

## Fire Guts Woodville School Building

The schoolhouse is on fire were the words that three unidentified young men used when they reported to Police Chief Gary Mattingly that Kirby High School was on fire. Mattingly took a look out the police station door then relayed the "Major fire" call to Sheriff's department dispatcher James L. Almond interrupting what

would have been a sleepy July 4 holiday. Woodville suddenly came alive.

The call from Mattingly was officially logged at 11:15 Monday morning with subsequent calls for assistance to the Colmesneil and Jasper Volunteers which were logged at 11:40 a.m. Firemen fought furiously

under extremely dangerous conditions for two hours straight until the fire began to contain itself or at least burn in one direction toward the chemical storage, chemistry lab, classroom at the north wing of the building. That classroom later blew one of its walls to a 45 degree angle and sent a large number of heavy metal lockers sliding down the hallway.

The fire seemed to have started at the intersection of the "T-shaped" building burning north and east at the same time.

"We're fortunate there were no classes in session," said the wife of school board trustee W.S. Nichols.

Firemen had trouble getting water on the blaze since a majority of the flame was contained in the two foot false

ceilings and it was spreading rapidly.

Rumors of previous nights fireworks activities and other possibilities were suggested by firemen as they fought the blaze but with no resulting conclusions or evidence as of late Tuesday.

Fire Marshal Alva Cook, who acted in the place of Fire Chief O.L. Marsh who was away for the day, found him-

self monitoring the blaze by continuously walking around the large structure and keeping in radio contact insuring proper water pressure and hose placement.

Courageous firemen from Colmesneil and Jasper mounted the roof and moved in close with Woodville volunteers trying to extinguish the fire.

Volunteer firemen from a Houston suburb, Forest Bend, pitched in when they heard about the blaze as they were vacationing at Lake Ivanhoe. Local firemen were very appreciative of their efforts during the blaze and were trading off information about each others departments capabilities and equipment.

Cooks said he requested a visit from the State Fire Marshal's office. "Not blaming anyone, but mainly just because it's the fourth of July and we'd be wrong if we didn't have this thing investigated."

Fire Marshals are usually called in when there is a possibility of arson he said.

The Woodville schools have been the target of what firemen believe to be continuous arson attempts. Two incidents have occurred earlier this year.

The only reported injury as a result of the blaze was sustained by volunteer helper Mack Dorsey who lacerated his wrist and hand on a window that he was trying to punch out in order to get water on the flames.

Volunteer offerings of help from community residents plus sandwiches, soda, iced tea and iced water, brought smiles from the firemen as they worked the fire in exhausting temperatures that rose near the 100 degree mark.

School Superintendent Tom Linam and School Board President Dr. R.E. Swearingen watched as the fire defied the firemen.

"We want to give profound thanks to the firemen for their efforts and to everyone who volunteered and assisted to try to put out the fire."

Swearingen said the school board would meet Wednesday (July 6) at 7 p.m. at the schools administration building to assess the situation.

"We've asked the portable building companies to be present to put together estimates on what it would

some are score head.

School Principal Bennett Hanna, who was away on vacation near Carthage returned home around 11 p.m. Monday night only to be told of the fire by a friend who telephoned the day events.

Early Tuesday morning Hanna, along with other school officials were examining the damage to the property and to the students record files.

School officials were lauding the firemen calling it "a miracle" that the adjacent classrooms and library and gymnasium weren't spared by the fire. "They did a tremendous job," said Aubrey Bradley.

The Kirby High School campus has had its share of fire over the years. Once in August 1923 when George Tubb, a student at the school, an home to get his "Brownie" and subsequently recorded the event on film. Twenty years later in 1943 on August 2, another fire hit the main KHS building and it was completely destroyed that year. School officials report that area churches and the Masonic Lodge were set up for classrooms to handle the situation.

## Accident Claims Life

A late night accident on F.M. 255, claimed the life of one Tyler County youth and sent two more to the hospital during the July 4th weekend.

Dead on the scene was Ricky Brasler, 18, of Colmesneil, who died of injuries received in the crash. The two other youths involved in the accident were Randy Brasler, brother to the deceased, 19, and Chris Hightower, 24, of Colmesneil, who were taken to Jasper Memorial Hospital by Elenders Ambulance Service. The two youths were listed in fair condition late Saturday evening and were released Sunday morning. Randy Brasler received a broken arm from the accident and Hightower escaped with minor injuries.

According to Department of Public Safety Officer Billy Platt, the youths were traveling west on Farm to Market Road 255 at approximately 9 p.m. when their car hit some loads of dirt that were dumped in the middle of the road, which is currently still under construction.

Apparently the driver of the car, Hightower, did not see the dirt due to the dust the car ahead of them had stirred up. Officers speculate that the boys had been to the Neches River Bridge and were on their way back when the accident occurred. No other vehicles were involved in the accident. For Ricky Brasler, services will be held Monday, July 4, with burial at the Colmesneil Cemetery.

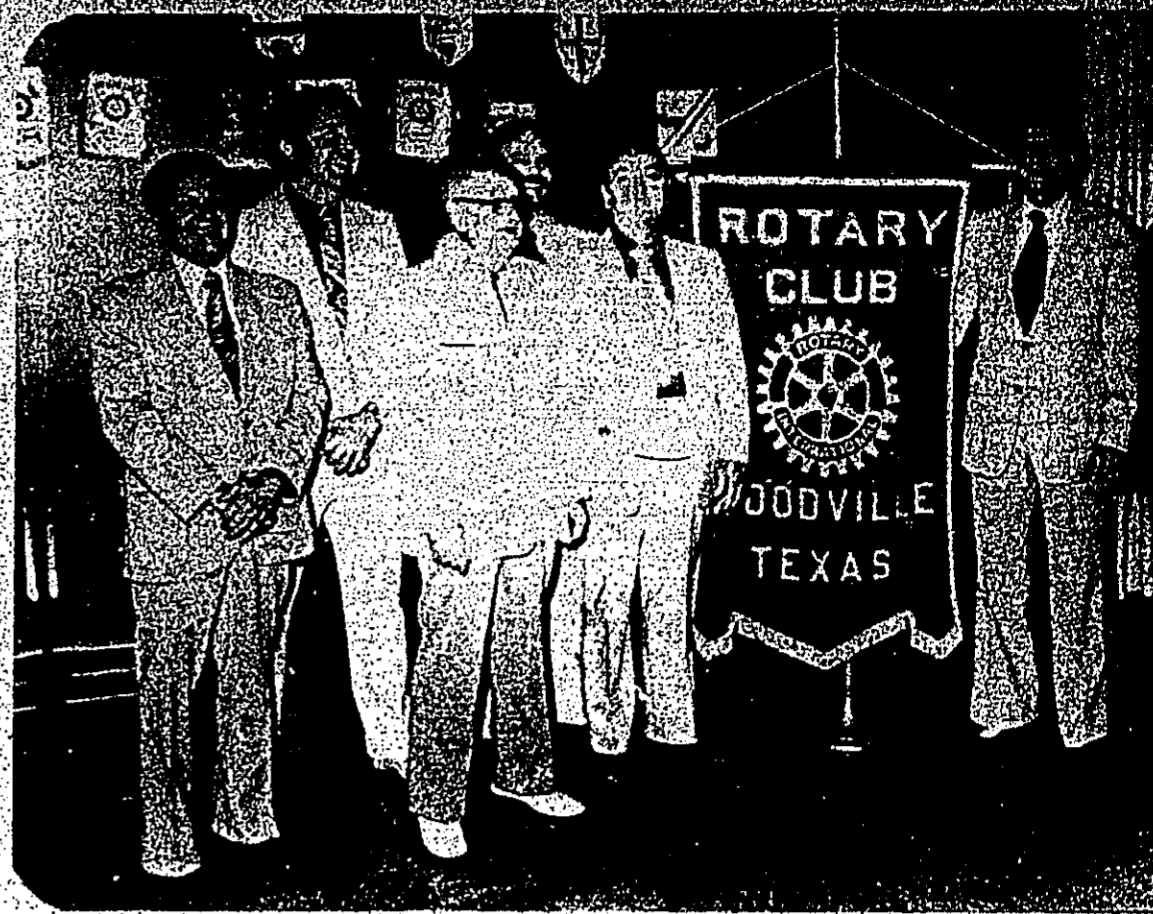
One new attraction at the reunion this year was a large cake called "Dominy Land". It was made in a map form showing the area of and around Tyler County where the older Dominy's settled.

# Uniform Health Code For Food Services Possible

A new set of rules governing health requirements for places serving food may soon benefit both the dining public and restaurant owners, according to the Texas Department of Health.

The proposed rules would give restaurant owners in Texas a standard guide to sanitary practices, said James M. Doughy, Jr., Director of Food and Drug Division for TDHR. "Recent studies have shown that food-borne illnesses and diseases are a health problem. Another purpose of the new rules, therefore, is to reduce such outbreaks to protect the consumer from adulterated and insanitary food," Doughy said.

The Department has been holding a series of public hearings across the state about proposed regulations dealing with food service sanitation," said Doughy.

Each city in Texas establishes health standards through local ordinances for places that serve food. The local ordinances cover food serving operations, the food servers, the serving equipment and utensils, the examination of the food and the sanitation of the eating establishment. These local ordinances often differ quite a bit from one city to another.

The new proposed rules on food service sanitation would give all the cities the same common set of regulations from which they could draw up their ordinances.

"We have a lot of chain-type restaurants in the state today selling hamburgers, chicken, fish—and other things," Doughy said. "If one city, and then find sanitation requirements for the same kind of eating place totally different in another city, the chains would like to have the rules governing such things as building plans, lighting, ventilation and storage to be the same for the entire state. We hope that the proposed rules on food service sanitation will make inspections statewide more uniform," said Doughy.

The original of the form will be given to the owner and will summarize the new regulations. The various requirements for proper food service sanitation will have different point values. The score of the restaurant will be the number of points accumulated from violations subtracted from 100.

When the score is less than 60, the establishment must begin correcting its violations within 48 hours. One or more reinspections will be conducted at reasonable time intervals to assure that the proper action is being taken.

An imminent health hazard exists, such as a sewage backup, or the complete lack of sanitation or refrigeration, the restaurant must stop serving food immediately. It can't begin again until authorized to do so by the local health authority. Penalties for violations can be imposed under the Texas Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act.

While the cities are responsible for the sanitation of the places that serve

**"Desk Sitters Slump" Strikes Thousands**

"Desk sitters' slump" is a problem that strikes thousands of office workers, making them feel tired, tense and inefficient. This common disease also can open the way for a whole host of problems including heart attacks and obesity, the Texas Medical Association says.

Basically, desk sitters' slump is caused by hours of office work with little variety or exercise. At work a person's mind might be engaged, but the body often just sits and sags. In fact, many office workers spend 14% of the 16 daily working hours sitting.

All that immobility makes endurance drop, fatigues and tension rise. One answer is exercise.

A Canadian physician group developed 14 exercises that both men and women of all fitness levels and ages can do easily right in the office. These exercises will not get someone in shape for the Olympics but they can help fight off desk sitters' slump.

One exercise designed to tone waist muscles and relieve lower back tension is the seated torso twist. While sitting, raise elbows to shoulder height and twist as far to the right and then to the left as possible. Repeat until you have done the exercise 10 times on each side.

Two even simpler exercises are designed to relieve neck and shoulder tension. One involves tilting the head slowly in a circle while seated. Reverse the direction and repeat about six times in each direction at a slow, easy pace. Another tension reducer is to sit upright and breathe in while strutting shoulders up for a few seconds. Then exhale and relax, holding that position for a few seconds. Repeat about six times.

An exercise to help hip and thigh muscles is the knees press. Sit forward on a chair with feet and knees close together. Breathe in and press knees tightly together for three-five seconds. Exhale and let knees relax. Do this exercise about 14 times.

A stomach exercise is to sit with hands on knees and breathe out while pulling stomach muscles in and up as far as possible. Hold this position for about five seconds, and then breathe in while relaxing muscles. Start at about six repetitions daily and build up to at least 10-20 daily.

All the exercises can be increased in time and strength. These, or other exercises should be done several times a day. Some of the exercises mentioned are isometric movements, which can increase circulation, endurance and strength.
