Rogers Named As 'Mr. East Texas'

Beaumont businessman Ben J. Rogers has been named the recipient of the 1978 Mr. East Texas award by the Tyler County Dogwood Festival directors.

Rogers, 63, is active in many business enterprises in Beaumont and Texas. After moving to Beaumont from his native Chicago in 1936, he helped open the second Texas State Optical office after his brother Sol founded the company.

Texas State Optical (TSO) became a family enterprise, and today, Rogers and his three brothers are associated in the management of more than 145 optical offices in Texas, New Mexico, and Louisiana.

Meyerland Bank in Houston, the First Security National Bank and First Security National Corporation, Gateway National Bank, San Jacinto Savings and Loan Association and Parkdale Bank, all in Beaumont.

Many civic, charitable and religious organizations are also among Rogers' interests. He is currently president of the Liberty Muscular Dystrophy Research Foundation and the Babe Didrikson Zaharias Foundation.

Rogers has been honored many times. In 1973, he was named Outstanding Texan by the Exchange Clubs of Texas for "outstanding service to the nation in any cause that strengthens our great country."

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Fire Destroys Home

Woodville volunteer firemen responded to a mid-day residence fire four miles north of Woodville just off the Chester Highway.

The home, which belongs to Travis L. Clark of Deer Park was being rented to the Billy Joe Blalock family, was two-thirds engulfed in flames when firemen arrived.

Firemen were able to extinguish the blaze but with most of the contents lost. The fire, itself, was reported by phone to the Tyler County Sheriff's office by bars A.M. Lovell who lives across the street.

The Lovell family kept Mrs. Blalock and a two year old son while firemen tried to save the home.

Early reports had indicated that Mrs. Blalock was in the kitchen cooking lunch when she smelled smoke and found the couch in the living room on fire. She then scooped up her son and ran to the Lovell's to report the fire.

RESOLVED, that the State Board of Education designate the week of March 6 to 10, 1978, as the twenty-eighth annual Public Schools Week in Texas, and all citizens in the State are urged to visit a public school during that week; and

That the State Commissioner of Education and the State Department of Education staff shall join with the State Board of Education in encouraging public school administrators and teachers to work with individual citizens, parent-teacher associations, and other organizations and agencies interested in improving educational opportunities to the children of their respective communities; and

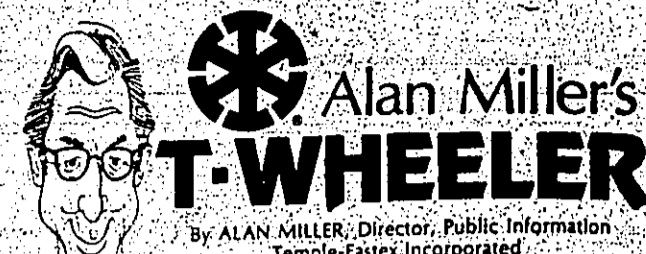
Teacher Thanks Officials For Government Day

Government Day Feb. 22

An influx of Kirby High School seniors took over the Tyler County Courthouse Wednesday as a part of special Government Day activities last week.

Approximately 90 seniors under the direction of teacher Becky Jinnette descended upon the seat of county government in the early morning hours to learn the intricacies of government from the various county officials.

Prior to Wednesday, the seniors had elected their own set of county officers, and each one was instructed by his real life counterpart.

The students also conducted two mock trials: one on the county level to commit a man to the Rusk State Mental Hospital, and a murder case on the state level. Judges, attorneys, lawyers and jury were all students.

The first courtroom drama centered on a woman who was trying to get her husband put away, but at the same time was clutching \$75,000 in inheritance in her hands. The second trial involved a murder with three suspects.

Lawyers "battled" and presented documented evidence in each case, pointing out the innocence of their client (although some were not sure exactly what their client had done).

Not to overlook any facet of county business, the students also held a commissioners' court session.

By the end of the day, the students had received a practical education in the workings of government which should help them in the future.

County Closeup: Meet Your County Clerk

The county clerk is the sentinel, the protector of county history, the duties of the office in securing and protecting all county records, land deeds, wills, births and deaths, plus a score of other records placed in the "hands" of the county for safe keeping.

County Clerk Grace Bostick considers the challenge of the job "to protect and preserve the records of this office. And, some times, we have a hard time protecting them," she added indicating that some people searching family genealogies will try and "slip out" with the original record.

The county clerk also serves as secretary to the county commissioners and is present for every meeting. It is her job to record all action taken during the sessions, handle bids, publish notices and file for permanent record all proceedings.

County records are kept in a fire-proof vault and date as far back as 1850. The history of Tyler County can be found through the recordings of births, death and marriages that date back to the late 1870's.

"Some days as many as 100 people come through this office seeking our help with land deeds and other records," Ms. Bostick said, adding "It is a joy to serve them all, and this office will always be willing to help in any way possible."

There are four deputies working under the supervision of the county clerk and office policy is regulated by state standards. All fees for services such as marriage licenses and birth certificates are also set by the state.

All monies received through the office are recorded and turned over to the county treasurer's office. This involves a monthly report audited by the county auditor and approved by the commissioners.

The office of the county clerk also handles all elections and the polling of the elections. All boxes are supervised by the county clerk and she is solely responsible for them.

Other duties of the office and/or services performed there include licensing for public notaries, and a record of all notaries listed in the county. Persons wishing to become a notary travel through the office of the county clerk to receive applications.

Army discharges are another facet of county clerk work. In some ways, the county clerk is the "mother" of the county, watching over its proceedings and making sure that all runs smoothly.

The duties of county clerk are numerous but Ms. Bostick explains "It's an enjoyment to work with the people each day and to know that they have placed their confidence in me."

Eggs, Fruits Best

COLLEGE STATION—Beef and pork prices are rising, but eggs, citrus and some vegetables offer attractive prices at Texas grocery markets, according to Mrs. Owendolyn Ciyatt.

Mrs. Ciyatt is a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

FRESH VEGETABLES—Although weather is still slowing supplies, several items offer economical prices. These include cabbage, carrots, onions, rutabaga, dry yellow onions and hard-shell squash.

Moderate prices appear on broccoli, eggplant, sweet potatoes and cauliflower.

Lettuce quality has improved and prices are lower. Asparagus is limited and prices high.

FRESH FRUITS—Grapefruit and oranges "by-the-bag" are economy buys if shoppers have adequate storage space. Although prices are now at moderate levels, Tangolot (a cross between a tangerine and a grapefruit) also boast moderate prices.

POULTRY—Eggs have lower-than-usual prices for this time of year. "A Grade A" large eggs at the economical buy price of 50¢ per dozen.

BBQ—Beef prices are steady to slightly higher than last week, and cow beef for grinding is scarce, while ground beef prices are higher. That situation is causing higher prices on weiners and luncheon meats.

PORK—Prices remain relatively high, due in part to bad weather.

Meat economical choices are fresh picnic roasts, Boston butt roasts, shoulder steaks, quarter loin cut into chops and smoked picnic.

ORCHARD MARKET—Economic include any of the attractive specials offered on canned and frozen fruits and vegetables.

CONSUMER WATCH—WORDS: For an economical change, consider "canned meats."

For the year 2,870 fires burned 43,394 acres, the largest total since 1967. In addition eight lives were lost as a result of the wildfires.

Don Staples, district forester for the Texas Forest Service's District 9, which includes Polk and Tyler Counties, reported that 48 percent of the district fires in 1977, without their concern and help, the total acreage burned by wildfires could have been doubled.

Uncontrolled Fires Cause Wildfires

LIVINGSTON—Careless debris burning was the leading cause of wildfires in East Texas in 1977, according to a report released by the Texas Forest Service.

Fifty-one percent of all wildfires controlled by the Texas Forest Service crews in the 52-county East Texas region originated from trash fires, field-clearing fires and similar causes. Arson and smoking were also important causes, with 18.54 percent and 7.56 percent respectively.

The first three months of last year were our worst, stated Staples. "In fact, this past year has probably been our worst fire season in eight years. We were extremely lucky to keep most of our fires under control. Our crews can spread in extremely dry ground cover fuels, and the chances of our crews must travel to reach a fire."

Although most of our fires were detected by fire patrol aircraft, we still rely on the general public as an important wildfire reporting source, Staples said. Private citizens reported more than 48 percent of the district fires in 1977. Without their concern and help, the total acreage burned by wildfires could have been doubled.
