New D.Q. Planned

Plans are underway for the construction of a new "completely different" Dairy Queen, to be located south of Woodville, next to Mack's Auto Parts, with the anticipated opening date set for the first of January, according to Mark Lietman, of Motel Enterprises of Lufkin.

Lietman said that the new Dairy Queen will be an "all new deal" offering a

complete cafeteria line, and will have a restaurant type atmosphere with a seating capacity of 90. The proposed D.Q. will employ some 32 persons.

"This concept is perfect for small towns," Lietman said. "It's like having Bonanza, Wyatt's and Dairy Queen all rolled into one," he added.

Commissioners Court Hears Report

Tyler County Commissioners met in "special session" Friday, September 30, to open bids and hear a special report from a court appointed committee concerning the City of Woodville's control over parking around the courthouse, the cost of housing city prisoners in the county jail and the cost of operating the county dump located on Highway 190.

Commissioner J.R. "Bo" Jordan, committee chairman, along with Sheriff Lewis Craven, Kenneth Lowe and E.A. Sturrock presented to the court three requests that the city answer the requests by October 15.

During a brief recess in court actions, Royce L. Brockman was sworn as Tyler County Attorney. Brockman's appointment as County Attorney followed the resignation of former County Attorney James Allison.

Brockman, who is a former Tyler County attorney, indicated that he was glad to be back in county government practice.

"I have a good aggressive court to work with," Brockman said adding that the first consideration was "to clear the overloaded county court docket."

Brockman assumed the duties as county attorney October 1, 1977.

In other court action, commissioners voted to: "Accept a bid from Lufkin Typewriter and Cash register of 699 for a typewriter for the District Clerk's office. Bids ranged from 699 to 725.

"Agreed to lease a 7000 copy machine. Cost to the county will be \$53.21 including the service charge. After a period of five years the cost will be reduced to the service charge only which is \$160.

3. GARBAGE DUMP - The County has operated the Garbage Dump on the Jasper highway out of Revenue Sharing funds and has paid all cost of keeping it operating for the past five (5) years.

Since the County Tax money is not used here, it is our recommendation that the City pay 1/2 the cost of operating the Dump. (If the City did not use this Dump, we could reclassify the Dump to Class III Dump and cut the cost of operation from about \$20,000.00 to \$25,000.00 per year down to less than \$1,000.00 per year.)

Commissioners asked that the city answer the requests by October 15.

COMMITTEE'S REQUEST TO THE COURT

1. PARKING - The County has asked the City to issue parking permits to Employees and Elected Officials - they have continued to refuse to do this. The County has had a Surveyor to check the lines around the Courthouse and find the South side and West side meters and Parking and Parking area on County Property. Therefore it is the recommendation of this Committee that the Court ask the City to remove their parking meters from the West and South side of the Courthouse Square. This Area being on County Property should be under control of the Commissioners Court.

2. JAIL - It is the recommendation of this Committee that the City pay actual cost of keeping a prisoner per day. The estimated cost being \$6.00 per day to keep a prisoner, we therefore recommend that the City pay to the County \$8.00 a piece per day for their prisoners.

Sen. Adams Day Is October 15

(AUSTIN) State Senator Don Adams of Jasper, President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate, will serve as Governor of Texas on Saturday, October 15, 1977, when both Governor Dolph Briscoe and Lt. Governor Bill Hobby will be out of the state on official business. As President Pro Tempore of the Senate, Adams is third in line of succession to the governor's office and temporarily assumes the duties of the office upon the absence of the Governor and Lt. Governor.

Adams, 38, and his family will be honored at various festivities in Austin during the tradition "Governor For A Day" program in recognition of his service to his district and the State of Texas.

"I am of course very happy and humbled by this great opportunity and honor," Adams said, "and hope that all of our friends from East Texas will be able to be in Austin to join with Linda and me on this happy day."

The Adams "Governor For A Day" program will be a "simple and casual affair for the whole family," he said. The public, and especially all of the citizens of Adams' East Texas senatorial district are invited to all of the events which include:

11:30 a.m. - Saturday-Official swearing in ceremony in the Senate Chamber in the capitol. Senator A.M. Aikin, Dean of the Senate, will serve as Master of Ceremonies. Featured speakers will be Texas Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace and State Representative Lynn Nabers of Brownwood.

12:00 Noon - Public reception in the Governor's Office in the capitol.

1:00 p.m. - Barbecue on the capitol grounds. Tickets to the barbecue are \$7.50 per person. All of the other events are free of charge and open to the public. Tickets to the barbecue may be obtained from the chambers of commerce in Jasper, Lufkin, and Nacogdoches, the Deep East Texas Electric Co-Op in San Augustine, or by writing to "Don Adams Governor For A Day Committee", P.O. Don Adams began his political career in 1968 when he was elected to the Texas House of Representatives. After four years in the House, Adams was elected to the Senate in 1972 and re-elected without opposition in 1974.

As a member of the Senate, Adams has served as Chairman of the Administration Committee and Vice Chairman of the influential Senate Finance Committee.

In 1972 Don Adams was named Outstanding Young Man in Jasper and was selected by the Texas Jaycees

as one of the five Outstanding Young Men in Texas.

Adams, who announced earlier this summer that he would not seek re-election to the Senate, was unanimously elected President Pro Tempore by his fellow thirty state senators on the last night of the recently concluded 65th Regular Session of the Texas Legislature.

Adams received his education in the Jasper public school system, Schreiner Institute and Baylor University where he graduated summa cum laude from the law school in 1963.

Senator Adams is the son of the late T. Gilbert Adams, former Jasper County Judge, and Mrs. Dess Hart Adams.

Adams is married to the former Linda Cullum of Wickett, Texas. Their children include Don Adams, Jr., Debra Adams and Dinah Adams. The Adams family is a member of First Methodist Church of Jasper.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—The drive to conserve energy has attracted the interest not only of cost-conscious consumers but also of manufacturers and sellers of home insulation products.

While most are honest, there are a few who reportedly are trying to earn a fast buck through deceptive trade practices. Not only can this cost the consumer money and fail to produce energy savings, but fire safety officials report that inefficient or faulty insulating materials being used by some unscrupulous installers can result in serious fire hazards to users.

Our Consumer Protection Division attorneys point out that many conflicting claims are being made about various types of insulation. Our lawyers caution that no responsible seller of insulation can make a flat claim of savings applicable to all homes.

Some sellers are also exaggerating the efficiency of their product, its price, and warranty coverage. Most experts agree that when insulating the home the least expensive and most efficient approach is to make certain attic insulation is sufficient to insure maximum retention of both heat and cold.

Until recently most homes were insulated with an "R" (or "resistance") factor of 16. Some electric utility companies now recommend the equivalent of six inches of R-30 value insulation. In most homes, this would mean a substantial increase in insulation.

When deciding on insulation material, you should beware that the "R" factor is the most effective way to compare types of insulation and prices. If you pay more for one particular brand of attic insulation, you should get more "R" value for your money according to the amount of square feet you have in your attic.

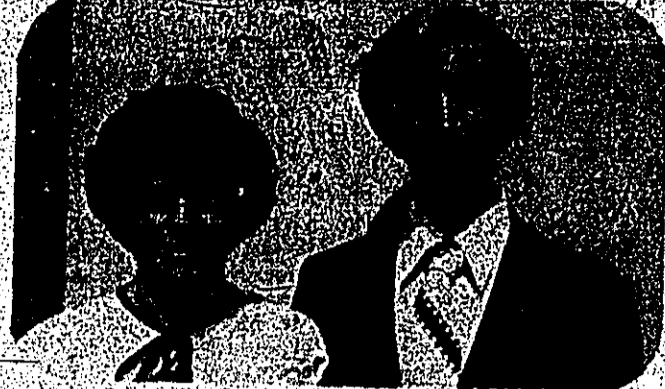

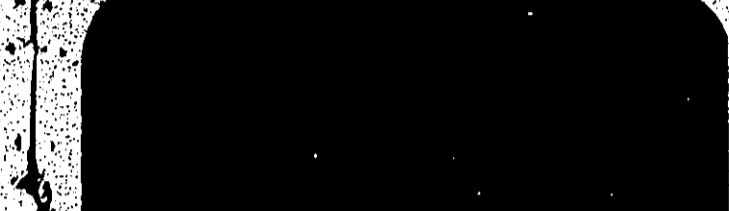

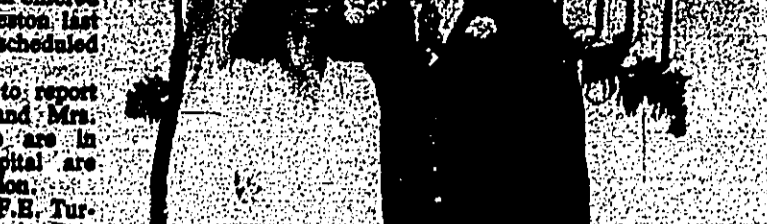

MHMR Client Number Shows Increase

As the Board of Trustees meeting on the Mental Health Mental Retardation Services held in the Harvest Room of LaVilla Hotel Savings & Loan on September 21, it was reported that during Fiscal Year 1977 there was an increase of clients served by

monthly. During the September meeting, there was a review of the progress made during the past Fiscal Year (September 1976 through August 31, 1977). It was reported that a total of 1,838 persons received services for mental health related problems which was a 26 percent increase over last year's total of 1,461 persons. Expenditures were broken down into four primary areas: Mental Retardation-42 percent; Alcohol & Drug Programs-15 percent; Administration-11 percent.

Other items discussed at the meeting were the overall status of the Day Treatment/Administrative facility which is currently being built in Liberty, Texas. The facility should be completed by January, 1978. A report was made by the Board from a Peer Review Team which evaluated the mental health and mental retardation services for FY 1977. The Peer Review Team was composed of professional employees by MHMR, who took it was to analyze the progress of mental health and mental retardation

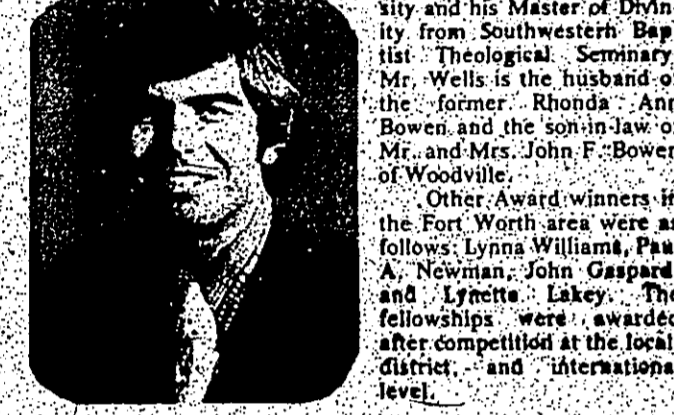
Wells Receives Scholarship

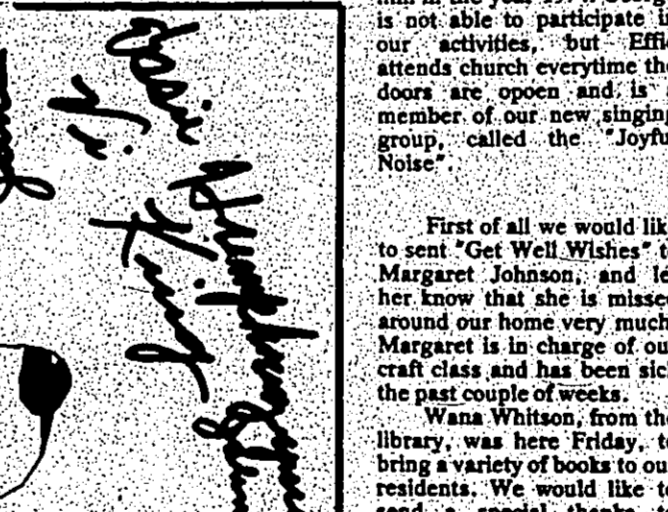

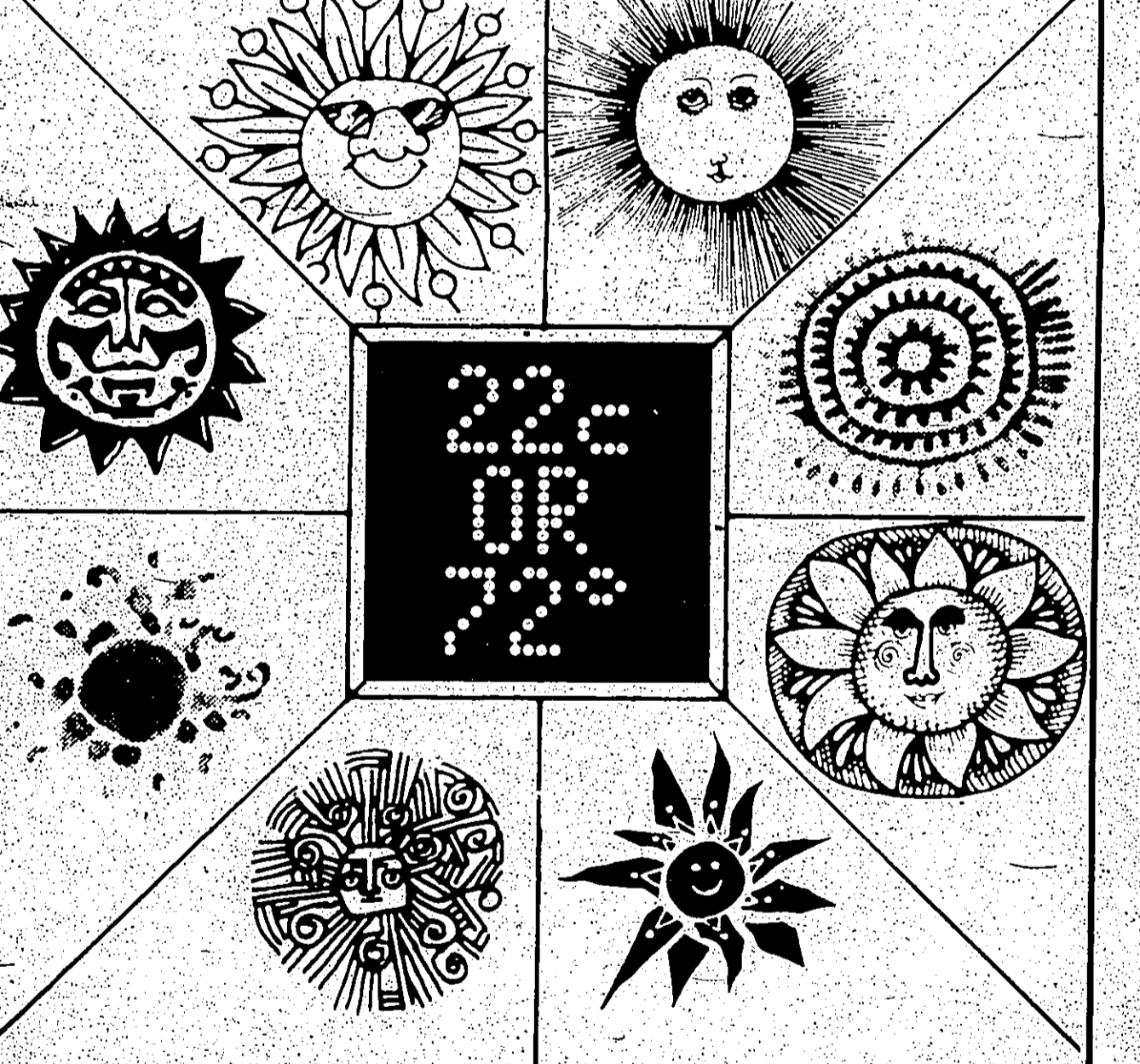

Sound Management Key To Future Supply

PORTLAND, ORE.—The nation's timber needs, expected to double by the year 2000, can be met by sound management of publicly-owned forest land, part of a report by the National Forest System, says Harry A. Merlo, Louisiana-Pacific chairman and president.

Merlo, who is president of the National Forest System, said that the federal government's timber supply is being depleted by the National Forest System's timber harvests, which are being sold at a loss to the U.S. Treasury.

Merlo said it is up to Congress to "take the lead in establishing a clear national policy which states goals and priorities, directs efficient use of national resources and provides adequate financing."

"Timber harvests on the National Forest System could be increased 50 to 100 per cent without impairing future supply and while maintaining environmental standards, but it takes money."

"Larger timber harvests would require increased initial investments which would yield immediate and many-fold returns to the federal treasury," he added.

"If 15 billion board feet of timber were put up for sale, instead of the 1.2 billion board feet currently being sold, the National Forest System could return close to \$3 billion to the U.S. Treasury in addition to wiping out its current half-billion annual operating deficit."

"Congress knows this is possible," said Merlo. "In July a representative from Western Timber Association in San Francisco shared this analysis with the House Subcommittee on Forests holding hearings on the Resources Planning Act."

THREAT TO TIMBER SUPPLY

Merlo said unless Congress acts, the timber problem head-on instead of coming up with short-term solutions, the result will be a national timber shortage.

"If wood shortages occur," he added, "they will be largely artificial and totally unnecessary. The

Accent On Health

The last thing on the mind of many homeowners moving to a suburban area is sewage—but it shouldn't be, says the Texas Department of Health.

About 20 percent of the Texas population uses septic tanks, and about 95 percent of the private systems use the absorption system—with lateral lines leading from the septic tank to the ground.

To their dismay, many residents have discovered that their soil won't soak up all the effluent being generated from their homes. This leads to the surfacing of septic tank effluent, which results in odorous standing water and in breeding places for flies and mosquitoes. It also permits direct contact with disease-carrying water by humans and pets.

New standards for construction of private sewage facilities have been developed by the Department. The new standards have been discussed in public hearings, and will be submitted to the September meeting of the Texas Board of Health. If the board approves them, they will become official 90 days later.

The private sewage systems are usually single owner systems. In addition to residential systems, however, these can also include a motel, laundry, service station, or other commercial establishment.

With very few exceptions the typical private sewage system is composed of a septic tank followed by a soil absorption system for the effluent. Normally, this is what the homeowner has.

The residents of subdivisions, lake developments, and individuals living in smaller towns and cities—as well as other rural residents—all use septic systems.

But some of the areas where private sewage facilities are built are just not suitable for septic tanks under ideal conditions. A septic tank system should be located where soils have good permeability, such as sandy loam and sandy clay. Many private facilities, however, are installed in rocky areas with no permeability or in tight clay soils which won't allow passage of water.

Where you have many residences and businesses moving into subdivisions which have ordinances governing the regulation of private sewage facilities, problems have sometimes arisen. These problems have involved developers marketing small lots and contractors providing facilities which don't meet recommended standards.

Sometimes, home owners find themselves with an individual disposal system that doesn't work. And, in some cases, residents have had to construct and operate a central, or public, collection system and treatment plant at considerable cost, or tie in with nearby municipal systems.

The new standards offer alternatives to conventional septic tank design, including the elimination of wastewater by evaporation and plant transpiration. This method will work very well in the drier areas of the state. Where sufficient land area is available, an evaporative absorptive system can be changed to an evaporative system which has a much better chance of functioning properly.

The construction standards are intended to upgrade the minimum acceptable standards for private sewage facilities in the state and to try to eliminate some of the problems. The standards will supply additional information to home owners, home builders and local and state public health officials.

Through the cooperation of the Texas Water Quality Board, counties have the option of adopting regulations for the installation of septic tank systems in the jurisdictions. Some 35 counties, many of them in the prairie areas, have adopted these orders.

Water oriented agencies, such as water districts, have adopted similar orders through the Texas Water Quality Board to control the pollution of streams and lakes under their jurisdictions. River authorities, such as the Lower Colorado River Authority, Trinity River Authority, and Upper Guadalupe River Authority, have adopted these orders for areas around certain lakes.

The challenge for bringing legal pressure to bear against someone who has a defective private sewage system is the San Antonio law, which has expired for years. Control and state public health authorities.

TEA To Hold Annual Meeting Oct. 20-21

LUFKIN—Several Texas will be driving new nails into their walls after the Texas Forestry Association annual meeting Oct. 20-21 in Beaumont.

They will need them for hanging the plaques TFA will be handing out for outstanding contributions to forestry. The honorees include B.J. Pryor, Smith County extension agent, who gets the TFA County Agent of the Year Award, and Dr. Thomas L. Payne, assistant professor at Texas A&M, Research Award.

Journalism laurels will go to Sam Malone of the San Augustine Rambler, Weekly Newspaper of the Year Award; Longview News Journal, Daily News and the Year Award; KFDM-TV in Beaumont, Television Station of the Year Award; and KSPA in Nacogdoches, Radio Station of the Year Award.

Getting scholarship honors, which will include \$500 gifts from TFA rather than plaques, will be Reginald Whitehead of Stephen F. Austin State University and James Hanula of Texas A&M University.

Pryor, named for his forest conservation efforts will receive his second award—the first person to repeat to top honors.

He claimed a prior citation in 1967. A TFA spokesman said that Pryor is being lauded again because he has provided leadership in developing and maintaining a strong Smith County Forestry Committee, which plans and conducts forestry educational tours and clinics each year.

The spokesman said that Pryor provides sound timber management and marketing information to forest landowners, works with youth groups on all phases of forestry and fire prevention, has the only hardwood growth demonstration in the state and one of the largest Christmas tree result demonstrations.

TFA said that research winner Dr. Payne "has distinguished himself in providing leadership for southern pine beetle research in Texas and the entire southern region."

The honor has carried with numerous research projects dealing with the beetle, including a program evaluating behavioral chemicals as they relate to the woodpecker.

Dr. Payne recently has been associated with the Expanded Southern Pine Beetle Research and Application Program, a 10-million effort which he and a comrade planned, organized and implemented. The program involves both forestry schools in Texas and U.S. Forest Service personnel across the South.

Sam Malone of the San Augustine Rambler is being given the Best weekly journalism citation as "one of TFA's best friends and most solid supporters."

"He knows that TFA promotes policies that are good for East Texas, good for San Augustine and good for Sam Malone and individuals like him," the TFA spokesman said.

KSFA Radio claims its honor as "The Radio Station Among the Pines" named for "The College Among the Pines," Stephen F. Austin State University.

"The people at KSFA, by their use of stories concerning forestry in general and TFA in particular, are, in effect, telling us that they are our friends," said the TFA spokesman.

KFDM-TV, he said, is walking off with the television honor because it is a station that believes in concentrating on local and area news, "and that means, to a degree, news about the East Texas Pine Woods."

The Longview News-Journal, particularly the coverage of such stories as the Tyler (Clearwater) lawsuit, the spokesman said.

Both of the scholarship winners carry high graduate degrees in forestry.

Whitehead, a native of Henderson, has a B.S. in Forestry from Texas A&M and a Ph.D. in Forestry from the University of Mississippi.

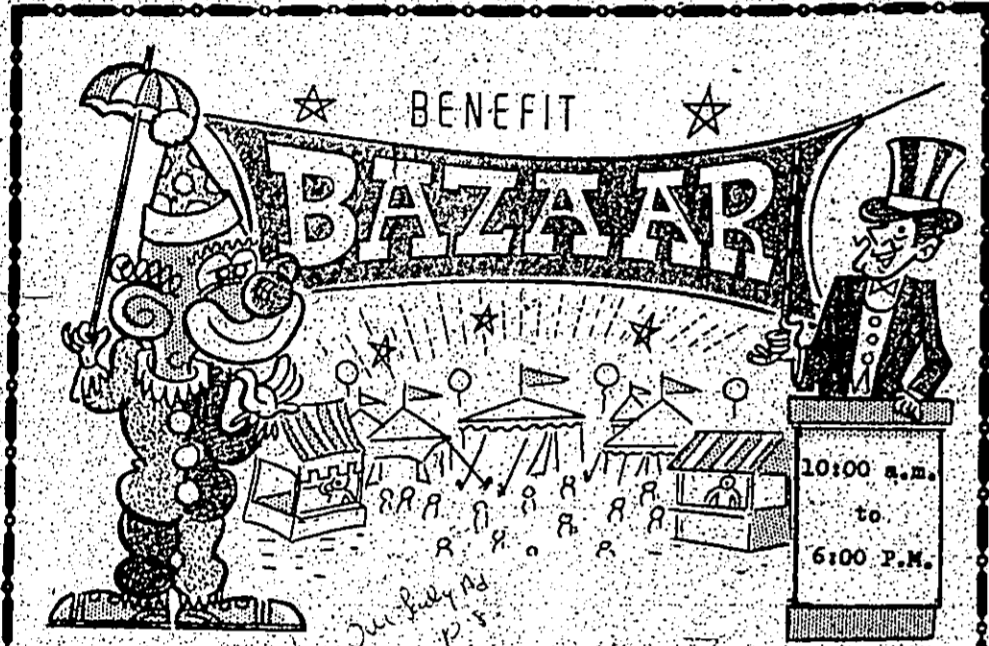

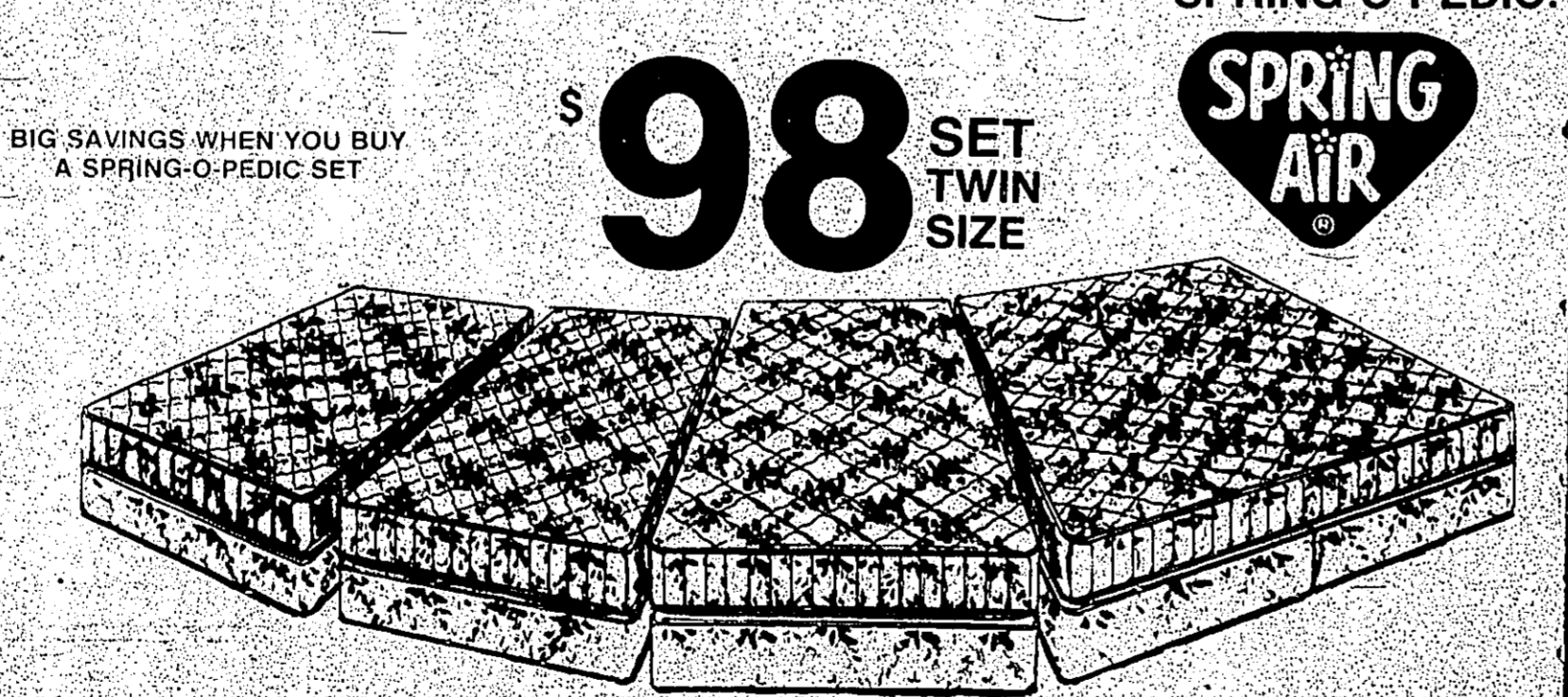
