



Festival Celebration Saturday

The Tyler County Dogwood Festival winds up its 35th year Saturday April 1 with parades, pageants and dances.

Kicking off Saturday afternoon events will be the Dogwood Queen's Parade boasting of over 200 entries consisting of colorful floats, lively band music and spirited entertainment.

Parade Marshal Leon Hale of the Houston Post will lead the parade which will begin at 2 p.m. west of town and travel east on Bluff street. The procession will carry out this year's "fantasy" theme with storybook characters which promise to delight the eyes of festival goers.

Activity will abound all

day around the county courthouse with a square dance exhibition by the Dogwood Squares, concession and craft booths and a variety of other events.

"Fantasy in Thicket Land" will be the theme for this year's Dogwood Festival Coronation and Pageant to be held at the Dogwood Amph-

theatre located behind the Kirby High School starting at 7:30 p.m.

The story tells of a make-believe first Dogwood Festival set deep in the piney woods of East Texas. The pageant will climax with a spectacular fireworks display by the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department.

The 1978 Dogwood Queen

will be chosen from five Tyler County girls.

Ben Rogers of Beaumont will be honored as Mr. East Texas during the pageant.

Topping of the final day of the festival are two dances. For persons under 18, disc jockey J.J. Stone of radio station KWIC in Beaumont

will provide music for the Queen's Ball that begins at 10 p.m. in the Kirby High School Gym.

The adults can dance to the music of "Sweet Honey" at the Dogwood Dance held at the Woodville Inn beginning at 10 p.m. and lasting until 2 a.m. Tickets are \$15 per couple.

Festival goers are also invited to tour the various dogwood trails as outlined in the official Dogwood Book and last week's Tyler County Booster. The dogwood blooms, wild azaleas and other natural beauties in Tyler County shows why spring is honored each year with the annual Dogwood Festival.

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Area Trustee Elections Scheduled For April 1

All five Tyler County school districts will hold trustee elections this Saturday, April 1.

WOODVILLE ISD
In Woodville, incumbent WISD Board President R.E. Swearingen will be running against Troy Pfeider for position 1, while newcomers Beth Allison and Jim Pool are candidates for position 2.

The Woodville ISD voting box will be located in the Kirby High School main building, located at the north end of Charlton Street. Voting hours will be 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

WARREN ISD
The Warren ISD election will also feature a pair of two-candidate races. Incumbent Harold T. Davis and newcomer J.R. (Dick) Johnston are vying for position 4 on the board. In the position 5 race, newcomers Luther Moyer and Joe Thomas Weeks are running for the trusteeship formerly held by R.H. Elliot.

Voting boxes for the Warren school election will be located at Fred Elementary School, the Warren Junior High School Library and the Village Mills Methodist Church. Voting hours will be from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

COLMESNEIL ISD
Eight candidates are on the ballot for three at-large trusteeships on the Colmesneil ISD. All three incumbents Charles Faircloth, Val Blanchette and Bill Hooks, and newcomers Hardy Carlton, Kenneth Freeman, Leonard Durham, Bobby Lord and Debra Freeman are in the race.

The Colmesneil school election will be held from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at the Colmesneil Community Center.

CHESTER ISD
Chester voters will fill three 3-year terms and one unexpired 2-year term on the CISD board.

Incumbent Sam Darden Jr. and newcomers Aubrey Cherry, James Robert Willson Wilburn, Neal Larry Trest, James Loving and Donald Wayne Woodrome will be on the ballot for the 3-year terms.

Eunice Standley, who was appointed to fill a vacancy on the board, and newcomer R.D. Connor are the only candidates for the 2-year unexpired term.

Voting in the Chester

school election will take place from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at the Chester school cafeteria.

SPURGER ISD
Spurger voters will be mainly concerned with filling position 1 on the SISD board, as incumbent Henry Joe Jordan is uncontested in his bid for re-election to position 2.

Candidates for the position 1 trusteeship are Ed L. Matthews, Virgil A. Segrest,

John A. Morris and Johnny Smart.

Position 1 Trustee John M. Hicks did not file for re-election as he is a candidate for county commissioner from Precinct 4.

The Spurger voting box will be located in the vocational agriculture building on the high school campus. Voting hours will be 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Municipal Elections Feature Council Races

Voters in three Tyler County cities will go to the polls to elect new council members this Saturday, but only in Woodville and Chester are the races still in doubt.

All three incumbent council members in Colmesneil will serve another term as they failed to draw any opposition on the April 1 ballot.

Returning to office will be Cecil Ogden, Ross Gardner and Rex Christy. St. Colmes-

neil city voting will take place from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at the Community Center.

In Woodville, Mayor Terry Watts is unopposed, but two incumbents and one newcomer will be vying for two at-large positions on the council.

Homebuilder John A. Gilchrist and incumbents Doug Tolbert and Dr. Malcolm Radford are the candidates for

aldermen.

Woodville voters will be able to cast their ballots from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at the city fire station, 215 Davillon St.

In Chester, only one candidate is running for mayor but there are five candidates running for three at-large council posts.

Ollie Woodrome, 67, is the only candidate for mayor.

The candidates for the council are newcomers Dennis K. Johnson, Charles McMillan and David McGahey, and incumbents Sue Torres Davis and John Wallace.

The Chester city election box will be located at the Lions Den in the Masonic Hall and will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday.

Davis Announces For Warren Board

WARREN—Harold T. Davis has announced his candidacy for re-election to position 4 on the Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees in the April 1 election.

Davis, the owner of Davis Grocery in Warren, has been a WISD trustee for the past six years.

"Many rumors have hit the political gossip circuit," said Davis. "I suppose one of the greatest untruths is that I am opposed to athletics and am trying to stamp out the

program. Both are erroneous. First of all, I feel a well-rounded athletic program is necessary in any school system and secondly, it is virtually impossible for one person to add or extract any portion of your program as outlined for your district," added Davis.

"In my opinion, we are losing sight of the original intent of educating the child. Too much stress is being placed on athletics and not enough on academics.

"Past experiences warn me that endorsing some issues is costly. Because of the position that I have taken on certain matters, my business and my family have sacrificed," said Davis. "I have no past regrets because I feel that I was acting in the best interest of the school district. I merely mention this to clarify the fact that although a businessman, I will continue to fight for what I feel are the taxpayers' greatest profit from their tax dollar. In my opinion, this should be the desire of each board member."

Durham To Run For CISD

COLMESNEIL—Leonard Durham, 33, has announced his candidacy for trustee on the Colmesneil Independent School District Board in the April 1 election.

A native of Colmesneil, Durham is married and has two children who attend the Colmesneil school. He graduated from Colmesneil High School in 1963, has been employed for the past 11 years with the Gulf Oil Corporation.



"I urge voters to take an interest and vote in this trustee election," said Durham. "Education today will be the key to our children's tomorrow. A quality education for every child should be the goal of each board member, teacher and parent."

Durham will be running against seven other candidates including three incumbents for three at-large trusteeships on the CISD board.

County Approves Tax Office Repairs

Tyler County's tax office will be getting a face lift as county commissioners voted Monday to hire an architect to begin working on plans and

speculations for improvements estimated to cost the county \$40-\$45,000.

Architect Don R. Cole will receive \$3,150 for his services which will include plans and supervision of the construction.

Additions to the present 40-by-40 building will include two offices, extended counter space, work areas for various persons who must use the

office and a large lobby.

"We are so crowded in there now we can hardly move around," said Tax Assessor/Collector Barbara Tolbert.

County Attorney Rols Brockman said that additions and improvements to the entire courthouse must be considered and that space in all county offices was getting crowded.

County Commissioners also voted to ask the city of Woodville to assume one half the payment of a new John Deere 750 Crawler bull-

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Pfleider To Run For WISD Trustee

WOODVILLE—Troy Pfeider, 41, has announced his candidacy for position 1 on the Woodville Independent School District Board of Trustees in the April 1 election.

Pfleider, a 1960 graduate of Stephen F. Austin State University, is employed by the Woodville Lumber Company in timber procurement, a position he has held for five years.

Pfleider, his wife Peggy and son Joey, 16, moved to Woodville six years ago. Joey is a sophomore at Kirby High School and the Pfeiders are members of the First Baptist Church.

Prior to coming to Woodville, Pfeider held several positions. He was with the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington state, superintendent of a particle board plant and assistant manager of a plywood mill. He also spent two years with DuPont working in computers and chemical research in connection with the NASA space program.

"I elected to the board of trustees. I intend to see what can be done to raise the standard of education and athletics in the WISD without spending more money than necessary," said Pfeider. "I, too, am a tax payer and represent many other landowners who are concerned about

rising taxes.

"Such things as students being taught the basics and having proper supervision and encouragement in class and athletics is my wish for the students of this school district," Pfeider added. "I also believe in a board of trustees open and sensitive to the needs and desires of everyone in the district."

Pfleider will be opposing incumbent WISD Board President Dr. R.E. Swearingen on the April 1 ballot for position 1.

Watts indicated that the city would probably favor the request and also pay a percentage of upkeep costs.

Tabled from the last meeting was the approval of the auditor's yearly report prepared by Keys and Company and John S. Epps. Commissioners voted to accept the report and commend county personnel for their good record keeping.

County fair board appointments were also announced during the Monday meeting naming Precinct 1 residents, Mrs. Harold Davis and Ben Worthy, both of Woodville and Precinct 3 residents, Louise Owens of Woodville and Clifford Hall, of Colmesneil to serve two-year terms on the board.

County Commissioners will meet again April 10 for the regular meeting at 10 a.m. in the courtroom on the first floor of the courthouse.

Peanut Spice Cake - An Inviting Dessert

Cake is a natural accompaniment to coffee and pastries can be bought in most bakeries, nothing surpasses the homemade variety.

Suggested recipe: Peanut Spice cake, a moist tube cake, laced with peanuts, citrus and spices, topped with a luscious Cream Cheese Frosting. A swirl of chocolate meringue nuts gives the cake added flavor and texture.

PEANUT SPICE CAKE
2 cups sifted flour
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/2 cup margarine, softened
1 cup sugar
1/3 cup molasses
1 egg
1/2 cup chopped Peanuts

Cream Cheese Frosting (recipe below)
2 tablespoons chopped Peanuts Cocktail
Sift flour, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves together. Set aside.
In large bowl, cream margarine and sugar together. Add eggs, beat well. Blend in molasses. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk, being until well blended. Stir in 1/2 cup peanuts. 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
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

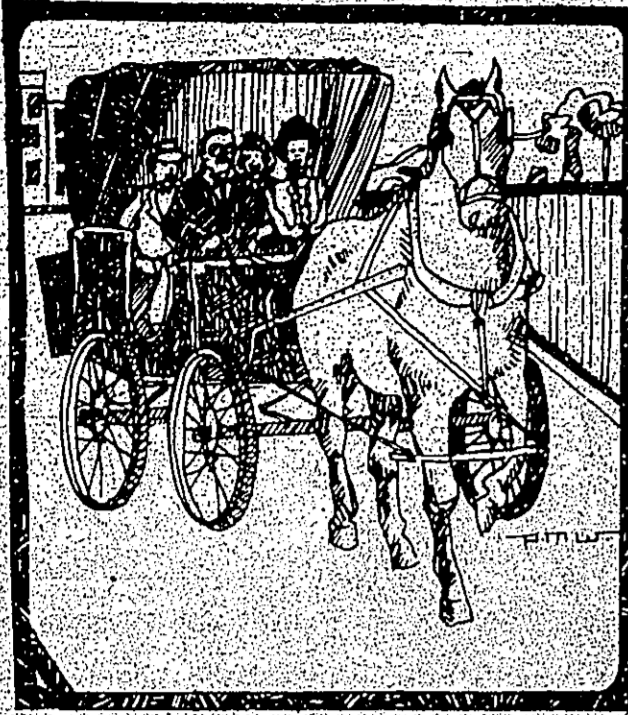

National Forests Serve The Public

LUFKIN—The National Forests in Texas. What do you get from them? In recent years the forests are growing three times as much timber volume as is cut on an annual basis but public demands for more goods and services from the national forests is in conflict with other demands for preservation and conversion to wilderness.

The greatest challenge facing the National Forests in Texas today is balancing the sound land management practices to provide something for everyone while perpetuating the forests forever.

Today, the National Forests in Texas stretch throughout 12 Texas counties, comprised of 661,830 acres of land.

On the land, there are 6,356 head of cattle grazing on the forage of grasses for which 235 cattle owners pay a monthly fee.

Wildlife food, such as sorghum and bahia grasses, have been planted on 419 acres to improve the forest as deer habitat.

Another eight and a half miles of ground cover have been sited up to stimulate new vegetative growth to feed the wildlife.

Three new watering ponds were constructed on your lands last year to give the deer a drink, and more ponds were set out last year for a total of 120 nesting boxes being maintained for the wood ducks.

Another 10,879 acres of land were burned by Forest Service professionals last year under carefully controlled conditions to stimulate new vegetation growth that the animals like to eat. Eastern wild turkeys were reintroduced to the lands last year, and you'll have to find them.

And many trees were cut last year on 168 acres that were blocking the holes and flying routes of the endangered Red-Cockaded Woodpecker to help increase its population.

Over 150,000 acres of land received intensive soil surveys last year to be sure that they are put to the best possible use.

A comprehensive evaluation was also completed on the shoreline erosion the lakes last year and a \$70,000 project is now underway to keep your soil from washing away.

A new boat launching ramp was built last year on the shore of Lake Conway and a new campground and another boat ramp is now under construction there.

All told, 251,230 people used some of their leisure time last year to take advantage of the 531 campsites, 11 picnic sites, 7 swimming beaches, 11 boat launching ramps, 4 campfire theaters, and many miles of hiking and interpretive trails.

Another 750,000 people took the time last year and just that first decade of public ownership to help the U.S. Forest Service guide the management and protection of the watersheds, timber, forage and outdoor recreation opportunities that are still in developing stages.

By the end of the decade the new timber stands were growing vigorously and the national forest lands were well on their way to recovery.

As time passed and the forests developed, new long range plans looked to the future with a view to perpetuating the growth of the forests while making use of the various renewable resources now being produced on these lands.

Early timber sales were primarily thinning and improvement cuts designed to improve the growth of the young and healthier trees, but in the early 60's harvest cuts were needed as the stands matured, and the common method was clearcutting with follow-up reforestation.

The Forest Service wrote prescriptions for each compartment of the land, detailing the trees to be sold, cut and removed while being ever mindful of the impact on other resources and mitigating any possible environmental consequences.

The objective to provide a balanced output of goods and services was reinforced by the Multiple-Use Sustained-Yield Act of 1960 which directed that the resources were to be managed to provide a combination that would best meet the needs of our citizens.

While multiple use may have different meanings to different people, the objective of the Forest Service is to provide an optimum level of goods and services in ALL resources with no single product maximized at the expense of others.

Lumberton Rodeo Set



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


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
