Airport Seeks Operator

Following a report presented to County Commissioners by Airport Committee members Bud Byram and Carl Nichols, on the growing interest in the Tyler County Airport, Commissioners in a special called meeting held October 13 voted to advertise for bids for a Fixed Base Operator to meet terms and specifications as outlined in a lease agreement drawn by the committee.

Byram indicated that interest has grown as a direct result from this year's Tyler County Fair and Airshow and many persons had inquired about flying lessons and hangar fees.

The Fixed Base Operator (F.B.O.) would be required to operate an approved F.A.A. flight school and have to abide by numerous other requirements as specified in the lease agreement which was prepared by the Airport Committee. A private charter service is also called for in the agreement.

Commissioners estimate that the county will save some \$2,000 per year on maintenance fees as the F.B.O. will also be responsible for the upkeep of the airport.

Bids will be opened November 4 at 10 a.m. In other business commissioners voted to:

Accept bid for \$4,400 from Kistner Radar Systems for two K&I radar devices to be used in Department of Public Safety vehicles.

Advertise for bids for office furnishings for County Attorney Rols Brockman.

Accept bid from Lufkin Typewriter in the amount of \$99 for typewriter to be used in County Auditor's office.

Advertise for bids for the sale of two used 1973 dump trucks and

Approved county bills as recommended by County Auditor Ann Fonden in the amount of \$25,378.72.

In a special called meeting held Monday, October 17,

commissioners voted to accept gravel for Pct. 3 from Kirby Industries Inc. Approximate value of the road material is \$1,012.50.

In other court action commissioners voted to sell used garbage trucks and canisters to Hunter/Westbrook of Lufkin, who submitted the high bid of \$10,150. The money is to be deposited in the Solid Waste I & S fund and according to commissioners will pay for one year's indebtedness on garbage equipment.

Commissioners will meet again October 28 to finished business tabled from previous meetings.

Highway Department Officials Unveil Plans

"I won't say we're not getting our fair share of funds but we're not getting enough," said County Judge Allen Sturrock. "We want to plead, urge and fuss for some additional funds."

This statement and many like it, was made during the Highway Planning meeting held Thursday, Oct. 13, to outline a four year plan for roads and highways improvements in Tyler County.

State Rep. Jim Browder was on hand to meet with Commissioners, Highway Department officials and county residents during the special called meeting which focused on the avenues Tyler County could take to receive additional funds for state roads improvements throughout the county.

Sturrock during the session, said "We do have some possibilities of getting additional Farm to Market roads funds in Tyler County, additional highway improvements in Tyler County but let me say this" adding, he said that they, (Commissioners and highway committee)

were not meeting to bypass the Highway Department but to ask for help from all sources on receiving the needed funds to complete proposed projects.

Jim Browder presented the group with some "facts and figures" given to him he said, from the Highway Department which pointed to some \$9,920,000 scheduled to be spent in Tyler County over the next five years.

Planned highway improvements which were unveiled at the meeting for the county are:

177-Construction of Cypress Creek Bridge, Highway 69, and approaches, Highway 69, 1978-Widen existing pavement 2.9 miles north of Hardin County line to 1 mile south of Warren;

-Grading, structuring, and surfacing sections of U.S. 69 from Woodville to the Rockland Bridge;

-Extend FM 92 2.2 miles northwest from U.S. 190.

Concerning the advanced four year plan, Browder indicated that several projects would be underway within the next few years including:

-Grade, structure and surface U.S. 69, 1 mile south of

Warren to Hillister.

-Construction of underpass at Warren at the T&O Railroad crossing and to grade, structure and surface those sections missed on U.S. 69 from Woodville to Rockland Bridge line missed in 1978; and to

Upgrade existing FM 92 from FM 1746 north to U.S. 190.

"I think if you look state wide it's recommendable to this court, judge and commissioners, that they've made they're problems known to the Highway Department," Browder said, adding "The Highway Department is making every possible effort to solve the problems we have here."

Concerning funding for Farm to Market roads, commissioners questioned Hwy Department official, Homer Smith, about the way roads were judged to be established as Farm to Market roads.

Smith said "It depends on traffic count, mail routes and the school bus routes are very important."

According to Smith the last official traffic count done in Tyler County was in 1975. Commissioners plan to

request updated reports from the Highway Department.

The court appointed Highway Committee is comprised of residents from each precinct in the county. Representatives from Pct. 1 are C.D. Willford and Eugene Boykin, Pct. 2 are Carl Fairchild and H.B. Pool, Pct. 3 is Carl Nichols; and in Pct. 4, Leo Gunter.

The main objective of the Highway Committee is to travel to Austin to appeal to the Highway Commission for additional road funding.

Commissioner Riley questioned Browder on the availability of these funds to which Browder plainly answered "We won't know until we go and present our case," adding that he would give all possible assistance to the county on receiving the funds.

Browder indicated that the best way the county could help would be through letters of support and court resolutions pertaining to the road situation.

The Highway Committee plans to give further study of the FM road situation before traveling to Austin to make their appeal.



Three Nabbed For Burglary

Alert action by a Jasper City Policeman plus followup action by the Woodville City and Tyler County Sheriff's office in a key arrest have led to three suspects being jailed on charges of burglary stemming from the Warren Post Office break-in, a burglary of the Jasper Coca-Cola Company and a break-in and burglary recently of the Jack Lane Ford Company.

Jasper Patrolman Gaines Foster who stopped a vehicle containing two subjects last week on a traffic violation and then apparently with the help of Tyler County law officers was able to link to burglaries in Tyler County and one in Jasper County with the trio. Officers believe that crimes extending into Newton and Jefferson County may also be connected with the case.

Charged on three counts of burglary are Elgie McGallon, 17, of Dam-B; and Joseph Scott Santos, 20, of Woodville. And, charged on two counts of burglary, is Ronald Kenneth Haney, 25, of Port Arthur.

McGallon, who was a "first time offender," had a combined bond set at \$17,500 by Jasper and Tyler County Peace Officers and was sentenced to a five year probation sentence by District Judge Milton Lewis.

Haney had bonds set at \$12,500 and sentenced to 10 years in the Texas Department of Corrections.

Joint Session Held

Some accord was reached in a combined City-County meeting last Thursday which focused on mutual parking meter and garbage dump problems which afflict both groups politically and which directly affects the pocket books of the citizens in that both questions overlap.

And, since they are considered age-old headaches by both entities, the meeting proved somewhat productive in that ideas surfaced from both groups which might be implemented as soon as the first of the year.

One possible solution to the garbage problem was offered by County Judge Allen Sturrock who suggested that they separate into two dumps and get them recognized as a Type 3 Dump for the county and a Type 2 Dump for the City.

Since there are some 40 acres of land in the present Type 1 Dump Commissioners and City Fathers liked and agreed to further examine the idea.

"Being able to reclassify the dumps from Type 1 to Type 2 or 3 would be of great

savings to the county."

One direct result of the joint meeting is another scheduled meeting which is set for 10:30 a.m. Monday, Oct. 24, will host Region 7 State Department of Health Solid Waste Expert Victor James, who will be asked to survey the situation for Tyler County; and, hopefully agree with the commissioners and city that the idea of a mutual usage of the facility, would be a feasible one.

The parking meter question was met with a proposal which calls for changing the

two-hour limit to one-hour and by calling for stiffer fines. Also the commissioners and the City further agreed in principle to ideas which would, in effect, allow county elected officials privileged parking around the court house. However, this idea along with the parking limit time change and fine increase idea is still considered "under review" by both committees. Judge Sturrock and Mayor Terry Watts said they would reconvene their committees soon and evaluate the situation.

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Texas P & WD To Issue Antlerless Deer Permits On November 2

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. will issue Antlerless Deer Permits to qualified land owners and/or leasees or their agents for portions of West central and northwest Tyler County at the Tyler County Courthouse, in Woodville, Nov. 2 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Permits for Tyler County may also be picked up at the Polk County Courthouse in Livingston from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., November 1. Those persons who fail to pick up their permits for Polk County may do so at the Tyler County Courthouse on Nov. 2.

A permit issuance area map will be posted on the bulletin board at the Tyler County Courthouse during the week of Oct. 24-28.

There will be three different permit issuance compartments on the map. Issuance rates for each compartment are not known at this time; however, should be available on the map at the Courthouse and in the Tyler County Booster next week.

The following is a description of the antlerless deer permit area in West Tyler County. From the Polk County line east along the Neches River to Hwy. 69, south along Hwy. 69 to Colmesneil, south along FM 256 to Hwy. 287, south along FM 256 to Hwy. 190, south along Hwy. 190 to the pavement line south on the Pump Station County Road to Horse Bend Creek, south along Horse Bend Creek to FM 1943, west on FM 1943 to the Kimball Creek County Road, south on the Kimball Creek County Road to the Camp Seal Community Road, west on the Camp Seal Community Road to the Polk-Tyler County line.

This area is in West Tyler County and adjoining the Antlerless Deer Permit area in East Polk County. Persons who receive permits must sign a receipt verifying their qualifications to receive permits, according to Bill Borden, Biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

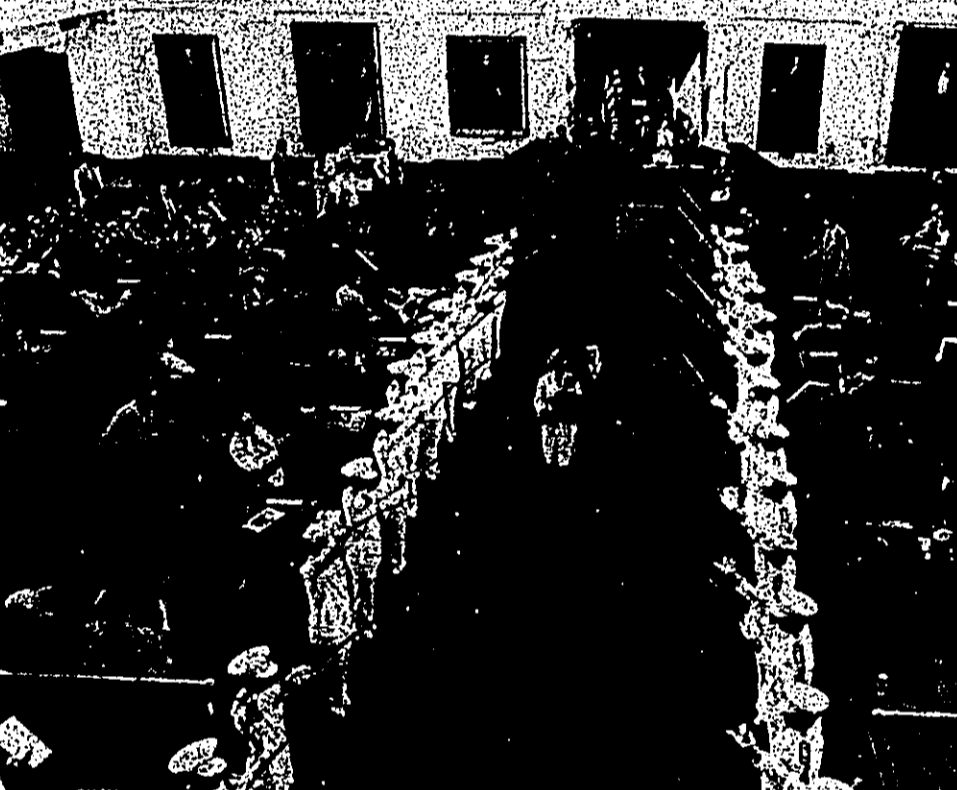

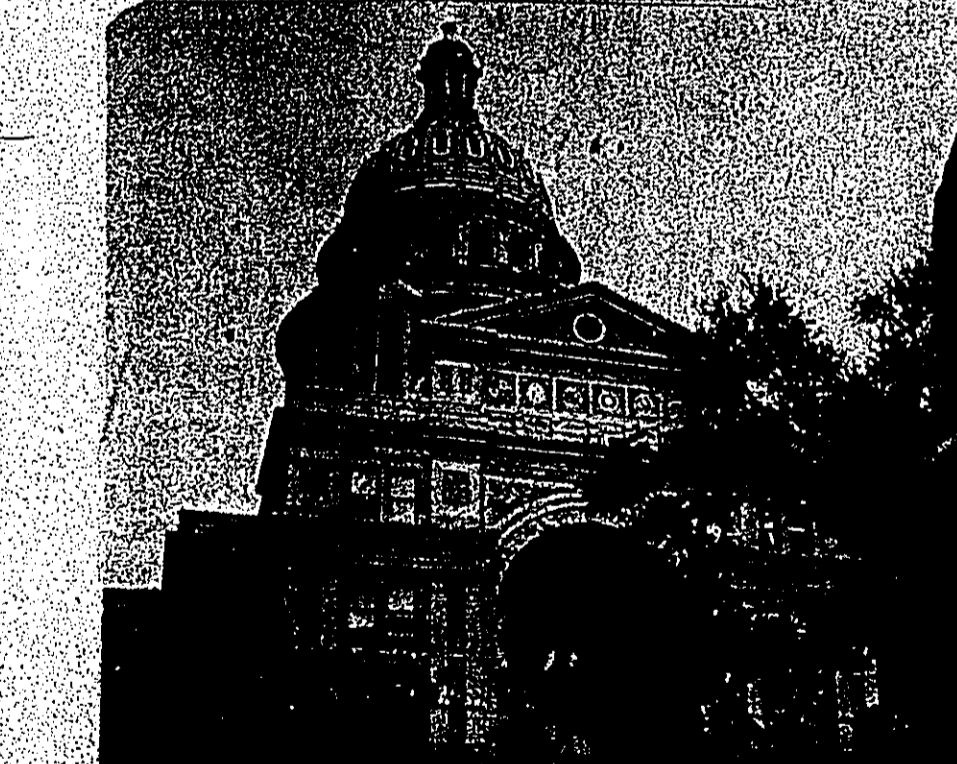

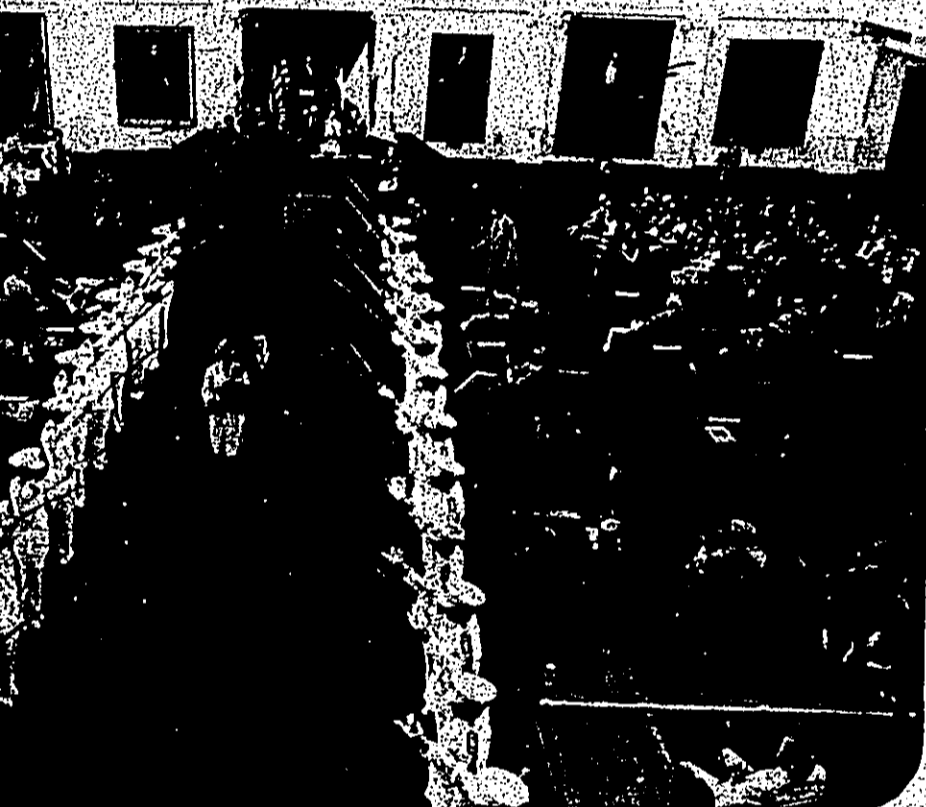

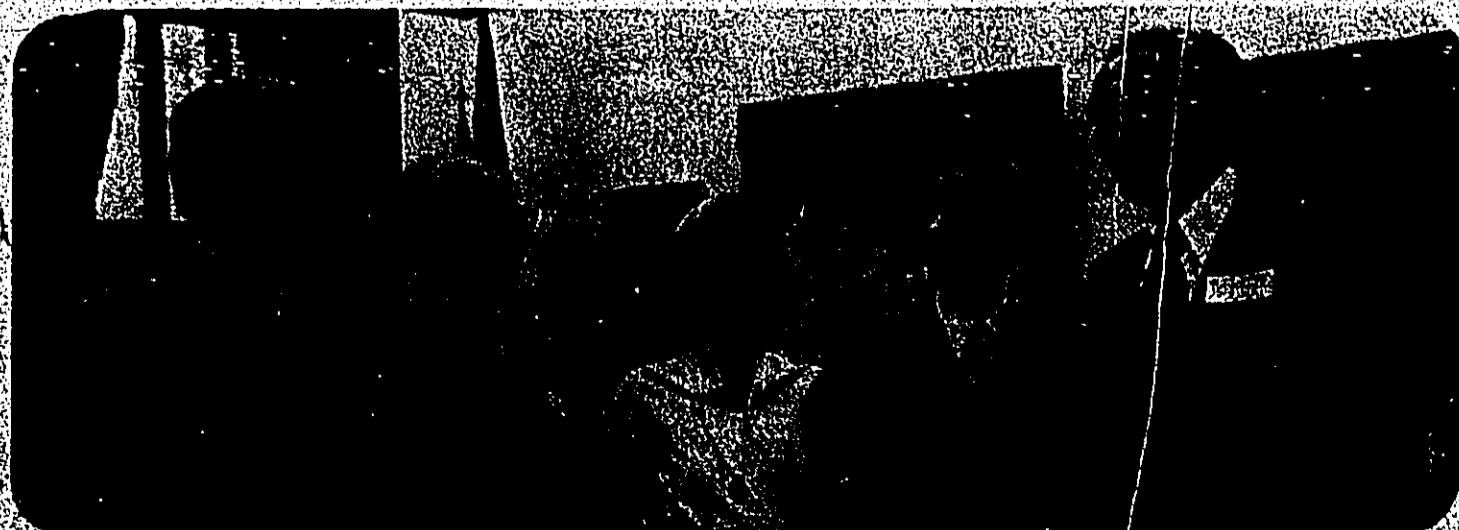

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New Wilderness Approach Announced

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., Oct. 19 (UPI)—A new U.S. Department of Agriculture program of review and evaluation to establish a quality national wilderness system on a planned and controlled basis was outlined here today by St. Rupert Cutler, assistant secretary of agriculture for conservation, research and education.

Speaking before the Society of American Foresters, Dr. Cutler said the present "piecemeal" policy of designating National Forest wilderness areas is less satisfactory because it operates "out of context with sound comprehensive land management planning."

Two primary aims of the new program are:

- to determine which roadless and undeveloped areas are still needed to complete the Forest Service-administered share of a quality national wilderness system; and
- to determine which areas should receive a higher wilderness consideration but be devoted to other uses.

Dr. Cutler pointed out that the previous method of identifying potential National Forest wilderness areas, called the Roadless Area Review and Evaluation (RARE), had some serious shortcomings.

For example, he said, the inventory standards were too general, often resulting in inconsistencies in the way areas were selected and in overlooked areas from region to region. The old method also failed to include eastern forests in the whole evaluation program.

Under the new program of wilderness review called RARE II, "the public will be made a full partner in each step of the selection from the initial inventory through the final selection of alternative recommendations to Congress at the end of the project," Dr. Cutler said.

Dr. Cutler said that an inventory list of roadless areas to be reviewed for wilderness potential will be announced later this month and the list will be published in the Federal Register for public comment.

Evaluation of the roadless areas will involve careful screening based on such factors as representation of diverse ecosystems, availability to visitors, distribution in relation to population centers, and analysis of socio-economic tradeoffs. Dr. Cutler pointed out:

White said many people confuse his main opponent, Price Daniel, Jr., with his Supreme Court Justice father, Price Daniel, Sr.

"I am proud to run on my own name and my own qualifications," he said. "I think the voters of this state are not up to the task of electing a candidate, not the best known name, but the best qualified to live in a country where high offices cannot be passed from father to son."

The three children are Mark W. White III, age 7; Andrew S. and Elizabeth Marie, 3.

White received a business administration degree from Baylor in 1962 and his law degree from Baylor Law School in 1965. He returned to Houston and entered private law practice. In 1966, White entered public life as an assistant attorney general in the Insurance, Banking and Securities Division.

As Secretary of State, he has modernized and streamlined the office into a highly efficient operation and responsible to the public.

While expanding his services, White worked in connection with election laws and voter registration. White has returned to the treasury more than \$4.2 million of the approximately \$7 million appropriated to his office.

White wrote and won passage of legislative measures making it easier to prosecute election law violations.

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The Ten Horned Beast

Daniel 7 records a vision. It took place near the end of the Babylonian Empire, during the reign of Belshazzar. Daniel saw a beast like a lion (Dan. 7:4), another like a bear (5), one like a leopard and a fourth beast which was different from the others and had ten horns (7). This fourth beast corresponds to the fourth metal (iron) in Nebuchadnezzar's dream of Daniel 2.

The four metals (gold, silver, brass or bronze and iron) represented four kings or kingdoms (Daniel 2). During the days of these kingdoms the God of heaven would set up a kingdom which would never be destroyed (Dan. 2:44). The four kingdoms were: Babylonian, Medes and Persians, Greeks and Roman.

It is evident that when Christ came the first time that He did not set up an earthly kingdom (Acts 1:6). It is claimed that the Jews rejected Jesus and His kingdom, therefore, it had to be postponed. However, you will note that it was not an earthly kingdom which would never be destroyed. They actually wanted to make of Christ an earthly king (John 6:15). Also, he is noted that by the end of the Roman Empire, something better kingdom had been established by God. Therefore, a theory had to be worked out so that the prophecies of Daniel could be made to fit a doctrine of a future reign of Christ on earth.

The fourth beast supposedly represents Rome Phase I, the second existence of the Roman Empire. Rome Phase II, according to Hal Lindsey in "THE LATE GREAT PLAINER, EARTH IS THE European Common Market with its ten nations do not have an actual Roman Empire but something built upon or out of its ruins. Be aware please that the ten horns ten nation confederacy was indicated by the ten beast, could one identify it as the fulfillment of Daniel 7 with any statements in the word of God. Colossians 1:13: "Who has delivered us from the power of darkness, and has translated us into the kingdom of His dear Son." How if the kingdom is yet future? (Col. 1:9; Acts 1:6; Acts 2:1-4); Christ's kingdom is not earthly (John 18:36), but spiritual (John 14:17).
