Rogers Named As 'Mr. East Texas'

Beaumont businessman Ben J. Rogers has been named the recipient of the 1978 Mr. East Texas award by the Tyler County Dogwood Festival Directors.

The announcement was made in Beaumont Tuesday, but the award will be presented formally in Woodville at the Dogwood Amphitheatre on April 1 as part of the festival ceremonies.

Rogers, 63, is active in many business enterprises in Beaumont and Texas. After moving to Beaumont from his native Chicago in 1936, he helped open the second Texas State Optical office after his brother Sol founded the company.

Texas State Optical (TSO) became a family enterprise, and today, Rogers and his three brothers are associated

in the management of more than 145 optical offices in Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana. The brothers also own Rogers Enterprises which has optical laboratories in Beaumont and San Antonio.

Rogers is also active in real estate and banking. Most recently, he and his brothers developed Parkdale Mall in Beaumont.

Rogers is a director of the

Meyerland Bank in Houston, the First Security National Bank and First Security National Corporation, Gateway National Bank, San Jacinto Savings and Loan Association and Parkdale Bank, all in Beaumont.

Many civic, charitable and religious organizations are also among Rogers' interests. He is currently president of the Liberty Muscular Dystrophy Research Foundation and the Babe Didrikson Zaharias Foundation, is a member of the board of trustees of the American Medical Center in Denver, the advisory board of St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Beaumont, the steering committee for the YMCA 50th Anniversary Capital Funds Campaign, Lamar University Regents' Development Council and the advisory board of

the International Seamen's Center, and is an honorary director of both Boys' Haven and the Atascocita Historical Society.

Rogers has been honored many times. In 1973, he was named Outstanding Texan by the Exchange Clubs of Texas for "outstanding service to the nation in any cause that strengthens our great country."

Rogers resides with his wife Julie in Beaumont. They have three children: Dr. Arvey Rogers of Miami, Fla., Dr. Bernard Rogers of Dallas, and Miss Regina Rogers.

The Mr. East Texas award, which has been made each year since 1967, is presented to an East Texan who best exemplifies the spirit and quality of leadership which advances, shapes and gives directions to the growth and progress of East Texas.

Former recipients of the award were O.R. Crawford, the late Glenn E. Richard, Dr. Arleigh Templeton, Arthur Temple, Gov. and Mrs. Allan Shivers, John E. Gray, Edward Clark, Cong. Charles Wilson, the late Ralph Ramos, Dr. Ralph Steen, and Texas Supreme Court Justice Price Daniel Sr.

Warriorettes Capture 17-2A Basketball Title

LIVINGSTON—The District 17-2A girls basketball championship which eluded Warren last year finally came for the Warriorettes Friday night as they beat a strong Hudson team, 55-45.

Playing before a vocal crowd in the Livingston Junior High School gym, the Warriorettes shone on both

offense and defense for most of the game.

Led by senior forward Melissa Cassell's 24 points, Warren hit a hot 68 percent of its field goals and 75 percent of its free throws.

Equally effective as Cassell were forwards Kelly Evans (15 points) and Kay Freeman (16 points). While

Cassell poured in points from the right baseline, Evans hit from the circle and Freeman drove in from the left, creating a balanced attack.

On the opposite end of the court, the Warren guards stymied Hudson long enough to preserve the victory.

Senior Kathy Gibson held Hudson's big forward, Lisa Jones, to 14 points through

three quarters, but fouled out with two seconds left in the third period. After Gibson left the court to a standing ovation, Jones managed 14 more points with freshman Pam Kervin taking Gibson's place.

Junior guard Paula Price led Warren with eight rebounds, followed by Gibson with seven and senior Bonnie Rhodes with three.

Warren opened up a 23-13 lead during the second period, but Hudson narrowed that to 27-23 at halftime, and only a three-point play by Cassell insured that margin.

Warren widened its lead in the third period to 41-30,

then to 49-34 with 3:36 left in the game.

A last minute flurry of points from Hudson closed the margin to five points, but a layup by Evan's locked it up for the Warriorettes.

For the Warriorettes, who had been beaten for the 17-2A title last year by Hudson, it was a very emotional win.

There may be more to come however.

Tuesday, the Warriorettes were scheduled to play

18-2A champions Kountze for the bi-district championship and the right to advance to the regional tournament Friday or Saturday in Brenham at Blinn

Junior College. The game was to be played in Silsbee.

"We worked all week for Hudson," said coach Bettie Yates. "All of the players played a good game and extra well on defense. We appreciate the fans, the administration and the student body for the support they gave us."

Kountze and Warren met one time during the regular season with the Warriorettes coming out on top on a last-minute basket by Kervin.

Ms. Yates qualified the Lionelettes as a "good, all-around team" and added that Kountze would have a height advantage.

Resolution

WHEREAS, the Texas Citizens' Committee for Public Schools Week in 1950 originated the observance annually of this week for citizens to visit in the schools; and

WHEREAS, since the founding of the Texas Public School System 124 years ago, the growth and development of our State have been tied closely to the educational advantages available to Texas citizens and depend upon the continuance and furtherance of educational opportunities for all Texas children; and

WHEREAS, members of the State Board of Education are grateful for this continued interest of the people of Texas in public schools therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the State Board of Education designates the week of March 6 to 10, 1978, as the twenty-eighth annual Public Schools Week in Texas, and all citizens in the State are urged to visit a public school during that week;

That the State Commissioner of Education and the State Department of Education staff shall join with the State Board of Education in encouraging public school administrators and teachers to work with individual citizens, parent-teacher associations, and other organizations and agencies interested in improving educational opportunities to the children of their respective communities; and

That Public Schools Week be suggested as an appropriate week for local school officials to plan school events and educational programs which will give to each pupil and to each citizen who participates therein a better understanding of the important responsibility which rests upon the public schools in a country governed by and for the people.

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


