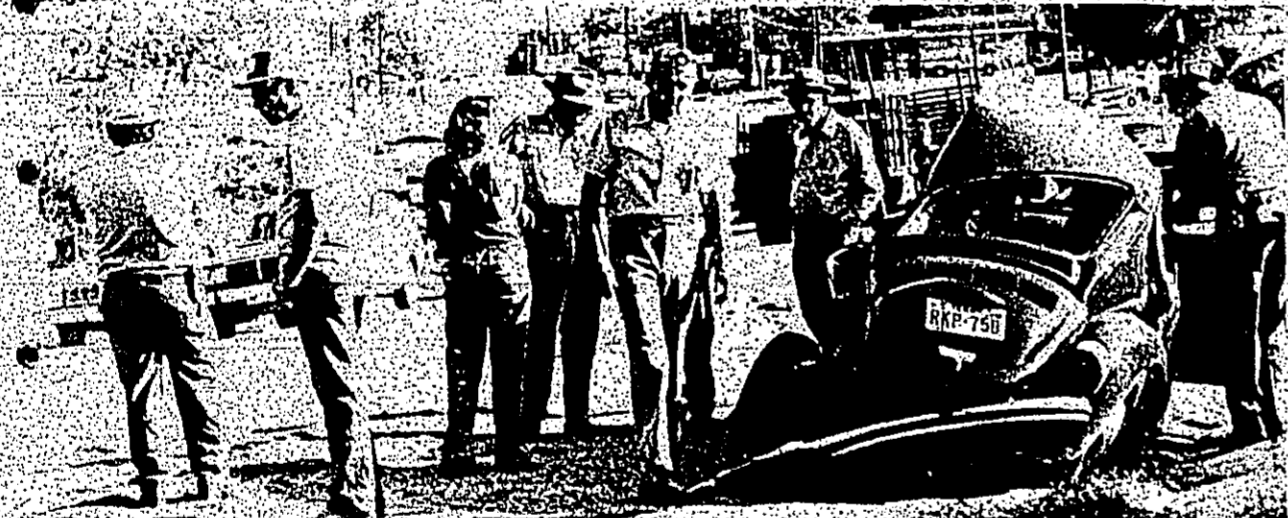

Court Acts On New Road

Tyler County Commissioners met in special session Monday afternoon to determine and set land values on property to be for the extension of FM 92 north from the Dam-B community to Recreation Road 255.

According to County Judge Allen Sturrock the value is determined by "comparable sales and location of the land in that area."

Commissioners, who are looking at only \$30,000 to purchase some 52 acres and move the utilities, voted Monday to set the value of the land along the proposed road at \$450 per acre.

Owners of the land will be able to sell any timber and improvements raising the individual value, commissioners said, to around \$600 to \$650 per acre, depending on the amount of timber and improvements to be sold.

Commissioners will now send the proposed values to the State Highway Department in Austin and will begin to notify persons whose land is under study, of the price the county will be willing to pay.

"The minute the road is finished," said Commissioner Leon Fowler, "the value of the surrounding property will increase considerably. I hope people realize that."

Immunization Clinic To Continue

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be conducted at the Lions Den, Jasper Hwy., Woodville, Tx.

The next clinic will be held May 5, 1978 at 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Future clinic dates will be announced.

Also during the meeting commissioners voted to release a \$150,000 University of Houston "pledge bond" on the recommendation of bank officers at Citizens State Bank in Woodville.

Sturrock explained that when a bank makes a bid to be the county depository, State Law requires that the bank pledge a bond in another bank, to provide the county with security should the local bank fold.

The University of Houston bond is just one of several that insures the county of \$400,000 should Citizens State Bank, the county depository, "fold under," Sturrock stated.

The bonds will be replaced with a \$50,000 bond on the Dallas-Fort Worth Airport and a \$100,000 bond on a Tarrant County Hospital.

"It's just a mechanical thing," Sturrock said, "it's for the county's protection and does not cost the county any money."

Commissioners will meet in regular session Monday, May 8 in the Commissioners Courtroom, first floor of the Tyler County Courthouse.

Chester I.S.D. Calls \$700,000 Bond Election

The Chester Independent School District Trustee's have voted to call a School Improvement Bond Election for Saturday, May 20, 1978. Total amount of the bonds is \$700,000.

The Trustee's unanimous decision to ask voter approval of these bonds concludes several months of study and investigation, said School Superintendent David Malone.

The major construction expense will be for a New 16,000 square foot Elementary School, Malone said.

In addition to the necessary class rooms and offices, the building will feature a combination cafeteria/auditorium which can be arranged to seat 300 to 400 people at functions, such as graduation and school plays.

The new school will be constructed north of the High School on the Old Elementary School site. When the school is completed for occupancy plans are to demolish the present elementary school and the site made into a courtyard and "commons" area for the schools.

Other needs included in the bond program are: Air conditioning of the High School, and some needed repairs. A tax increase will be needed to retire the construction bonds over a 20 year period. Malone said that details of actual tax impacts to the Chester School District will be forthcoming in the next week.

Patrons of the Chester I.S.D. are encouraged to come by or contact the Superintendent's Office for information about the building program.

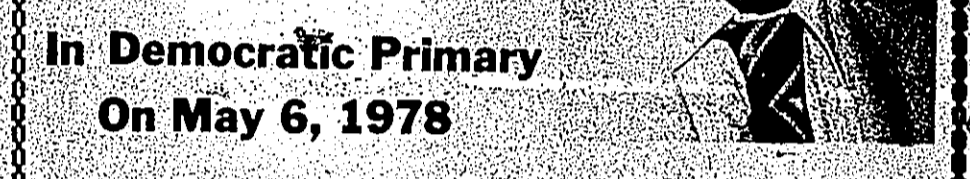

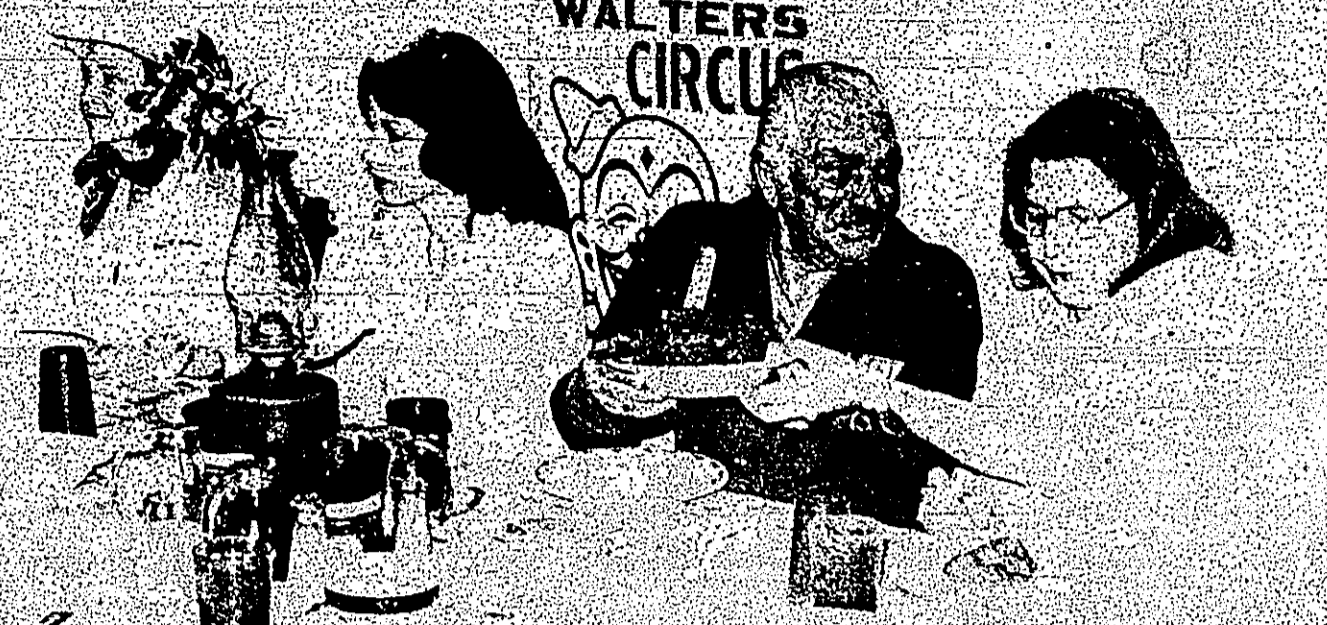


Looking for her native country, Gray points out the many states and countries that have visited the village and at right, Arab representatives pose in front of the world's largest 'Mantel Clock'.



Camp Meetings Popular In Early Texas
Camp meetings arrived in Texas almost at the same time as the Protestant denominations which sponsored them. From the days of the Republic until after the turn of the century they provided not only a hearty dose of religion for those who lived remote from churches, but also a welcome opportunity for reunion with acquaintances and relatives who lived too far away for regular visits. Typically, families would arrive at the meeting ground equipped with food and the necessities of camping for a period of one to two weeks. Many brought along a cow for milking. At least some arrangements were made at the site for sanitary facilities, and occasionally also for community kitchens. A "boarded-up" "trunk arbor" - an open-sided, roofed structure filled with benches provided shade and shelter for worship services. A persuasive preacher was always on hand to conduct services, and occasionally also to lead the singing. Between the song services, the Bible study groups and the sermons, grown-up children played and frolicked for fun. Young couples were sometimes able to marry, a little courtship, though their elders carefully observed their whereabouts and activities. Repeated below is a description of some of the facilities available at such a meeting, held in Austin County in 1911. The meeting's daily program began at 6 a.m. with morning prayer. With time out for meals and rest, the remainder of the day was filled with a series of lectures, preaching services, study groups and song sessions. The final sermon of the day began at 8:30 p.m. and continued into the night. On this occasion both the preaching and the singing were conducted by Rev. G. Harbin. **PROGRAM OF THE HOME-CAMP MEETING** - July 6 to 10, 1911. Twenty-fifth Anniversary of Brethren District Camp Meeting, East, 1887. **"MUSIC:** Rev. W.G. Harbin will again be director of music, and will be assisted by organists, violinists and voices from Brethren, Chappel Hill or Bellville and other points in the District. **"THE GROUNDS:** The Camp Grounds consist of 25 acres of land, well set in grass and large trees which furnish at all times of the day abundant shade. The tabernacle is a large and commodious one, admirably situated for the purpose, comfortably seated and well lighted. **"TRANSPORTATION:** Transportation may be secured from Kenney, Chappel Hill or Bellville. Hacks run regularly every day from Chappel Hill as most traveling is through this point. **"LACATION:** The Camp Ground is situated in the Bre-

Middle-East Women In East Texas History Highlights Tour

A dinner of fried chicken, flour dumplings and peach cobbler, served Texas style at family sized tables, was the chosen Monday when some 60 women from the mid-east countries visited Woodville's Heritage Garden Village as part of a tour sponsored by the United States and American Arab Chambers of Commerce. The women are the wives of some 130 prominent businessmen from the Arab countries who are in the United States to meet with American businessmen and government leaders in an unprecedented effort to establish new business relations with the Arab world. East Texas and Heritage Gardens was chosen for the tour to show the women early American ways and rural living according to tour guide Mrs. Dee Gamal of Houston. Since their arrival in April, the women have toured New York where Tiffani presented a jewelry show and Houston where they were entertained with a tour of Nass and a style show presented by Neiman Marcus. Clyde Gray, owner of Heritage Garden Village, took the ladies on a tour through the museum, pointing out the many aspects of early life in the piney woods. The women were able to try their hand among the other things on an old water pump, suffer and meat grinders and visited a home typical to the lives of Texas settlers. The visitors to this village however, were not the only ones to see a way of life not like their own. While touring one museum, the interpreter for the group, a concert pianist began playing the homeland music of the Arab world on a very old and worn piano. The lively music quickly got the ladies in a festive mood, stimulating one Jordanian woman into showing us Americans one of her native dances. The hand clapping and quick steps transformed the Texas museum into a musical filled Arab location. Following the tour of the village, the ladies were escorted to the main dining room where they were greeted with a Texas style dinner. By special request of the tour officials, rice and cabbage had been added to the menu. Many of the Arab visitors, exclaimed that they haven't eaten that well since the tour began in April and the sounds of laughter and hearty eating dominated the room. Gray said that the choice of visiting the village was "not for East Texas." Out of all the rural locations in America the tour guides chose us to represent small towns and rural life in the United States. "Consider it a great honor," he said. Upon leaving, one lady from the country of Egypt told us that their visit to Texas had been the most enjoyable. "Everyone is so friendly here, they ask how you are and what they can do for you," she said. "I am most pleased that we came to your Texas."

REAL CAMPING: Do those who attend are urged to do real camping, come prepared to eat and sleep at their own camp. Campers should bring with them a cot, sheets and needed bedding for same, and such cooling vessels as they will need. Groceries, ice, meat and bakers' bread may be secured daily by phone. **"HOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS:** A hotel will be run where meals and lodging can be had or board secured for the entire meeting. **"BATHS:** There are bath houses with shower baths for both ladies and gentlemen entirely free of charge. **"WATER SUPPLY:** The water is the purest and best in the land, and the supply is abundant. A fine well with good pump, cistern and hydrants all over the grounds is the source of supply. Many of the conveniences available to campers at this relatively late date must have seemed miraculous to Texas who had attended similar meetings 50 or more years before. The camp meeting in modern times were working to end the camp meeting as an established place in rural and semi-rural society. Within a decade or two rapid transportation, improved roads, and telephone and the radio would end the attraction of the extended camp meeting as an opportunity to hear the gospel and tell the gospel. Although church members are still held today, the old fashioned gathering under the brush arbor are, for the most part, only a fading memory.

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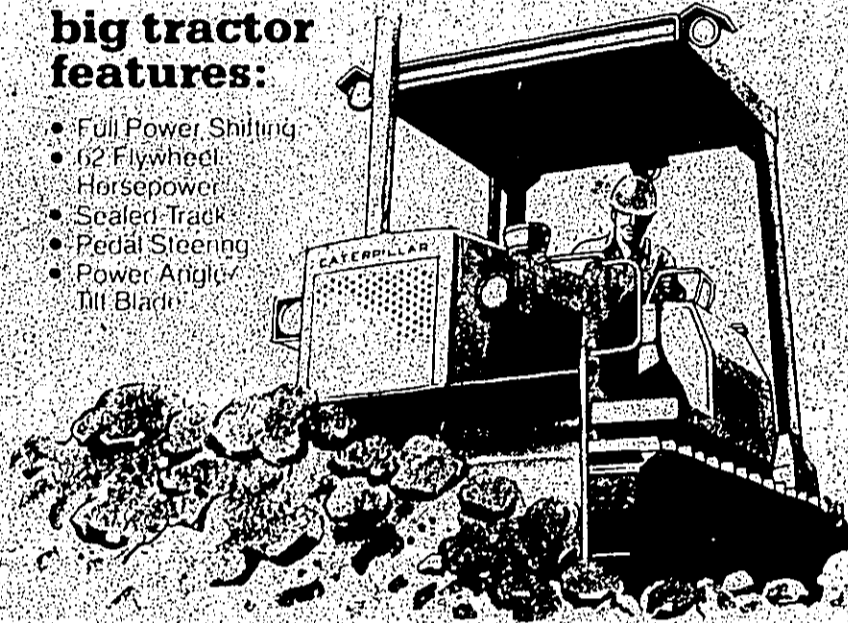
