Fire Destroys Mobile Home

HILLISTER—Fire totally destroyed a mobile home belonging to the victim of a recent gunfight late Sunday night in the Beaumont Hill community near here.

Units of the Warren Volunteer Fire Department and the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department responded to an alarm reported in via citizens band radio, but were late to save the mobile home, which had been occupied by Mrs.

Bertha Weaver, prior to her Thanksgiving Day death in a gunfight at the Cypress Creek Bridge on U.S. 69.

According to neighbors, there was an explosion at approximately the same time as they noticed the fire at 11:10 p.m.

Members of the Warren VFD did arrive in time to save a frame dwelling within approximately 20 feet of the trailer.

Sunday's fire was the sixth call Woodville firemen had responded to in the last six days, and it was also the most serious.

Last Tuesday, the WVFD responded to two alarms. First, at 11 a.m., it helped put out a fire on a Caterpillar and a Jew-boy trailer 11 miles west of the city on U.S. 190. At 8:05 p.m., firemen answered a rescue call and helped remove accident victim Jerry Reider of

Hillister from his car after an accident on Nellius Street.

Hillister was the scene of another fire at approximately 2:05 p.m. Wednesday, as a smokehouse, belonging to W.V. Phillips burned to the ground. Approximately 600 pounds of pork were lost in the blaze.

Units from Dam B. Fred Spurger and the Woodville fire department responded to an alarm at 4:30 p.m. Friday

when a hot water heater blew up in the home owned by J.D. Moore at Barlow Lake Estates near Town Bluff. The nearby units had the fire extinguished by the time Woodville units arrived on the scene.

The shortest alarm of the week came at 1:43 a.m. as fireman B.J. Vardeman helped extinguish a car fire on U.S. 190 three miles east of Woodville. Damage was extensive to the rear portion of the vehicle owned by Swift Cruise of Woodville.

"We always have a heavy December," said WVFD Fire Marshal Alva Cook, commenting on the numerous alarms. Through Monday, the department had answered 86 calls, as opposed to only 77 for the all of 1976.

ROW Bond Proposed

Tyler County Commissioners met in regular session Monday with the main topic of discussion centering around a proposed right of way bond.

The issue was tabled from an earlier meeting when the question of right of way funding was tabled for "further study" resulting in the idea of presenting the people with a R.O.W. bond issue.

"We either ask for a bond or no road," said Precinct 3 Commissioner Leon Fowler, who at the time had several thousands dollars worth of R.O.W. to purchase in connection with the extension of FM 92 north.

Commissioners appointed Carl Nichols of Woodville, to chair the Highway Study Committee which will begin the "groundwork" setting up priorities to where the funds would be used should a bond pass.

The Highway Study Committee is also expected to travel to Austin to appeal to the Highway Commission for more. From Market Road, funding.

County officials anticipate a bond in the region of the one-half million mark.

Also during Monday's meeting, County Auditor Ann Fondren suggested to officials that a "Capital Improvement Fund" be established, consisting mainly of funds received from delinquent taxes and presently resting in the General Funds account.

Fondren advised taking some \$95,000 from the \$158,000 general fund account to create the new fund.

"It might as well earn interest until the need arises to use the monies Fondren said. Commissioners voted to follow her suggestion.

In compliance with revenue sharing regulations, Fondren also presented the court with the first annual report on all Tyler County Little League Association financial transactions.

In a typed report to the commissioners Fondren stated the following:

"Regarding the following report, sources of cash deposits were not designated on the deposit slips; therefore, I was unable to determine between donations and concession stand receipts. In the future, deposit slips should be clearly stated as to the source in order to determine a more accurate statement on receipts."

At the suggestion of Precinct 1 Commissioner Maxie Riley, Joyce Crowson of Woodville was appointed as a member to the Public Responsibility Committee for MHMR. The committee follows up on any and all complaints filed against the MHMR service.

In other court action, commissioners voted to: meeting the request of Precinct III Constable Harley Crews for a deputy constable at Dam B. Commissioner Fowler stated that he will make the motion to abolish all deputy constable positions in the county.

Approved County Treasurer's report.

Advertise for bids on exterminating the courthouse to be opened Jan. 9 at 10 a.m.

Accepted bid from Texas Fence Company of Cleveland to construct an enclosure fence for the sanitary land fill maintenance equipment at the price of \$1,188 and.

Stopped As Robbery Suspects

A case of being in the wrong place at the wrong time with the wrong substance landed two young men in county jail Thursday.

Department of Public Safety patrolman Jim Deal, assisted by Parks and Wildlife Game Warden Charles Westbrook and Alcoholic Beverage Control supervisor Bobby Phillips, arrested the pair at 10:30 a.m. Thursday for felony possession of approximately five kilograms of marijuana.

It wasn't the marijuana, however, that led Deal to stop the men in the first place.

Approximately one hour before the arrest, a man abducted the manager of the Livingston Brookshire Brothers grocery store on U.S. 190 east of that city. The man took \$5,039 in cash which the manager was carrying from the bank to the store, then dropped him off six blocks from the store.

The pickup which the man was driving was later found near where the manager was released. A description of the holdup suspect, a white male in his early 30s with red hair and red moustache, was radioed to area law officers, who joined in the search.

Deal pulled over a 1971 Ford LTD near the Dogwood Country Club, west of Woodville on U.S. 190 because the driver fit the description. As he approached the car, the driver threw the trunk key under the front seat and his passenger tried to cover himself with a coat in the back seat, according to Deal.

After Westbrook and Phillips came to Deal's assistance, the car was searched. An apparent marijuana cigarette was found in the ashtray and what may have been marijuana seeds were scattered on the floor.

After the trunk key was retrieved, the trunk was opened and five two-pound "bricks" of what was apparently marijuana were found.

The driver, Ernest McClintock, 28, of Town Bluff, and the passenger, David Cox, 19, who gave a Lotta, La. address, were arraigned before Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace E.A. Shrock. Bond was set at \$10,000 each.

The CISD also approved the 1976-77 audit of school funds performed by Keith Green, a Lufkin certified public accountant.

In cooperation with the other 30 school districts in Region V, the CISD also approved approximately \$100 in financial support for the state board meeting which will be held Feb. 11, 1978, at Little Cypress-Mauriceville High School.

Superintendent David Malone presented information from the Chester Parent-Teacher Organization about the needs and concerns of the elementary school.

Due to the mid-Winter conference for superintendents in Austin the second week of January, the next meeting of the CISD will probably be held Friday, Jan. 6, according to Malone.

QUANTICO, Va.—Woodville Chief of Police Guy G. Mattingly was among 250 law officers honored at the graduation ceremonies for the 111th session of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Academy here last Friday.

Chief Mattingly is the first officer from the Woodville Police Department to ever attend the FBI National Academy.

FBI Director Clarence M. Kelley was the principal guest. This was the last National Academy Session to graduate during Mr. Kelley's tenure as FBI Director.

The 250 officers receiving diplomas were represented by the elected class spokesman, Dennis V. Scott Herdige, staff inspector, Winnipeg Police Department, Winnipeg, Canada, who a brief

The graduation ceremonies concluded eleven weeks of executive-level training for the officers who come from all fifty states, Puerto Rico, the District of Columbia, the U.S. Virgin Islands, as well as eight foreign countries. 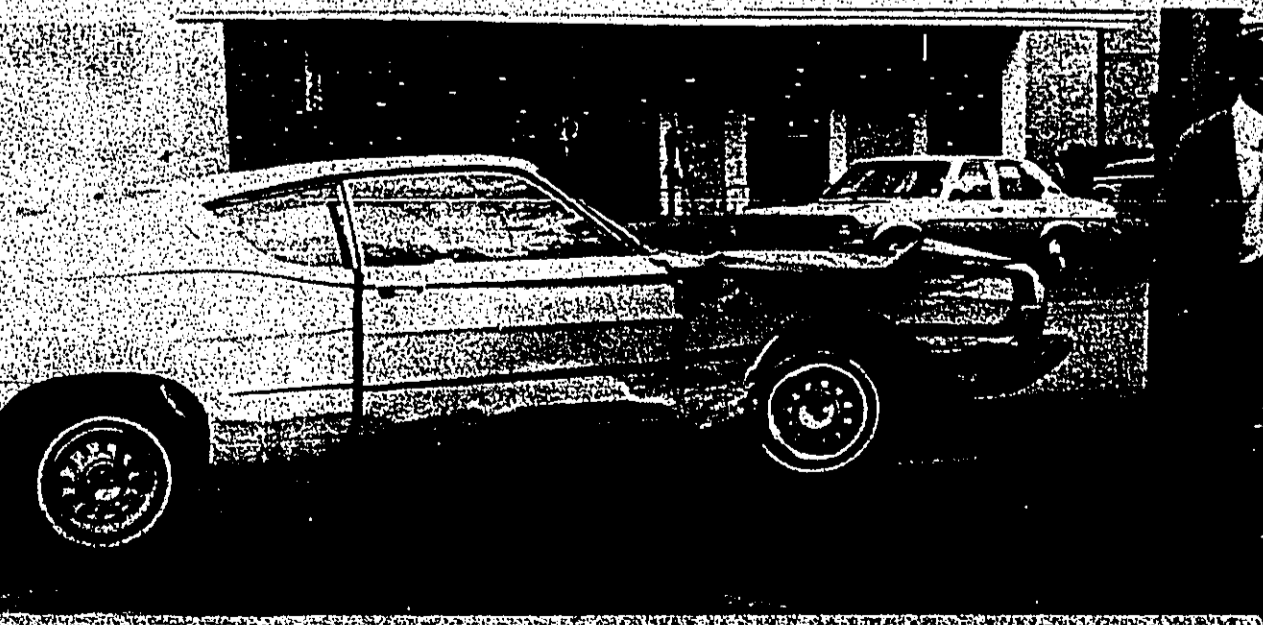

Council Hears Citizens' Query

The Woodville City Council heard a request from representatives of a local church Monday night for assistance in covering up a drainage ditch.

Freddie Smith, speaking for the congregation of the Pleasant Hill Church, 401 Elm St., told the council that they planned to build a new church and move the old building to the back of their lot where the ditch is now.

City Manager Walt Davis estimated that approximately 125 to 150 feet of 42-inch culvert would be needed for the job, which he roughly priced at \$6000.

Mayor (Bill) Gassiot did promise us that he was going to put a culvert in there. But that's water under the bridge; there's no need talking about it now," said Smith.

Councilman Dr. Jim Jinnette moved that the council table the matter, pending further discussion between the representatives and their congregation. Councilmen offered to work out a compromise whereby the city would provide soil and labor as available; if the church would buy the culvert. The motion passed.

The major business transaction of the evening saw the

council approve a bid from Southwest Fluid Products, Inc. of Weatherford for equipment for a new wastewater treatment plant. The company offered the lowest total bid for seven items advertised by the city.

Five other firms bid on the equipment, but only one, Environmental Improvements, Inc. of Houston, submitted bids on all seven pieces, too.

Total cost of the winning bid was \$51,090, whereas the Environmental Improvements Inc. bid was \$60,176.

Acting on a petition by Mrs. Vivian Jordan and Robert McCombs, the council voted to close a short unnamed street between Ada and Garden streets adjacent to the Springwood Subdivision. Mrs. Jordan and McCombs own land on either side of the street.

The council also discussed ways to correct a drainage problem in the Tucker subdivision.

City Manager Davis told the council that the city was "holding its own" as far as the natural gas supply was concerned, and Mayor Terry Watts said that he had told Keller Industries that they would not have to close down because of a gas shortage this year.

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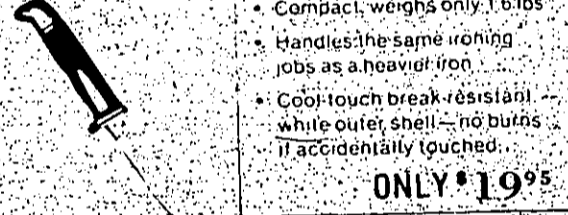
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Warren Wins Consolation

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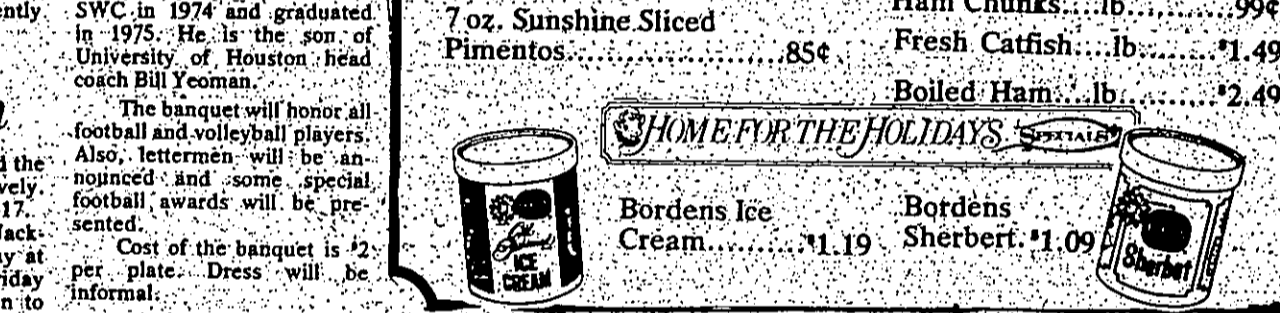

- "Other ways to give a little money, and a little time: install an outside lamp to light walkway, or handrails on steps and porches
- apply abrasive strips on stairways and bathing
- provide bedside telephone outlet
- install an emergency push button or signal device in the bathroom.

Be A Good Host

Giving a holiday party carries more responsibility than having enough to eat and drink. Hosts also are responsible to make sure guests have a good time and do not hurt themselves by drinking too much.

Providing plenty of snacks gives guests a chance to enjoy something besides drinking. Foods such as cheese, sour cream dip, meats, eggs and fresh vegetables can be used many ways to make tasty snacks. Any food, but especially high protein foods, slow down the rate the body absorbs alcohol into the bloodstream.

About one out of three men and one out of four women do not drink alcohol at all. Many social drinkers prefer to have a choice between alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages. Hosts should have an alternative available such as punch, tea, coffee or soft drinks.

Non-alcoholic beverages also can stretch the alcohol supply when used as mixers. They also can slow down the body's alcohol absorption rate—except for carbonated beverages which speed up the rate. When the rate speeds up, people get drunk quicker.

Some hosts like to get drunk by mixing doubles. Hosts may not realize that some guests like to pace their drinks and do not appreciate doubles.

But some guests do like to drink a lot and may have too much. Since it is his or her party, the host has the right to help the guests limit drinking to reasonable levels. Offering intoxicating drinks is not a subtle way to let them know that they are having too much. Or a host can offer to mix someone's next drink, make it light and bring some food back with it. The least a host can do is let glasses be empty while refilling them or respect guests' wishes if they do not want more drinks.

When guests do get drunk it is an extension of hospitality to arrange to give the people a ride home or let them stay overnight or until they are sober enough to drive well. Serving a substantial snack and closing the bar about an hour before the party ends can give guests a chance to sober up some. But time is the only real cure for intoxication. It takes roughly an hour for the body to get rid of the effects of one drink of almost any type alcoholic beverage.

Encouraging responsible drinking with tips like these and others from the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Information not only will make the trip home safer for guests but will give them something to remember the party for other than embarrassing moments and hangovers.
