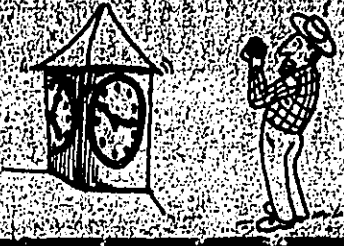

Hallows Eve Has Colorful Past

All Hallows Eve, a time in which the dead flocked together to mingle among the living, started with pagan rituals including human sacrifices to the Celtic tribes Sun God and Samhain, Lord of Death.

Although Halloween is now a time for children to dress in outlandish costumes and scurry around gathering treats and surprises, the customs of today reflect ancient religious beliefs connected with the celebration of the New Year by first the Druids and then, of the Romans who conquered them.

November 1 was honored as New Year's Day, a day to celebrate the beginning of winter, a time when the livestock was returned to the pens. Joint festivals were also held by the Celts, who first celebrated what we now know as Halloween, when they believed that sinful souls who died during the year were installed in the bodies of animals. Through sacrifices, both human and animal, the people felt that the souls could be freed to claim a heavenly reward.

Samhain, Lord of Death, judged the souls and decreed in what form their existence was to continue.

Men, mostly criminals, were imprisoned in wicker baskets resembling animals and set on fire. The Romans put an end to human sacrifices, however, they still threw black cats into the burning flames as they believed the cats to be friends of "witches" or even transformed "witches" who hoped to escape their tormentors.

All Saints Day, November 1, as decreed by Pope Gregory IV in the 9th Century, was to be a universal church obser-

vance in honor of all the saints who had died with or without official church recognition of their sanctity. The eve of All Saints Day, All Hallows Eve, became known as the favored time by witches and sorcerers, who hoped to trap the spirits before they could return to heaven.

The custom of costume dressing goes back to the pagan New Year feast. The ghosts that were thought to haunt the homes of the living were greeted with a banquet-laden table on All Hallows Eve. Following the feast, the villagers would dress in the mode of dead souls and would parade to the edge of town, leading the ghosts away.

Although not celebrated in this country for the first 200 years of settlement, Halloween "tricks" can be attributed to Americans. When the night before Halloween was known as "Mischief Night," gate posts were unhooked and hidden, and powder was scattered on porches, causing the people to slip and fall when they came out to check the noise caused by mischief makers.

"Mischief Night" stems from the old beliefs of the Irish Catholic settlers who came to this country following the terrible potato famine of the 1840's. They believed that ghosts and fairies roamed the roads on Halloween, curdling milk and riding horses to exhaustion.

A favorite treat for "Trick or Treaters" were apples and nuts, once believed to be great forsoers of the future.

The New Year's Eve custom of setting a bonfire, sometimes a young row two nuts into a fire, naming each one after that burst was thought to represent

an unfaithful lover and he was soon forgotten. However, the nut that sustained a continuous glow meant the suitor was faithful in his affection.

In modern times, Jack-O'-Lanterns can be seen adorning the front windows and porches of many homes. They represent Irish Jack's search for a place of rest. It seems, according to Irish legend, that Jack was a very stingy and rotten man who craved the "drink." Jack tricked the Devil into climbing a tree and quickly carved a cross in the trunk, preventing the Devil from climbing down.

Jack made the Devil promise to never claim his soul or to pursue him in any way. When Jack died he was not allowed passage through the gates of Heaven, thus he went to the doorway of Hell, seeking a place to rest.

The Devil, remembering what Jack had done, told him to return to where he came from. The road back was windy and dark and as a final gesture the Devil threw a live coal straight from the fires of Hell to Jack, who placed it in a turnip he had been eating, hoping it would light the way to a place where he could find eternal peace.

Legend has it that Irish Jack is still traveling the face of the earth carrying his "Jack-O'-Lantern."

As Halloween rolls once more into the lives of the children who anticipate the event with an excitement that only Christmas can equal, we can only hope that the goblins, witches and sinful souls will once again be banished from our doorsteps.

Expert Meets With Officials Dump Sharing Discussed

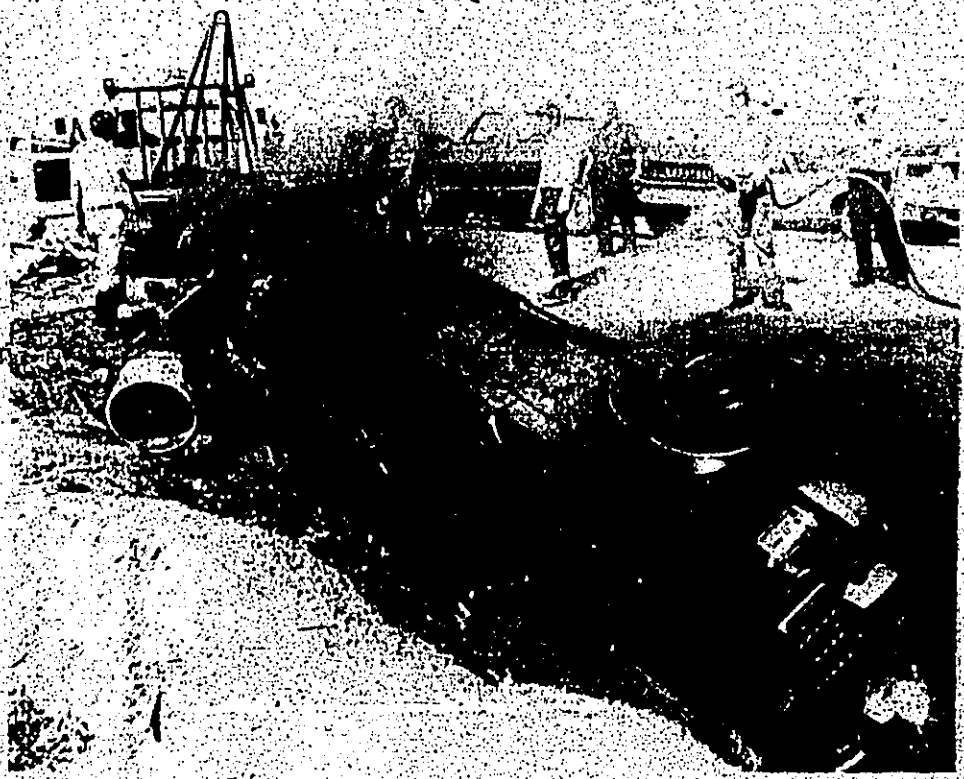
County and city officials met at the Tyler County Sanitary Landfill site Monday with Region 7 State Department of Public Health Solid Waste Expert Victor Cain, to discuss the possibilities of the county leasing approximately 10 acres to the City of Woodville for solid waste disposal.

This proposal results from the recent request of

County Commissioners that the city pay half the costs of operating the county dump.

During a joint meeting between city and county officials held Thursday, October 13, one proposal was to separate the 40 acres of land and reclassify the county dump as Type II and have the city's dump recognized as a Type III Dump.

School Plans Shown

Woodville Independent School District Architect Jack Stansbury produced a 62 page set of plans and specifications for the new school which will be made available to area contractors as Board Trustees await responses following the invitation to bid for new high school construction work which was advertised first on Oct. 20.

Stansbury characterized what he called some "bad news" for the board in reporting that of 13 companies "from Shreveport to Houston" which his firm of Moore Stansbury and Vought Inc. of Port Arthur, that only three have indicated an interest in bidding on the project. The bids are set to be opened November 15.

The architect reported that the air conditioning projects around the district were about 25 percent complete. Scheduled deadline for the air conditioning portion is only a few days away.

In other board action the group:

- approved the minutes of the Sept. 20 meeting;
- reviewed and accepted the report of the Woodville Independent School District Tax Assessor Collector;
- discussed clearing activity thus far on the new high school campus site and on the completion activity of the demolition of the old burned Kirby High School and disposal of rubble;
- discussed future adherence to a law that requires the school district to name a carrier for unemployment insurance for all persons who work for the district.

The next meeting of the Woodville Independent School Board of Trustees is set for 7 p.m. Nov. 15.

After Warning Shots Fired Woodville Man Caught

A brief automobile chase climaxed by the firing of several warning shots by law enforcement officers resulted in the arrest of a Woodville man late Saturday night.

Craig Barlow, 22, was arrested by city patrolmen

Jim Reid and Charles McCullough, County Juvenile Probation Officer Roger Harvill and Texas Parks and Wildlife Ranger Charles Westbrook assisted in the arrest.

Barlow was charged with aggravated assault on a police officer and evading arrest before Judge C.E. Phillips. He was released after posting \$1,000 bond.

The incident began at approximately 9:30 p.m. Saturday when Reid and McCullough stopped Barlow's automobile on West Bluff because of a faulty tail lamp. A half-filled baggie of marijuana was allegedly found on the front seat of the car.

Barlow knocked the baggie from Reid's hand and assaulted the patrolman, according to the official report, then jumped back in his car and drove south on Pecan Street.

Reid and McCullough followed in pursuit, joined by Westbrook and Harvill in another car. The law enforcement officials finally caught up with Barlow on Cobb Mill Road. Warning shots were fired and the suspect surrendered at 10:05 p.m.

WVFD Barbecue Is A Real Bargain

Everyone who has ever wanted to "have their cake and eat it, too," should be interested in the annual barbecue dinner being sponsored by the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department Friday, beginning at 5 p.m. at the fire station.

Not only will one be able to buy a good meal, but he or she will be aiding a very worthy cause. The profits from the \$3 per dinner charge will go towards better equipment for the WVFD.

Woodville City Manager, Walt Davis estimated that 25 percent of the fire department's funding comes from the annual barbecue, so the importance of this event is obvious.

As of Tuesday, the WVFD had responded to 73 fire alarms in 1977 alone. Most publicized of these was the July 4 fire which gutted Kirby High School, but there were many others, including those damaging family homes.

For years, Woodville firemen also had to respond to many of the fire alarms from outside the city, but over the past five years, the various county volunteer departments have taken much of that burden away.

Whether one just likes barbecue, or is guided by a sense of public service, Friday's dinner is a bargain. Where else can one buy dinner and a bit of community security at the same time?

Woodville Schools Growth Earmarked By Fire, Tornado

In 1903 it was determined by a number of the leading citizens of Tyler County that the long felt need for a public high school should be met.

The corporation was organized by John H. Kirby, H.H. Wickline, Dr. J.E. Roberts, W.P. Chapman, and William McCready.

By the time John H. Kirby had already moved to Houston and had begun the career which would lead to the forming of Kirby Lumber Company, Houston Oil Company and other enterprises which merited the title given him of "The Father of Industrial Texas." However, his interest in his home town and county never slackened.

The other men mentioned were also leaders in their community and in the mercantile, banking and timber interests.

The corporate charter of the Tyler County High School set forth the purpose for which this corporation was formed. It was the support of an educational undertaking, to wit: The support of an institution of learning at Woodville, Tyler County, Texas, to be known as the Tyler County High School.

The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a board of seven directors.

The first directors named were John H. Kirby, J.A. Mooney, J.C. Miner, W.E. Chapman, R.H. Case, and S.H. Reid.

The corporation was authorized to raise capital by issuing two thousand shares of stock at \$2.00 per share.

The people of Tyler County responded to the appeal with the same generosity they have always exhibited, with reference to the support of their schools and the needed funds were quickly raised.

The larger stock holders were S.F. Carter, the owners of one of the larger sawmills in the county who contributed \$500.00; J.S. and W.M. Rice, who were also lumbermen, \$250.00; Rice, lumber merchant, \$100.00; W.A. Wickline, President of the Bank, \$100.00; R.A. Cruse, Merchant, \$100.00; J.A. Mooney, a prominent Woodville attorney, \$100.00; Dr. John H. Roberts, a physician, \$50.00 and his partner in the firm of Roberts and Reid, General Mercantile, \$50.00; Sam H. Reid, \$30.00; W.C. Chapman, physician, \$50.00; E. Case, General Merchant, \$100.00; William McCready, Superintendent of Facility Lumber Company's Doucette mill, \$50.00; W.A. Johnson, the attorney, \$50.00; and W.W. Wilton, \$100.00.

Also, W.P. Nicka, the judge and father of Miss Clara Nicka who taught music in Woodville for many years; T.C. Mann, the attorney, \$50.00; Other contributors were J.C. McBride, O.F. Tomlinson, Mark Majors, D.P. Rice, J.C. Miner, A.G. Reid, A. Best, J.F. Isbell, A.J. Hodges, E. Triplett, H. Stewart, W.A. Ford, W. Rock, J.C. Best, L.M. Wheat, C.A. Young, C.F. Sanders, J.P. Mann, W.G. Woodward, D. McClinton, P.C. Cruse, S.B. Kinserly, J.D. Banks, John A. Stetson, and J.P. Barclay, \$25.00 each.

Many of these made additional contributions later when additional funds were needed.

The Bylaws of the Corporation provided that the Board of Directors shall hold annual elections after giving due notice of same to each stockholder, at which election only stockholders are qualified voters and each stockholder owning one share of stock owned by the voter, and declining to hold the same, is entitled to one vote on Saturday of May in each year or as soon thereafter as possible.

J.W. Hatcher was employed as the first superintendent of the school. Further evidence is available as to the operation of the high school by the Stockholders' List which was published in the newspaper at that time.

The main body of the hall will be 50 ft. x 45 ft. in the clear and will have a dome ceiling 20 ft. high.

Two 4' x 6' stairs lead from the first floor. One from the boys' entrance and one from the girls' entrance.

The ceiling will have a paneled ceiling ventilator, constructed of 2" Mesh Wood lattice work.

The construction will be studded and braced frame, covered with 7/8" x 4" x 16" plain ceiling. Overhead ceiling like wire. The wall ceiling will be placed up and down.

The assembly hall will be finished over.

The floor throughout will be first and second clear 7/8" x 4" x 16". Outside gallery floors to be 1/4" heart pine sawed floor.

There will be four flues from ground up to highest point in roof.

The roof will be covered with 5" heart cypress shingles.

The deck roof will be covered with 1/2" x 4" x 16" plain ceiling. This roof was used for weekly chapel program for the entire school and for school plays, entertainment and community meetings.

As the enrollment increased the school experienced the problem common to all such institutions, the need for additional classrooms. This resulted in a wall being constructed to convert the eastern portion of the auditorium into a classroom.

Subsequently a third partition wall was constructed along the outer edge of the stage to convert that area into another classroom.

In the summer of 1924, during the school recess, at about 10:00 o'clock in the morning, George Tubb returned from his milk delivery to the family home situated where the present residence of Mrs. E.W. Tubb is located and observed a smoke building in the corner where the stage had recently been converted into a classroom as above mentioned. Picking up a Kodak box camera, young Tubb ran down the hill to the school grounds and took the picture which was previously printed in the Booster.

The cause of the fire was never determined although there was some speculation that some man may have been gambling in the empty schoolroom - the previous evening and caused the fire by leaving a smoldering cigar or cigarette. However, there was never any evidence to support or substantiate the theory.

The following fall the high school classes met in the Tyler County Courthouse and the other classes were moved to churches in the community and the first floor of the Masonic Lodge then located on the southeast corner of the property now belonging to the First Baptist Church of Woodville.

A new brick building was subsequently constructed on the site of the burned High School by the Woodville Independent School District. This building later housed the first through seventh grades until it was damaged too badly for further use by a tornado in February 1967. The site of the Tyler County High School is now occupied by the brick building generally referred to as the high school - known as the "north side" of the parking area in front of the Kirby High School gymnasium and auditorium.

Since 1924 two other school buildings have been destroyed by fire in Woodville. The Kirby High School building, which had been constructed in 1927 with gifts and on property contributed by John Henry Kirby and his wife and her family, burned on July 1, 1977. The building constructed from Tyler County native stone during the mid thirties by the Progress Administration which housed elementary classrooms and the band hall and which was generally referred to as the "rock building" in Tyler County, was destroyed by fire in the early sixties.

let to W.H. Owens by Contract dated July 3, 1903 signed by W.P. Chapman as President of the Board of Directors of Tyler County High School. On August 25, 1903 a change order was approved by the architect and the contractor providing for the construction of an additional classroom on the rear of the building at an extra cost of \$125.00.

At about the same time a change in the design of the assembly hall ceiling was agreed to at a reduction in cost of \$150.00. The change provided for a level ceiling 12' in the clear in the assembly hall.

As can be seen from the picture of the building taken by George Tubb it was a very large and attractive structure and, other than the court house, was probably the largest building constructed in Tyler County up to that time.

County Closeup: Meet Your Probation Officer

Juvenile Probation, good or bad? According to County Probation Officer, Roger Harvill, "Juveniles are like dealing with clay or plastic. If handled right, the outcome will be a good productive citizen."

Harvill handles some 30 juvenile probationers a month which amounts to 2 percent of the youth population in Tyler County.

"Approximately 80 percent of those 2 percent I won't see again," Harvill said, contributing this statement to the idea that many of those placed on probation are kids who just got carried away with themselves one evening.

"They meet their probation officer as directed by the court and pay their fines," he said and 10 percent of those who get their probation, he stated, adding that, "the way they are treated and handled during their probation will probably determine whether or not they chose to lead a law abiding citizens life."

"The remaining 10 percent" the 29-year-old Juvenile officer says, "well it's more than likely too late for any kind of rehabilitation program, all they know and have grown up with is lying, cheating and stealing."

The probation department requires a multitude of services for those on probation which includes some adults which are added to his responsibilities. Personal counseling, family counseling, alcohol and drug treatment programs in addition to job training and placement are all necessary roles he plays in his day-to-day work.

Harvill takes advantage of the Deep East Texas Mental Health Mental Retardation Out Patient Clinic located in Woodville. "It's a fantastic agency and many people don't know that the WISD could have a clinic help in the drug and alcohol treatments and with the counseling services."

Probationers in need of a job or job training are referred to the Texas Rehabilitation Commission. Harvill states that a lot of frustration results from this segment of probation duties.

"You take a guy and you train him for a job, set him up with tools and place to work and a couple of days later you find he's quit and back doing nothing," he said.

"In a realistic evaluation, you probably help 1 out of 50, but you know you've helped that individual and that's what gets you up in the morning," adding that the job "has it's own rewards."

In speaking of truancy duties Harvill indicated that there is a much truancy in the Woodville Independent School District that the WISD could have a truant officer, give him a car, gas and salary and still make money. "If we never met I'd experience a lot of trouble in school," he said.

The State Welfare Department and the Probation Dept. operate in each other's territory and run-a-way. There is usually a problem in the homes in those cases, such as lack of strong parental guidance, a negligent father or mother thus causing the youth to have a negative attitude towards himself.

There is not much you can do to change the home life

Litter Loses Dollars

Municipalities and counties in Texas could save thousands of dollars annually in sanitation costs by adopting litter reduction techniques tested in twelve U.S. cities during the past four years, says a study by a Texas Representative of the United States Brewers Association, said today.

Those techniques, to be offered immediately to local governments, the program "is also a major tool for holding enabled cities like Tampa, Fla., to reduce litter by as much as 70 per cent," he added.

Called "Positive Litter Reduction," the program "is also a major tool for holding government officials in Texas to hold the line against rising costs by increasing the cost-effectiveness of cleaning streets during the past four years, (see 1-D.)" says the Representative of the United States Brewers Association, said today.

Four interlocking components comprise the new program, he explained. They include updated ordinances, manpower, and modern equipment, education, and law enforcement.

Those four major components are designed to work together and directly against the seven sources of litter which were identified in the research," he said.

"Before the field testing, we assumed that pedestrians and motorists were mainly responsible for litter," he said. "But research revealed that well over 50 per cent of litter comes from five other sources."

Those five are household refuse pails, commercial refuse pails, loading/unloading operations, unsecured trucks, and construction sites.

The "Positive Litter Reduction program combines the most successful methods tested at sites ranging from Sioux Falls, S.D., to Dade County, Fla., which annually has an influx of more than 10 million visitors.

Extending the Program

"Municipal and county governments are the logical starting points because their departments are responsible for litter control methods. Improved refuse handling, updated ordinances, and law enforcement," Yarran said.

"To put the program into operation, each city needs to appoint an interdepartmental committee. It will include representatives from all key local government departments—such as sanitation, attorney's office, building and zoning, fire, health, housing, parking authority, parks and recreation, and police."

To gain public awareness for the program, an area-wide information campaign will be launched simultaneously. Using the "Pitch In" slogan, symbols, and educational materials, this campaign will urge all residents to contribute their litter and support the Committee's work.

Texas municipalities and counties "will gain more than economic benefits from the program," Yarran said.

"First, they'll see the physical improvement in their environment—a goal everyone shares," he said.

 Life is just what you make it, is the philosophy of life which Mr. J.O. Nash expressed on Monday, Oct. 10. At 83, Nash is the most active and outgoing man I know.
 Concerning the "Depression," Nash said, "I never felt the Depression in my own life. When asked how many hours a week that he played golf he replied, "I have a holding golf date for Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. We usually play about 4 or 5 hours a day." Nash offered some advice for anyone approaching retirement age. "Get a hobby."
 Concerning how he stayed in good physical condition he showed me a ladder which he climbed to keep his legs in shape. Nash said, "I got this idea from Red Granger who carried ice on his back up the stairs." Nash told me his ladder was about 35 feet long. When asked what period

of his life he would like to re-live he related, "I guess my high school and college days. They are probably the most interesting and exciting of a person's life."
 Describing his interest in those years he said, "I was interested in athletics, basketball mostly, and baseball when that season rolled around. Had it not been for athletics I would probably not have finished school.
 About his marriage he said that he did not recommend long engagements or short ones. "I recommend," he said, "an engagement should be long enough until the persons involved feel they know each other."
 When asked how long he was engaged he said, "We went together for 6 1/2 years. We were engaged and were going to marry for 5 years. From the summer of 1918 until the summer of 1923 we were going to marry. His engagement was so long due to his naval service interest."
 Turning to problems in marriage he related that there are several problems a couple faces. "One is money and another is your likes and dislikes," he stated. "The money problem is one we wish we had worked out earlier, but it wasn't until about 3 years ago that we solved it," he said. The way they worked out was by depositing equal amounts of money in each of their personal accounts to do with as they wished and running the household with the rest. "We settled quarrels in a special way too," he added. "If one of us gets mad enough to leave the room we don't come back until we have settled the argument in our own mind."
 Nash related on the question of education. "I have my Masters and Lela (his wife) has her B.S.," he said. He also stated, "We are enjoying our marriage now more than ever."
 Along similar lines he said, "I have two children, a boy and a girl, Bill and Dixie."
 Nash, who has kept his life active and his outlook youthful is still a vital contributing force in the Chester community. Even though he retired as Superintendent of Chester schools in 1961, he continues to work for youth and a progressive community as evidenced by the fact that he was local chairman of the Mental Health Fund-Raising Campaign last May.
 Nash is a living example of the "Senior Citizen" who still influences and contributes. He is much loved and respected by all of us. Mr. Nash, we salute you!

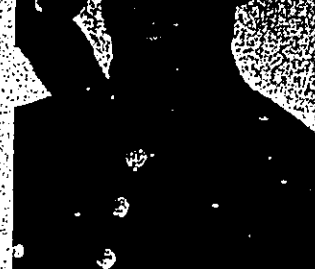

Temple Plans To Expand Diboll Fiberboard Plant

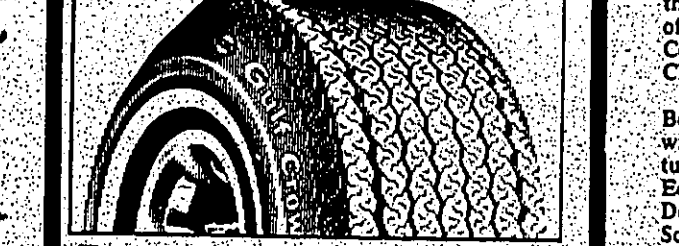

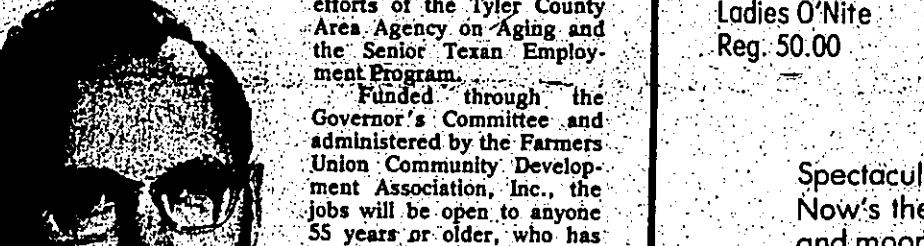

Beef Cattle Course Set For Nov. 7-8-9

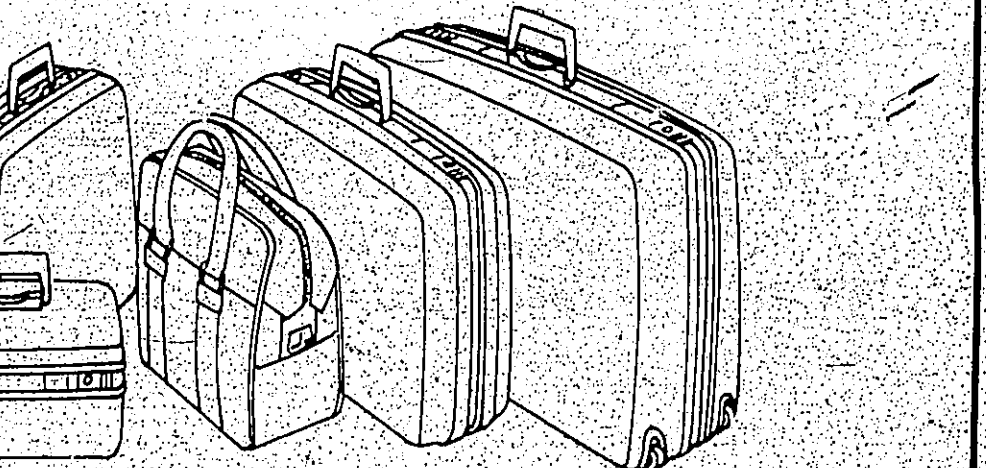

This short course is sponsored by the Young Farmers Organization, Milton Durbin, President and the Agriculture Committee of the Program Building Committee, Elmer Ray Oates Chairman.
 Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.
 Dr. Krehbiel is a native of Oklahoma. As a farm boy and FFA member, he had shown livestock and won many awards, including championships at the Southwestern Livestock Exposition in Ft. Worth and at the American Royal Livestock Exposition in Kansas City. He has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B.S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950; an M.S. degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph.D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. His graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproduction performance of cow herds.

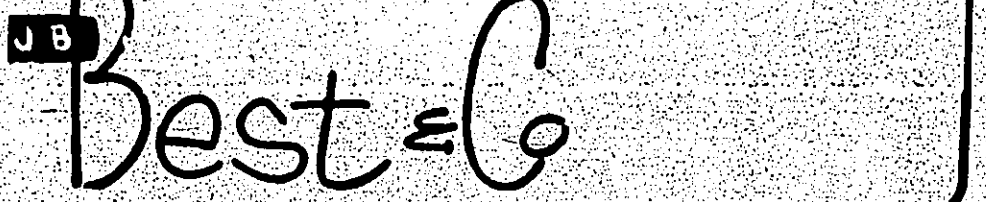

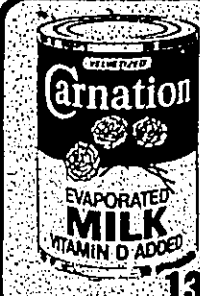
