Money Available For Special Projects

The Deep East Texas Council of Governments will be receiving an additional \$300,000 in CETA Title VI Public Service Employment funds. Senator Adams Appeals For Extended Sessions

State Senator Don Adams of Jasper addressed the Deep East Texas Development Association at its regularly monthly meeting held last Friday at the Woodville Inn and told the group of his overall disappointment during the recently ended legislative session calling it "Very unproductive and not one of accomplishment."

Adams told the group that it was a waste of energy to try to place blame for the failures of the 140 day legislative gathering but told the group that the most important place he thought was to place the blame on "The situation we found ourselves in under the constitution of this state in being limited by only 140 days. Adams spoke in favor of a biennial session of the legislature which he said was an unpopular idea and one which has been soundly defeated. Adams said opponents of the bill have said it would be too costly to hold the biennial session and that more laws could be enacted.

Browder Fields Questions

Tough questioning from Tyler County School Superintendents and from Tyler County Commissioners as well as from a "good" crowd which gathered at the Citizens State Bank in Woodville Thursday, June 21, were fielded by State Representative Jim Browder in his first visit to Tyler County since the closing of legislative activities just recently.

Browder commended the group for their good questions and assured them he would follow up wherever he could. He reminded them, however, that he was "Only a freshman but learning fast," he said.

Warren School Superintendent Adolph Hryhorchuk surfaced the question of rural vs. urban financing designed "in favor" he said, "around the metropolitan areas of the state which already has good roads. Hryhorchuk was informing Browder of the bad roads situation in rural Texas and how the buses which are used by metropolitan and rural districts alike, cannot compete when it comes to wear and tear and resulting servicing of the vehicle in the two different road situations.

Commissioner Precinct One, Maxie Riley told Browder, "We need some relief," and asked the Representative for guidance on how to get the Tyler County commissioners more involved in seeking additional funding.

"We need something more concrete," Riley said "so we can make more long range plans." Riley cited current problems on the Hillister and Rockland bridges and the general overall need, he said, Tyler County had for more road funding dollars.

"What can we do to back you more so we can get better roads?" Riley asked. Riley also questioned the

Representative about current "jailhouse" laws saying that Tyler County was looking for any assistance that it can get in that area.

Kathy Thomas, a teacher in the Warren School district questioned the legislator closely about teacher pay raises saying that salaries for starting teachers at least "Left nothing to save?"

Browder in his campaign in Tyler County promised before he was elected to work toward the following: state leadership in a strong education program; apprehension and punishment of criminals; not their weapons; a strong workable utilities commission; a realistic ad valorem tax structure; and, realistic drug laws.

Board 'Disposes' Voting Box Idea

The Woodville Independent School Board of Trustees agreed on a formal motion initiated by Trustee Harold "Bud" Allison with a second by Doctor W.S. Nichols and the unanimous vote of the entire board not to act on a request by local airline pilot Jack Ealer which sought to establish voting boxes in the communities of Hillister and Dam-B.

Ealer who brought the request before the board several meetings ago asked that the matter be placed before the board at its next regular meeting. The item as listed on the Tuesday agenda (June 19) as one which was geared to "Dispose of the question of adding additional voting boxes in the Woodville Independent School District for future elections."

Trustee Fred Sullivan said, "It would be great, but when you look at the recent voter number turnouts in recent elections it's been a very small number and whenever you begin dividing them up you got a very small number."

Harold "Bud" Allison said that "Whenever you start having to redistrict everything, then the people who live on the borderline will produce just as many unhappy voters as those you make happy."

Ealer who brought the request before the board several meetings ago asked that the matter be placed before the board at its next regular meeting. The item as listed on the Tuesday agenda (June 19) as one which was geared to "Dispose of the question of adding additional voting boxes in the Woodville Independent School District for future elections."

Linnam reported that in the cases where there was more than one voting box that the decision came as a result of consolidation agreements within those districts.

"I personally feel," School Board President Dr. R.E. Swearingen said, "that if we put one in every community that we'd have to put them in every one."

Board President Swearingen referred to the inconvenience, in some ways, to "Dogwood Day" and during inclement weather but suggested again that a person had only to walk to the mailbox to vote.

Sullivan said "While in principal and theory it would be a very desirable thing to put one at every church and neighborhood, but from the economic and realistic standpoint it doesn't seem like it would be."

Swearingen said that the question was not a new one to the board and that, "We've been kicking it around for some 18 years. It's nothing new."

The more I think about it," Swearingen said, "There's no way those people can be disenfranchised, because they can still vote by mail. It's very simple," he said, "all they have to do is vote by mail. They don't even have to come to Woodville."

Swearingen said that the question was not a new one to the board and that, "We've been kicking it around for some 18 years. It's nothing new."

County Receives Grant

Tyler County has been awarded a grant totaling some \$44,000 to be used towards the hiring of four persons who will be trained in appraising and measuring properties, according to Barbara Tolbert, County Tax Assessor/Collector.

The grant is made possible by the Deep East Texas Council of Governments Manpower CETA Program.

The updating program, to be started in the near future will involve getting tax values correct, the tax assessor said, making sure that everyone is on the rolls so that proper equalization of the property values can be attained.

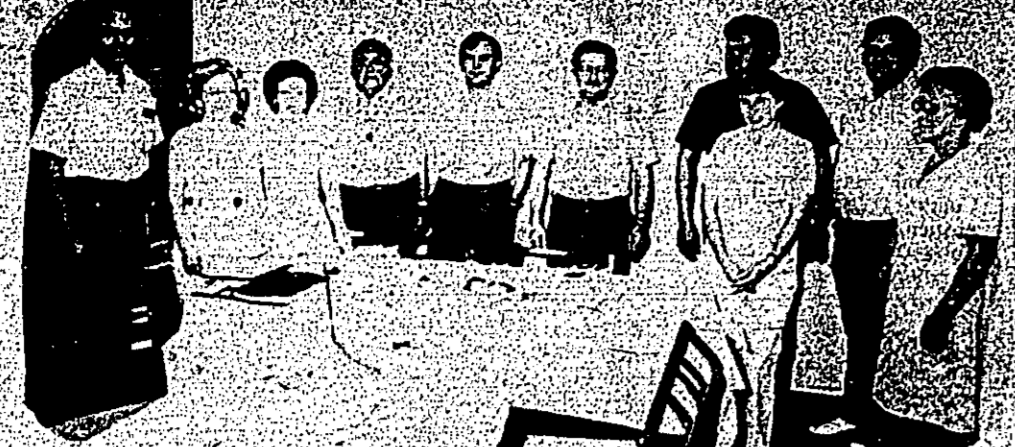

Average Price Of Gasoline Passes 60¢ Per Gallon

The average price of regular gasoline in Texas has passed the 60-cent-per-gallon level and further price increases are coming at many service stations before the July Fourth weekend.

A survey of 231 service stations conducted by the American Automobile Association, Texas Division, revealed average gasoline prices per gallon of 60.2¢ for regular, 61.0¢ for unleaded and 64.6¢ for premium.

While these prices represent an increase of only about one-half cent per gallon over the prices revealed by AAA's survey just before the Memorial Day weekend (59.8¢ for regular, 62.7¢ for unleaded and 64.4¢ for premium), many station operators told AAA that their prices would be going up 1 to 2 cents per gallon around July 1.

A comparison of AAA's study with one made at the same time last year shows that the average price of regular gas has risen 3.9 cents a gallon in the past year. Unleaded fuel averages 4.7 cents a gallon more, and premium has gone up 4.2 cents a gallon.

Motorists should have few problems finding an open station during the July Fourth weekend. All but one of the 231 stations surveyed will be open on Saturday, while 72 percent will be open on Sunday and 85 percent on Monday.

Service stations in College Station, Fort Worth and McAllen tied for the lowest priced gasoline found anywhere in the state by the survey, 61.3 cents per gallon for regular. A station in Fort Stockton reported the highest price, 72.6 cents a gallon for fuel.

The survey indicated that motorists who pump their own gas can save an average of 4.3 cents per gallon off the fuel-service price of fuel.

Each 4-H member will receive six hours training in one of these fields and is expected to share the skill with other 4-H club members in their county.

Applications Sought For Airport Aid

The Texas Aeronautics Commission is accepting requests from Texas counties and municipalities for matching funds under the FY 1978 Texas Airport Aid Program.

Charles Martin, Executive Director, announced that applications for grants are being sought prior to the September 1, 1977 starting date in order to expedite program funding.

The Legislature has appropriated \$1 million for the FY '78 program, which under the 50/50 matching grant provisions, can provide economic benefits for a substantial number of communities. The emphasis of the program this year will be upon construction of airports in communities not now served, and especially upon those unable to obtain federal aid.

Every effort will be made to expedite construction of approved projects in order to assure their completion within the same fiscal year. Cities and counties prepared for immediate action are encouraged to respond. Higher priority will be placed on requests for matching funds greater than \$5,000 for local capital airport improvements.

The Legislature has removed the restriction which previously limited the Commission's participation to communities of less than 75,000 population, and has raised the amount of 50/50 matching funds available for any single airport project to \$75,000. Cities and counties which have already filed a formal request for aid may revise their requests or confirm by letter that their applications are still valid.
