

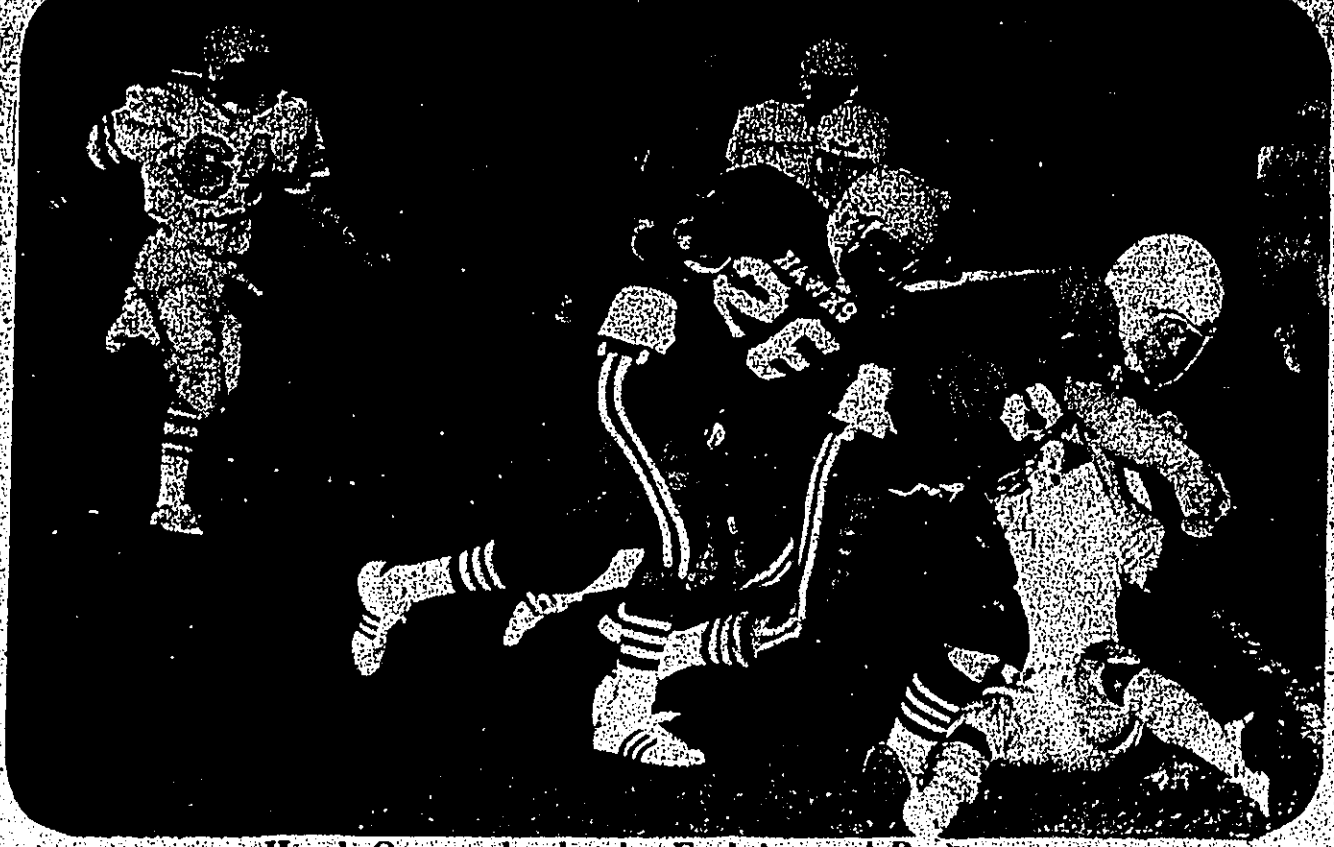

The Hardin-Jefferson Hawks took advantage of the Woodville Eagles Friday night to tune of a 27-0 win during the first game of the season at Sour Lake.

The Eagles, who took the blow like it was Hurricane Anita managed to rush for over 200 yards against the Hardin-Jefferson defense and pass for a total of 90 yards.

The Hawks amassed a total of 340 yards on the ground.

Eagles Defensive End Terry Settler, a 165 lb. junior, helped turn the end around plays in and participated in a lot of tackles for the Woodville team. Woodville suffered from five fumbles, losing three of the drops. Sour Lake couldn't find the handle either dropping five also but recovering two.

According to Woodville Coach Guy Broussard, the team got tired early in the game. "And they tried to play the easy way."

Broussard said the main offensive threat is James Barlow, a 145 lb. junior, who's "real quick and shifty." The team will start 5 seniors. Kountze ended last year 7-2-1.

Woodville Jr. High Takes Newton 8-6 Last Thursday

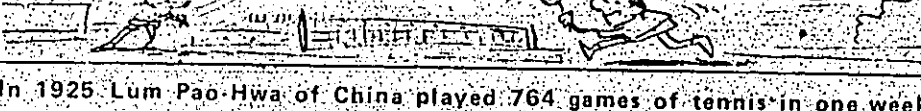
The Woodville Junior High team beat Newton, 8-6 in the first game of the season Thursday, September 1.

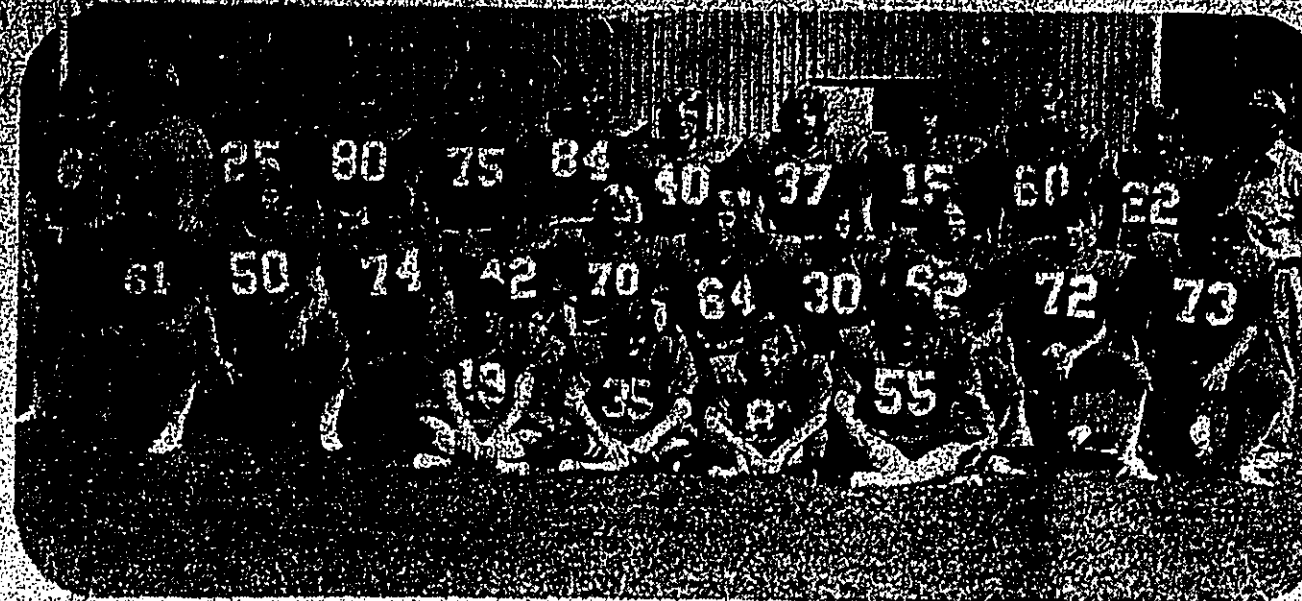
Bulldogs Breeze Thru Season Opener 20-0

"For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast." (Eph. 2:8,9). How do grace and faith work together to save men?

GRACE. Meditate on Heb. 2:9 which says, "But we see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels for the suffering of death, crowned with glory and honour; that He by the grace of God should taste death for every man." Because God so loved man (John 3:16) He provided that while we were yet sinners Christ should die for the ungodly (Rom. 5:8).

The teaching of this gospel has been provided by grace: "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men... Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in the present world..." (Titus 2:11,12). GRACE INCLUDES ALL GOD HAS DONE TO SAVE MEN.

FAITH. How does faith function in the saving process? First, we note the necessity of faith: "But without faith it is impossible to please Him: for he that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him" (Heb. 11:6). Jesus said, "For if ye believe not that I am He, ye shall die in your sins" (John 8:24).

Saving faith comes by hearing the saving word (Rom. 10:17). Nothing short of faith in the gospel message will save man. When Jesus speaks the person who has saving faith will obey, for Jesus is the author of eternal salvation to those who obey Him (Heb. 5:8,9).

The church had saving faith and that is the reason he asked, "What doth hinder me to be baptized?" (Acts 8:36). 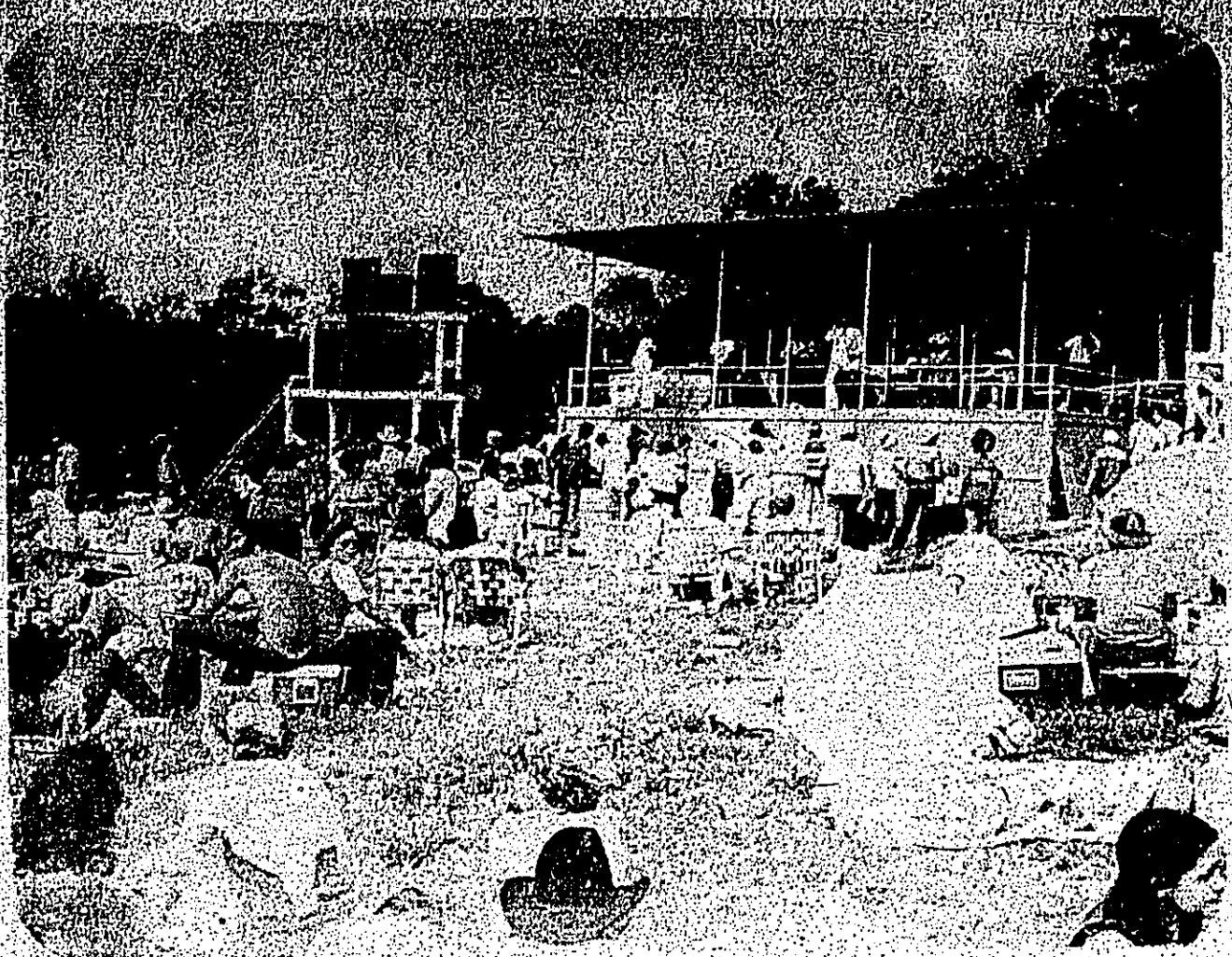
Max Westbrook, owner of Green Valley Ranch stated that "Folks here are just out for a good time and good music, and," he said, "they don't want any trouble."

Authorities report the estimated 3,000 who attended the festival had few complaints and with most enjoying the music, fun and good times with family and friends.



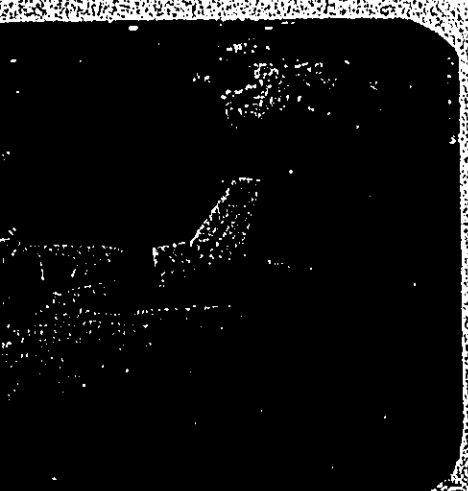
Country Singer Roy Head belts out a song to Country Western Fans



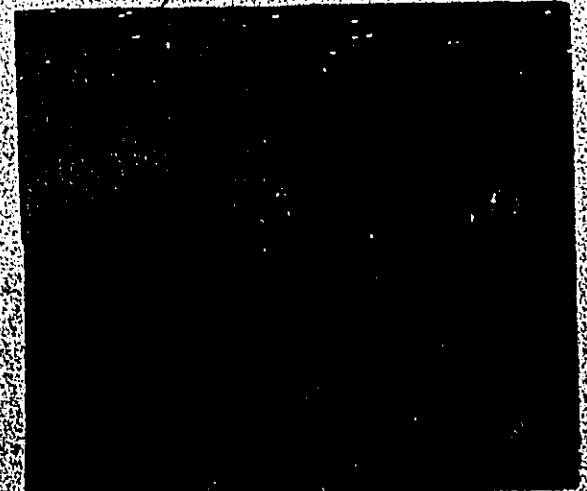

Civil Air Patrol Forming In Tyler County

The family of a pilot flying from Dallas to Humphrey, Texas, became concerned when the flight was overdue and notified the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center who, in turn, notifies the Texas Civil Air Patrol (CAP). Utilizing air and ground search and rescue techniques, Texas CAP located the downed aircraft near Conroe. The pilot, although suffering from broken bones and other minor injuries, was found in good condition and transported to a hospital in Conroe, putting a happy ending on an otherwise possibly fatal ordeal.

In Oregon, two teenage boys were reported missing while hiking in the vicinity of Mt. Hood, with their last known position the mountainside at the 500 foot level. At the request of the county Sheriff, Oregon CAP ground teams located the two cold frightened hikers, returning them to their parents unhurt but wiser, who were waiting at the CAP base camp.

Assisting in many types of rescues from transporting needed blood to recovering stranded boaters, Civil Air Patrol members, comprised of men, women, boys and girls, nation wide, were directly responsible for saving 34 people and averting tragedy in many cases, by locating a record breaking 395 search objectives in the year 1976.

Civil Air Patrol is an Official Auxiliary of the United States Air Force, volunteers who are always ready to render assistance in times of disaster and emergency.

According to Tyler County CAP Organizer Floyd Petri, "There is way more to the program than flying an airplane, that's just one part," he said, adding, "CAP has much more to offer such as Youth Activities and the Cadet Program." Although CAP can play a major part in rescue attempts, it also concerns itself with promoting America's aerospace education, for adults and youth, search and rescue and disaster relief missions and a cadet program to develop tomorrow's leaders.

Tyler County is being offered the benefits

of the Civil Air Patrol, but members are needed, he said. There are approximately 30 members at this time, with CAP Units being organized in Woodville, Warren, Ivanhoe and in the future Hillister, Colmesneil and Chester.

According to Petri, the Senior (Adult) program offers activity for those persons who believe in helping their local community and country. It offers activity and challenging work such as helping to operate CAP's radio network, sharing in property and life saving efforts during emergencies and learning new skills while motivating the young to take part in America.

The Cadet (13-18) program gives boys and girls an opportunity to participate in flying programs, International Air Cadet exchange program, traveling to some 24 countries around the world, and offers scholarships in engineering, languages, aeronautics, physics and education not relating to Air Force matters.

But study is not all of the Cadet Program. CAP Cadet's may spend a week at an Air Force Base, living the life of a regular airman, using the same quarters and facilities as Air Force personnel and working side by side with trained persons in the control tower or taking a ride on one of America's jets or bombers. They are given the chance to study maintenance of engines, radar, radio and related areas.

To qualify for the Senior program you must be (a) 18 years or older and (b) must be a permanent resident of the United States.

To qualify for the Cadet program, you must be (a) 13 years (or enrolled in the seventh grade) to 17 years and single, (b) permanent resident of U.S., (c) non-member of the armed forces, (d) High School or College student and (e) be making passing grades.

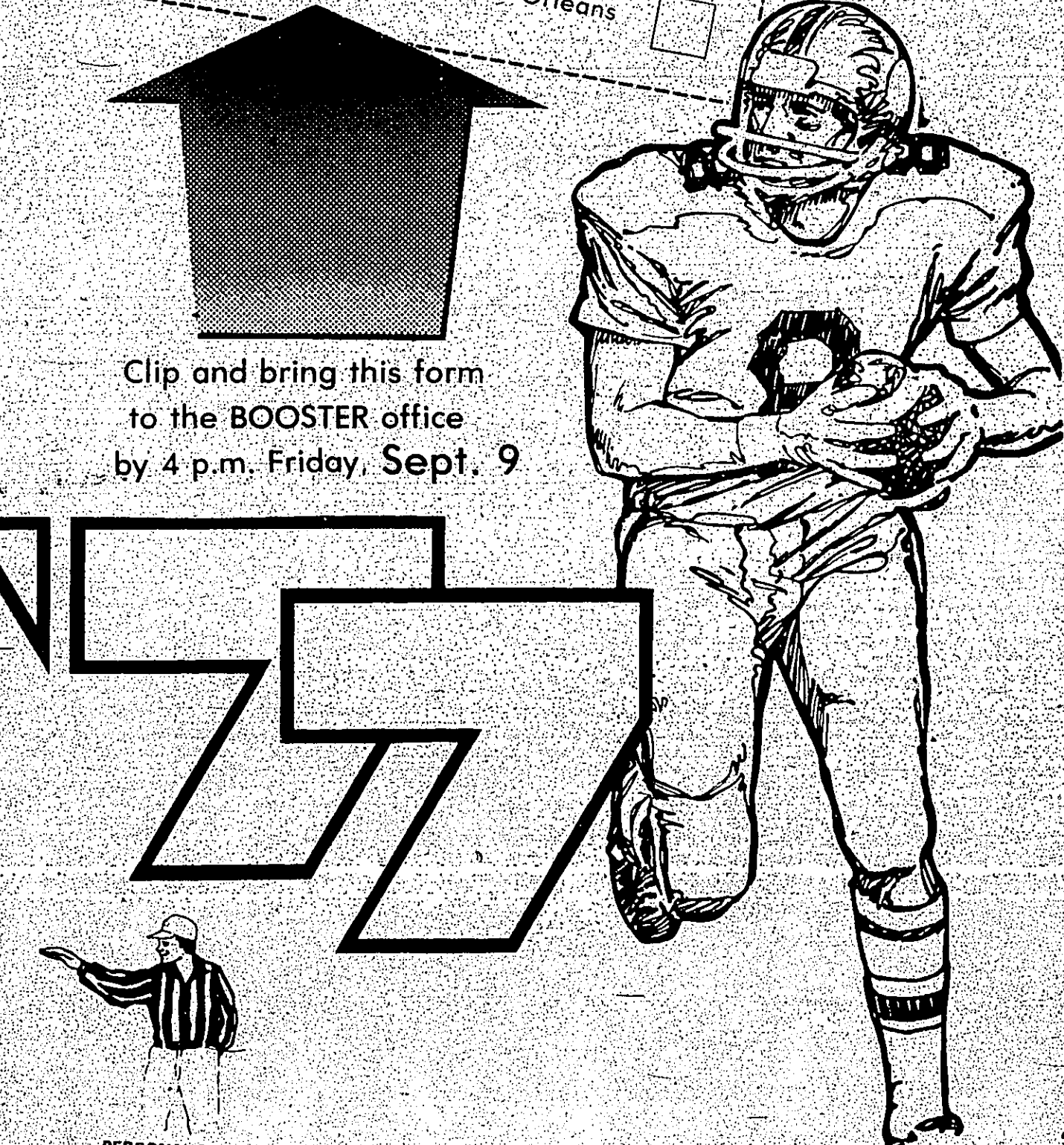

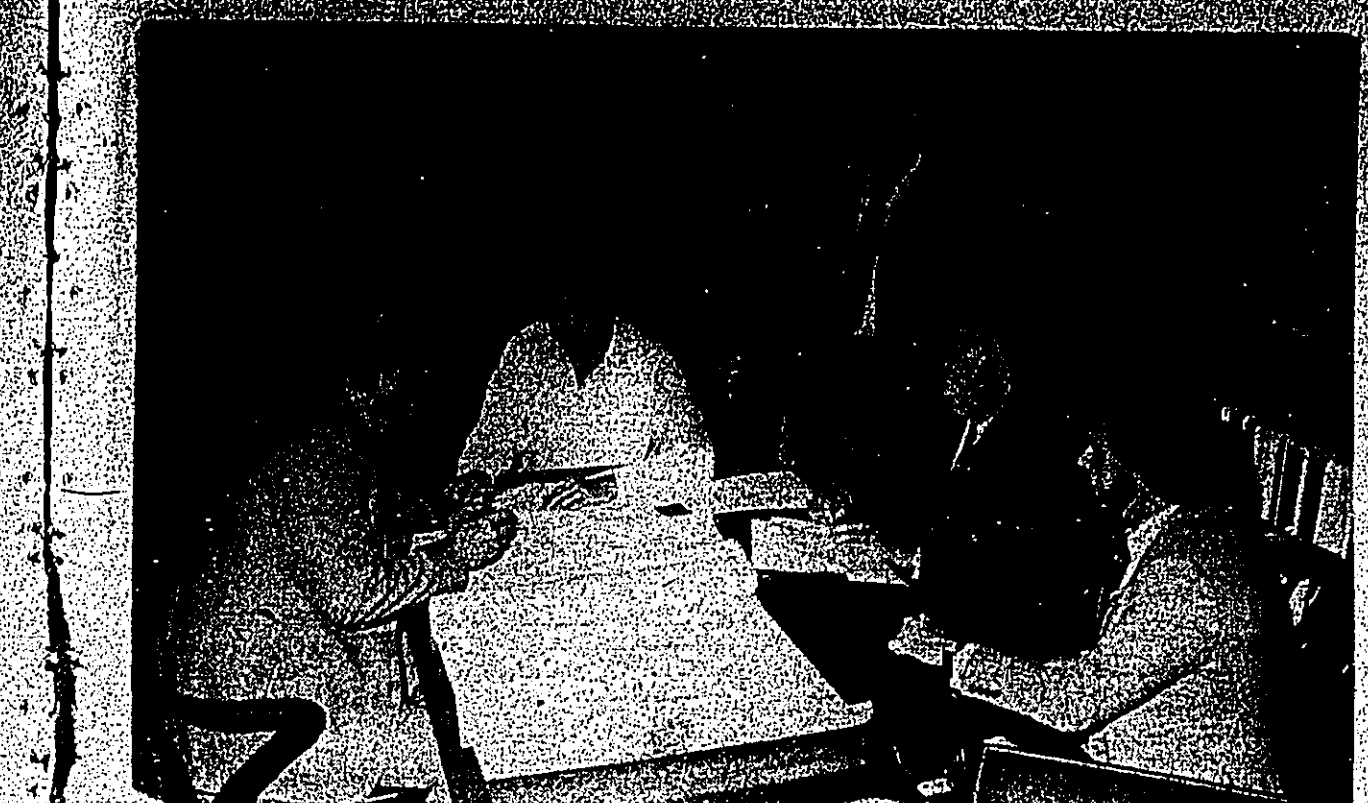

Christie May Seek Senator's Seat

AUSTIN- State Board of Insurance Chairman Joe Christie resigned Thursday, saying he plans to decide during October whether to seek U.S. Sen. John Tower's seat next year.

"As you know, I am considering running for the United States Senate against John Tower, and I want to make that decision on my own time, not at taxpayers' expense," Christie said.

The Christie Committee, formed recently by supporters of a Christie bid for the Senate, has been assessing "strong support" and evaluating his potential as a senatorial candidate.

Christie said he was proud of his work at the board, stinging out several reforms he initiated as its chairman.

"We cut our budget by \$1.7 million. We were the only state agency to cut our budget, to reduce the number of employees and increase our workload," Christie said.

"We have closed the loopholes and eliminated the fine print in accident and health insurance policies, making the board a truly consumer-oriented agency."

In addition to deciding whether to make the Senate race, Christie said he plans to get more active in the oil business and continue to his law practice.
