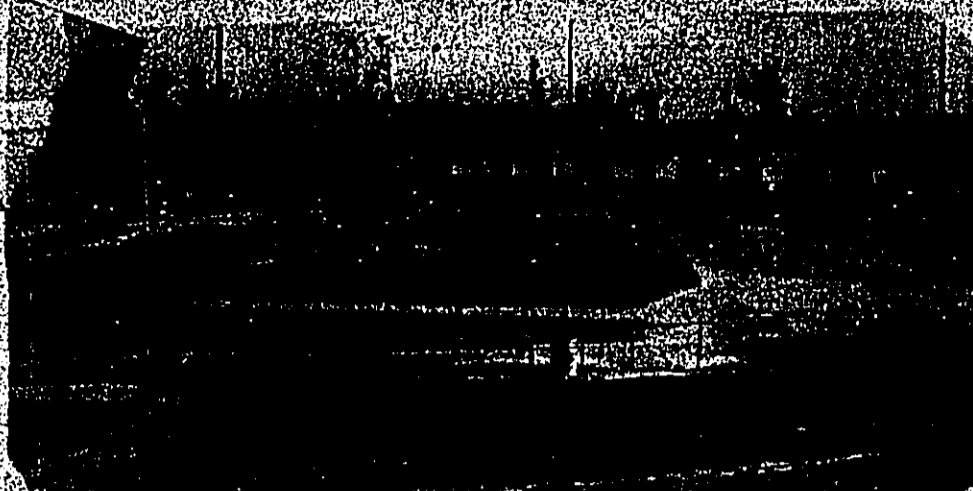


Woodville To Host Tournament



The state championships in Senior League 12-13 year olds and Big League 16-18 year olds will be held in Woodville, Texas on August 1-5.

"This is one of the highest honors that a town or county can receive as far as baseball is concerned," said Gary Hennigan, Tyler County Youth Baseball Association President.

According to Hennigan, the tournament directors were considering University of Texas at Arlington and

Texas A&M at Bryan and Woodville. Last week Tyler County Baseball Association learned that Woodville had been chosen as the site to hold the State Championships.

Don Hargrove, tournament director of Ft. Worth, Texas and Boy Scout district director from Beaumont came up and went through the facilities and "were so impressed they seemed to find it hard to believe that a community the size of Tyler County could have a complex

of this stature," Hennigan said.

Hargrove made the statement Tyler County should be real proud of their facilities as this complex rates as one of the best complexes in all of Texas.

The teams that finally reach Woodville for the State Championships will be the best four teams in the state of Texas competing to see who will advance on towards may be a possible trip to the world series.

There will be four teams of boys in Senior League and

four teams in Big League here the first week in August plus parents and followers of each team. Local television networks have been notified and say will carry coverage of the state tournament.

Hennigan said he hopes the people of Tyler County will come out and see these games.

Hennigan also said the stands should be full of scouts from the majors because some of the players playing will be future Major Leaguers. A schedule will be made and put in THE BOOSTER as soon as we know the teams that will be left playing for the State Championships.

Court OK's Festival, Plans Survey

Tyler County Commissioners met twice during the past week to finalize plans for a Safety Survey and to grant permits for a Country Western Music Festival to be held Labor Day weekend.

Jim Driscoll, representing the Office of Traffic Safety (O.T.S.), presented to commissioners in Wednesday's July 20 meeting a proposed system of identifying county roads. According to Driscoll, one major area of concern is inventory of roadway signs and their conditions for roadway hazards. O.T.S. has made a complete study of accidents and their locations throughout the county. Any site where more than 5 accidents have occurred, O.T.S. will recommend to the Department of Public Safety changes in the roadway design or other changes as they exist. But, before the survey can proceed any further, commissioners must first decide what type of road identification will be used.

Driscoll left with the commissioners a complete grid and marking system for their approval. Commissioners voted to table making a decision until August 2, during which time further study and consideration will be given to the proposed numbering system.

Commissioners met again Friday, July 22, to correct and amend the salary of the W.A. office. During the special meeting, commissioners voted to increase the

salary of the Veterans Administrator officer, Enoch Pitts, by 20 percent.

Also during this meeting Roger Stone, from Lufkin Texas, requested a permit to hold a three day Country Western Music Festival at the Green Valley Ranch in Colmesneil, owned by Billy (con't on Page 4A)

Rotary Governor Here

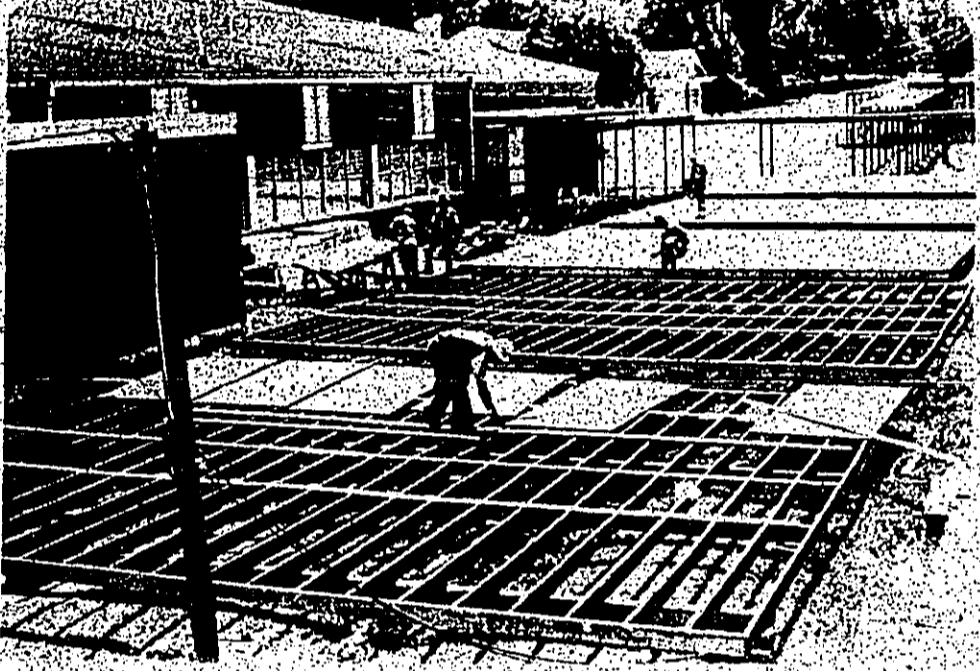

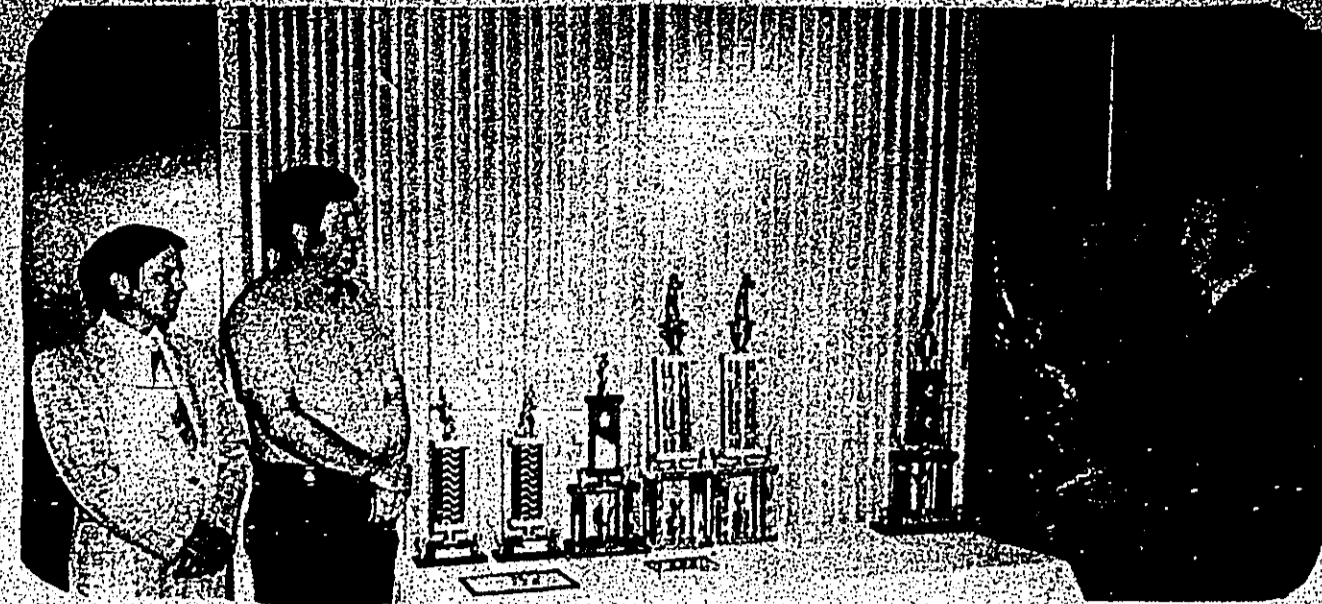


'I Do'

Scheduled Music Festival Causes Mixed Reactions

A Labor Day Country Western Music Festival scheduled to be held at Green Valley Ranch, owned by Billy Westbrook of Colmesneil, has received some verbal complaints. One group of citizens from the First Baptist Church of Colmesneil have made their objections known. Ron Walling, pastor of the church, speaking in general for the membership of the church said that "Our main concern is whether the law enforcement agencies can handle that large a group of people. This is not the official view of the church but at this time it is the general opinion of the church members." Walling stated that they have heard that other activities of this kind have ended up with property damage being done, large amounts of alcohol being consumed and some drug activity.

At this time, there are no petitions being circulated but Walling stated that if the need arises for one of that there would be a number of people who would sign it. According to Ruth Westbrook, who resides at Green Valley Ranch with her husband Max, "We have made our home here for the past three years and we would not do anything or bring anyone into our county who would damage either our property or others," adding "We only want to bring the country western stars to Tyler County so that the residents here can enjoy them." Ms. Westbrook went on to say that there would be food and drink available at the festival but that under no circumstances would alcoholic beverages be sold.

The festival is not a rock concert, according to Ms. Westbrook, just a gathering of top entertainers in the country western field. "We just want the residents to be able to see the top entertainers here in Tyler County," she said. "Everything will be on the up and up and will be in accordance with county laws," she added. The festival is to be held three days during the Labor Day Weekend. According to Ms. Westbrook, the promoter Roger Stone, is signing up the entertainers now and will know for sure who they will be next week.

Accent on Health Nursing Homes Have Improved In Recent Years

Even though there are deficiencies in some nursing homes, we should not forget how far we've come in the past few years, the Director of the Texas Department of Health's Nursing and Convalescent Homes Division, Howard C. Allen, asserts.

Nursing homes recently have come under fire-partly, chiefly in East Texas-for problems involving patient care.

Allen said there are bound to be some nursing homes which fail to provide proper services in all cases, even though the breakdowns may be temporary.

"But," said Allen, "the nursing home care has improved drastically in recent years. Some 25 years ago, nursing legislation called for regulation of nursing homes in Texas, the situations now being found in isolated cases were much more widespread."

"Back in those days, however," said Allen, "nursing homes were for the most part in private homes and large residential type structures. Compared to the operation of nursing homes today, the homes of 25 years ago had little physician direction and had much less nursing care provisions, less consideration to diet therapy, and less attention to the handling of medications-services against which complaints are being aired today."

"But since we began licensing and inspecting nursing homes, there has been a dramatic improvement in service and the quality of homes, and without these increases year by year. Today, the nursing home is a sophisticated institution averaging nearly 100 beds in size. In 1953 the average size home was 18 beds."

Allen said there are 1001 nursing and convalescent homes consisting of 98,500 beds licensed and under inspection by the Texas Department of Health.

Inspections and surveys cover such areas as administration, nursing care, dietary care, medical records, pharmacy services, sanitation, and physical environment. Most facilities participate in Medicare or Medicaid, or both. The Texas Department of Health performs surveys for certification of facilities under Medicare/Medicaid programs, in accordance with state and federal requirements, while at the same time making inspections for licensing.

To perform inspections and surveys the Department has 115 inspection personnel not counting supervisors, administrative and clerical personnel. Inspection staff consists of health facility surveys, nurses, nutritionists, pharmacists, medical record specialists, architects, and engineers. An in-depth survey to establish eligibility for continuing certification may range from two to five days in a facility, such a survey normally occurs annually. Other visits are made to verify correction of deficiencies or to investigate complaints. On the average a nursing home is visited about four times a year. All complaints, both written and verbal, are considered legitimate and are investigated.

Today, an entire new industry has grown up in nursing homes, said Allen. With application of the nationally recognized Life Safety Code, facilities are safe structures, and for the most part are modern, have central heating and air conditioning systems, and fire alarm and other safety equipment. Quality medical consultation, quality nursing, dietary, and pharmacy services, and records systems are stressed in the standards governing the operations of the homes. Hand in hand with improvements in physical surroundings, Allen said, has come training for personnel employed in nursing homes.

As for the menu-it was as cool as possible: Cold gazpacho, Salmon mousse, Artichoke hearts, Chicken crepes, and a three-layered frozen dessert which I could hardly look at.

Mrs. Begin, an earthy woman said it was her first time to make a speech on her own. "I've always tried to keep to the Greta Garbo image. One star in the family is enough."

Accompanied for the evening was Miss Debbie Dean of Woodville.



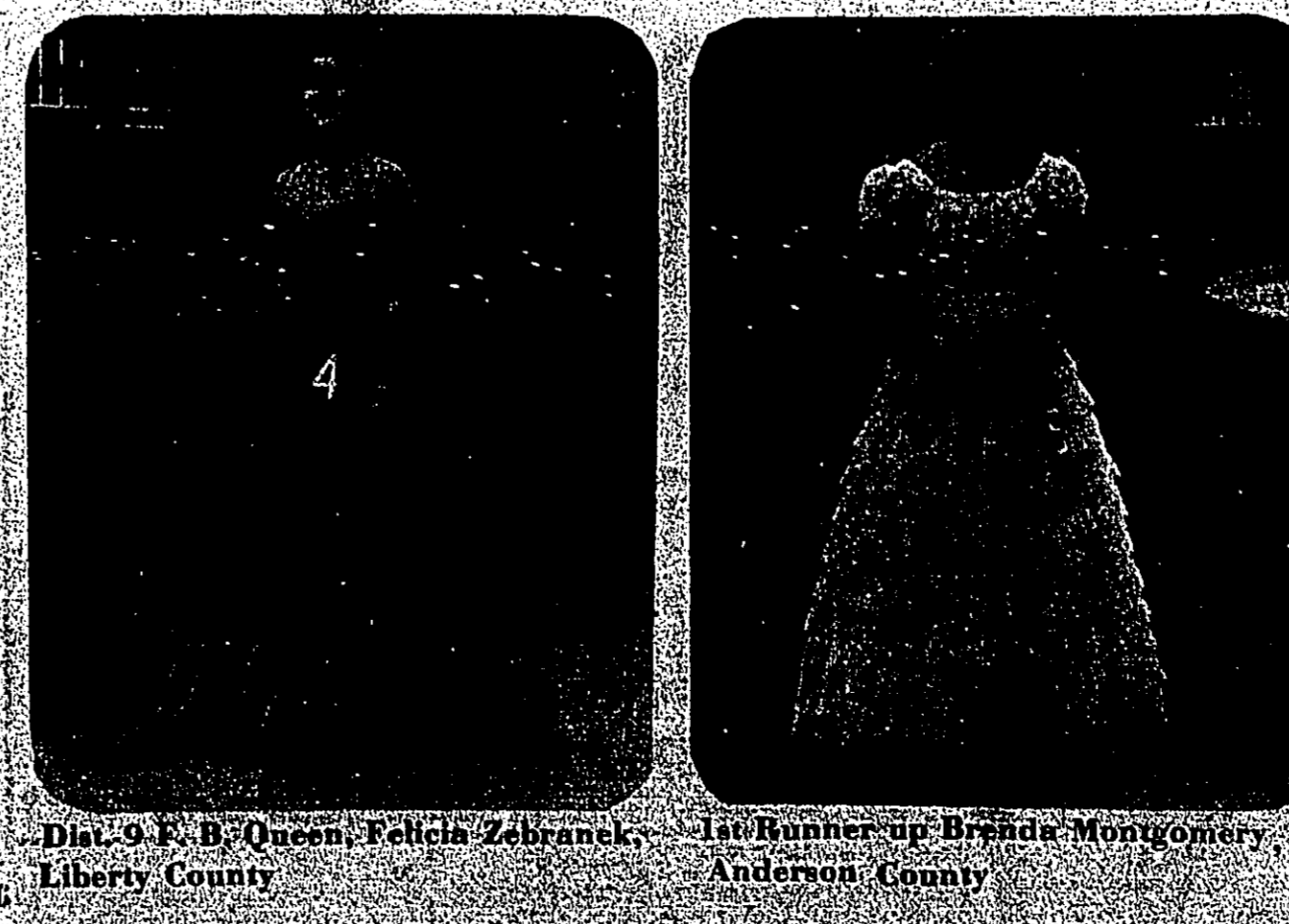

Toll Free Number For Child Abuse Reports Working Again

AUSTIN—A toll-free statewide hotline for reporting child abuse was put out of service Thursday, when a telephone cable was cut at a construction site. The special telephone number, 1-800-252-5400, can be used anywhere in Texas to report suspected child abuse or neglect to the State Department of Public Welfare in Austin. Steve Bradley, supervisor of the hotline operation, said it was knocked out at approximately 10:30 a.m. by people calling in. It would sound as though the number was ringing in Austin, but it wasn't, Bradley said. "We are concerned that people trying to report abuse or neglect would think nobody was on duty to answer at this end." Cutting of the cable also interrupted the statewide telecommunications network for the Welfare Department's computer center. A spokesman for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company said service was expected to be restored by 7 p.m.

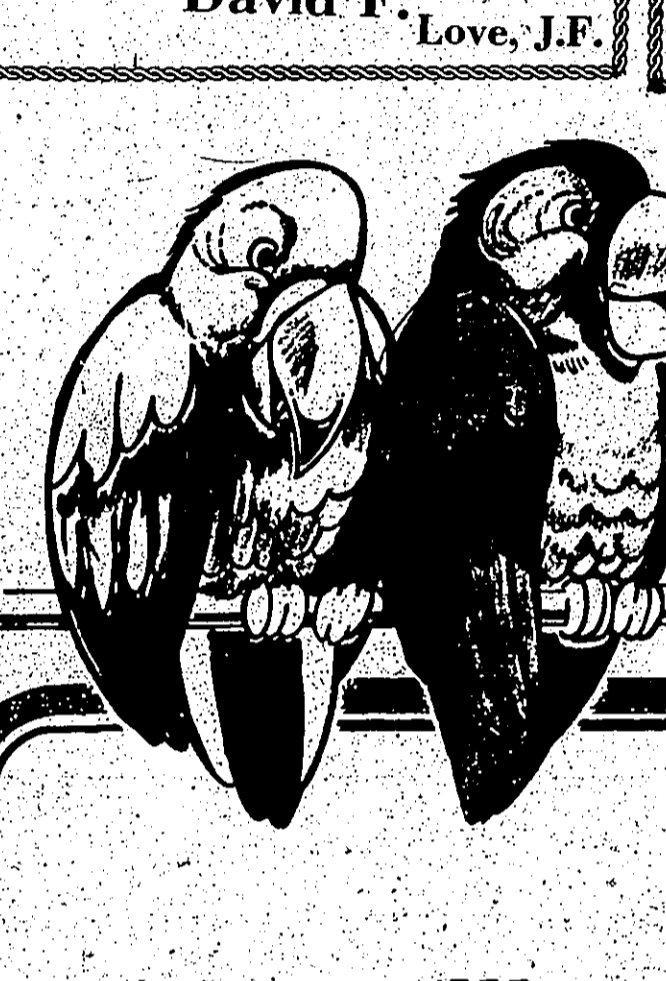
