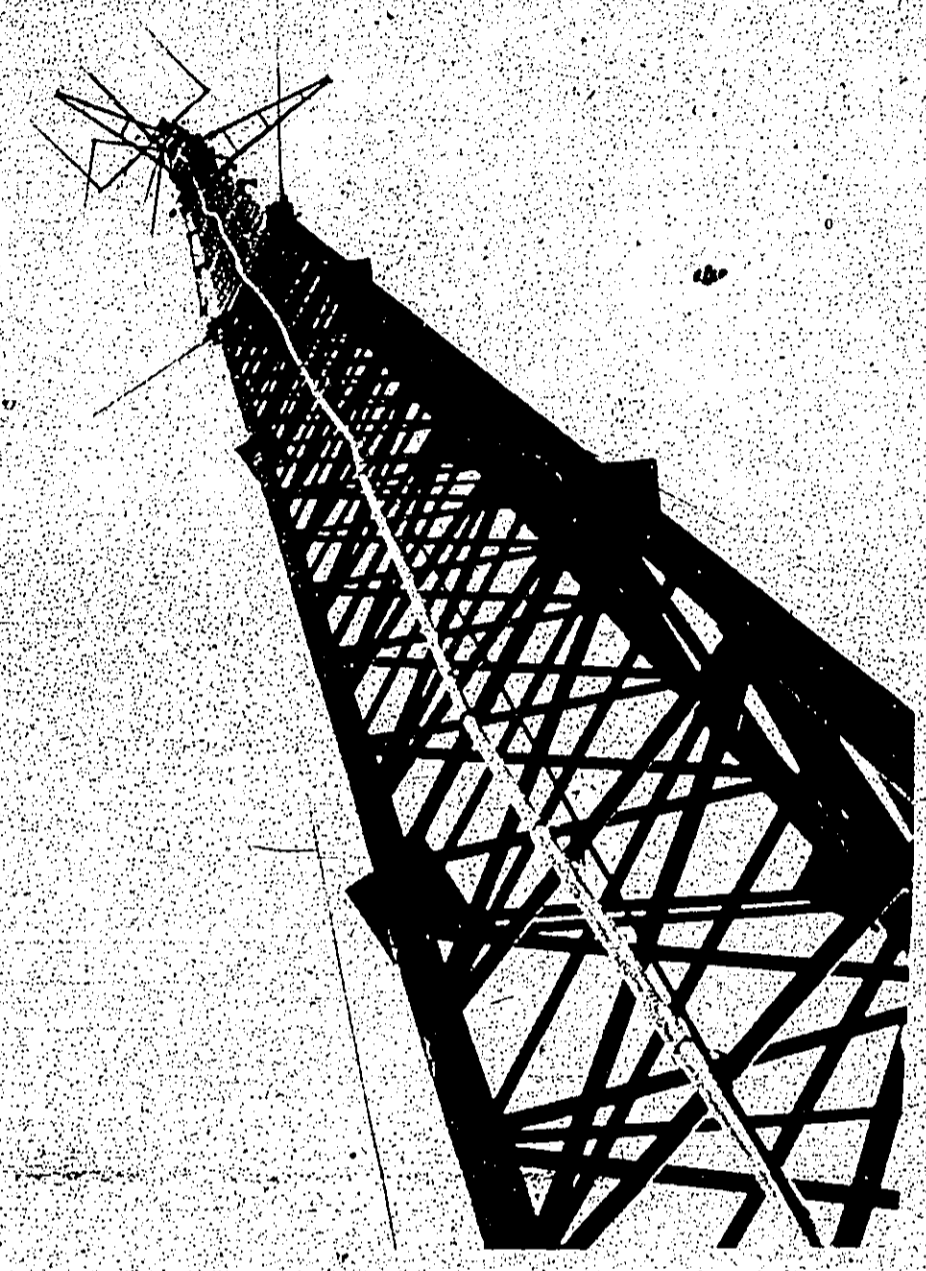
### Indian Pow-Wow June 3-4

More than 100 Indians from tribes across the nation are expected to join the Piney Woods Indians in brotherhood and competition.

Award winning dancers will be competing for the War Dance championship. These dancers will be performing the age old war rituals passed down to them from their forefathers. Also, colorful dances telling various stories of Indian history and tradition will be performed by members of the tribe. During the Pow-Wow, authentic, handmade artifacts and crafts will be for sale.

The winner of the Indian Princess contest will be announced Friday night during the first part of the celebration. The contestants were judged in four categories: Original Indian Dance, making Fry Bread, a traditional food of the tribe, telling Indian Folklore and Legend and their talent abilities.

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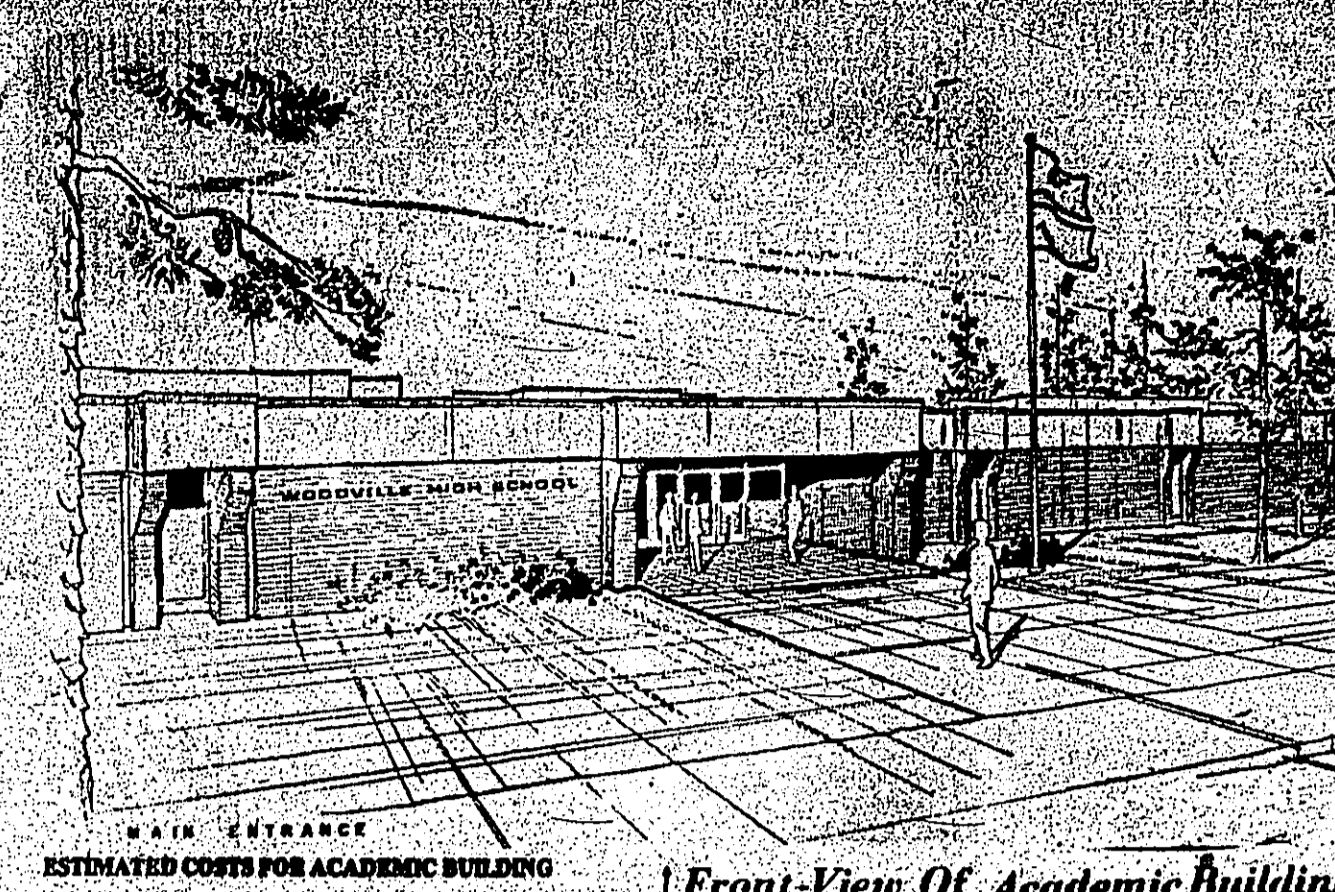
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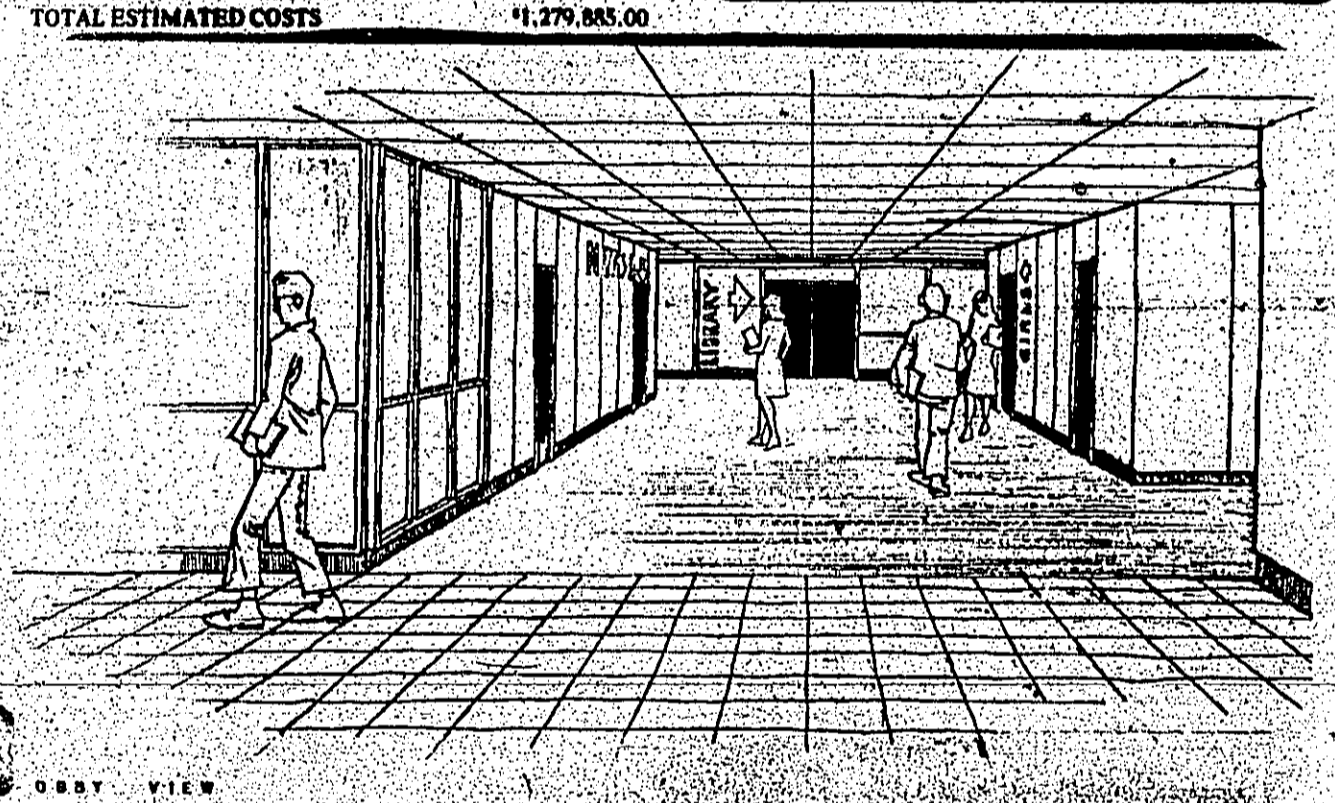

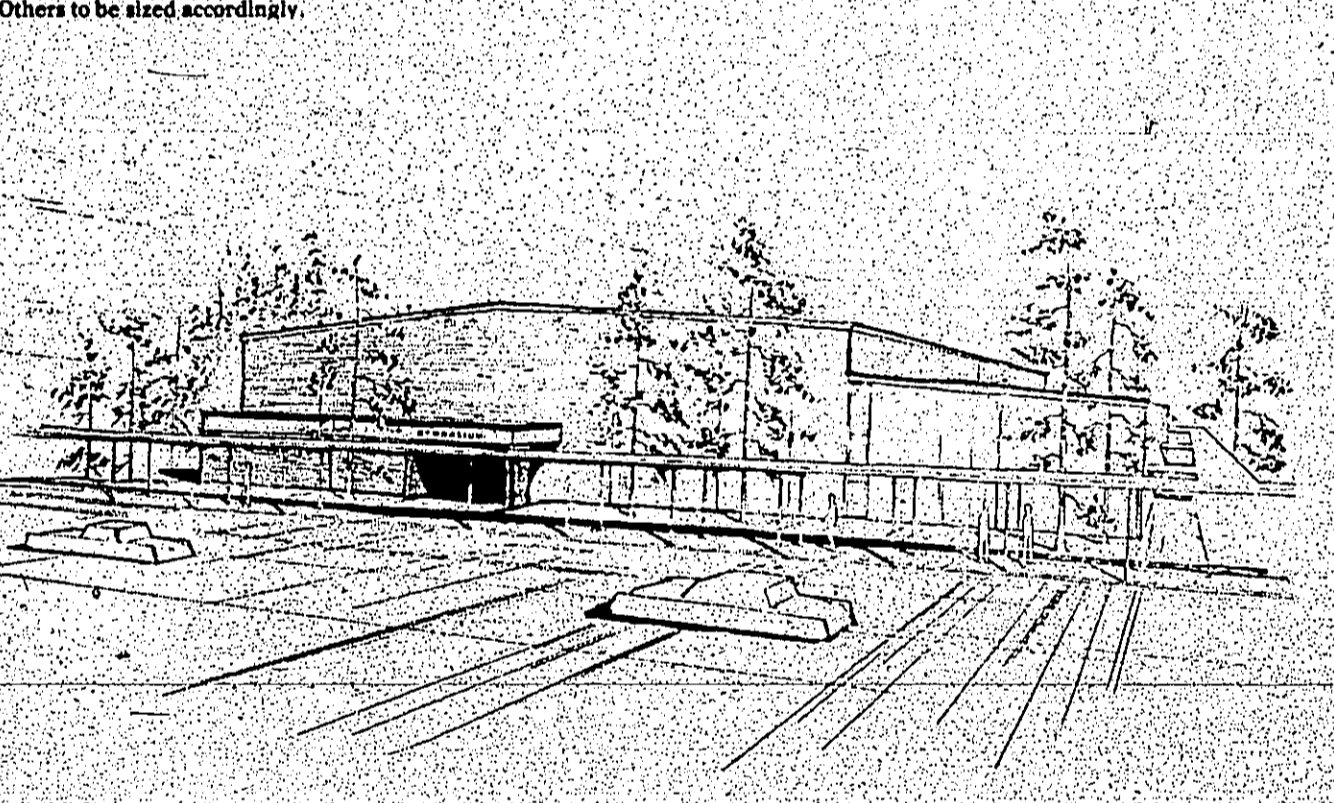
## School Bond Program Building Cost Estimates Given By Architect

### SPECIFICATION DATA FOR ACADEMIC BUILDING

- FOUNDATION:** Drilled footings with concrete grade beams and 4" concrete slab. All concrete reinforced.
- LUMBER & RELATED MATERIALS:** All interior partitions to be wood framing with pre-finished plywood paneling applied over 1/2" sound board. Inside walls of exterior wall are concrete block. All lumber in contact with masonry or concrete to be treated materials. Corridor walls would be formica covered panels applied over 1/2" plywood back-up. Panels are approximately 3/8" thick.
- GLASS & GLAZING:** Rest rooms to have mirrors over each lavatory. Windows to be 1/4" plate glass set in aluminum frames. Exterior doors are glass doors with aluminum frames.
- FINISH FLOORS:** In general, all floors are carpet, except rest rooms and kitchen. Dining, kitchen and laboratory to have vinyl floors. 4" vinyl base over carpet and vinyl floors.
- ROOF & SHEET METAL:** A lightweight concrete roof deck poured over metal decking is included. A 20-year built-up roof would be applied over the concrete deck. Concrete deck would serve as insulation for the attic space. All sheet metal would be galvanized iron or aluminum.
- PLUMBING:** Install a complete plumbing system as noted on drawings. P.V.C. and copper would be used for water and drain lines. American Standard fixtures or equal.
- HEATING & AIR CONDITIONING:** The entire building is to be air conditioned using roof-mounted units. Ducts would be either metal or fiberglass.
- ELECTRICAL:** Install a complete electrical system, including lay-in light fixtures and exterior lighting. Necessary look-up for all equipment.
- MASONRY:** All exterior walls are brick veneer with concrete block back-up to form inside finish walls. Waterproof between the 2 walls with mastic and waterproof brick walls between the 2 walls.
- STUCCO:** All facia and soffits are stucco finish with a sand finish.
- CERAMIC TILE:** Rest room floors and walls to be ceramic tile set over plaster back-up. Dishwasher room and main kitchen floors to be quarry tile.
- TOILET PARTITIONS:** Install metal toilet partitions in rest rooms. Provide necessary toilet accessories for each rest room.
- FOLDING PARTITIONS:** Folding partitions in home economics and speech rooms to extend from floor to ceiling. Others to be sized accordingly.

### SPECIFICATION DATA FOR GYMNASIUM

- FOUNDATION:** Drilled footings with concrete grade beams and 4" concrete slab. All concrete reinforced.
- LUMBER & RELATED MATERIALS:** Interior walls at the lobby and band practice rooms would be wood framing. All framing lumber No. 2 grade or better. Areas requiring sound treatment would have 1/2" sound board on both sides of walls and sound insulation between studs. Wall covering would be 5/8" Fire Code sheetrock or pre-finished plywood paneling.
- GLASS & GLAZING:** Install mirrors in rest rooms and locker rooms. Flued glass openings would have 1/4" thick plate glass.
- FINISH FLOORS:** Carpet in band and practice rooms and vinyl asbestos in lobby and public rest rooms. Concrete floors in locker rooms and showers. Install poured vinyl floor in gymnasium. All base to be 4" vinyl.
- MILLWORK:** All doors solid core set in wood frames. Cabinets and shelving to be unselect birch. Formica tops on all cabinets.
- CEILING:** In general, all ceilings would be a 2 x 2 suspended acoustical tile on metal suspension system.
- PAINTING:** Paint all woodwork 3 coats. All exterior concrete blocks to receive block filler and 2 coats masonry paint. Interior block walls to receive block filler and epoxy-type paint.
- MASONRY:** Exterior walls concrete block up to 12' above floor level. Interior walls to be concrete block except as noted in item 2. Shower and locker walls to be concrete block.
- CHALK & TACK BOARD:** Install chalk and tack boards in classrooms and locker rooms.
- PLUMBING:** A complete system of plumbing for rest rooms, shower rooms, and concession room. Fixtures to be American Standard or equal.
- ELECTRICAL:** All fixtures in suspended ceilings to be lay-in type. Provide sound system for gym. Provide necessary service for complete electrical system.
- METAL BUILDING:** In general, pre-engineered, three-span building with metal roof and walls. Exterior walls to extend from top of block wall to eave of roof. All roof and walls insulated.
- METAL LOCKERS:** Install metal lockers in locker rooms.
- TOILET PARTITIONS:** Install toilet partitions in rest rooms and include toilet accessories.
- ROOFING:** Finish metal roof and walls in concrete steel counter and divider sections in gymnasium.
- ALLOWANCES:** Included in estimate: \$500.00 for finish hardware; \$365.00 for kitchen laboratory; \$500.00 for china hardware.
- GENERAL CONDITIONS:** This item for all buildings includes pay roll taxes, insurance, temporary facilities and other job-related costs. Performance and payment bonds are included in estimate.
- SITE WORK:** Site work includes asphalt parking and driveways, concrete walks, clearing the site for construction, concrete 2 tennis courts, site drainage and finish grading. Some walks would be covered with either galvanized or aluminum covered walkways. Parking will be provided for 183 cars.

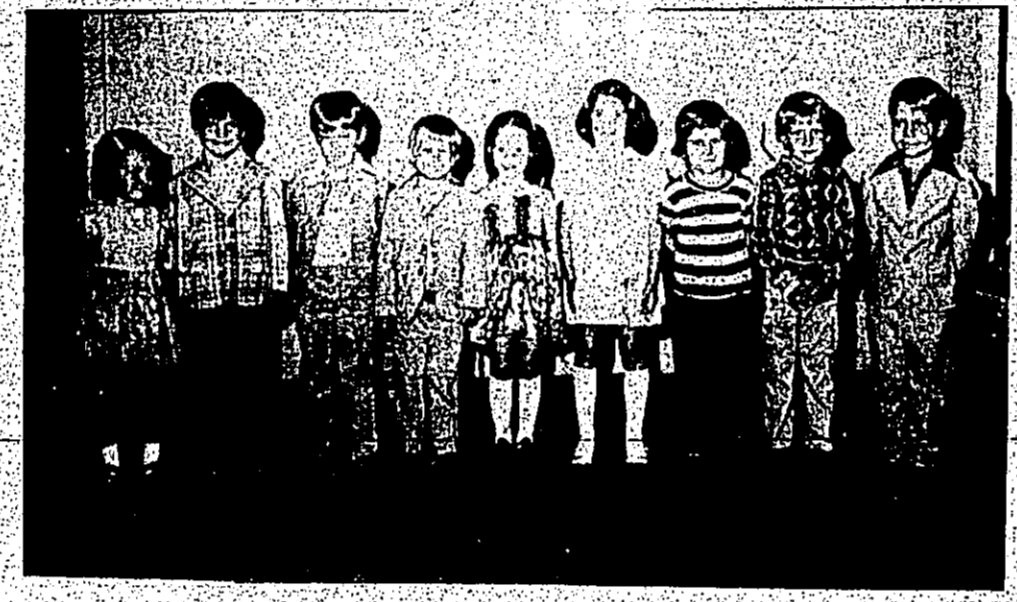

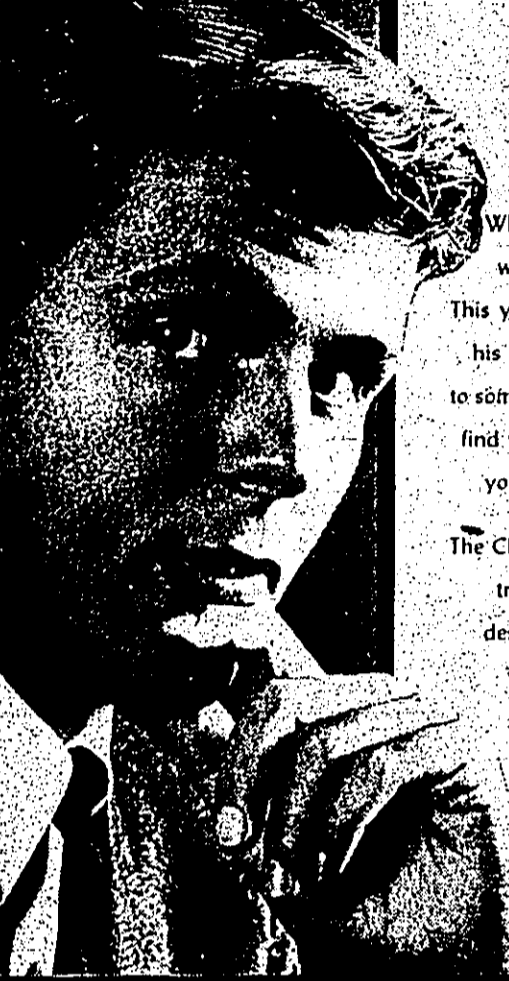

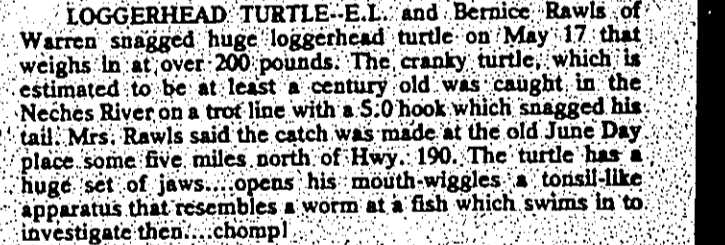

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# Jim Browder Report

AUSTIN—Many of the major pieces of legislation that have been passed by the House and the Senate are presently in a conference committee with the hope that a compromise can be reached before the end of the Session at midnight May 30th. With the very controversial bills, it is difficult to pass an identical bill in both the House and Senate. The differences between the House and Senate bills must be worked out before the bill can be passed. For example, a bill is passed in the House and is then sent to the Senate for its action. If the Senate amends the bill, it must be sent back to the House for concurrence with the amended version. If the amended version is accepted by a majority vote of the House, the bill is sent to the Governor. If the House does not concur in the amendments, a conference committee will be called for by the chamber that originally passed the bill. This committee will have the responsibility of working out a compromise between the two versions of the bill. The conference committee consists of five House members appointed by the Speaker and five members appointed by the Lt. Governor. Prior to the appointment of these committee members, each chamber can, if they wish, instruct their representatives on the committee to pursue a particular course of action as the conference committee works on the bill. Committee members from each chamber vote as a unit and agreement on final action is determined by majority vote of both units. Once the Committee has agreed on a compromise, each chamber has the opportunity to accept or reject the compromise bill. This bill cannot be amended on the floor at this point. If the bill remains unacceptable to either chamber, it can be returned to the conference committee for further deliberation. At this point, the chamber that originally called for the conference committee can request that a new committee be formed. If the conference committee fails to produce a bill that is acceptable to both chambers, the bill will die at this point. If the committee recommendations are acceptable to both chambers, the bill is sent to the Governor. With only a few days remaining in the 56th Legislative Session, there are a number of conference committees working on some very critical issues. The conference committee has just completed deliberation of the appropriations bill. The school finance bill is still in conference committee with many of the big issues of this bill yet to be agreed upon. The medical malpractice bill is bogged down at this point with neither the House nor Senate willing to compromise any further. One more attempt will be made to work out these differences before the adjournment. It is my hope that the bills that come out of these committees will reflect the concerns of the majority of Texas citizens.

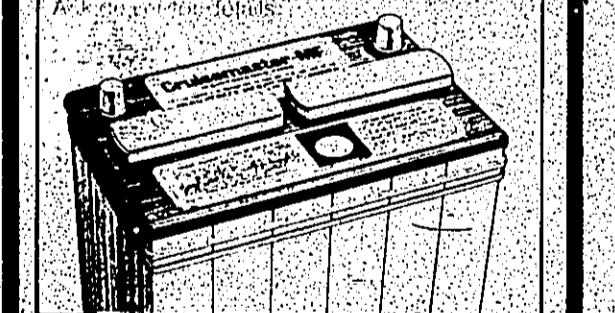
