

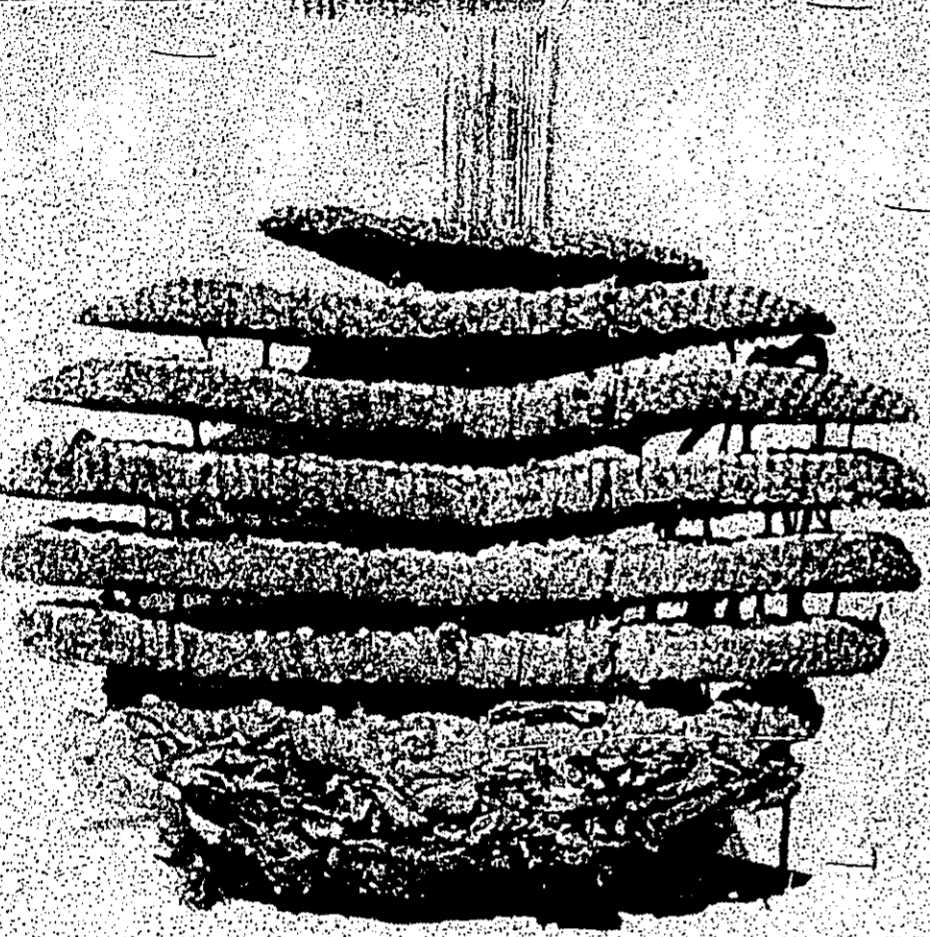

County-City Split On Garbage, Meters

The Woodville City Council met in regular session Monday and devoted a large part of the meeting to mulling over a Tyler County Commissioners Court "semi-ultimatum" which attempts to roll three sensitive requests into one.

The requests are not new to either governmental agency. They cover garbage dump usage for the City of Woodville, the parking meters on the west and south side of the square, and a request for the city to pay a higher cost for city prisoner accommodation at the County jail.

The City Fathers agreed only to the last of those three items.

They rejected flatly the parking meter proposal which they referred to as "the same ole' thing" and have formally called for a combined "heating" type meeting which has been tentatively set for Thursday, Oct. 13, at 5:30 p.m. to hash out the conflict of opinions on the garbage situation.

"We can't understand,"

first of all, why we weren't informed of their requests in each of the three categories before we read it in the paper," said Mayor Terry Watts, who met with the county's chief executive, Allen Sturrock on Tuesday to ask for a preliminary meeting to be held at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 12 prior to the Thursday get-together.

"We've got to meet on Thursday," said Walt Davis, "because their letter to us demanded an answer by Friday, Oct. 15."

Sturrock confirmed that Watts had been to visit him earlier in the day and had requested that a preliminary meeting be set up.

Sturrock said, however, that he "didn't know what was to come out of the meeting. This is the city's first response to our request."

"We have to see if we can arrive on some common ground," he said. "I guess."

City Mayor Watts told THE BOOSTER Tuesday afternoon that the meeting set for Wednesday was to be held with Sturrock, County Auditor Ann Fondren, County Attorney Royce Brockman, City Manager Walt Davis and City Attorney Josiah Wheat.

One observer close to city hall was quoted as saying, "It's about time the courthouse employees stopped trying to run Tyler County's government. It's easy to understand the pressure that the courthouse employees must put on County Judge Allen Sturrock and the other Commissioners to get parking permits. I have sympathy for them, but it sure makes it hard to tell the indians from the chiefs, doesn't it?"

In other action at the city council regular monthly meeting on Monday the group:

- approved the minutes of meetings previously held on Sept. 12, 21 and 29.
- tabled a discussion concerning a Smith-Perry subdivision road;
- approved an ordinance on the sewer rate which increases from '3 to '4 for usage up to 2,000 gallons with a 10 cent to 15 cent increase for each thousand gallons thereafter;
- ratified an ordinance which increases from '2 to '2.50 the cost for residential garbage customers;
- the city council tabled the appointing of a housing board member; and passed a Deep East Texas Council of Governments resolution on a Housing Assistance Program.
- the council also heard a Tourism committee report which authorized a \$1,200 expenditure to THE TEXAS Monthly magazine promoting tourism in our area;
- approved an expense totaling \$400 for Jethro Holmes for tourism activities; and allowed a \$300 addition to the budget of the Tourism committee.

Browder To Speak On County Roads

Highway officials and Tyler County Commissioners will hold a public meeting Thursday, October 13 at 1:30 p.m. in the Commissioners Courtroom in the Tyler County Courthouse. The discussion will center around improving county roads, long range plans for the completion of the proposed "recreational" roadway in Tyler County and funding for more Farm to Market Roads in the county.

State Representative Jim Browder, will be on hand to answer questions regarding State funding for FM roads and to outline ways of obtaining the funds.

Highway official and Commissioners met Thursday October 6, to discuss the purchase of Right of Way along the proposed extension of Highway 92 that will eventually tie in with the new Recreational road 255.

The extension of Highway 92 will cover some 2 and

one half miles and involves some 10 property owners.

Paul Cook, Resident Engineer at the Jasper Highway department, estimated that construction cost would be somewhere around \$600,000.

According to A.J. Cortez, Resident Engineer in Tyler County, "If the Right of Way can be obtained by January 1, 1978, construction will begin in the spring."

Commissioners Hear Reports

Tyler County Commissioners met in regular session Monday to conduct regular monthly business which included handling some 14 items on a lengthy agenda. Highlights of the busy two hour meeting included reports from County Auditor Ann Fondren on the Minor Home Repair Program and from Tyler County Fair President Carl Nichols.

County Commissioners praised the work done during the recent Minor Home

Repair Program which was sponsored by the Deep East Texas Council of Governments and Tyler County.

The program provided minor home repairs for some 40 homes throughout the county. Repairs ranged from putting running water in one home to replacing broken windows, building wheel chair ramps and repairing broken steps and porches in others.

Commissioners labeled the project as "an outstanding program" and praised David Collier and Jesse Adams for "the real fine job that was done." Commissioners voted to send a letter of commendation to Adams and Collier.

County Fair Chairman, Carl Nichols, presented a "preliminary" report concerning the outcome and profits of this year's fair. While still awaiting some last minute bills to arrive, Nichols estimated that profits from the second County Fair and First

Air Show should be around \$350. Nichols pointed out though that the fair's assets, items that can be used in future fairs, had increased to some \$1,200 worth of materials.

According to Nichols, the main objective of the fair was reached, which was to develop interest in the Tyler County Airport, and as Nichols indicated, "to at least break even."

Discussion then centered around the request from Pct.

4 Constable, Arthur C. Gilchrist, that he be allowed to appoint a deputy constable to assist him. The deputy would work only in Pct. 4.

Following a lengthy discussion involving the legalities of the request, commissioners voted to appoint the deputy constable, but at "no cost to the county."

Precinct 3 will be getting a new used Motor Grader machine as commissioners accepted the bid submitted by Lufkin Tractor for a used 1972 model grader at a total cost of \$32,000, with trade-in, which will be paid for in cash.

In other court action commissioners voted not to participate in the Volunteer Firemen pension plan, Senate bill No. 411. Cost to the county would have been around \$8,600 per year. No money was provided for this expense in the 1978 budget.

Still undecided at this time is the purchase of new radar equipment for the Department of Public Safety. Gary Hennigan, of the DPS, stated that the present radar system was "weak" and that the radar was old and beginning to need costly repairs.

Cost to replace the present system with a new radar system that, according to Hennigan can not be detected by such devices as "Flux Busters" and "Super Scoopers", will be \$4,400.

Commissioners voted to table the bid "for further study" and a better price.

In other business, Commissioners voted to:

- Approve County Treasurer's monthly report;
- Approve County Extension Monthly report;
- Reject all bids submitted on cyclone fencing for Pct. 3. Commissioners barn and to go into negotiations;
- Accept road in Pct. 1 (continued on Page 2)

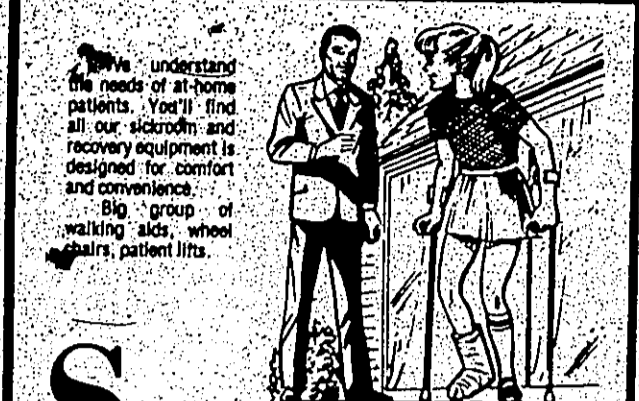
The theme this year for Business & Professional Women is "Changing Times - Women in Transition."

Called Financial Accounting and Control for Texas System — FACTS for short — the new streamlined system replaces the state's 16-year-old split-and-patch accounting system, which had become antiquated as the Model T.

The new system provides not only an up-to-the-minute accounting of the state's income and expenditures at the touch of a button — but also can show how much each agency has spent for what, program-by-program, and how much money it has left.

About the only thing we could get off the system was an accounting of what we had spent and how much we had left. And to get this required a lengthy and costly computer run, and an expert at your side to interpret all the codes and symbols on the printout.

The new system flashes the information on a terminal as quick as a wink.

The proliferation of state programs and expenditures — now roughly \$8 billion a year — makes it absolutely essential that the state have a system to rigidly monitor agency expenditures and programs to see that the taxpayer is getting his money's worth.

Without such checks, state spending could easily go out of sight.

This system will provide those checks by giving the Legislature the ability to go beyond the simple ledger sheet and to actually evaluate an agency's performance and programs to see that it is meeting its goals and is operating efficiently.

We have been unable to do this in the past because we simply couldn't readily obtain the data. This new system will instantly provide the information needed for such an evaluation.

If, for example, the Legislature wanted to check in the past to see how much of the money budgeted for welfare was actually reaching the poor, sick and aged, it would have required hundreds of man hours at an untold cost to get the information, he said.

And by the time it was finally compiled, it may have been too late to be of any use.

With FACTS, we'll be able to provide that information and much more — when it's actually needed.

And if someone had wanted to know how much the state was spending by program on travel, utilities, professional fees or rent... Well, he was just out of luck because it would have cost a fortune to compile that information.
