## Police Suspect Arson In Radio Shack Fire

Woodville police suspect arson as the cause of the New Year's Eve fire which destroyed the Woodville Radio Shack store on North Magnolia according to the Woodville Police Chief Gary Mattingley.

The discovery of a partially burned, one-gallon plastic milk jug containing gasoline at the scene prompted the arson theory. "It wasn't there when I closed at 5:30 p.m.," said store manager Jim Powers.

Powers said that he and city policeman Charles McCollough were searching through the fire debris at approximately 3:30 a.m. Sunday, when they found the plastic container.

Police are holding the container, as found, until they receive further instructions from the state fire marshal's office. An amount of water is

also on the bottom of the container. Water sinks below gasoline because it is heavier. The top of the container was melted down approximately one-third of the height of the container.

Gasoline was apparently spread near the container, according to Mattingley. Also, several firemen reported smelling gasoline as they entered the flaming structure at 11:50 p.m. Saturday.

The state fire marshal will have an investigator here sometime between Wednesday and Friday, said Mattingley, adding, "We're just awaiting instructions."

No estimate of fire damage was available at press time as an inventory was still in process, and owner Dorothy Nettles was reportedly in an area hospital.

## Rites Held For Coach Broussard

Kirby High School head coach Guy Thomas Broussard, 47, died suddenly after suffering an apparent heart attack while deer hunting near Chester last Thursday, Dec. 29.

Broussard was held Sunday, Jan. 1, 1978, at the First Baptist Church, of Woodville with Dr. Raymond Parker and the Rev. Earl Mudd officiating. Burial followed in Magnolia Cemetery under the direction of Edwards Funeral Home.

A native of Beaumont, Broussard had been a coach and social studies teacher at Kirby High School for the last six years.

Broussard was an all-state player at French High School where he graduated in 1949. At East Texas State he played linebacker, and captained

teams which went to the Tangerine Bowl twice and was the No. 1 small college football team in the nation with a 33-game winning streak. He also attended Panola Junior College.

Broussard also served as a captain in the Air Force during the Korean conflict.

Prior to coming to Woodville, Broussard had coached at Hamshire-Fannett, Dickinson and French high schools. He also played semi-professional baseball.

Broussard was a member of the Lions Club, the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department, the Dogwood Country Club, the Woodville Bass Club, and the Coaches Association of America.

Broussard is survived by his wife Mrs. Peggy Broussard a son, Kelly Broussard, of Woodville; two daughters, Karla and Kriste Broussard both of Woodville; his mother, Mrs. Wilma Broussard of Beaumont; and a sister, Mrs. Wilma Leovsky of El Paso.

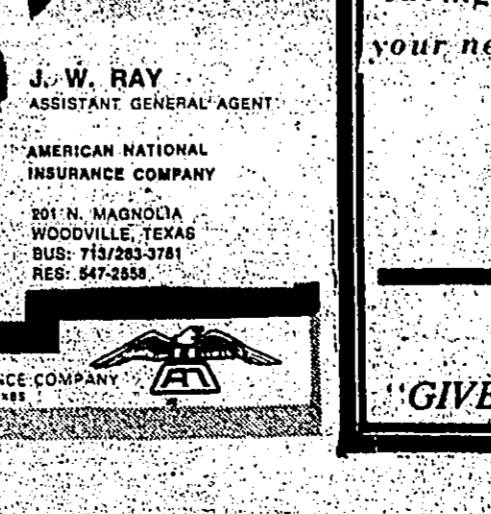

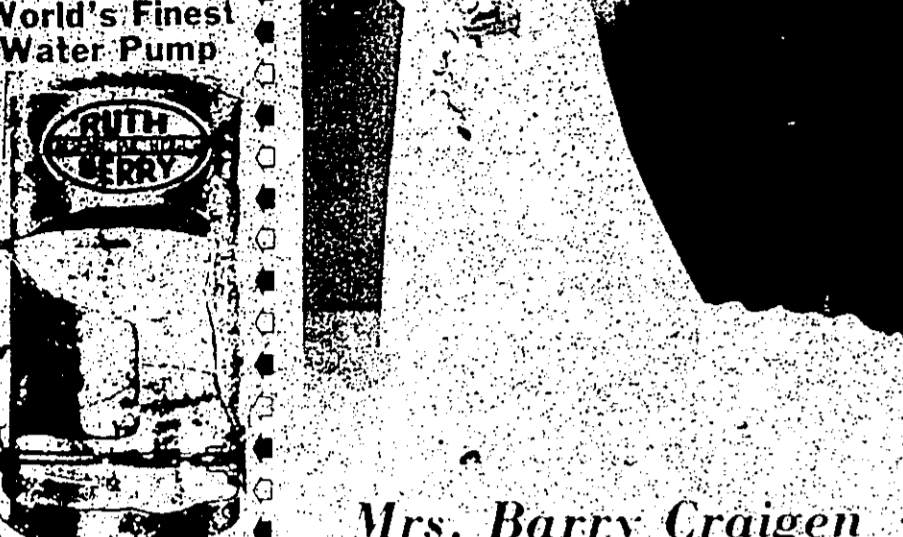

**Germ Warfare**

If you want to get a few extra days off from work or school, follow these suggestions from the Texas Medical Association. But be warned: the time off will be for sick leave because following this advice helps spread colds, flu, winter-vomiting disease and all the other diseases running loose during the winter.

Flu victims are contagious several days after the first get the disease—which usually hits within 24 hours after exposure to the germs. Colds are contagious for as long as they last, often 10 days, although non-contagious complications can hang on much longer. Vomiting and diarrhea associated with winter vomiting disease often last four or five days. Researchers are unsure exactly how the virus is transmitted. Bacteria and other agents causing the same symptoms can be transmitted many ways including spoiled food, or person-to-person contact.

So one of the best ways to get sick this winter is to encourage your fellow workers to come to work even though they are contagious. Despite the fact that they will feel miserable and do inferior work, they will spread germs and there is a good chance you will get sick, too. If you do get sick, be dedicated, come to work and pass on the "flu." Or you can let people cough and sneeze in your face. Many germs are transmitted by air and if they are a little damp, they can be infectious. Using this principle, a sneaker, although not as successful, may get sick to thoroughly handle a piece of paper someone has just coughed all over and then get your hand in your mouth. Any person-to-person contact will do the trick.

Luckily for people who want to lie at home feeling bad, being sick earlier in the year may be no protection against another illness. Approximately 100 viruses cause colds, numerous bacteria and other agents cause vomiting and diarrhea, and two main varieties of viruses are causing flu this winter. An attack by one particular germ may provide some protection against this particular variety or make it a less severe bout next time. But there are always plenty of other germs out there waiting to strike, especially if you give them a chance.

**Water Hearing Scheduled**

AUSTIN—Public hearings to consider water quality management plans for both the Neches and the Sabine River Basins have been scheduled by the Texas Department of Water Resources for Jan. 17 at the Chamber of Commerce Building in Tyler. The hearings will begin at 10 a.m.

"To be discussed at both hearings is material contained in Volume I of what will be a two-volume report on water quality management planning for each basin. Contained in the first volume, which is the Basic Data Report, are existing water quality, in the basin, existing land use patterns, existing population, and projections of economic growth and population and probable land use patterns.

Volume II, a Plan Summary Report, when completed will present recommended plans for water quality management and legal, financial and institutional requirements of each plan. Also to be included in Volume II are descriptions of feasible alternatives and environmental assessments for planning in each basin.

Not included in planning for either basin is the South-Central Texas Designated Area for which an acrewide water treatment management plan will be developed separately. That area includes parts of Orange and Jefferson Counties.

"Interest on the part of the public in river basin planning is important," said Harvey Davis, executive director of the Department of Water Resources. "Plans are long range and people who live in the basin will be affected by terms and conditions of each basin plan. Attendance at the Jan. 17 public hearing is encouraged and public participation in the discussion will be welcome," he added.

**Accent On Health**

People who worry too much about their health create difficult problems for themselves, doctors and the rest of society, the Texas Medical Association says.

The hypochondriacs in the U.S. spend several billion dollars yearly on health care. Yet the money lost is only a part of the problem. The millions of people overconcerned about their health can get trapped in a web of frustration that angers physicians and patients alike.

On the other extreme are people who ignore real medical symptoms and act tough, hoping "it will go away by itself." This attitude also can trigger unnecessary expense and pain because many problems will only get worse if left untreated.

Knowing when to seek medical treatment can be difficult. Keep in mind anything serious or very unusual deserves medical investigation because catching a problem early can avoid worse trouble later on. Calling the family physician may help clarify matters somewhat.

Hypochondriacs run into trouble because they often do not want to accept a doctor's diagnosis, especially if he says there is nothing physically wrong. If the physician has exhausted physical tests and possible remedies, the patient may still feel the doctor is not doing enough. Suspicion and frustration will begin to plague both parties. Finally, the patient will seek treatment elsewhere and start the cycle all over again.

Of course, many complaints are real but very difficult to diagnose. That is why most physicians suspect hypochondria only when it fits the general definition of a pre-occupation with bodily processes and overconcern about illness when no physical basis for the complaint exists.

A hypochondriac's major way of expressing another concern. Effective treatment must work with these underlying causes.

Anxious, depressed, unfulfilled people may express these emotions through hypochondria. A physician interviewed in a recent issue of Working Women magazine said a profile of a hypochondriac most often will also include some of these characteristics: middle-aged or older; female; urban dweller; or unhappy worker. The person also may have had an unhappy childhood or grown up around ailing adults.

The Merck Manual, a medical reference book, says many hypochondriacs may be men who have had relatively successful careers. Hypochondria may hit this group after a minor physical illness or diagnosis of the early stages of heart or blood vessel disease.

Working with underlying causes of hypochondria may involve counseling to help the patient realistically face fears and problems. Proving ways to relax and control bad situations takes effort of the patient and understanding of the doctor. Solving basic conflicts, expressing emotions in another way besides health concerns is not an instantaneous miracle cure but it may be the only way out of the hypochondria trap.

Following the same rule, do not touch an appliance at the same time you touch water or plumbing or any metal object, the specialist cautions.

For example, reaching for a dish in a sink of water while touching a toaster is dangerous, she explains.

Also, while in the bathtub or shower, do not operate electrical appliances, such as hair dryers and radios, she says.

When it comes to electrical current "leak," she says, "the least resistance and electrical current will travel to water through a person if it occurs to do so."

# Shipwrecked On Padre Island: Part III

Near the end of May 1867, a company of Mexican volunteers, en route from Galveston to the mouth of the Rio Grande, was shipwrecked near the southern tip of Padre Island. They were able to signal to the mainland, and wagons were ferried to the island to transport the ship's cargo and supplies to nearby Point Isabel, where the troops were to assemble.

One of the volunteers was Dr. S. Compton Smith, who described the adventure in his 1867 memoir of the war, "Chili Con Carne." In the first two segments of this three-part series, Dr. Smith told first of the shipwreck and then of a sudden norther which found him and a companion named Roberts separated from the wagons and all other shelter during a night of wind, rain, hail, sleet, and blowing sand. The final portion of the narrative resumes the account on the morning following the disaster, and tells of yet another hazard which Smith and Roberts encountered before reaching the mainland.

"As length the wished-for light returned, slowly breaking through the murky clouds to seaward; and revealing the dark bottom of the ocean, hatched and broken into foam and dashing in huge waves,

upon the shore, as if determined to swallow up the ground beneath us. A point of sand-hills my attention was called by an exclamation from Roberts.

"Look-look there! What are those objects approaching us along the edge of the breakers?"

"I looked in the direction, and perceived about a dozen animals moting, leisurely towards us. They came along one after the other, in a single line. Not supposing that animal life could find existence on this myriotic sandstone, we were at a loss to make them out. But, at length, as we

approached them, nearer Roberts declared they were wolves of a large and ferocious kind.

"The creatures had lighted on us, but continued to move along in the same leisurely manner, as at first. They were of a blue color, slightly brindled, and of a larger species than I had ever before seen.

"The strip of beach, between the sand-hills and the breakers was only a few yards in width, and, totally untraced as we were, I had no disposition to come into close quarters with strangers of so unpropitious appearance. I, therefore, proposed to give them a wide berth, and the entire right of way, which they seemed disposed to claim; and suggested to my friend the propriety of our taking a cut over the sandridge.

"This he objected to, and thought it best to arm ourselves, each, with a good club—plenty of which were to be found among the drift on the shore—and show the wolves a determined front.

Still, on they came, showing no inclination to give us a last silence, and simultaneously inspired a full, relieving breath of ocean air for, to tell the truth, we had not breathed at all for the last few moments.

"When the last gaunt devil of them had passed, I could not withstand the temptation of hurrying my club at his ugly head. Roberts saw my uplifted hand, and instantly caught it. 'What!' said he, 'would you have the infernal pack turn upon us? Had you hit that brute, they would not have left so much as a grass-wool of us!'

"As may be supposed, we lost no time in increasing the distance between us, and those unwelcome customers. On proceeding a few miles further down the coast, we discovered the reason of the forbearance of the wolves toward us. It was not in consideration of the bold front we presented to them, as we had flattered ourselves; but they had been regaling all night upon some carcasses of

beaver that had been cast upon the beach, and probably washed overboard in the storm from some vessel bound down to the army.

"The encounter with the wolves ended; Smith's adventures on Padre Island, reached he and Roberts at last when Point Isabel he was able to begin preparing to go to war.

After some last minute rearranging of equipments and supplies, Smith received his appointment as an army surgeon, and shortly afterward accompanied General Taylor on the march to Monterrey.

LUPKIN—More than four thousand persons have been served by the Deep East Texas Regional Mental Health Mental Retardation Services during its three years of operation.

Service to persons with mental health, mental retardation, and alcohol and drug dependency problems, totaled 2,347 during the past year.

MHMR has developed during that three-year period from the planning stages which was comprised of the nine-member board of trustees appointed by the commissioners of the 13 county area, and Executive Director Wayne Lawrence to an organization with an annual budget of \$1.2 million offering approximately 40 programs to the people living in the 11,000 square mile region.

MHMR has been a pioneer in the development and delivery of mental health and mental retardation services to persons living in rural areas.

The basic concept of persons having these services available in their home communities without having to be institutionalized has fostered the development of such innovations as a mobile evaluation unit, which travels throughout the region providing evaluation and screening services to persons near their homes.

The work of MHMR has been evaluated by an outside team and the results compared with the 1975 survey showed that persons receiving or who had received services from MHMR are satisfied. The answers to questions asking if they are willing to recommend MHMR to others showed only one percent of the responses to be negative.

This is consistent with the goals of MHMR as outlined by Board Chairman Ward Burke, longtime advocate of good mental health and mental retardation service to the people of East Texas.

"We are here to provide these services to the people. That is what we are charged with doing and if we can't do that, we should not exist," Burke said at one of the organizational meetings.

Clients served include persons with incomes under \$50 per week and persons with incomes of \$100 a week and above. Ages range from children under 12 years old to persons 65 and over. About the same number of males as females are served. Persons of every race living in the region have received services.

Of the total services rendered during 1977, 1,545 persons, 65.8 percent received mental health services, 304 persons or 21.5 percent received mental retardation services and 283 persons or 12.1 percent received services in the alcohol and drug abuse area.

Funding for MHMR is dependent on the participation of the counties in which it operates as these funds are matched by state funds.

Expenditures of the funds by programs include 42 percent for mental retardation, 32 percent for mental health and 15 percent for alcohol and drug abuse. Administration received only 11 percent of the total \$2.2 million budget.

Dr. Lawrence said that there will be further expansion of the programs in the future but that MHMR will strive to deliver high quality services which allows the mentally handicapped and chemically dependent citizens of the region to achieve their maximum potential.

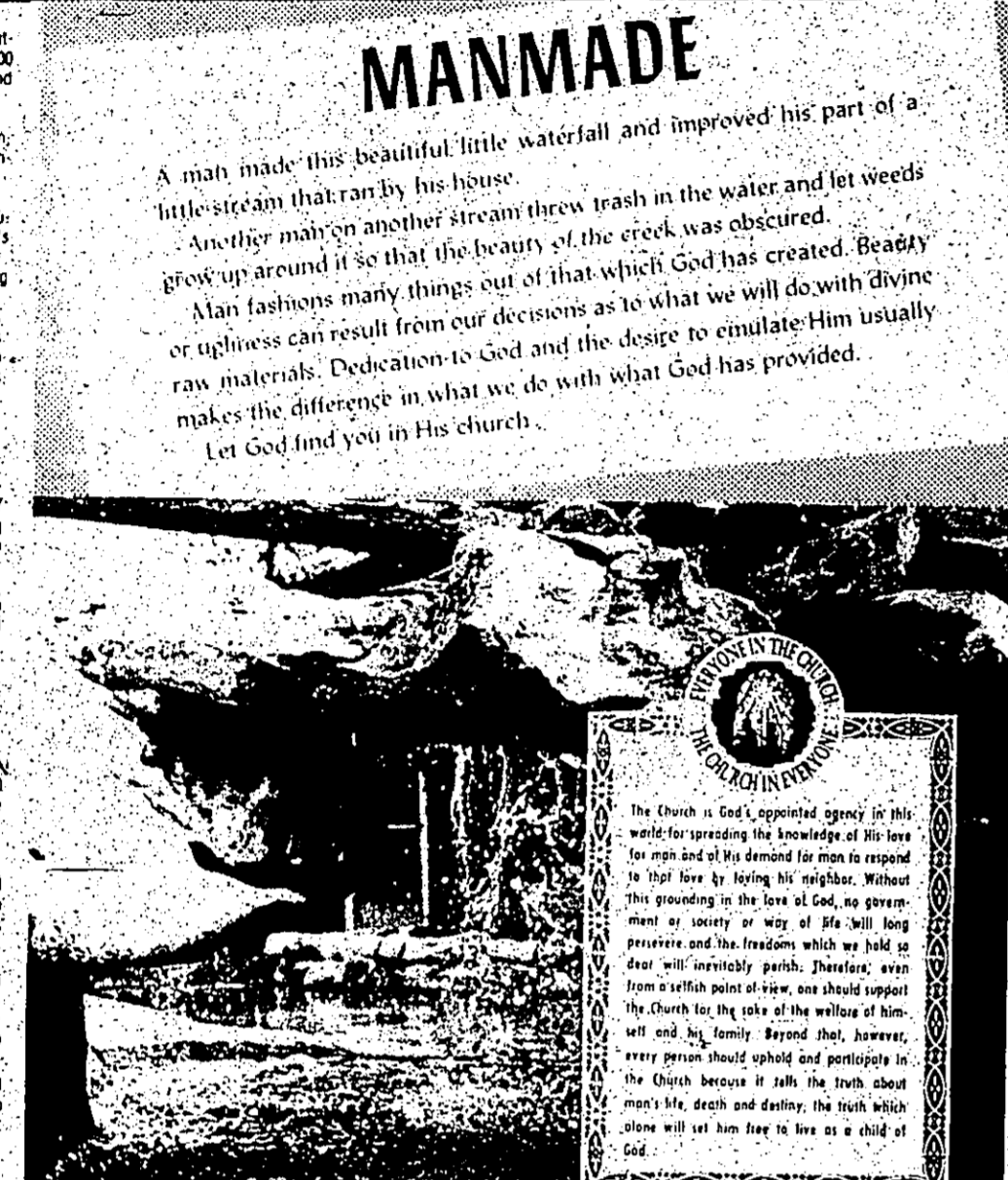
