County Blood Drive Scheduled For Friday

p.m. The Blood Center of Southeast Texas will sponsor the drive. The center supplies needed life-saving blood to 18. hospitals throughout Southeast Texas including some of the blood used by Tyler County Memorial Hospital.

According to Blood Center representative Carol Weatherall, there is a shortage of this vital substance available. An estimated 1300 pints of blood are needed each month, and with the recent shortage of donors, persons needing blood must wait until

a suitable donor can be found. The center is a non-profit. but self-supporting community of blood for this are.

ing for at least 100 donors from the county. Area churches and businesses are also expected to participate in the drive.

To be a donor, a person must weigh at least 110 pounds. Those aged 17 may donate only with written. parental permission and those over 65 must have a written doctor's consent dated within two weeks of the donation. A medical history will be

taken at the time of the donations. "Actual blood donation time is five minutes. Following the practically painless procedure, the donar will be given something to eat and drink and will be allowed to rest about 5 minutes. Weatherall said.



Give Blood, It's A Lifesaver

Man has accomplished many amazing medical feats Heart and kidney transplants are performed daily. Artificial limbs and machinery enable many to lead normal lives, but man cannot create, or hope to create. the most precious and necessary substance of them all; the liquid of life; blood

When a person needs blood there is only one source

from where to obtain it ... volunteer donors. The Blood Center of Southeast Texas supplies blood to some 18 area hospitals. The supply is seriously low at this time and personnel from the center are starting blood drives in Tyler and surrounding counties. Tyler County Memorial Hospital also receives needed blood from the center, the only source of blood in this area, so the need for a high inventory is great. If a victim does require blood and the center is short

or out of supply they will call in emergency donors, but this takes precious time, time that could be critical in saving a life.

Not everyone can be a donor; but the majority of persons can. The procedure is simple and practically painless. All donors are thoroughly checked from red cell counts to medical history to pulse, blood pressure and temperature. Donors are no longer paid for their blood, thus there is no need to lie about medical history just to receive a few bucks.

For the donation of one pint of blood (it won't be missed, the average adult body has 12 pints) the donor can join the Family Assurance Plan. This plan will fur nish unlimited free blood to the donor, spouse and unmarried children under 22 for one year. This is EREE blood. In our area a pint of blood will east between 145 and 70. A very expensive, but necessary substance should the need arise.

There is also a group plan for companies and plusinesses. If only forty percent of the employed will donate one pint of blood each, a year, 100 percent will receive the unlimited free blood in case of an accident: One thing ... all conditions are covered except preexisting conditions such as leukemia and cancer, etc. However, the family of such victims can replace the blood with blood, and no charge will be made. Also, donors are eligible to receive blood immediately following donation for accidents and childbirth, and

after a three month waiting period for all other needs. Sniffen Around


Somewhere between that fourth helping of turkey
