Court Also Hears New Valuation, Audit Proposals

Commissioners Deny 'Conditional' Retirement Plea

Tyler County Commissioners Court denied a written proposition of retirement Monday as submitted by County School Superintendent George Barclay. The resignation, which was "conditional" in nature, stated that unless Judy Williams, the Assistant School Superintendent was named as next superintendent that Barclay would not resign.

The commissioners, in an open regular session meeting, told Barclay that they would accept his resignation if the request for Williams to be his successor was withdrawn. Barclay told the court that he would not do that and was then told by the commissioners that his resignation would not be accepted.

County Judge Allen Sturrock said "We will not do business that way. The court feels it would be unfair to shut the door on other applicants that have shown interest in having the job." Barclay's resignation proposition was written and submitted (in part) as follows:

"I am presenting today my sincere feeling that I wish to be retired from the office of Tyler County School Superintendent. Reasons obvious. With ample time for transition of my successor and time for me to take back my Teacher Retirement by making application in sufficient time. Since I am the duly elected officer by great majority of the voters of Tyler County, I feel obligated to name my successor. I think that I have a person, Miss Judy Williams, my assistant whose experience in the practices and duties of this office and who is competent, congenial and has promised she will to the best of her ability continue to be as faithful and obey the laws and duties set forth for this office to fulfill. Now without equivocation and with sound mind, I am asking you to elect Judy Williams to succeed me between the dates of July 1, 1977, but no later than July 15, 1977. If you feel as a

commission that this is an undue request then consider this retirement null and void and then so notify me. In other business, the commissioners voted to table utilization of a lease/purchase plan for funding a proposed new jail. The idea was presented by Bill Corbett from Corbett Services, Austin, Corbett, representing a group of private investors offered the county financial backing for the project, if the county qualifies, he said. Estimated cost for the construction of the new jail is \$620,000, Corbett said, adding that his company would lend this amount to the county at an interest rate of between 4.75 per cent and 5 per cent for a period of 20 years. Cost to the county would be approximately \$15,000 quarterly if building began within three months. To find out if the county qualifies, the county would need to risk \$8,000 to have Corbett Services investigate the county government to see if the payments could be met. That fee involves four activities: legal assistance, financial research, court research and architectural plans. If the county did qualify the money

would then be rebated, if not Corbett Services would keep the fee, the financier said. Judge Sturrock stated that "the public must have a say in this project" and suggested several public hearings regarding the building and funding of the jail. Considered also at this time is the possibility of a regional jail to be centrally located and which would serve Jasper, Newton and Tyler Counties with each county having a small holding place until prisoners could be transported to a larger facility.

County Judge Allen Sturrock's interpretation that it is an "outside firm" was used only on a "consulting" basis that the cost would center somewhere around \$50,000. The program has been requested by commissioners and County Tax Assessor/Collector Barbara Tolbert. Pritchard said, "The program is not designed to raise taxes but to see that everyone is listed on the rolls and everyone is paying their fair share." The court tabled approval of the Pritchard proposal until Friday when a more detailed presentation will be made by Pritchard and Barbara Tolbert.

Also tabled until Friday was the courts approval of an independent audit of the county's operation. William Keys and John Eppes, auditors from Silsbee, presented the proposal to commissioners at an estimated cost between \$12,000 and \$16,000. The county has budgeted \$15,000 for the audit, which is required by the federal government through a revenue sharing program. Judge Sturrock stated "We want a better idea of what the actual cost will be before the court accepts your proposal."

Council Appoints New Magistrate

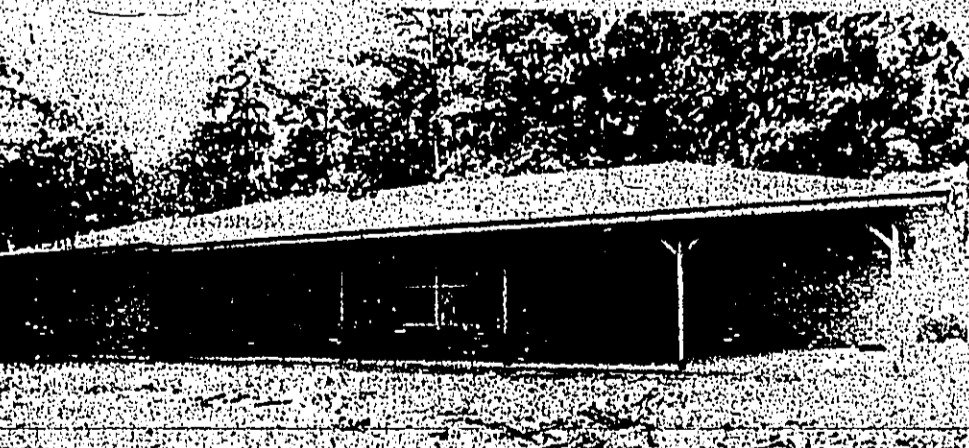
The Woodville City Council acted to appoint a new municipal judge Monday night during the groups regular monthly meeting. Filling the shoes of his father T.E. Phillips who asked to be excused from the position "regretfully" the council voted unanimously to appoint Carl Phillips, his 54 year-old son as the new city magistrate.

Phillips reportedly asked to be relieved of his duties following an apparent auto accident which according to his son "aggravated some back problems." The senior Phillips assured the council that he would stay on to help "in the mornings." He said the duties of the office were to "Pass on the legality of the officers complaint and to

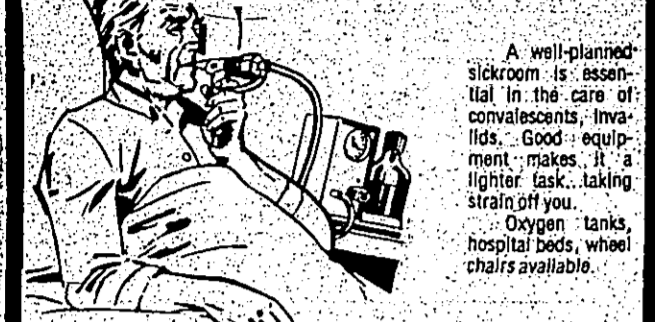

Welfare Dept. Offers Aid

A child support enforcement program, sponsored by the State Department of Public Welfare is available to all persons in Hardin, Jasper, Newton, Orange, Polk, Tyler and San Jacinto counties regardless of whether they are on public assistance. The service is available to mothers, fathers, grandparents and others who have custody of children but who are not receiving support from a parent who is able to provide financial help. Since the beginning of the year almost 300 cases have been filed in the above mentioned counties, including more than 50 in Hardin County alone. Children who are receiving Aid to Families With Dependent Children can benefit from the child support collection program free of charge. Those who are not receiving public assistance must pay a minimal application fee of \$20. When the absent parent is brought into court, DPW attorneys also ask that the judge order the absent parent to pay attorney fees and costs of court in addition to the child support owed. In searching for run-away parents, DPW attorneys use local, state and federal parent locator services, which are available solely for help in collection of child support payments. The cases, which have been brought in the various District Courts include motions of contempt, suits affecting parent-child relationships and paternity suits. Contempt motions are filed when a prior order for support exists but has not been complied with as ordered. Child relationships are filed when no previous order exists. This situation arises when divorce decrees do not spell out child support arrangements, or when parents are separated but not divorced. Paternity suits are filed when it is necessary to establish paternity for the purpose of obtaining child support. The child support collection service is available in all 15 counties covered by Region 10 of DPW. For more information, persons living in Southeast Texas should call 835-3751 in Beaumont or the AFDC caseworker in the local State Department of Public Welfare office.

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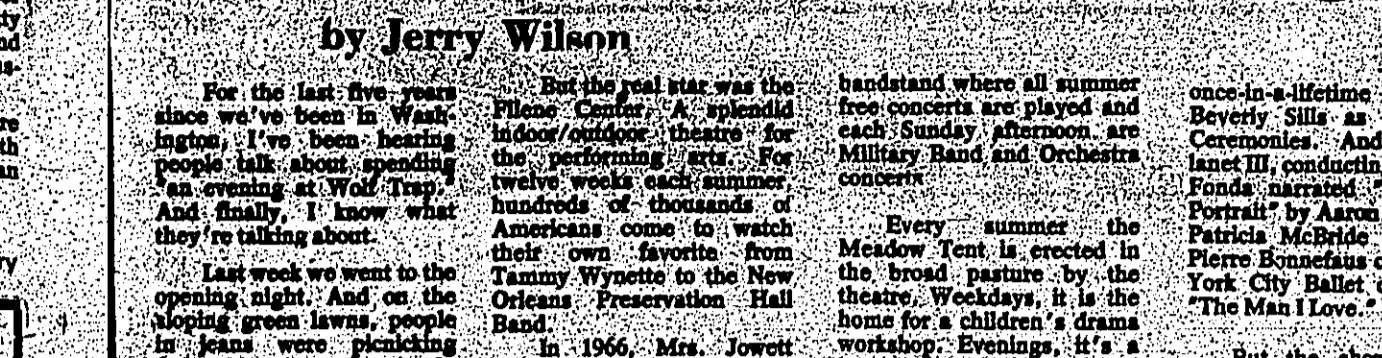

If you find what you think is a potential national or state champion tree, write the Texas Forest Service, College Station, Texas 77843 for a nomination form and instructions on how to measure the tree. The Forest Service will verify your nomination, and if the tree is of national champion stature, will forward a nomination to the American Forestry Association, keepers of the national big tree registry in Washington, D.C.

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Marital Obligations (1)

Self-centeredness keeps one's eyes on self and his needs or wishes. It blinds one to the happiness of his wife. To help men dwell with their wives according to knowledge is, in part, what these studies are all about.

PROVIDENT: Forgivefulness is the basic idea. I Timothy 5:8 says, "But they that provide not for their own, but for the wife and children, have denied the faith that is good, and they shall be cursed, and shall be cursed, and shall be cursed." (1 Tim. 5:8). How many wives suffer because of the selfish hands of their husbands, too lazy to work and make her a good living.

HEAD: "For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church, and he himself saves the church, which is his body." (Ephesians 5:23). God said to Eve, "...And they desire shall be to thy husband, and he shall rule over thee." (Genesis 3:16). Something for husbands to remember is that he will submit himself to God, and he will submit to God first and in doing the will of God he will submit to his wife in those things which do not violate the law of God.

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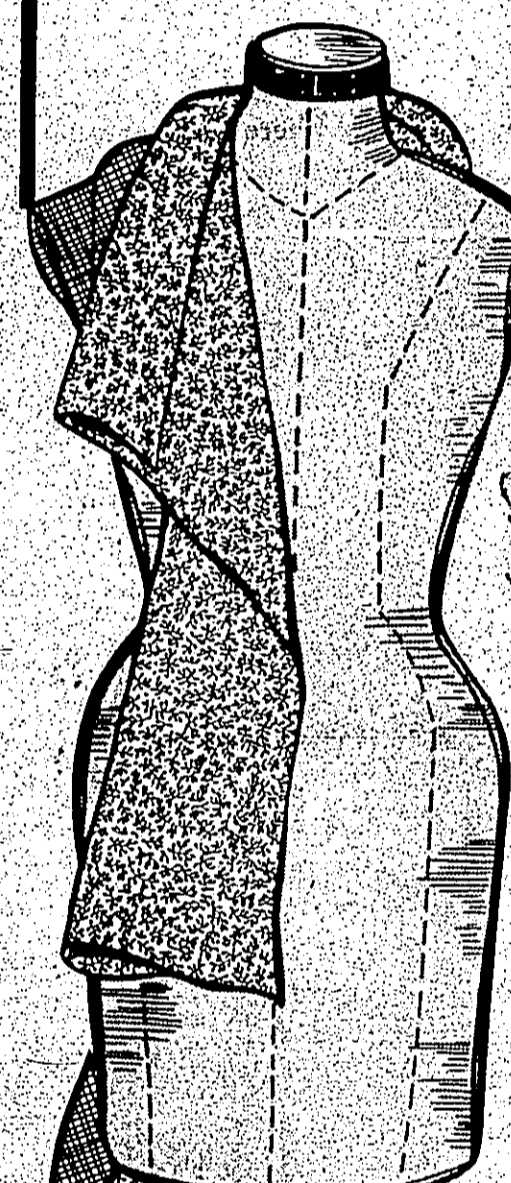
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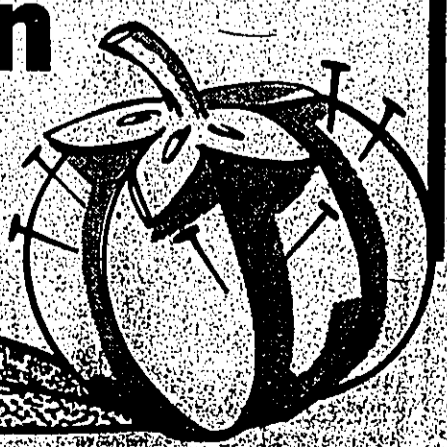
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Industrial Award Entrants Sought

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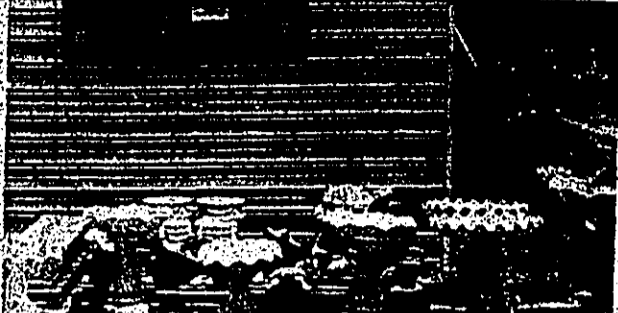
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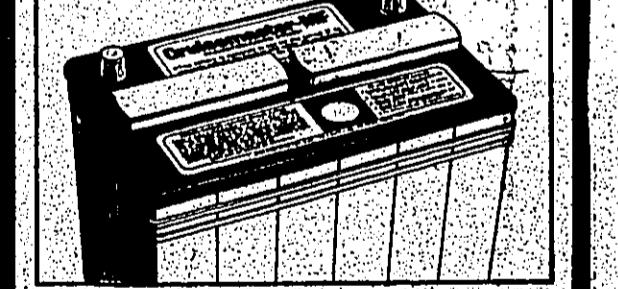
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"Jungle Journey" Program Moving On
