## Festival Permit Withdrawn

Some 25 Colmesneil area residents were on hand for a special called Commissioners Court meeting on Tuesday, August 2, to voice their complaints or support for the upcoming County Western Music Festival that was scheduled for Labor Day weekend. However, Joe Price attorney for Tri-Four Incorporated, the company promoting the festival, had called County Judge Alen Sturrock, late Monday afternoon verbally withdrawing the request for the permit and following with a correspondence to the court which reads as follows:

RE: APPLICATIONS FOR

MASS GATHERING PERMIT AND OUTDOOR MUSIC FESTIVAL.  
Dear Judge Sturrock:  
This will confirm our conversation to day wherein I advised that the Board of Directors of Tri-Four Incorporated have unanimously voted to withdraw the above referenced applications. Pursuant to their instructions, I am respectfully requesting the withdrawal of such applications. Please forward the applications directly to me.

The law, however provides that a music festival can be held for two 12-hour periods within a three-day period without a permit. This means that live entertainers can perform for 12 hours, take a break, and perform for 12 more hours during any three-day period. The court reportedly would have no jurisdiction over such an event, as long as the event was on private property.



## Warren Underpass Crash

A Friday afternoon accident on Highway 69 at the Warren underpass, sent three persons to the hospital and tied up traffic for almost an hour.

William Wade McCraw, from Fort Neches, driver of a Conn's delivery truck from Beaumont was traveling south when it apparently lost control and crossed into the north bound lane hitting an oncoming car driven by Beverly JoAnn Bixby of Tipton, Iowa.

A third vehicle, driven by Mitchell Leonard Pfla apparently was rounding the curve at the site of the accident and was unable to stop, authorities said, hitting the rear of the Bixby car.

Taken to Tyler County Hospital by Elanders Ambulance Service was Curtis Holland, of Beaumont; passenger in the Conn's truck, Betty Enrich, of Tipton; Iowa passenger in the Bixby car and Beverly Bixby also of Iowa.

No one was seriously injured in the pile up.

Fire Closes Sawmill

An early morning electrical fire, Monday, at the Martindale-Hardwood Mill, off Highway 92, at Dam-B has closed down the mill for approximately one week and caused an estimated \$10,000 in damage.

Bobby Jean Stidham, a neighbor to the site, discovered the fire at 7 a.m. Monday, then called the Dam-B Fire Department. Apparently the fire started in the control panel of the de-barker machine as the control panel and hydraulic lines were ablaze when the fire department arrived.

Luke Martindale, owner of the mill said "The Dam-B fire department did an outstanding job of containing the fire until the Woodville and Jasper units could arrive on the scene."

The mill employs some twenty employees. There were no injuries from the incident.

Start School Date Given

The first in-service day for teachers and aides of the Warren Independent School District will be August 15, 1977.

Registration of all students and first day of instruction has been set for August 16, 1977. Graduation and last day of instruction will be May 23, 1978.

Colmesneil Date Is August 22nd

The school year 1977-78 for the Colmesneil Independent School District will begin Monday, August 22, according to James Hensley, Superintendent, Colmesneil ISD. All Colmesneil schools will open on that date.

Commissioners tentatively voted to accept the road leading to the Livingston Ship-builders site, pending the meets and bounds being presented to the court. The road has been built up to meet county specifications.

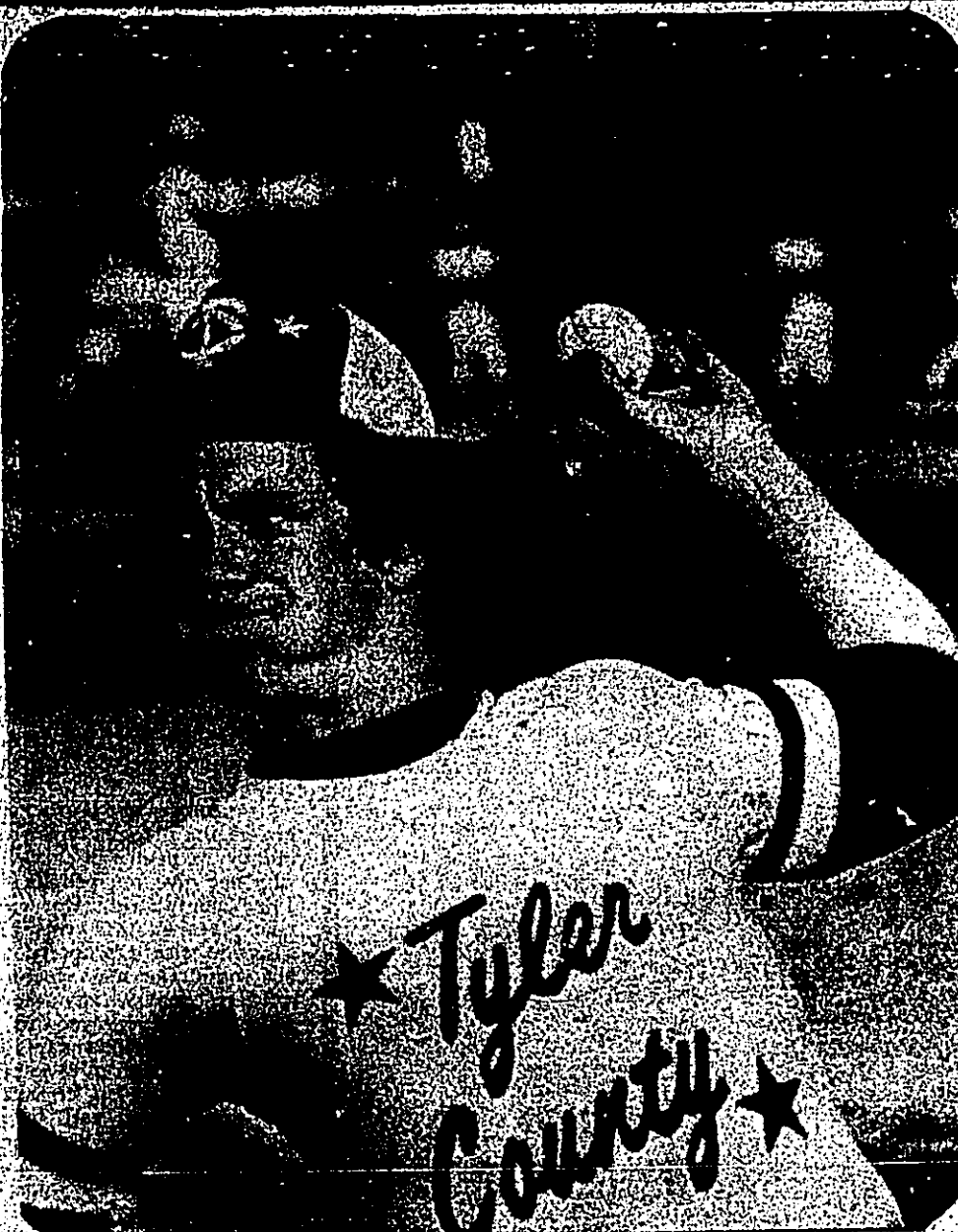
Jack Lane's bid, \$1,131,000, was the lowest. His bid included a fee of \$5 for small hangers and \$10 for the larger hangers. This would be on a monthly basis with yearly payments due in advance. Commissioners voted to accept the proposal and to meet with the Airport Committee to set up rules and regulations to govern the airport in regards to the building and landing of planes at the site.

Also, during Tuesday's meeting, commissioners voted to accept Jack Lane Ford's bid of \$5,131,000 with trade in, for a new car for the Sheriff's Department. The car being traded has some 103,000 miles on it.

Concerning the bids for trucks for Precinct 2 and 4, commissioners voted to accept the bid for the truck in Prec. 2 but voted to table the bid for Prec. 4 truck "for further study." The bid accepted was from Jack Lane Ford, the sum of \$9,550 for a 1976 Ford, stock number 1781. Title warrants will be issued for the entire amount.

In other action, commissioners voted to:

- Table voting on bids for the asphalt materials to be used in the HUD project in Doucette until further study can be made. The materials are hard to bid on because of the availability of the materials;
- Pass a resolution to County and District Road Indebtedness requesting lateral road refund of \$28,193.70 for construction on county roads;
- Accept the grid system as presented by Jim Driscoll in the Wednesday, July 20 meeting;
- Table until August 8 regarding the land lease with International Paper for Solid Waste Material, to see if the City Council will help pay for the cost of renewal which is \$400;
- Accept 2500 cubic yards of gravel for use on county roads donated by Kirby. The cost of the gravel is \$1,500. The bid made by Monroe, from Lubin for an Adding Machine/Calculator for the Tax Assessor/Collector office at the price of \$275.

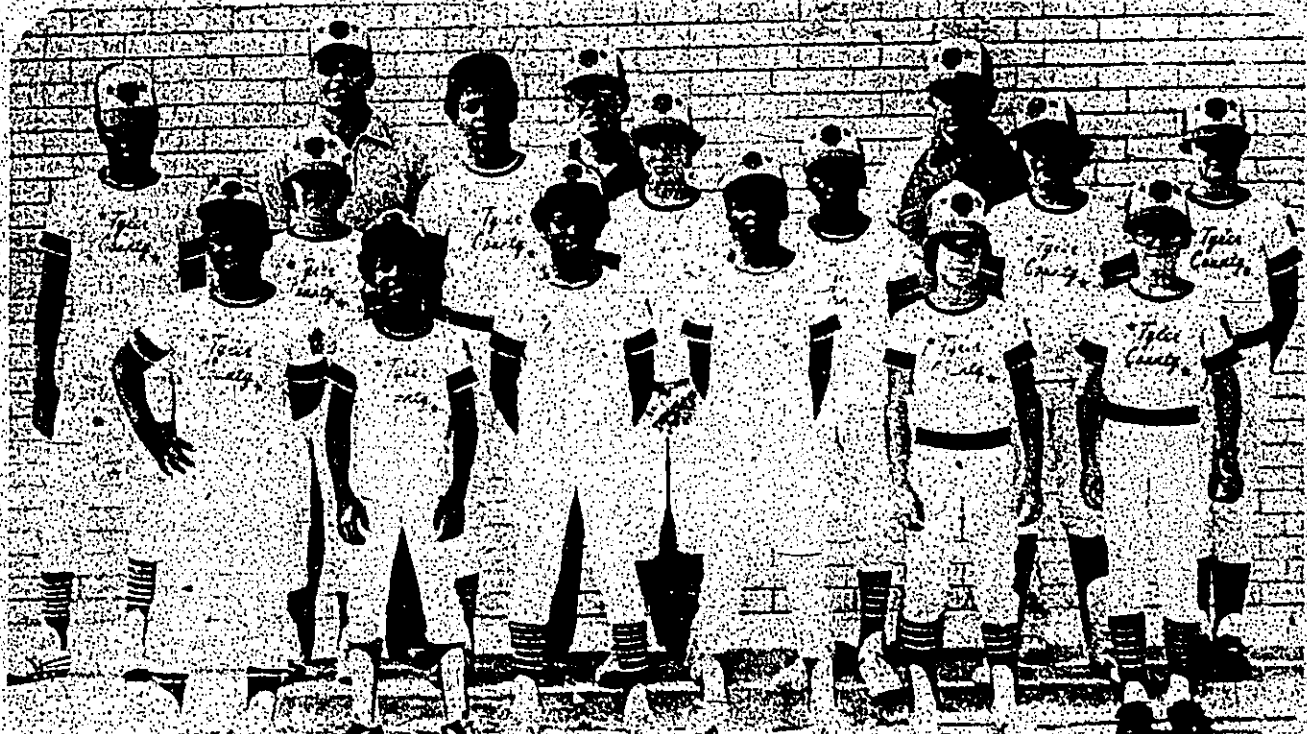
Tyler County Pitcher Greg Wells shows his stuff as the County team advances into play that could lead to World Series action soon.

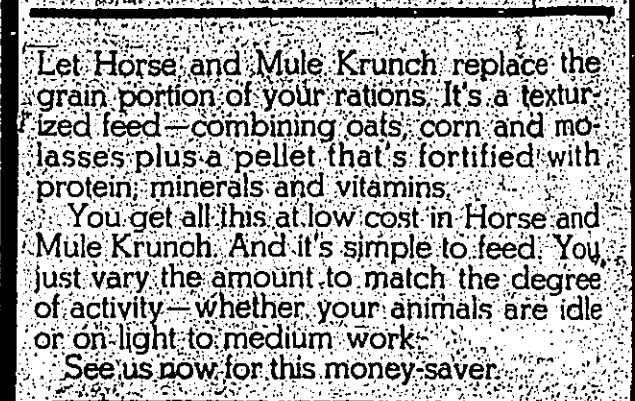

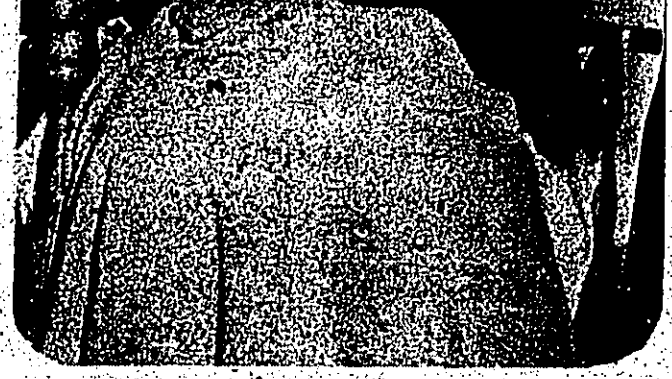
# Chit-Chat From The Convalescent Center

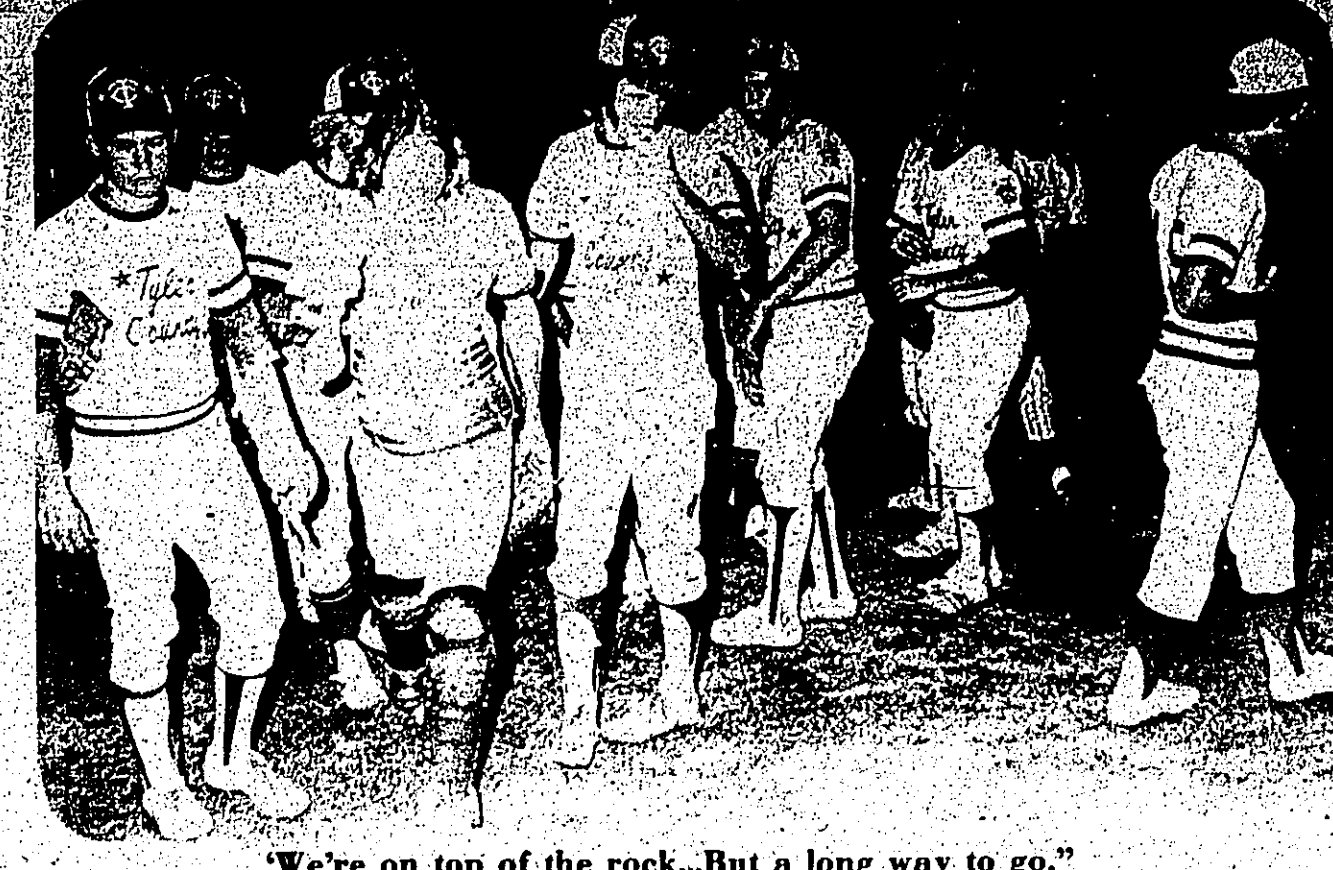

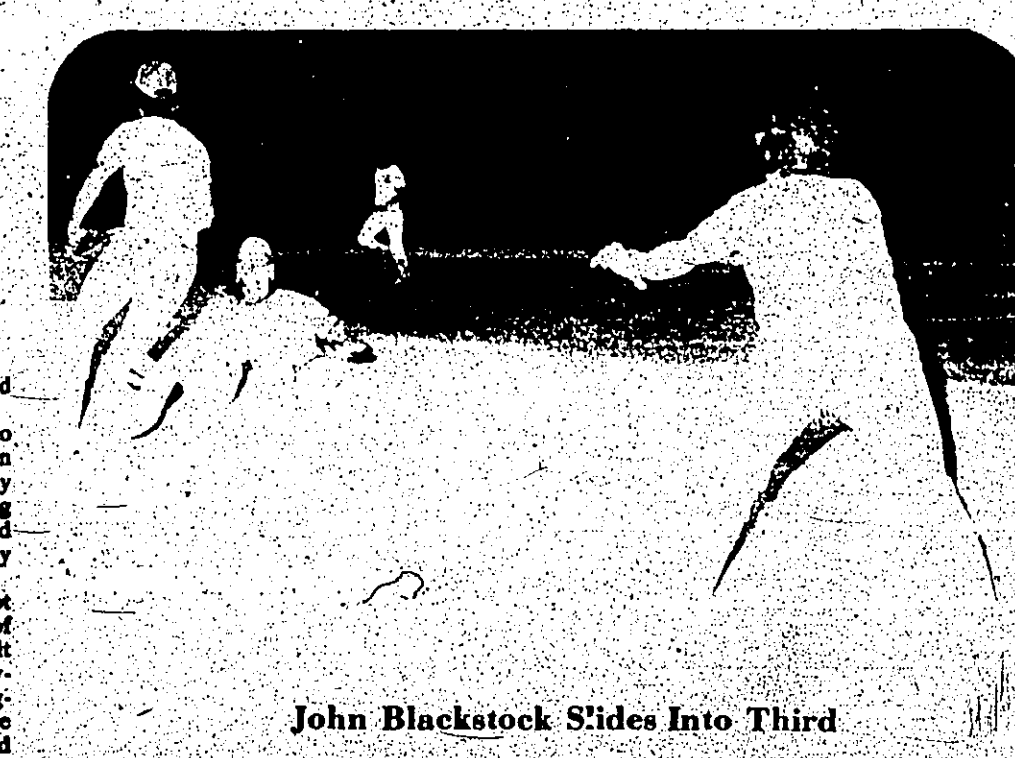

**Immunization Isn't Just Kid Stuff**

A measles outbreak this year and the first confirmed case of polio reported since 1975 should prick the conscience of many Texans.

Why? Because these are among the diseases that are preventable through immunization. And, immunizations do work as attested by the sharp declines in disease since compulsory school immunization laws went into effect in 1971.

August will be observed as Immunization Action Month in Texas as part of a nationwide campaign this year to immunize those needing protection. The Texas Department of Health is spearheading Immunization Action Month, aided by Mrs. Judith Brown's First Lady's Volunteer Program.

During August, special clinics will be made available to protect all children against immunizable diseases as polio, measles, rubella (German measles), pertussis (whooping cough), diphtheria, tetanus and mumps.

"This year we had the first confirmed case of polio in the State since 1975," said Dr. Jennie H. Greenberg, state center of preventable disease for the Department of Health. "The case was in Eagle Pass, and the patient had visited relatives in Pictou, Nova Scotia where polio cases are still occurring."

"The spread of the disease," she said, "is through August, special clinics will be made in child care centers and institutions providing immunization levels up among children attending these centers. Department of Public Health and American inventors have brought the breakthrough which will bring the cost down to less than \$100 per kilowatt."

"Whether this particular claim proves accurate or not, other countries and the Congressional Office of Technology Assessment feels that these solar panels may well be economically competitive with conventional electricity within 10-15 years."

"One serious obstacle to widespread use of these panels has been their cost: \$200,000 to create one kilowatt of electricity 10 years ago, while it takes about 30 kilowatts to provide a home with needed electricity."

**Senator Lloyd Bentzen Watching Washington**

Questions: Are we going to run out of energy in this country?

Answer: Not our energy resources are as limitless as the ability of man's mind to conceive them, and an immense amount of research is underway to develop the sources of energy that will provide our power 50, 75, 100 years from now, and even further into the future.

Many projects are getting serious attention right now that would have been scoffed at as science fiction fantasy only five years ago.

NASA's National Aeronautics and Space Administration is talking about sending electric power stations into space equipped with solar panels that would convert the sun's energy into electricity for transmission back to earth.

NASA's idea is to have five or six of these stations in orbit by the year 2,000, each of them sending back 10,000 megawatts of electricity.

A more down-to-earth approach would be to provide these same solar panels—known as photovoltaic cells—to homeowners for installation on the roof or in the yard.

Now, these are not the conventional kind of "solar energy" panels which merely reflect and intensify the sun's heat. Photovoltaic panels actually convert the sun's rays into electricity.

One serious obstacle to widespread use of these panels has been their cost: \$200,000 to create one kilowatt of electricity 10 years ago, while it takes about 30 kilowatts to provide a home with needed electricity.

A decade of research has brought that cost down to \$15,000 per kilowatt, which is still out of the realm of economic feasibility. But a few weeks ago, at a scientific conference in Scotland, an American inventor claimed a breakthrough which will bring the cost down to less than \$100 per kilowatt.

Whether this particular claim proves accurate or not, other countries and the Congressional Office of Technology Assessment feels that these solar panels may well be economically competitive with conventional electricity within 10-15 years.

### Road Improvement Imminent

Work in eight counties in District 20 is included in the 1978 Special Rehabilitation and State Highway Safety Program. The program is a Farm to Market Road Improvement Program approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer F.C. Young of Beaumont said the work will consist of base repairs, seal coats, reconstruction of frontage roads, pavement widening, water drainage structures and construction of shoulders of Interstate, U.S. State and Farm to Market highways in Chambers, Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Newton, Orange and Tyler Counties. Some 354.1 miles of highways in District 20 will be improved at an estimated cost of \$11,405,600.

Statewide, the quarter-billion-dollar program, largest in the 60-year history of the department, provides for the improvement of some 6,900 miles of highways at an estimated construction cost of approximately \$22,500,000 with an additional \$1.1 million set aside for later assignment.

Some 1,075 projects in 22 counties are included in the program. Mr. F.C. Young noted that a large part of the program will be financed with General Revenue funds appropriated by the 65th Legislature for maintenance and construction. The remainder of the state will be financed with State Highway Funds.

Approximately 69 percent of the overall program will be on State and U.S. Highways, another 30 percent on Farm to Market Roads, and the remaining 1 percent reserved for future assignment.

The program is the first phase of a long-range program to restore the highway system to the standards Texas has come to expect. Mr. Young said it is based on recommendations submitted by several District Engineers and selected following a Statewide assessment of highway needs.

### Accident Report Released

Sergeant C.L. Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that during the month of June-1977, in Tyler County, there were 0 Rural, Fatal Accidents in which 0 persons were killed. In addition, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 15 Rural Motor Vehicle Accidents in which 5 persons were injured.

Through June of this year, there have been 82 Rural accidents in Tyler County, killing 4 persons and injuring 45 people. During the same 6 month period in 1976, there were 93 Rural Traffic Accidents, killing 2 and injuring 68 persons. During the month of June, in the 16 Counties comprising District 2B, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 466 Rural Accidents, killing 10 persons and injuring 229 people.

**U.S. Forest Service to Offer Workshop August 6**

The U.S. Forest Service will hold a public workshop in Lufkin on August 6 to get the help of Texas citizens to determine the woods and possible evaluation criteria for wilderness areas on the National Forests.  
The workshop will be held at the Lufkin Civic Center beginning at 1:00 p.m. in one of 200 workshops being conducted nationwide under the direction of Assistant Secretary of Agriculture M. Rupert Cutler.  
Cutler said the opinions of the public to be obtained at the workshop are necessary to provide better coordination of the Forest Service's land management planning and to help develop the administration's positions on wilderness proposals, which come before Congress.  
"We are at this very moment," Cutler said, "updating the national assessment of all of our country's forests and rangelands and the Forest Service's program. We must present that updated assessment and program to Congress by 1980. The information to be gathered in this study is a vital element in assuring their validity," he concluded.  
The Lufkin workshop, the only public session to be held in the state of Texas, is being conducted by the Forest Supervisor and staff of the headquarters of the National Forests in Texas: C. Mitch Gurganus, Acting Forest Supervisor, said every person who shows up at the workshop will be asked to review and rate the preliminary criteria developed at the Forest Service office of the Washington office of the Department of Agriculture and inclusion in future land management planning of the Forest Service.  
The Lufkin Civic Center will be the public workshop site. The public workshop will be conducted at 601 North Second Street in Lufkin, and can accommodate up to 2,000 people.  
All concerned citizens are being encouraged to attend.  
The concerns and desires of everyone who participates in the workshop will be collected and analyzed at the Lufkin headquarters until September 15 to be sure that everyone concerned will have an opportunity to comment.  
All proposals and suggestions, along with the recommendations of the Forest Supervisor, will then be forwarded to the Washington office of the U.S. Forest Service for review by the Department of Agriculture and inclusion in future land management planning of the Forest Service.  
Cutler said the workshop will be conducted for the purpose of developing land management plans on the National Forests in Texas and a great deal of public consideration have already been received on local wilderness proposals.  
"The primary purpose of the workshop is to add," he added, "will be to concentrate on the development of national criteria to set national standards against which any proposed wilderness area in the country may be evaluated."

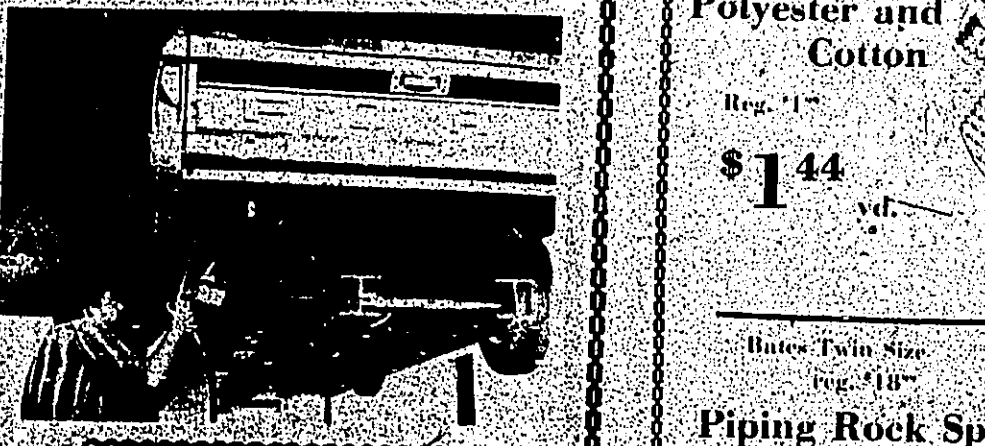
**Special Crisis Intervention Program Underway**
