At Chamber Banquet Hennigan Honored

Friday's rendition of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce's annual banquet had a definite law enforcement flavor.

Texas Department of Public Safety Director Col. Wilson A. Speir twice saw men under his command applauded by the record crowd at the Kirby High School cafeteria.

DPS patrolman Gary Hennigan was honored by the Chamber as "Outstanding Citizen of the Year," and fellow patrolman Jim Deal presented a flawless demonstration of his marksmanship for the crowd.

"These are the type of men we try to put in all the communities around the state," said Col. Speir of the two patrolmen.

Also at the banquet, Bertis Best took over the Chamber presidency from Carl Nichols, who had served in that post for the past two years. Nichols recounted some of the successes of his terms of office, including the securing of a north district office of the Big Thicket National Preserve in Woodville, and locating the new Levinston Industrial Products plant in the county.

Nichols passed out certificates of appreciation to representatives of the Tyler County Commissioners Court, the Woodville City Council and the Tyler County Industrial Corporation for playing active roles in locating Levinston in the county.

Hennigan, who was one of four nominees for the Outstanding Citizen Award, was responsible for bringing the state little league baseball playoffs to Woodville last summer. His efforts helped send one group of Tyler County all stars to Waco and another to playoffs in Orlando, Fla.

Hennigan is also responsible for the development of the baseball park west of Woodville which bears his name and has been called one of the best in the state.

"Hennigan serves his community by serving the youth of the community," said Chamber official. Other nominees for the award were Maggie Pryor, Maj. M.L. Alford and Cecil Ogden.

New Chamber President Best told the crowd that he accepted the challenge of leading the Chamber activities for the coming year, but would need the help of everyone in the Chamber.

Col. Speir addressed the audience about the statewide need for the DPS to enlarge its ranks, and said that the one thing he could do would be to exert influence to help raise the salaries for DPS personnel.

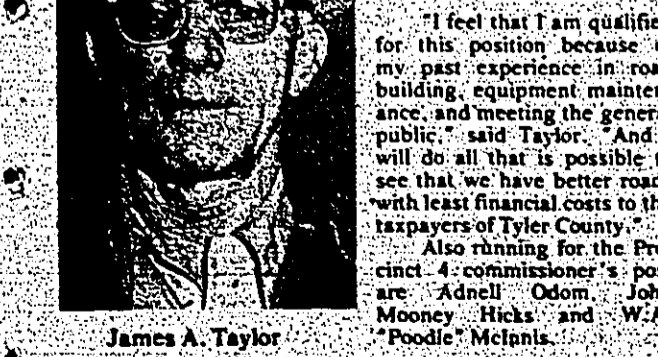
Future clinic dates will be announced.

County Finds ROW \$\$\$

By transferring funds from one account to the other, county commissioners apparently have solved the problem of right-of-way money needed for the extension of FM 92 north of Dam 2.

Following a discussion on possible ways to obtain some \$30,000 needed for the purchase of right-of-way, commissioners voted Monday to transfer \$22,000 from the capital improvement fund into the county's ROW fund.

Precinct III Commissioner Leon Fowler, who is responsible for the purchase of approximately 50 acres for the extension of FM 92 said he hoped the county could purchase the right-of-way for approximately \$25,000, and that the extra \$5,000 would be needed for property improvement damage such as water wells and fence lines.

Concerning future right-of-way money for road improvements, Precinct I Commissioner Maxie Riley said, "We're all going to face the problem sooner or later," adding that a bond issue was to be expected.

Riley also stated that the Highway Study Committee was preparing a bond program outlining where bond money would be used and approximately where the improvements could be expected.

In other business, commissioners, after months of discussion and study, approved a Fixed Base Operator (F.B.O.) contract for the Tyler County Airport.

Bud Byram of the Airport Advisory Committee and acting in behalf of Buel Owens, the F.B.O., presented the contract at the regular monthly meeting of county commissioners January 9. The decision was tabled until boundary lines could be checked to see that the land leased to Owens would not interfere with an "improvement of the land" program by the Soil and Water Conservation office.

Total space to be leased to Owens is 156,000 square feet.

Owens, as stated in the contract, will operate a flight school, private charter, service and plane maintenance at the site.

Byram said that construction of buildings would begin within the next two weeks with the operation being functional, he said, around the end of February.

Spanhanks Files For Peace Justice

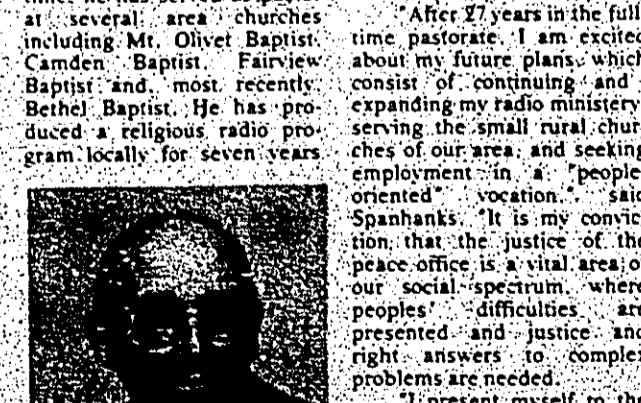
John Spanhanks, 51, of Warren has filed and announced for justice of the peace, Precinct 1, in the upcoming May 6 Democratic primary election.

"I present myself to the voters of Precinct 1 as a qualified candidate that has proven himself in ministering to the social, emotional and spiritual needs of our county, and seeks to broaden his concern and expertise to include serving as your next full-time justice of the peace," added Spanhanks.

In addition to Spanhanks, M.D. Holland and T.T. (Peck) Foreberry have also filed for justice of the peace, Precinct 1, on the May 6 Democratic primary ballot.

Bypass Proposed Around Woodville

State Department of Highways and Public Transportation officials heard a request for a bypass around Woodville during a meeting here Thursday to discuss a proposed five-year plan for U.S. Highway 69.

Carl Nichols, outgoing president of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce and a member of a county appointed highway study committee, questioned the officials on the possibility of bypassing Woodville "straight through."

Nichols cited that traffic flow through Woodville would increase "tremendously" within the next few years due to industry growth, park improvements and "a score of other things."

"The Highway Department is underestimating the growth potential in this area," said Nichols. "I feel we feel that a bypass should be included in future plans."

Homer Smith of the Jasper THD office said that a bypass had been considered in 1958, but met with so much local opposition that it was dropped.

Nichols proposed that U.S. 69 circle Woodville, marking the present highway as District I-A, beginning on the south side of the city and continuing to near Doucette.

Nichols said that although the highway currently has four lanes through Woodville, the city will not be able to handle the increase in traffic he anticipates.

The five-year plan already proposed, according to Smith, will include a protected left turn lane at the intersection of U.S. 69 and U.S. 190 (Magnolia and Bluff streets). Smith further indicated that studies show Woodville should be able to handle the traffic.

"For the highway department to even consider a bypass program, you must have support from the local people," Smith said, adding that a resolution from the county commissioners in favor of the bypass would also be in order.

"What I'm looking for, and what we're all looking for," said Nichols, "is further planning to include these changes in the county that we see coming."

Smith described the highway department's five-year plan for U.S. 69 as "workable." The plan includes the construction of an overpass to replace the present railroad underpass at Warren. Contract on the overpass will be let in the future.

A contract has already been let for the widening of the bridge over Cypress Creek one mile south of Hillister. Also under the plan, the highway slab will be widened from approximately two miles south of Warren to the Neches River Bridge at Rockland. This will include the construction of surface shoulders.

Pair Charged With Theft After High Speed Chase

ZAVALLA—What was apparently a 700-mile "joy ride" ended here Saturday as Department of Public Safety patrolman Jim Deal chased down a stolen vehicle and its two occupants.

After Zavalla authorities made the arrest, James Leslie Davis, Grocery Store in Warren. Police said the car may have been selected because it resembled a vehicle featured in the movie, "Smoky and the Bandit."

Deputy Sheriff Floyd Petri was at the same store, but had to retrieve his sheriff's car from his home before pursuing the pair.

In the meantime, patrolman Deal began pursuit as the stolen car sped through the intersection of U.S. 69 and U.S. 190 in Woodville. Deal reported that he stayed one car length behind the stolen car as the chase reached speeds of 100-plus miles per hour.

It all came to a halt in Zavalla, however, as the Trans-Am blew a tire while crossing some railroad tracks, Zavalla Constable Cotton Gaskamp made the arrest.

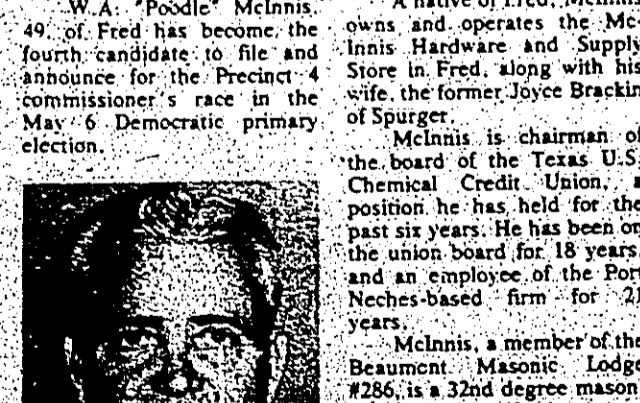
A native of Fred, McInnis owns and operates the McInnis Hardware and Supply Store in Fred, along with his wife the former Joyce Bracklin of Spurger.

He Keeps It Quiet



Charlie McCollough

Woodville is a quiet town, but it's even quieter than normal at 2 a.m. If Charles McCollough has his way, it will remain quiet.

McCollough is the Woodville policeman assigned to the 1 a.m. to 9 a.m. shift. If he's lucky, his duty will be routine. If he's not, it could be trouble.

"Many of the calls McCollough must answer are family disturbances. Husbands and wives arguing over personal matters may lead a neighbor or one of the participants to call the police for help."

"You can't hardly do anything about it," said McCollough, who has been with the police department approximately 14 months. "I just go in and try to get them to calm down."

"What bothers McCollough the most about the family disturbance calls is the danger presented by the situation. Many a patrolman has been injured or killed while stepping in to quell such a situation."

"It's the feeling that I go there with: You don't know if you might be shot or knifed by one or the other of the family," said McCollough. "Most of the time, they won't press charges against each other."

McCollough, 41, is well-acquainted with the Woodville area. He was raised in the Dies Community and graduated from Scott High School in 1955.

It took approximately three years for McCollough to get on the Woodville Police Department after he first applied. When he did, he became the first black member of that force. "At first it was a little hard, but everybody's treated me real well," said McCollough.

In December, McCollough completed eight weeks of basic training with the Harris County Sheriff's Academy. The course included both physical and classroom instruction.

He escaped a near tragedy while returning from one session when his car was struck head-on by another vehicle near Humble on U.S. 59. The city police car he was driving was totally destroyed, but McCollough escaped with minor injuries. He is still under treatment for back ailments caused by the wreck, but missed only three days of duty.

McCollough said that he most enjoys the investigative side of police work. "It's very exciting and you never get anything the same way twice," said the policeman. "I also attended training sessions on bombs, homicides and offensive driving."

On a typical night, McCollough estimated, he drives 110 to 115 miles, all inside the city limits. He routinely checks out public buildings to be sure they are locked and keeps a watch for intruders at residences and businesses.

Though he wears a gun, McCollough would prefer other ways of stopping offenders. "A man could go without a gun. What he needs are brains and to know how to deal with people. A gun and badge are just something to wear," he explained.

McCollough and his wife Josephine have been married 19 years, have five daughters, and reside in the Dies Community.

"Perhaps it is the fact that he is a family man that forms McCollough's philosophy on law enforcement," a policeman has to make decisions and to answer for it," he said. "You don't want to get shot yourself, but then, you don't want to kill somebody else, either."

Achievement Tests Planned

AUSTIN—More than 100,000 Texas public school students will be tested for their achievement in four key subject areas during a statewide assessment scheduled for April 1978.

The Texas Assessment Project, most comprehensive of its kind undertaken by the Texas Education Agency and the public schools, will provide student achievement data in reading, writing (composition), mathematics, and citizenship.

Data will be compiled on a statewide and regional basis, according to Dr. M.L. Brockett, Texas Commissioner of Education. There will be no district-by-district or campus-by-campus comparisons.

"This assessment project is the first step in a two-pronged approach toward improving the public school system," Brockett says.

"We will look at two pivotal areas. First, we will be able to analyze truly objective test results in terms of the overall Texas student population. Second, we will be able to gather the kind of information which will help us improve learning throughout the school system."

During its last session, the Texas Legislature allocated \$3 million to the State Board of Education for statewide testing and other measures designed to help schools assess student needs and improve their programs.

The 1978 assessment plan was developed by the Texas Education Agency in cooperation with teams of school personnel representing small, medium or suburban, and urban districts. Statewide and regional data will be reported to the State Board of Education in October or November.

Each of the tests will be administered to groups of 25 or more students selected at random from some 1,900 elementary and secondary campuses in all areas of the state. The total package will be approved by the Research Triangle Institute of Raleigh-Durham, N.C. This research firm has had major responsibility for testing students for the National Assessment of Educational Progress project.

The State Board of Education approved the contract at its regular meeting on Saturday (January 14) in Austin.

Hermit Of The Hills



Peter Berg, the Gillespie County hermit, came away from Germany to Fredericksburg in the 1850s. A skillful stonecutter and mason, Berg had a "perfect eye" and was said to have no need of a plumb line or measure to lay a perfectly straight course of stone. He worked at his trade in the growing young town until he had saved enough money to pay passage from Germany to Texas for his fiancée.

Unfortunately, Berg's judgment about women was not as accurate as it was about the cutting and laying of stone. The lady, arriving at the port of Indiana, not and married another man and settled in the coastal area, leaving Berg high and dry in the interior of the state.

"A disappointment seems to have changed the course of the young man's life. Deciding that he had had enough of the humdrum society of a frontier town, Berg moved to an unpopulated area about eight miles east of Fredericksburg and took up the existence of a hermit."

In a ravine surrounded by hills, Berg constructed his residence. The steep face of the ravine served as the back wall of the structure, which was soundly built of stone by his own labor. The Fredericksburg resident who owned the land upon which Berg built later granted him life tenancy of his home. Nearby, the hermit erected a stone tower and on top of this, a windmill which he used to pump water from a nearby spring and to grind corn.

Berg embellished his residence by constructing a bedstead, a chair, and a pipe organ. This instrument was made of bark and braided sheets. For pipe, Berg used rolled newspapers which he replaced as they became worn.

Those who heard the organ's music said that it produced rich full notes with considerable carrying power. The unexpected sounds from Berg's instrument often startled hunters in the area.

Berg did not live too hermit-like an existence. He used the corn ground by his windmill to distill his own whiskey, which he stored in casks and barrels of his own construction. Occasionally he would haul some of his moonshine in a home-made wheelbarrow into Fredericksburg, where he sold it for 30 to 50 cents per gallon. On one of his trips some residents of the town bought whiskey from Berg to serve at a dance, and invited the hermit to attend. He did so, and afterwards he was present at every dance.

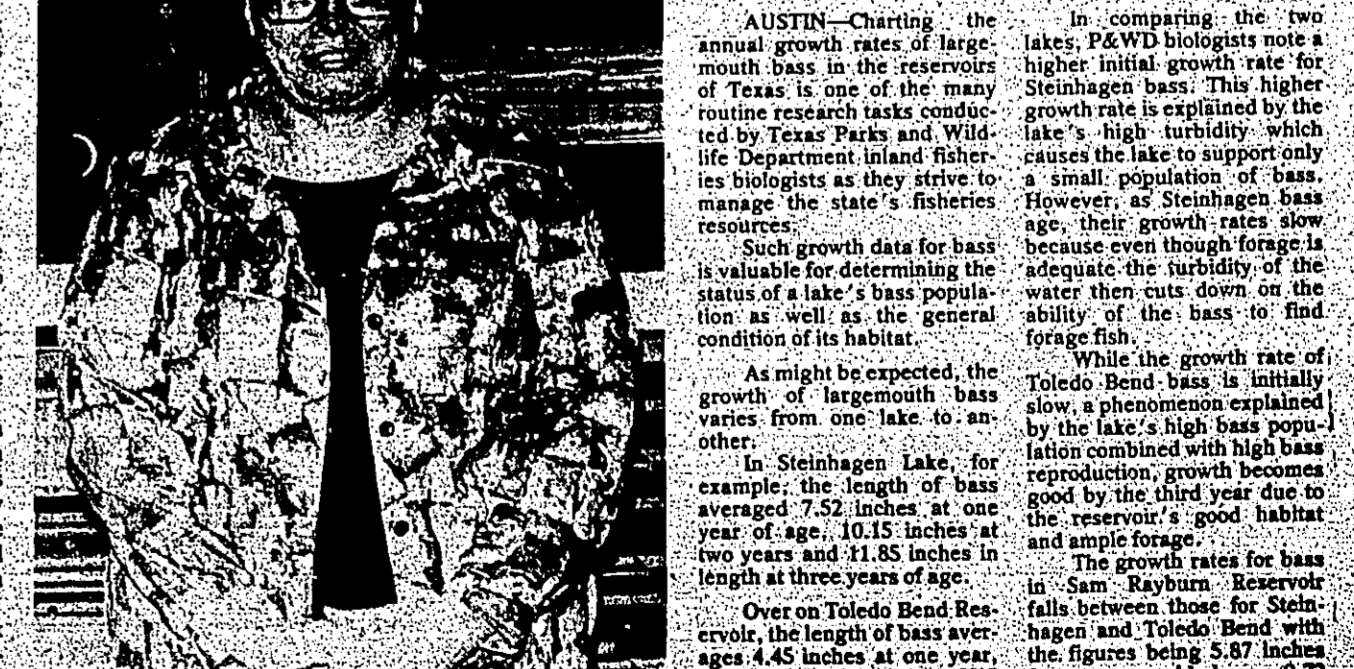

Texas Bass Grow Fast

AUSTIN—Charting the annual growth rates of large-mouth bass in the reservoir of Texas is one of the more routine research tasks conducted by the state's fisheries resources.

Such growth data for bass is valuable for determining the status of a lake's bass population as well as the general condition of the habitat.

As might be expected, the growth of largemouth bass varies from one lake to another.

While the growth rate of Toledo Bend bass is initially slow, a phenomenon explained by the lake's high bass population combined with high bass reproduction, growth becomes good by the third year due to the reservoir's good habitat and ample food.

Over on Toledo Bend Reservoir, the length of bass averages 4.45 inches at one year, 8.50 inches at two years, 13.15 inches at three years, 16.38 inches at four years and 19.17 inches after five years.

This higher growth rate is explained by the lake's high turbidity which causes the lake to support only a small population of bass. However, at Steinhagen bass age, their growth rates slow because even though forage is adequate, the turbidity of the water then cuts down on the ability of the bass to find forage fish.

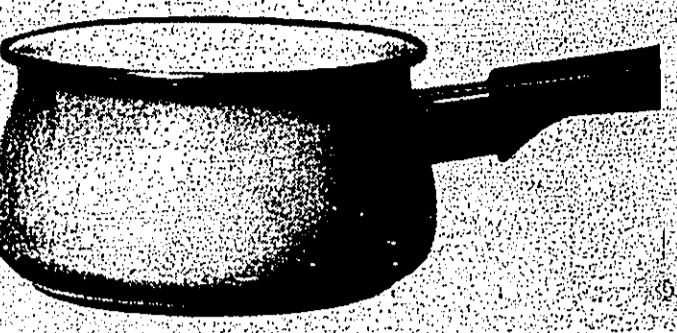
BEAUMONT—Richard Neumann, director of off-campus courses for Lamar University, is concerned about the way society treats old people and he has decided to do something about it.
 Aided by a \$6,000 grant from the South East Texas Regional Planning Commission and the help of Lamar students, he has just completed a major survey of the elderly in Southeast Texas.
 "Basic thrust of his report is the legal needs of the elderly," Neumann said.
 "Let's face it. We are all going to get old some day. It is up to us, who are younger, to help those who are older. It's a matter of survival. We may need somebody to help us some day," Neumann said.
 "As a group, the elderly are faced with many problems and needs. The numbers of elderly people and their needs and problems are increasing. Currently about 10 percent of the United States population is over 60 years of age, with population experts indicating the proportion will rise to 15 percent by the year 1980," said Neumann.
 "Twenty percent of these people, a disproportionately large number, live on incomes below the poverty level. In the sample, 58 percent of the elderly are poor, elderly who probably need legal services, this group receives only about 6 percent of the legal services provided to indigents through federal and Bar Association programs."
 "A recent New York Times article, written by Robert Roberts, captures the viewpoint of the elderly. He quoted one woman who said, 'The young seem to feel that old people descended from outer space. They forget we have a past.'"
 Neumann said "The relationships between age and the law are complex and influenced by the whole gamut of individual differences among people. Additionally, society holds opposing values. For example, economic independence is valued, but so is a labor market open to upward movement for young and middle aged adults, and these opposing values add to the complexities."
 "In an effort to gain understanding of these complexities, and to assist the social and legal agencies concerned with assessing and meeting legal service and other needs, the present study was conceived. The objective of this project is to assess the legal service needs and problems perceived by the elderly in Hardin, Jefferson and

Beware Of Fads In Food

COLLEGE STATION—Consult a variety of nutrition sources and avoid the sometimes fatal \$600 million a year food-fad trap, a food and nutrition specialist says.
 "Consumers not only waste money following food-fad practices, but they support harmful poor nutrition when they follow fads, Mary K. Sweeten continues.
 Mrs. Sweeten is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.
 By consulting a variety of sources, each consumer can learn to recognize food fads and their possible dangers.
SOME FOOD FADS ARE DANGEROUS
 "Some food fads are dangerous, contributing to malnutrition, unnecessary surgery and even death, she warns.
 "Thirty-one deaths thus far are the direct result of liquid protein diets, according to the Disease Control Center in Atlanta, GA.
 Also, taking massive doses of vitamin A can cause symptoms like those of a brain tumor—and that might lead to unnecessary surgery.
 Results of following other food fads are less serious, but they encourage irrational nutrition practices that might be acting as 'poor substitutes' for sound nutrition habits."
FOOD FADS START WITH FALLACIES, QUACKS
 "A food fad is a misconception that people accept as fact," Mrs. Sweeten says.
 Two sources of these misconceptions are the food fallacy and food quack, she adds.
FOOD FALLACY
 "False or mistaken ideas about foods and nutrition are termed food fallacy.
 "For example, the idea that adults do not need milk is a fallacy. Adults do need milk products or other sources of calcium to keep strong bones."
FOOD QUACK
 "In addition, a food quack is one who has little or no education in foods and nutrition but who pretends to have knowledge and skill in the field."
 "These quacks take facts out of context and draw the wrong conclusion. They fail to report the total facts," she explains.
 "For example, the quack might say that phytyates in cereals, or oxalates in spinach or chocolate, tie up calcium; therefore, they say, they are bad and should be avoided."
 "In truth, it would take vast amounts of these substances at one time to make a significant difference in the amount of calcium absorbed," Mrs. Sweeten points out.
 "There are two types of food quacks—those who report about nutrition, accidentally and those who report misinformation about nutrition intentionally, she says."
ACCIDENTAL QUACKS
 "The accidental quacks are those such as a scientist with a bias, a scientist who misinterprets research of others, misinformed educators, health care personnel who are skilled only in their own field, and well-meaning friends, relatives and associates."
 "These people do not really mean to spread misinformation."
INTENTIONAL QUACKS
 "On the other hand, some people spread misinformation intentionally, she adds.
 "Some of these quacks are commercial publications that distort facts, self-instructed diet consultants working in specialty shops, advertisers and food promoters, and indeterminate publishers and broadcasters," the specialist says.
PUBLIC AWARENESS GIANT STEP AGAINST FOOD FADS
 "To combat misinformation sources, nutritionists recommend that consumers try to keep abreast of as much information about food as they can. Just knowing about the many different viewpoints on food issues is a giant step toward sound nutrition," Mrs. Sweeten emphasizes.
 "Mrs. Sweeten suggests several nutrition information resources."

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God's Secrets

The secret things belong unto the Lord our God: but those things which are revealed, we use unto our children: even so (Deut. 29:29). Consider two of God's secrets.

1. Germ of life. Genesis chapter one tells of God's creating all things, including plant, animal and human life. Each produces after its own kind (cf. Gen. 1:11). Even children understand that corn grows from corn, peas from peas; etc. The seed has in it the germ of life. Does man understand the germ of life? No! But, he does not quit planting; does he? Who understands how a brown cow can eat green grass, produce white milk which makes yellow butter? But, we like it just the same. Life has many mysteries does it not?

2. God's origin. "In the beginning God..." (Gen. 1:1). The word of God assumes the existence of God. It makes no effort to answer the question: where did God come from? Many have missed upon the question. Some had rejected all idea of God simply because they could neither explain God nor His origin—these are known as atheists. Others believed the God was once a man, and that men have the potential to become Gods. This, however, is not taught in the word of God. Some who accept the existence of God (Heb. 11:6) entertain serious doubts, anxieties, etc. because they cannot explain His origin. Since God is infinite, He is everlasting. How can He be in His present finite state understand any explanation of God's origin, if indeed He had an origin. How could anything eternal have an origin?

An important suggestion. Inasmuch as man is finite and God infinite, rather than trying to comprehend what God has not revealed, let us rejoice in His revelation. The hope of being with God is the anchor of the soul (Heb. 6:19). Jesus died to make that possible (I Pet. 3:18; II Cor. 5:18-21). Let us give serious consideration to our need to obey the gospel (Rom. 6:16; II Pet. 1:6-10). Christians live with the assurance that an omnipotent God watches over them (I Pet. 3:12).

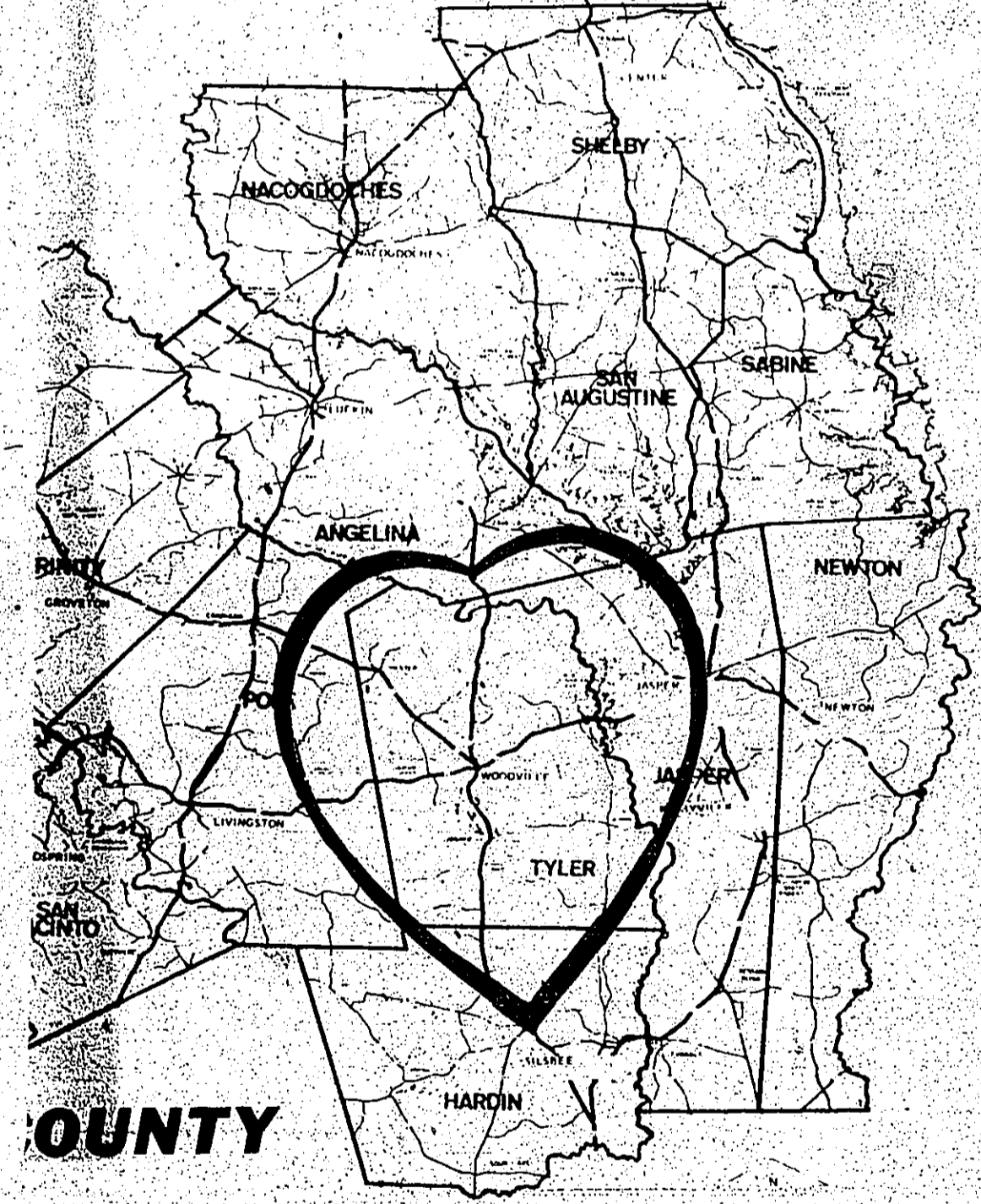

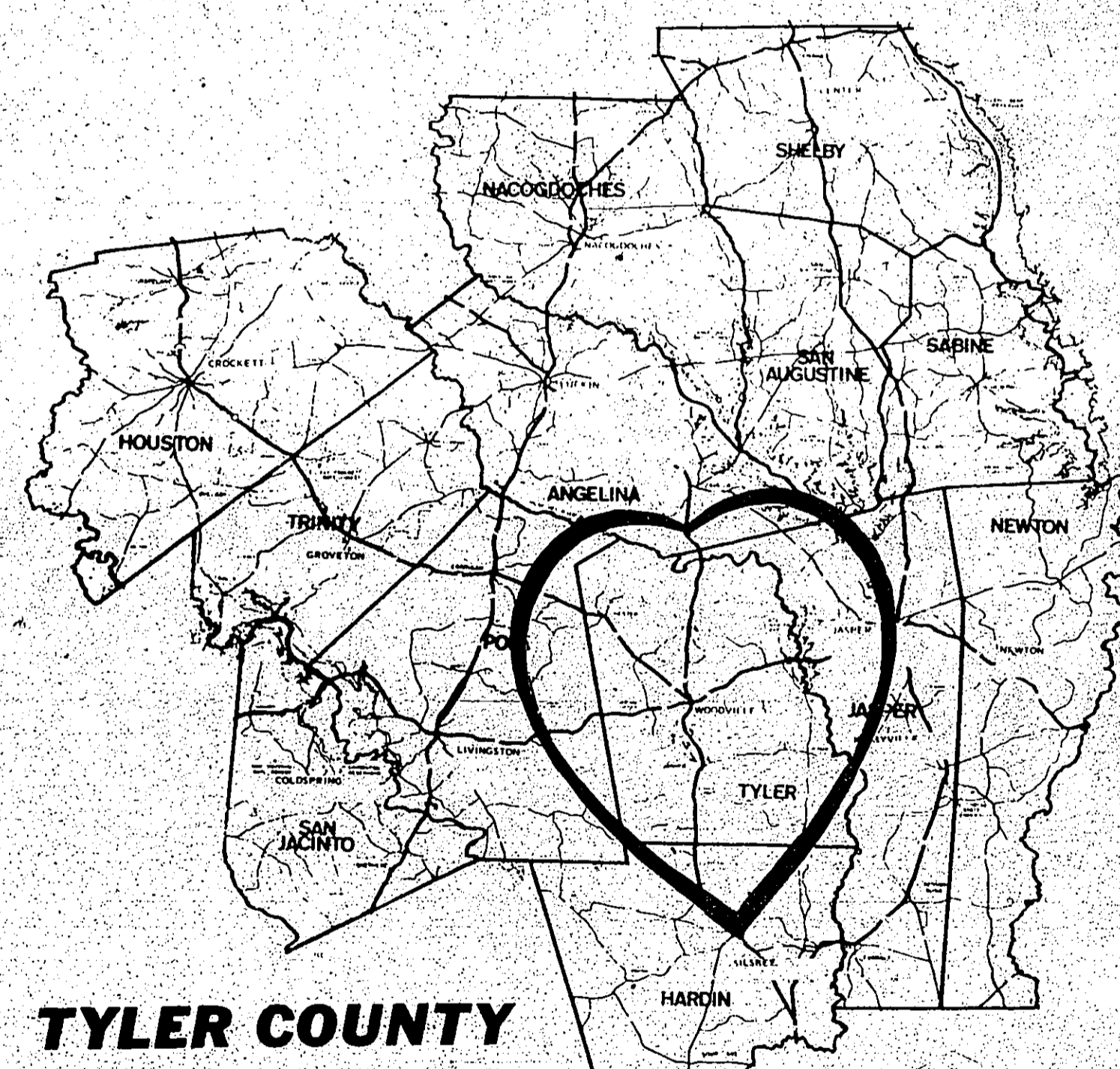

County citizens, in providing input to National Park Service questionnaires. We feel that office will eventually expand into an initial information center which will justify the title "Gateway to the Big Thicket" and will funnel Northern visitors to the Preserve through Tyler County.

There have been estimates of upwards of 500,000 visitors per year to the Big Thicket within 3 to 5 years of operation. This amount of traffic will be of great economic benefit to Tyler County, considering that visitors spend anywhere from \$20 to \$50 for each day they are in the area.

Another major success was the decision by Livingston Shipbuilding to locate in Tyler County. We regularly receive industrial queries looking us over with plant location in mind-but this time a strong united stand and aggressive cooperative effort was made and Livingston Shipbuilding was the result. This will bring obvious economic benefit to Tyler County in the form of additional jobs and wage earners who will purchase from local businesses and contribute to our tax base.

During mid-1977, the Chamber recommended to the Tyler County Commissioner's Court a more aggressive approach to the State Highway Department with respect to road improvement. Partially, as a result of this recommendation, the Court appointed a Highway Study Committee to identify and justify appropriate roads in the County for improvement by the State. The Chamber is represented on this committee and it is fully endorsed by the Chamber. You will be hearing more of the work of the Highway Study Committee during the coming year.

I wish to thank you for the privilege of having served as president of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce. There have been some failures, some frustrations, but most remembered are the successes. As Tom Lamb, President of the Beaumont Chamber of Commerce recently reminded, "It Takes Two-The Chamber And You." No truer words were ever spoken. Working together will bring even better things to Tyler County in the future years.

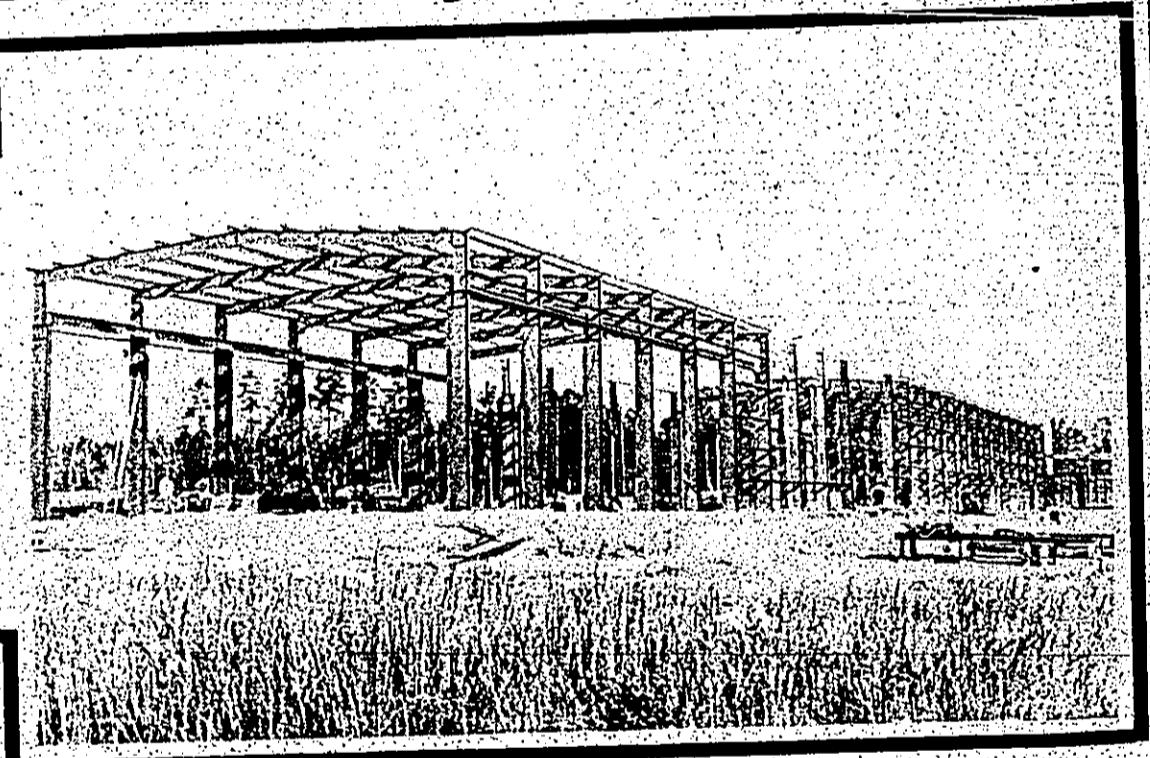

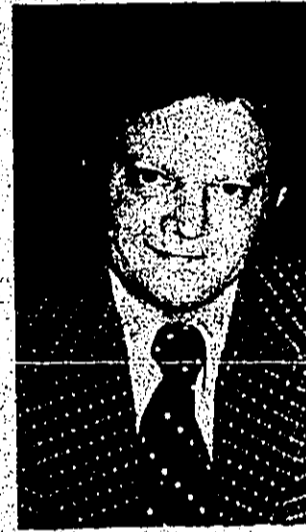

Road Work Set

Plans for improved road construction throughout the county were unveiled in 1977, pointing to an estimated \$9,920,000 scheduled to be spent in Tyler County over the next five years, according to the Texas State Highway Department.

State Representative Jim Browder was on hand several times during the year to answer questions regarding the highway and Farm to Market Road situation and to offer assistance to the Highway Study Committee, formed by County Commissioners, on ways they could obtain funds for Farm to Market Roads.

Highway Study Committee members are Bud Byram, Leo Gunter, Carl Nichols, Carl Fairchild, Gene Boykin, Ewell Fowl and C.D. Willford.

The committee was formed in August of '75 to look into the county road situation and to make recommendations concerning future funding of F.M. roads.

According to Highway Department official Homer Smith, roads eligible for F.M. funding depends on school bus routes, mail routes and traffic counts.

It is the responsibility of the Highway Study Committee to investigate all these areas and make their recommendations known to county commissioners.

Planned highway improvements which were unveiled for the county are: 1977-Construction of Cypress Creek Bridge, Highway 69, and approaches.

1978-Widen existing pavement 2.9 miles north of Hardin County line to 1 mile south of Warren.

-Grading, structuring, and surfacing sections of U.S. 69 from Woodville to the Rockland Bridge.

-Extend FM 92, 2.2 miles northwest from U.S. 190.

Concerning the advanced four year plan, Browder indicated that several projects would be underway within the next few years including:

-Grade, structure and surface U.S. 69, 1 mile south of Warren to Hillister.

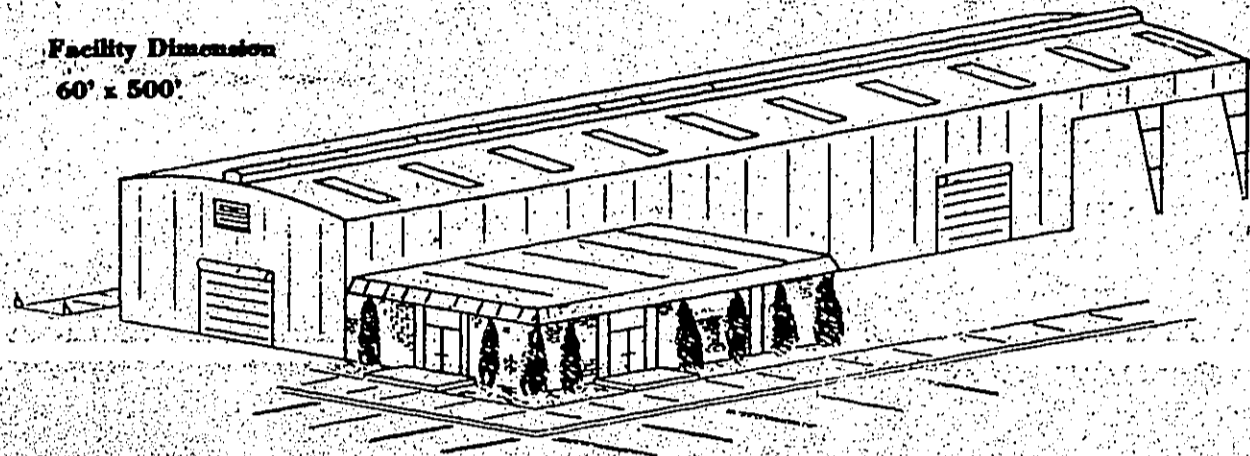

Levingston Builds Here

Bringing with it an estimated payroll of over \$600,000 in its first year of operation, the Levingston Shipbuilding Company of Orange has branched into Tyler County with a rolled steel pipe fabrication plant located on Highway 69, 2 1/2 miles north of Woodville.

The plant will employ some 40 persons startup and, according to Plant General Manager, Dave Hardin, projected estimates of employee needs call for a gradual build up to about 150 workers by the end of the first year of operation.

Key factors in helping to complete local negotiations with the corporate prospect are: F.M. (Polly) Archer, president of the Tyler County Industrial Corporation and Attorney; Secretary-Treasurer, Harry Stafford. The officers of the Corporation have been very complimentary of cooperative efforts in joining with the Woodville City Council, the Tyler County Commissioners Court and Chamber of Commerce and Wood-

ville Independent School District in combining efforts locally to provide information and assistance to the incoming industry.

According to General Manager Hardin, "We really picked Woodville because it was centrally located to our market areas in Dallas, Houston and Louisiana. And," he said, "we're also convenient to the Shipyard operation in Orange."

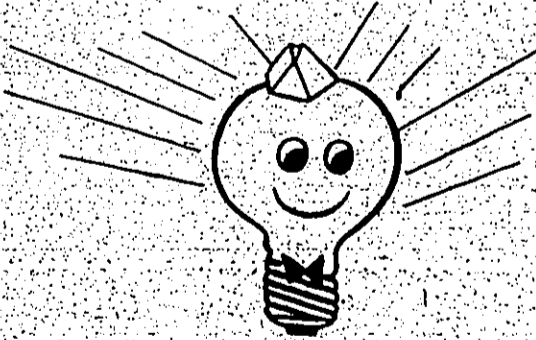
The industrial building to be built on the approximate 40 acre site which is adjacent to the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks will be 60' x 500'.

Keller Expands

Keller Building Products of Woodville expects record 1978 sales of approximately \$10 million, an increase over 1977 sales of \$2 million, according to

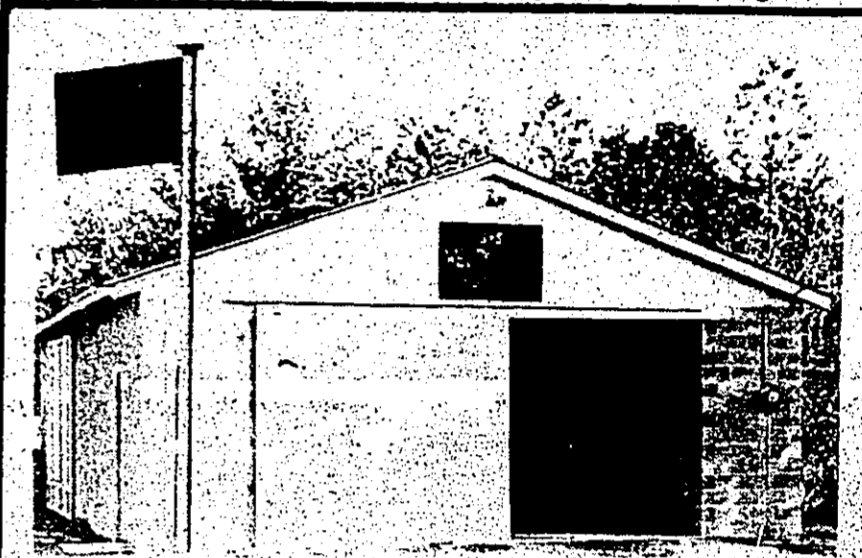
Sales Manager John Craine. Contributing to the increase in sales is the addition of a 20,000 square foot warehouse. The ware-

house is just part of a \$35,000 expansion plan program underway at the Woodville site. Also in the expansion plan is the addition of a paint line expected to be in operation by March of this year. The line will enable painting of the aluminum windows and doors at the plant instead of shipping the finished products elsewhere to be painted. The line will create some 15 new jobs.

According to Craine, another expected addition will include insulated windows to be done at the plant.

Keller now employs some 350 persons. Plant Manager Henry Carroll reports many job openings at the plant to the extent that Keller now sends a bus to Livingston to carry workers from that area to and from work. Keller puts an estimated \$2.5 million payroll dollars into the county each year.

Keller has been serving Tyler County for the past 18 years, involving itself also in community projects. Windows for the rangers home at Camp Umland were donated by the plant and employees took an active part in the January 20 blood drive.

Tax Checks Sent

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday his office has mailed checks totaling \$16.5 million to 894 Texas cities as their January share of the one percent city sales tax. Of the three incorpor-

ated cities in Tyler County, only Woodville will receive a check for January. Woodville's share will be \$4,527.28, according to a release from the comptroller's office. Bullock also reminded

the 250,000 Texas retail merchants who remit their sales tax collections on a quarterly basis that January 31 is the deadline for their next reports.

"If they haven't done so already, I'd suggest they put a big red circle around the date on their calendars, because late reports can mean costly and time-consuming problems for our merchants," he said.

Bullock said that the latest batch of rebate checks include two in excess of \$2 million for the cities of Dallas and Houston.

Houston, the state's most populous city, will get a check for \$4 million and Dallas will receive \$2.2 million.

San Antonio will receive \$94,163, Fort Worth, \$761,375, Austin, \$600,346 and El Paso, \$507,051.

The local-option, one-percent city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders and remitted monthly to the cities by the Comptroller's Office.

Bullock urged merchants who have questions or problems with preparing their sales tax reports to contact the nearest Comptroller's Field Office or call toll-free 1-800-252-5555 for assistance.

World's Largest Clock Coming!

Billed last year by Beaumont Enterprise reporter Richard Stewart as Woodville's answer to Walt Disney, Clyde Gray, creator and developer of Heritage Village is at it again.

Last year it was a flying outhouse. How can you follow that?

Don't ask Gray cause he'll tell you that the only way would be to build a five-story, two-faced mantel clock designed after a 1903 replica from the Seth Thomas Company of Thomaston, Conn. It will be the largest in the world, Gray promises.

As you drive by the Heritage Village complex on Hwy. 190 one mile west of Woodville after the Saturday April 29 dedication ceremony it should be there, "weather permitting" Gray says, with one face looking toward the Picket House and the other face pointed to the highway.

The structure will have a 47 foot base and will be built in two levels. People will actually be able to go up into the clock where a clock museum will be found with facts about time and time's influence on man.

The face of the clock will be ornately designed with the signs of the Zodiac and numbered by Roman numerals.

The clock will be operated by 2 1/2 tons of weight which will have to be wound every few days, Gray said.

The inner workings of the clock came from atop

the Houston Market Hall (City Hall). According to Gray, the Houston mayors office called recently asking where and how Gray acquired the timepiece.

Gray, who has invited all the living Houston mayors to witness the dedication, says he has been planning the spectacle for years.

Expected cost of the structure will be near \$25,000.

Gray says that the Seth Thomas clock, from which he will copy the five-story clock, was picked up for \$5 in a Fort Arthur junk store many years ago.

Gray, who has collected many items in his life is well on his way now to becoming a horologist, a clock collector. He says he will accept any clock of interesting design or an antique, for the clock museum itself. Persons who have such an item are asked to contact him about the possibility of such a loan.

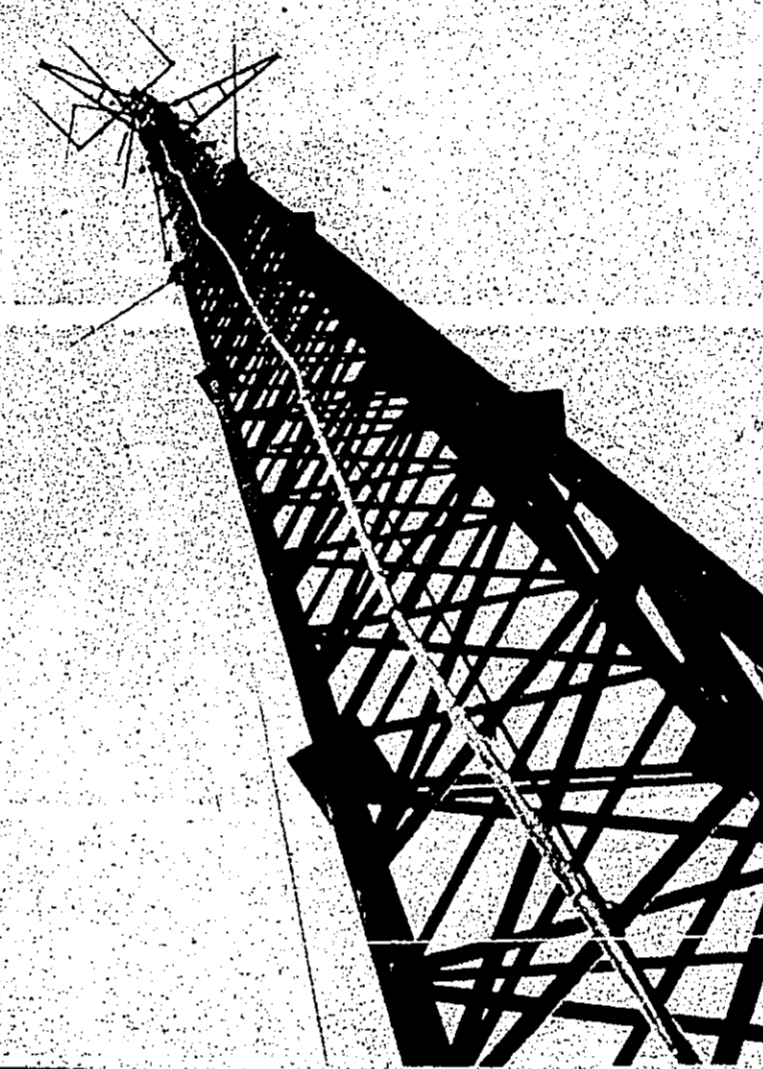

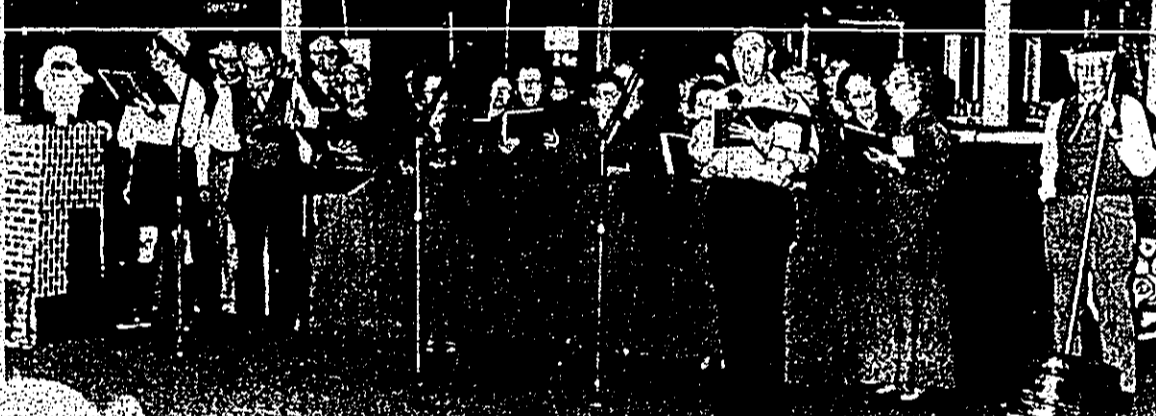

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Southwestern Bell Reviews Last Year, Forecasts Next Year

Unprecedented growth and economic expansion in the Woodville business community during 1977 characterized Southwestern Bell's service activities according to Gary Pircher, Bell's local manager.

"During 1977," commented Pircher, "we began serving an additional 29 business customers in Woodville. That may seem small by some people's standards, but it represents a growth rate of 7.27 percent."

According to Pircher, at the end of the year Southwestern Bell was serving 428 business customers in Woodville. That figure compares to only 399 business customers at the end of 1976.

"Growth in the residential market was not as dramatic as in the business community," added Pircher. "During 1977 we added about 99 residential phones, not including

extensions. That represents a growth rate of 4.5 percent. At the end of 1976 we were serving 2,195 residential customers compared to 2,294 at the end of 1977."

Total telephone growth in Woodville during the past year was five percent, reported Pircher. During the year his company added 138 new customers bringing the total number of customers being served by Southwestern Bell in Woodville to 2,732.

In terms of service improvement, local Bell employees worked on a number of major construction projects during the past year, said Pircher.

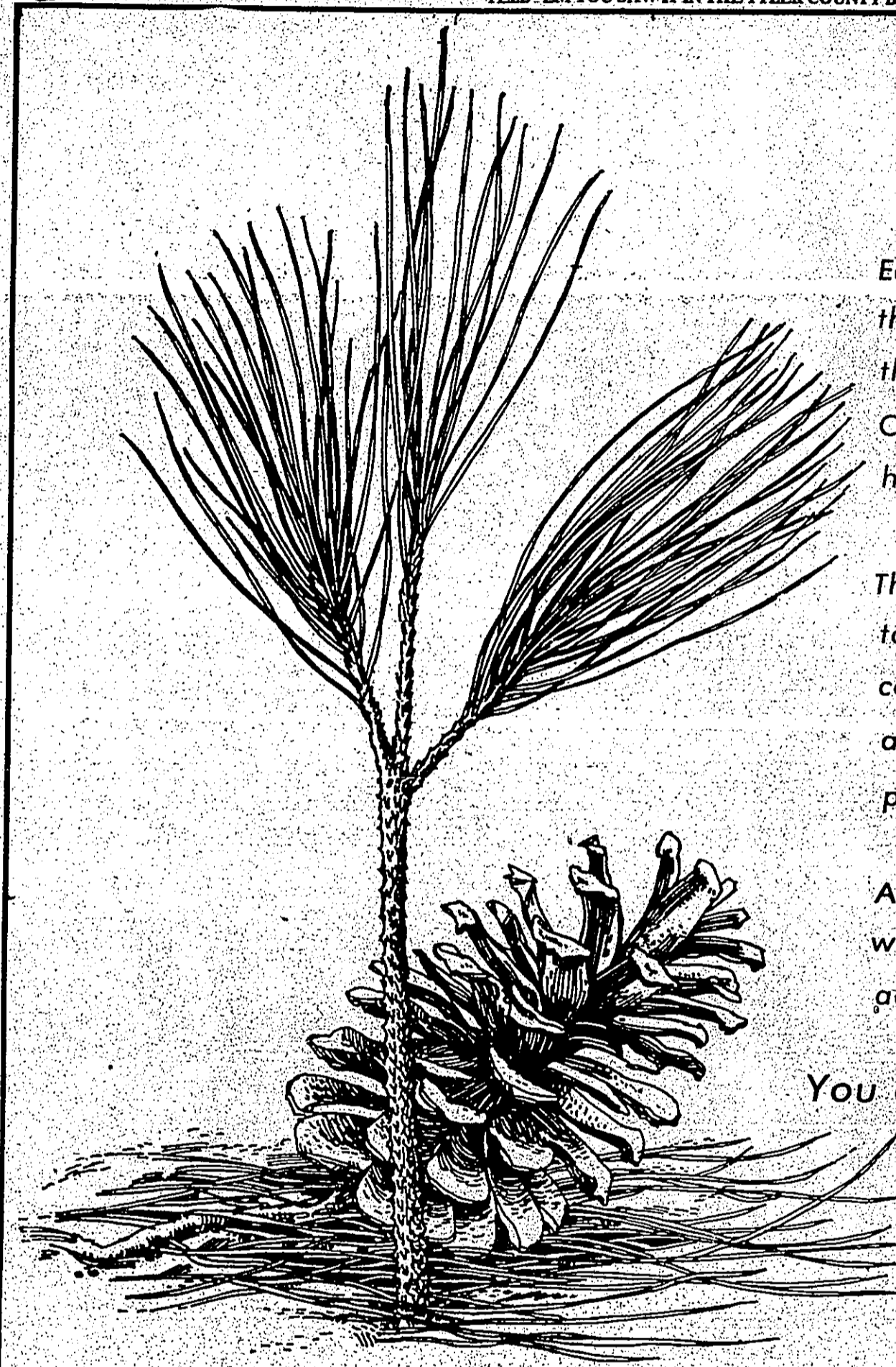
"We began work on the placement of a major cable from Woodville to Colmesneil," reported Pircher. "This project included the installation of a conduit system from our Woodville office up Village Street to Bluff and on to Nellius Street at a cost of

about \$140,000."

During 1978, Pircher said, the company will complete the Woodville to Colmesneil project. Additionally, he reported that Bell will spend about 1.1 million dollars on other service improvement projects.

"One project we plan to complete during 1978," he said, "is the placement of a local cable to Hillister and out towards Spurger. The cost of that project alone is estimated at about \$400,000."

Pircher said that he expects the rapid growth rate in the business community to continue through 1978. The construction projects Bell is working on in the area are designed to allow Southwestern Bell to continue to provide better than adequate service while the area continues to expand.

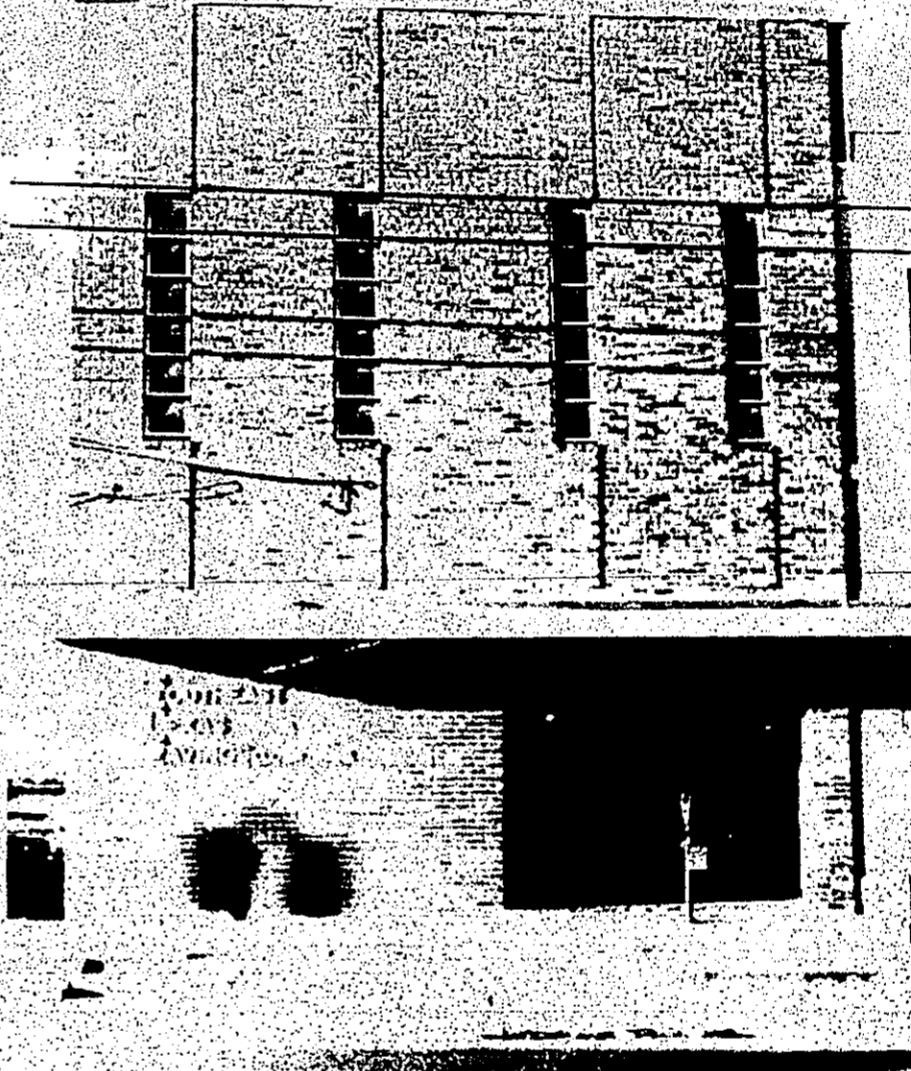
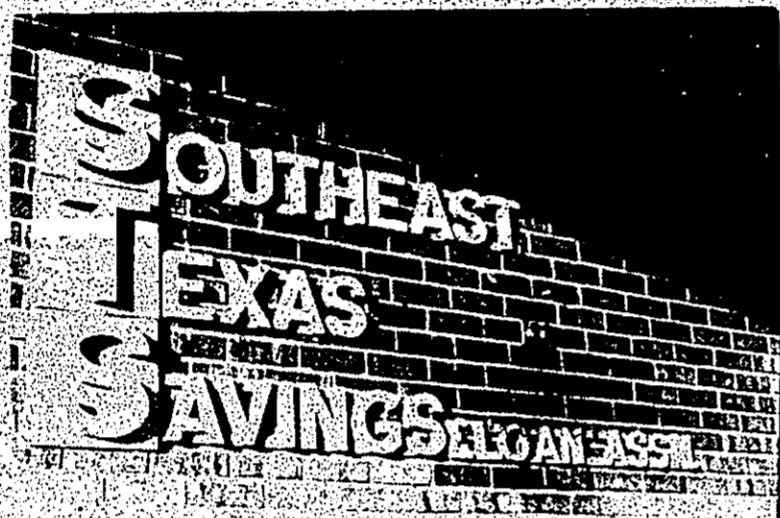

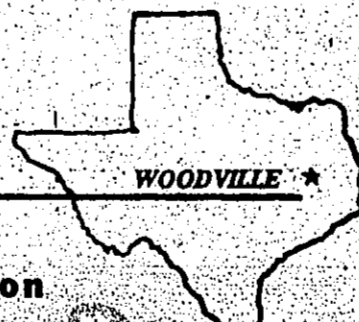
