County Court To Study Flood Insurance Program

Tyler County Commissioners Court held its special meeting Friday, August 12. There were 9 items on the agenda.

One item under consideration was the National Flood Insurance Program. The program would allow persons presently living in flood hazard areas to acquire National Flood Insurance which is a subsidized insurance and available at subsidized rates. At this time the county is studying the flood maps and plans to hold public hearings to get the people of the county to point out areas that do have the tendency to

flood easily. At such a time that the county does decide to partake in this program, commissioners will pass a resolution stating their intent to participate.

Commissioners voted to table the decision until further study could be made.

During Friday's meeting commissioners also voted to disregard the repair bill on a Solid Waste disposal truck. The county has no desire to wench on legitimate bills, but the truck was under warranty and the bill is not legitimate, stated County Judge Allen Sturrock. Commissioners all

agreed that the truck never did run or operate properly.

Commissioners voted to donate the sum of \$500 to the Tyler County Little League for the care and upkeep of Hennigan Park.

In other business commissioners voted to reappoint present Hospital Board members. Members whose term had expired are Odna Ogden, Morris Clemmons and Johnny Harris. The Hospital Board meets the third Wednesday of each month at 2:30 p.m. at the Tyler County Hospital, Woodville.

In other action commissioners voted to:

- Approve payment of bills from Auditor's office totaling \$30,092.02.
- Sign contract for grant application for H.U.D. Re-Table for "further study" the present resolution on Criminal Justice Grant for the District's Attorney Office until the costs can be looked into.
- Appoint M.D. Holland as Alternate Absentee voting Judge and to
- Accept the Official Bond from the Spurger ISD Tax Assessor/Collector, Margie Jordan.

Commissioners will meet in special session, August 22 at 10 a.m. in the Commissioners Courtroom, first floor, Tyler County Courthouse, Woodville.



W.I.S.D. Monday Votes To Hire Attorney

Warren School Seeks New Fund Allocation From Austin

The Warren Independent School District in a special called meeting Monday acted to retain an Attorney to assist in presenting that districts case in Austin Wednesday in attempts to get a local fund assignment adjustment.

According to District Superintendent Adolph Hryhorchuk the district is experiencing severe financial impact from depleting all revenues which the district has characterized as somewhat of a "natural economic disaster."

Combined with substantial acreage losses to the Big Thicket program, the district officials feel that they're going to Austin to fight for what the district deserves.

"We're going to holler because we feel we have just cause in this appeal," one trustee said.

The board voted to hire Lufkin Attorney James Cornelius, who currently serves on the Lufkin School Board and is working with the San Augustine School Board in a similar appeal.

District officials say they're worried about next years fund assignment also. The district problems originate with the oil and gas valuations being reduced by more than one-half from 1972-73, 1974-75 to a low of 14.8% in 1977.

District Superintendent Hryhorchuk and District Tax Assessor/Collector Ernest Findley were scheduled to

appear with Cornelius at a 1 p.m. hearing Wednesday before the Texas Education group. Trustees referred briefly during the Monday meeting to mass correspondence from House Speaker Bill Clayton which urged the Trustees across the state to consider the possibility of passing along fund assignment overages to the district taxpayer patrons.

Warren boardmembers say they're wondering how what excesses House Speaker Clayton are talking about?

In other action the board voted to obtain bid specifications in order to repair a leaky roof on the Warren Elementary School and agreed to hire two more bus drivers to service the districts 13 bus routes.

Briscoe Attends 'Sundown'

Governor Dolph Briscoe and First Lady Janey were in Tyler County Monday to designate the week of August 15-20 as "Beyond The Sundown Outdoor Drama Week" in Texas.

"Beyond the Sundown" is an outdoor drama depicting the struggle of the Alabama Coushatta Indians to remain free and at peace during Texas' fight for independence.

Governor Briscoe, on his way to the outdoor drama, and while on the campaign trail arrived in Tyler County Monday afternoon, at the Tyler County Airport where he was greeted by Chief Fulton Battise of the Alabama Coushatta tribe and other local dignitaries.

Following a brief reception at the airport, the Governor and his party attended a reception given in his honor at the Woodville Inn Ballroom.

The Governor shook hands in a long receiving line where he met many of the residents of Tyler County and commented on the beauty of East Texas stating that "It is always a pleasure to visit in The Big Thicket area."

Miss Janey Briscoe was honored with a banquet at the Inn of the Twelve Clans at the Reservation. During the presentation of gifts to the First Lady from the Chiefs, the First Lady stated, "I can only hope to be as good a Texan as the Alabama Coushatta Indians."

Prior to the evening performance of "Beyond the Sundown" Governor Briscoe was made an honorary member of the Alabama Coushatta tribe and was presented with the customary Headdress during the intermission of the drama.

Gov. Briscoe then signed the proclamation making the week of August 15-20 "Beyond the Sundown Outdoor Drama Week", urging all Texans to visit the Reservation and enjoy the fine production, "Beyond the Sundown."

Engineering Work To Proceed On Proposed Highway

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvement of F.M. Highway No. 92 from U.S. Highway 190 to Recreation Road 225. Since the Highway Administration approved the route and design proposed for this project, The Department of Highways and Public Transportation will begin work on the next phase of engineering necessary for the development of this project.

The proposed project will consist of grading, structures, base and surface of a two lane farm to market road with a minimum right of way width of 120 feet.

Many drawings, environmental studies and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected and copied at the Resident Engineer's Office on State Street, Jasper, Texas 75951.

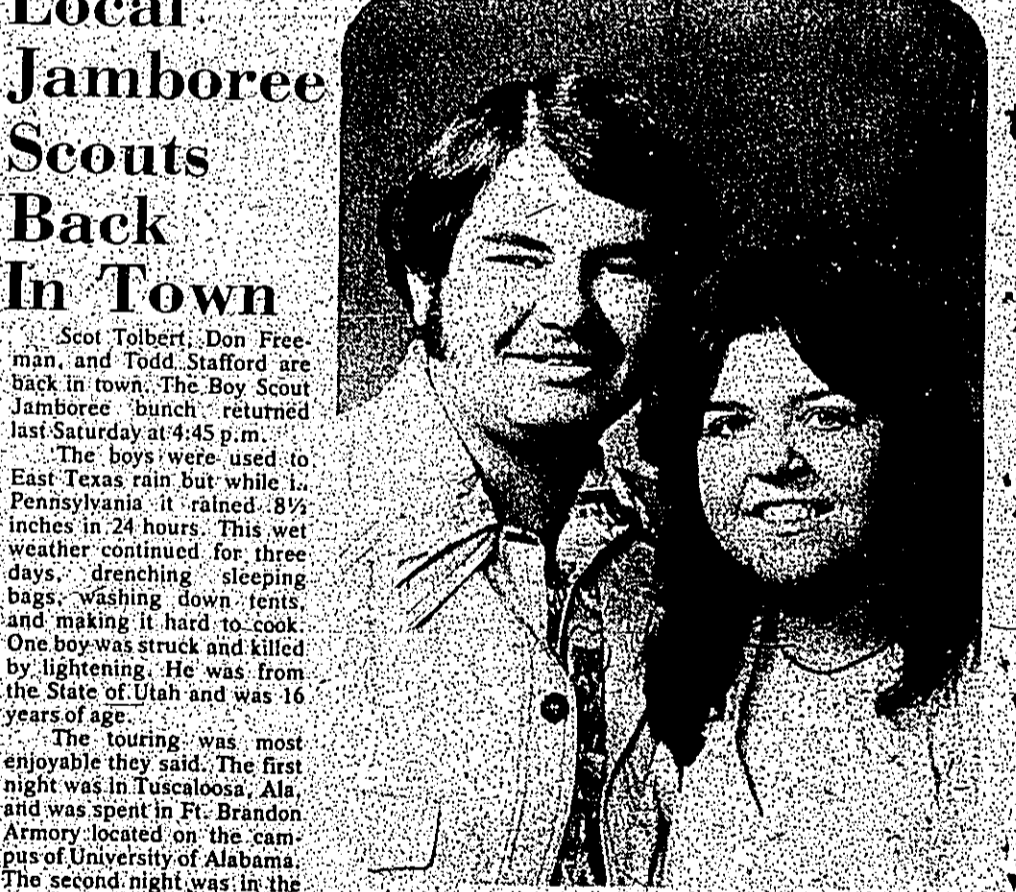

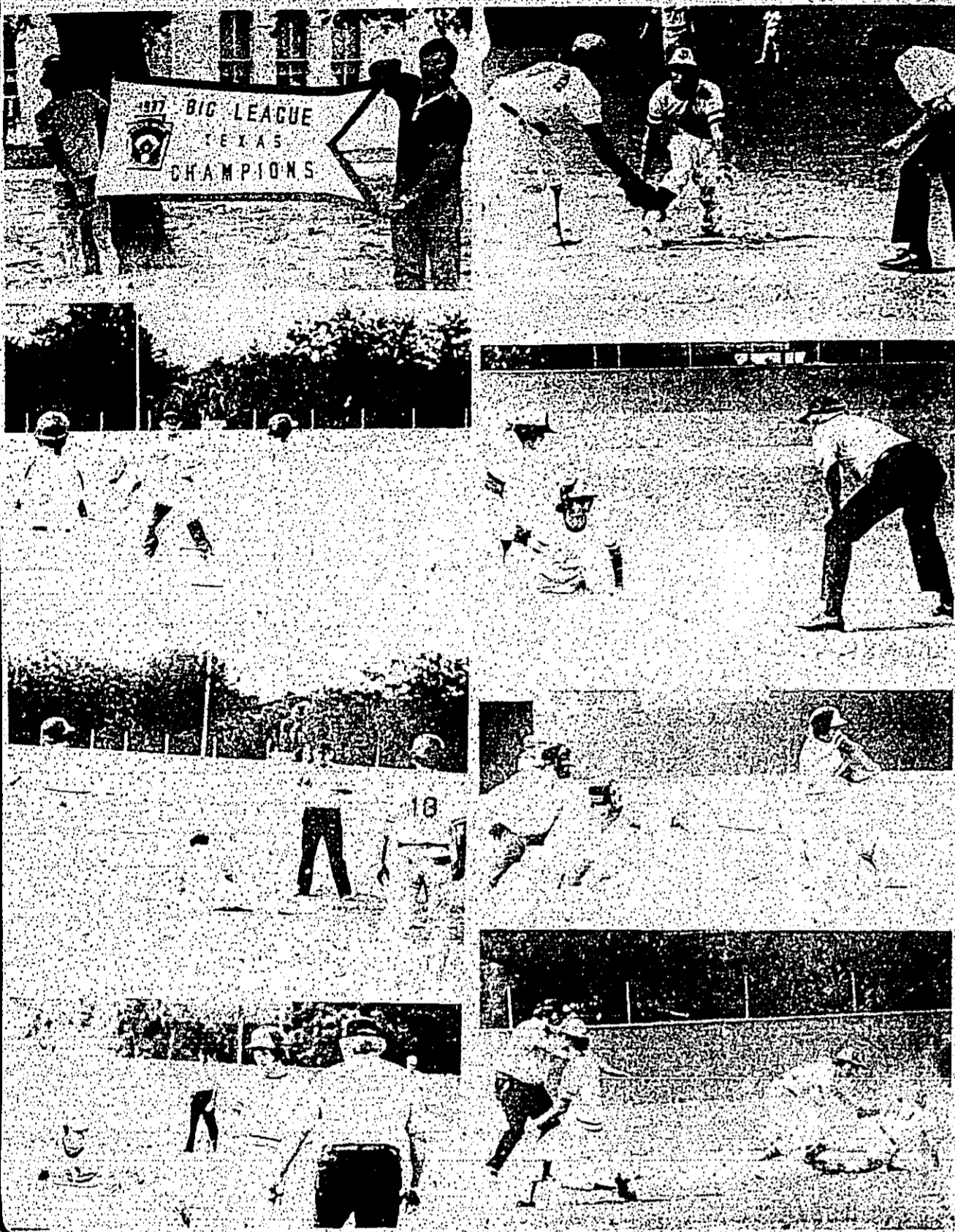

Tommy Corbett was outstanding at second base for Crockett. Darren Wellborn made several key defensive plays at first base for Woodville.

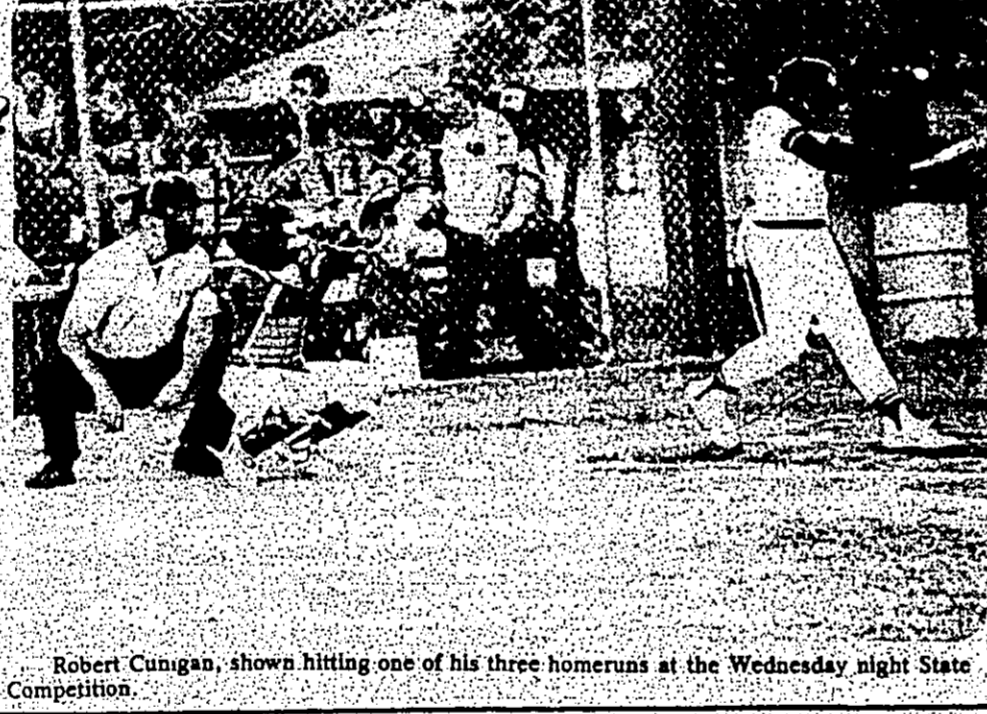

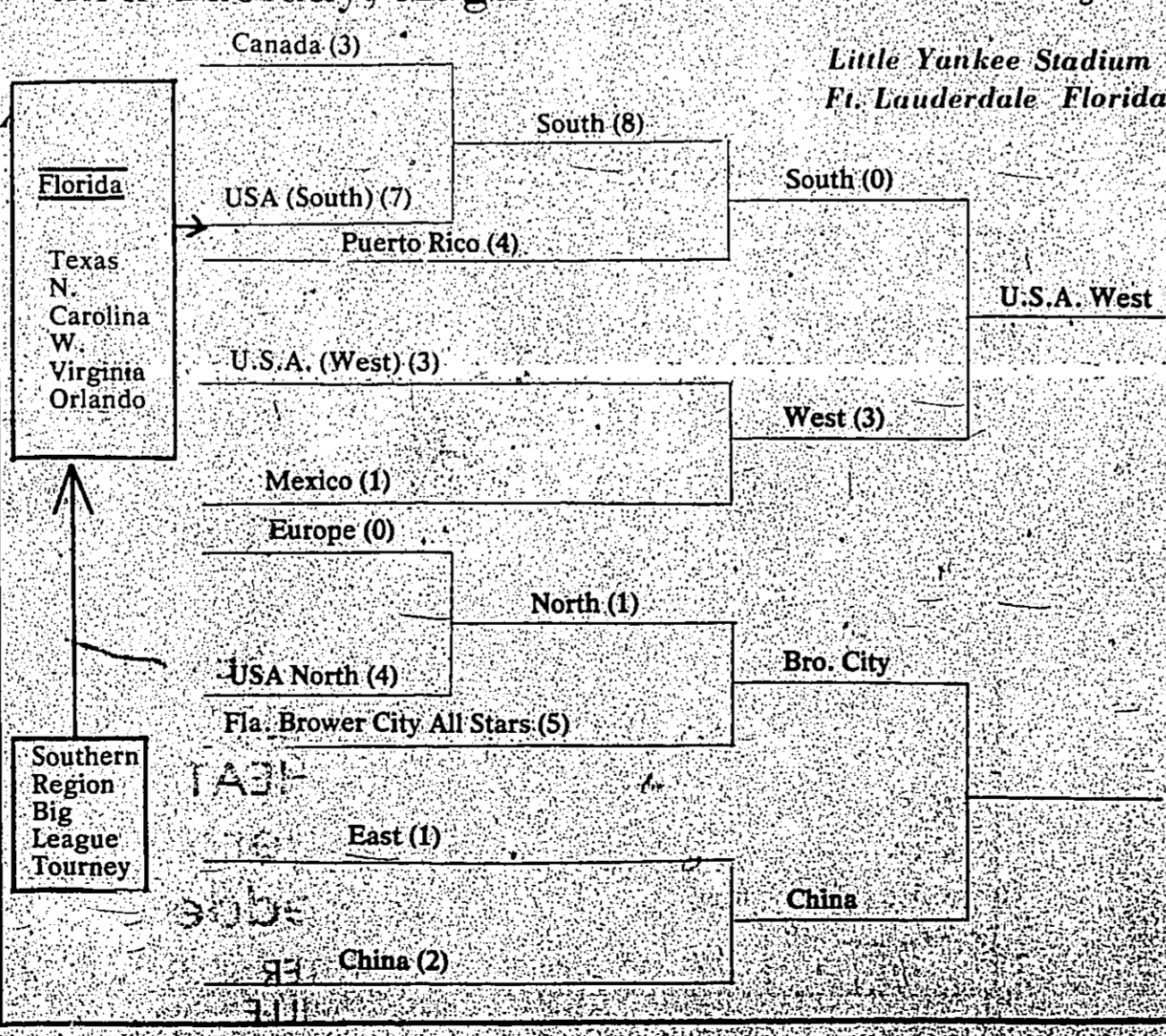

AUSTIN—New hunting and fishing licenses will be mailed to sales deputies August 19.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department license sales officials say 1.7 million licenses will be mailed at that time, about 70 percent of the total to be distributed about the state during the coming year.

Major licenses to be mailed include: resident hunting, \$8.75; resident hunting, \$8.25; resident exempt hunting, \$1.25; and resident fishing, \$4.50.

The resident fishing license is up 25 cents from last year. It will not go on sale until September 1 at which time it will be valid until August 31, 1978.

Other changes in license combination: hunting and fishing, \$100.75; general non-resident hunting, \$37.75; small game non-resident hunting, \$10.50; non-resident five-day fishing, \$4.50.

Migratory game bird regulations will be published in September.

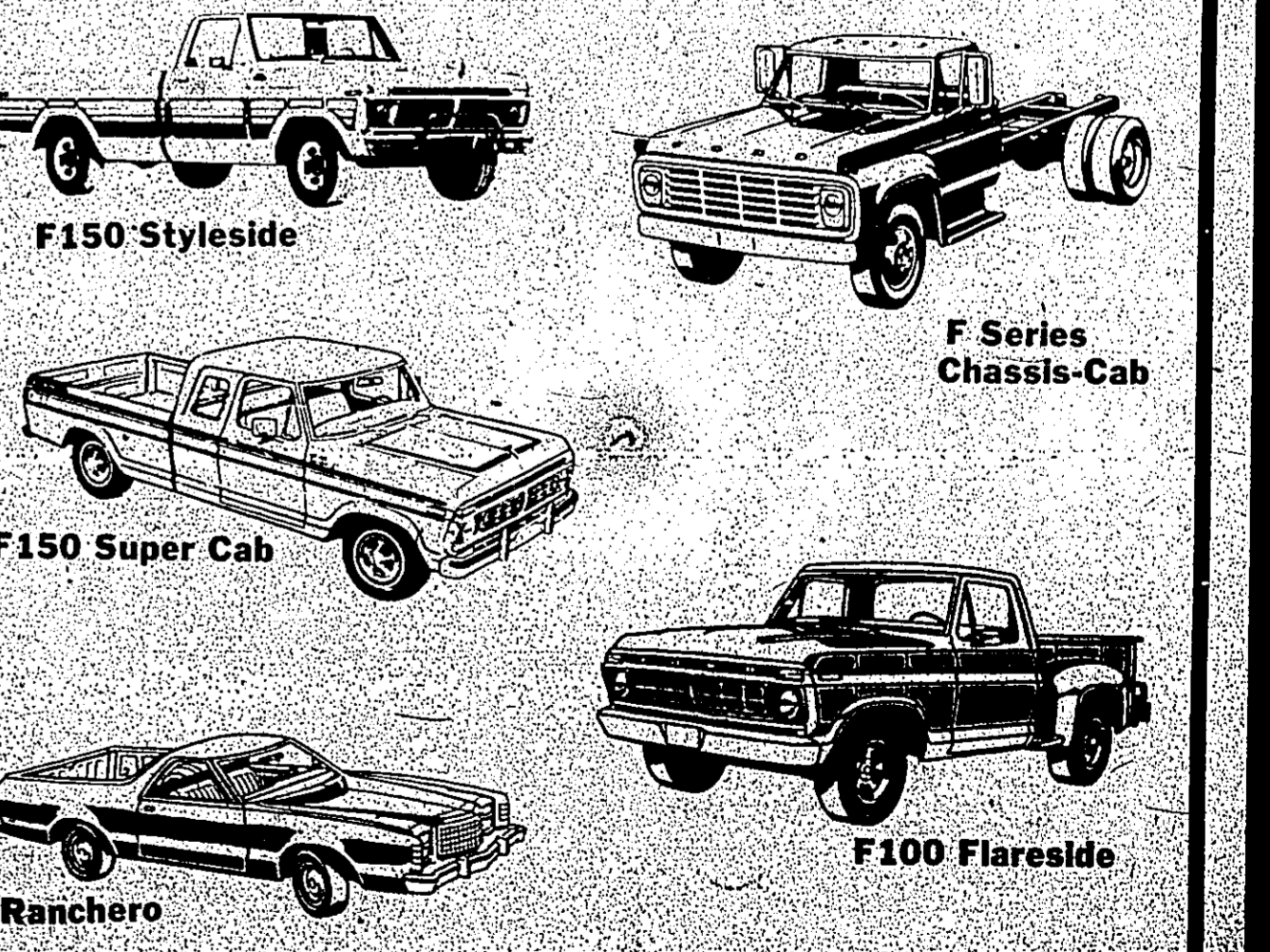
A county-by-county listing is again included in the guide. Seasons and species which may be legally hunted are listed by county with bag and possession limits.

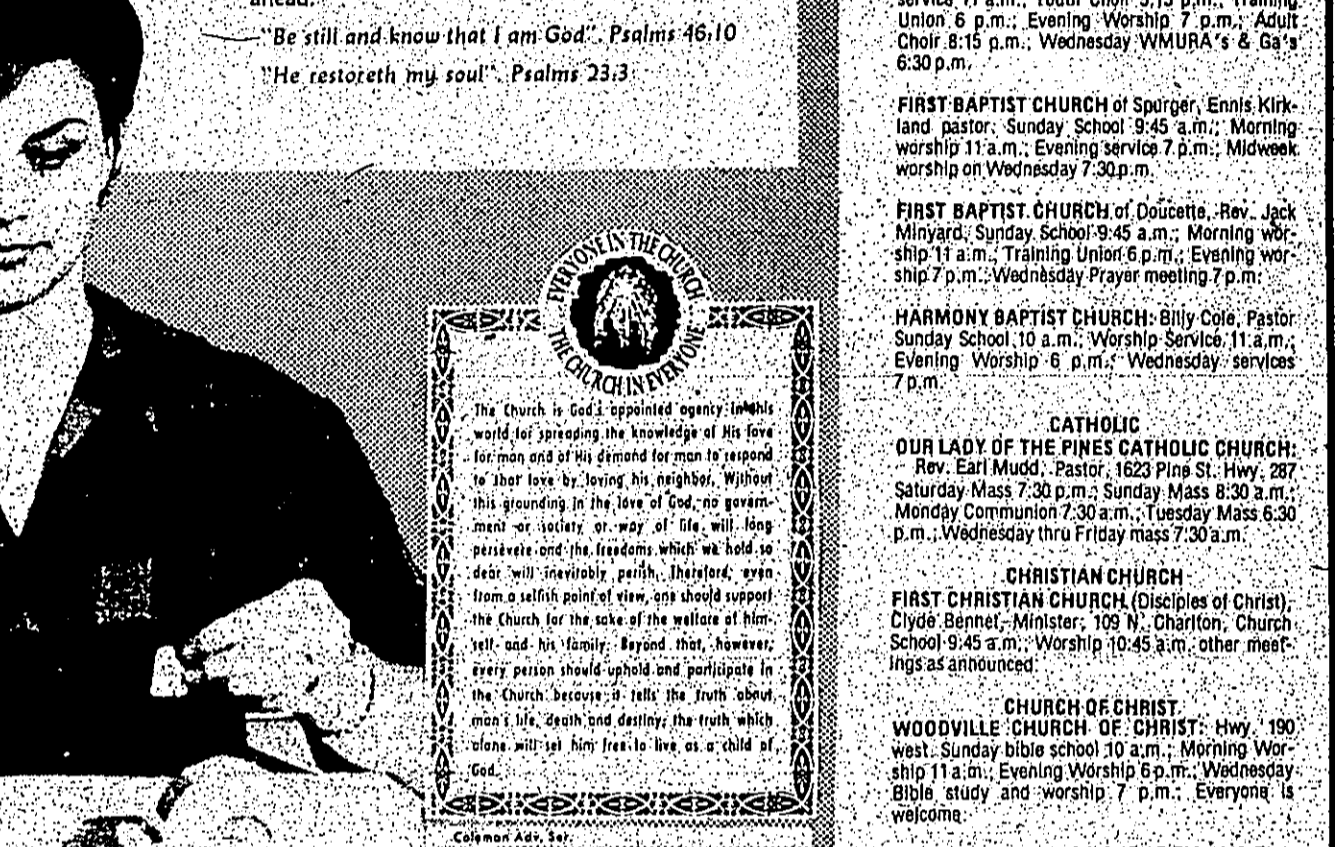

"Kiss Your Baby" Theme Chairman Is Ms. Clark

Ms. Donna Gayle Clark has been named the Woodville Cystic Fibrosis Chairman for the "Kiss Your Baby" Campaign to be held in September. This campaign is being held to raise funds for research, and also to make people more aware of the signs and symptoms of the disease. Ms. Clark will coordinate the fund raising and educational campaign to support research and care for children afflicted by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis and bronchiectasis.

Approximately one of every 1,500 babies is born with cystic fibrosis, which is still incurable. Cystic Fibrosis is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for cystic fibrosis. It is believed that one in twenty persons, or a total of ten million Americans, is a symptomless carrier of this gene. Current research funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers, as well as a cure for cystic fibrosis and better methods of treatment for all lung-damaging diseases.
