School Tax Up 36.5%



K.H.S. Principal Hanna Moves In Desks

The Woodville Independent School District Board of Trustees under the recommendation of Superintendent Tom Linam and with the unanimous vote of the Board on Tuesday (August 16) set a new tax rate for the district of \$2.05 per \$100 assessed valuation that figure up from \$1.50, the tax rate for last year.

The new tax rate computes to an overall 36.5 percent tax increase to the district which estimates show to be valued at approximately \$50,000,000.

The maintenance tax portion will amount to \$1.25 which is down five cents from

last years figure of \$1.30 while an increase will exist in the debt service portion up from last years 20 cent figure to 80 cents; an overall increase of 60 cents.

Linam said that the district's 7,000 tax payer patrons would reflect the new tax increase in their October statements.

Linam said that the action should be no surprise for the district in that all the predicted rate projections were reported to the public prior to the passage of the recent \$3.1 million dollar school bond.

"We even came up five cents lower than we projected," he said.

"We told the people when we went to the polls on this \$3.1 million bond issue that it would take somewhere between 60 cents and 70 cents to service the \$3.1 million."

"Now we are going to be able to service the bond with only 60 cents, the minimum figure," he added. "That as low as we could figure it with-out going into deficit financing."

The new tax rate is based on total estimated cash collection of taxes in 1977-78 of \$299,500.

Along with the new tax rate board action which was initiated on a motion from D. W.S. Nicholas and seconded by Harold (Bud) Allison the board also ratified projected expenditures for the coming year in the 1977-78 Fiscal budget which totaled some \$4,022,377. That figure includes anticipated construction costs for the new school (\$1,741,154) and arrives at an approximate \$300,000 increase over the previous years figures.

Linam pointed out to the board in his narration of the necessity of the expenditures that "I think we can live with this budget. I think its good business in having a sufficient fund balanced so you don't have to go to the bank and borrow for September and October payrolls, for example, and pay interest."

"It also means we can go and buy three new school buses with cash and not pay interest for five years."

"We can also take care of our maintenance and building problems without going and borrowing money from our bank and paying interest."

Linam said that a projected estimated fund balance in August of 1978 would serve the district also by protecting it from increased construction costs on the new high school...without," he said, "having to cut down or pare away at the project as it exists now."

"We are the only school district that I know of in the area that pays cash for buses and for everything...we didn't pay any interest this last year...not any," Linam said, "except on serial bonds."

In other district business the district heard a report from District Architect Jack Stansbury about progress thus far concerning installation of air conditioning units.

Stansbury indicated that there was some delay in equipment shipment but that plumbing and individual slab work for the window units was progressing.

The Architect reported that a special lengthy work session would have to take place soon to discuss the details of the plans as his firm has developed them. The board agreed to meet on or before the next regularly scheduled meeting to review the drawings.

The Superintendent, Linam, pressed to the board that it looked like the portable building

would be completed so that school and classroom space would be available for the start of school on Wednesday, Aug. 31. Linam said that teachers were to report for work on Monday, Aug. 29.

In other action the district approved the August Financial statement, and accepted the July Tax report.

Linam reported to the board of three separate insurance payments totaling \$100,000 which were handed to the district in a preliminary

settlement on the fire of the Kirby High School fire on July 4. Linam said a committee made up of the entire Board of Trustees would convene with the adjusters soon to arrive at a complete settlement on the fire.

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"Education Costs...Worth It"

School Board President Dr. R.E. Swearingen and School Service League Publicity head Mrs. Anne Garner in a talk before the Woodville Lions Club Thursday told that group regarding the recent rate increase in school district taxes that "The voters looked at the facts before the bond election and voted 'Yes' to the proposal."

Swearingen who said he intended "to represent the district until he was voted out or retire," commented further by saying that the proposal actually came in five cents less per \$100 valuation.

Mrs. Anne Garner, who was largely responsible for gathering and presenting the majority of the facts about the bond election to the voters said at the Lions meeting Thursday that "Yes, education does cost something...but its worth a lot more than it costs."

Swearingen said that it had been wrongly assumed by a lot of voters that the retiree community was against the bond. "We find this not to be true," he said.

Tyler County Commissioners Budget Hearing Underway

Tyler County Commissioners voted Monday to pass a resolution indicating Tyler County's intent to participate in a National Flood Insurance program, held the first of several required budget hearings for expenditure anticipated in 1978 and squeezed in a workshop session to consider the priorities on completing the road in the H.U.D. project in Doucette.

Commissioners heard several requests from various county offices during the budget hearings ranging from typewriters to increased travel expenses. Monday's meeting served primarily as a workshop session allowing public interest groups an opportunity to present the court with requests for funding and to hear from the county officials.

Tyler County Commissioners did not make any requests at Monday's budget hearing, however, they do intend to study their individual Road and Bridge budgets, funds coming primarily from Auto Registration, and make their requests known soon.

Trying to meet a late September deadline, commissioners will meet regularly until a proposed budget can be presented and adopted by the court. The next budget hearing session will be Friday August 26 at 9 a.m. in the Commissioner's Courtroom in the courthouse in Woodville.

Also during Monday's busy meeting, commissioners voted to participate in a National Flood Insurance program which will offer subsidized insurance rates to those persons living in flood hazard areas. Public meetings will be held for the purpose of studying the flood maps and to give residents of the county the opportunity to point out areas which they know have the tendency to flood.

In other business commissioners voted to adopt a resolution requesting that the Criminal Justice Grant for the District Attorney's Criminal Investigator, B.J. Vardeman, be continued for one year. The grant will be in effect until September 30, 1978.

In other action commissioners voted to table the discussion of road right of way in Pct. 1 for further study.

Accept gravel donated by Kirby to be used on County roads in Pct. 1.

Granted request from Kirby for rock from the Rockland pit to be used in the Kirby State Forest.

Approved the expense of Roy Drake to attend a Justice of the Peace school to be held in December, and to appoint a committee of commissioners and court officials to discuss with City Council members the city's share of costs in the operation of the Solid Waste Disposal site and the County Jail. The committee will also discuss the parking situation for courthouse employees.

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Accident Victim Listed As 'Critical'

A late Monday afternoon car accident during the thunderstorm that swept through Tyler County, left a woman, Faye Hamilton Smith, 56, of Warren in critical condition. She was taken to Tyler County Hospital by Eland's Ambulance Service and later transferred to St. Elizabeth's in Beaumont where she is listed in critical condition. Mrs. Smith was traveling south on Highway 69 when she apparently lost control of her car on the rain slick road, causing the vehicle to cross the road and collide with two pine trees. The accident occurred at approximately 4:15 p.m. 1/4 mile south of Cypress Creek Bridge. There were no other vehicles involved in the accident.

Dear Editor,
Now that our natural resources are running out we need to find alternate forms of energy. Some scientists are predicting that our oil and gas supplies will be depleted in 25 to 30 years. Right now we are not prepared to use very many different energy sources, but the 25 to 30 years will give us time we need to develop different

sources of energy. We have many alternatives such as coal, wood, atomic energy, solar energy, wind energy, wind energy, geothermal energy and many more. Out of all of these energy sources there are only three that are technically and economically feasible to use. These are coal, atomic energy and wood.

The U.S. known coal reserves are enough to last us about 16,000 years. In Alaska alone the known coal reserves total to 11,000 years. There haven't discovered yet. That should be more than enough, but there are certain drawbacks in using coal. The coal can pollute the air very easily if the right type of filters are used. Thousands of animals would also lose their homes after strip mining. Even though it is all supposed to be put back it does take time to grow back.

If we used wood, we would soon have to cut down most of our forests and it still wouldn't be enough. It would also create a serious erosion problem. If it is clear cut, using wood wouldn't work, except on a very small scale.

We could also use atomic energy, as long as the radioactive wastes are stored properly. If fusion reactors could be built it would be safer because it doesn't leave radioactive wastes.

Many people are saying that we could turn to solar energy. This would work in some part of the country, but not all of it. Some scientists think that we could put large collectors out in space and convert the solar energy into microwaves and beam it down to earth. This might work but we can't put one up yet. We could also put large collectors out in space and convert the sunlight into solar energy.

Wave energy would be useful, but it would have to be supplemented by another energy source. Large electrical generators could be built in a spot that has high waves. Paddles could be built on the generator and the waves could turn the paddles which would produce electricity. This same principle could also be used on a smaller scale. A small shed could be built over a swift river. A generator would be connected to a series of batteries. The river would turn the paddles, which would turn the generator and this would produce electricity.

Wind energy could be used where the wind blows frequently and hard enough to turn a windmill. A windmill could be used on the same principle as the wave energy.

Geothermal energy would be used the least often out of all of the other energy sources, because there aren't many places where it exists. Geysers could be harnessed and used to heat up houses. People could also build houses underground. The house would require little heating or cooling, because the ground temperature is just about the same all year.

Of all these energy sources not one could be used by itself, with the exception of coal. It would take a mixture of these to really make America energy dependent, which I think is a worthwhile goal. The type of energy source used will depend on the climate and the availability of the energy source itself. Some of these alternate energy forms would be economically and technologically feasible, only if research is done on them and mass production of the different systems needed. We should also need some kind of reserve, just in case of bad weather or an accident.

The United States cannot remain dependent on foreign countries for her energy supply. We must experiment and build for the future when no one has any oil left. We need to set an example for other countries to follow. If we can successfully find and develop other energy sources I'm sure that other countries will do the same.

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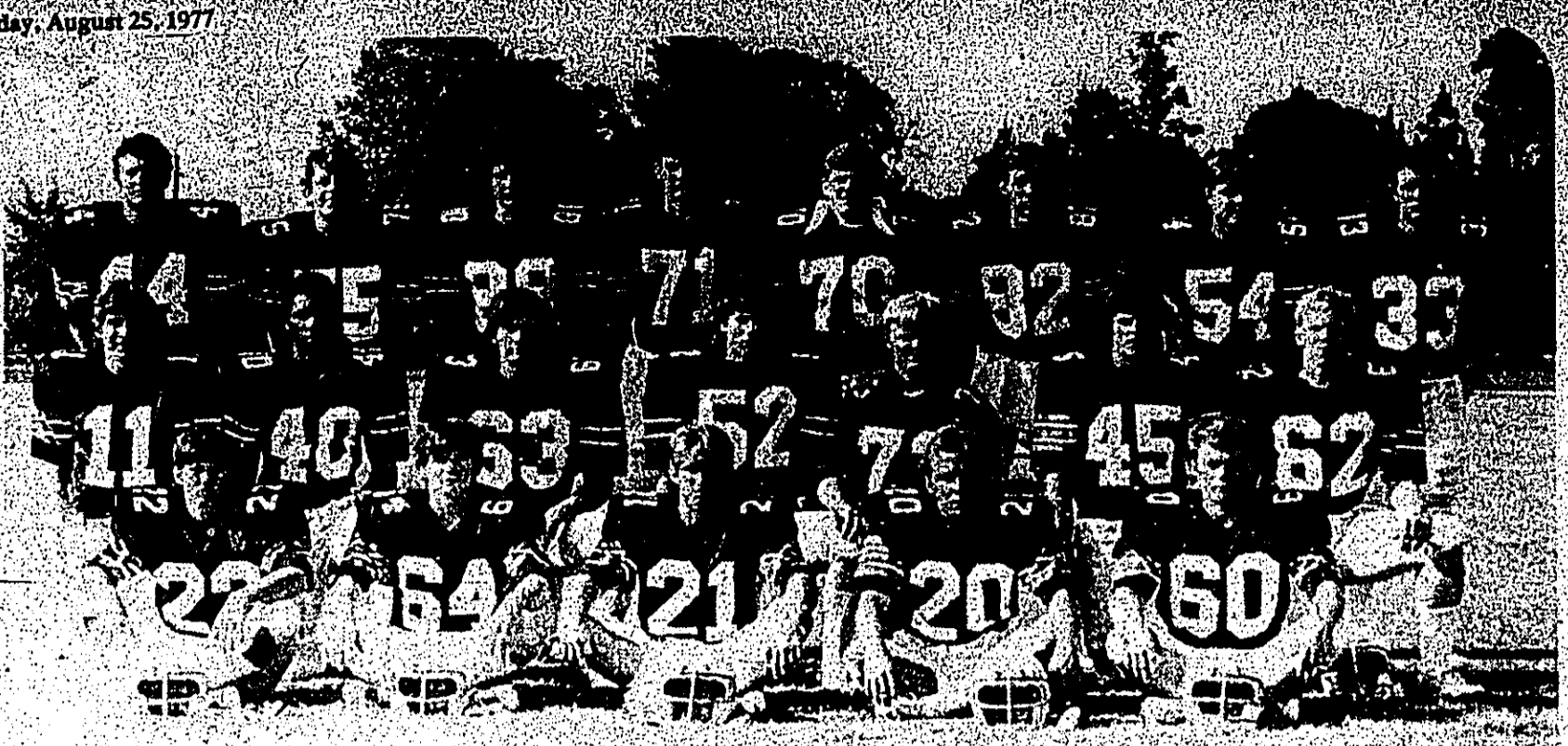

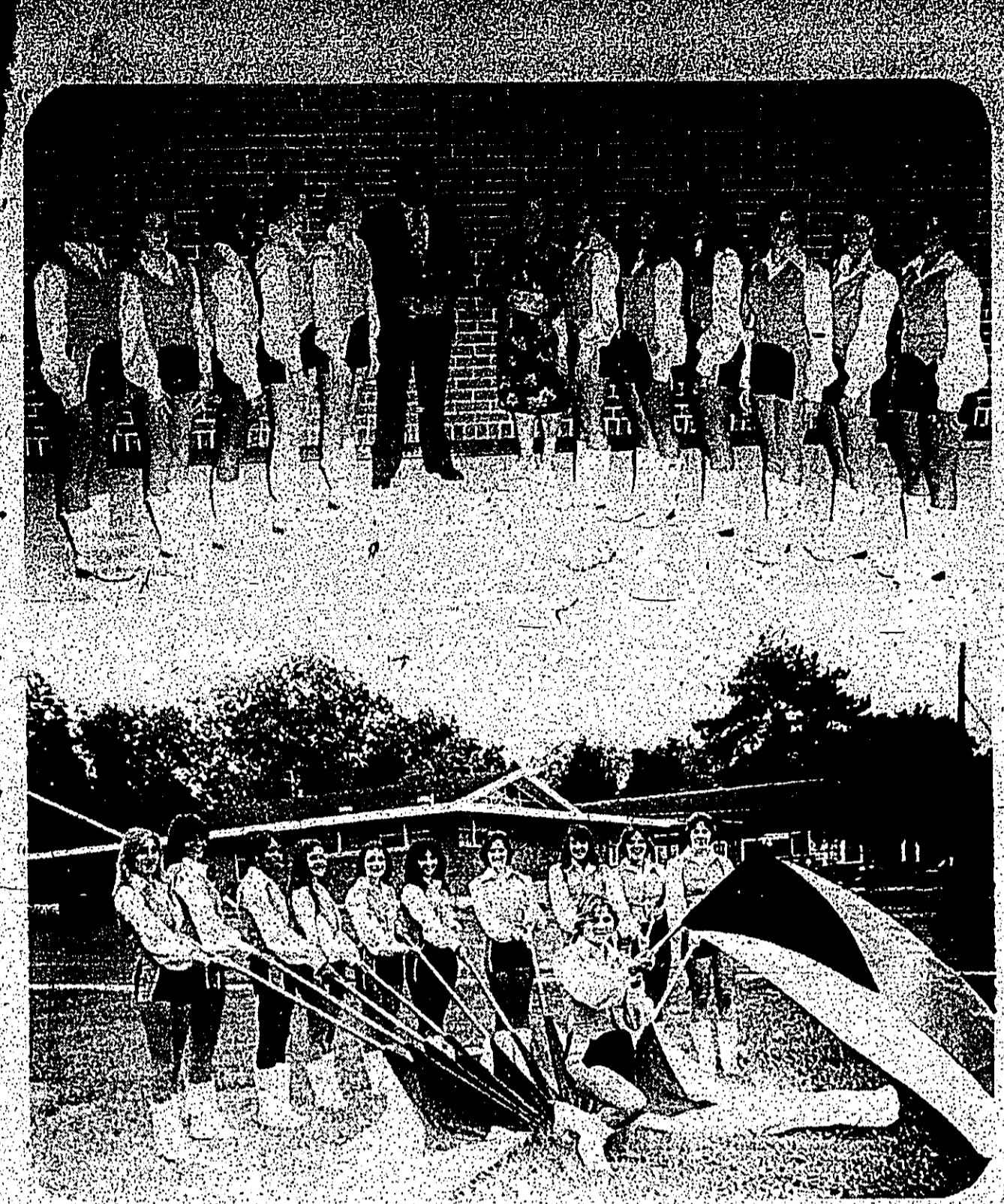

Country's '76 Oil Production Important

The massive energy needs of this nation continue to grow in the face of declining crude oil and natural gas production in Texas and nationwide. Because of this, Tyler County's 1976 petroleum production was as important as in any year since production began in 1937.

According to figures from the U.S. Bureau of Energy Statistics, Texas crude oil production last year was approximately 1,189,719,000 barrels, a decline from 1,221,929,000 barrels in 1975. The four consecutive years of decline from 1972's all-time high of 1,415,975 from natural gas.

Natural gas production, estimated by the Bureau of Energy Statistics, also was down from 1975. Texas production also peaked in 1972 at 8,657,840 Mcf. Since then, it has fallen each year since.

An October 1-31 season will be held on the Dan B. Hain Area in the Angelina Area in Jasper and Tyler Counties. Limit is one buck with forked antlers.

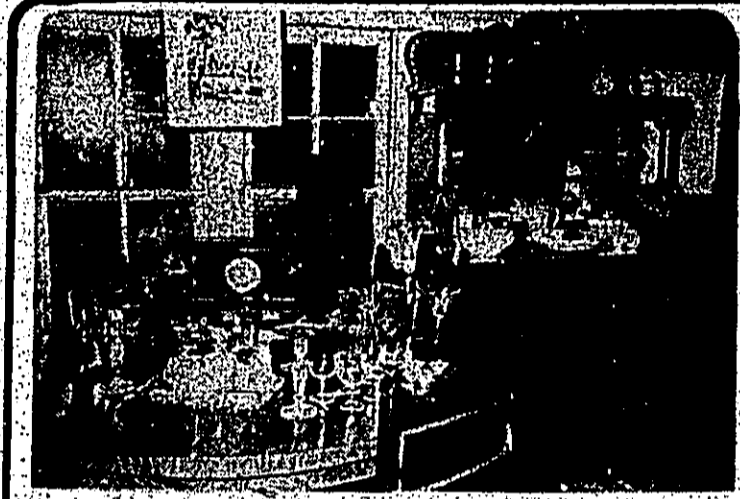

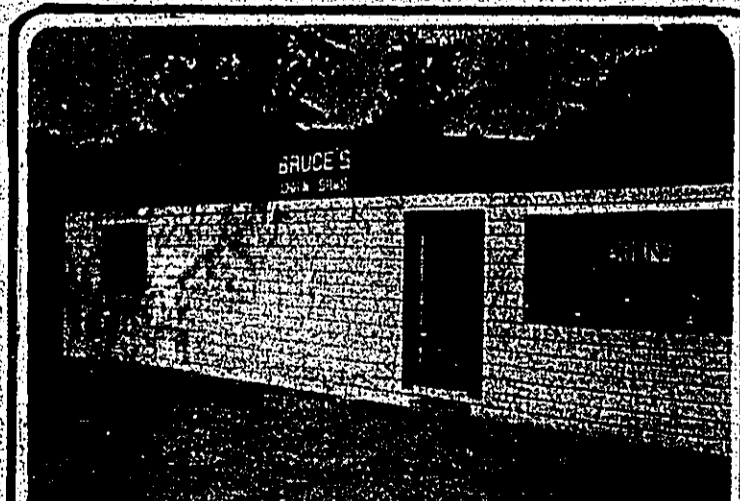
