# Tyler County Big Leaguers Headed Home From Florida



Coach Ted Borowski Takes A Plunge After Winning District Championship Last Thursday

**SANFORD, FLORIDA (Special)**—The Tyler County District 1 Texas State Champs lost a 2 to 1 decision to North Carolina Division 2 State Champs in game action Tuesday, August 9, at Sanford Memorial Stadium near Orlando.

This game was crucial in that either Tyler County or North Carolina would be eliminated from tourney play when it was over. Tyler County took Sunday night's game against this same team 3-2.

The Tyler County team ended the game having left 11 runners on base during the course of the game. Hitters for Tyler County included John Blackstock, J.R. Bateman, John Scroggins, Jason Wells, Daryl Worsham and Charlie MacLin. Jason Wells is credited with Tyler County's one RBI. Scroggins and Cowart were each walked twice.

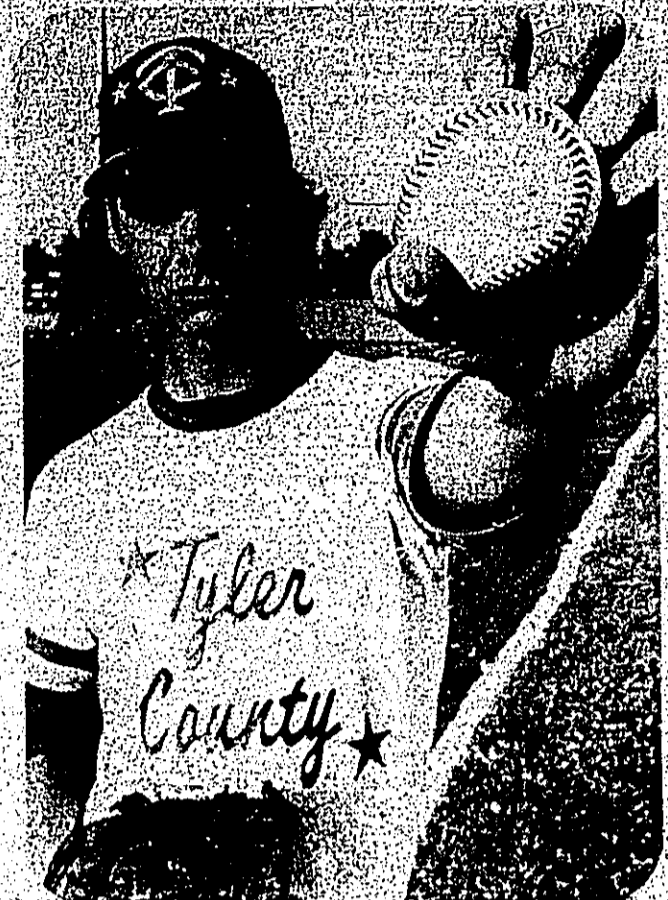
Greg Wells was the starting pitcher for Tyler County and allowed 2 walks, 4 hits and one earned run during his four innings. Pitcher John Scroggins came in for relief allowing 3 walks, 2 hits and 1 run.

Tyler County, a come-from-behind team, had the tying run on base during the bottom of the seventh inning but the game ended with 2 quick outs—a fly popped out to 1st base and a strike out.

Following a hard fought series, the Tyler County team will end their visit after stopping at several area tourist attractions. At presstime Tuesday, plans were being made for arrival back in Houston early Thursday morning.

### Commissioners Have Busy Session

During a two hour regular monthly meeting held Monday, August 8, county commissioners completed a number of items tabled from the Monday, August 2, meeting.

One item under consideration was the prospect of hiring a Deputy Constable for Pct. #4. Commissioners went into "executive session" to consider this personnel matter.

Following the twenty minute session, Commissioners voted to table the appointment until County Attorney Jim Allison could study the legalities of such an appointment.

Tabled from the August 2nd meeting was approval of the bid from Gulf States Asphalt for material needed in the HUD project. Commissioners voted not to accept the bid, rather, they decided to go into negotiations for the needed material. In another motion, Commissioners voted to advertise for bids for "topping" of the road by contract.

In other business, Commissioners voted to table until Friday, August 12, the appointment of three members to the Tyler County Hospital Board. Members to the board now are: Toby Spiveck, L.P. Hicks, Carl Falschild, Odna Ogden, Morris Clemmons and Johnny Harris.

Also, Commissioners voted to approve pending approval of the County Attorney, the contract from John Semetko and David Waxman to administer the recent \$250,000 HUD grant. The grant will be used primarily for roads and bridges in the Beaumont Hills Division. According to Waxman, of all the grants, this one, "city of county that are funded from



Pupils who register in kindergarten or 1st grade will be required to have birth certificates in order to establish eligibility for registration. Pupils new to the Woodville schools should have grade, book and credit records, as well as vaccination and health information from previous attended schools ready at registration time.

State law requires that all pupils entering and attending the public schools of Texas must have been immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomylitis, measles, rubella and pertussis, subject to provisional admission if the required immunizations have been started, as certified by a physician. Attendance in the public schools of this state is compulsory for all pupils ages 7 through 17, for a minimum of 165 days of the regular school term. Attendance in kindergarten, by option, is required for all 6-year olds are eligible to enroll in the 1st grade. The kindergarten program of the district will operate on a single semester basis, with the 6-year old student attending the first semester.

# TV Can Be Good For Kids

**COLLEGE STATION.**

Watching television for kids is sometimes good, says Dorothy Taylor, family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"In addition to stimulation and amusement, children can be encouraged to emulate the 'good guys' they identify with on television," she says. "The most dramatic characters who catch the child's eye, rescue Lassie or, if whatever the case, save the day," she says.

"Also, with early and frequent exposure to lessons in art, music, drama and science, young viewers benefit as they could never have before. TV programs offer fresh and treasure, but supervised, limited viewing provides children with learning experiences that broaden their horizons," she contends.

"On the other hand, too much television—and unmonitored television—can be a form of destructive play, Miss Taylor cautions.

"If children are allowed to watch all kinds of programs they see great amounts of the negative at a time of major moral development in their lives.

"They may be exposed to an over-emphasis on crime, terror and the abnormal," the specialist says.

Television "overtime" tends to interfere with family time together—and thus relationships. "It can rob children of eating and sleeping time, too, the specialist points out.

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# August Is Immunization Month

A gift that lasts a lifetime and perhaps may save the life of the receiver—will be the immunizations given in August.

The gift is immunizations against such serious even life-threatening diseases which continue to plague Texas. These are poliomyelitis (polio), diphtheria, measles, rubella (German measles), tetanus (lockjaw), whooping cough (pertussis), mumps. They're still with us and are always looking for a susceptible person—somebody who hasn't been immunized against them.

During the past few months, more red measles cases have been occurring across Texas than have been experienced in several years. Measles is a very serious disease for young adults.

Health scientists feel that children who were immunized against measles before their first birthdays have only limited protection unless they receive a booster vaccination. When exposed to the disease, they have come down with an infection, although symptoms

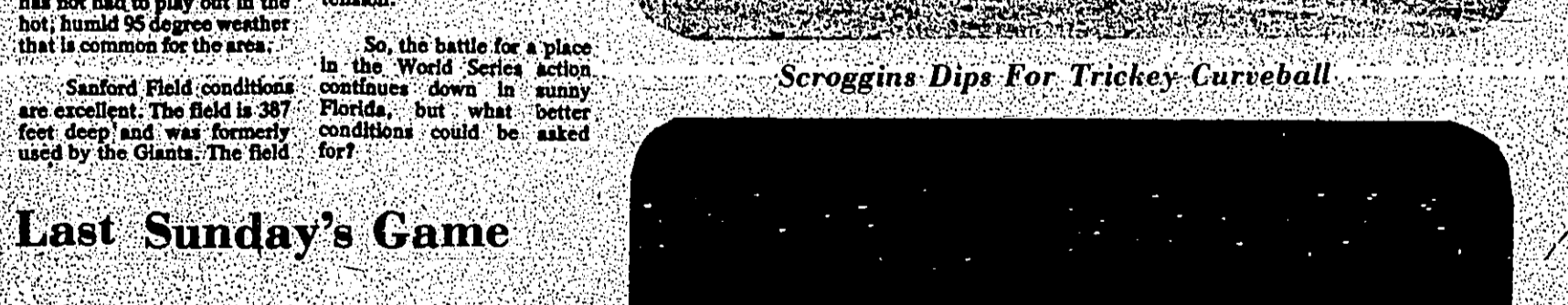

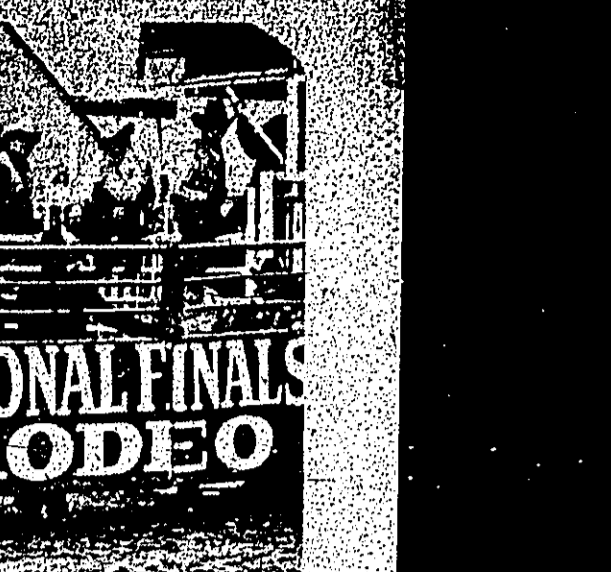

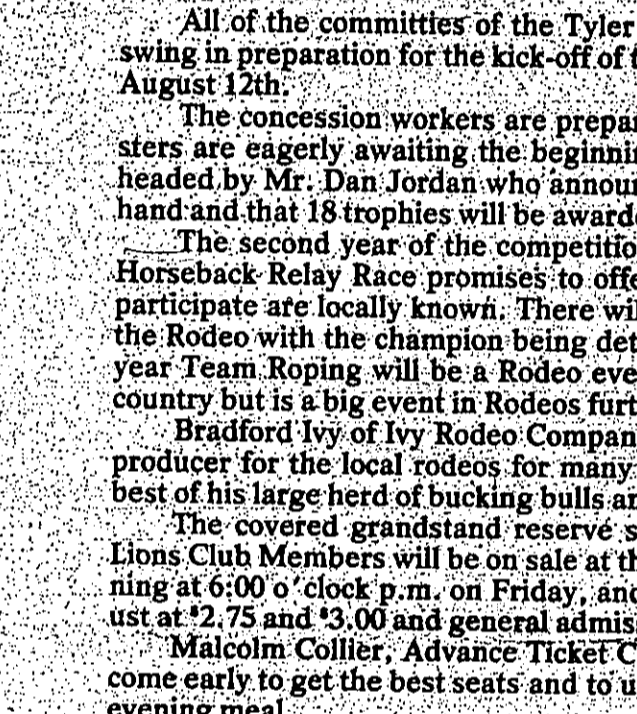

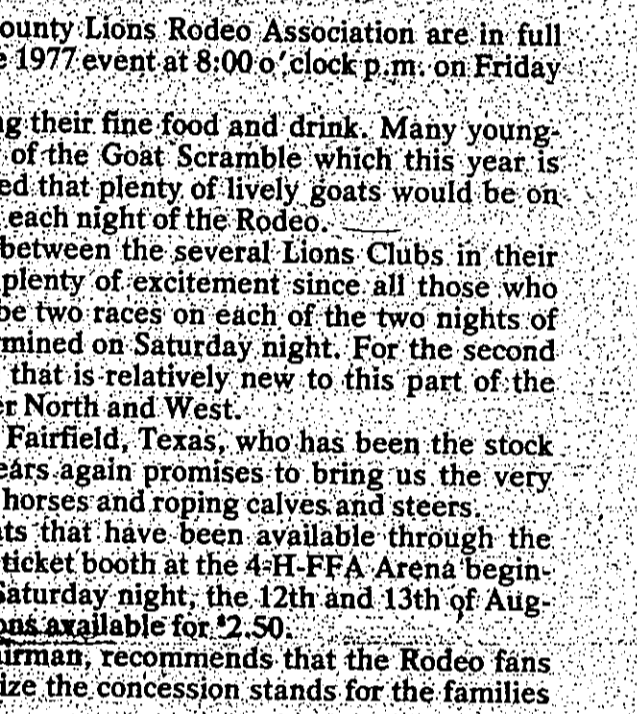

**Church Membership**

3. Yes, one must be a member of the New Testament church because Jesus is the savior of the body of Christ and we are one and the same thing (Eph. 1:22, 23). If Jesus is going to save His body and His body is His church then one is going to have to be in the New Testament church to go to heaven.

Are you saying that one church is as good as another? Neighbor, do you think that Martin Luther, John Wesley, John Calvin or John the Baptist could start a church capable of taking the place of the heaven planned and blood bought church of the New Testament? Surely not! What man today has the right to presume to start a religious movement not based on the Bible? When only truth is taught and men obey it then the New Testament Church will result.

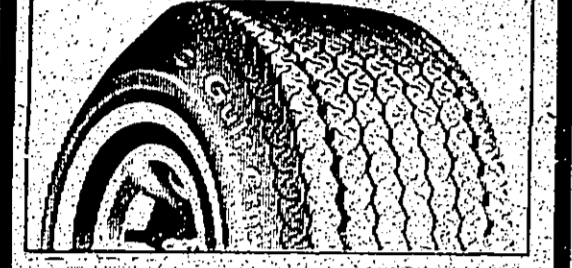

## SSI Eligibility Redetermined Each Year

The Social Security Administration reminds persons who draw the gold-colored checks under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program that they will have their eligibility for the check redetermined each year. The reason for this "redetermination" is to make sure the person is being paid the right amount. For the most part, this redetermination of eligibility shows that the check amount is correct, but sometimes the payment must be raised or lowered because of a change in the individual's circumstances.





If someone is asked to contact the social security office for a redetermination, let's about it as soon as possible. Payments cannot be continued for the redetermination is not completed within a certain length of time.

Also, if a person goes into the social security office for a redetermination, let's about take a copy of his most recent bank statement and savings accounts statement.

Any time a person receiving SSI checks has a change in circumstances such as a change in income, an increase in resources (such as an inheritance) which causes the person to have over \$1,000 on hand (or \$2,250 for a couple), or a change in residence, the change should be reported immediately to the social security office.

## Bentsen Feels Senate Misses Chance To Limit Over-Regulation

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Those waters which are in fact navigable, and their adjacent wetlands, "become a symbol to many Americans of how a well-intentioned regulatory initiative can turn into a nightmare of disruption, frustration and bureaucratic entanglement for the ranchers, farmers, foresters and average citizens of this country," Bentsen said during floor debate on the Senate bill.

"It has assumed an importance that extends far beyond dredge and fill activities. It has become synonymous with a federal over-regulation, over-control, cumbersome, bureaucratic procedures and a general lack of realism."

In offering his amendment, Bentsen rejected a compromise amendment proposed by the Public Works Committee saying "it will not reduce the amount of red tape. It does not diminish the burden on the average citizen."

"A conference will now decide between the language in the Senate Bill and the House bill, which is identical to the Bentsen amendment."

The Senate today used a good chance to do something about federal over-regulation. Instead of just talking about it, Bentsen said following the vote.

"I will urge the conference committee to reject the Senate language and adopt the House version of this legislation so that Congress can demonstrate for the people that it is determined to start doing something about over-regulation by government," Senator Bentsen said.
