**Colmesneil Girls Close To Title**

CHESTER Colmesneil's basketball girls continued their steady pursuit of the District 50-B championship here last Tuesday, downing the defending champion Chester Lady Jackets, 58-50.

The win gave Colmesneil a 6-0 record in district and a two-game lead over Goodrich, its nearest competitor with a 4-2 record.

Junior forward Lisha Gilder poured in 49 points in the winning effort, but was the only Bulldog player to score in double figures. Nevertheless, forward Janette McNeal did a real good job rebounding the ball, according to coach R.B. Moffett.

Colmesneil held a slim 23-21 lead at halftime. Chester was paced by Donna Neal's 21 points. Support came from Lisa Darden and Diane Davis, who scored 15 and 14 points, respectively.

Colmesneil can wrap up the district title with one win Tuesday. The Bulldogs hosted Big Sandy. Friday Goodrich will be in the Bulldog gym for the final regular season contest.

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**Wiginton Files For Pct. 3 J.P.**

Morris S. Wiginton, 52, of Doucette, has filed and announced his candidacy for justice of the peace, Precinct 3, in the May 6 Democratic primary.

A graduate of the University of Texas, Wiginton is self-employed as an architectural designer and farmer. Prior to moving to Tyler County, he practiced engineering and architectural designing for 30 years.

While working in Houston Wiginton was associated with the Harris County Sheriff's office, holding a commission as a reserve deputy working regular assignments in patrol units, in the warrant division and the narcotics division.

Wiginton and his wife Katherine have four grown children. He is a veteran of World War II, having served three years with the navy in the Pacific.

"Precinct 3 is the largest in the county and new people and industries are moving in each day," said Wiginton. "I feel that the justice of the peace should be open and available at all times, so our law enforcement officers and our citizens can receive proper attention when needed."

"I am not involved in any business that requires 50 to 60 percent of my time," Wiginton added. "If elected, my office will be open 24 hours a day."

Three other candidates have also filed for the Precinct 3 justice of the peace. They are incumbent Frank Grimes, Jimmy Wayne Davis and D.F. Parrott.

**WISD To Hire Three Teachers**

Approximately 50 persons including many teachers from the Woodville Independent School District and parents packed the District board room Tuesday (Jan. 31) in a special called meeting which resulted in the hiring of three new teachers and the creation of another classroom in the district.

Mrs. Jim Allison, who earlier brought the question of adding teachers to compensate for "wall to wall kids" in the classrooms, said the action of the board Tuesday night was "outstanding."

The new faculty will be utilized in sixth, fifth and first grade classes.

Mrs. Allison said that she felt the board will have hired the teachers and also will have partitioned a large classroom, thus creating a new one, before the next regular meeting of the board takes place on Feb. 21.

**Board Picks Houston As Coach**

Woodville Independent School District trustees voted last Tuesday to hire Kirby High School assistant coach Melvin Houston as the new football coach, filling the vacancy left by the death of coach Guy Broussard in December.

Houston, 40, was Broussard's first assistant on the varsity football team and coached the offensive backs and defensive secondary.

A native of Austin, Houston has worked for the WISD for eleven years. He coached one year at Scott High School, then moved to Wheat Junior High when the schools integrated in 1968. After four years at Wheat, he became a junior varsity coach at Kirby. He is also coach of the Eagle track team, which won the District 17-2A title last year.

Houston received his B.A. from Houston-Tillotson College in Austin. He is currently working on a masters degree in physical education at Texas Southern University in Houston.

"When you walk out of college, that's the head coaching position is the objective," said Houston. "Of course, the circumstances were not the best," he added, referring to Broussard's death.

"We won't be outstanding, but we'll be competitive," said Houston, looking ahead to next year's football season.

Houston also expressed confidence in the overall Kirby sports program. "There is a future for sports in the school."

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**Dillion Files For Congress**

AUSTIN—Woodville attorney and businessman James H. Dillion became a candidate in the May 6 Republican primary for the United States Congress from the Second District of Texas Monday.

Dillion, 58, paid his \$1500 filing fee to State Republican Party Chairman Ray Barnhart.

Dillion and Jackie, his wife of 28 years, have lived and worked in Woodville since moving there from Houston in 1965. He received his legal training at the South Texas College of Law in Houston and also studied at the University of Louisville.

A disabled veteran of World War II, Dillion served with the U.S. Air Force in the Southwest Pacific.

The Dillions have two sons: Steve, a graduate of Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, and Jeff and wife Cindy, both graduates of Sam Houston State University in Huntsville.

District 2 of Texas includes Tyler, Hardin, Jasper, Angelina, Sabine, Anderson, Nacogdoches, Grimes, Leon, Houston, Trinity, Polk, San Jacinto, Walker, Madison, Liberty, Newton, Orange, Montgomery and Freestone counties.

Dillion will apparently be uncontested in the Republican primary on May 6, but will have to face incumbent Democrat Charles Wilburn of Lufkin in the November general election.

Wilson, 44, filed for the Democratic primary on Jan. 2. He is completing his third term as the representative from District 2.

Flower Chairman Dixie Jarrott reports that approximately 30 people are already making the flowers but that many more volunteers are needed to hand fashion the colorful dogwood, magnolia, jasmine and azalea blooms.

Of entertainment value and one of the highlights of each year's Dogwood Festival is the parade. Parade Chairman Jerry Carruth hopes to have something different for this year's parade.

"We are looking for entertaining groups to perform this year," said Carruth, who has set the float and entrant goal at 150.

Invitations to perform in Tyler County's oldest tradition have been sent to over 30 bands from around the state.

Carruth indicated that there might be several surprises for parade watchers.

Clowns and cowboy shoot-outs can be expected for this year's parade as well as the popular Shriners small car performance.

Carruth also stated that area business merchants are encouraged to take part in the festivities. "What better way to advertise?" said Carruth.
