## Sen. Adams Day Is October 15

(AUSTIN) State Senator Jon Adams of Jasper, President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate, will serve as Governor of Texas on Saturday, October 15, 1977, when both Governor Dolph Briscoe and Lt. Governor Bill Hobby will be out of the state on official business. As President Pro Tempore of the Senate, Adams is third in line of succession to the governor's seat and temporarily assumes the duties of the office upon the absence of the Governor.

Adams, 38, and his family, will be honored at various festivities in Austin during the tradition "Governor For A Day" program in recognition of his service to his district and the State of Texas.

"I am, of course, very happy and humbled by this great opportunity and honor," Adams said, "and hope that all of our friends from East Texas will be able to be in Austin to join with Linda and me on this happy day."

The Adams' "Governor For A Day" program will be a simple and casual affair for the whole family, he said.

The public, and especially all of the citizens of Adams' East Texas senatorial district are invited to all of the events which include:

11:30 a.m. Saturday Official swearing in ceremony in the Senate Chamber in the capitol. Senator A.M. Alkin, Jr., Dean of the Senate, will serve as Master of Ceremonies. Featured speakers will be Texas Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace and State Representative Lynn Naber of Brownwood.

12:00 Noon Public reception in the Governor's Office in the capitol.

1:00 p.m. Barbecue on the capitol grounds.

Don Adams began his political career in 1968 when he was elected to the Texas House of Representatives. After four years in the House, Adams was elected to the Senate in 1972 and re-elected without opposition in 1974.

As a member of the Senate, Adams has served as Chairman of the Administration Committee and Vice Chairman of the influential Senate Finance Committee.

In 1972 Don Adams was named Outstanding Young Man in Jasper and was selected by the Texas Jaycees

as one of the five Outstanding Young Men in Texas.

Adams, who announced earlier this summer that he would not seek re-election to the Senate, was unanimously elected President Pro Tempore by his fellow thirty state senators on the last night of the recently concluded 65th Regular Session of the Texas Legislature.

Adams received his education in the Jasper public school system, Schreiner Institute and Baylor University.

We have our home for \$40,000 in 1965 and now have it for \$40,000. Our homeowners insurance is fully insured. Could we right in urging us to increase our policy?

He's right. That house you built for \$40,000 would cost you, on average, \$5,880 to replace today—\$45,880 more than its original value. Our Consumer Protection Division attorneys point out that many conflicting claims are being made about various types of insulation. Our lawyers caution that no responsible seller of insulation can make a flat claim of savings applicable to all homes.

Some sellers are also exaggerating the efficiency of their product, its price and warranty coverage.

Most experts agree that when insulating the home, the least expensive and most efficient approach is to make certain attic insulation is sufficient to insure maximum retention of both heat and cold. Until recently most homes were insulated with an "R-

(for "resistance") factor of 15. Some electric utility companies now recommend the equivalent of six inches of "R-30" value insulation. In most homes, this would mean a substantial increase in insulation.

When deciding on insulation material, you should beware that the "R" factor is the most effective way to compare types of insulation and prices. Our lawyers caution that no responsible seller of insulation should get more "R" value for your money according to the amount of square feet you have in your attic.

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## MHMR Client Number Shows Increase

At the Board of Trustees Meeting for the Tyler County Mental Health, Mental Retardation Services held in the Harvey Room of Linfield Federal Savings & Loan on September 21, it was determined that for the year 1977 there was an increase of clients served by

54 percent. The "Help Texas Take" region (Aguila, Polk, San Saba, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Nacogdoches, Newton, Trinity and Tyler).

The Board of Trustees, which is the governing body for the organization, meets monthly during the September meeting. Decisions were made during the past Fiscal Year (September 1, 1976 through August 31, 1977), that a total of 518 persons received services for mental health related problems which was a 20 percent increase over last year. Of those 518 persons received help for mental retardation related problems which was an increase of 29 percent of last year. Since inception of MHMR in Tyler County a total of 365 persons have received help for mental

health or mental retardation related problems. A discussion was presented to the Board on Administrative facility which is currently being built in Lufkin, Texas. The facility should be completed by January 1978.

A report was heard by the Board from a Peer Review Team which evaluated the MHMR program.

Expenditures were broken down into four primary areas:

Mental Health-32 percent; Mental Retardation-42 percent; Alcohol & Drug Program-15 percent; Administration-11 percent.

## Wells Receives Scholarship

## Senator Lloyd Bentsen

Earlier this year, when a San Antonio man refused from his home to pay his taxes, his records showed that he had paid substantially more into his account than he was supposed to.

Even though he had retired, he was still working as an active worker. And he was listed as once having had two jobs at the same time, one in Chicago, the other in San Antonio.

This confusing entry in a Social Security account was listed as official in the Texas District Tax Office.

After investigation, the Service found one of the more bizarre and revealing illegal alien investigations they have ever conducted.

If convicted in the arrest of Juan, a 47-year-old father of eight from Guadalajara, Mexico, who was holding a good job

for 11 years, even since Juan joined the Social Security card, he had been using it to obtain work in the United States, all over the country—from South Texas and San Antonio to Kansas City and Chicago—working from seasonal fruit picking to construction labor to a job as chef in a Mexican restaurant.

According to INS records Juan has been arrested three times under his real name for illegally entering this country. He has also been arrested three other times, maybe more.

Social Security records report that he successfully crossed the border nine times over the past 11 years, never going for more than two years without returning home to see his family and often twice or more frequently than that.

He is now back in Mexico, but they expect he will again return to Mexico, but they expect he will again try to return to this country in his search for work. He may already be back.

Jobs are hard to come by in Mexico and even if Juan should be fortunate enough to find one, the most he could hope to earn in the United States is some of the roughest, hardest and one of the highest rates of population increase in the world. If present trends continue, the population will double every 19 years and by 2025 there would be more people in Mexico than in the United States.

Half the population is under 17 years of age. Productive

work soon have to be found for millions of Mexicans in an economy where unemployment and underemployment already run at the rate of about 40 percent.

It is not surprising that Juan and millions of his countrymen leave their homes and travel North for an illegal search for work in the United States.

The situation poses a serious problem for this country and President Carter has proposed specific remedies to deal with it: amnesty for aliens here since 1970, a non-deportable status for those who came illegally between 1970 and 1976, and civil penalties against employers who knowingly hire illegals.


The President's proposals, like the problem itself, are inherently controversial and deserve our best efforts at careful, compassionate and thorough analysis. The President's program has thus far received little public attention to date, particularly as it relates to Mexico's cooperation with the countries that are the sources for these illegal immigrants.

One way to reduce the number of illegal aliens is to reduce the pressure that send them here by creating jobs in their

home country.



## Champion Explains Expansion Plans

CAMDEN, Texas, Sept. 26—Officials of Champion International Corporation today said they feel compelled to comment on recent nostalgic articles concerning the former company-owned town in Camden, Texas.

"We feel that history has somewhat distorted the current situation," the company said, "and in one instance put an operation out of business that we are actually expanding."

Richard Baldwin, area general manager for the Camden/Corriago complex of Champion International Building Products, said, "Contrary to what I have been reading, we have had an operating sawmill in Camden since it was purchased from the city in 1920."

Not only have we operated it, but it has been expanded and we currently have over 250 people working there. The Camden plant produces lumber and wood chips.

The recently announced \$44 million expansion program at the Camden complex calls for a new plant to be built to mean over 300 new manufacturing jobs. This is in addition to the sawmill.

Douglas Chamberlain, president and general manager of the company's Moscow, Camden and San Augustine Railroad, said, "I recently read that we have sold the railroad to the city of the railroad. We have no intention of shutting down the Moscow, Camden and San Augustine Railroad. It is the only way we can move our product out for shipment and our wood chips to the Pauls Valley Complex."

Pauls Valley, in fact, plans to nearly triple the usage of the railroad, we'll be adding new equipment and employing more workers in the coming months when the new wood plant is in operation.

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

the average citizen who will suffer in the long run but will have to pay more for all wood products he uses. Before it's too late, Congress must take the necessary steps to avoid a crisis.

According to L.P. President Harry Merlo, sound management of the National Forest System, which totals close to 13 billion board feet of timber each year, can be met by efficient management of publicly owned forest lands, particularly those areas which offer commercial timber growing potential as well as recreation opportunities.

Merlo said: "We also cannot forget that the threat to the nation's timber resources comes from proposals to classify roadless areas which offer commercial timber growing potential as wilderness areas. This would be severely hurt by rising prices for wood and wood products."

"Large timber harvests would require increased initial investments which would yield a return of 10 percent and many board feet to the federal treasury," he added.

"Congress knows this is possible," said Merlo. In July, a resolution introduced by Western Timber Association in San Francisco shared this analysis with the House Subcommittee on Forests and Range Resources Planning Act.

Merlo said under current law, the U.S. Forest Service is required to meet its obligations to timber companies by giving them a minimum amount of time to harvest timber on land it manages. This is becoming physically impossible for industry lands to shoulder the major burden of meeting greater demands," he said.

"Congress is going to have to give careful consideration to Administration's proposal to change treatment for forests," said Merlo. "Capital gains treatment for years has helped small farmers offset the disadvantages of tying up investments up front for many years in tree growing and holding timber. If this proposal is repeated, it will be

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Accent On

Health  
The last thing on the mind of many homeowners moving to the suburbs is sewage—but it shouldn't be, says the Texas Department of Health.

About 20 percent of the Texas population uses septic tanks, and about 95 percent of the private systems use the same type of system, with lateral lines leading from the septic tank.

To their dismay, many residents have discovered that their new soil won't soak up the effluent that has leached from their homes. This leads to the surfacing of septic tank effluent, which results in odorous standing pools of water holding places for flies and mosquitoes. It also permits direct contact with disease-carrying water by humans and pets.

New standards for construction of private sewage facilities have been developed by the Department. The new standards have been discussed at public hearings, and will be submitted at the September meeting of the Texas Board of Health. If the board approves them, they will become official 90 days later.

The private sewage systems are usually single owner types. In addition to residential systems, however, these can also include a more limited service section of other commercial establishments.

With very few exceptions, the typical private sewage system consists of a septic tank followed by a soil absorption system for the effluent. Normally, this is what the home owner has.

But some of the areas where private sewage facilities are built are just not suitable for septic tanks. Under ideal conditions, a septic tank system can be built where soils have good permeability, such as sandy loam and sandy clay. Many private facilities, however, are built in areas that are not suitable for septic tanks, with no permeability, or in tight clay soils, which won't allow passage of water.

Where you have many residents moving into subdivisions which have ordinances governing the regulation of private sewage facilities, problems sometimes arise. These problems have involved developers marketing small lots and contractors providing facilities which do not meet recommended standards.

Sometimes, home owners find themselves with an individual disposal system that doesn't work. And in some cases, residents have had to construct and operate a central or public collection system and treatment plant at considerable costs, or tie in with nearby municipal systems.

The new standards offer alternatives to conventional septic tank design, including the evaporation method of waste water by evaporation and plant transpiration. This method will work very well in the drier areas of the state. Where sufficient land area is available, a more absorptive system can be changed to an evaporative system which has a much better chance of functioning properly.

The construction standards are intended to upgrade the minimum acceptable standards for private sewage facilities and help to try to eliminate some of the problems. The standards will supply additional information to home owners, home builders and local and state public health officials.

Through the cooperation of the Texas Water Quality Board, counties have the option of adopting regulations for the installation of septic tank systems in the jurisdictions. Some 35 counties, many of them in problem areas, have adopted these rules.

Water oriented agencies such as water districts, have adopted similar orders through the Texas Water Quality Board to control the pollution of streams and lakes under their jurisdictions. River authorities such as the Lower Colorado River Authority and Upper Guadalupe River Authority, have adopted these orders for areas around certain lakes.

The Texas Sanitation Law, which calls for bringing legal pressure to bear on anyone who has a defective private sewage system is the Texas Sanitation Law which was adopted by the Texas Legislature.




